Paper shortage reduces State Press publication

The continuing newsprint shortage could force State Press to cut back publication next week.

According to a spokesman for the Tempe Daily News, which prints State Press, a newsprint shipment due last Tuesday or Wednesday will not arrive until next Tuesday. This has forced State Press to delete this Friday's editorial pages to conserve space.

Program loses accreditation

ASU's clinical psychology program has lost its accreditation with the American Psychological Association (APA), but may appeal the decision within 30 days.

The program will have to upgrade its standards to requalify for accreditation, according to Dr. Ronald Kurz, Associate Administrative Officer of the APA.

"I don't have the exact date of my letter in front of me but it was within the last week or two that the University was informed that the accreditation had been removed," Kurz said.

Dr. Norris Vestre, director of the clinical psychology program, confirmed that accreditation has been lost. He said the psychology department will prepare a written explanation.

Clinical psychology

Dr. Austin Jones, chairman of the psychology department, was unavailable for comment yesterday.

Jones is resigning as head of the department. He announced his resignation Aug. 30 and it will become effective at the end of the academic year, according to his secretary.

Kurz, contacted at his Washington office, would not reveal the reason for the APA dropping the program from accreditation calling the information confidential.

"We consider accreditation very important for the purpose of meeting standards and informing the public of the quality of programs," Kurz said.

The purpose of the accreditation is to provide an opportunity for the program to upgrade its standards of training by being reviewed periodically by a professional association, Kurz said.

"Accreditation brings in some outside review process to allow the program to improve itself," Kurz said.

"Another purpose is to provide the public with information about programs that meet the association's standards," Kurz said.

The APA only accredits doctoral training programs in clinical psychology, but Kurz didn't think the loss of accreditation would affect

graduates in their hunt for jobs.

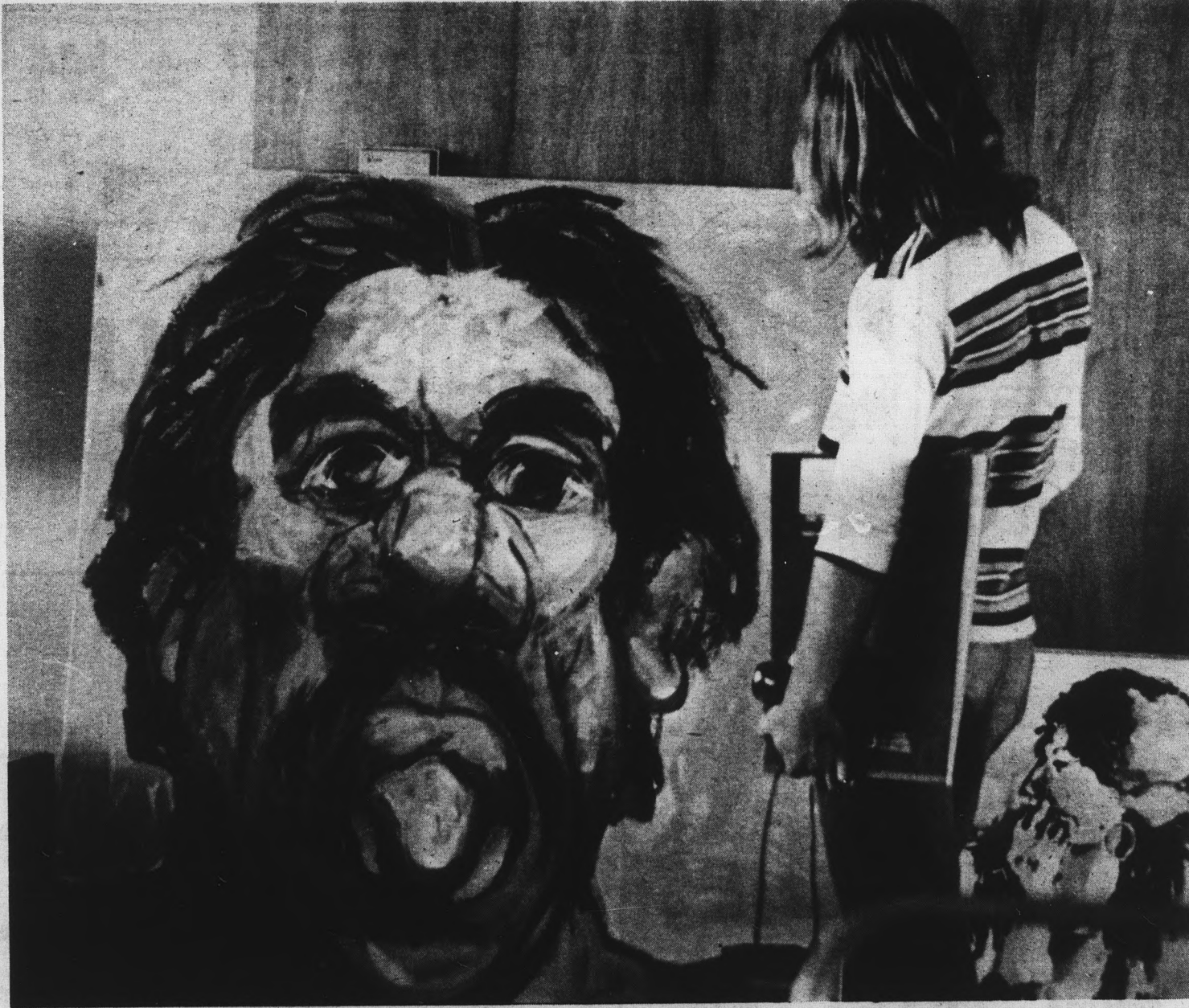
"There are lots of programs that aren't accredited and they have no problems placing their graduates in jobs," Kurz said.

