'Boy Friend' Curtain Time Nears; Musical Spoofs Roaring Twenties

"The Boy Friend," a rollicking, hokum musical comedy satirizing the Roaring Twenties, will begin a three-night run at Grady Gammage Auditorium on Friday, July 14.

Complete with flappers, raccoon coats and lilting strains of the Charleston, the play will be staged by the University Players and the Lyric Opera Theatre.

"The Boy Friend," a musical spoof by Sandy Wilson, was the show that launched Julie Andrews on her successful career. It was first performed in London in 1953, and opened a year later at the Royale Theatre in New York.

The local performances will be directed by Dr. James Yeater, with Kenneth Seipp as musical director. Choreography will be by Santa Giglio, scene design by Douglas Scott-Gohsen, and costumes by Hazel Burnett.

Julie Gibson, of Flagstaff, has been cast as Polly, the role made famous by Miss Andrews. Tom Burns, of Tempe, will play Tony, the title role, originally performed by John Hower.

The first act takes place in an English girls' boarding school. Polly and her roommates are discussing the upcoming Carnival Ball — the year's biggest social event. Polly is the only girl without a date.

A delivery boy from a costume house, Tony, delivers a message to the boarding house and Polly falls in love with him. However, because of the apparent difference in their social standings, Polly and Tony realize they can never be seen together socially. Polly decides to rectify matters by telling Tony she is actually just a chambermaid at the school. This doesn't help the situation, though, because Tony is really the run-

away son of a prominent family.

The remainder of the comedy is devoted to unscrambling the deceptions and bringing everyone happily together for a traditional melodramatic finale. The musical score includes such tunes as "Charleston," "The Riviera," "I Could Be Happy With You" and "It's Never Too Late to Fall in Love."

The show will be presented at 8:30 p.m. July 14 and 15, and at 7:30 p.m. July 16.

Other members of the cast include Berry Burton, Scottsdale, Mme. Dubonnet; Tomm Fox, Mesa, plays Percy; Mike Traw, Phoenix, and Freya Benes, Tempe, play Lord and Lady Brockhurst.

Linda Burke, Tempe, is Nancy; Barbara Gephart, Phoenix, is Dulcie; Claire McCoy, Tempe, is Fay; Gloria Whiting, Tempe, is Maisie, and Alan Grier, Scottsdale, is Bobby.

Others include Larry John, Mesa, as Alphonse; Susan Mecham, Tempe, as Hortense; Steve Rosenberg, Scottsdale, as Marcel; Phil Trapani, Phoenix, as Pierre; John Fondrisi and Bill Price, both Phoenix, as the Gendarmes.

A special day-long bus tour to the University Arts Center in Payson, will leave the front of the MU Saturday morning at 8. The reservations have all been taken, according to Mike Byron, MU program director.

Another tour slated for next week will be to see the famous architecture school at Taliesin West, home and workshop of the late Frank Lloyd Wright. The trip will leave the MU at 2:30 on Tuesday afternoon.

Religious Courses Offer Free Credit

Summer students may take certain courses in religion at no cost and still get University credit for their efforts.

The courses are being offered by the School of Religion, an organization somewhat separate from the University, being sponsored and financed by religious denominations throughout the Religious Conference.

In May of 1966, the University adopted a new policy statement formalizing the acceptance of Religious Conference courses as general education electives.

The courses are taught on a non-doctrinal basis, at a University academic level and by instructors with teaching qualifications equal to university standards. The instructors are local theologians such as Rev. Thomas Walsh and Rabbi Albert Plotkin.

