SIX INDUCTEES LEAVE CENTER

New Inter-Camp Bus Time Effective Today

Starting today, June 1, a new bus schedule will go into effect for persons travelling between units, according to Ken Amano, dispatcher.

The first bus will leave camps I and III at 8:15 a.m. as before. The change will be the last buses of the day, which will leave Units I and III at 3:15 p.m. Buses for WORKERS ONLY will leave the units at 4:15 and 4:45 p.m.

Mr. Amano stated that passengers must secure round trip tickets at the point of origin, otherwise, they will not be able to return as no tickets will be issued for return trips. ~~snip~~ tickets will be

DELINQUENTS PICKED UP

For failure to appear for induction, Charles Ichiro Oki and George Washington Inouye were taken to Phoenix by FBI agents on Saturday morning, as were Iitaro Nishi, Hisashi Ogata and Arthur Asa Shimizu, who refused to appear for pre-induction exams.

A sixth resident, Thomas K. Mizuno, was also taken into custody on a charge of sending a threatening letter.

William Harumi Nakasaki, who previously failed to report for his pre-induction physical, pleaded guilty on May 27 to the violation of the selective service act, and was sentenced to three years in the federal penitentiary.

Five Report From Outside Residence

Six brand new Privates, the first group of inductees to leave Poston, left Tuesday morning at 2 o'clock to begin their life as soldiers in the United States Army. Their destination was the Ft. Douglas, Utah, reception center, from where they will be assigned to an army camp which as yet is unspecified.

SENTRY SHOOTS TULE RESIDENT

Shoichi James Okamoto, 30, former resident of Garden Grove and Heart Mountain center, was shot by a sentry at Tule Lake center Wednesday afternoon, May 24, according to a wire received by Project Director Duncan Mills from National Director Dillon S. Myer. Mr. Okamoto died in the base hospital at 12:10 a.m. Thursday.

The Japanese American was driving a truck returning from the farm to the center and was stopped by the sentry outside the gate. As he approached the gate, the wire stated, the sentry first struck him with the butt of the gun, then shot him at close range. The reason for the shooting was not clear.

Army authorities at the center arrested the sentry and an investigation was held. The coroner's investigation Friday returned a verdict clearing the sentry of all charges in the slaying.

No sign of disturbance in the center was observed.

The six, whose names follow, are from an original list of 11 called for active duty from Poston, the others being out on leaves: Pvt. Norman S. Okamoto, 222-6-D; Pvt. Sumio Nishi, 219-8-A; Pvt. Hideo Shigekawa, 21-11-C; Pvt. Shiyochi Matsubara, 19-1-A; Pvt. Tom Aochi, 4-11-A, and Pvt. Takao Eno, 42-5-A.

It is presumed that the other five have reported to Fort Douglas from their present places of residence.

UNIT I TO HAVE TWO SUPERVISORS

Masaru Kawashima, who has been acting block managers' supervisor since Tom Sakai's departure, announces that beginning June 1, Unit I will have two block managers' supervisors.

Richard Nishimoto, present Block 45 manager, will take over the position of senior supervisor and will be in charge of welfare and management; while Tsuneco Sumida, present Block 16 manager, will assume supervision of supplies and equipment.

Mr. Kawashima will again devote his full-time to his Community Enterprises work.

WORKERS IN PARKER NEEDED

Three or four men are urgently needed to work as loaders in Parker, so that the baggage of those who have recently left on seasonal and indefinite can be sent to them.

At present a huge amount of baggage is standing in Parker for lack of men to load it on the train. Only one crew, consisting of two men, is now left to handle it, and the heavier pieces of 500 lbs. and up, cannot be moved without more workers.

Residents interested in this work are asked to contact their unit employment offices immediately.

TRADING POST TO OPEN JUNE 4

Sunday, June 4 has been tentatively scheduled as the opening day of the Trading Post which will be located at the Unit I Fire Department, according to Minoru Okamoto, City Manager. As far as is known, this store is the first of its kind attempted in any relocation center, and will be sponsored by the local council.

Residents having unnecessary goods, such as appliances and clothing, that they wish to sell, may bring them to the Trading Post where they will be put on sale to the community. A ten-percent donation will be accepted from the sale price.

Food, poultry and other animals will not be accepted, and the Trading Post committee reserves the right to refuse any other item which it deems unsuitable.

The donation fund will be used to pay expenses of running the establishment, while the balance will go towards community recreational purposes.

