

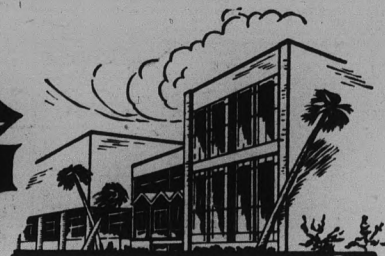

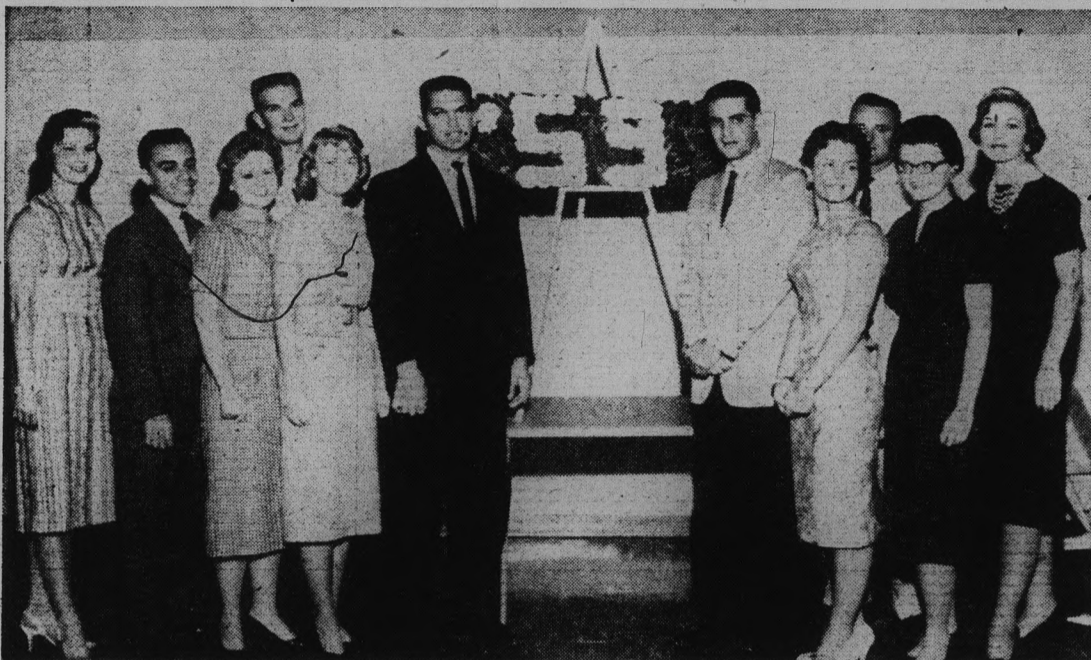

### Airplane Crash Causes Death Of AS Students

Two ASU students died as a result of a plane crash yesterday at 1:25 p.m. near Guadalupe.

Terry Ward Heiman, 21, of 86 W. Holly, Phoenix, an Engineering major at ASU, was dead on arrival at the Tempe Clinic Hospital.

Jack L. Rooks Jr., 22, of Buckeye, pilot of the Luscombe two-place plane, received multiple internal and external injuries. He was taken to Tempe Clinic Hospital and then transferred to Mesa Southside District Hospital, where he died some four hours later.

The Maricopa Sheriff's office said the plane apparently stalled shortly after take-off from the Sanders Aviation Co. airstrip southwest of Tempe.

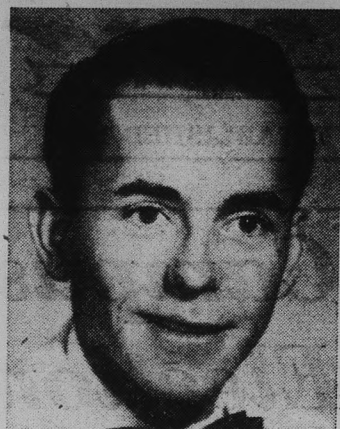

Phi Kappa Phi, national scholastic honorary, will initiate 78 new members Friday evening instead of last Friday, as announced in the State Press May 8.

