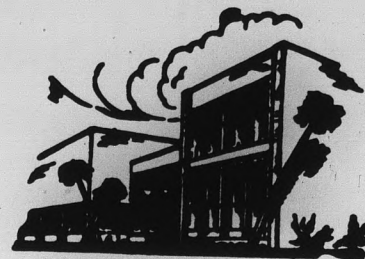

Celebrity Arts Brighten Paths

Twist art, politics, music, comedy and international views into a five week span. The result is the production of six evenings of entertainment free to ASU summer students.

Guests appearing in the summer celebrity arts series are the ASU Faculty Chamber Music Society, director-producer Anthony Roland, the popular Meredith Willson, publisher Robert Luce, world traveler Dorothy Burton and former Vietnamese Ambassador Dr. Tran Van Chuong.

Music in Grady Gammage Auditorium will open the series at 8:30 p.m. June 16. A varied program will be performed by the ASU Faculty Chamber Music Society under the direction of Edwin Putnik.

Frenchman Anthony Roland will discuss at 2 p.m. June 18 in the MU Ballroom his interpretive screenings of artists Degas, William Turner, Delacroix, Henry Moore and Rembrandt. Roland uses documentary films to compliment his commentary on the understanding of the "essential character of an artist's work."

An open reception in the MU Upper Lounge will afford students the opportunity to meet Roland on a casual basis.

Spotlights at Gammage Auditorium will brighten June 22 for "An Evening with Meredith Willson."

The "Music Man" will spark a refreshing program of music and comedy. Willson's talent and charm have captivated countless audiences.

Publisher of The New Republic, Robert E. Luce, will

lecture in the MU Ballroom at 8 p.m. June 29. With his typical penetrating comments, Luce will appraise President Johnson's image of a better society in his timely lecture "Will 'The Great Society' Work?"

An illustrated lecture entitled "Portrait of Southeast Asia" will be presented by Dorothy Burton, world traveler, author and musician at 8 p.m. July 6 in the MU Ballroom.

A thought-provoking discussion, "What Next in Viet Nam?" will be heard at 8 p.m. July 13 in the MU Ballroom. Commentator will be Dr. Tran Van Chuong, Viet Nam Ambassador to the United States until he resigned in 1963 in protest of the Diem regime policies. A capacity crowd listened last year on campus as the statesman expressed his views pointedly.

Casual receptions in the MU Upper Arts Lounge will follow each of the three lectures.

Summer students will be admitted free of charge to all six performances by showing registration receipts.

Dash To Lecture Lunches

Three lecture luncheons in the MU Pagoda Room will feature ASU Professors. Reservations should be made at least one day in advance at the MU information desk for the \$1.25 buffet luncheon.

Following the June 24 luncheon, Dr. Zimmerman of the English department will ex-

pound on his travels and findings in Greece.

On July 1, Dr. Henry Bruinsma will describe the development of the ASU College of Fine Arts as a reflection of fine arts throughout the country.

Dr. V. Faust will explain at the July 8 luncheon new methods in training elementary school teachers in counseling.

Guided Tours Break Afternoon Monotony

To vary your summer footsteps, the MU has arranged for guided tours to points of interest on campus and around the Valley of the Sun.

The doors of Grady Gammage Auditorium will open from 2 to 4 p.m. every Wednesday and Sunday for the inspection of the spectacle that has gained national attention. No reservations are necessary.

Students will meet at the MU at 3 p.m. June 23 when they will be conducted to the ASU Planetarium. Associate professor of Science Dr. Francis Yale will explain, discuss and point out interesting details of the planetarium. Reservations should be made at least one day in advance at the MU information desk.

One of the two trips to the Taliesin West is a must this summer session. On June 30 and July 7, buses will leave the MU at 2:30 p.m. to tour the late Frank Lloyd Wright's desert school of architecture. Reservations may be made at the MU information desk for 75 cents which includes the bus and tour.

