CUSHMAM COMPILES BEHAVIOR ADVICE

The following information was compiled by W. Allen Cushman, Leave Officer, during his recent trip to Cleveland, O., and Detroit, Mich., it might prove useful to those relocating:

One should go to the relocation office before the middle of the morning; interviewing goes on only from 8--1 each day and one evening a week.

One should be willing to cooperate with the office workers so that the office may give all the help they can. People not willing to sign the day register cannot be helped. Changes of addresses--it is vital to the organized work of a relocation offices that these be told them.

New Schedule for Movie Set

New schedule for the regular motion pictures for Poston, was announced July 27, by the motion pictures committee of the community council.

Pictures will be shown twice weekly, Monday and Tuesday, in Unit I, once in Unit

II, Wednesday, and once in Unit III, Thursday.

Next week, July 31-August 4, schedule will be; Monday and Tuesday: Central Swimming Pool and Blk. 59, respectively, Unit I; Wednesday, Unit II; Thursday, Unit III. The main picture will be "Spitfire," starring Leslie Howard and David Niven.

Because certificates of indebtedness of the Tule Lake Cooperative Enterprises, Incorporated, for the period ending September 30, 1943, are ready for redemption, members of the Tule Lake enterprises, are requested by the Board of Directors of the Tule Lake enterprises, to send these certificates of indebtedness, issued September 30, 1943, duly signed, by return mail, to the Board. Checks will, it is stated, be mailed to members about the latter part of July.

Members are further requested to notify the board of their permanent addresses, this being important because the board cannot afford to take the risk of mailing the checks without knowing the addresses, it is stated.

It is further asked that members, if they have not terminated their membership, and still have their membership cards, send the cards with the certificates of indebtedness. Their membership fee, it is stated, will then be refunded upon receipt.

One should have some little idea of what type of work would suit him, if possible.

One should not make his departure from any prospective employer by saying, "O.K., I'll be back tomorrow." The employer expects the person, and if he does not show up, he dislikes the whole Japanese set-up, and the interviewer has made it harder for the next person. One should say he will think it over and let him know whether or not he would care to work for him at a later date. One should set the date if possible, so that the employer would not hold the offer open for that person after that date.

One should be prepared to dress as others do on the outside. Five boys in zoot-suits were refused and viewed until they had dressed themselves inconspicuously. They hurt their own chances of getting a job and discredited all other Japanese in that area.

One should do nothing to cause himself to be looked at by a passer-by. City sentiment for or against the relocation of Japanese in a certain part of the country may depend on a very small incident caused by lack of thought on the part of one individual.

One should not be "fresh" with any person in stores or lunch places.

TWO POSTONIANS KILLED IN ACTION

Two names were added to the nation's honor roll when wires were received by relatives of Pfc. Shichizo Toyota and T/Sgt. Atsushi Sakamoto, both of the 442nd Battalion now stationed in Italy, that they were killed in action on July 13 and 17.

Pfc. Toyota, formerly of Gilroy, Calif. was transferred from the Salinas Assembly Center to Camp II, where he was employed by the Unit II Community Activities section.

He volunteered sometime last year, and completed his training at Camp Shelby, Miss., before he went over.

He is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Shichiro Toyota, 218-1-10, Poston, Ariz., and four brothers, Toshi, Kameo, technical sergeant in the army, and Yoshio, now a private overseas.

T/Sgt. Atsushi Sakamoto is formerly of San Pedro, Calif., where his folks had been farming prior to evacuation. Sakamoto was drafted on February 21, 1942, and spent training months in various Army Camps before being transferred to Camp Shelby, in the 442nd Battalion.

Surviving him are his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Uhachi Sakamoto, 226-8-B, and three brothers, Tom, Sueo and Susumu.

Both boys will be honored with the nation's oldest military award, the Purple Heart.

Next semester will find more Caucasian teachers here, but not because there has been an increase in the allotment instead there has been a decrease in the allotment. The allotment provides for 51 secondary school teachers and 41 elementary school teachers in addition to the administrative and supervising staff which consists of four principals, two assistant principals, one vocational counselor, and supervisor for the teachers, adult education and vocational training.

"I have received," the letter reads, "the Daily Water Report for July 25, 1944, which shows that the amount of water used in Unit I on that day was 2,398,690 gallons.

"This is a considerable reduction over the days of the previous week and is an indication of effectiveness of the work of the Block Managers and the residents in curtailing the use of water.

"Will you please convey to the residents through your Block Managers' organization my appreciation of this effort. It is encouraging to see a problem of this kind so effectively handled by the community itself, and a tribute to your organization.

W. ALLEN CUSHMAN RESIGNS

Pfc. YAMAMOTO KILLED IN ACTION

Pfc. Johnny Yamamoto, brother of a former Unit 1 Chronicle reporter, was killed in action in Italy, according to a wire received from the War Department by the boy's father, Kanzo Yamamoto, 22-1-C.