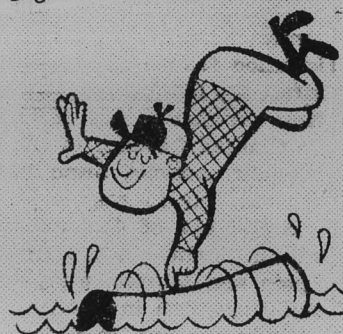

# Writer Will Teach Here

Dr. Glendon Swarthout, fiction writer, will teach at ASU next semester, Dr. Collice Portnoff, English department chairman, announced recently.

Swarthout, who will be a part-time English lecturer,

writes short stories for "Esquire" and other magazines. His novel, "Cordura," is now being filmed by Columbia Pictures.

"Cordura," published in 1958 by Random House, was a best-

seller on the New York Times and New York Herald-Tribune lists. It was published in London by Heinemann and was a selection of the Great Britain book-of-the-month club. The first printing of the Signet pocket edition this spring numbered 2,000,000 copies.

In addition, translation rights into Spanish, German, French, Italian, Swedish and Danish were sold. The novel was also selected as novel-of-the-month by a Buenos Aires book club.

Swarthout is helping with the screenplay for the movie, which will be released this summer. Gary Cooper, Van Heflin, Rita Hayworth, Tab Hunter and Richard Conte will star.

Swarthout received his doctor of philosophy degree at the University of Michigan. He holds bachelor's and master's degrees of English.

He will teach literature courses including EN 351 - Contemporary Fiction. His section will meet from 6:40-9:30 p.m. Mondays.

# Seniors Receive Sahuaros First At MU During Final Exam Week

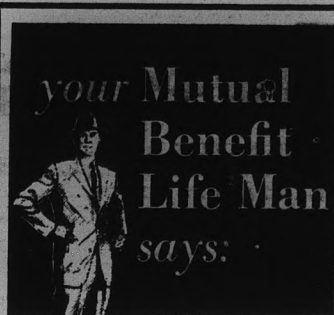
The Sahuaro, ASU yearbook, will be distributed during finals week. It will be available in MU 207 to seniors first and undergrads later.

Note the \$22,000 athletic budget increase compared with the \$300 decrease in the cultural affairs budget shown in the article by Gordon Peterson last Friday.

The need for further expenditure for cultural events is obvious by their infrequency. The expansion of the athletic budget is questionable, if for no other reason than the present omnipotence of that department.

It is up to the students who came here for an education beyond a physical one to let their opinions be heard. There are

other feasible solutions to this problem. Why the senate passed this budget, I do not understand.

I was reading an ASU departmental publication called Foreign Languages In Progress the other day. I finished the little anecdotes, and another article caught my attention.

In essence it questioned, "Can a single ethnic people divided into two groups find their main bond, a common language, a barrier rather than a bridge?"

"West Germans are beginning to fear that this may become the fate of their partitioned nation. It's a matter of changing semantics in the Soviet-occupied East as evidenced in two different published versions of the Duden dictionary."

This dictionary is a time-honored authority for the pronunciation and meaning of German words. The "West Duden" is published in Mannheim; the "East Duden" in Leipzig.

Here are a few interesting excerpts, comparing the two:

"Cosmopolitanism — (West Duden) — world citizenship; (East Duden) — today primarily a concept of imperialistic ideology which seeks to destroy the cultural heritage of nations and undermine the national independence of peoples by using the idea of 'world citizenship' as a subterfuge.

Objectivism — (West Duden) — the tendency to deal with existing facts and truths rather than subjective thoughts and feelings; (East Duden) — a doctrine by which, under the pretext of scientific objectivity, essential aspects are ignored, while events and opinions are merely registered in an unselective and passive manner."

There's more. Individualism in the East Duden dictionary is "self-interest without any consideration for society." And on and on ...

Atheism in the East Duden dictionary is "the scientifically founded denial of the existence of God."

It provides information about the program, location, fees and ownership of each camp and the name and address of each camp director.

