CHAMBERLAIN WARNS NATION OF PROLONGED WAR AGAINST GERMANY

A LONG ECONOMIC STRUGGLE DEEMED MOST EFFECTIVE MEANS TO DEFEAT HITLERISM; UNITY AND DETERMINATION OF BRITAIN STRESSED

ALL HOPES FOR PEACE SHATTERED

LONDON, Sept. 27 (Central-United Press)—Prime Minister Chamberlain warned the nation from the House of Commons yesterday to prepare for a long economic struggle which would eventually destroy the Nazi war machine and defeat Hitlerism.

Mr. Chamberlain accused Germany of callous disregard for humanity and the rules of submarine warfare in attacking all shipping, including neutrals, while en route to England.

He said that such progress in being made in the war as Chamberlain had warned that "quick results cannot be expected."

Striking a more optimistic note, the First Lord of Admiralty, Mr. Winston Churchill, told the House of Commons that the German submarine menace is being rapidly reduced. He said that it is possible one-third of the German submarines as she have already been destroyed.

Mr. Chamberlain indicated that Germany's economic stranglehold would be a major phase of the Allied strategy instead of destroying an immediate military destruction of the Reich. He said that Britain has seized 250,000 tons of contraband en route to Germany in the first three weeks of the war.

Turning his attention to the Western Front, Mr. Chamberlain said that the French have continued to make progress in certain localities and have succeeded, notwithstanding the increasing German reaction, in maintaining all gains in tact.

Prime Minister Chamberlain said that the general object of economic warfare was to "organize Germany's economic structure and make it impossible for her to continue the war." However, he warned that Germany possesses considerable supplies and war material wherever "quick results cannot be expected."

Peace Hopes Shattered LONDON, September 26 (Reuter)—Hopes held abroad of possible peace on the completion of the conquest of Poland, was shattered by Neville Chamberlain in the House of Commons today. He said:

"Never have our people been more united and more determined. They are resolved—and simple fact cannot be too often stressed—led themselves once for all of the perpetual threat of German aggression which Poland is only the latest instance. We and France have entered the war to rid ourselves and the world of that menace, and our eyes are once again before in their resolve to achieve that purpose."

The Prime Minister then informed the House that on the western front, the French had continued to make progress in certain localities and had succeeded "notwithstanding increasingly energetic German reaction in maintaining all their gains intact."

SERIOUS FRENCH ATTACK UNLIKELY FOR TIME BEING

Special Tactics Adopted To Save Human Lives; Rhine's Winter Floods Being Awaited

PARIS, September 26 (Central-United Press) Refusing to be rushed into an attack, which most French military experts agree would be playing into Hitler's hands, General Maurice Gamelin, commander-in-chief of the French forces, is putting into force a different tactic which is intended to save human lives.

Most experts agree that a frontal attack on the Siegfried line at its present strength would cost at least half a million men—some say one million. But if the approaching winter brings the Rhine floods and constant rains, which normally begin in October, the new Siegfried line's concrete emplacements would be menaced by an inundation.

It may be recalled that over half of the German West Wall block-houses along the Rhine were evacuated early in the summer of a surprise Rhine flood. It is normal every year when rains cause the rivers to rise, but electrically heated underground galleries of the Maginot line thus far have been able to withstand the effects of floods.

However, if the Siegfried line proves as ineffective against floods as reported, then the German general staff will be obliged to concentrate the German troops behind the fortresses of expose them in trenches.

Most observers do not expect the French to take any serious offensive action before winter although they expect that the intervening weeks will see a constant and intense shelling to blast to pieces the German fortresses.

The Siegfried fortresses themselves are only a small part of Germany's West Wall defense. It is necessary for the French artillery to comb the intermediate area before the main line in order to destroy the wire entanglements, machine-gun block-houses and tank traps.

Maginot Impregnable On the other hand, the Maginot line is believed to be impregnable along the Rhine, but the artillery action was precautionary and preventive in order to oblige the Germans to pull their troops further to the rear after the German general staff took advantage of three weeks of complete calm to install them dangerously near a few Rhine bridgeheads.

The French army along the whole Western Front proceeded yesterday with the enforcement of the plan of their commander-in-chief, General Gamelin, which calls at this phase of war for a preliminary and systematic demolition of the German fortifications.