Johnny, formerly of Oceanside, Calif., came to Poston in 1942 and volunteered for the Army sometime last year from Salt Lake City, Utah, while he was on seasonal leave. He was sent to Camp Shelby, Miss., where he completed overseas training and went across with the now famous 442nd Infantry.

He is survived by his father, Kanzo Yamamoto, a sister, Hisaye, an ace Chronicle reporter for almost two years before she relocated recently to Springfield, Mass., and two brothers, James and Frank.

Johnny is the fourth Postonian to be killed in action in Italy, and will be awarded the Purple Heart.

MORE CALLED

Four more of Poston's Nisei have been called to report for active duty. Two were called to report on the 4th, while the remaining two are to report on the 10th.

The two which were called yesterday were Hiroshi Nakazono, 60-7-C; and Joe Shigematsu, 60-11-C. The two who are to report for active duty on the 10th are Sam Nakamura, 39-5-E; and Iwao Yamaguchi, 13-11-B.

Five Charged with Violating Leave Regulations

Decisions in the cases of the War Relocation Authority against five evacuee residents were read by Project Director Duncan Mills Thursday morning in Mr. Mill's office. The trial involved five charges which resulted from an accident in which a project car was damaged and a bull was injured.

The sentences were:
1. In the case of WRA against Kenneth Yoshioka, Tomio Inai and Tetsuo Sakamoto, all defendants pleaded guilty to the violation of WRA leave regulation. Yoshioka and Sakamoto were sentenced to be ineligible for leave, except for the purpose of relocation or for an emergency to be determined by the Project Director, for a period of six months. Inai was referred to his supervisor for disciplinary action as may seem to him appropriate for leaving his bus unattended.

2. In the charge of WRA vs. Tetsuo Sakamoto for misuse of a government vehicle, the defendant pleaded not guilty, but his defense was inadequate and was found guilty. His driver's license was revoked.

3. WRA against Tomio Inai, K. Yamamoto and Kenneth Yoshioka. Inai and Yamamoto pleaded not guilty and Yoshioka, guilty. Inai's and Yamamoto's guilt were unable to be proved. With the judgment against Yoshioka and the judgment rendered against Sakamoto, both will pay the government for the

Mr. Cushman is a world-wide traveler and lecturer, having visited many different countries. While on these trips he has taken motion pictures which he has shown to residents of Poston.

(Sgt. Roy Takai, The nisei "Pvt. Hargrove" writes again from Calcutta, India, on July 16, 1944:)

"Honestly, it certainly feels "good" with a capital "G" to be back in civilization once again--I had almost forgotten how a civilized man acted--six months in the jungles sure take things out of one...

"What a glorious feeling that first bath was!! Gosh, I waddled and squirted water about like a little child--you ought to have seen the color of the water after I finished bathing!! It's good to know that I can once again bathe in codles of water instead of that one messily can of rationed water!!

"This city is one of the largest in India. The European section is almost as modern as some cities in the states...The thing that catches one's eye is the tremendous amount of "rickshaws" running about... Just so I can say I rode one I rode about 10 minutes on one--I must confess I prefer the taxis to them--Anything from the 1925 to the 1940 model cars are used here for taxis... Surprising enough there are no tongas here....

"For entertainment there are the cinemas, clubs which might be termed night clubs, and, of course, the American Red Cross Club where I'm sure many happy hours are spent by the G.I.'s!!! There is a surprising number of Chinese here; and I must say, some of the Chinese girls are okay--It's a pity I haven't taken the time to master the Chinese language... I'm sure it would have come in use. Yes, there are British and Ameri-

Living together in nose bumping closeness with unwanted agitations and little hope for the future, we saw us turn from a hard working and industrious people of California days into lazy and close to hopeless cases. . . but on the other hand we have made good friends, learned a thing or two and for many it became a stepping stone for a wider traveling and new environment in other parts of the States.

Materially we have seen great improvements. . . among them our adobe school and auditorium, swimming pools, amphitheatre, sport fields.

As we go into the third year, our population has dwindled from 4393 to 3007. It will continue to decrease as the army calls the boys and resettlement takes a ~~few~~ ~~more~~.

Despite two years away from it, we still cannot help but yearn for good old California. . . gee, grapes are just ripe now. . . and oh, how I'd like to feel that ocean breeze!!

Selective Service Stop - List Removed

Information About Soldiers Requested

Poston families having two or more daughters in the Army or the Wac are requested to bring or send information concerning them to the Reports Office, as soon as possible, Pauline Bates Brown, reports officer, announced.

The information will be turned over to the National Headquarters of the Japanese American Citizens League, which is conducting a survey to find the largest number from one Japanese American family serving in the Army.

