## MOST WEST COAST RETURNEES REPORT FAVORABLE RECEPTION

### MESS CONSOLIDATION OF BLOCKS 5 AND 12 POSTPONED TO FEB. 14

Consolidation of Block 5 and 12 mess halls at Block 5, which was scheduled for February 1, has been postponed until February 14.

A mass meeting of the two blocks will be held on Wed. eve, Feb. 7, to determine the worker quotas and to discuss the various difficulties which may arise with the combination of the groups.

In this connection, a misunderstanding has been reported, to the effect that mess hall workers are now frozen.

This is definitely not so, says Dr. John W. Powell, MC chairman. In fact, Director Mills has stated that if quotas are not met by April 1 under the recent MC ruling, still subject to Washington approval, terminations will begin.

### EAST-SOUTH RESTRICTIONS WILL BE RESCINDED

WRA has received word from the War Department that the eastern and southern restrictions now included in the individual notices to excludées will shortly be rescinded.

Excludées who are not at present in the eastern or southern coastal areas are advised to defer any plans for settling there until further notice is received from the Western Defense Command. After they have been individually notified of the revocation of restrictions, they will be (cont. on city page)

### CONTRABAND WILL BE RETURNED TO CITIZENS

Revocation of the mass exclusion orders also revoked Public Proclamation No. 13 which made certain articles, including cameras and short-wave radio, contraband in the possession of any person of Japanese ancestry in the Western Defense Command.

The regulations of the Justice Department on contraband, however, remain effective upon all aliens of enemy nationality.

The WRA will, upon request, aid citizens in all centers in recovering possession of cameras. Cameras are still contraband in the possession of Japanese aliens.

Shortwave radios will continue to be prohibited in the centers as a matter of WRA regulation. WRA, however, will continue to ship such radio sets on the certification of the project director that the shortwave mechanism will be removed.

### WRA Expects Real Test of Sentiment to Come in Spring

Most Poston returnees to the Coast have sent back reports indicating that the favorable reception they have received from their former neighbors and leading citizens in their areas has outweighed the unpleasant incidents and that they have decided to remain on the Coast.

One example is John Yamamoto from Unit III, first returnee to Orosi, Calif., who writes: "All sorts of rumors were flying around... and we started to worry. However, the first place we stopped in upon entering California was the Checking Station. The inspector came out and questioned us... Uncomfortably we (cont. on Unit I page)

### THREE MORE REPORTED WOUNDED ON FRENCH FRONT

Mr. and Mrs. Masugoro Watanabe, 222-8-D, and Mrs. Tai Morimune, 213-10-A, have learned that their sons, Pfc. Tom Watanabe and Pfc. Shigetsumi Morimune, were slightly wounded in action in France, Jan. 16 and 18. With a delayed report on Sgt. Alfred Sadamune, son of Kakuichi Sadamune, ex-37-1-A, they raise the center casualty total to 75.

Pfc. Watanabe, 22, inducted last March, is from Lindsay, Calif.,

and a 1941 graduate of Delano High. A brother, T/Sgt. Harvey, is now in the South Pacific.

Already holder of the Purple Heart for wounds received last October in France, Pfc. Morimune, 23, from Watsonville, Calif., went overseas last August. His brother Harry was recently called for duty from Boston.

Sgt. Sadamune, 29, was wounded in action in France. His wife, Della, resides (Cont. on Unit I page.)

PUT THIS IN YOUR PIPE AND SMOKE IT

Lost or destroyed tobacco ration cards will be adjusted only after the cancellation of two ration periods, according to Fred Akashi, general manager of Community Enterprises.

During these periods cigarettes will be available only through adjustment coupons, which will be good for one package of cigarettes. These are available at the Community Enterprises office.

An error was contained in a story on cigarette rationing in the last issue of the Chronicle. It should have been stated that letters "C" and "D" would be punched for the purchase of one pound of pipe tobacco, letter "C" only for four packages of cigarettes.