(Sgt. Roy Takai, the nisei "Pvt. Hargrove" writes again from somewhere in India with the British troops:)

"Although the skies are gray, the weather gloomy, wet, and hot, I feel today as I used to feel during the bright spring mornings back home. For this morning (April 30th) I was deluged with 20 some-odd letters. There is nothing like letters to cure a good case of the blues.

"Yes, battle conditions and atmosphere are now a reality. As I sit in our basha-office typing this out, can hear the whine of the projectiles as they pass overhead. At night while attempting to fall asleep we can hear our and their machine guns, mortars, and rifles firing away at each other. Yes, the enemy is that close and one can almost say that they are parked on our front and back steps.

"Air activities have certainly increased lately. The angle worms who inhabit our trenches are beginning to wonder if we are going to move in with them; for we are compelled to jump in and out of them at least four to five times a day. Yes, the worms and I are becoming quite attached to each other.

".....but unpleasant also is the factor of trying to keep clean and healthy. Honestly I haven't had a good wash in weeks. A bath is unheard of in these parts. Also unheard of is the problem of diet in our meals. It is almost as constant as the "pi" in the math circles. Bully beef for breakfast, lunch, and also for dinner. Pvt. Shintaku, Unit II Soldier Wounded in Action Call is for June 7

A wire disclosing the fact that her youngest son, Pvt. Bob Kiyoshi Shintaku of the 442nd Infantry, was slightly wounded in action at Italy on May 13, was received by Mrs. T. Shintaku of Blk. 219-2-C, from Acting Adjutant General Dunlop Thursday morning.

Reports of his condition will be sent as they are received, the wire stated.

LEAVES FOR UNDER 18 CLARIFIED

Seasonal leaves may be issued to any person under 17 years of age and to anyone under 18, who became 17 on or after May 17, 1944, according to an emergency instruction received from Washington. The applicant must meet the eligibility requirements for indefinite leaves.

The minor must be accompanied by a parent or have the consent of the parent or guardian, and the project director, relocation officer and high school principal must agree that he is reasonably mature before he will be issued a seasonal leave, the instruction states.

All persons under 18, whether accompanied by parents or not, must be certified by a physician as physically fit for employment before recruiting.

Upon induction into the army a few days before the outbreak of the war in December, 1941, Pvt. Shintaku was in airplane mechanic at Camp Shelby, Mississippi, before the camp was designated for the All Nisei Combat Unit.

Prior to induction, Pvt. Shintaku resided in Salinas, where he attended school and operated a service station.

The trial of George Fujii, local mortician who has pleaded not guilty to the charge of violating the wartime sedition act, has been set for Tuesday, June 6 in Phoenix, Project Attorney Scott Rowley reports.

Herman Lewkowitz will represent Fujii as attorney.

CUSHMAN LEAVES FOR DETROIT

W. Allen Cushman, leave officer who is in charge of the departure station, left last Wednesday night for Detroit and Cleveland where he will be stationed about one month.

Mr. Cushman returned here from a two-week visit in California on May 29 and spent the interval discussing problems with residents who are interested in relocating to the Detroit and Cleveland areas.

Seven more boys, the second group of inductees from the center, have been ordered to report on Wednesday, June 7 to Fort Douglas for active duty assignments, according to James D. Crawford, selective service representative.

Their names are: George Shiba, 309-9-D; Takashi Ezaki, 12-12-A; Haruji Akimoto, 5-9-C; Mitsugu Eto, 209-5-B; Tets Henry Nakabayashi, 5-6-D; Arthur Tetsu Sugino, 11-8-B; and William Masaru Shigekawa, 21-11-C. Of this list, the last two are not on the project, Sugino having left recently for Chicago and Shigekawa having relocated to Virginia.

Also received late this week were about 80 names for induction and pre-induction examinations, which are tentatively scheduled for about June 24. This will be the fourth visit of the army medical team.

Sgt. R. L. Porter of the Phoenix board notes that several residents have written to the Phoenix board about possible deferments. It is again emphasized that all such matters should be brought to the attention of their original local boards.

POSTON AND PARKER SCOUTS LOADS 30 TONS OF WASTEPAPER

Half of Polio Campaign Proceeds to be Retained

Word has been received that Basil C. Connor, former law partner of President Roosevelt and President of the National Infantile Paralysis Foundation, has declared that Poston will be able to retain 50%

of the proceeds of the last campaign, as outside cities are doing.

A controversy has been waged since the last President's Ball, on whether 50% should be retained here for work in infantile paralysis and 50% sent to the National Foundation, or whether 100% should be sent to the National Foundation. Miss Elma Rood, head of Public Health Nursing, Dr. A. Pressman, the Poston Infantile Paralysis Committee, and Dr. John Powell have worked for the retainment of 50% for project use.