However, it is desired to have information concerning any brothers or sisters in the Armed Forces, even if there are only two in the family serving.

The information should include names of the soldiers, their ranks, their addresses, their parents' names, their home and occupation before evacuation, date of entry into the Army and from where, school background, and if possible a photo.

ting into these complicated selective service problems, misunderstandings have resulted, and he has been quite strongly accused of retarding their normal relocation.

"I am now placing my assumed responsibility for the welfare of those concerned in selective service upon each individual. By this, I mean I would like to have everyone familiar with the selective service requirements and penalties and have the individual make his own decision whether he wishes to leave the project prior to his examination or induction. With each notice for preinduction or induction, I will send a mimeographed copy of a paragraph of penalties. Further instructions are printed on each of the official notices, forms JSS 215 and 150. I believe everyone is fully acquainted or can acquaint himself with the regulations and therefore, I believe it is not necessary to explain to those who wish to relocate. As far as this division is concerned, we do not have a 'Selective Service Stop List,'" states Mr. Crawford.

In a few days the Relocation Division expects an Assistant Relocation Advisor to be assigned full time to selective service problems. Individuals can then discuss all matters pertaining to selective service and active duty with the selective service representative prior to relocation.

EVACUEE PROPERTY UNDAMAGED

Word was received recently by Project Director Duncan Mills that no evacuee property whatsoever was damaged in the fire occurring at Florin, Calif., on June 21.

Investigation at the scene of the fire by WRA evacuee property officers revealed rumors of the destruction of a warehouse, containing property stored by Japanese Americans, are incorrect. According to report submitted by the investigators, the property involved included seven farm buildings and adjacent sheds, none of which were owned or being used for any purpose by evacuees from the West Coast. At the time of the fire, the property was occupied by visiting farmers from Oklahoma and Arkansas.

MYER LETTER READ AT MEETING

The following letter to the Project Director from D. S. Myer, WRA Director, was read at the Manpower Commission meeting held Friday, according to F.M. Haverland, supply officer.

Dear Mr. Mills:

"I have read with interest the reports in the Poston Chronicle of June 8, 16 and 22 on the activities of the Manpower Commission. The community participation and planning evident from these reports is exactly the type of cooperation which I referred to in my letter of June 29.

"We have duplicated these articles and distributed them to the other Centers as an example of one technique which may be used.

THOUSANDS SEE BOYS OFF

About five thousand thronged the newly-decorated Block 4 Stage in Unit I to witness the send-off program for the 75 boys who were to report for active duty August 4. After the program they boarded the buses that soon were off, taking them to Las Vegas, where they were to take the train for Salt Lake City and Ft. Douglas.

The program was opened by the 20-piece Mohave Indian band which had come from Parker for the occasion. Scott Rowley, project attorney, was master of ceremonies. He thanked the members of the shibai group, for the use of the Block 4 Stage. He thanked Girl and Boy Scouts of Unit I for helping. He said, "I don't know when I've ever felt the thrill and pride I feel as I face this audience. This

shows you are taking and have taken your place as good people of Japanese ancestry."

The boys who were leaving had by this time taken places on the stage. Dr. Arthur L. Harris called roll, answered by the boys on the stage, by rising. Flag salute was led by the Boy Scouts Color Guard of Unit I. The singing of the National Anthem by the audience, followed. Setsugo Sakamoto, member of the community council and chairman of the Unit II local council, spoke on behalf of the community. He exhorted the boys to keep up the good work started by the 100th battalion.

Duncan Mills, project director, spoke on behalf of the administrative staff, saying, "I just want to say this to the men leaving tonight: We shall watch for news of you and follow your activities with interest. We shall see that your families will be well cared for. We wish you a safe return. Good-bye and good luck to you all."

Music from the Parker Indian Band filled the hot summer air as thousands streamed toward the newly remodeled Block 4 stage, so that they might pay their respects to the 75 boys who were leaving to fight for their country. Mothers, wives, fathers, sweethearts, brothers, sisters and friends, all in one unit of thought, swarmed about the stage; some scuffling their feet causing the dust to rise, others covering their nose for protection from the dust, while the remaining looked frantically for their loved ones....

With starry eyes, friends grouped together staying close by their beloved ones--a queer feeling runs up and down your spine as "assembly" is blown by the bugler and the boy whom you knew from childhood days answers the call. No, it is no longer proper to call him a boy--he is a man who has left to fight for you and the things which you cherish.

Roll was called, the boys responded by standing; there's Johnny, Thomas, Mas, Aki and a dozen more of the fellows you know. Some looked puzzled, a few questioning, but the majority seemed lost, searching in vain for their friends among the black heads in the audience.

"....I know that the angels will watch over you...." not only was the quintette singing that, but every heart rang out with the sweet melody saying, "I'll be with you dear, no matter how near or far...."

