

## RED CROSS WAR FUND DRIVE ON

The March 1944 National Red Cross War Fund Drive started yesterday, Mar. 1 and will end Mar. 31, with the national goal set at \$200,000,000 according to the local chapter.

Poston's goal has been set for \$3,597.55, which is to be used by the local chapter for operating expenses and various activities as the Red Cross chapter receives no financial support from the government. In the other centers 50% of the fund derived from the campaign is sent to the national headquarters while in Poston nearly all will be retained.

The wholehearted support of the residents are requested in the campaign.

And when the Nisei boys get drafted they're going to get sent to the front right away so that they'll get killed off first. That's not all, wait till you hear the juicy tidbits I've heard about certain people!

How do I know all these things? Oh, a little birdie told me. And I happen to know that this little birdie gets his information strictly from authoritative sources, but authoritative, but strictly.

Oh, I know I shouldn't go around repeating these things, because they may be rumors and only rumors, but you know what the saying is. Where there's smoke, there's fire. And fire, you know what fire is. Hot stuff. And you know that I'm the last person in the world who'd go around spreading gossip, but I just had to let you know the latest.

Of course, you know that everything I've told you is just between us, strictly-entrepreneur, that's French for strictly confidential, you know. Well, I can't tell you my name because I don't want to get into any trouble, but you can just call me

## MORE QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS ON DRAFT

(Continued from last issue)

Q. What are the general physical requirements?

A. Minimum--105 lbs., 5 feet tall. No maximum.

Q. What is Form 219?

A. An individual who does not expect to leave the Project or appeal his 1A classification should use this Form through the Committee members of Mr. Crawford. It will be necessary for an individual to fill these out before induction.

Q. Will married men with children be inducted at the same time as single men? What age will go first?

A. Age or dependency will not affect the selective service process. This question is dependent on the Local Boards, some of which are very careful to take the single men first, some of which do not take age or dependency status into consideration. As of February 1, 1944 there are 1913 eligible men, both married and single, in Poston.

FIVE AMACHE NISEI  
IGNORE DRAFT CALL

"I had asked for repatriation before. I feel no loyalty to the United States. When we came to the center, we lost all civil rights. The Constitution says that in the United States all men are created equal, regardless of color, race or creed. I don't call this democracy." These were the words of an 18-year-old Nisei who was held in technical custody in Granada Center recently after he ignored an induction call.

Five Nisei out of 53 were held in custody by F.B.I. after they failed to report for induction an A.P. dispatch disclosed.

## ARIZONA SELECTIVE SERVICE HEADQUARTERS RELEASE ARMY CLASSIFICATIONS FOR ELEGIBLE MEN

- I-A Available for military service.
- I-A-0 Available for noncombatant military service; conscientious objector.
- I-B Formerly available for limited military service.
- I-B-0 Formerly available for noncombatant limited military service.
- I-C Member of land or naval forces of U.S. or man who has been medically discharged since December 8, 1941.
- II-A Man necessary in his civilian activity.
- II-B Man necessary to the war production program.
- II-C Man deferred by reason of his agricultural occupation or endeavor.
- III-A Man with child or children deferred by reason of maintaining bona fide family relationship.
- III-B Formerly deferred by reason of dependency and activity. This classification has been discontinued.
- III-C Man deferred both by reason of dependency and agricultural activity.
- III-D Man deferred by reason of extreme hardship and privation to wife, child or parent.
- IV-A Man deferred by reason of age. Over 45 years of age.
- IV-B Official deferred by law. Congressmen, Governors, Judges, etc.
- IV-C Neutral Alien requesting relief from training and service, and aliens not acceptable to the armed forces.
- IV-D Minister of religion or divinity student.
- IV-E Available for work of national importance; conscientious objector.
- IV-F Physically morally or mentally unfit for military service.
- IV-H Formerly a registrant between the ages of 38 and 45. This classification has been discontinued and men classified IV-H will be returned to their former classifications with the symbol (H) indicating deferment by reason of age. For example: I A(H).