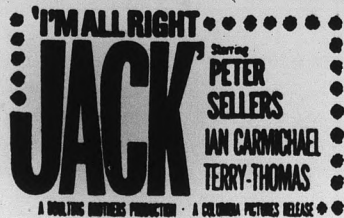

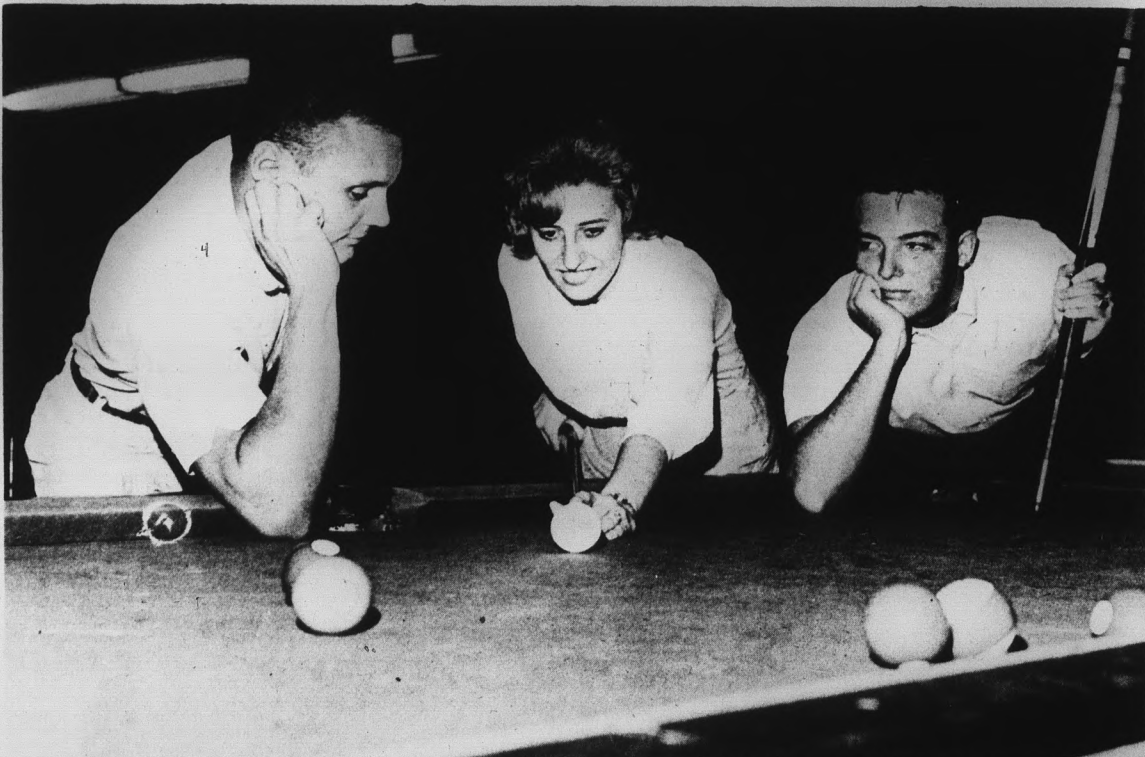
MU Samaritan Aids

MU Offers Afternoon Card Class

Camp card sharks beware!

Every Tuesday and Thursday from 2 p.m. to 3.30 p.m., a series of eight contract bridge lessons will be taught in MU 209-210 by Captain Ericson Lewis.

A \$6 fee includes a special instruction booklet.

Completion of the course does not assure the student that he will become a full-fledged card shark. However, past summer bridge classes have proven that much skill can be developed. And, fun is unlimited.

Captain Lewis uses considerable individual instruction, both oral and visual. He teaches the Charles Goren system of contract bridge.

Instruction covers beginning and intermediate bidding and basic elements of the card plays as dealers and defenders.

The principles of duplicate bridge will also be explained.

Classes will be one half instruction and review followed by supervised play. They will be on June 17, 22, 24, 29 and July 1, 6, 8 and 13.

Students may register at the MU Information Desk for the eight lesson series.