The Poston funds will be in charge of the Project Director who will disburse them on advice of the Infantile Paralysis Committee and the medical staff. A few grants have already been made to some Poston residents.

PROPERTY MAN TO ARRIVE

Earl Browne, Field Representative of the San Francisco Evacuee Property Office, representing the Coast Area of Northern California, is scheduled to be here Tues., June 6, staying until June 8, according to the Evacuee Property Office. He will be glad to see any evacuee with property problems in the Salinas, Watsonville, San Francisco, and San Jose areas.

Mr. Browne will be at the Evacuee Property Office Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday.

Center Gives 20 Tons, Parker 10

Marking a milestone in friendly relationships between Poston and Parker, Boy Scouts from both communities combined their efforts to assist in the national wastepaper campaign on Saturday and Sunday, May 27 and 28 at Parker. The wastepaper collected from Poston and Parker was combined to make approximately the 60,000 pounds, a minimum car-load weight.

Poston I Boy Scouts led by Arthur Kaniye, Neighborhood Commissioner of Unit I, and the Parker Scout Troop led by Wesley Bush, Scoutmaster, did all of the work of loading and unloading. Lunches for the Unit I Troops were prepared by the Unit I Girl Scouts, led by Sue Sakamoto.

On Saturday and Sunday afternoons, the Parker Troop escorted the Poston Scouts to the store, malt-shop, and other places in Parker. Some of the Poston Boy Scouts enjoyed their first Coca Colas in two years. Late Sunday afternoon, after loading the

121 VISITS CENTER IN MAY

During the month of May, 3171 meals were served to 121 persons who visited the project, according to James D. Crawford, relocation program officer. They paid \$634.20 for meals during their stay on the project.

RIVER WATER UNFIT FOR DRINKING

A test of the Colorado River water revealed that the river water is unsafe for human consumption, according to C.A. Dennis, project sanitarian.

Mr. Dennis stated that the river serves as sewers directly or indirectly, carrying away varying proportions of waste produced by inhabitant from dams along the river. Laboratory tests revealed the presence of B-Coli, an organism not harmful itself, but found in intestinal tracts of man and animals.

Many people believe that running water purifies itself every 100 feet, but this is untrue, stated Mr. Dennis. All stream water should be purified by boiling 15 minutes before they are usable, otherwise, a person may contact typhoid, paratyphoid fevers, dysentery or diarrhea, which are most likely to be conveyed by the water in the U. S.

Fishermen and picnickers are urged to carry sufficient water on their trips for drinking purpose.

UNIT I FIRE SYSTEM READY

Tested and ready for service is the new fire reporting telephone service, which consists of 32 telephones in I, 19 in II and 21 in III, according to A. M. Chisholm, chief telephone foreman.

The Unit I system includes one in Rainbow Village, one for the garage and heavy equipment shop and one which covers the Military Police and Green Village district. All 72 stations terminate on separate jacks at the Unit I fire department switchboard.

Residents are asked to familiarize themselves with the location and number of the nearest alarm box and give this information to the fire department when making emergency calls. This will help the efficiency of the system and will assist the department in responding to the calls.

PAPER DRIVE

(Cont. from page 1) recommended the termination of several departments which are not directly essential to community welfare. Suggested for elimination were subjugation, road construction, landscape gardening, Rainbow Village work and fish culture, while a 50% cut in nursery work and life-guard personnel was also mentioned.

The Unit I commission also recommended that departments such as transportation, maintenance, agriculture, hospital, subsistence (including warehouses and mess operations), fire and police be given priority listings, Mr. Yahiro said.

It was agreed by the inter-camp Commission that the 5-3-3 ratio would be substituted for the present 3-2-2 ratio for unit evacuee representation on the Commission. Meetings are to be held every Monday and Friday beginning next week, until such time as the shortage is definitely relieved.

The Commission is confident that a workable plan will be found in the very near future which will be acceptable to the community, it was added.

Fujii Acquitted of Violating Sedition Act

George Fujii, local mortician, was acquitted last Tuesday in U.S. District Court of charges that he violated the Wartime Sedition Act, Charles A. Harper, internal security officer, reports.

Of the three notices signed "Voice of the Nisei" and posted in the center, only the third was considered subversive or seditious. The prosecution was unable to introduce any evidence whatsoever that connected Fujii with the third bulletin, Mr. Harper said.