Class IV-E is not a deferment. Registrants so classified are inducted for work of national importance and delivered to Civilian Work Camps within 30 days after classification.

Registrants with wives only (no children) may be deferred only by reason of occupation, or if the local board is convinced that the induction of such registrant would result in extreme privation and hardship to the wife beyond the reasonable sacrifice expected of people living in the United States in time of war.

**NEW VEHICLES ARRIVE HERE**

Several '38 and '39 model trucks and ambulances are being turned over to the project by the Army. Robert Ruckey, operations division chief, reported last Friday.

For each stake truck received the project is to turn in one truck, and so far nine have been secured. For ten newer cargoes, 18 are to be exchanged and for four newer ambulances three are to be turned in. The old equipment is to be declared surplus and disposed of.

**SPANISH CONSUL'S STATEMENT**

Several centers have indicated that a statement has been received from the Spanish Consul De Amat to the effect that the Government has adopted an attitude that American citizens of Japanese descent who do not wish to serve in the U.S. Army are under no obligation to do so. Efforts are being made to have this statement retracted or corrected by Senor De Amat according to a wire received by Acting Director Duncan Mills from Dillon S. Myer.

The wire also stated that anyone applying

for expatriation since Jan. 20, 1944 on the part of male citizens of military age must be regarded as efforts to evade military service.

Citizens acceptable for service who refuse to be inducted on the grounds that he has requested expatriation will be subject to penalties prescribed in the Selective Service law. The wire continued.

**DON'T THINK YOU ARE A NISEI SAYS CULLUM IN TALK**

Although Robert M. Cullum, New York relocation officer, says in his talks before various groups here that the main purpose of the relocation team is to learn more about the evacuee's relocation needs, he has much pertinent information to impart to resettlement minded residents.

The nisei's chances of getting the kind of job he wants to do are good, Mr. Cullum says, if he will cease brooding over the fact that he is a nisei, an American of Japanese ancestry and concentrate on thinking of himself as an individual. "Don't compromise on second best because you're afraid of not making the grade."

Because of the recent nisei draft announcement, one of the main questions he has been asked is "I am hesitant about relocating because I may be drafted soon. What do

you advise?" For men and boys leaving the centers the possibility of occupational deferment is probably extremely small, but Mr. Cullum believes that after eating in mess halls for over two years it would be a rather good thing for them to get the feel of a different kind of table under their elbows before going back to mess halls again.

Rounding out their program today, Mr. Cullum, Mr. Fistere of the Cleveland area relocation office and Mr. Fischler of the Washington Reports Office will be available for individual and family discussions at the Unit III Relocation office in the morning, meet with the appointed personnel staff in Unit I in the afternoon and hold their last general evening meeting at Mess 222.

**ATTENTION! FRESNOANS**

The Transportation Division of the WRA in San Francisco has requested the local Evacuee Property office to obtain forms WRA 155 or WRA 156 for the form FRB-2 from evacuees of the Fresno area which they now hold for their property deposited with the Federal Reserve Bank at the time of evacuation.

The new forms must be executed due to a change of custody of the property from the Federal Reserve Bank to the WRA.

It is requested of the evacuees that they present the old Federal Reserve Bank receipt at the respective Evacuee Property Offices and execute the forms WRA 155 or WRA 156 as soon as possible.

**BREAD MAY BE RATIONED**

Rationing of bread in the United States is a distinct possibility before the year is out, according to some authorities. Carl S. Kelty, L.A. Examiner finance editor, disclosed in his column last Friday.