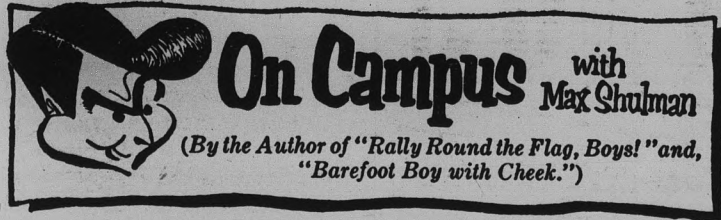
ASU's Camp Tontozona, near Payson, established in 1952, is the oldest school camp in Arizona, according to the directory.

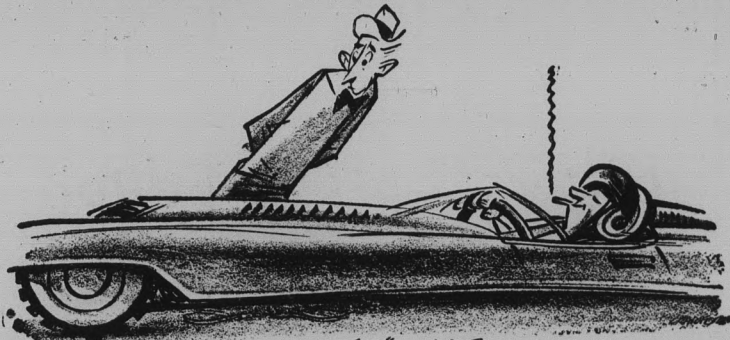

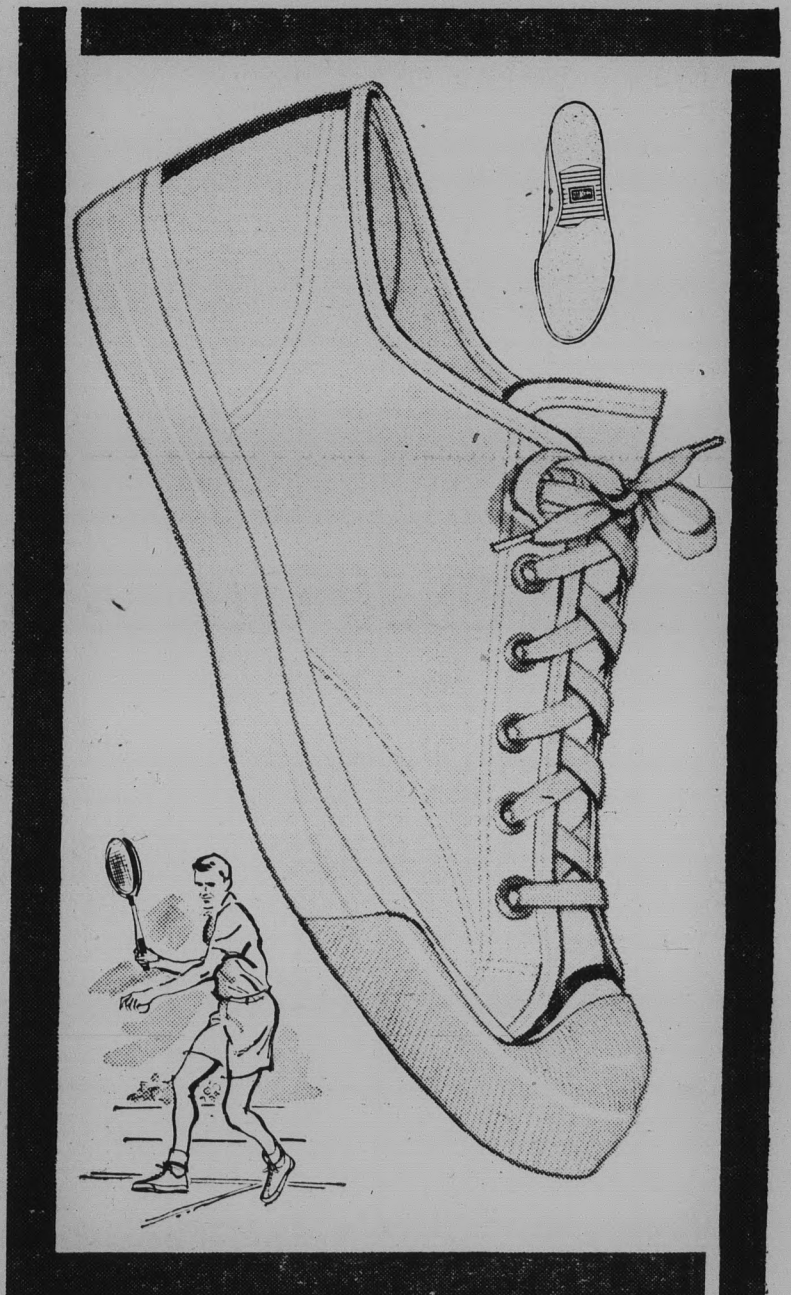

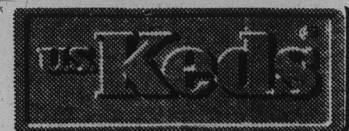

## Vista Offers South Pacific

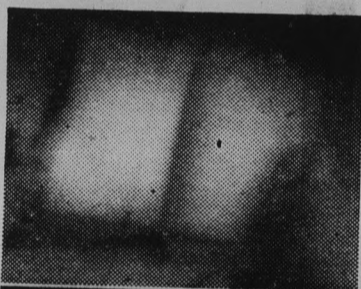

# Riflemen Nab Championship

Arizona State's sharpshooting rifle team, captured the Border Conference championship in Tucson last week.

The Sun Devil riflemen shot a 2803 out of a possible 3000 to defeat second place Texas Western by 39 points. Arizona was third with 2750; New Mexico State placed fourth with 2723; and Hardin-Simmons was fifth with 2703.

