## Addresses First Senate Meeting

ASASU President Bob Carter presented a twelve-point program of financial appropriations, evaluation of activities and boards, and support of five campus programs at the Student Senate's opening session Wednesday at 3:45 p.m.

Carter delivered his program in the annual "State of the University" address to a highly distinguished audience of university and Valley officials and ASU students in the Senate Chamber.

Two gifts of financial appropriations to the University from ASASU's unencumbered balance were suggested by Carter.

**THE FIRST** "substantial" appropriation would be accepted by the Board of Regents and matched by 1 1/2 to 1 from an existing private source for the purpose of student loans.

Carter's other fund recommendation was for a donation to the University over a period of years for the purchasing of a carillon, giant musical chimes, for the University.

The president asked the senate to review and examine ASU's Senior Day and Freshman Orientation Week programs. Carter would like to see greater associated student participation in the former and a stronger "feeling of the university" for the incoming classes in the latter.

**CONSIDERATION** of division of the existing Rally and Traditions Board and establishment of a Senate Historian were Carter's recommended student government changes.

Carter expressed a need for more work and specialization in both areas of rallies and traditions. He feels that a Senate Historian is needed to do the

## Four Triumph In Primary

ASU primary freshman senator elections Wednesday cut a slate of fifteen candidates to four as less than 15 per cent of the freshman class voted.

Fred Reish, Joe Murphy, John Reiser and Claudia (Corki)

Norde finished highest in the election in that order to become next Wednesday's general election candidates.

**ONLY 797** votes were cast by the freshman class, which totals about 5,500. 27 of these votes

were not counted because voters did not mark with the "x".

Highest vote-getter was Fred Reish with 120. Joe Murphy received 98 votes. In a close contest for third, John Reiser tallied 73 to "Corki" Norde's 70.

Other contestant's tallies were: Paul Cattrell 65; Cecelia Maxwell 57; Marty Stellhorn 45; Michael Cassidy and Harry Luge both 40; Judi Jones and Charlotte Land both 33; Howard Silverman 30; Melinda Rasmussen 29; Marjorie Pavelin 28; and Nancy Butler 9.

**CANDIDATE REISH** was requested to appear at a meeting of the Election Board Thursday to discuss the possibility of his failure to fulfill all campaign requirements of the statutes.

However, the board concluded only that he failed to number his campaign placards, a recommendation of the board and not a statute requirement.

### Schirra Orbits Six Times

**ABOARD U.S.S. KEARSARGE IN PACIFIC** — Astronaut Walter M. Schirra Jr. whirled around the world six times in nine hours, 13 minutes Wednesday, alighting directly on target in America's longest, most precise and most spectacular space flight.

"I feel fine . . . what a sweet little bird," the 39-year-old Navy commander said as he and his space capsule were plucked from the Pacific Ocean 285 miles northeast of Midway.

### Barnett Urges Law, Order

**OXFORD, Miss.** — Gov. Ross Barnett Wednesday night urged Mississippians to maintain law and order as James H. Meredith, a Negro, made plans to spend his first weekend as a student at the University of Mississippi off the campus.

Some forces were withdrawn yesterday, but a large number of troops still patrolled the campus, anticipating possible weekend disorders when fans flock here for the home-coming football game against the University of Houston.

### Americas Denounce Red Cuba

**WASHINGTON** — InterAmerican foreign ministers unanimously denounced Sino-Soviet intervention in Cuba last night as an "attempt to convert the island into an armed base for Communist penetration of the Americas."

## Monday Set As Deadline For Payson Applications

Monday is the deadline for submitting applications to attend the Leadership Workshop in Payson, October 12, 13 and 14.

All students interested in attending the workshop, whether they are now participating in student government or not, are encouraged to submit applications.

These may be picked up in the ASASU offices in the MU or at the information desk.

All students planning to participate must file applications in order to complete records, attendance rosters, and room and board allotments. This includes those students who have already received invitations.

The purpose of the fall session is to plan the activities of the 1962-1963 programs for all campus government groups.

These plans will be outlined on Sunday morning.

Student participation and direction will be stressed throughout the workshop, with keynote speeches to be given by Dean W. P. Shofstall and Dean H. D. Richardson.