Moment by moment time passed, the murmur of voices grew louder and the people became impatient, yet it seemed like ages before the boys began to file off the stage. The question, "Where is he, will I get to see him before he leaves?" hung like a heavy cloud about the minds of all who were present.

"There he is," someone cries, and there he stands among the throng of people, bewildered, confused, lost and nervous. He starts toward you, you meet him half way, he extends his hand and grabs yours firmly and cordially. He utters a few words, mumbles and quivers, but is soon left speechless. Silence sweeps between the two of you and not a word is said but red eyes and expressions on both faces alone tell each other their thoughts.

Close by a month-old bride gallantly fights back her tears as she makes her way through the mob, that has surrounded the busses, to her husband. The busses start their motors and the young groom bids his bride good-bye as he boards the bus.

A small boy calls frantically, "Paul, Paul, where are you?" Tears roll down his cheeks and his crying is soon drowned by the good-byes and the sounds of the busses moving. The crowd follows the busses as they leave, but are soon left behind, as the boys leave to fight for "Old Glory."

Maryknoll has assured evacuees, according to Father Clement, that at least six Catholic hospitals in Chicago will accept any Japanese patients, regardless of faith.

Father Clement returned from Chicago last Friday, August 4, from a short business trip. He saw people he had helped to relocate, while here. He said the biggest problem there for the evacuees is housing, but that this is a problem for everyone, evacuees or not, and should not make them hesitant to leave Camp.

SISTERS CONDUCT SUMMER SCHOOL

Two Maryknoll sisters, Sisters Gerard and Eucharis, are conducting summer school classes each day this week, August 7-13, for grade school and junior high school students of Poston I, at the Maryknoll Chapel at Blk. 45, according to Father Clement, of the Maryknoll Church.

Sister Gerard, one of the teachers, returned from Dairen, Manchuria, on the Gripsholm a half year ago. She spent one year in a concentration camp at Shanghai. She is particularly interested in meeting issei mothers. Sister Gerard speaks Japanese fluently, having worked among the Japanese over 15 years. She will be at the Maryknoll Chapel days and evenings.

the boys who were leaving to go into the service of their country.

Before the buses left the camp, crowds surrounded them, densely, so thick that passage through them was at first difficult if not impossible. Dust was everywhere, standing in the air, and the air was close.

About three boys stood as the buses started to move, but seats were made for them before the buses left the project. When good-byes had been said, and hands shaken, buses started to go. And some boys and girls ran after the buses as they left.

"Here for an inspection visit to the Omaha WRA Office, Simmons denied reports that evacuees are being coddled in the centers.

"Anyone who feels that the evacuees are coddled should live at one of the centers for a short time. It's true that the healthful conditions are maintained. The over-all cost of maintaining the centers, including food, education, administrative work and all other necessities runs only \$1.15 a day per capita, perhaps the lowest cost of any activity of its kind in history.

"Explaining that WRA has 10 times as many job offers as it can fill, Simmons said most middle-aged and elderly evacuees decline relocation offers because they fear unfavorable sentiment and dread the thought of beginning life anew in strange surroundings."

JUNGAN MILLS DISCUSSES FAMILY PLANNING PROGRAM

other federal agencies.

Personal interviews have been held by the Welfare section with families, to obtain information, and to exchange information and ideas. According to Mr. Mills, the talks are intended to supply the people of Poston, as well as the government representatives, with all the facts available regarding the possibilities of the future years.

"The future is on its way to all of us," said Mr. Mills. "Each of us must meet it as he can, but all of us can meet it better if we assist each other now in making our plans and our preparations according to such knowledge as we have."

Accurate information is needed by both government and the people of Poston, if plans made by the government looking toward assurance of security are to suit the needs of the people, said Mr. Mills. He has asked continued community cooperation for the pooling of information, which is important:

MILLS DISCUSSES PROGRAM

(continued from page 1)

(1) to assist the government in giving families help in making their own plans, and

(2) to assist the people in making plans to help themselves by giving them knowledge of what the government is prepared to do, or hopes to do, based on their advice regarding their own hopes and desires for the future. The welfare section is getting and giving information now, but half the job is "up to the people themselves," according to Mr. Mills, who continued, "They will have to run their own affairs, in the next few years, without much control or support by the government. The family planning interviews are meant to give the people all the facts that WRA has which can help them in planning for that time." The pooling of information included; whether families or members thereof hope eventually to return to previous

homes or business, and the possibilities of success, so far as known now, of doing so; and whether they hope to seek or have plans to seek fresh fields of endeavor, and the scope of opportunities for doing that.

One interviewer has been assigned to all the families in blocks from one section, because of the similarity of the facts for families from the same section, and the connection of the plans with possibilities of returning to their homes.

