## Phi Kappa Psi Chapter Installation Set Saturday

Phi Kappa Psi Fraternity will be installed this weekend as the 19th ASU national fraternity.

The Arizona Beta chapter of Phi Kappa Psi was colonized at ASU on Sept. 14, 1961 by two university of Washington juniors, Bob Chamberlain and Bob Clampett.

The colony was assisted by Arizona alumni Judge James Smith, G. Richard Siegler, Bob Bohannon, Bill Swanson, Mike McKinney, Jack Cate, Jack Glidewell, Jim Warbasse and Dick Nielson.

INSTALLATION ceremonies will be conducted in the Corral

Room of the Westward Ho in Phoenix tomorrow afternoon, with the installation banquet in the evening.

There will be a reception for the Phi Kappa Psi national officers tonight in the chapter house at 1120 McAllister in Tempe.

PHI PSI national officers attending the ceremonies are Dr. Louis Corson, president; Ralph D. Daniel, executive secretary; Ralph Haney, treasurer; J. Robert Meserve, director of extension, and George Kincaid, traveling secretary.

Jack Glidewell of the Arizona Alumni Association will emcee the program.

ASU president Dr. G. Homer Durham will give the welcoming address.

Dr. Louis Corson, Phi Kappa Psi national president and featured speaker, will present the charter to the two colonizers.

ROBERT C. BOHANNON, of the Arizona Alumni Association, treasurer of National Life Insurance Co. and former Republican state legislator, will bring the final address at the banquet.

Sunday morning a national pledge ceremony for the colony pledges will be conducted at 9 in Danforth Chapel.

## Zache Named New Editor

Bob Zache, senior, was named second semester editor-in-chief of the State Press by the Board of Publications yesterday.

A journalism major, Zache has worked as news editor this semester. He also has been chief proofreader.

Last spring he was awarded the \$1000 Eugene C. Pulliam Sigma Delta Chi Scholarship. Affiliated with Sigma Delta Chi professional journalism society, the new editor works part-time as a proofreader for the Arizona Republic.

His college career was interrupted after his freshman year in 1955 for three years in the Army. His wife, Barbara, graduated from ASU in 1961.

Now a fulltime journalism student, he has a 2.31 accumulative grade index.

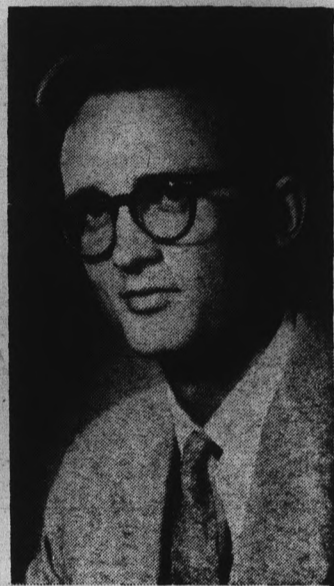
"I don't anticipate any major editorial policy changes," said Zache upon hearing of his appointment. "I hope to maintain the high standards set up by previous staffs."

His immediate concern is assembling a good staff which he considers to be of primary importance.

Several members of the present staff have submitted verbal applications for positions next semester.

Second semester staff positions are now being considered and will be announced shortly after the Christmas vacation, according to Zache.

Zache, born in Miami, was originally a major in mechanical engineering.

Upon his return to ASU in 1960, he switched to history, then journalism.

During his Army hitch, Zache spent two years in Germany after a year's Stateside training. He served as a radio operator in Army security agency.

Zache, 26, intends to continue in journalism, following his undergraduate program with a Master's degree in political science.

He succeeds Linda Warren Sims who did not seek reappointment because of student teaching next semester.

## Cashing System Approval Sought

The Board of Financial Control and the university Business Office are in the "final process" of approving a campus check-cashing system, according to ASASU President Bob Carter.

President Carter is "optimistic" about plans to have the check-cashing office operational in the "foreseeable future." Carter is working toward having the student service ready by next semester.

Tentative plans call for the service to cash student personal checks up to a \$10 maximum, and all ASU student payroll checks, according to Carter.

Final approval of the exact procedure is pending action by the Business Office.

Present plans would locate the service in the university Business Office, MU 207.

The service would be operated by the Business Office during its hours from 8:30 to 4:30 daily and from 8 to 12:30 p.m. Saturdays.