"If you are only concerned with the employability of students, then accreditation is relatively unimportant," Kurz said.

Kurz said the program might have to make various changes to requalify for accreditation. He would not comment on what needed changing.

He was not sure what affect the loss of accreditation would have on the clinical psychology program.

"Until recently, a non-accredited program would not be eligible for National Institute of Mental Health (NIMH) grants. However, the NIMH grants are being phased out anyway," Kurz said.

Senate asks IRS to audit Ford

The Senate Rules Committee has asked the Internal Revenue Service to audit Vice President-designate Gerald Ford's income tax returns for the past five years.

The House Democrats called for a thorough investigation of Ford's background and qualifications Wednesday. Estimates placed Ford's confirmation at least a month away. Democratic caucus members said there was almost unanimous agreement that the House should not rush into the confirmation, but at the same time, the majority wanted to act on the nomination as soon as possible.

Rep. John Rhodes of Arizona seems to be the most likely candidate to replace Ford if he is confirmed. Rhodes' opponents for the House Republican leader position dropped out of contention Wednesday.

Israelis, Egyptians clash

The Israelis and Egyptians fought what one Israeli officer called, "the biggest armored clash in our military history" Wednesday along the Suez Canal.

The Egyptian command reported that the Israeli forces suffered heavy tank and armored car losses. The Israeli military command claimed it destroyed 60 Egyptian tanks and shot down four Egyptian planes.

On the other front of the war, Syrian artillery barrages attacked Israeli forces stalled on the road to Damascus.

Nixon meets with Arab ministers

President Nixon met with four Arab foreign ministers Wednesday, and said that they had a very good talk.

Nixon said the ministers from Kuwait, Saudi Arabia, Morocco and Algeria had differences with American policy in the Middle East, but he felt confident a fair and just war settlement could be reached.

Judge dismisses Watergate suit

U.S. District Court Judge John Sirica dismissed the Senate Watergate committee's suit against President Nixon because he said the court had no jurisdiction in the matter.

The committee's subpoena demanded the tape recordings of presidential conversations about the Watergate scandal.

A committee spokesman said the decision would probably be appealed.

AWS hosts forum on contraceptives

Associated Women Students of ASU will sponsor an open forum for persons interested in birth control at 2:30 p.m. Monday in the MU Mohave Room.

Participating on the panel will be Bob Kennison, ASASU chairman of student affairs, Dr. Richard Jones of the Student Health Center, Father Thomas DeMann from the Newman Center, and possibly Joe Davis, executive director of Planned Parenthood.

Cindy Settergren, AWS president, said the four panel members would present background information and open the forum to questions afterward.

The forum is open to all students and faculty, Settergren said.