Mr. Mills expressed the hope that this organization of the interviewing staff, will be of assistance when the return to California is possible to some families. He also stated he regards the interviews as having utmost importance; he said he is happy that the response and cooperation to the program has been fine in all.

FORMER POSTON TEACHER KILLED IN ACTION

Pvt. Joe Shiomichi, a former Poston High chemistry teacher, was killed in action in Italy on July 19, while serving with the 442nd Infantry.

Pvt. Shiomichi, formerly of Brawley, Calif., was a graduate of Brawley Union High School, and also attended the University of California for four years, where he was president of the Japanese Students' Club and also a member of the Phi Epsilon Chi Fraternity.

Surviving him is his wife, Miye, who is in Milwaukee, Wis.; his parents, Kesaichi and Fusa Shiomichi, Block 6-5-D; a sister, Mrs. Yoshiki Yoshida, relocated to Michigan; and a brother, Tokio, who is a Pfc. in the army and also serving overseas in the 442nd Infantry.

REFUGEES ARRIVE AT FORT ONTARIO

Nearly a thousand refugees of the European war arrived in Oswego, N.Y. August 5, to remain for the duration of the war in an emergency refugee shelter established by the WRA at Fort Ontario, N.Y., according to an Associated Press dispatch printed in the San Francisco Chronicle.

Chosen on a basis of need from Italian camps, the majority of the 982 men, women, and children, are Poles, Austrians, Yugoslavs, Germans, and Czechs. In all, 19 nationalities are represented.

PLANS FOR AUDITORIUM MADE

Because of the nearness in the completion of the new high school auditorium in Unit III, a meeting was called by Frances Cushman, principal of Parker valley High School, to clear some questions concerning it.

In attendance were seven student representatives, Gerald Lumino, from the Administration, and Mas Honda, representing the Community Council and the Community Activities section, and Kyuichi Uyeda from the construction department. Also attending were Miss Barbara Washler and Dick Watanabe, representing the teachers' staff.

It was decided to have a formal dedica-

tion August 21 as the date before any other activity in the auditorium come forth. The committee chosen for the planning of the dedication was Babe Karasawa, student representative, as chairman, and Gerald Lumino and Mas Honda as other members.

Whether the YBA should be allowed to hold a movie August 25 in the auditorium, was discussed. It was unanimously decided to permit the YBA to hold its movie. Also brought up was how the uses of the auditorium should be controlled; charge, limit, and so forth were decided. A draft was set up and approved by the members present.

CURRENT CASES OF PROPERTY OFFICE NAMED

"Boy bring me the asperin," may well be a familiar thing to hear in the evacuee property office here. Cases then being currently handled were named recently by R.W. Schmitt, evacuee property officer, as samples of problems that his office handles continually.

A farm being rented to a produce company, had not been paid for by the tenant. The family wanted this looked into, and they also wanted a check-up made on their furniture. Another family, giving authority to the property office to break into the home, wanted their property removed and had the ranch sold for \$3000. Another family owned a coffee shop for which the people who bought it had not paid, and the bills had accumulated. The property of 25 evacuees was burned in a fire, and their property was being looked into and insurance adjusted. A restaurant having burned up in a fire was a problem of another evacuee. In a church in which personal property was stored, there was a small fire. Desire to sell 186 acres of land and that 160 acres be taken care of, and that a tenant be found for the latter, was being looked into.

New insurance was being sought by one person, who also wanted to sell 80 acres; he also wanted a check made on a house on which he never collected rent. Another man who wanted his property sent to Utah, was having trouble getting it released from the present custodian.

An evacuee had some personal problem he wanted taken care of. Among other problems, were property problems of: typewriters, a contraband camera, a lost refrigerator, a lost piano, which was found, rented farm machinery which was not being used properly. Property stored in churches in three cases was being looked into; problem in regards to a house was being handled. Non-payment of taxes was another problem.

These problems were named by Mr. Schmitt as problems then currently being handled by his office. Not only problems, but money is handled by this office.

They are willing to continue on an eight hour basis, in spite of the headaches. But you are advised: "Don't forget the asperin!"

Tentative plans are made for a Model Airplane Hobby Center, probably soon to be opened at the Block 38 Rec. Hall.

The Hobby Center will be sponsored unofficially by the Christian Church, perhaps by the Young People's Forum, as a continuance from the handicraft period at the Summer Vacation Bible School which terminated several weeks ago.

Los Angeles, and will be available to interested persons at a very reasonable price. No private orders must be sent to the Western Model Distributors, it was announced, but Model supplies can be ordered only through Yoshiya Tsujimoto when the center opens.

The official date of opening and the place will be announced as soon as definite information is available.

Although there were no witnesses, it was believed the boy was running alongside the truck when the vehicle started to turn and struck him with the right rear wheel. The truck was preparing to stop at a block to unload and was moving at only about five miles an hour in second gear.