## ART COUNCIL OF NISEI MAKES DENUNCIATION

NEW YORK -- A public denunciation of "the brutal and depraved acts of the Japanese fascists against every human decency" was issued today by the ARTS COUNCIL OF JAPANESE AMERICANS FOR DEMOCRACY through its chairman, Yasuo Kuniyoshi. The ARTS COUNCIL, composed of anti-fascist Japanese American artists active in all fields of creative endeavor, states that it is "keenly aware that the atrocities committed against our soldiers by the Japanese imperialists, like every other fascist crime must be avenged. Every leader of the fascist-imperialist clique must be held accountable, for it is they who have perpetrated these crimes, not only against Americans but also against the people of Japan."

The statement further continues with a denunciation of the "Peace Now" movement, terming it a group which would "sabotage democracy's fight by attempting to succor the enemy, to save fascism by working for a negotiated peace. Any step short of unconditional surrender" the ARTS COUNCIL states, "is contrary to our principle as anti-fascists."

Members of the ARTS COUNCIL, organized last month and headed by leading anti fascist Japanese American artists, are pledged to make articulate their belief in democracy, both in principle and action, and to add their strength to the democratic forces. The first purpose of the organization, as listed in its Constitution, reads: "To contribute our full support to the United States and the United Nations, and to take an active part in winning this anti fascist war"

### V. Business Shall be Strictly for Cash

The strict observation of this principle has never been regretted by cooperators. The success of the society depends on it. If credit is given one member and he fails to pay his bills, the other "strictly cash" customers have to make good the loss. In other words, their patronage dividends are reduced through no fault of their own. This breeds discord within the membership and has ruined many a society. The advantages are apparent, lower prices through discounts and better business standing.

### VII. Neutrality in Race, Religion, and Politics.

No matter what other differences exist between people, they are all consumers with common basic needs. As Dr. Coady of the University of Antigonish says, "there is no Catholic way of canning lobsters or Protestant way of marketing vegetable." If cooperatives get mixed up in political, religious, or racial quarrels, the membership will be split into factions and the society will suffer. Co-ops of America are following this principle.

From the principal of the George Washington High School in San Francisco where Mamie went through the whole four-year course with only one mark below "A" came the following:

"Mamie's teachers and student associates at George Washington High School hold her in the highest regard for she was an excellent scholar, a tireless worker, an unselfish friend and a fine school citizen. We all feel her loss."

To Mamie Yoshida belongs the title "Nisei Ambassador of Good Will" for by her life wherever her lot was cast she exemplified the fact that racial backgrounds have nothing to do with honest character and the shock of her death has brought to many the realization that America has lost a citizen of the highest type.

## THE JAPANESE QUESTION

We were among those who favored the evacuation of the Japanese from the West Coast after the treachery of many Japanese residents of the Hawaiian islands.

With our navy badly beaten, we could not afford to take chances of another disaster in California, Oregon, or Washington.

If, after the war, our military authorities believe it wise to forbid Japanese to come within 10 or 50 miles of our forts or navy yards, we should support them in this request.

But it is one thing to take sane precautions and another to use the war as a means of expressing racial hate and discrimination.

Japanese Americans are tilling our soil for victory; they are giving blood to the Red Cross, and they are dying on the field of battle for America. But the same Americans who were hating the Jews, and the Catholics, and the negroes in 1924 have now directed their attack to all oriental people, whether aliens or natives, loyal or disloyal. Even the Filipinos and Chinese, our own peoples, are often abused by mistake.

Sgt. Ben Kuroki, who has done more to whip the Axis than almost any of us, is constantly insulted despite the fact he has twice won the Distinguished Flying Cross. His medals and U. S. uniform are no protection from the hysteria now sweeping America.

It may be asked how one can tell a loyal from a disloyal Japanese. That is a job for the F. B. I. No disloyalty has been revealed about any of the Japanese in our area, and certainly no one has found these loyal Japanese hindering the war effort.

There are 127,000 Japanese in the United States. Most of them are native-born Americans. The aliens' average age is 54. These Japanese, both native born and foreign born are a very small part of this huge nation, less than one in a thousand. The problem they presented to our national security two years ago no longer exists. We should now be wise and treat these loyal citizens with a tolerance that will keep them loyal. Does anyone imagine he is serving Christianity, humanity, democracy, or America by driving these 127,000 people away from our ideals and compelling them to look to Tokyo for ultimate justice?