Statement On War LONDON, Sept. 26 (Reuter)—"All the world has been deeply moved by the magnificent heroism of the defenders of Warsaw and Helia peninsula who are still holding on," declared Neville Chamberlain in his fourth statement on the war situation in the House of Commons.

HEROIC DEFENSE OF WARSAW IS STILL CONTINUING

Attacks Effectively Repulsed; Germans Reducing City By Continuous Bombardment

Artillery Duels Mark Fighting On West Front

Surprise Reich Attack Repelled By French; Reinforcements Being Rushed From Poland

LONDON, Sept. 27 (Reuter)—Warsaw radio station broadcast yesterday evening on the 21st day of the siege, spoke continuously of raids by 300 German aeroplanes and shelling by heavy artillery. Hundreds of incendiary bombs have caused many fires. Most of the public buildings are on fire. Fire brigades and civilians are said to be fighting the flames with utmost heroism but are hampered by scarcity of water. The food situation is also said to be difficult, especially in distribution owing to continual shelling and bombing. Hundreds of horses killed in streets for consumption. Eight German aeroplanes were brought down on September 25. It is impossible to estimate the loss of life. Warsaw is falling in ruins but the garrison is maintaining its defenses and has repulsed German attacks. Modlin is surrounded but is holding out bravely, says a communique issued by the Warsaw command on Sept. 26.

To Reduce City BERLIN, September 27 (Reuter)—German troops have started intensive bombardment of Warsaw in an effort to compel its defenders to surrender.

In a communique issued yesterday evening the German high command states that as a result of the failure of all efforts to convince the Warsaw garrison that further resistance is useless, "military operations for the reduction of the city have started."

Western Front PARIS, Sept. 27 (Central-United Press)—Heavy French artillery fire splintered some German fortifications on the Western Front yesterday and a Nazi counter-attack was repulsed, according to the French High Command.

It was announced that the German evacuation of civilians from the area east of Saarbrücken has been speeded up as French batteries began shattering the German defense lines.

Said a French communique: "Early in the morning a surprise German attack was repulsed on the Lauter front. Activity of the enemy's artillery was reported in the region south of Zweibrücken and south of Pirminers."

Fighting along the entire front from Saarbrücken to the Rhine has been reported. The French High Command reported brisk aerial activity all along in which the French allegedly scored two victories against German combat squadrons.

A French communique confirmed the news that the Germans raised a new type of captive balloon defenses which are called "aerial Siegfried line." It said that by electric wire it has enabled the German ground crew to explode aerial mines in an attempt to destroy Allied warplanes.

Informed quarters said that the French have taken advantage of the recent gains on the Saar front by moving their artillery positions where their effectiveness has been doubled. Unofficial but informed sources said that from the new positions the French artillery caused "destructive effects on the Siegfried positions."

Nature Of Operations PARIS, Sept. 27 (Reuter)—Scene of operations on the western front continues to be the country west of Haard; which forms a kind of link between Saar line and forest Haard.

REPORTS OF TENSION BETWEEN RUSSIA AND RUMANIA DENIED

BUCHAREST, Sept. 27 (Reuter)—Negotiations between Soviet Rumania and Rumania are categorical, stated in official quarters here. The frontier is said to be in normal relations and Soviet Rumanian relations. It is emphasized that no negotiations are being conducted on the basis of complete neutrality.

SOVIET NAVY IN NORTH IS PLACED ON WAR FOOTING

Russian Troops Manned On Estonian Border; New Developments Imminent In Eastern Europe

MOSCOW, Sept. 27 (Central-United Press)—The Soviet navy in the north was placed on a war footing yesterday as Soviet troops were massed on the Estonian border, according to a Moscow radio broadcast.

The announcement was made after the official Tass News Agency disclosed that the German Foreign Minister, Herr Joachim von Ribbentrop, visited Moscow today to discuss problems connected with the partitioning of Poland.

The official Moscow radio station said that Soviet warships are now patrolling the northern waters between Russia and Finland. It said that the Red Fleet in the White Sea was also given "new duties because of external conditions."

Herz von Ribbentrop's arrival here will climax a series of diplomatic maneuvers, which some informed circles believe is an indication that important new developments are imminent in Eastern Europe.