NEW CLASS OF NURSE-AIDES BEING FORMED

A new class for nurse-aides will begin at the Poston General Hospital, September 4, according to an announcement by Dr. Abraham Pressman, chief medical officer. This class is being organized to help meet the critical need for workers of this type in Poston and other communities.

The training is offered to girls 17 or over, high school graduates, who are in good health. Extending over one year, the course includes training in care of patients in the wards, experience in the operating rooms, caring for small babies and mothers, besides eighty hours of classroom work in the use of medicines, in physiology, anatomy, sanitation, and other subjects.

Nurse-aide training provides opportunity for useful and remunerative employment all over the country. To date, 132 nurse-aides have been trained in the Poston Hospital, it is reported. Many of these girls have relocated. At present, 13 are serving as nurse-aides in the University Hospital at Ann Arbor, Mich. Studying to be registered nurses, in Illinois, Minnesota, and Pennsylvania, are 25 others. Many others plan to continue their training in various hospitals in other communities.

Girls interested in this work are asked to register now with Elizabeth Vickers, chief nurse, at the Poston Hospital.

It seems so strange that it takes a war to force us to make gains that ought to be made through reliance on intelligence and goodwill.

The editorial reads as follows:

The U.S. Army's 100th Infantry Battalion, one of the finest war records of all the military services, has been awarded the War Department citation for outstanding operations during two days of fighting in the Italian theater.

Against a numerically superior enemy, this battalion attacked during June 26 and 27 and destroyed the German right flank. It killed at least 178 of the enemy, wounded over 20, captured 73 and drove the Germans back in re-

For 10 months this battalion has been in almost continuous combat. Although losing only two as prisoners, it had taken hundreds of the enemy and killed hundreds more.

List of decorations is none Distinguished Service Cross, 44 Silver Stars, three Legion of Merit medals, 31 Bronze Stars and more than 1,000 Purple Hearts.

The 100th Infantry Battalion is from Hawaii. It was recruited here, and some of the men who as privates have won company distinguished service records of leadership.

They suffered heavy losses, losses which be expected in such prolonged combat. Other outfits from various states have suffered just as heavily. Italy has been a costly contest.

The 100th Infantry Battalion was formed of Japanese ancestry. Because of this they have been singled out in dispatches and in most comment on that basis.

It is time now to quit thinking of these men in terms of their ancestral background of as Asians.

They have won the right to be thought of as Americans.

HOW TO SEND CHRISTMAS CARDS AND PACKAGES OVERSEAS TOLD

Although it is still four months before Christmas, Clarence Johnson, project postmaster, reminds residents of the fact that all Christmas cards or parcels for soldiers overseas should be sent during September 15 and October 15.

All Christmas greeting cards for soldiers overseas must be sent in sealed envelopes prepaid at first class mail. All packages should be sent parcel post. No requests are necessary from a soldier to send a parcel during this period.

Christmas packages shall not exceed 5 pounds in weight, 15 inches in length, or 36 inches in length and girth combined. Due to the great distance this mail must be transported, and the handling and storage it must undergo, it is absolutely necessary that all articles be packed in boxes of metal, wood, solid fiber board, or strong double-faced corrugated wood, reinforced with strong gum tape or tied with strong twine. These boxes should also be wrapped in heavy paper. When combination

packages are made up such as miscellaneous toilet articles, hard candies, soap, etc., the contents should be tightly-packed in order that the articles may not be loosened or damaged during transit.

The public is urged not to send food or clothing. Perishable goods will not be accepted. The sending of fragile articles is also discouraged.

Not more than one package will be accepted in the same week from the same person to the same addressee. Parcels should show, in addition to the name of the addressee and sender, the name, rank, army serial number, branch of service, organization, APO number of addressee and post office.

One should not guess at the postage rate as all matter must be fully paid for. No written message should be enclosed within the package except Christmas greetings of some sort.

No mail matter shall be accepted as insured mail. If money is desired, money orders should be sent instead of cash.

LIFE-SAVING--PENICILLIN NOW AVAILABLE AT HOSPITAL

YESTERDAY:

Little Johnny Sugita, age 12, once a care-free, fun-loving boy filled with mischief, as is typical of boys everywhere lay critically ill, his life a mere shadow of what it was formerly, as a result of a ruptured appendicitis with the setting in of blood poisoning. As a pendulum sways, so was his life swaying -- between life and death!

But in the distance was hope -- penicillin, the miracle drug! But perhaps that distance was too far to reach, for penicillin is reserved for the armed forces and is not on the market for civilian use. Through the painstaking efforts of Dr. A. Pressman, penicillin was promised to save little Johnny's life, by the Regional Army Hospital on Davis Mt. in Tucson, Ariz., after first contacting the Denver Medical Depot, where Poston's medical supplies are obtained.