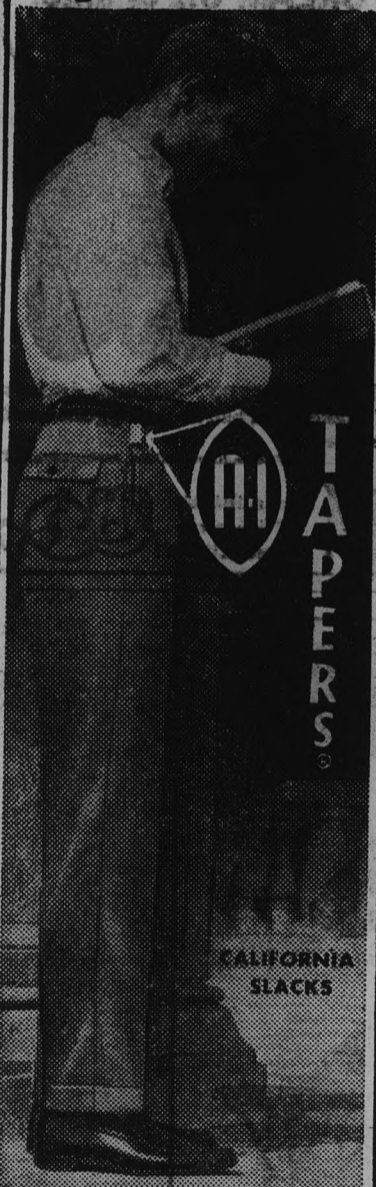
Leading the ASU onslaught by firing a 281 and 287 for the two-day meet was Joe Andrews. Andrews finished second to New Mexico State's Otto Wildenstein for medalist honors. Wildenstein, for two years among the top three shooters in the country, fired

a 286 the first day and followed the second day with a spectacular 295.

Jim Ferris was second among the ASU scorers with 279 and 287 for a 566. Jack Jones and Dave Shoore finished in a tie for third place in team honors with a two-day 565 total; and Lou Zakas was fifth with 538.

This season, the Sun Devils and their coach, Captain John Luxemberger, swept eight consecutive matches before dropping one to the University of Mississippi.