Dean Richardson will speak the night of Oct. 12 on "Who's Leading Whom?", and Dean Shofstall's topic on the evening of Oct. 13 will be "Why Government?"

# Spring Semester Loans Available

National Defense Student Loans and United Student Aid Funds are now available for ASU students.

The NDS loan is available for the 1963 spring semester to students carrying a minimum of 12 semester hours and who have a cumulative grade index of 2.5 or higher.

**THE APPLICANT** cannot be on disciplinary probation or have any present undue financial obligations. He must justify his need, submitting a detailed budget and get recommendations from two faculty members. He also must be a citizen or permanent resident of the United States.

The loan may be repaid in installments over ten years beginning two years after graduation. Three per cent interest begins one year after graduation.

For the students who become teachers, the first five payments are canceled. Priority is given to students majoring in education, engineering, science, language and international relations.

**STUDENTS INTERESTED** in the NDS loan may obtain an application blank from the financial aid office, MU 212, and return it before Nov. 1.

The United Student Aid Loan is available to sophomores, juniors, or seniors. The student may borrow up to \$1000 a year or a

total of \$3000 for undergraduate and/or graduate education.

Loan payments, with six per cent interest rate, begin four months after graduation with three years to pay.

**APPLICATIONS FOR** the USAF loan are available in the financial aid office.

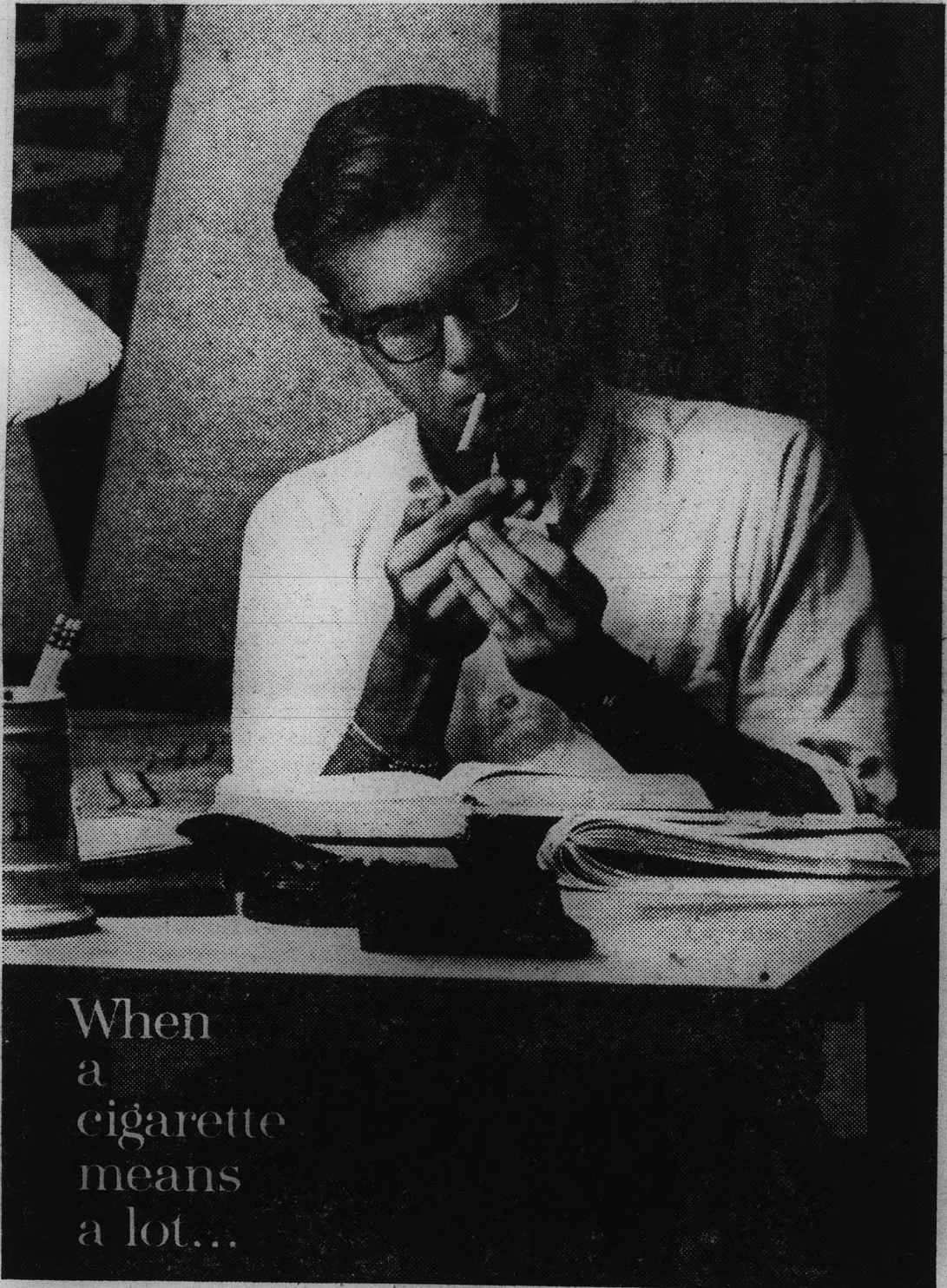

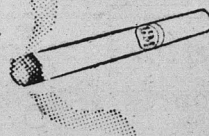

She also reported that Mississippi students were leaving the campus "just

to get away from it all. They want to wait this out a few days or a week."

The "Wildcat" labeled Mississippi actions as "shameful" and "unthinkable" in a front-page editorial. They also said, "In Arizona, in our schools and in our university, we have learned that the Emancipation Proclamation was signed by Abraham Lincoln on Jan. 1, 1863. That is three months from being a century ago."

Congratulations to the staff of the "Wildcat"! This example of "Big Time" reporting is a credit to their newspaper.

