

'We Can Win Them All' — Winkles

Champion Sun Devils Face UCLA in Opener

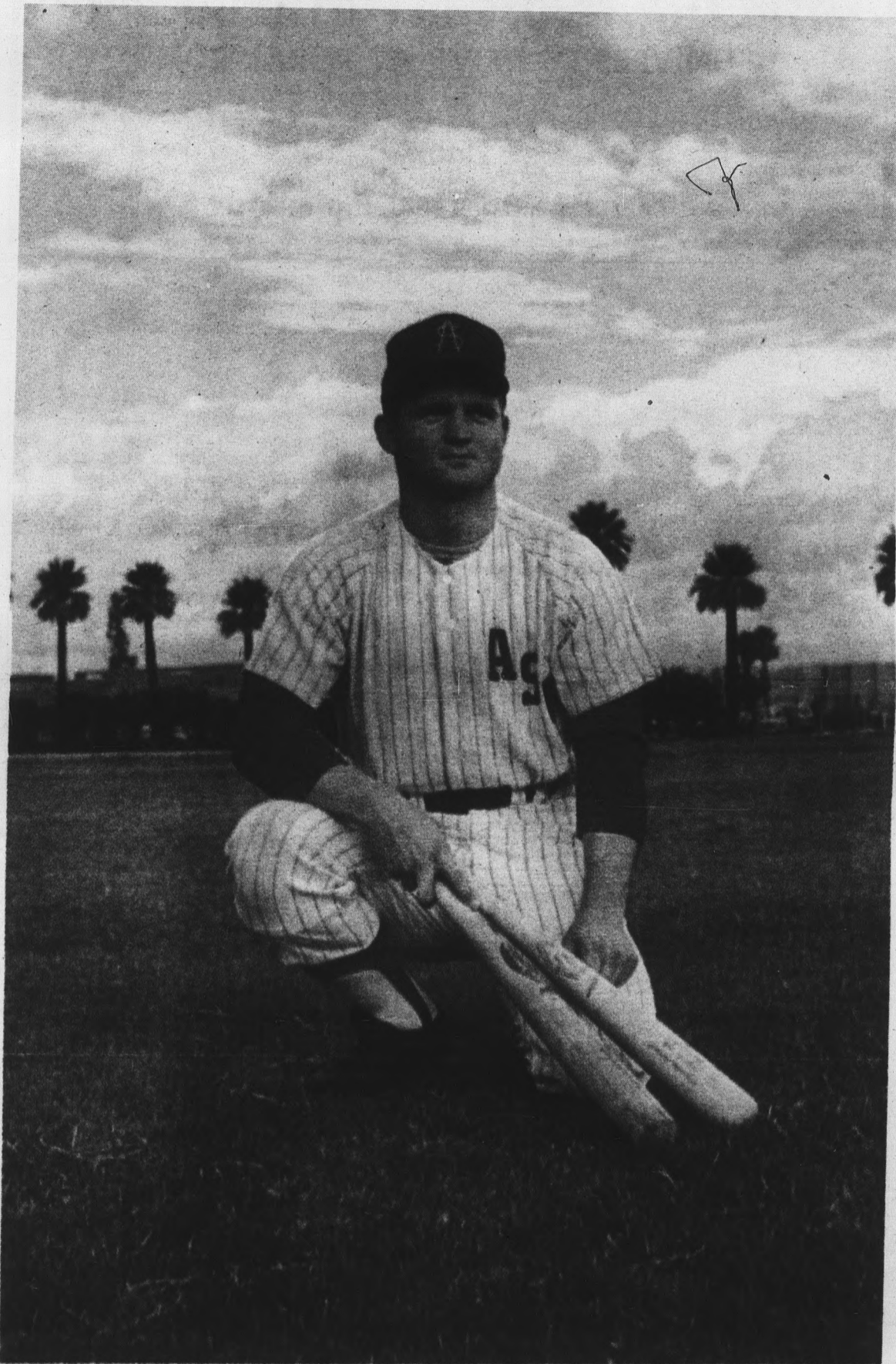

Baseball.

"A sphere weighing not less than five nor more than 5¼ ounces avordupois and measuring not less than nine or more than 9¼ inches in circumference. It shall be formed by yarn wound around a small core of rubber, cork or combination of both and covered by two pieces of white horsehide tightly stitched together," according to the NCAA Baseball Rulebook.

