## Spirit Song Needed

### Present Tunes Said Lacking

The University needs a fight song that raises spirit and "tugs at the heart-strings," President Durham told cheerleaders during a visit to a practice session this week.

"This is the only university I have ever been associated with that had no rousing song that its students and alumni could sing," he said.

Citing "On Wisconsin" and "Ten Thousand Fighting Men" as examples, Dr. Durham declared, "When Notre Dame rings out with its 'Boola Boola,' it brings tears to its alumni."

"BEAR DOWN Arizona," the UofA fight song, "imitates battle charges used in the military for centuries," while varying from the sub-dominant to the dominant note on the scale, he said.

"I have seen games where

that song was played over and over, and they beat ASU teams better than the UofA team," Dr. Durham said.

He feels ASU students miss a "wonderful part of college life" because they have no inspiring campus anthem.

Few students or alumni even know the words to "Maroon and Gold," the University fight song, let alone are able to sing them, Dr. Durham said.

THREE YEARS ago Dr. Durham appealed to the cheerleaders and pom pon girls to lead the students in learning the fight song and alma mater. "I'm trying again," he said.

In an attempt to get the words to both songs printed in the football and basketball programs, he has appealed to Vice President for Special Services Joseph Schabacker.

Dr. Durham, son of a music-

ian, wrote a song for the University three years ago. This year William Hill, band director, has had the band play it for every game. "It could use some better words than mine though," Dr. Durham said.

"We need to encourage students and faculty to write a good fight song around here," he said, but indicated that the present songs should be retained for tradition.

## Professor Defends Liberal, Professional Education Mix

Linking some of the basic problems facing the world today with the responsibilities of our educational system, Dr. H.

C. Perkins, professor of engineering at the UofA, defended the balanced university in a speech before the University Forum Tuesday night.

Speaking on "Professional Education vs. the Liberal Arts," Dr. Perkins touched upon facts of a long-standing debate among academicians:

SHOULD THE university be a sanctuary for the undisturbed pursuit of "liberal" knowledge or should it be involved in practical research and technical training of professionals?

Dr. Perkins traced this controversy of professional versus

liberal education from its origins rooted in the 19th century and the early development of the modern university.

He then pointed out how this question is of increased significance today. He said that the problem of providing enough energy in the world is one encompassing many others, including the feeding and education of a growing population.

Dr. Perkins concluded that the universities should be able to maintain their capacity for meeting technical problems without failing in their role as protectors of the liberal arts.

## Bombs Unite Vietnamese Against the U.S.-Neilands

"The Vietnamese people look at Ho Chi Minh as the George Washington of Vietnam," said Dr. J. B. Neilands, bio-chemis-

try professor at Berkeley yesterday.

Prof. Neilands, who visited Vietnam as an investigator for the war crimes tribunal, told a

sparse crowd of students and faculty that the "systematic, scientific, bombing of Vietnamese hamlets is uniting that country against the United States."

PROF. NEILANDS prefaced his talk by justifying the work of the war tribunal. He noted that the formal condemnation of war atrocities is not unprecedented.

He cited the Hague Convention, the Paris Pact of 1928 and the Nuremberg Judgments as previous attempts to adjudicate war crimes.

Anti-personnel bombs are most frequently used by the U.S., said Neilands. Napalm is the "United States' favorite bomb in South Vietnam," he said.

Displaying another anti-personnel bomb, called the pineapple because it looks like one, Prof. Neilands explained how a plane carrying 400 pineapples could explode up to one million steel pellets and ram them down on the "churches, schools, hospitals, and dikes."

Prof. Neilands hopes the war tribunal's published account of the United States' bombing practices will affect President Johnson's Vietnam policy.

Prof. Neilands also advocated punishment for the instigators of U.S. bombing tactics. "For President Johnson, I recommend ejection from political office as soon as possible."

## Student Leaders Organize To Voice Views to Regents

ASASU officials and student government leaders at the UofA and NAU have formed an organization for cooperative effort in issues under consideration by the state Board of Regents.

The new group, Associated Students of Arizona Universities, was formed Saturday in Tucson to act as spokesman for the three student bodies on issues such as compulsory ROTC training.

"It is the unified feeling of the students of the three campuses that a voluntary ROTC proposal be considered," a letter from the group to Gov. Jack Williams and each of the regents said.

About 40 student government representatives, including student body presidents and vice presidents, attended the organizational meeting at the UofA.

## Dr. Durham Elected To National Council

President G. Homer Durham has been elected to the executive committee of the National Association of State Universities and Land-Grant Colleges.

Dr. Durham will serve a two-year term on the governing board of the nation's oldest university organization, comprised of 99 major state universities and land-grant institutions located in all 50 states and Puerto Rico.

Dr. Durham, who recently

president as chairman of the association's Council of Presidents during the group's 81st annual meeting in Columbus, Ohio, has been succeeded in that post by President Mason W. Gross of Rutgers University.

The fund will be used to assist students enrolled in the law college.

Receiving his bachelor of laws degree from the University of Illinois in 1929, Mr. Byrne practiced law in Illinois and served as the Ottawa city attorney until 1940. At that time he moved to Prescott where he was county attorney in the early 1940s

and later became a partner with his brother, T. J. Byrne, in the law firm of Byrne and Byrne.

Upon the death of his brother in 1956, Palmer Byrne maintained his Prescott office and former the partnership of Byrne and Cline with Barry B. Cline.

## Indians Here for Workshop -

# 50 Will Study News

ASU will host more than 50 representatives of American Indian tribes at the second Southwestern Indian Journalism Workshop today through Saturday.

Most of the trainees are on tribal newsletter staffs in Arizona, Colorado, California and New Mexico.