Reliable quarters said that the German military authorities would not accompany Herr von Ribbentrop to Moscow where he will "discuss the boundary of a possible Polish buffer state between Germany and Russia."

forces never stronger than a battalion at a time on either side. German artillery fire which has been harassing the French line has now dwindled. The position has been relatively calm except in the sector east of Zweibrücken where appreciable activity continues.

Large radio station announced that according to neutral observers a very large part of the German armies which operated in Poland, has now been transferred to the western front. Reports of concentrations of German troops at Aix la Chapelle (Aachen) and Black Forest were said to be confirmed although no information is available regarding their strength. Aix la Chapelle and other towns near the Siegfried line have been almost completely evacuated.

Strengthening Defenses According to the same source work is proceeding day and night to strengthen the defense system between Metz, Saarbrücken and Wissembourg. Concrete gun pits are being constructed and block-houses and shelters are hurriedly erected. The latest French war communique reports "activity by the enemy's artillery in the region south of Zweibrücken." At dawn an assault was repulsed on the Lauter front.

In an attempt to smash the reported mass German troop concentrations brought from Poland to the western front, French artillery units hurled shells across the Rhine near the Swiss border yesterday, according to reports reaching here. With the Germans retreating here, the Germans reported to be also massed across the Belgian border near Aachen. French military authorities here consider that the Reich might attempt a double assault through neutral countries against France. The French general staff has reported that German attempts to force a general war.

PEACE OFFENSIVE BY HITLER STATED TO BE IMMINENT

Reich Expected To Make Supreme Effort To Stop War With Britain And France

Nazi Relations With U.S. To Be Improved

Berlin Reported Considering Sending Of Ambassador Back To Washington Post

PARIS, Sept. 27 (Central-United Press)—Information reaching diplomatic quarters here said that a peace offensive by Hitler is imminent. Simultaneously, informed quarters in Berlin said that they believed important peace initiatives will be undertaken this week. They are believed to be in the form of a joint Rome-Berlin action.

To Make Supreme Effort LONDON, Sept. 27 (Central-United Press)—Germany will make a supreme effort this week to make peace with Britain and France despite the flat statements by leaders of the Allied powers that peace cannot come until Hitlerism is destroyed, according to reports from Paris and Berlin.

Berlin reports said that Chancellor Hitler would "temporarily" visit the German campaign in Poland this week and then, with the probable cooperation of Premier Mussolini, would sue for peace.

Berlin reported that informed quarters there believed that important peace initiatives would be undertaken this week with probable Italian cooperation.

Paris reports said that information reaching diplomatic quarters there indicated that Hitler's peace offensive is imminent. Observers recalled that aside from warfare on the high seas, Germany has thus far refrained from attacking Britain and France. Despite the British and French aerial attacks on German cities and the French drive into the Reich, the Saar front Germany has not attempted to bomb Paris, London or other Allied cities. Observers believe that as long as Hitler holds the German air force check he must still hold hopes that peace with Britain and France can be achieved.

Nazi-U.S. Relations

BERLIN, September 27 (Central-United Press)—The campaign by Nazi Germany to improve relations with the United States was reportedly under way last night after Chancellor Hitler and Foreign Minister Ribbentrop returned to Berlin from the Polish front.

Herr Hitler and Herr von Ribbentrop returned to the capital by plane and proceeded immediately to the Tempelhof airfield.

Reliable quarters simultaneously reported that Germany is considering sending German Ambassador to the United States, Hans Dieckhoff back to Washington as a "peace gesture." However, German quarters emphasized that the decision has not yet been reached. He will leave Berlin early Wednesday so that discussions can be commenced the same day.

It will be recalled that the American Ambassador to Berlin, Hugh Wilson, recently resigned after a long absence from Berlin. With Foreign Minister von Ribbentrop preparing to leave for Moscow, the German government has continued to clamor for peace in Europe. Despite the rejection of the German peace offers by Britain and France, the German press continued to urge for a peaceful international settlement. Nazi papers said that the attitude of Italy was "correct" while accused Britain of attempting to force a general war.

CHANGSHA, Sept. 27 (Central)—As the result of a successful counter-offensive the Chinese recaptured Kweiyi, southeast of Milo and 75 river kilometers north of Changsha, yesterday morning following a severe battle in which they inflicted heavy casualties on the invading forces.