ASU Baseball.

"The brand of the game of baseball played by members of the Sun Devil baseball team, coached by one Bobby Winkles. This brand is characterized by hustle, speed and heads up play; usually ranks very high among college and university brands; and in fact was the number one brand in two of the past three years. Attainment of this number one position was, in fact, due to the efforts of Coach Winkles, a tobacco chewing mentoring veteran who has no qualms about winning large numbers of baseball games.

ON FRIDAY night, Coach Winkles and his Sun Devil baseball team will formally set out to win every game they play this season. The opener against UCLA at 7:30 p.m. in Phoenix Municipal Stadium, is the first of a three-game series with the Bruins.

Sun Devil football and basketball coaches find it better to be openly pessimistic at the beginning of each season, but Coach Winkles finds it better to be optimistic. "We'll start out by thinking we're going to win 57 games and lose none," he said.

His optimism is matched only by his appraisal of his team's capabilities. "We've got to do what we're capable of, then do 25 per cent more, and then we'll win games," he said.

IN THE past, Winkles has showed his reluctance to work down from his preseason perfect-record goal. He has never lost more than 18 games in one season (in 1959 and 1962, out of 45 played) and his best season came in 1965 when the Sun Devils won 54 and lost 8 in a drive to their first NCAA Baseball Championship. Winkles had a comparatively slow season in 1966, losing 11 out of 52, and missing a chance to again compete for the national championship.

He came back last year with a 53-12 record, and took the national championship honors for the second time. Winkles' overall record at ASU (348-113 for a .779 average) has impressed professional baseball officials enough to have offered him several pro contracts.

WHICH brings to mind the question of this season.

Biggest loss: Five key players left the Devils last season. Pitchers Gary Gentry (17-1) and Tom Burgess (16-3), bulwark of the best collegiate pitching staff in 1967, signed professional contracts, leaving Winkles with gaping holes to fill on the mound. Infielder Jack Lind, key to the Sun Devil close-quarter defenses, is also gone, as are outfielders Ralph Carpenter and Scott Reid. Reid, along with Gentry, made first team All-America last year.

Winkles will turn this season to sophomores and transfers to fill gaps, an alternative with which he has been faced for several years and also a spot where his recruiting department has consistently come through. "We get the good ballplayers because the pro scouts believe that ASU is the best school to go to learn how to play baseball," he said.

Threesome to Fill Holes in Outfield

Score on the 1968 Sun Devil outfield: have one, lost two.

The 'one' is junior Larry Linville, the only returnee who was a regular on last season's team.

THE 'TWO' are slugger Ralph Carpenter and All-America Scott Reid, who both signed pro contracts last summer after heavily contributing, both defensively and offensively, to the Sun Devil NCAA championship drive. Both were regulars on last year's squad and committed a total of only five errors. Their loss will hamper the Sun Devil both defensively and offensively.

This season's Devil hopes are riding on a trio of sophomores, J. D. Hill, Paul Ray Powell and John Dolinsek.

In practice session, Hill and Powell, who played football last season and Dolinsek, who played frosh last spring, were rated "best lookin' prospects among the newies" by Coach Bobby Winkles. Hill is fast, with sure hands, but is questionable in the hitting department. Powell, another speedster, is showing

great offensive potential. Dolinsek was injured while on the frosh squad and sidelined most of the season and last summer, but is healthy now and adding power to the lineup.

Linville batted .264 last season and stole nine bases. He is expected to start in the opener Friday night against UCLA.

Winkles sized up the outfield this year as being defensively as good as or better than last year's squad. They are definitely weaker offensively, he said. "Our perennial problem with hitting is that we never find out how good we are until after we have played several games," Winkles added.

Devil Ball Champs Plan to Keep Title

Last year at this time, the Sun Devil baseball team consisted of untried sophomores and juniors with a supposedly weak pitching squad.

Three months later they were on top of the collegiate baseball world — with the second national championship for Arizona State in three years and the best pitching staff in the country.

They hustled their way through a tough schedule that included such teams as Stanford, Oklahoma and UCLA. Then the "Cardiac Kids" survived a 15-inning marathon against arch-rival University of Arizona, winning the Southwest division title, 3-2.

In the College World Series, the scrappy Devils knocked off top-ranked Stanford twice. The last game was a 14-inning duel that captured the imaginations of fans across the country. A victory over Houston in the finale garnered the crown for the Devils.