Finally, microphones and other electronic equipment should be triple-checked to guarantee an absence of little incidents similar to the one which preceded one of the numbers Tuesday night.

The first meeting of ASASU President Bob Carter's cabinet yesterday included "advisory members" from the IFC, AMS, State Press and other organizations in an effort by Carter to provide a sounding board of student opinion on which to map out executive programs.

An effective utilization of this cabinet by Carter would help in creating student interest in his work.

"The Script" includes rules and privileges of residence living and standards required of university women.

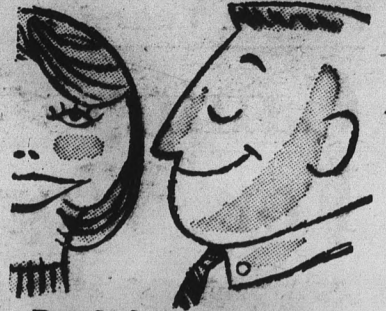
"Costumes" notes that the "key word for the dress of the West is informality."

and personal choice are your main script outlines for campus dress."

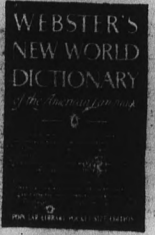
The book includes the AWS constitution, a diagram of how AWS is organized and a directory of AWS officers, residence hall head residents and presidents of other women's organizations.

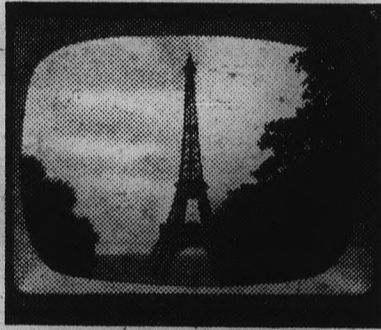

# Campus Headquarters For World Publication

A publication which reaches the four corners of the world has its headquarters at ASU.

Located in a quonset hut across College Avenue from the Agriculture building, the Jacques Cattell Press Inc., publishes "American Men of Science," Directory of American Scholars and "Leaders in Education."

"American Men in Science" is a biographical directory of scientists in both North and South America who have contributed greatly to their field of endeavor.

The first edition was published in 1906 and carried 4,000 entries.

This year, the 10th edition will be published in five volumes and will have about 112,000 entries.

A considerable percentage of the scientists listed work outside of universities in industry, hospitals, agencies of the government and the armed forces.

Most industrial laboratories and public libraries in the United States keep the publication on hand.

Performing similar services in their fields are the "Directory of American Scholars" and "Leaders in Education."

LAST FALL the Jaques Cattell Press became a subsidiary of the R. R. Bowker Co. of New York.