## 900 SIGNS PETITION

Nine hundred thirty-four boys out of approximately 1900 young men of military age of this center signed the President bound petition drawn up by the Community Council according to K J Takashima, chairman of the Council.

The petition sent to the President of the United States asked for the restoration of civil rights for the Nisei who will be drafted soon for the U.S. armed forces.

Since there are still a number of boys of military age who signed up for expatriation, the number signing the petition was large, stated Mr. Takashima.

## MEN ARRESTED FOR GAMBLING

Arrested last February 28 in a police raid twelve Unit I men were arraigned and tried before the Judicial Commission last Tuesday morning on charges of gambling.

Two of the men who were second offenders, were sentenced to 45 days each in the project jail with 30 days suspended. A third man, tried on an additional count of disturbing the peace was also given 15 days. The remaining nine were given 30 day suspended sentences and all twelve were placed on six months' probation.

In pronouncing the sentences, Elmer Yamamoto, chairman of the Judicial Commission, commented, "We regret that the penalties must be severe and hope that this will have a wholesome effect on your future conduct."

## SEASONAL LEAVES RESTRICTED

No more seasonal leaves will be issued except in accord with new regulations released Monday.

This new regulation provides for release of evacuees only on seasonal agricultural work and only on government contract submitted by the Extension Service or War Food Administration after approval of the district relocation officer. All inquiries for seasonal labor should be referred back to the government agency responsible for the farm labor program in the county.

Since Neighbor Extension service nor War Food Administration have procedures established for seasonal labor, it will probably be several weeks before any approved government contract will be submitted to the center.

## FOURTH WAR LOAN DRIVE PASSES QUOTA

Passing the set quota of \$22,933.44 by 130% to contribute \$29,800.21 in the Fourth War Loan Drive, the appointed personnel of Poston's three units won congratulations via teletype from Director Dillon Myer last Monday.

Mr. Myer commended them for their "outstanding job" in surpassing their quota by a wide margin and thanked them "for the fine spirit shown in carrying out your part in this campaign."

Lloyd Johnson of the personnel management section who chaired the local drive, added "We appreciate the cooperation of all participants in making the Fourth War Bond Drive in Poston a success."

## FORMER FAMILY WELFARE GIRL WAC

Mary Ryuko Uyesaki, 27 former counseling aid with the Unit I family welfare section, is now receiving WAC training at Ft Des Moines, Iowa according to news received here by Miss Lou Butler, Family Welfare head. She was sworn in on January 31 and began active duty on February 23.

Of her military life, Private Uyesaki writes,

"It's grand and in this way I feel I am doing something."

Prior to her entrance into the Army, Miss Uyesaki was secretary in the Catholic Rural Life offices in Des Moines for six months. Her family relocated to Kersey, Colorado last August. She formerly lived at 15-1 B and are from Glendale, Arizona.

## POPULATION OF FEB. 26 13,630

The relocation bug has been biting quite severely in the past few weeks. This is evidenced in the housing division statistics which recorded 13,630 persons on the project on February 26 as compared with 13,811 persons on January 29.

Of the 13,630, Unit I claims 7,246 people, Unit II 2,827, Unit III 3,434 and Poston General Hospital 123. Resettlement alone accounts for the population decline, because in the same period between January 29 and February 26, there were six deaths and thirteen births.

## CRIME AND PUNISHMENT

Every once in awhile our illustrious contemporary, the L\*s \*ng\*1\*s \*x\*m\*n\*r, and many of its political kin, get all hot and bothered about the uncurbed life of Riley we are living.

Among the milder remedies they recommend to arouse us from the bed of roses on which we languorously recline, is the removal of the Inefficient Evacuee Police and the Ineffective Evacuee Courts, and the substitution of Caucasian law enforcement officers.