\*\*\*\*\* ON SOLDIERS' DEPENDENCY BENEFITS \*\*\*\*\* No. V MAILING OF CHECKS \*\*\*\*\*

THE MAILING OF CHECKS: The regular monthly checks will be mailed by the Office of Dependency Benefits, 213 Washington St., Newark 2, N.J. Unless otherwise requested by the applicant, the full sum due all dependents each month will be mailed in one check. For example, the monthly payment for a wife and two children will be mailed to the wife if she is named as payee in the application. However, payments may be made to more than one dependent, if they are designated by the applicant as payees or are determined by the ODB to be proper payees. For example, the payment for a father and mother-in-law who are dependent upon the soldier for their chief support (class B-1) may be divided equally and mailed in two checks--one to each dependent. Only one payee may be named for Class B dependents, unless they are living in separate households. In such a case monthly payment of \$37 will be divided equally among the dependents and a separate check mailed to one designated payee in each household.

Only 40 individuals have actually left the centers for relocation to the West Coast, from Dec. 17 through Jan. 9, according to daily reports which the WRA has received from all centers.

This does not include those who went to the coast for exploratory trips on short term. During the same period, a total of 267 individuals left for relocation outside the evacuated areas.

### RETURNEES TO COAST RECEIVED FAVORABLY

(cont. from front page) explained our intentions and to our surprise he congratulated us and said the Government was finally convinced of our loyalty and nothing could be more fortunate. He wished us luck and told us to work hard on the farm for the sake of the country."

"...I went down to visit the Crosi school principal... He said his son was in the Pacific but so was his Japanese friend, and that he will not permit anyone to mistreat the Japanese children... In his Civic studies, he has taught... that the Japanese students will someday return, and it was their duty to show fair treatment in a democratic way..."

Although there were some adverse encounters with people, "who are making the place unlivable," Yamamoto advises those who plan to return to do so immediately, "the sooner you renew your acquaintances and get started the better."

In an Associated Press story, Jan. 28, WRA said that Japanese returning to the Coast had encountered "little trouble", aside from the "Auburn incident," and that it expects the real test of sentiment to come with the spring.

Planting time and the "lure of the land" will recall many of the evacuated farmers, and the real attitude of Coast states will probably be determined at that time, the story said.

### RUNCORN ANSWERS QUESTIONS ON CO-OP LIQUIDATION

1. Q. Who will get the remaining assets of the Enterprises when final liquidation occurs? A. After all goods and equipment are sold, and all taxes and other obligations are paid, the remaining assets will be distributed to all members on the basis of all of the cash register stubs turned in by such members in good standing at the time of liquidation.

2. Q. Is the one dollar membership fee returnable? A. Yes.

3. Q. Will there be liquidation losses, and if so, how will they be covered? A. Yes, some goods and equipment will probably have to be sold below cost, but there is a reserve of nearly \$20,000 which has been saved for the purpose.

4. Q. Is the inventory gradually being reduced? A. Yes, the inventory has been reduced from \$150,000 to \$100,000 in the past months. This is an achievement of your buyers whom you should greatly appreciate, for it means more efficiency, hence more refunds for you.

5. Q. What must a member do to receive his full share of refunds? A. Cooperate by buying everything possible at home, by turning in all cash register stubs to your Co-op offices each quarter, and by keeping the offices clearly informed of your mailing address.

6. Q. What happens if stubs are not turned in? A. You cannot possibly receive refunds on those purchases. Instead, the net gain on such unrecorded patronage is true profit and is subject to Federal and state income tax. Unless special exemptions are made, the Enterprises must pay \$12,000 in taxes on such profits on unrecorded patronage in 1943 and 1944.

7. Q. When will refunds on recorded patronage be paid again? A. In February, all Certificates of Indebtedness, amounting to nearly \$60,000, will be paid in scrip. This scrip, which can be used for any purchase from the Enterprises, represents patronage refunds earned prior to June 30, 1943. Other refunds have been paid down to April 1, 1944.