The court granted the request of the attorney for the defense who moved that the jury be instructed to return a verdict of not guilty, and Fujii was consequently cleared of the charges against him.

Disruption of Service May Occur

Frequent disruption of water service during the hottest summer months is predicted by Charles A. Popkin, construction engineer, if residents continue to use water at the same proportion of increase noted between April 25 and May 25.

NO SPECIAL TRAIN JULY 4

There will be no special train on July 4, according to Relocation Program Officer James D. Crawford. The last departure before that date will be on June 27 and the first after that date will be on July 11.

Morning departures will cease after June 30 and will be resumed on July 6.

Figures for this period indicate that water consumption in Unit I increased 10%; in Unit II, 8½%, and in Unit III, 270%. Because cool weather delayed the widespread use of coolers until the latter part of May, these percentages assume serious significance, Mr. Popkin said, giving assurance that water consumption will be even greater for this month. With the increased use of coolers, it is very probable that the equipment will be unable to handle the additional load, resulting in a loss of pressure and consequent water supply failure on some of the hottest days, he added.

In order to prevent recurrence of last summer's frequent water stoppages, residents are asked to use the minimum amount of water required for the proper operation of their coolers. They are reminded that excessive running water hinders, rather than helps, the efficiency of the coolers.

PROSPECTIVE INDUCTEES MAY BE REINSTATED

Those on indefinite leave who wish to return to the project because of impending induction into the Army, may do so by presenting their certificate of fitness to the relocation officer in their area, James D. Crawford, relocation program officer, reports.

Men who return without the approval of the relocation officer should present their certificate of fitness to the Project Director.

Such persons will be reinstated as residents and will not be required to pay for subsistence. However, those wishing to remain on visitors' status will be allowed to do so, and will be charged the regular subsistence rate of 60¢ per day.

Also included in the joint statement is the fact that since June 25, 1941, Executive Order No. 8802, otherwise known as the "non-discrimination" clause, has been included in all War and Navy Department and Maritime Commission contracts. This clause requires the granting of full employment opportunities to all loyal and qualified workers regardless of race, creed, color or national origin and applies equally to citizens and non-citizens.

For each full-fare ticket, 150 lbs. of baggage are allowed; for each half-fare (5-12 yrs.) ticket, 74 lbs.

Unless such baggage privilege is utilized, even those who wish their freight sent after they have relocated, will not be entitled to take advantage of the new "unlimited freight" clause, Mr. Crawford said.

MORNING LEAVES CEASE DURING HOLIDAY

A slight change in the dates during which departures from the project are to be restricted, has been reported by Takeo Aoki, assistant leave officer.

Morning departures will cease from June 30 to July 10, instead of July 6 as formerly scheduled. Evening departures will cease from June 27 to July 11.

Emergency situations which evacuees may encounter while traveling from a relocation center to a point of relocation can often times be solved quickly with the help of local units of the Travelers Aid Society. Evacuees planning to spend a few days in a city can secure from the Travelers Aid desk free information on housing accommodations, points of interest, medical facilities, and recreational resources. Arrangements can also be made to have a representative of Travelers Aid to meet resettlers at transfer points or on arrival in new towns.

Local units are also equipped to handle more serious problems. Special accommodations can be given persons who lose their money or railroad tickets en route. Medical attention can be provided for travelers.

A list of the local Travelers Aid units and complete information on the types of service available can be secured at the office of James D. Crawford, Relocation Program Officer.

MANPOWER COMMISSION REACHES FIVE DECISIONS

First Battalion, 442nd Infantry, Camp Shelby, Mississippi is now the address of the first group called for active duty from Poston, according to a delayed news release dated June 13.

Arriving at Shelby on June 10, Shiyochi Matsubara, George T. Miyada and Hideo Shigekawa were assigned to Headquarters Company; while Teijiro Namatame and Etsuo J. Ogawa were assigned to Company "A". Norman S. Okamoto was assigned to Company "C"; and Tom S. Aochi, Takao Eno, Sumio Nishi and Chester S. Okimoto are now members of Company "D".

According to the medical report on the inductees from the relocation centers, most of the men are in good physical condition, the news release added.

55 RESIDENTS TO LEAVE FOR CANNERY

Fifty women and girls and five men are scheduled to leave tonight for the Woods Cross Cannery in Clearfield, Utah, the relocation division reports.

Also leaving are four workers for the Kayville cannery.

The remainder of the men signed up for the Calpac and Woods Cross canneries will leave in the near future.

There will probably no more cannery employment offers, the relocation division adds.