Sometimes, when we read these suggestions, a shudder gets started somewhere at the base of our neck that runs slowly down our spine and quickly up again, gaining momentum as it goes. We attribute this phenomenon to an uneasy suspicion--ill-rounded, no doubt--that itches the back of our mind. We suspect that the men who are behind these stories favor not only an all-Caucasian law and order set-up, but a police force equipped with leaden shillelaghs, persuasive pieces of rubber hose (with the shortage, yet), and nice shiny pistols, with Simon Legree himself sneering on the bench, wielding a black, steel-tipped whip.

We would like to point out--humbly, of course--that the Utterly Worthless Evacuee Police and the Equally Useless Judicial Commission have been instrumental in getting free room and board in the Parker Indian Jail for a couple of male residents who recently violated the Poston Penal Code for a second time.

These two men constitute the very first case in which residents, tried before and sentenced by the Unit I Judicial Commission, have actually been made to serve out their penalties. This fact, we believe, is a beautiful commentary on (1) the effectiveness of verbal warning on lawbreakers who have heretofore been tried, sentenced, and paroled on their promise of good behavior, and (2) the general law-abiding atmosphere that pervades the community.

We doubt very much that this example has served to rebuke those who moan about the awful gentleness with which evacuees are treated. Let it serve, then, to subdue the few reckless hearts among us. Those two men are in the Parker Indian Jail right now. One must stay there 60 days for assault and battery and violation of probation; the other, 30 days for violation of probation. They should be proof enough that the Evacuee Police and the Judicial Commission are not just playing like.

We rather think they mean business. H. Y.

VII Constant Education

The Rochdale weavers decided early in their struggle to establish a store that it was of utmost importance to have all their members thoroughly understand the principles and policies under which their store should be run. Accordingly they set aside a certain amount of their yearly earnings to be used in carrying vital information to the people who had already joined, and to promote the idea among non-members. In cooperative business where the members have the final say it is important that their voting be based on thorough understanding of the questions in hand.

Some 6,000 members through their votes control the Poston Cooperative. Just as it is important that people who vote in a democracy should thoroughly understand the policies and procedures of their government, so it is important that these 6,000 members be conversant with the Rochdale principles, the by-laws, and all essential facts about their cooperative. By constant education, the people "raise their sights" to include new fields of cooperative endeavor such as wholesales and manufacturing.

Rochdale principles, by-laws, and a constitution do not guarantee that a society will be democratic. The progress of the society depends on the amount of thinking and actual decisions the people themselves make so that in the end it is the individual who is the strength of his society. "SERVICES ARE NEXT STEP" SAYS RICHARDSON.

At the regular meeting of the Board of Directors held Feb. 29th, Mr. Richardson, Wash. Head of C.E., was present. He paid tribute to the development of the Enterprises in the following words:

"Reviewing the work of the cooperatives, we see one of the most rapid developments of business you could find in the history of business. The people responsible have to be complimented. Complimented chiefly because they started off without capital, without anything and they built up, as time went on without any capital, by going under their own steam, and from credit from outside agencies and firms. The thing looks so good at most of the centers that it is a great temptation to feel good about it and to just go on now the way the enterprises are organized. The period of rapid expansion, of setting up new services, and the opening of new stores is over. We have entered into the next most important period. It is doing well and making good profits. It is now the time to make it more and more efficient, and to figure out new ways of serving the people. The cooperative stands in a peculiar position on the project. It is a large business run by a group of people that all the residents

## COMMITTEE ON RACE RELATIONS TO WORK AGAINST RACIAL PREJUDICE

Chicago, Ill.--(Special)--Chicago's Committee on Race Relations recently was told by Mayor Edward J. Kelly of Chicago that its accomplishments "should have a deep significance, not only for Chicago but for the entire nation."

"Chicago," said the mayor, "will become a richer and finer city in direct proportion to our ability to provide full opportunity for all of our people to work together--not as Poles or Italians or Swedes or Negroes or Jews or any other race, but as friendly American neighbors."