The Bowker company is known throughout the world for such directories as "American Architects Directory," "Who's Who in American Art," "Ulrich's Periodicals Directory" and "American Library Directory."

It is also well known for its journals: "Publishers' Weekly and Liberty Journal."

The Cattell Press was founded in 1940 by Cattell at the time he started his popular "Humanizing Science Series."

the "American Men of Science," which was first published in 1906 by his father, J. McKen Cattell.

The late Dr. Grady Gamme, ASU president for 26 years, invited Cattell to set up editorial and publishing headquarters at ASU in 1958.

CATTELL accepted, and space in the quonset hut was

rented to the firm for its operations.

After the death of Cattell in 1960, his wife, Mrs. Elizabeth Walsh Cattell, took over the concern and is now vice president and resident manager.

About 30 persons work in the quonset hut collecting, writing, editing and proofing the biographies.

After completion of the current edition of "American Men of Science," the firm plans to publish the "Directory of American Scholars" and a new edition, "Directory of the American Psychiatric Association."

The first program which the president asked the senate to support was the development of the tri-weekly State Press.

President Carter recommended the development of a group on the campus to participate in the forming of the Collegiate Council for the United Nations, an educational body aimed at informing one of UN policy and functions.

Carter also asked for support of a high quality social calendar, such as the campus appearance of the celebrated Brothers Four indicated.

Participation and senatorial evaluation of the new Univer-

sity Forum was Carter's next request.

Carter also asked the senators to use the Presidential Cabinet to a maximum in order to obtain good ideas from all sources of student life.

The ASASU president's final request was for the senators to carefully follow and evaluate the University of Mexico exchange program which will attempt to bring the ASU concept of student government to our neighbors toward the south.

Carter expressed "full assurance" that his program would get complete consideration. He closed with a quote on mutual aid from William Morris.

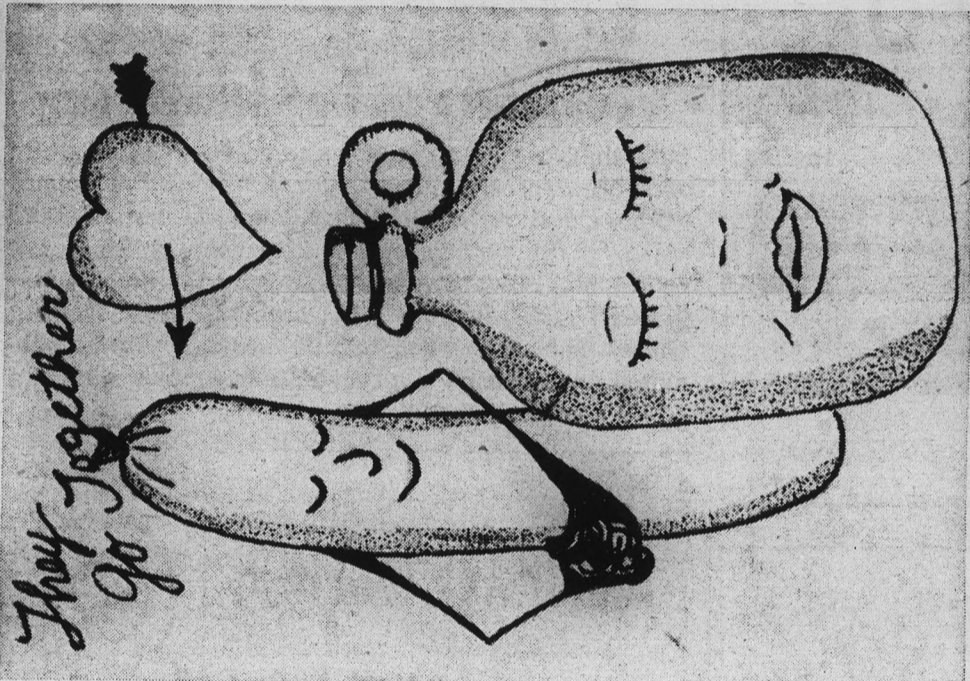
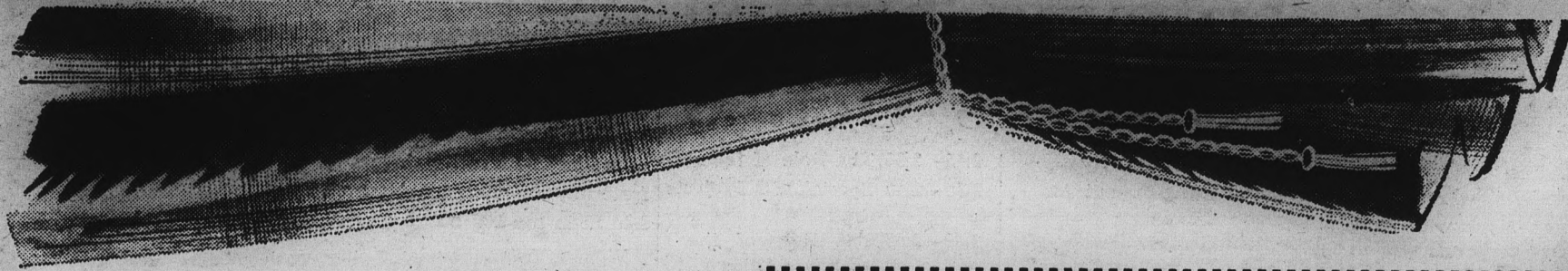