Lady weight-lifters invade showers

Women weight-lifters have invaded the men's faculty locker room, but the men have a Bobby Riggs-type hero in the person of Richard Dahl, professor of law.

The weight training area is located in the annex of the men's gym. To reach the weight room the women pass through a hallway.

But the men must cross the hall in full view of the women in the weight room to reach the shower.

Dahl entered the locker room after jogging on Monday and was confronted with a group of women waiting for class to begin.

"They were sitting there in the male faculty locker room so I scared them out. Some old broad came stomping through and demanded to know who was in charge. I told her I was going to walk bare-assed through there whether they like it or not," Dahl said.

Dahl got his shower, but has been complaining about the women's presence ever since.

Signs have been posted in the locker room area listing co-ed class times, according to Deane Richardson, chairman of health, physical education and recreation department.

"We're just overflowing and we try to use all the space we can. We try to make all possible classes co-ed and we posted a sign in the locker room stating when these classes are held," Richardson said.

Dahl said his complaints have gotten him no results.

"I fought the administration and got nowhere. The administration said classes come first," Dahl said. "We have girls in purple leotards flitting around from a dance class."

Richardson said dance classes do use the area but they try to schedule classes when recreation is at a minimum.

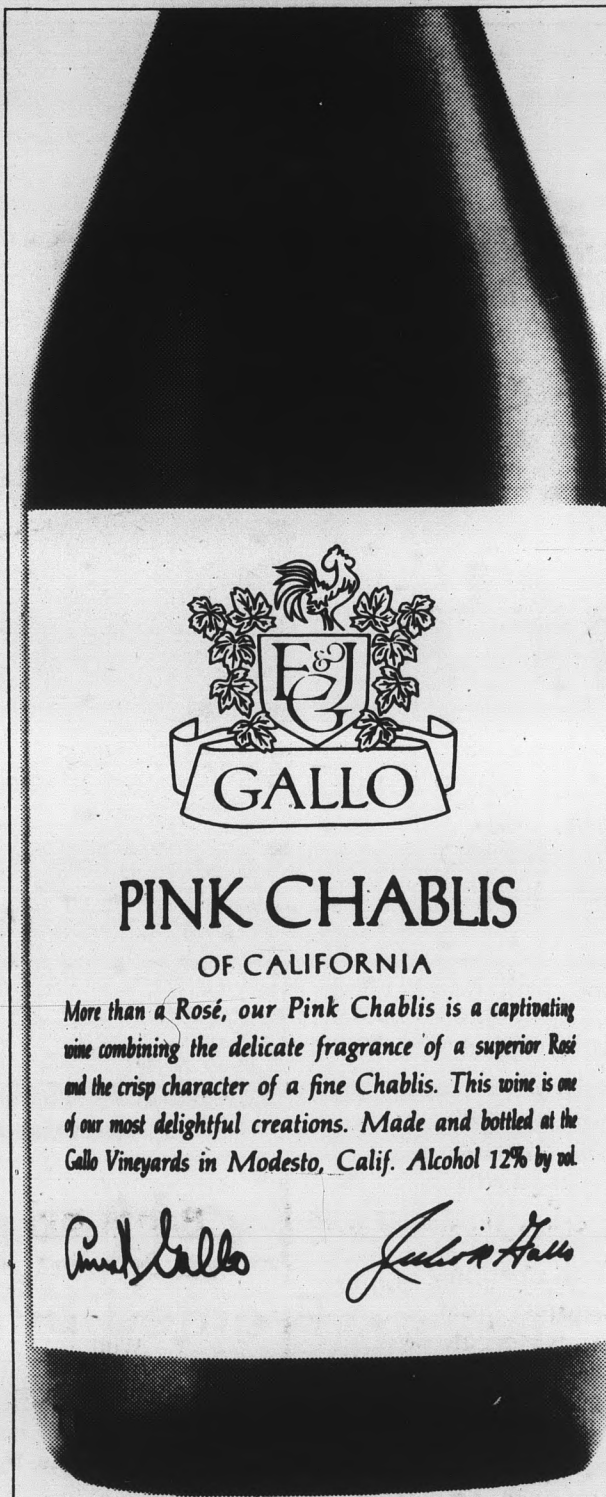
"The faculty will just have to plan showers when no co-ed classes are in session," Richardson said.