The check-cashing service was one of President Carter's goals outlined in his "State of the University" address at the opening session of the ASASU senate.

The purpose of the service is to save time for students who presently must go off campus to cash a check for more than \$5 or any payroll checks.

### Sportsmen Hear Kennedy Pleas

WASHINGTON — President Kennedy pleaded Wednesday with the Amateur Athletic Union and National Collegiate Athletic Association to quit their bickering so the United States can prepare for the 1964 Olympics in Tokyo.

The President said the "continued bickering is unfair" to U.S. athletes and that the disputing organizations are putting "their own interests above the athletes'."

The two organizations have been disputing for control of amateur athletics in this country.

### Khrushchev Calls Names

MOSCOW — Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev slapped bad names at the United States and Red China in his rambling two-hour policy report this week.

Almost openly accusing Peking of war-mongering, Khrushchev rebuked the Chinese for urging war with the U.S. over Cuba.

## Electron Microscope Aids Life Sciences

A \$25,000 electron microscope capable of nearly one million magnifications has been purchased and installed this week in the Life Sciences building.

Purchase of the EM-100 B was made possible through a grant from the National Institutes of Health, division of general medical sciences.

One of two electron microscopes in the Phoenix area, ASU's unit was purchased from Van Waters and Rogers in Phoenix.

INSTALLED in the basement of the Life Science building, the aluminum-framed microscope is adjacent to a darkroom, equipped for the photographic processes required in use of the instrument.

In the past, men and women who wanted to delve into the secrets of the infinitely small — the structure of cells and the study of viruses and bacteria, for example — were hampered in their work because only light microscopes, capable of 3,000 magnifications were available.

## Appropriations, Bill Debates Fill Senate Program

The ASU student Senate Wednesday passed S.B. 181 appropriating Inter-Collegiate Athletics \$2,314 from the 1961-62 unappropriated budget balance.

In other action during a debate-filled session, the student senators' committee of the whole recommended one bill pass, while stopping two other bills.

Two bills concerning policy for campus charity drives, one to establish a new set of policies and another to repeal present legislation, were debated by practically every senator present.

The committee of the whole recommended to the senate that S.B. 183 to establish a parliamentary procedures training program for senators, "do pass."

S.B. 183, if passed by the senate, would provide a special parliamentary workshop for senators on the Wednesday prior to the first regular senate session in the fall.

The workshop would be organized by the senate Rules committee and senators would be required to attend.

A similar workshop would be held and mandatory for senators at the first senate session after the Spring Leadership Workshop at Payson.

The charity drive bills, 184 and 185, were both introduced by Carole Walker, member of the Student Government Operations committee.

S.B. 184, defining a campus charity drive and placing the authority for all campus charity drives with the executive manager, received amendments before being sent back to Student Government Operations committee to be rewritten.

In other action, the Student Government Operations committee read to the senators a letter from President Bob Carter announcing his appointment of the Freshman Orientation Week Study committee.

## Students Utilize Suggestion Box In ASU Library

The suggestion box at Matthews Library has been in operation for about four weeks. So far, 20 suggestions have been submitted.

Several of the suggestions concerned the heating problem. A breakdown in the central heating system several weeks ago caused too much heat. This situation has now been remedied.

A suggestion to have an outdoor book slot has now been accepted. This will be in use within a few months.

Signed and addressed suggestions will be answered. The suggestion box is located at the main desk in the first floor lobby.

magnifications of 90,000 times. Using photographic enlargements, magnifications may reach nearly one million times.

President Durham said that research projects formerly impossible without such equipment can now be undertaken on the campus.

The instrument will also have value as a teaching tool for both graduate and undergraduate students.

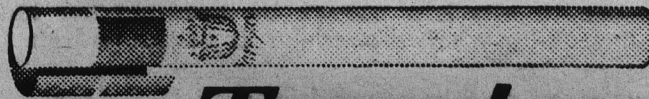

I happened to have arrived at that game in its last fifteen minutes and I did not see my husband bounced to the turf. However, this would not bother me, nor would it bother him.

