### Free Dance On Thursday In Ballroom

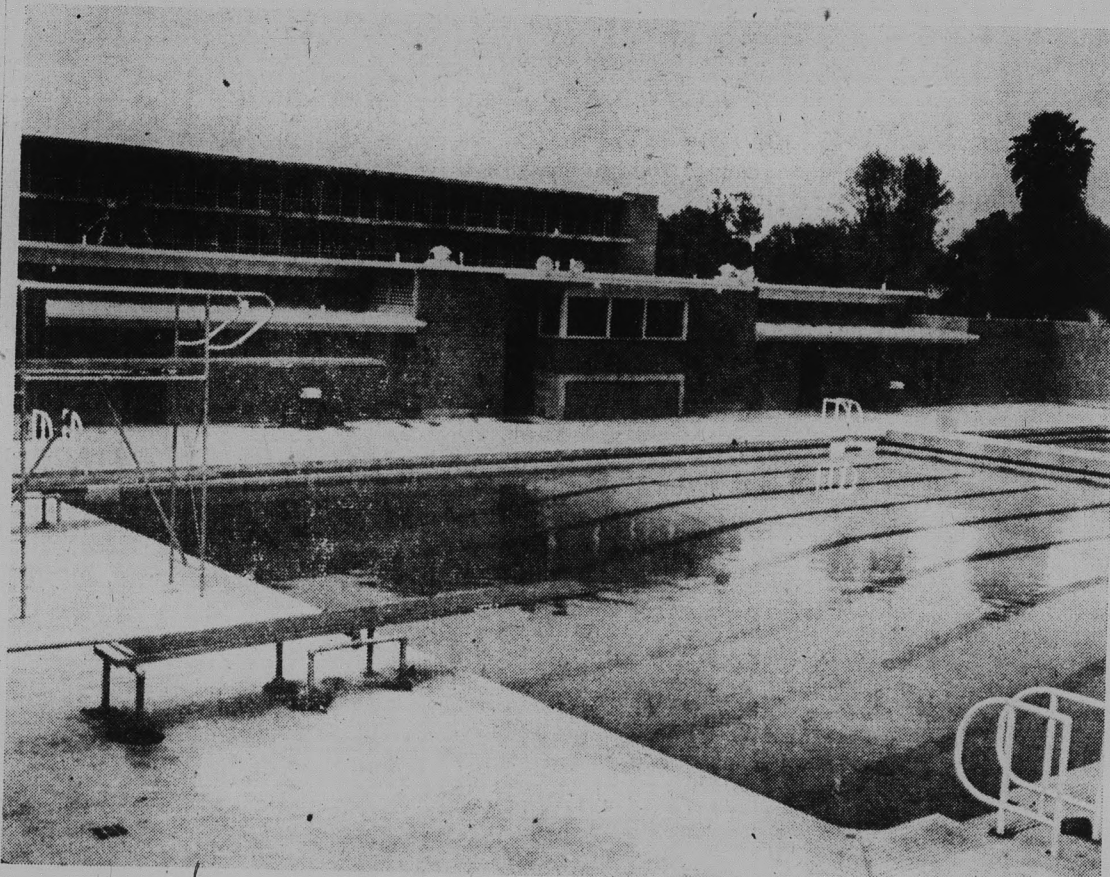

### First Devils To Hit Water At Ten O'clock

A dream becomes a reality when the swimming pool at Arizona State will be splashed into use Monday morning, July 22.

Second session summer students at AS will be the first Sun Devils to use the long awaited swimming pool.

The pool itself incorporates many features not found in most commercial swimming pools.

**CLYDE SMITH**, Director of Athletics at Arizona State said that the pool will employ the most modern features of swimming pool construction, including a sanitation-circulation system that completely changes the water every six hours and a jet system on the bottom to provide super chlorination.

The service areas of which there are three, and the dressing room areas are up-to-date in design according to Smith.

The pool itself is 60 feet wide and 75 feet and one-half inch in length. The width provides for eight lanes which is two lanes wider than most competition pools.

**SWIMMERS** in competitive events will race over tiled lanes instead of between the usual parallel black tar lines.

The fractional addition to the length was incorporated as insurance, in case a record is set in the pool.

The pool is actually two in one. A permanent bulkhead separates the east end of the pool from the larger west portion. The smaller pool will be used for hydro-therapy and instruction.

The larger west pool extends from a 3 1/2 ft. depth to a 13 foot depth.

### Second Session Registration Totals Record 2159 Students

Registration records for second summer sessions at Arizona State were topped when 2,159 students had been enrolled by Wednesday morning, Registrar Alfred Thomas reported.

Total for the 1956 second summer session was 2143, which was an increase of about 200 over 1955. The final total for the 1957 session may run over 2,200.

**DISTRIBUTION** of registrants was 1511 undergraduates and 648 graduates, approximately the same proportion as in the first summer session.

Heaviest rush was early in the morning, with lines extend-

ing for several blocks from Engineering block D, where class cards were given out by classroom teachers. By noon more than three-quarters of the prospective students had been enrolled, and many checking and listing lines were closed down in early afternoon.

**ONLY** untoward incident of the registration was failure of the air conditioning in the Memorial Union Ballroom for several hours in the morning. This was offset, however, by the punch ladled out to perspiring registrants after they completed their programming through courtesy of the Memorial Union.

### Shapiro Named Director Of AS Business Services

Dr. Harold A. Shapiro, associate professor of economics at Arizona State, has been named acting director of the AS Bureau of Business Services.