"We have nowhere to put the weight-lifting machine so we can't move it. The classes are overflowing and we try to use all the space we can. There's nothing wrong a new facility wouldn't correct. I think things will get worse before they get better," he said.

"I got into a long argument about the value of the weight lifting for women. They could get the same exercise without the machine. I know that if you keep pestering the administration enough something gets done," Dahl said.

"The sweaty locker room is the line. I feel like the Bobby Riggs of the faculty. It's bad enough some of the girls outrun you but I don't want them looking at my 50-year-old body," Dahl said.

Dahl said it is a long walk from the locker room to the shower room and he resents having to dress to take a shower. The administration can't solve the problem and Dahl continues to complain.

Regent's choice

The Arizona Board of Regents will be able to hear the student's side this Saturday as to why birth control distribution should be allowed on campus.

At its meeting at the UofA, ASASU Student Affairs Committee Chairman Bob Kenison will try to give the regents an idea as to why birth control should be allowed.

We hope he will be given a hearing.

ASASU has put a lot of work in on this issue. Petitions have been circulated and they have investigated various ways of providing the service here or near campus.

The committee sent the board a detailed letter outlining the problem and suggesting that Planned Parenthood be given space to provide a family planning clinic here on campus.

The letter points out that a student attitude survey conducted in 1967-68 indicated that more than 77 per cent of the students in that year felt the health center should provide birth control.

Well, times have changed. That figure is probably higher now.

A Tempe Daily News survey of 18 Tempe residents showed that 14 said having birth control on campus would be ok. Only one said it would not.

It could be suggested that this is an amazing result considering that just a few years ago, all of the respondents probably would have said no.

Birth control is becoming accepted by almost all segments of society. ASASU is just trying to make it easily available for the students here.

Why? In the letter to the regents it states that as many as 200 girls a year drop out of ASU because they are pregnant. Why should this be allowed to happen with all the preventatives we have?

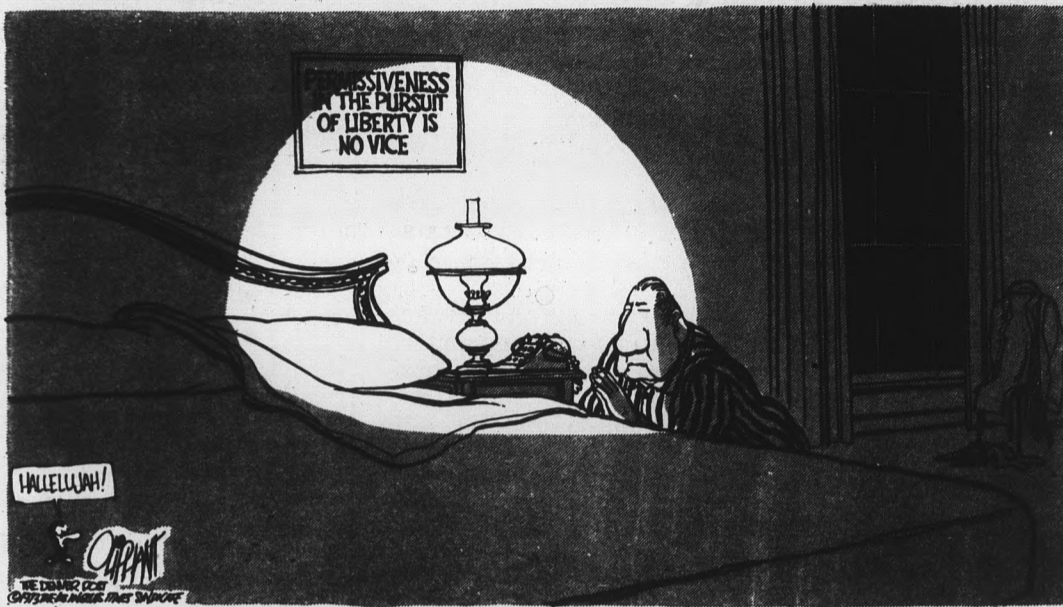
The regents have a choice. They are the body that must decide.

Will they give ASASU a fair hearing on the subject. Will they discuss it with Kenison?

The students have a right to be heard and the regents need to listen so they can make the most intelligent and informed decision possible.