8. Q. How may I become a co-op member? A. By paying one dollar at the Enterprises offices in Camp I, II or III, or by allowing the membership to accrue from refunds on cash register receipts.

9. Q. Should I withdraw my \$1 membership before liquidation? A. No, only members in good standing can receive remaining assets.

10. Q. How can I be a better cooperator? A. The first step is to get correct information. The second step is for you to act with others--cooperate. Some folks "coo" and some folks "operate", but it takes both together to be a good cooperator.

As ascertained by Masaoka, J.M. Monroe, 41, Union Pacific freight brakemen, shot Harry Gomi, Kyutaro Fujinami, both Issei, and Ken Kikumoto, Hawaiian Nisei, in the kitchen of the Wells Hotel-Cafe, Sat., Jan. 20 at 6:00 p.m.

Deputy Sheriff Murphy of Wells said that Saturday afternoon, Monroe sought to have his check cashed and upon being told that the boss was out, went to the kitchen where he was refused the loan of \$20 by Gomi. Several hours later, he returned, and going to the kitchen, fired and wounded the three men without warning.

PFC. HIRATA WRITES OF ITALIAN FRONT ADVENTURE

Pfc. Louis Hirata from Block 35, who promised reports of his experiences overseas, writes of an Italian adventure from southern France:

-o-o-o-o-o-o-o-o-

"In Italy, early one morning in July, our company was moving up to new positions. It was just before daybreak and everything was still dark. Another boy and myself were scouts about three hundred yards in front of the rest. Our officer ordered us to move up to the top of the next ridge which we believed had been cleared of enemy troops.

"Everything was very quiet and we weren't expecting any trouble. When we were about to reach the top, someone spoke to us in English, asking us what company we were. Believing it to be one of our officers, I said, "E Company." The next second, the other scout and myself were being fired at.

"Yes, it was a German soldier who had spoken to us in perfect English. It was really a miracle that both of us scouts escaped being shot. The enemy was only about thirty feet away!! The same boy who went through that with me, helped me here in France when I was wounded. He has become a close buddy of mine. His name is Pfc. John T. Suzuki and he hails from Honolulu."

**UCLA GUARANTEES EQUAL OPPORTUNITIES**

Equality of opportunity in the eyes of the University to all students of Japanese ancestry has been guaranteed by President Robert Gordon Sproul in a statement to the California Bruin at the Los Angeles campus.

President Sproul's statement said, in part: "The University makes no distinction among students because of their race, religion, or nationality. Therefore, persons of Japanese ancestry who have been cleared by the War Department and other federal authorities and who return to California either to begin or to resume their studies at the University will not be treated differently from other former students or applicants for admission"

Then as ask the same question, "Going back then with all your family?" This boy with aged folks, and having been the sole supporter during the pre-evacuation days, answers, "Nope, how do you suppose my folks and sisters are going to eat? I'll be drafted in the army so it'll be useless for my folks to go back. They won't be able to take care of our farm, with me in the army, I guess my folks will stay in the center until somethings happen."

Circumstances have made large groups of Nisei to have aged parents in their early twenties. The parents, like the custom in their native lands de-

## EVACUEE HOSTEL WILL OPEN IN LOS ANGELES ON OR ABOUT MARCH 1

Officially opening in Los Angeles on or about March 1, will be a hostel for returnees, located at 506 Evergreen Ave., in the former Japanese Presbyterian Church, according to Rev. Sonei Kowta of the Unit I Christian Church.

Jointly sponsored by the Presbyterian Church in the United States and the American Friends Service Committee, the hostel will have as co-directors, Rev. Kowta and Miss Esther Rhoads. The latter is formerly of Tokyo, Japan, and worked for a short time in Unit II Family Welfare. S. Amano of Blk. 36 will be manager.

About 100 evacuees can be accommodated in the hostel at one time, but because of wartime difficulties in getting necessary equipment, only a small number will be accepted at first, Rev. Kowta said. Board and room will be available for about \$1 a day.