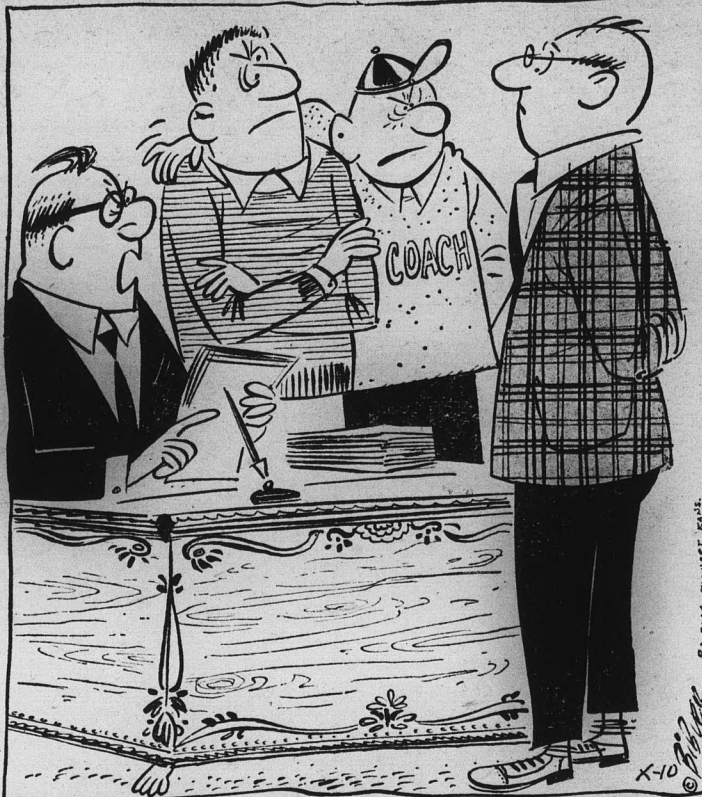

So far, we have heard or seen nothing in support of this project from groups and organizations who usually spend large amounts of their time and energy proclaiming their devotion to this university.

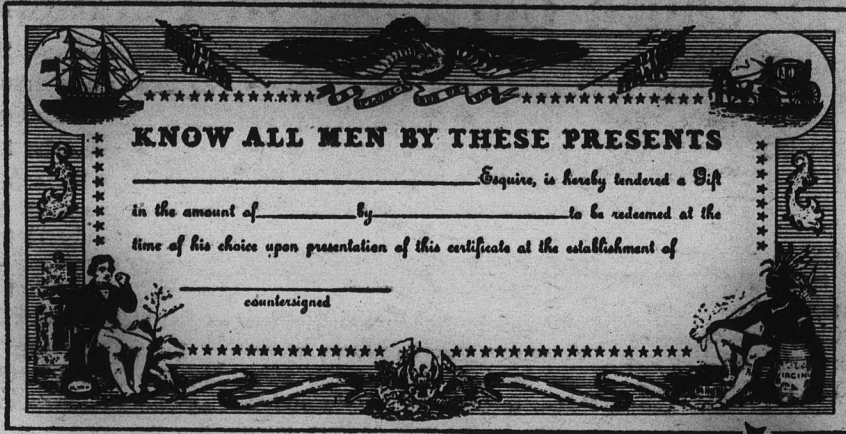
Among them are all the ASU fraternities and sororities, our many service clubs and organizations and many other supposed school boosters.