SPONSORED BY the Indian Community Action Project (ICAP) and the University Department of Mass Communications, the workshop is financed by a grant from the Office of Economic Opportunity.

"Because of the tremend-

ous success of the nation's first such workshop here last January, we decided to continue the project," said Marshall Tome, ICAP communications specialist.

Fundamentals in writing, editing and production of the newsletters will be stressed in the three-day workshop, said Dr. Joe W. Milner, program coordinator and associate professor of mass communications.

THE PROGRAM will begin with registration in Old Main at 8:30 Thursday morning and a welcome address by Dr. Robert Ashe, project director.

Prof. Donald E. Brown, chairman of the mass communications department, and Robert Lance, assistant professor and State Press faculty adviser, will join Milner and Tome in conducting the sessions.

Bert Fireman, curator of the Arizona Collection at the Uni-

versity library, will address workshopers at a Thursday night banquet at the Sands of Phoenix. Coverage of the speech will be one of the laboratory assignments.

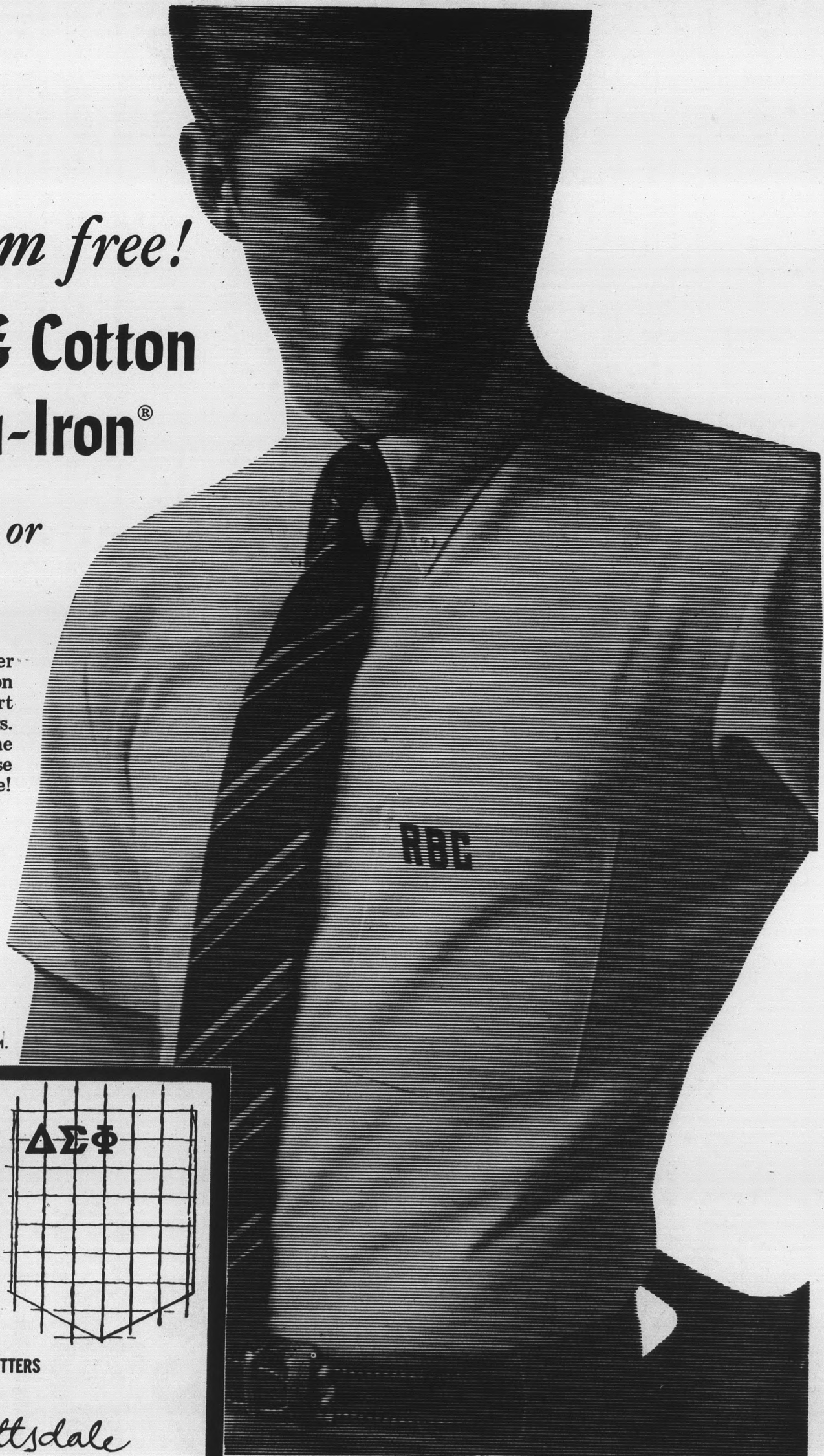

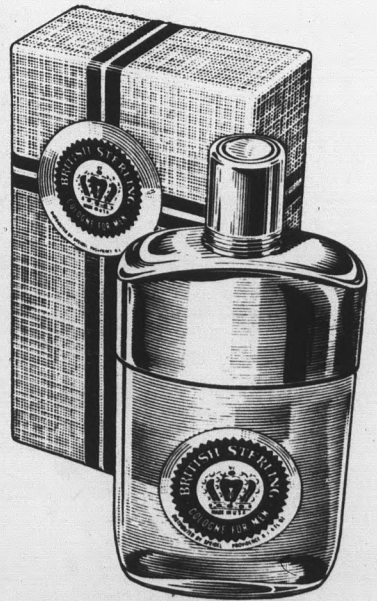