This year the situation is similar — an untried pitching corps and a bunch of youngsters. But the youngsters are champions of the national collegiate baseball world. And they intend to stay that way.

Rusk Attendance Uncertain At Foreign Policy Meeting

Secretary of State Dean Rusk may appear here Saturday at a day-long State Department conference.

James B. Creasman, director of University relations, said that Department spokesmen have told him Rusk's appearance is not certain.

HE SAID THAT a flexibly-planned schedule for the conference would provide for either contingency.

Thick packets of background material will be given to all participants during the 8:30-9:30 a.m. registration period, he said.

After a welcoming by University vice president Karl Dannenfeldt and introductions by moderator Dixon Donnelly, assistant secretary of state for foreign affairs, special assistant Winthrop Gilman Brown will speak on East Asian policy at 9:45.

IF RUSK decides to speak at the conference,

Creasman said, it is likely that he would speak in this or another early time period so he could leave as soon as possible.

Walter J. Stoessel Jr., deputy assistant secretary of state for foreign affairs, will speak on U. S. relations with Eastern Europe at 11:00, with assistant administrator for the Agency for International Development (AID) Herbert Salzman discussing the value of foreign aid programs at 11:45.

The conference will adjourn for a barbeque lunch in the MU cafeteria from 12:45 to 2:15 p.m.

Charles Robert Burrows, director of the Office of Central American Affairs, will deliver a speech on Latin American policy at 2:15. A panel of State Department officials take part in a panel discussion at 3:30, followed by closing remarks from Dean George Peek of the College of Liberal Arts.

Pickets Plan Protest of Conference

If Dean Rusk appears on campus Saturday, he may be greeted by 200 pickets.

Penny Jacobs, publicity chairman for the projected protest, said that it will draw antiwar

protestors from Tucson as well as the local area.

The pickets will arrive at the beginning of the day-long State Department conference at 8:30, she said.

The protest is sponsored by the campus chapter of the Committee to End the War in Vietnam and the High School Mobilization Committee.

Press Panel to Probe Vietnam War Coverage

Criticism of American press coverage of the Vietnam war will be solicited at a noon MU luncheon today from a panel made up of journalists, an Asian expert, a philosopher and a military man.

"The Press in Vietnam: Is it Doing its Job?" is the controversial question to be put to the panel.

Panelists are Don Deder, an Arizona Republic columnist who has worked in Vietnam as a reporter; Dr. Yung-hwan Jo, professor of political science and an Asian authority; Dr. Donald W. Gieschen, professor of philosophy; Lt. Col. Charles W. Newton, veteran public information officer in Vietnam and present head of the freshman ROTC program; and Roger R. Morris, mass communications instructor who will serve as moderator.

The panel discussion will immediately follow a noon luncheon in MU 218A. Cost to students and faculty is \$1, but students holding meal tickets may obtain 75 cents credit with transfer meal tickets available from the managers of their respective dining halls.

Sigma Delta Chi, professional journalism society is sponsoring the luncheon.

A movie on Brazil, and another on Kenya will be shown in HEC 102 at 2:30 p.m. Friday.

Non-competitive language aptitude tests will be given by Peace Corps representatives today, tomorrow and Friday at 10 a.m. and 2 p.m., on the 5th floor of the Library, room 406. The tests are scheduled Saturday each hour from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. The test takes approximately half an hour.

Wheelbarrows are being rolled away and workmen are adding final touches to the building to be dedicated to Armstrong, known as the "legislative father of ASU."

Arizona Chief Justice Ernest W. McFarland will introduce Warren and an academic procession will follow from Gammage Auditorium.

A symbolic acceptance of the building will be made and a portrait of John S. Armstrong I, legislative father of Arizona State University, will be presented.

KAET-TV, Channel 8, will broadcast live the dedication of the new law building, John S. Armstrong Hall, beginning at 10 a.m.

The program will include a dedication address by Chief Justice Earl Warren at Grady Gammage Auditorium.

An academic procession, made up of about 100 people, will proceed to the symbolic acceptance of the new building, located at the corner of Orange St. and McAllister Ave.





Mitey Man Coaches Mighty Men

It's not often that the coach is the smallest man on the team, but that's the way it seems with Coach Ted Bredehoft and his Sun Devil wrestling squad. Anything the 5'3", 134-lb. mentor lacks in physical size is made up in spirit and determination.