The Race Relations Committee is chairmanned by Dr. Edwin R. Embree who heads the famous Rosenwald Foundation and whose son, John Embree and daughter, Catherine, were employed by the War Relocation Authority. His son was with the War Relocation Authority in Washington and his daughter taught school at the Poston center.

In a letter to Dr. Embree, Mayor Kelly said: "Just as our entire war effort depends on the unity of purpose and unity of effort of all our people, so the continued healthy growth of the United States as a nation depends in a large measure on the willingness and the ability of all our people to work together in harmony without prejudice of any kind."

The Committee, appointed last summer by the mayor, was one of the first of its kind in the country. The mayor said that now 137 similar committees have been appointed by mayors, governors, or civic and religious bodies from one end of the country to the other.

The Committee will study ways to avoid friction and to promote cooperation among the many great racial groups in Chicago. Although much of the work will center upon the Negroes, the relationships of all peoples will be considered.

The mayor said that, by wise planning, benefits to any one group can result in advantage to all. He said the Committee would aid in the revising of attitudes and the giving of stubborn prejudices which some people hold.

Declaring that the Committee's conferences were not meetings of idealists and dreamers to sketch a panacea, he said they were meetings of the officials of the various municipal departments and of leaders in every branch of civil life to plan together wise and feasible steps toward the goal of democracy.

The educational requirement will be waived in the case of those whose aptitude rating, as revealed by the Mental Alertness Test, shows equivalent ability. Girls under 21 must have the parents' or guardian's consent. The height minimum is 58 inches, the weight, 100 pounds.

**SPANISH CONSUL:**

**PREVIOUS STATEMENT BY DE AMAT CLARIFIED IN WIRE TO MILLS**

The Spanish Embassy has no authority whatsoever to act on behalf of American citizens

That is the reminder that has been issued through the WRA by F. De Amat, Spanish Consul at San Francisco which corrects the misunderstandings created by his earlier statement regarding military service for American of Japanese ancestry.

Senor De Amat quotes a memorandum from the

Spanish Embassy, translated as follows.

"The Protecting Power is not authorized to act on behalf of American citizens and it is solely with the American authorities that they (the American citizens) must deal in these matters (American military service) since these authorities are the only ones who can solve such problems "

To this official statement he adds, "May I also point out, as has been frequently and repeatedly emphasized by the Spanish Delegates in their visits to the various centers that the above mentioned memorandum is not limited only to military service but to anything that concerns American citizens. They must approach their own American authorities not the Protecting Power whose duties are towards the Japanese Nationals in the United States "

## NEW YORK'S JAPANESE AMERICAN BACKS RED CROSS FUND DRIVE

Full participation by New York's Japanese American in the current Red Cross fund campaign was pledged today by Dr. Kanzo Oguri, chairman of a recently organized special Japanese American Red Cross Committee.

Dr. Oguri, a Brooklyn physician who has two sons serving in the U.S. Army, declared that giving to the Red Cross is a matter of special urgency to all Japanese Americans.

"Our first concern," he said, "is to keep the Red Cross at the side of our troops, including the thousands of fellow Japanese Americans who are today fighting our enemies on the Italian and Southwest Pacific battle fronts.

Secondly he continued Japanese here at home feel a special responsibility to assure the public of their proven loyalty to democracy.

"There are some people," he said, "who still mistakenly hold our ancestry against us."

Dr. Oguri last fall headed the 1943 National War Fund Committee which raised more than \$3,500 among New York Japanese Americans.

best be served by continued residence in one of the centers", Mr. Myer continued, "or by establishing residence outside the center in one of the many communities or localities where they are needed and where they are welcome. While our major effort will continue to be directed towards the accomplishment of the latter objective we feel that WRA has a responsibility to those individuals and families who may, for one reason or another elect to remain in a center, either temporarily or for the duration.