# AWS Self-Rule Lauded

"The women govern themselves at ASU," Bonnie Evans, president of Associated Women Students, said.

"They have decided on their own dormitory hours and regulations within the halls, and enforce these rules. This is done through the work of the general council," she added.

WITHIN EACH ASU dormitory is a hall council composed of elected representatives who govern their halls, handle hall discipline cases and conduct the hall meetings.

"AWS is designed for all women, and the general council's main duty is to govern the wo-

men through hall councils," said Miss Evans.

The AWS general council is composed of the president and one representative from each hall on campus, a representative from women's campus organizations and a representative from Phrateres, the off-campus organization.

"The primary aim of AWS is to help ASU women develop culturally, intellectually and socially," said Miss Evans.

"WE HAVE a definite activity program, and we want to expand it this year to include all ASU women," Miss Evans added.

Last year AWS prepared a questionnaire for ASU women dealing with a cultural program similar to the program sponsored by Palo Verde Hall.

The reaction showed a definite desire for increased cultural programs. "We would like to initiate similar programs in the freshman halls this year," she said.

Associated Women Students has planned several special events for the 1962-63 year.

On Oct. 24 AWS will honor dormitory and fraternity house-mothers at a tea.

The AWS Star Formal will be Nov. 16, and "Mr. Preferred" will be chosen from ASU men.

PROFITS FROM the formal will go to the AWS scholarship fund.

Also planned for this year is the reinstating of the big sister-big brother committee in conjunction with Associated Men Students.

This committee will plan functions for the incoming freshmen students.

Each year AWS begins the semester by sponsoring an assembly for freshmen women.

At this time the new stu-

dents are introduced to the members of AWS and to representatives of the women's campus organizations.

Also, AWS sponsors a council workshop each year for the freshman hall councils.

THE WORKSHOP is designed to help the freshmen plan their hall councils and to explain how the individual hall councils function within the AWS structure.

Council meetings of AWS are on the first and third Monday of every month.

The meetings are open to all ASU women.



# Devils Await WSU; Battle Of Unbeatens

It's a battle of the unbeaten when Arizona State's Sun Devils host Washington State's Cougars in Sun Devil Stadium tomorrow night. Kickoff is set for 8 o'clock and over 30,000 fans will be on hand.

Stadium gates open at 6:30. The Cougars come in fresh off a 21-15 victory over Wyoming, pre-season favorite for Western Athletic Conference honors, and a smashing 49-8 win over ASU's waterloo, San Jose State College.

ARIZONA STATE opened the season two weeks ago with a come-from-behind 21-10 victory over Wichita and last Saturday showed the home folks an awesome display of speed in a 35-0 romp over Colorado State.

"We've got to go all out if we expect to win," said Sun De-

vil head coach Frank Kush. "A victory will add a great deal of prestige to our own ball club and also to the conference. Also the prestige factor will increase on the west coast as WSU potentially could wind up in the Rose Bowl," Kush added.