From his start here five years ago, Bredehoft has coached teams to high positions among national collegiate wrestling powers, his squads having placed in the top eight in the nation during two of the past three years.



His wrestlers practice about ten hours each week. Bredehoft doesn't put them on any specific training program, feeling that by now they know what they can and can't do, and that they eat in order to remain in good condition. "Besides, we're out to wrestle, so we wrestle," he said.

What does it take to be a wrestler?

To Bredehoft, a knowledge of basic fundamentals and techniques ranks near the top of his list. Most people think strength is, he said, but actually it ranks about fourth.

Bredehoft feels possession of the three D's — desire, determination and dedication — ranks far above practical qualifications. "A person must have these qualities before we can even think

about letting him into our wrestling program," he said.

Bredehoft indulges in an extensive recruiting program, obtaining outstanding wrestlers from all over the country. Scholarships are given, he said, although there are never enough. He has been grateful for the phenomenal support of the administration to which he attributes much of his success.

His crew wrestles some of the toughest teams in the country. "Our schedule is the most ambitious and sophisticated that we have ever undertaken," he said. "The goal of our Sun Devils is to win the WAC crown, and of course, the NCAA championship."

A new NCAA rule passed this year allowing freshmen to wrestle in varsity competition, Bredehoft said, not only fills up his ranks (earlier in the year there were not enough varsity wrestlers for each class) but adds an economic boost to his scholarship program — a person on a scholarship doesn't have to wait a year to wrestle.

Bredehoft is also varsity tennis coach. This presents a big conflict, he said, because the seasons overlap, but he hopes to alleviate the situation soon.

Bredehoft is a very active promoter of wrestling, as can be evidenced by his actions at matches. Attendance has risen in the last five years from about 10 to more than 3,000 — a great tribute to Ted Bredehoft.

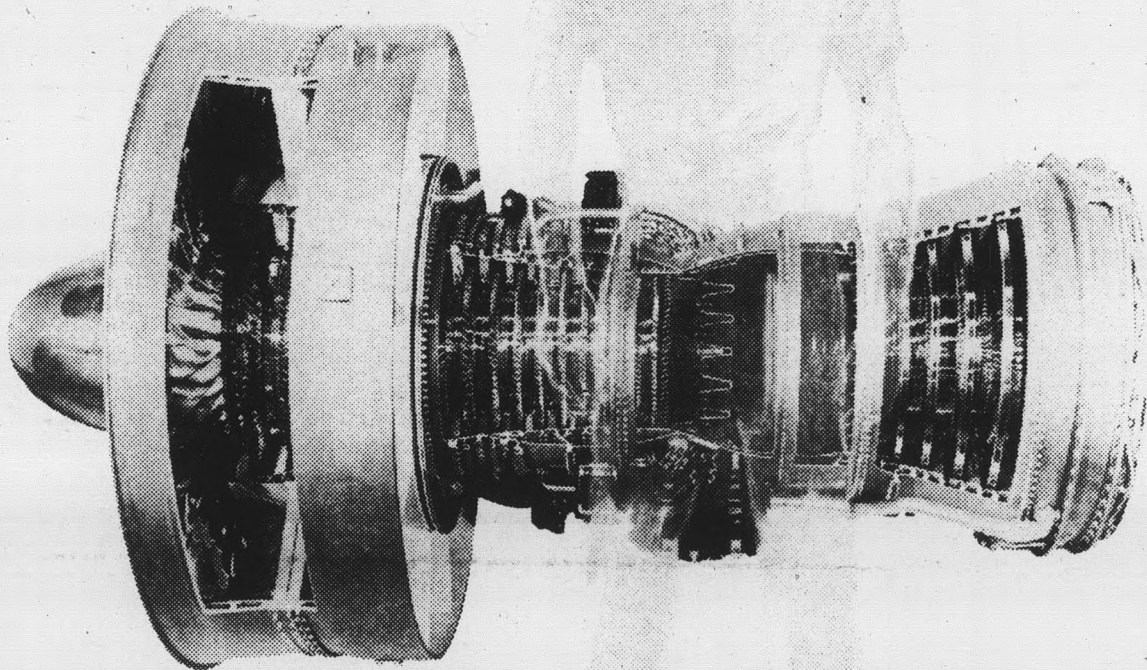

Unusual Jobs Offered In Work-Study Program

"Milking" scorpions, writing books, guarding art displays and working with computers are some of the unusual jobs offered by the University's fastest-growing programs, work-study.