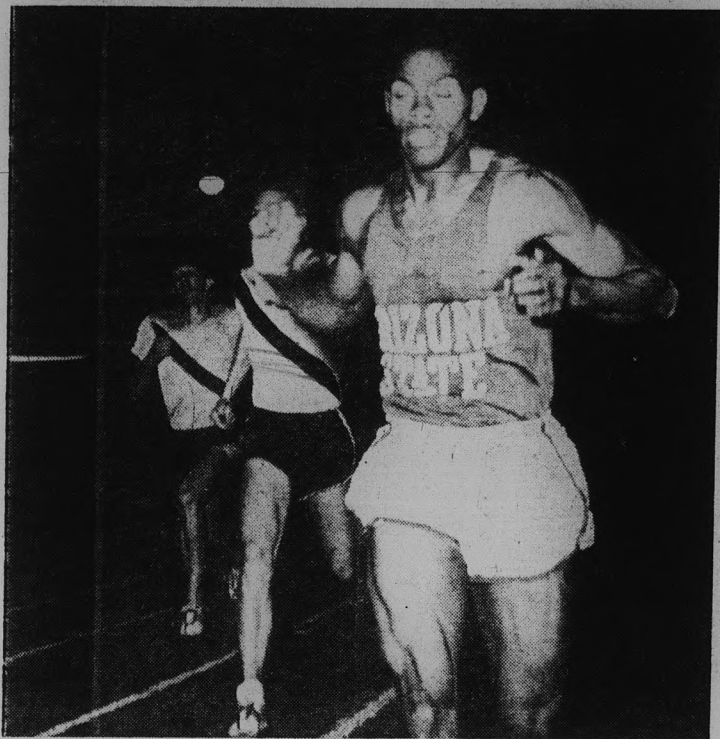

# 'Cats Win BC Meet

A flu-ridden Sun Devil track and field team snared second place honors in last week's Border Conference Championships. Despite the absence of four top perform-

ers, the Demon spikers accumulated 55½ points behind the winning UA Wildcats, 84½.

Distance star Alex Henderson, discus thrower Carol Lindroos, and sprinters George Hershey and Tom Pettit did not participate in the meet for the Devils due to cases of flu and pulled muscles.

The ASU team still garnered six first places with sparkling showings from Don Jeisy, Jerry Roberston, Herb Montoya, Jesse Bradford, Mal Spence and Dick Fischl. Joe Rose, Tom Whetstine, Wayne McDonald, Mel Spence, Bradford and Fischl each picked up second place points for ASU.

## Golfers Win Third Crown

Arizona State University's golf team successfully defended its title to win its third straight Border Conference championship at Tucson Friday afternoon.

The Devils were led by sophomore Rex Wilsen who had a three-under-par 69 for the two day tournament. ASU finished out the ASU scoring. University of Arizona for a total 577-581.

Hardin-Simmons came in third with 616, Texas Western had 649, West Texas 662 and New Mexico State 671.

Along with Wilsen's 138, Duff Lawrence shot 70-74 — 144; Joe Kallof 71-76 — 147; and Don Boaz 74-74—148; finished out the ASU scoring.

Mike Rombold led the University of Arizona's freshman laden team with a 140. He shot two under par 70 on the par 72 Tucson Country Club course.

Jeisy defeated teammate Rose in the pole vault and established a new BC standard of 14'7¼".

Mal Spence won the 440 in record-breaking time of 47.4. He also turned in a spectacular 46.2 in the anchor leg of the relay. Spence was 20 yards behind at the start of the final lap and was barely nipped at the tape.

Robertson won the high jump at 6'6", beating teammate Tom Whetstine. Whetstine finished second at 6-4½.

Herby Montoya, a senior, and freshman Wayne McDonald finished one-two in the javelin competition with throws of 224'6" and 216'0", respectively.

Bradford was edged by Arizona's Jim Tate in a 9.8 century, but he redeemed himself by copping the 220-yard low hurdles in 23.6, three tenths of a second off the BC record. Fischl finished second in the lows and won the 120-yard highs with a 14.7 timing.

Sophomore Jim McGowan led the pack by five yards for the first two laps in the mile run, but pulled a muscle in the backstretch and finished the race in pain, staving off a UA man for fourth place.

Arizona's George Young won the mile and the two mile. Texas Western was third with 11 points; Hardin-Simmons and New Mexico State tied for fourth with 7 each. West Texas State did not compete.