It will be remembered that this church was used as a shelter for evacuees from Terminal Island just before total evacuation.

This will be the second returnee hostel. The other is at 305 Kensington Place, Pasadena, and has been operating under the Friends of the American Way.

## DILLON MYER WILL VISIT, MARCH 6 AND 7

### San Diego Sentiment Okay Say Returnees

Returning to Poston, happy over the warm welcome from former friends in San Diego, which he visited with four other Unit III residents, Rev. Kenji Kikuchi reports not one single incident of discrimination or display of ill-will during the 10-day trip.

Speaking before two church groups, riding street cars, shopping, and visiting the entire city, he received every consideration, he said.

The only fault he found was the extreme congestion. About 400,000 are now living where 90,000 is normal. He advises residents to make certain of housing before returning.

Another Unit III resident, Fred Katsumata, who visited the city, reports a similar reception. Owing his own home there, he intends to return soon with his wife, child and parents.

It is planned to hold a mass meeting Tuesday afternoon at Block 4 stage, if the weather permits, to which everyone will be welcome. He will also meet with more specific evacuee groups: Council, Block Managers, and other community leaders. Meetings with the relocation, welfare, and evacuee property section staffs are also scheduled.

Mr. Myer is currently attending the all-center conference which began yesterday in Salt Lake City.

### FORMER RESIDENTS LOSE LAND TO CALIFORNIA

Superior Judge Joe L. Shell of San Diego has signed final judgment escheating to the State of California 118 acres of land valued at \$50,000 and allegedly owned by Masato and Sumi Tanida, Japanese aliens, the Pacific Citizen reports.

District Attorney Whelan, who brought the suit, charged that the Tanidas had held the land through subterfuge by deeding it to five of their American-born children, in violation of the anti-alien land law.

The Tanidas, formerly of Blk. 22, were recently transferred to Crystal City (Tex.) internment center, with their seven children. They did not contest the suit.

## WRA CLARIFIES ENEMY ALIEN TRAVEL RESTRICTIONS

Information clarifying alien travel restrictions on the Coast has been released by WRA because of a rumor now current which states that Japanese alien travel will be restricted to an area not more than five miles from their homes.

Under Department of Justice regulations, an enemy alien may travel freely without special permission within the limits of the community in which he lives, in such a way as to permit his engaging in normal activities. This is not limited to the boundary lines of a city or county.

If he wishes to make a trip or move into another community, he must fill out a form

furnished by the U.S. Attorney of the district. If neither the Attorney or FBI know of any reason why the trip would endanger national security, the alien will receive a stamped copy of the statement which he should have with him at all times while he is traveling. Travel

AAF DRAMATIZES KUROKI STORY, ATTACKS RACIAL DISCRIMINATION AGAINST AMERICAN JAPANESE

Emphasizing that racial discrimination produces "wounds in this war that don't get Purple Hearts," the Army Air Forces Radio Unit dramatizes the story of T/Sgt. Ben Kuroki, Nebraska-born Nisei hero of the Eighth Air Force, in a half-hour program which was broadcast recently from New York City's station WABC over a CBS national hook-up.

Early in the program the narrator said it would "tell the story of a boy from a farmhouse near a potato field in Hershey, Nebraska," who had "picked up a very fancy collection of decorations, commendations, medals and citations--including two Distinguished Flying Crosses, the Air Medal and four oak leaf clusters, a Presidential citation, and half a dozen bronze stars--but no Purple Heart. Which is the point of the story."

Recent incidents were used to emphasize that Japanese Americans should not be discriminated against because of their race in the following and other excerpts from the script:

"Have you heard the story of the boy from Nebraska? He was missed by flak over Germany, but he could get it right in the teeth from a store keeper out West. He flew past the Fock-Wulfs all right, but the gentleman from the little town nailed him. He made it through the Ploesti raid, but he didn't quite make it through a truck farm in the U.S.A. And the point is, there are wounds in this war they don't get the Purple Heart for."