"We can make no commitment to keep open any particular center

for any definite period," he added, "but, insofar as we can make such a commitment it is the intention of WRA to maintain sufficient centers for those who do not take advantage of the present opportunities for resettlement."

In the near future, it is Mr. Myer's expectation that a large majority of the present residents will have made definite plans for their future and have determined where that future can best be served.

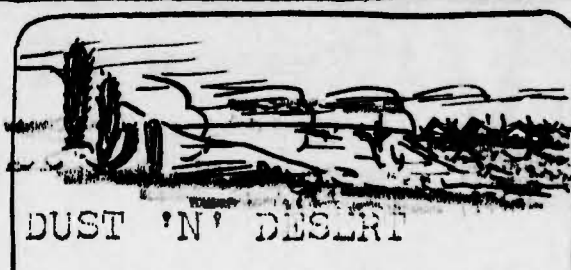

### FIRST PRE-INDUCTION PHYSICAL EXAMS SLATED FOR TOMORROW

Because the first pre-induction physical examinations are scheduled for this Sunday March 19 at the Poston General Hospital no visitors will be allowed there either in the afternoon or evening of that day Dr A. Pressman director of health and sanitation announces

It has been disclosed that approximately 228 men have been notified to report for check-ups with the medical team which is arriving from the Phoenix Board. Of the 228 35 are from Unit II 36 from Unit III and 157 from Unit I.

The combined results of the preliminary X-rays and the general examinations will be available in a week or so and will be sent to the California local boards. The examinees will then be sent their Certificate of Fitness Form 218 which will indicate their classification.

## 1944 RICE

## ALLOCATIONS ANNOUNCED

Seven and a half million bags (100-lbs. each) of milled rice have been allocated for civilians in 1944, the War Food Administration announced Feb. 8.

This allocation will make available about six pounds for each person, slightly less rice per capita than U. S. civilians consumed during recent years.

On the basis of allocations, civilians will receive about 42 per cent of the milled supply allocated for all needs in 1944. They will share the total prospective supply--17,904,000 bags--with U.S. military and war services, U. S. territories, U.S. allies and liberated areas.

## EXAMINATIONS:

## 171 PASS, 50 REJECTED SUNDAY

Two hundred twenty-one draftable men of the center out of 230 scheduled, were examined by the Army Medical Team of Phoenix, last Sunday morning at the Poston General Hospital for the draft according to James D. Crawford, local selective service representative. This was the first examination for the Nisei in over two years.

One hundred seventy-one passed last Sunday's examination 50 were rejected for physical defects and nine failed to report for examination. The final results of the examination will not be known for at least two weeks until the outcomes of the preliminary exams are known, Mr. Crawford disclosed.

Action to be taken on the nine who failed to report for examination will be the same as those on the outside who fail to report for physical, stated Moris Burge, acting project director.

The examination headed by Capt. A. C. Lawrence with the aid of three officers and 11 enlisted men started at 8 a. m. and was completed by noon. Assisting the medical team were five doctors, one optometrist, one dentist and two laboratory technicians, all members of the local hospital staff.

Capt. Lawrence highly lauded Dr. Pressman's staff for the efficient work they did in aiding the medical team.

## WASHINGTON ANALYST VISITOR HERE

Ned Spicer of the Washington Community Analysis Section was a visitor on the project for three days early last week.

Mr. Spicer, whose schedule included Topaz, Tule Lake, Poston and Gila, in that order, was formerly stationed here with Dr. Leighton, from July 1942 to July 1943.

The purpose of his trip, he disclosed, was to co-ordinate the work of the Community Ana-

lyst sections in each of the centers as well as to discuss the techniques and results of community analysis.

In comparing the life of Poston residents with that of the other centers, Mr. Spicer said, "The general morale of Poston seems to be very high. One of the most noticeable things is the high degree of resident participation in community affairs and government."