TODAY:

Within 24 hours, the penicillin arrived, but it was not used for little Johnny. As the saying goes "Where there's a will, there's a way," and Johnny's will to live had won out. In the face of death, Johnny had made one last stand and had won out, on "old man" death. Defeated, death had faded out of the picture and in his stead stood "lady" hope with all her banners waving.

TOMORROW:

Although Johnny did not need the penicillin in his fight with death, that penicillin Johnny did not use will remain here in Poston to bring hope to the patients whose lives will hang as though on a swaying branch between life and death. Penicillin the hope of mankind--the drug to bring life back to the gallant men and women, who are fighting, struggling, and dying to make the world a place of love and happiness -- the drug of hope so that little boys and girls like little Johnny need not die, for they are the leaders of the world of tomorrow, where peace will be had and perhaps that dream of Utopia will come true. Truly, penicillin is the life-restoring drug-- a dream come true!

GIRL WAR PLANT WORKERS WANTED IN CLEVELAND

Cleveland, O., August 16---A very attractive job in a war plant making parts for rocket ships and bombers, has just opened for a large number of Nisei girls in Cleveland. Inexperienced girls will be taught drilling, deburring, assembling, packing and inspecting operations at a high rate of pay, which starts at 70¢ an hour, goes to 75¢ after 30 days, and then, to 80¢ after 3 months. After these increases, further pay raises are possible based on merit. Time and a half is paid after 40 hours and a 58 hour week can be worked although it can be adjusted downward if the girls do not wish to work that many hours.

Working conditions in the light and airy factory are good. Excellent food is served by the company operated cafeteria at reasonable prices, and the woman who is in charge of the personnel department will assist girls in housing and transportation problems that might arise.

At this writing, five Nisei are already employed at the company and are apparently well satisfied with their jobs.

Here I am in Milwaukee, Wisconsin, the "home of Breweries and America's Dairyland." It has been a month almost to the day since saying good bye to good old Poston, and will say that it takes just about that long for one to get acclimated to the outside atmosphere. For the first couple of weeks, the first thought that comes to you is to chuck the whole thing and return to the center. But, as time passes by, as it has the habit of doing, one gets accustomed to the outside life, and right now, I am enjoying this life very much.

Housing conditions here and in Chicago are not too good. It appears that higher priced, good houses and apartments are much harder to find than cheaper and mediocre housing, due to the fact that everybody is making good money, and consequently, moving into better places. It took me two full days of "apartment hunting" to find a small apartment for two men, and another couple of weeks to find a fair family apartment. The saying here in Milwaukee regarding housing is as follows: "Trying to find a good house is like trying to find a perfect wife--mighty difficult but not impossible." ---Work opportunities are plentiful, but here's a warning! In actuality, the great majority of them are not nearly as attractive as they sound on paper. Wages in Chicago averages 75¢ per hr. and here 70¢ per hr. (Cont. to next issue)

SEIZED ARTICLES RELEASED TO WRA SEND-OFF PLANNED FOR TOMORROW BACK OF P.O.

The Evacuee Property Office was informed that contraband articles confiscated by the Army from several relocation and assembly centers including Manzanar and the Salinas Center, have been released to the custody of the WRA and can now be returned to their owners, with the exception of (a) military weapons including all firearms; (b) ammunition, bombs and explosives; (c) radio transmitters or component parts thereof, and (d) Japanese phonograph records.

A few of the articles which can be released will be available only to owners who are citizens of this country and who are presently residing outside the eight Western Defense Command states.

The Unit I evacuee property office is in possession of the list of names, articles and place of confiscation. Evacuees who had articles picked up by the Army while in the Salinas Assembly Center or elsewhere, should contact Room 48 in Ad. 1, and file necessary papers for release of their property.

It was also pointed out by the evacuee property officers that articles which were taken by the Army should not be confused with those confiscated earlier by the FBI.

Those whose cameras were confiscated will not be affected by this, as cameras were not confiscated in assembly or relocation centers.

An elaborate send-off is being planned by the send-off committee for the 23 boys who will answer the call of their country tomorrow night. The boys will be feted by a banquet, at Mess Hall 32 tomorrow night at 5:30, which will be

Nineteen evacuees left Tuesday afternoon at 5:00 for Crystal City Family Internment Camp, to join members of their families who had been interned until now in the Santa Fe Detention Camp in New Mexico.

They left the center three hours behind schedule in a single covered truck, escorted by two immigration officers from Texas.

TEACHER'S LETTER TO PAPER PUBLISHED

In the Des Moines Register of August 5, a letter to the Open Forum Editor was published; sent by Myrtle Barley, New Hampton, Ia., who taught in Poston III high school.

"For the past two years I have been a teacher at the Japanese relocation center at Poston, Ariz. During the time friends from Iowa have sent me articles, comments, and the like from the Register. I have been very happy with the general attitude which your paper apparently holds toward these people.