"The neighbors of the truck farmer who needed help with his crops and hired five Japanese Americans...didn't run out five of the people who brought death to China, and plunder to Burma, and starvation to the Phillipines. They ran out five people like the boy from Nebraska.

"The gentlemen (who) counted off the names of the Japanese Americans on their servicemen's honor roll and got a bucket of paint and wiped out the names...weren't wiping out the people who raped Nanking, who came to Pearl Harbor in the dawn, who planned the death march of Bataan. They were wiping out the brothers of the boy from Nebraska..."

WAR DEPT. TAKES OVER CALDWELL (IDA) "INCIDENT"

The War Department has taken over the matter of a Caucasian serviceman, who on Jan. 6 assaulted three Nisei youths in Caldwell, Ida., who were enroute to Fort Douglas, Utah for active duty in the army.

Approximately 40 residents of Caldwell and vicinity had assembled at the station for a send-off. One of the crowd, a 70 year-old man, was pushed off the station platform.

The soldier is a native Caldwell man and has a past criminal record.

BOSTON MAN HELPS JACL FILE TEST CASE BRIEFS

The JACL has received \$479 from Godfrey L. Cabot, a Boston (Mass.) businessman, to partly defray expenses incurred by the JACL in filing the brief in the Korematsu case. The total cost of the brief was \$1114.

Last year when the JACL filed a brief in the Yasui-Hirabayashi cases, Mr. Cabot donated over \$1000.

He has expressed his deep concern over the civil rights of Nisei.

Change of residence or of employment can be made only after at least seven days' notice to the U.S. Attorney, of the proposed change; and the holder of a Certificate of Identification cannot change his name, residence address, or place of employment without written notice to the Alien Registration Division of the Immigration and Naturalization Service and to the FBI at the office shown in the holder's Certificate of Identification.

The travel restrictions apply to all aliens fourteen years of age or older, who were or are citizens or subjects of Japan, Italy, or Germany, or who are at present stateless but who were citizens or subjects of any one of those countries.

The curfew regulations of the Western Defense Command no longer apply, since they were rescinded under Public Proclamation, No. 21.

1. If you do wish to go to Japan, you should be sure to send your changes of address to the Spanish Embassy, Washington, D.C., and to the Department of State, Washington, D.C., in order that you may be reached by telegraph if necessary.

2. If you do not wish to go to Japan as a repatriate or expatriate, you should write to the Spanish Embassy and the Department of State, at once, asking that your name be removed from the exchange list.

Note: Cancellations may be made at the Unit Welfare Offices in the center. No applications are taken at the center.

## DETROIT, MICHIGAN:

The Detroit WRA's efforts to meet the problem of housing resettlers has met with some favorable results, Wendell P. Gee, head of WRA Michigan, reveals.

The new housing now open to war-working evacuees is within the limits of two war housing projects: one at the famous Willow Run offering temporary or semi-permanent housing and situated 24 miles west of the city limits; and the other at Norway offering housing to 20 families in permanent-type dwellings. There is frequent and rapid bus service from both of these projects. Each project is a complete community in itself with running water, electricity and gas in the dwellings.

## LANCASTER, CALIFORNIA:

A resident of Lancaster, Calif., has stated that he has a 40-acre ranch which he desires to have operated by a person of Japanese ancestry. The main crop is alfalfa. There is a two-room house on the place which would be suitable for a man and wife.

A person of Japanese ancestry, in Lancaster, Calif., has stated that he wishes to do share-cropping with two or three men, or a man and his family. The farm is one of 160 acres, which consists of 80 acres alfalfa and 80 acres of low land very suitable for vegetable growing. The first income will come in May when the alfalfa crop is harvested. A large house is available.

ther Nisei couple, Ty and Kay Arifuku, were unhurt.

Sheriff George J. Overholt and deputies found many lead pellets lodged in the side of the house. This indicated, he said, that the blasts were fired from about 100 yards away.

The house which was burned belonged to Bob Morishige, who before the war operated Selma's largest garage. The building burst into flames and was destroyed along with the household effects stored

there by Morishige and other evacuees. The loss was estimated at \$7,000.