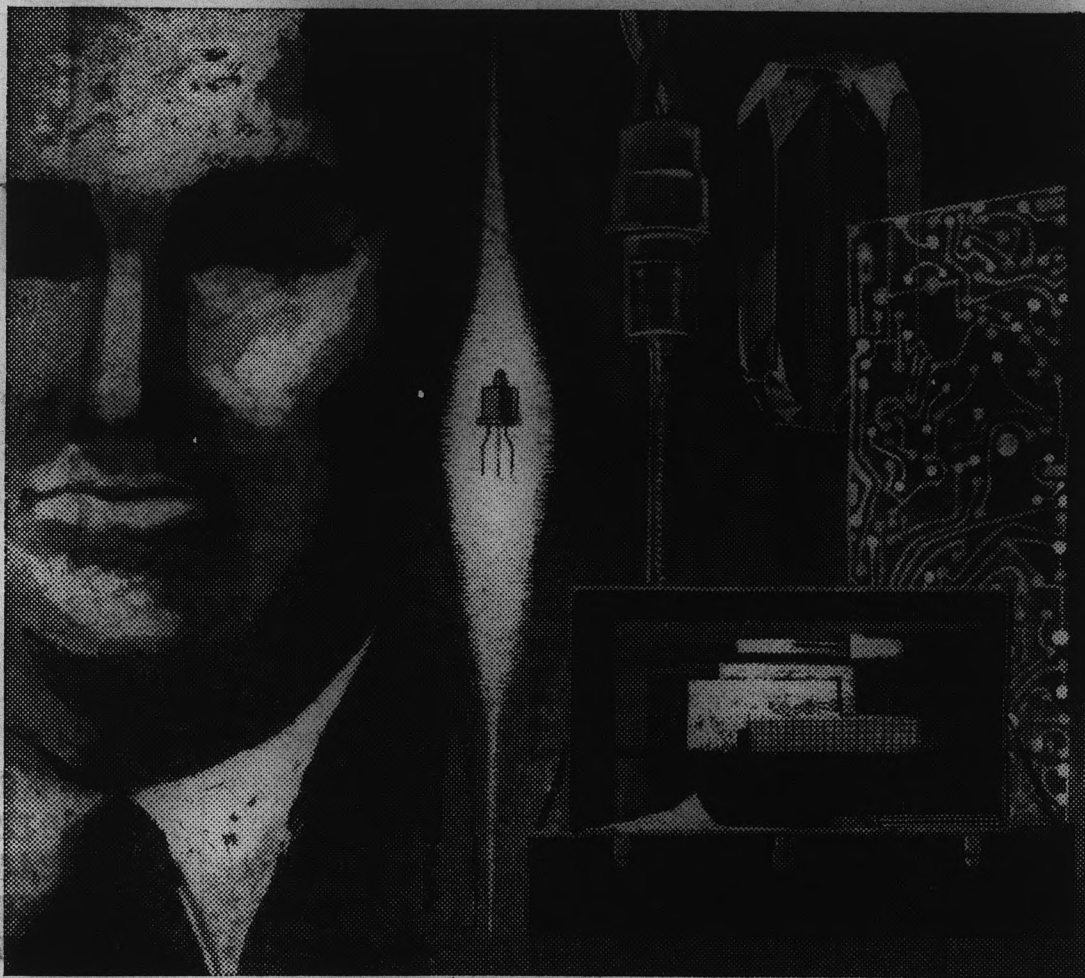

### Dickens Tape Is Scheduled

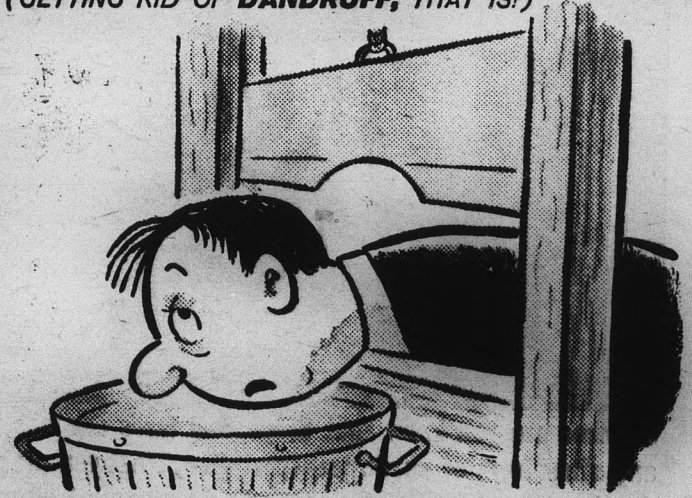

A triumph for contemporary could best describe the outcome of the pops concert presented by the ASU Symphony Orchestra Wednesday in the MU.

Of seven composers represented, five were modern.

When conductor Eugene Lombardi stepped onto the podium, not music, but the squeals of his little daughter, delighted to see her daddy, brought considerable laughter and lessened the formal atmosphere.

**THE PROGRAM** began with the Overture to "Die Meistersinger" by Wagner. This work is difficult for even a top notch orchestra to play. Except for scratchy violins, it came off quite well.

Kaper's atmospheric theme from the movie "Invitation" was well handled by all. The string sound was warm and full.

The grave diggers' delight, Moussorgsky's "A Night on Bald Mountain," was served up in fine style with very effective first desk playing, especially in the closing section.

**A SPECIAL** treat came in the form of the ASU Percussion Ensemble playing the first and third movements of the Chavey "Toccata for Percussion Instruments."