"Not only has it made me feel good, but I posted from time to

time, those articles on the bulletin board in my classroom. My students, chiefly sophomores, were always delighted to know that somebody cared. After their reading the Los Angeles Times and other west coast papers it was a relief to read favorable comment.

"My students were such fun. My pet story is this:

"One evening several young high school lads stopped by the teacher's barracks to chat. I was getting ready to go to an adult education class, but since my room had a cooler in it and also some easy chairs, which the boys didn't have at

their barracks, I said, 'You may stay here and read or whatever you wish; just don't raise the roof or keep the neighbors from studying.'

"Now, Miss Barley, you'd better not trust us; we're a bunch of Japs, and we're liable to pull a Pearl Harbor on you.'

"From then on I had perfect confidence in those kids--and there never were any Pearl Harbors.

"Well-- I just want you to know that many of us appreciate your attitude--not only toward the Japanese Americans but toward other minorities. Power to you."

SHIOMICHIS LAUDED IN NEWS STORY

In the August 13 issue of the Milwaukee Journal, an article was written about Miye Shiomichi, widow of the late Pvt. Joe Shiomichi reported killed in action July 19, while fighting with the 442nd infantry, in Italy.

The story stated Mrs. Shiomichi was "cheerfully awaiting the arrival of her baby, who is due any day now." *

The story stated also: "Almost at the same time Miye was notified of her husband's death, she got a letter from a friend, extending condolences because of the death in action of her brother, Shaw Kiyaku, also with the 442nd."

Also: "Miye met Joe while they were attending the University of California at Berkeley. Joe came from Brawley, Calif., and was only one year away from graduation when Pearl Harbor was attacked on Dec. 7, 1941. Shortly thereafter all persons of Japanese ancestry were removed from the west coast, and Miye and Joe met again at a relocation center in Boston, Ariz., and were married."

"Joe volunteered for army service, and after long waiting, finally was called in October, 1945. He was assigned to the 442nd infantry, the second all-Japanese regiment to be formed, and finally went to Italy last April."

At the conclusion of the story, the comment was made: "That is being an American."

*The baby was born August 22.

CONTRIBUTIONS MADE TO JACL DEDUCTIBLE

All contributions made to the JACL are deductible by the donors in arriving at the taxable net income, according to the ruling of the Commissioner of Internal Revenue. Also, bequests, legacies, devises or transfers to or for the use of the JACL are deductible in arriving at the value of the net estate of a decedent for estate tax purposes. Gifts of property to the JACL are deductible in computing net gifts for gift tax purposes.

This latest report is believed to be a recognition of the work that the JACL has been carrying on throughout the Nation to educate the American public to have a better understanding of the persons of Japanese ancestry and to thereby improve their status.

The tax exempt status of the JACL had been under consideration by the Commissioner of Internal Revenue at Washington, D.C., since the early part of this year. The application had been filed when it was discovered that a ruling made by the San Francisco office of the Collector of Internal Revenue in 1938 that the JACL was an "educational organization" in the tax matter of Dr. Russell E. Wehara of Oakland who had donated \$1000 for the \$100,000 Endowment Fund of the National JACL was not in the file

CARE OF SCHOOL CHILD OUTLINED

Procedure which should be followed for a child who has recovered from an illness of three days or more, was told by the hospital.

Any school child who has recovered from an illness of three days or more, should be brought by the parent, to the child's teacher.

The teacher will look him over. If she feels the child is all right, she will re-admit him to the school.

If, however, the teacher wishes advice from the doctor on any point, she will give the parent a slip requesting a check-up in the clinic. After the doctor has checked the child, the parent should follow the doctor's advice. The slip containing the doctor's advice should be returned to the teacher so that she may know what the doctor wishes to have done.

It is hoped that by the above procedure children will be returned to school promptly without undo loss of time.

NO CENTER CLOSINGS

No plans are under way to close any other centers until the West Coast exclusion ban is lifted, and even then a reasonable time will be provided for relocation before centers are closed, declared Dillon S. POSTON BOY IS PROMOTED

Somewhere in Italy, a former Poston boy has won his first stripe the hard way--and none can say that winning a promotion on the field of battle isn't doing it just that way.

In a letter dated August 16, Louis Hirata, 19-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Jusuke G. Hirata, Block 35-2-C, says "recently I was promoted to private first class (Pfc) much to my surprise." A previous letter, dated July 29, said he was then behind the lines resting after a month's combat duty.

Louie, as Poston friends know him, is a former resident of Los Angeles, attended Abraham Lincoln High School and was graduated from Poston I High School in February, 1943. He entered the army in October, 1943, training at Camp Shelby. He visited in Poston on furlough, in March, shortly before going overseas.

Louie's brother, Sgt. Manuel Hirata, is one of the few, if not the only boy of Japanese