Fire Chief Julius Jensen of Selma pronounced the blaze as "plainly of incendiary origin." He said "the gas and electricity had not been turned on for months and the bedding was new and unlikely to be subject to spontaneous combustion."

Previously, Frank Osaki, who returned to Fresno from Gila center, reported to WRA that three shots were fired from a shotgun into his home on Feb. 9, midnight.

Osaki was alone at the time and no one was hurt, but windows in three rooms were broken.

The 40-acre Osaki farm is located about seven miles southwest of Fresno.

Osaki said that his neighbors are very friendly and helpful, and that he does not know who fired the shots.

He has two brothers, both honorably discharged from the Army. One, Harry, is now working in Chicago, while the other, Moro, is in Gila to take his parents back to Fresno.

In regards to the sale, purchase and possession of tobacco to and by minors, a memo from Unit III Administrator, H. K. Yoshimine was sent in as follows:

A large number of minors has been using tobacco to their detriment and in the interest of their welfare, an inquiry was made into the legal aspects of this.

The Arizona State Code; Chap. 43; Sec. 4003, Vol. 3 states as follows:

"Any person who shall sell, give or furnish any cigarettes or cigarette papers, smoking or chewing tobacco to any minor, and any minor who shall buy, or have in his possession or accept or receive from any person, any cigars, cigarettes etc., shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and be punished by a fine of not less than ten nor more than one hundred dollars."

A minor is any person under the age of twenty-one.

The Judicial Council of Poston has the authority to punish a person for any infringement upon or violation of the law of Arizona in force at the time of the doing or omitting of the doing of any illegal action.

## PARKER BUSINESSMEN ISSUE INVITATION TO RESIDENTS OF POSTON

The evacuees and appointed personnel of Poston have received an official letter of invitation signed by the businessmen and other interested residents of Parker.

Stating that they bear no ill will toward the people of Poston, they add that they are desirous of accepting whatever business the residents of the center wish to offer them.

They also suggest the setting up of a commercial bus line between the two communities.

### EX-TERMINAL ISLANDERS MAY RECOVER PROPERTY

Personal property left on Terminal Island by former residents will be returned to them through the Naval Lands Acquisition office in Los Angeles.

The evacuee property office here, located in Rm. 48 of the Admn. Bldg., will assist residents who wish to recover property of this type. The following information will be requested: former Terminal Island address; address where property was stored, or as complete information as possible as to where property was left, and full description of the property.

## Tooele Ordnance Jobs Now Available to Evacuees on Same Basis as Other Citizens; Prior PMGO Clearance No Longer Required

### DSC for Pfc. Madokoro Presented to His Mother By Brig. Gen. Wilson

The Distinguished Service Cross awarded to Pfc. Harry Madokoro for heroism in action was presented to his mother, Mrs. Natsu Madokoro, by Brigadier General J. H. Wilson, chief of staff of the Ninth Service Command, who came here by plane Wednesday from Camp Haan, Calif., to make the presentation. Pfc. Madokoro volunteered from the center in June, 1943, and was killed in Italy last August while fighting with the 442nd Combat Team.

The ceremony took place in Cottonwood Bowl, where the Boy Scout Color Guard presented colors and led the flag salute. The 30-piece high school orchestra from Unit I played the National Anthem.

Among the audience was Mrs. Nase Toyota, mother of four sons in the army, one of whom, Pfc. Shichizo, was killed in Italy last July. With her was her son T/Sgt. Kameo, who was wounded in France last October and December. Mrs. Toyota was greeted by General Wilson after the ceremony. Also present was Pfc. Mitsuru Yagura, who is here convalescing from wounds received on the French front last October.

### Family Head May Precede Other Family Members to Tooele Depot

Because of the unusual success of persons of Japanese ancestry working at Tooele and Sioux (Neb.) Ordnance Depots, it has been announced that Japanese who are free to travel anywhere within the United States, may apply and be accepted for Ordnance Depot employment in the same manner as any other citizens applying for such work.