22 HOGS SLAUGHTERED

Twenty-two hogs have been slaughtered during June 12 to 16 the Agriculture Department reports.

The harvest for June 19 to 23 will amount to 12,000 pounds of cucumbers, 15,000 pounds of daikons, 12,000 pounds of beans, 10,500 pounds of shiro uri, 15,000 pounds of carrots, and 4,500 pounds of tomatoes.

The Agriculture Department reports that the harvesting of barley is underway in all three units. Combines are working daily to speed the harvesting.

JAPANESE STILL BANNED FROM COAST

Present restriction against the return of persons of Japanese ancestry to the Pacific Coast areas have not been lifted and any future policy changes will "hinge entirely on changes in the military situation," stated Secretary of War Stimson, recently according to a U.P. dispatch.

NISEI SOLDIER'S MOTHERS WEAR PINS

Before the Jerome Relocation Center in Southeast Arkansas closes at the end of June, all of the 155 service mothers of this wartime Japanese-American community will have lapel pins with one star for each son in uniform, the War Relocation Authority announced today.

Arrangements for purchasing the pins have already been made by the USO club of the relocation center, and delivery is expected in the near future. One-star pins have been ordered for 122 of the mothers; two-star pins for 18; three-star pins for 10; and four-star insignia and might possibly lay claim to an additional star since she has a son-in-law as well as five sons in the service.

"Since coming out here, I have become aware of the fact that centers such as Minidoka and those situated inland have a distinct advantage as far as seasonal work is concerned. Take this work for example, if we were from Minidoka, the transportation would have been furnished as all our employer would have had to do would have been to pick up the evacuees at the camp.. Young girls going out for domestic work around Jerome and Twin Falls may often see their prospective employers first before accepting employment, and this arrangement will in most cases lead to a more satisfactory placement. Such an arrangement is hardly possible in Poston and Manzanar. Therefore, considering the handicaps I think the Relocation Division in Poston has done quite well."

Another letter received stated: "I am interested to provide home shelter, food and employment for one family, and would welcome Japanese friends and neighbors."

1,000 to be Brought to United States

The War Relocation Authority has been instructed to make arrangements to handle the administration of a new camp to be operated at Fort Ontario, N. Y., for about 1000 Italian refugees who will arrive soon.

This has been the request of President Roosevelt, who notified Ambassador Robert Murphy in Algiers who is making arrangements for transporting the refugees to the United States.

The War Dept. will properly equip Fort Ontario and will also make arrangements for transportation from the port of arrival to the camp. The Bureau of Budget is to finance the project until UNBRA is in position to assume the financial responsibilities involved.

This move to bring refugees here is in accordance with the opinion of the President, that it is important to indicate that this country is ready to share the burden of caring for refugees during the war. They will be returned to their homelands at the end of war.

(Sgt. Roy Takai, The nisei "Pvt. Hargrove" writes again from some where in India with the British troop on May 26, 1944:)

"As I sit in our spacious (2 tables, 3 chairs) basha-office situated high in the hills among nature's jungle vegetation and look across the span of green at the mist covered peaks of the neighboring tree crested hills, it is, indeed, hard to conceive that we are now battling against the foe so cleverly hidden in those yonder hills. Yet, we know it must be so; for the roar of the guns and the repeated, sharp bursts of the machine guns still reverberate among the hills.

"We are now being initiated to that uncomfortable, wet season known as the monsoon. During the monsoon the weather is dull, overcast and at times very depressing. Just imagine listening to the patter of the rain for hours and hours on time, day in day out, for weeks. There is not one stitch of clothing which can be said to be dry. Even those which I wear now are damp. The paper on which I am now typing is damp also, and the typewriter is acting as though it is suffering from wateritis, too.

"Although the monsoon has more or less set in, the enemy has shown no sign of slackening their operations. This means that we may be around these parts for some time, yet. Aside from dreaming of folks back home my dreams seem to concentrate on "good food and entertainment" which can easily be

(四) 各州当局にとってこれら土地の沒收手續を行ふ爲には相當の證據を必要としてゐる。従つて当局は予審の際

に、この面談に依つて日系人から得た材料を使用し予審に於ける本人の供述との矛盾(説明の不充分に依る)を捉へて裁判を有利に導かうとする懼れが充分にある。それ故面談に際しては、外人たる自分の土地購入は子供の爲にふした

もので土地法違反を犯してゐると云ふ事を事實を以つて充分説明出来るやうに用意して置く必要があらう。

ひたひたはこの面談に關しては、日系人の財産保護の爲に充分法律的不助言を兵へる義務を有してゐる。
