## Pulitzer Prize Winner To Speak



Allan Nevins, Pulitzer Prize-winning historian with a distinguished career in Journalism, will deliver the main address Friday, May 12, at Arizona State University's annual honors convocation.

Dr. Nevins, who published a two-volume history, "The Emergence of Lincoln," in 1952, will speak at ASU on "Lincoln, the Civil War and Democracy."

The convocation, which honors ASU's outstanding students, signals the beginning of commencement activities. It is scheduled for 10:40 a.m. and is open to the public.

Professor Nevins, DeWitt Clinton professor emeritus of American History at Columbia University, currently is senior research scholar at the Henry E. Huntington Library, San Marino, Calif.

The scholar and editor, who taught at Columbia for more than a quarter century, received two Pulitzer Prizes for biography during his prolific academic career. The first was in 1932 for his "Grover Cleveland," the second in 1937 for his "Hamilton Fish." He was appointed professor of American History at Columbia in 1931, after an outstanding record in Journalism.

Born in Camp Point, Ill., on May 20, 1890, Dr. Nevins attended the University of Illinois, where he received his bachelor's degree in 1912 and a master's degree a year later, while serving as an instructor in English.

In 1913 he became editorial writer on the New York Evening Post, a position he held until 1923, and editorial writer for The Nation, where he served until 1918. After holding editorial positions on the New York Sun and the New York World, during the years 1924-27, he became professor of History at Cornell University.

In a span of 45 years, he has written or edited nearly 40 books on a wide variety of subjects ranging from the American Revolution to the New Deal. He currently is completing a multi-volume history of the Civil War and Reconstruction which he began in 1947 and which is expected to serve as the authoritative work on that era for many years to come.

Professor Nevins has received numerous awards and honors, including the Bancroft Prize, the Scribner Centenary Prize, and the Gold Medal for History and Biography of the National Institute of Arts and Letters.

## Special Seats Made Available For Graduate Football Fans

Graduating seniors and their wives or husbands will be able to purchase season football tickets for \$15 this fall.

Athletic Director Clyde B. Smith announced the new plan yesterday. "We feel that graduating seniors will have many financial obligations in the next few years," he said. "By offering them season tickets at this

The special program will continue for three years, with this year's graduates seated in a special alumni section of Sun Devil Stadium.

Season tickets for the 1961-62 season will go on sale in early March.

## Payson Workshop Named 'Best Ever'

ASU leaders enjoyed a weekend of recreation and hard work April 28-30 at Tontozona Camp, Payson.

Declared as one of the most successful student government workshops, the weekend was highlighted by three outstanding speakers in the field of leadership throughout the three days.

Approximately 45 students attended the workshop. This is the smallest group ever to go to Payson, according to J. C. Brown, chairman of Organizations and Leadership Board.

After supper Mr. John Schoolland, director of Guidance Services at West Phoenix High School, addressed the group on "Principles of Leadership." According to Mr. Schoolland, "humanness" and "humbleness" are the most important qualities a leader may possess. He listed a number of steps a leader should take before he undertakes an activity. At the end of his address he demonstrated Group Dynamics in which the psychological aspect of leadership was emphasized.

Les Miller, ASASU's outgoing first vice president, followed Mr. Schoolland with a detailed outline of student government at ASU and its functions. Recreation and dancing at Kohl's

Ranch completed the day's activities.

After an early breakfast Saturday morning, the leaders divided into six groups to work on ASU problems and take legislative action on them. Following lunch, six bills were introduced to the model Student Senate. Three were passed and three defeated. "This gives the student leaders some practical experience in legislative action," Miller stated. Dr. Roy C. Rice, professor of Education, spoke on Parliamentary Procedure.

"Leadership After the Sheekskin" was the topic of discussion given by Mr. Jim Creasman, Director, ASU alumni Association.

After breakfast and a morning worship service, Dean W. P. Shofstall made the closing remarks and evaluated the 1960-61 Spring Workshop.

"Best ever!" was the general opinion of student leaders in evaluating the workshop.

# Retarded Children Is Confab Topic

The annual spring conference sponsored by the National Association for Retarded Children and the College of Education, will begin 8:30 a.m. today at ASU.

Dr. Philip D. Gattney, associate professor of Educational Psychology, is chairman of the conference which will have its first opening session following registration at 9:30 a.m. Key-note speaker will be Dr. Willard Abraham, chairman of the department of Educational Services and nationally recognized authority on special education.