GERMAN FOREIGN MINISTER FLIES TO MOSCOW AGAIN

Question Of Creating A Buffer Polish State Expected To Be Discussed

MOSCOW, September 27 (Reuter)—Important problems in connection with developments in Poland will be discussed when Herr von Ribbentrop, German Foreign Minister, arrives here today on the invitation of the Soviet government.

It is believed that the German official visit is concerned with the question of the creation of a buffer Polish state. Von Ribbentrop is expected to arrive here in Herr Hitler's private aeroplane as he did on the occasion of his first visit last month.

Long Talks With Hitler LONDON, September 27 (Reuter)—Herr von Ribbentrop arrived in Berlin from Poland yesterday evening, according to a Berlin wireless broadcast. Von Ribbentrop had several long private talks with Hitler in the past two days prior to his visit to Moscow from where he is expected to return to Berlin on Friday.

Berlin Comment BERLIN, Sept. 26 (Transocean)—The surprising announcement of the journey of foreign minister von Ribbentrop to Moscow is given great attention in Berlin. The journey is not considered a sensation in view of the fact that the Russo-German pact binds the two countries to enter into consultations on questions of mutual interest. It is stressed that the collapse of the former Polish state makes deliberations necessary or the future fate of these territories.

It is pointed out furthermore that the German-Russian line of demarcation is only the delimitation of the regions which are to be occupied by the two armies and not to be regarded as the ultimate frontier. It is taken for granted here that in accordance with the spirit of the consultative agreement, Herr von Ribbentrop will use the opportunity of his presence in Moscow to discuss with the Soviet government other problems of foreign policy, such as arising out of the Anglo-French war in the west or of the visits of the Turkish and Estonian foreign ministers in Moscow. It follows from the character of this visit that no special programme has been drawn up and that no information is obtainable as to the length of Herr von Ribbentrop's stay in Moscow. He will leave Berlin early Wednesday so that discussions can be commenced the same day.

Enemy Attacked Felled LINGPAO, Hanoi, Sept. 27 (Central)—The enemy attack on Hanchuan, southwest of Yuhang in south Szechuan, which was launched by 700 Japanese troops, from Yuhang last Sunday, was repulsed by the defenders who offered stubborn resistance.

The Japanese garrison at Yuhang has recently been reinforced to more than 1,000 men. Serious Fighting TUNGKUAN, Sept. 26 (Central)—Despatches from southwestern Szechuan report the renewal of fighting at Chungchung on the foothills of the Chungchung range facing the Yellow River. On Sept. 24, it is stated, the Japanese columns from Yungchi (Puchow) and Fenglintu began moving eastward toward Chungchung. Serious fighting broke out in its suburbs the next evening and was still in progress at noon last Monday.

Local Activity FANCHENG, Sept. 27 (Central)—A body of over 1,000 Japanese moved eastward from Snyeng, southern Hunan, yesterday. It is considered likely that they may make an attempt on Louban. Japanese airillery units are being directed sporadically against Pingchang, northwest of Sinyang, but observers do not attach much importance to the localized Japanese activity in this area.

Naval Engagements In North Sea Said Having Taken Place

COPENHAGEN, Sept. 27 (Reuter)—Naval engagements in which warships including submarines and aircraft participated, have taken place in the North Sea, according to unconfirmed reports from Listerford and Farund, on the southern tip of Norway. The action is stated to have lasted an hour beginning at noon and ending at 1 p.m.

The Destiny Of The Balkans

News reports which have come to us during the past week... Several items which deserve mention in passing... Mussolini's plan to invade Greece... Italy's expansion in Albania and the Dodecanese Islands...

It is reported to be planned to take the Black Sea a closed sea... Powers. Whether for Germany or for Britain... The Balkans, though enjoying a period of calm, have again become a focal point in European diplomacy...

All the parties concerned fully realize the importance of the Balkans. Great Britain is particularly anxious to cut Germany's route to southeastern Europe... Germany is leaving no stone unturned to establish her own influence in the Balkans before the successful materialization of the British policy.

An analysis of the actual situation in the Balkans reveals that the picture is rather uncertain. It will be recalled that it was after the middle of March last, that Chamberlain launched his policy of extending guarantees not only to Poland but also to Rumania, Greece and Turkey...