**CONCLUDING** the program was Richard Rogers' "Slaughter on Tenth Avenue" and Leroy Anderson's "Sleigh Ride."

## 'Rivals' Called Unrivaled In Performance

A fine performance of a rather stuffy play, was given Thursday, December 6, at the Lyceum. "The Rivals" by Richard Brinsley Sheridan, is an 18th century drawing-room satire about the trials and tribulations of one Lydia Languish. Miss Languish, played by Carol Willey, flutters from one scene to another with all the charm of the belles of the period. Her hopeful suitors are Captain Absolute (Bill Dawson), a pompous young rogue, and Acres (Clyde Parker), the rather apathetic country bumpkin who tries to muster up

courage to challenge Captain Absolute to a duel.

Mr. Parker's fumbling and mumbling, mixed with a not disagreeable sprinkling of ham, was high spot of the play. Carol Benson and Jim Lindell as Lucy and Faulkland gave good supporting performances.

Michael Byron and Susan Flannery, familiar faces as they are to ASU play-goers, never seem to lose their style and vitality. In the role of Mrs. Malaprop, Susan did indeed have a lot to start with.

Byron as Sir Anthony Absolute, the gout-stricken and salty

old fellow who still has a kick or two left in him, showed his theatrical seasoning, when leaving one scene, he found his door blocked. With complete aplomb he eyed the door, gave the audience a wind and when it finally opened sauntered through — a comic piece that could have been written into the play.

Except for the fast pace set in the first act which hampered the audience in understanding the speech patterns of that period, the overall effect of "The Rivals" was one in which it was hard to say who had more fun, the players or the audience.

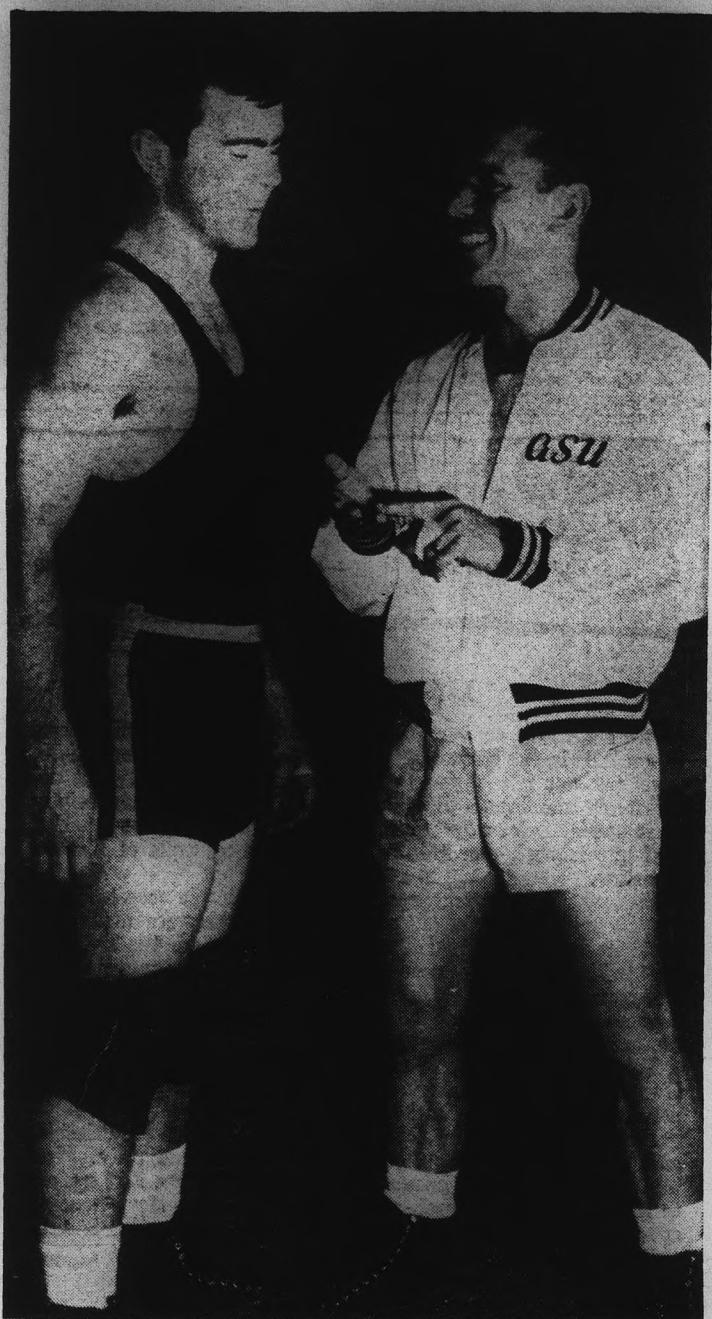

# ASU Tangles With Kansas Tonight

Three games in four days are on tap for the Sun Devil roundballers, starting tonight in Manhattan, Kan.