"A light in the Community" will be Dr. Abraham's topic, which will be followed by an evaluation of the facilities, personnel and future plans for assisting retarded adolescents and

adults. Relating education to the topic will be Dr. Lewis Allbee, assistant superintendent for Educational Services, Phoenix Union High School and Phoenix College system, and Dr. Sanford S. Davis, chairman of the department of Educational Psychology and Guidance at ASU.

This theme is to be followed during the afternoon session, meeting at 1:40 p.m. Kenneth J. Smithee, director of the Maricopa County Parks and Recreation department, and John A. Keenan, chief of special services section of the state vocational rehabilitation division, are the speakers. Dr. Agnes Sharp, Phoenix Elementary School District No. 1 psychologist, will speak on mental health at 3:20 p.m.

Speakers will be Dr. Murray G. Urie, Scottsdale psychiatrist, and Donald S. Reagen, president of the sponsoring county council of the NARC. The topic is "Sex Education for the Mentally Retarded: Everybody's Business."

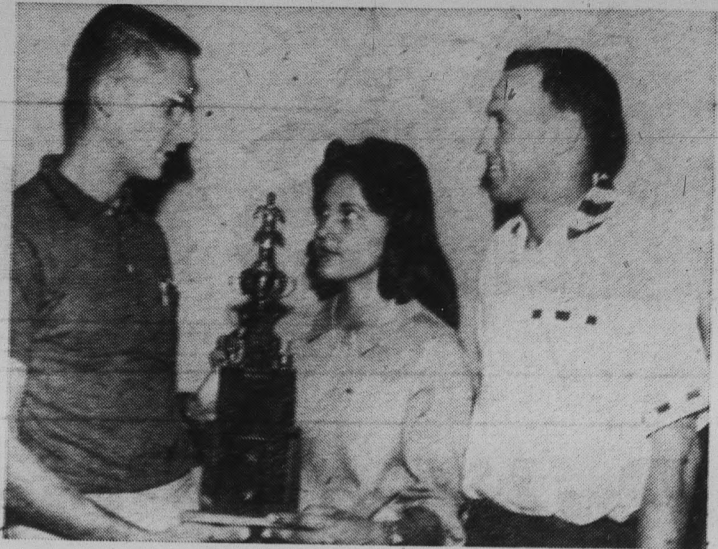

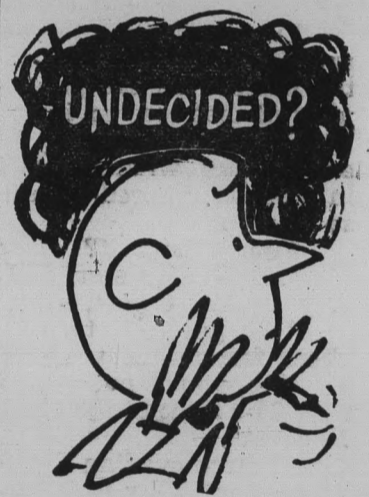

# ASU Receives Total Of \$20,000 In Grants Since March 1

Over \$20,000 in research grants, scholarships, and gifts have been awarded to ASU

since March 1, the Board of Regents report. Included in the total are:

A grant of \$8,419 from the National Institute of Mental Health, U.S. Public Health Service, Bethesda, Md., enabling Dr. Harold W. Coppock, associate professor of Psychology,

to continue his study of sensory and motor factors in escape conditioning.

A contract of \$4,064 with the National Institutes of Health for a workshop on "Planning for Community Service in Mental Health," under the direction of Mrs. Naomi Harward, assistant professor of Sociology.

A grant of \$1,200 from CIBA Pharmaceutical Products, Inc., Summit, N.J., for an investigation by Dr. Ernest Parker, professor of Animal Husbandry, of "Feeding Trials of Serpasil (a

tranquilizer) to Laying Hens to Combat Heat Stress Under High Temperatures."

An annual scholarship grant of \$1,000. "The Sigma Delta Chi-Pulliam Scholarship," from Eugene Pulliam, publisher of the Arizona Republic and the Phoenix Gazette, for the junior student showing greatest prom-

ise for a newspaper career, the award continuing for each student through his senior year.

A grant of \$3,000 from A. F. Morris, general manager, Ray Mines Division, Kennecott Copper Corporation, Hayden, for the purchase of additional equipment for the modern industrial spectroscopy program.