This means that it will no longer be necessary for evacuees to fill out the Personnel Security Questionnaire and obtain prior Provost Marshal General's Office clearance before they go to work. They may apply either at the center or field relocation offices or by going directly to the Depot. At the Depot they must fill out the PSQ the same as any other employee, but pre-clearance of the questionnaire will not be required as in the past.

Those who desire pre-clearance, however, may still obtain it by filling out the PSQ and sending it to the Depot with a covering letter of explanation at the same time the application forms are forwarded.

Another new policy permits the head of the family to precede his family to the Depot, provided he has the approval of the relocator. (cont. on Unit I page)

JUDICIAL COMMISSION:

Scheduled to appear as defendant in Poston's first jury trial on Friday, Feb. 16, Akira Shiraki, accused of driving a government vehicle while intoxicated, was found to be a minor.

The jury appointed for the trial was dismissed, and Shiraki's case was turned over to the Youth Counseling Board who found him guilty of the charges. The sentenced passed upon Shiraki denies him the privilege of driving a motor vehicle within the project and forbids him to use liquor. He must also report twice weekly to the Internal Security office for a period of six months.

CONTINUANCE OF WAR RELOCATION CENTERS  
ADVOCATED BY CHRISTIAN CENTURY MAGAZINE

For the second time in a month, the Christian Century magazine on January 31 urged that "no Japanese American should be forced to leave the shelter of the relocation camps before he freely chooses to go." The editorial said that although the magazine generally approved the liquidation of government wartime emergency agencies as rapidly as possible, that in this instance the "United States has incurred moral responsibilities which come before all other considerations."

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EX-NAVY MAN'S SON TO  
BE IN MERCHANT MARINE

Davy Arata, son of Charles Arata, 322-10-C, who served 12 years in the U.S. Navy, is now awaiting only his passport to become a seaman in the Merchant Marine, according to information received here. At present he is attending a Navy radio operator's convoy school in Brooklyn, New York, and impatiently awaiting his passport. All seamen other than those of Japanese descent are allowed to sail upon application for a passport.

He has a brother who recently received his active duty call for the Army.

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TEMPORARY HOUSING  
OFFERED IN RIVERSIDE

Commenting on a similar editorial entitled "A Moral Obligation to Japanese Americans," in the January 3 issue, Rev. Shigeo Tanabe, director of the Detroit relocation hostel, in the letters to the editor section, says that to force old people and small children out now—after nearly three years of internment and seclusion and to have them suddenly take their places again in a wartime society is bound to create all sorts of social and economic maladjustments.

"Hardships and sufferings will be just as great as, if not greater than, those incurred at the time of their evacuation. Evidences of these can already be seen where old people have resettled," he said.—Topaz Times, Feb. 10.

# DELANO STOPS BLACKBIRDS

In one of the most exciting casaba tilts witnessed this season, the youthful Delano quintet avenged an earlier defeat by turning back the Blackbirds, 33-29, at court 38 Tuesday night for their third consecutive win of the second round. Only the unpredictable Ramblers stand in the Dukes path to the second round pennant.

Delano's victory was sparked by George Ikemiya's nine points and fine defensive work.

### NATIONAL PTA TO AID RESETTLEMENT PROGRAM

For more than a year, the National Congress of Parents and Teachers has been organizing parent-teacher associations in the various relocation centers and now has ten associations with a membership of 4,256.

This national organization has stated its intention to cooperate with the WRA in assisting in the adjustment of the evacuee.

It is planned to establish state committees, whose duties will

be to create better relations between the two groups of Nisei--those who have relocated and those who are in the process of relocating; to co-operate with WRA in securing suitable employment and a normal social life; to give evacuee children an opportunity to participate in PTA welfare and student aid projects, and to provide an opportunity for scholarships and student loans to promising Nisei students.