The outlook in the Balkans as a whole is therefore none too encouraging for Britain and France. Chamberlain's efforts seem to have borne only meagre fruit... Economic and ethnological—why Germany and Russia may preempt spheres of influence in this region...

In spite of these efforts, British diplomacy has not been a complete success. Rumania, who acquired territories from Bulgaria and Hungary after the war, of course shares Britain's desire for the preservation of the status quo in the Balkans.

ROOSEVELT CONSIDERING FURTHER STRENGTHENING OF AMERICAN NAVY

Size of Next Year's Naval Bill Depends On Developments Between Now And January 1; U.S. Troops In Hawaii Start Seven-Day Defense Manoeuvres

WASHINGTON, Sept. 27 (Central-United Press).—With the Department of Navy drafting preliminary plans for fleet modernization in Hawaii, President Roosevelt yesterday conferred with Mr. James Scroggins, Chairman of the House Naval Affairs Committee...

Mr. Scroggins informed the President that "the navy appears to be well prepared and we have the situation very well in hand."

After the conference, Mr. Scroggins told the press that the war in Europe will probably not produce any drastic increase of the United States naval appropriations next year. However, he emphasized that "the size of the naval bill will depend upon developments between now and Jan. 1."

Meetings of the Appropriations Committee will begin in November when the funds bill for the 1941 fiscal year will be considered.

Mr. Scroggins predicted that next year's naval funds would be approximately the same as this year's record-breaking appropriation.

EASTERN BALKANS REPORTED UNDER SOVIET INFLUENCE

Tension Of Russian-Estonian Relations Remained; Rumania, Bulgaria Endangered

LONDON, September 27 (Central-United Press).—The Soviet Government has obtained the assent of Germany to earmark the East Balkan countries as being within the sphere of Russian influence, officials believed here today.

Pears were aroused for the fate of the independence of Estonia, Rumania and possibly Bulgaria. Reports from Tallinn the capital of Estonia, said that the Estonian Foreign Minister, Mr. Karl Selter, is returning to Moscow tomorrow in an attempt to solve what the Tass News Agency in Moscow termed the "strained Soviet-Estonian relations."

Foreign Minister Selter will be accompanied by the President of the Estonian parliament, Prof. Uots, an international justice expert, Prof. Phip, and the Estonian Minister to Moscow, Auguste Rei, when he goes to Moscow.

Moscow reports said that Mr. Rei's sudden departure mystified the official circles there.

Meanwhile, the Turkish Foreign Minister, reportedly conferred with Michael Kalinin, President of the Soviet Union, concerning Turkish relations with Soviet Russia.

Drastic Demands STOCKHOLM, Sept. 26 (Central-Havas).—Dagmar Nyheter announced that Estonian Foreign Minister K. Selter's sudden return to Tallinn from Moscow was due to Russia's drastic demands upon Estonia...

issues the following communication: In view of the fact that explanations made by the Estonian Government concerning the circumstances in an unknown direction the Polish submarine interned in Tallinn Port proved unsatisfactory, negotiations began between Estonia and the Soviet Union regarding measures ensuring security of the Soviet waters against the diversionist acts on the part of foreign submarines hiding on the Baltic waters.

According to the Estonian explanations, the Polish submarine in question entered Estonian waters having "mechanical" damage, thus impeding its movement. It is, however, incomprehensible how under such conditions a damaged submarine could escape from guards and flee from the very port of Estonian capital. It is believed that no verification that in Tallinn (this submarine was reported to be probably provided with fuel there) it was made able to escape.

Bearing in mind the report from Leningrad that periscopes of some unknown submarines were sighted at two spots in the area of the Linn Bay, one can arrive at the conclusion that some unknown submarines have secret bases somewhere near Estonian coasts. Judging from these circumstances, the question of ensuring security for the Soviet waters against the diversionist acts on the part of the hiding submarines acquires great importance.

Tense Situation MOSCOW, Sept. 26 (Central-United Press).

Meanwhile, reliable reports from Moscow stated that the Soviet capital became a center of important diplomatic activity with the arrival of Turkish Foreign Minister Sukru Sarakoplu with the object of strengthening the Soviet-Turkish friendship and probably defining Turkey's attitude toward the European war.