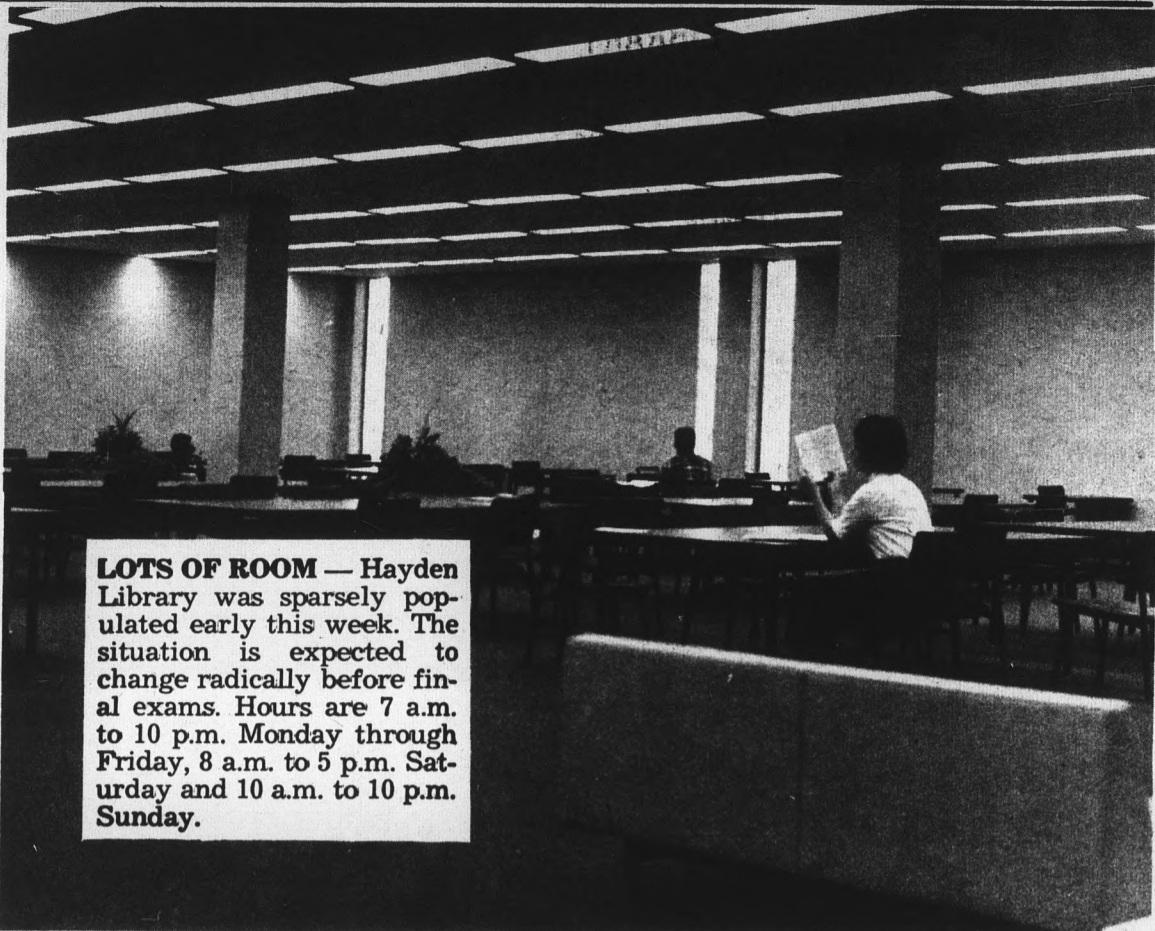
Second summer session courses being offered are Survey of the Old Testament and World Religions. Each class meets daily and is worth three hours credit. No grade for the course is registered with the University but the credits are automatically transferred to the University records office at the end of each semester.

Registration for the courses is conducted at the Office of Religious Affairs, apart from the University registration but following the same procedures.

Sign up will take place during the regular second session registration time.

Classes in the Survey of the Old Testament will be held from 7:40 to 9:10 a.m. daily and World Religions from 11 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. Both courses will be held in LL 305.

During the first session, courses were offered in Life and Teachings of Jesus and Thought Projections of Jesus.

Molecule Builders, Rat Keepers...

Students Get Unique Jobs

Lifeguards, geology field workers, rat keepers, teaching assistants and gardeners have something in common with one another at Arizona State.

These positions can all be found for students under the work-study program administered through the financial aids office in the administration building. Mrs. Kay Smith, work-study secretary, reports that between 500 and 600 students a month are employed on either a part-time or a full-time basis through this office.

Salaries for the working students range from \$1.25 to \$3.50 an hour, although most positions fall into the \$1.25-\$1.50 bracket. At the present time, the work-study program, administered under the Economic Opportunity Act of 1965, has filled most summer jobs, but many new positions will be created this fall. Students wishing to join the pro-

gram can fill out an application giving their financial status, the basis for awarding jobs, and then submit to an interview to determine financial need.

Generally, students with an income of less than \$3,000 a year qualify, but extenuating

circumstances will be considered.

One coed "made molecules," last semester on her work-study job. She constructed the model molecules for display in the chemistry department and paid for her meal tickets with the money she earned.

Other interesting jobs that crop up from time-to-time, according to Mrs. Smith, include caring for pigeons, running psychological experiments, laboratory technical work and counseling Indian children.

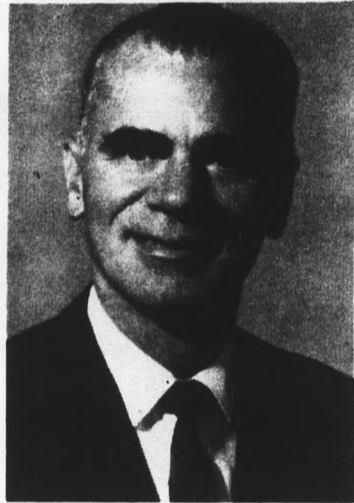
Dorothy Price, senior in business administration says, "It's hard to find a job at the hours you would like, but through work-study you can find a job to suit your schedule."

Although some of the students would like to be paid more, most of the work-study students interviewed find their jobs fill a definite need to help them through school.

VA Psychologist Named Director For Counseling

Dr. Stephen Kimler, a counseling-clinical psychologist at the Veterans' Administration Hospital in Phoenix, has been appointed the new director of student counseling service at the University.

The appointment, which becomes effective Aug. 1, was announced by University President G. Homer Durham.

Kimler will succeed Dr. Robert Heimann, professor of education, who served as acting director in establishing the service the past year. Heimann will return to full-time service director of counselor training.

Coordinated with the student health center, deans' offices, and other student services, the counseling program is responsible to the Dean of Students. The service consists of ten professional counselors and interns.

Before joining the VA Hospital staff in Phoenix in 1963, Kimler was a post-doctoral clinical psychology intern at the VA Hospital in Palo Alto, Calif.