The greatest collegiate pass receiver of all time, that's what's in store for fans who view the contest. The Cougar's brilliant end, Hugh Campbell, is no stranger to Sun Devil followers.

TWO YEARS ago in ASU's cliff-hanging 24-21 win he started his claim to fame by catching 10 passes and scoring all three WSU touchdowns. The 180-pound end set an NCAA mark for total catches in a season (66) and yards from pass receptions (881).

So far this season he has caught 12 for 175 yards and 3 scores. His three-year yardage mark of 1,769 is another record and his total of 131 receptions ties the all-time best. He's a shoo-in to break the latter.

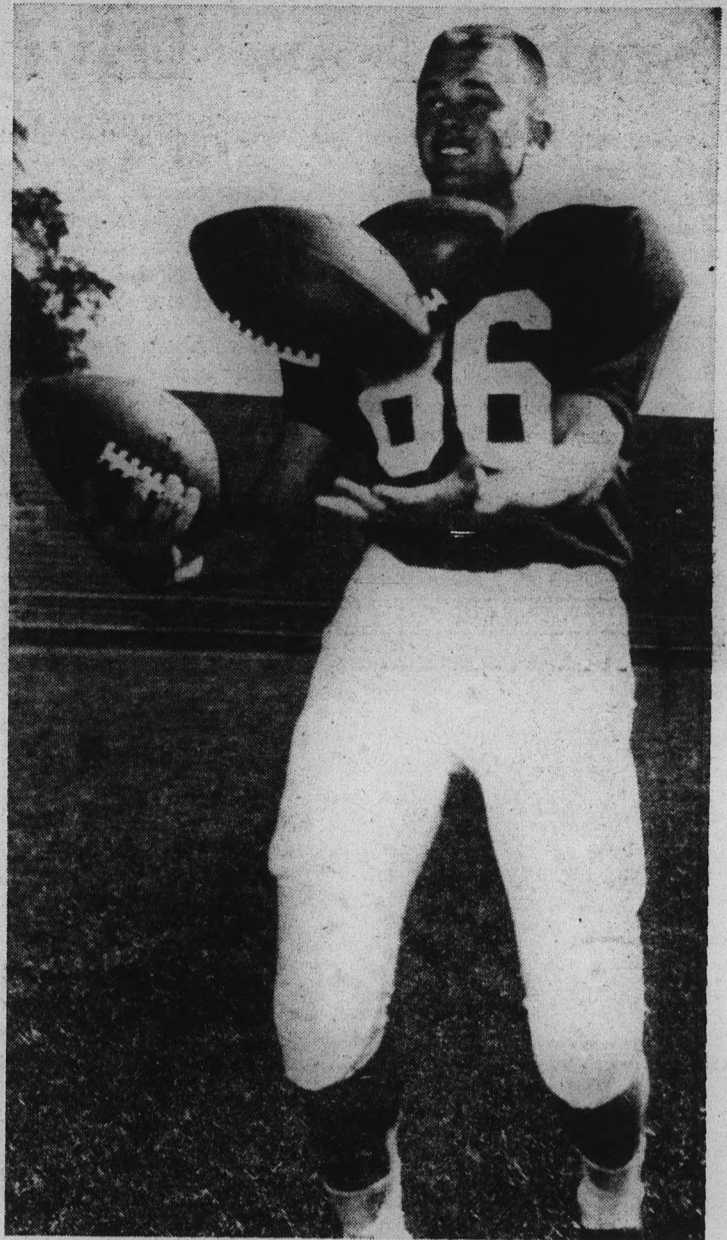
QUARTERBACK DAVE Mathieson is another in a long line of great WSU signal callers. In the Cougars' first two games he's completed 19 of 29 passes for 248 yards and three touchdowns.

"An exceptionally strong defensive line" says Kush. "They're big, strong, experienced and their overall depth could be a physical factor."

The record speaks for itself. The Cougar's defensive unit known as the "Red Raiders" yielded a scant 76 yards rushing and passing against San Jose and Wyoming. Their scoring average of 35 per game tops the Big Six Conference.


ASU's defensive prowess yields little itself. The Sun Devils rank fourth nationally in rushing defense with 46 yards allowed per game.

Kush summed up what could be a key factor to the outcome. "Our inside game is our biggest problem; we'll have to pick up that critical short yardage situation."
