## Dewey Picks Taylor for GOP State Chairman

Washington (GNS)—Governor Dewey has placed his stamp of approval on Rep. Dean F. Taylor (R-N.Y.) of Troy as the next Republican State Chairman for New York State.

Dewey singled out Taylor to succeed Glenn Bedenkapp of Niagara Falls in the state chairmanship at a breakfast meeting here today with the entire New York State GOP Congressional delegation, including Senator vice.

Bedenkapp, who served for four years, has wanted to resign for some time. It is understood he is to get a \$18,000 a year appointment to the State Public Service Commission.

The Governor would neither confirm nor deny this report, but there are two vacancies at present on the commission.

Taylor said later his acceptance of the GOP state chairmanship would be contingent upon his health.

The Congressman has not fully recovered from a recent operation. He intended to take a physical checkup early next week, then advise the Governor's office in Albany of his doctor's recommendations.

Taylor also said that if he accepted the state chairmanship, he would resign his seat in Congress, feeling that he would have to devote full-time duty to the New York GOP organization with a difficult election coming in 1950.

Dewey told other members of the New York delegation that he regards Taylor as a man "of great services and ability," and commends his opinion. There was unanimous agreement that Taylor, if physically able, should get the job.

## Death Claims 2 Noted Trainers Of Horses, Both Spa Visitors

Two widely-known trainers of thoroughbred horses, both Saratoga summer visitors, have died this last week. They are Kimball Patterson, 77, retired, who was stricken with a heart attack at his home in Santa Monica, Calif., on Wednesday, Feb. 2, and William Mason Wallace, 78, who died at his home in Hollis, L. I., Monday after an illness of several months. They were close friends and former associates.

A native of Kentucky, Patterson added to his list of stakes winners: Rock O'Brien, 1909; Eternal, 1918, and Leonardo II, 1920. The last named was developed and raced for E. F. Simms of Kalapa Stock Farm.

Patterson had been living at Santa Monica for the last 25 years and had not been active in racing for 15 years.

His father, Roderick Patterson, was one of the leading harness race drivers of his day, while his brother, the late Charles Patterson, trained such stars at Hamburg, Orman and Omar Khayyam.

Wallace started as a young man with the horses of Byron McLeland, training later for Simms and for Edward Axton and Arnold Hanger, among others. In 1886 he saddled 'The Commoner' which

## County Group Discusses Cattle Health

The status of dairy cattle health in the county was the theme of a meeting of the Extension Service called Tuesday afternoon at the Extension Service office.

Robert D. Gusewicz, assistant county agricultural agent, reviewed the discussion at the Dec. 21 meeting of the committee. H. T. Huckle, county agricultural agent, reported on the educational program carried on by the Extension Service during the last year on dairy cattle health programs.

Richard Hazlett and Ellis Faulkner, members of the dairy cattle health committee of the Saratoga County Board of Supervisors, reported on the work done to date in Saratoga County. He said testing for tuberculosis among dairy animals was conducted satisfactorily in nearly all sections of the county.

Approximately 1,700 heifer calves were vaccinated during the last year as a preventive of tuberculosis disease. This number is about half the total number of replacement animals raised. Dr. Minister said the vaccination program in Saratoga County is keeping pace with other counties of the state.

Dr. Ivan Howe, Albany, director of the Bureau of Animal Industry, reviewed the calfhood vaccination program on a statewide basis. He reported rapid strides throughout the state in recent years on this program. The group made plans to continue the publicity and educational program through the Extension Service.

Dr. J. D. Minister, Glenn Field district supervisor of veterinarians, reported on the work done to date in Saratoga County. He said testing for tuberculosis among dairy animals was conducted satisfactorily in nearly all sections of the county.

The group also took action concerning the quoting of prices paid dairy farmers for milk. It was recommended that the price be quoted on a quart basis as well as on the hundredweight basis. A copy of the recommendation will be sent to the New York State Farm Bureau Federation Dairy Committee.