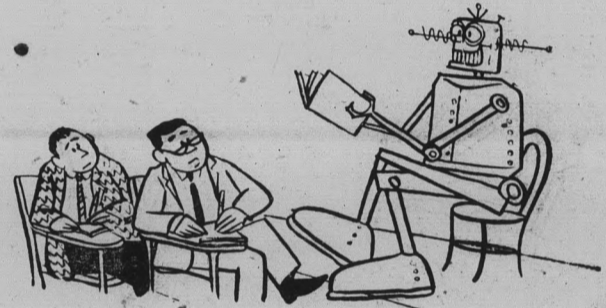

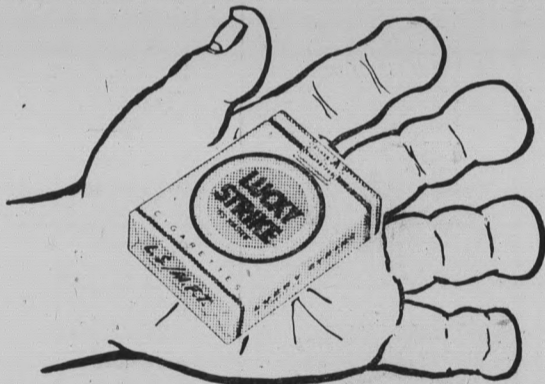

# Trojans, Devils Speed To New Relay Records

Arizona State's track and field team turns its thoughts towards this weekend's dual meet against Arizona after a spectacular showing by the Sun Devil mile relay quartet in the Mount San Antonio Relays last Saturday.

The Devils hooked up with the University of Southern California at Mt. SAC and as usually happens when the two school's mile relay teams get together, records went flying out the window.

USC turned in the fastest time in the nation's history by a collegiate mile relay team as the Trojans flew over the course at a 3:07.6 pace. The Sun Devils, leaders most of the way, finished second with 3:07.9. That tied former marks by USC and Abilene Christian as the second fastest time ever.

Sprinter Hubie Watson finished second to San Jose State's Dennis Johnson in the 100-yard dash. Johnson ran a wind-aided 9.2 and Watson clocked at 9.5.

The Arizona State mile relay

group also competed in the 880 relay and finished second to USC.

The outlook isn't extremely bright for Saturday's meet in Tucson against the Wildcats. Watson pulled a muscle in the 100 at Mt. SAC and hurdler Gaston Green fell and injured an ankle in the same meet.

Both Watson and Green must be at peak efficiency if they are to win their events against the Wildcats and both must win if the Devils are to defeat the Cats.

# Baseballers Hope To Turn Tables After Two Losses

After losing both ends of last Saturday's double header with the University of Arizona, ASU's baseball team will face the Wildcats here in a weekend twin bill.

The Devils will have to top the Cats in both contests to keep alive the local's chances of entering the NCAA playoffs.

After Saturday's 10-2 and 7-2 wins by the Wildcats and all-around dominance in every department, there appears to be a big gap between 5th and 6th places in the nation's collegiate baseball powers.

That defeat at the hands of the Wildcats was disheartening in as much as it stretched the string of defeats in Tucson which started in 1932. ASU must now wait until next year if it is to break the Tucson home field hold.

Arizona banged out 17 hits against four ASU hurlers in the first contest while Wildcat chucker Miles Zeller was com-

pleting his 11th straight game of the year and holding the Devils to just seven scattered hits.

First baseman Joe Skaisgir was the big noise for the Wildcats, collecting four hits, including two shots off the left-centerfield wall and then crossing up the Demons with a perfect bunt down the third base side.

Night time brought a different style of ball from the Sun Devils for the first four innings as Sterling Slaughter held the Cats at bay and drove in the contest's first run with a sacrifice fly to right following Mario Ramirez's smashing triple against the fence in center field.

Fielding errors, mental errors, and base-running errors,

coupled with Arizona's hitting and ASU's lack of it put the Wildcats into a lead they had little trouble holding.

Mike Tatum, who was charged with his first loss in eight decisions in the opener, relieved starter Slaughter in the second game and did a creditable job. Slaughter lost the decision to fireballing righthander Marv Dutt who went the distance while striking out 11 ASU batters.

Tatum and Slaughter are expected to go again for Winkle's crew Saturday in the day-night double header in Phoenix and will probably face Zeller and Dutt who stretched their records to 9-2 and 6-0 respectively.

# Arizona State Golfers Lose

The University of Arizona's golf team evened its dual meet record at 1-1 against Arizona State with a convincing 20½-6½ victory over the Sun Devils on the Tucson Country Club course Saturday.

The loss put ASU's season mark at 27-3-1 and set the stage for a real battle between the two Arizona schools in the Border Conference meet April 13 in Abilene, Texas.