## VISITING OF INDUCTEES AT CENTER FREE

Former residents of Poston who have received their certificates of fitness indicating their acceptance for army service may return to the center to spend all or part of their pre-induction period with their parents or relatives, according to a recent announcement from Washington.

Such evacuees, returning from seasonal or indefinite leave, will not be required to pay for food and lodging.

In order to be certified for their return, the inductees must present their certificates of fitness to the relocation officer in their area.

Dependents of relocated men called into the army will be discouraged from returning, it was added, since dependency allotments are considered sufficient to support dependents on the outside. Only

after all other alternatives have been ex-

plored will they be permitted to return to centers on the same basis as other individuals who have been unable to adjust themselves in outside communities.

Dependents residing in relocation centers and receiving dependency allotments will not have the amount for subsistence deducted from their allowances.

## NO LICENSE, DRIVER SENTENCED

Pleading guilty to the charge of driving without an operator's license, a local youth was given a ten-day suspended sentence and placed on 60 day's probation by the United Judicial Commission recently.

In suspending his sentence, the Judicial Commission warned that future traffic violators would be more severely dealt with, in view of the many complaints received by the Internal Security division "regarding the manner in which automobiles, trucks and tractors are being operated on the roads of Poston."

Because the warmer weather will find more residents on the roads, increasing the possibility of accidents, the Judicial Commission asks the cooperation of the public in exercising caution. At the same time, those few persistent violators of the traffic code are warned that

if they are given citations, some of them will probably have to be given jail sentences.

"We do not like the idea of sending people to jail," Elmer Yamamoto, chairman of the Commission, said, "but we would much rather do that than see people maimed or killed."

(Cont from page 1) who was in Poston on February 22 when the men left for Delaware wired the project as follows "A very unfortunate situation arose in Delaware but I am convinced it will soon quiet down and there would have been no action taken against these two boys had they stayed."

The Philadelphia Record on March 9 quoted Rev Nelson Waite Rightmyer rector of St. Peter's Episcopal Church, Lewes as saying "There is no reason whatsoever for the people to get upset. The workers involved are American citizens of Japanese ancestry who have been okayed by the FBI. We need farm labor here the very worst way."

Charles Mills the Lewes farmer who hired Matsubara and Honda and who asked for 50 additional Japanese Americans to work on his 1100 acre farm, was reported by the Journal Every-Evening, Wilmington (Del.) as stating "I feel that I cannot retain my self respect if I withdrew my support from these California people and until I am convinced that they are a menace to the community I will not go back on them."

PRINCIPLE

STATE RECOGNIZES POSTON CO-OP CORPORATION COMMISSION ISSUES LICENSE

March 16, 1944, The Arizona Corporation Commission issued to the Poston Cooperative Enterprises, Inc. a formal license to do business in this state as a foreign corporation under the Co-op Law of the District of Columbia.

Forced to operate as a trust for the past two years the status of Community Enterprises was very often confusing to its members. From this date forward, the membership has full and absolute control of its own organization within the bounds of the charter granted under the Co-op Law of the District of Columbia, the by-laws of their Co-op and the Rochdale Principles.

This represents a step forward and should be a signal for the membership to take a new interest in the business. As a trust, we could afford to leave its affairs to a small group but as a cooperative, it's every member's business and requires his personal attention. For from now on "This is Our Own."

TAX CO-OP REFUNDS

As profit business increased its pressure for taxation of co-operative earnings, Pres. M.D. Lincoln of The Co-operative League warned in a magazine interview that if enemies of co-ops succeed in getting co-op earnings taxed co-ops may be forced to "drop their long-time policy of maintaining competitive prices..and will simply cut prices."

"What our misinformed critics are calling profits are actually savings distributed on a patronage basis and not profit returns on capital investment and as such are not subject to tax," said Murray Lincoln.

"An international cooperative organization is already in existence, and greater utilization of this structure is anticipated by cooperatives in the post-war era. A regular flow of cooperatively produced products is anticipated between countries," says Mr. Lincoln.