Every year hundreds of students participate in a work-study program of employment. While these jobs are mainly to assist the student through college, they also offer unusual and challenging positions.

AMONG THE STUDENTS with interesting jobs is Nellie Taylor, who works in the center of Latin American studies. Because Miss Taylor knows Spanish, she is a research assistant who scans Spanish publications for articles and ideas for the University's bi-monthly Latin American Digest, which is sent to professors all over the country.

Ed Cooper works in the Forest Hydrology Department. Among his jobs he does drawings for government publications.

Tom Dooty has an off-campus job, as do many of the students involved in this program. He works for the Federal Milk Administration running lab work on "milk testing" for the amount of butter fat in the milk. Off-campus jobs are sponsored by non-profit governmental organizations.

MICHELLE WHEELER, Linda Schultz, Rene Rendon and Leo Leonard all work as guards for the various art displays around campus, particularly those in Gammage Auditorium and the University art gallery.

Work-study is a logical title for a program designed to give financial aids to students who need a job to help pay for college expenses. Students work for 15 hours a week while attending classes full time.

According to Del P. Higham, financial aids counselor, "anyone needing financial assistance except foreign students who are on foreign visas may apply for the program, which is on a first come, first served basis."

HIGHAM SAID THE library is the largest employer of students. "We also have specialized jobs in the animal research center, where they 'milk' snakes. Once they wanted us to send them a work-study student who would 'milk' a scorpion," said Higham.

Higham and Van L. Bushnell alternate as financial aids counselors. Both are working on their doctorate degrees in higher education administration.

"We can only put in 15 hours a week also," said Higham. "Actually, we are work-study students ourselves."

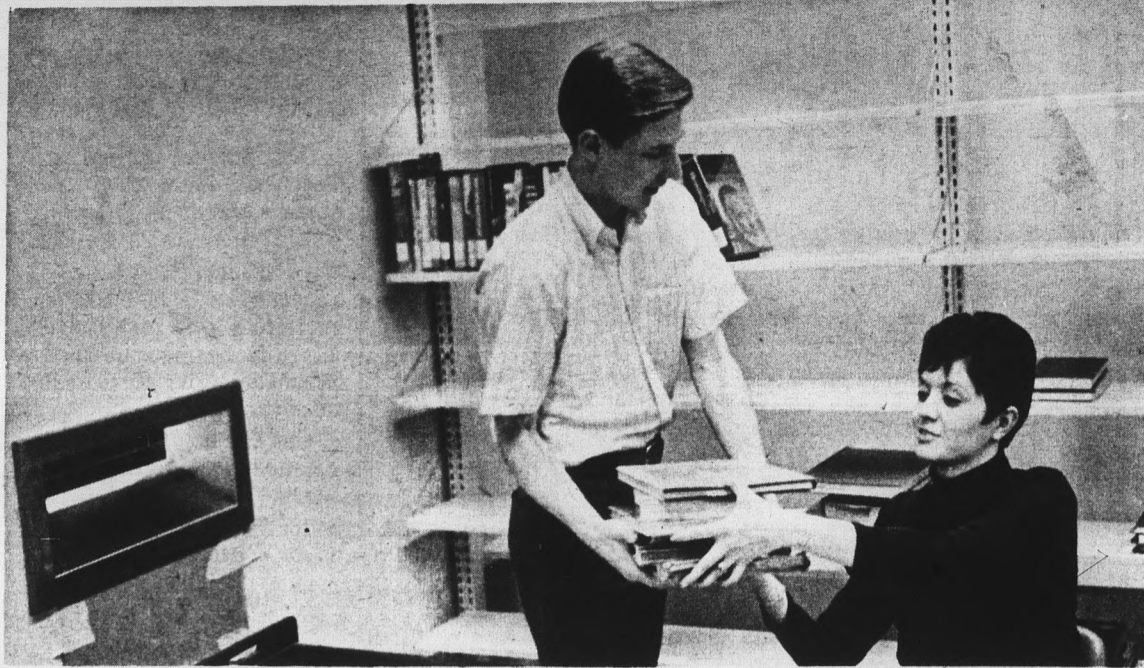