# RELOCATION

## COMMERCIAL PROPERTY:

Regulations on shipments of commercial property at government expense have been modified to eliminate the previous requirement that such property must be certified as irreplaceable at the evacuee's new location before shipment can be approved.

Hereafter, no such certification will be required. However, the relocation officer must certify that the property is essential to the evacuee's successful relocation, and the 5,000-lb. limitation still applies except in cases of commercial property now in storage or use at a relocation center.

## PROPERTY ASSISTANCE:

All evacuees who left the center on indefinite leave on or before January 2, 1945, are also eligible for property transportation assistance.

If such persons still have personal property at the centers or in the evacuated area--either in private storage or WRA warehouses--They may apply at their field office and have it moved to the common carrier depot nearest their present location.

This applies to those who left on short-term, seasonal or trial indefinite on or before Jan. 2, and later converted in the field to indefinite leave.

### Civil Service Status Will Assure Post-War Priority

Men in the Enlisted Reserve Corps who wish to obtain employment at Tooele Ordnance Depot in Utah may do so, according to J.M. Jennings of WRA Salt Lake, who was a visitor here last week.

Mr. Jennings pointed out that such boys can make arrangements to report directly to the Depot and work until they are called for active duty. In this way, they can accumulate money to aid their families.

He also stated that they receive Civil Service status, which with veterans' preference, will give them preferential rights for post-war employment.

Work in reclamation is available at the Depot for Issei who are in fairly good physical shape, Mr. Jennings added. This involves segregating used shells returned from the fronts after they have been fired. Different metals are separated, stored and prepared for shipment, so that they can be melted down into their original metals. The work is reported to be simple and light.

As previously announced, pre-clearance with the Provost Marshal General's Office is no longer required for either Nisei or Issei. The Depot deals directly with PMGO in handling the Personnel Security Questionnaire when the applicant begins work at the Depot.

# RELOCATION

## IN NEW YORK:

Representatives of 20 national and local agencies and organizations co-operating in resettlement attended the first of a series of discussion meetings designed to acquaint them with community resources available to resettlers in the Middle Atlantic Area on Jan. 27 in the New York City WRA Office. The audience of some 50 persons included many Issei and Nisei.

Four speakers discussed the various ways in which public and private agencies and assisting evacuees in meeting problems concerned with resettlement and family reunions. They also stressed the fact that these services would be continued after the liquidation of WRA. Resettlers who need aid in planning for family reunions as well as financial assistance were urged to avail themselves of all the services provided by these organizations which have been established to help people who need assistance. All the speakers asked evacuees particularly to seek help because resettlement undoubtedly raises many problems which cannot be solved by an individual alone.

Said the Enterprise, "The Army ought to know better than the average as to when the military necessity for the evacuation, if it ever existed, no longer exists." Californians ought to realize that the state was a part the United States, that all other states have Japanese Americans in their populations, and that they have been no threat to the safety and security of the nation, the editorial concluded.

Beauty Parlor, west side of Buffalo, containing 8 dryers, rent \$25, very good income, established trade, reasonably priced.



We receive heartening news from our returned-to-California friends, especially in Reedley. It makes us wonder why we don't pack up and return, too. But we presume everyone has different plans and problems.

In one of the letters from our friend, she states, "Sentiment around here is not perfect. It depends on your own attitude toward your Caucasian friends. If you do everything squarely and fairly, you won't have any enemy but some people say and demand beyond their rights. That's one reason why there are some troubles popping up." So it may be wise to open our mouth just so much when we return and leave the unbearable to the right officials.

The Issei, most of those who plan to stay in America, would rather return to California more than anywhere else. To them it is their second home where they built a little security with sweat and tears. Now they are too old to pioneer into the eastern states. But due to old age, many may not be able to provide for themselves, if they return "home" alone.

The Nisei, young as they are, have different ideas. Many would like to venture into the new horizon which lies mostly in the mid-west and east-where they will be treated as equals in jobs and face less racial discrimination. But they, too, deep in their hearts, will some day, perhaps when this war blows over, want to return to California. California has such a good climate...