The contests will mark the first road test for the undefeated ASU squad, owner of three victories.

Tonight, the Devils will tangle with the Kansas Jayhawks in the first game of the Sunflower doubleheader.

To complete the evening, Kansas State will meet the nation's number one team, the Cincinnati Bearcats.

Tomorrow night all four teams move to Lawrence, Kan.,

with the home state teams swapping opponents.

The road trip winds up Monday at Wichita against powerful University of Wichita.

The Devils will hit the road at full strength, with the exception of starting guard Gary Senitza.

Senitza injured his ankle in the game against Pepperdine and is a doubtful starter.

Senior Raul Disarufino has been named as the replacement for Senitza.

Despite the quick three victories, Coach Ned Wulk feels the big tests are yet to come.

"We've still got a long way to go," said Wulk. "We have to

develop more stability. On this road trip we will encounter new obstacles — the wear of travel, different officiating, different gymnasiums, foreign crowds. . ."

However, Wulk is more than pleased with the team's use of the fast break, which he considers the key win factor in the first three outings.

"Our running game is even better than I had hoped, and the weeks of training are starting to pay off," the coach said.

Tonight, the Devils will meet a well-balanced Jayhawk ball club.

In their last outing, a 75-57 win over Wyoming, four men

hit in the double figures.

Paving the way was 6-1 Jim Dumas with 18 points. Nolen Ellison, 6-1, hit 16, Harry Gibson, 6-3, totaled 14, and 6-7 sophomore George Unsel accounted for 13.

In Kansas State, ASU will face one of the tallest collegiate teams in the nation.

Leading the Wildcats is 7-0 Roger Suttner. Playing on either side of this giant are Willie Murrell, 6-6, and Gary Marriott, 6-5.

Kansas State lost to Marquette, 72-71, in the final 10 seconds of its last outing.

The Monday night opponents will have Dave Stallworth, 6-7, and Wayne Durham, 6-7, in the forward slots.

Filling in at center will be 6-10 Nate Bowman.

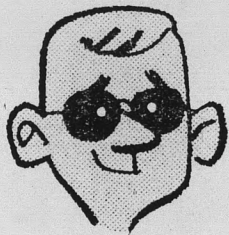

Both men also are accounting for 34 per cent of the ASU rebounds per game.

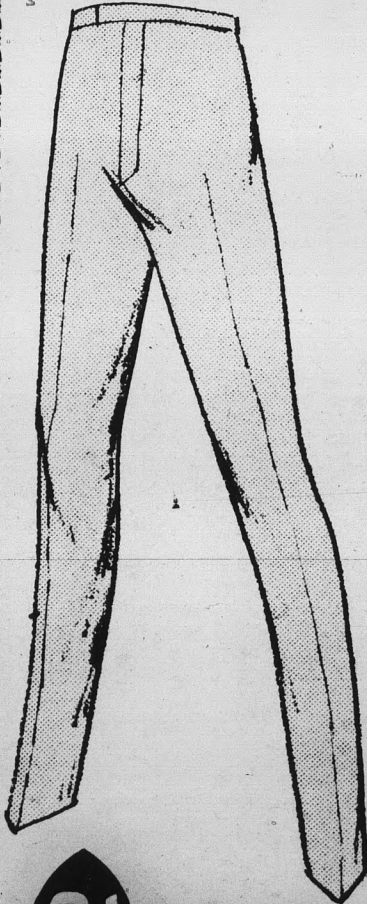

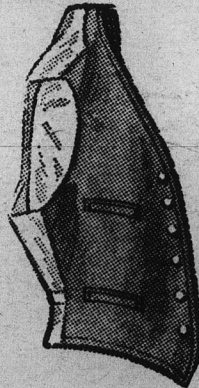
