Dearest Margaret:

Under another cover I am sending you  
by registered post, your manuscript, as well  
as a book that has just appeared on  
abortions, (by a Dr. sent to prison for  
performing abortions). The book has been  
written in prison and is illustrated by 16  
pictures by Käthe Kollwitz.

Käthe Kollwitz has been to see me  
and I translated much of your mms.  
In the end she said she believed that

you would need no new pictures; and, in  
view of her heavy work, she gave me  
the book I am sending and requests  
you to see if the pictures in it  
are not very suitable for your book.

For the 16 pictures, her  
publisher paid her M. 240. I suppose  
he himself charged more and kept  
a percentage. But Käthe Kallwitz has  
the full right to dispose of her  
work abroad. She said you could  
use the 16 reproductions for M. 240  
— or \$60, and she would like the  
money in American dollars, not in  
German marks.

If I had time I'd review the  
book for the "B.C. Review." But I  
just received it and it is better  
to send it off at once. If you  
are rushed for the pictures, cable  
me and I'll get the clichés (blocks)  
from the publisher, and send them by  
registered post where you wish. I'll  
have to write through Frau Kollwitz to  
the publisher and get them. They will  
be heavy things. My cable address is

As for the Clinic, I've done nothing so far because I've not felt well enough to go out to Kenilau myself and because Frau Dr. Wolff is ill with the influenza and I'm waiting for her to get well. I talked with her by telephone but she's not well enough to come out yet. I recover rather slowly because of insomnia. My operation brought back my sleeplessness and it simply tortured me to death for days and days. The past three nights I've slept some, but badly. I hope to overcome this soon. I fear to take sleeping powders because I might get the habit again. I'm still under high sun rays treatments and intend

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to try massage. For some reason I still have a pain in my side, though the wound has healed. It may be the ovary. The doctor has asked me to come again to him this week, for examination.

Jo Bennett is down with the Grippe also.

My book has been accepted by an American publisher. After revision, I'll let it go through. I need something to stand on, Margaret, and that will help some, I hope.