As the new director, Dr. Shapiro will be in charge of an expanded bureau, the two main functions of which include:

Serving as a laboratory for practical experiences for students. The laboratory aspects will be increased because of the new master of science degree program in business going into immediate effect:

**SERVING** as a center for business research, seminars and individual counseling for businessmen of the Valley.

Dr. Shapiro, who joined the AS faculty in 1956, was for three years head of the department of economics, sociology and business at Arkansas State College, Conway, Arkansas. He earned his doctor of philosophy degree in economics and government at the Univer-

sity of Texas and his master's degree at the University of Wisconsin.

### Featured Assembly Speaker Is Consulting Psychologist

Dr. Herbert Chamberlain, consulting psychologist from Sacramento, California, will be featured speaker at an assembly on Tuesday, July 23 at 9 a.m., in the Memorial Union Ballroom.

A former member of the Delinquency Control Institute held annually on the Arizona State campus, Dr. Chamberlain's talk will deal with various psychological factors in young people.

An assembly schedule has been announced by Dr. Roy C. Rice, director of Summer Sessions, that will enable all students to attend.

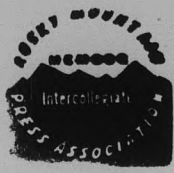

Dr. Clement Kevane, head of the U. S. Navy solar furnace contract held by the college, will lecture on "Solar Energy and Its Uses" in Science Building room 250 before the demonstration.

AFTER THE lecture, the audience will be taken in groups to the roof of the Science building to see the furnace in actoin. The instrument will be used to blast chips off rocks, instantly ignite wood, and melt holes in bricks.

AT THE FAR west end of the pool a 3 meter diving board is flanked by two one meter boards. The 13 ft. depth was incorporated as a safety measure since most competitive pools use a 11 1/2 ft. depth for diving purposes.

Smith said use of the pool will be free to summer session students, the only requirement for admission is the student's paid receipt for registration from which a temporary admission card will be issued at the front service area of the pool.

Although tank suits will be employed during the regular school semesters, summer students are required to bring their own suits and towels.

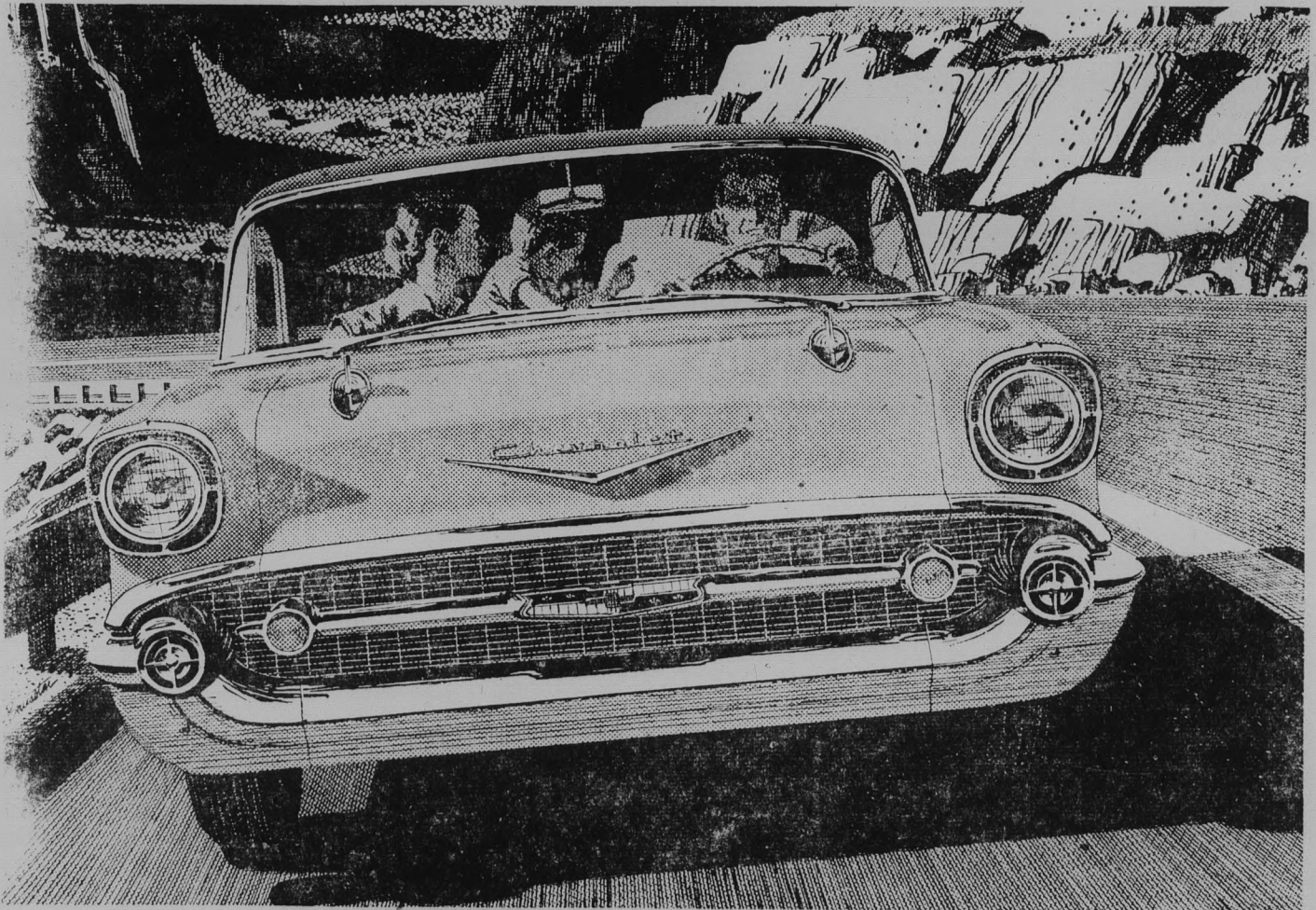