One can respect almost any decision the regents make when it is known why the board feels as it does and it gives answers to arguments people might present.

It is hoped the regents will be responsive and show the students the same respect the board feels it deserves.

Letters Framed by the ruling class

Editor:

Mr. Williams (in a letter in the Oct. 16 SP) has obviously failed to see the deepening reason behind the comparison of Angela Davis' trial and the charges brought against Spiro T. Agnew. Angela Davis' murder rap was a total frame-up! For years she had been a thorn in the administration's side. As a UCLA educator she had quite a following and helped build several demonstrations in support of the Soledad Brothers, one of whom was George Jackson. If one has seriously traced the jailings of the Brothers, their ludicrous jail sentences along with the brutality received in prison, their organized resistance, it may not be too hard to understand why Angela Davis was an active organizer for their defense.

As a member of the Young Socialist Alliance, I do not agree with the political party with which Angela Davis allied herself. The Communist Party is a Stalinist, reformist party, not at all revolutionary. I as well as my comrades did support Angela Davis for her case was part of the continuing struggle to protect our civil liberties. Through our demonstrations and educational forums we were able to expose the prosecution. This country is controlled by a minority of rich men whose goals serve only themselves and have carried out their policy of racist white supremacy. As

long as the capitalist system survives minority struggles cannot succeed.

Mr. Foster Williams mentions, "Spiro T. Agnew will be allowed bail if he is charged, but not because he is 'rich,' 'white,' or 'male.'" He is not facing a murder rap." Lt. Wm. Calley faced a murder rap, was convicted guilty, was lifted out of the stockades, placed in a duplex apartment, allowed to have his girlfriend visit overnight and even did some gardening in his very own backyard! During Calley's "sentencing" for murder, a black radical woman who was not allowed bail, was placed in a jail cell for a year and a half, destroyed by the press, along with verbal attacks from federal government officials. Mr. Foster Williams should question his statement.

"Everyone charged with any thing is innocent until proven guilty."

Angela Davis was framed by the ruling class who run our country and who wanted her off the streets in order to prevent her from mobilizing demonstrations against

them. After her trial, jurors were quoted as saying, "The prosecutor's case read like a fairy tale."

I urge Mr. Foster Williams to read *Letters from a Soledad Brother* by George Jackson, *Malcom X, Evolution of a Revolutionary*, and *Malcom X, By Any Means Necessary, Race Prejudice: How it Began, When it Will End* by George Breitman.

If one has the time and money take a trip to New York City and visit "The Tombs" you will find 85 per cent of the prisoners there have not been to trial but have already served 2 years as "criminals," not being able to afford bail or denied bail. Many have pleaded guilty for hope, a lesser sentence. Also, most important, of the 85 per cent, 80 per cent are black. I sense this was what Marc Schneider meant in his statement referring to the two systems of justice, one for the rich whites and another for blacks, Chicano and the poor majority.

Carnegie seeks researchers

A Carnegie Endowment fund representative told students Wednesday the government wants to recruit students to help enlighten the public about foreign policy students.

Dr. Roger Morris, a former aide to Secretary of State Henry Kissinger, was on campus to interview

students for research positions with the Carnegie Endowment for International Peace.

"Those selected for the projects will not be selected on a degree requirement. A political science background is not necessary. The key qualifications are ability,

written and oral expression and a commitment to the public interest, regardless of your major, Morris said.

A fellowship program sponsored by the Carnegie Endowment for International Peace in Washington D.C. has tried to bring public interest investigation and accountability to the foreign affairs bureaucracy, in much the same way other groups tackle consumer,

environmental or poverty issues, Morris said.

"Initial studies have been investigations of U.S. policy toward genocide in the African country of Burundi, which was completed in May, and potential new projects range from U.S. policy toward Chile to the media's impact on foreign policy making," Morris said.

"The whole idea of this program is to bring a public awareness of policies

directed by the once immune Pentagon and State Department," said Morris.

Fellowships are \$400 monthly plus travel to and from Washington D.C. Academic credit can usually be arranged at the initiative of the student, Morris said.

There were no heroics, no epic battles between the two men. Robert rushed eight times for a net gain of one yard and Garland entered the game late and carried just twice for 12 yards.

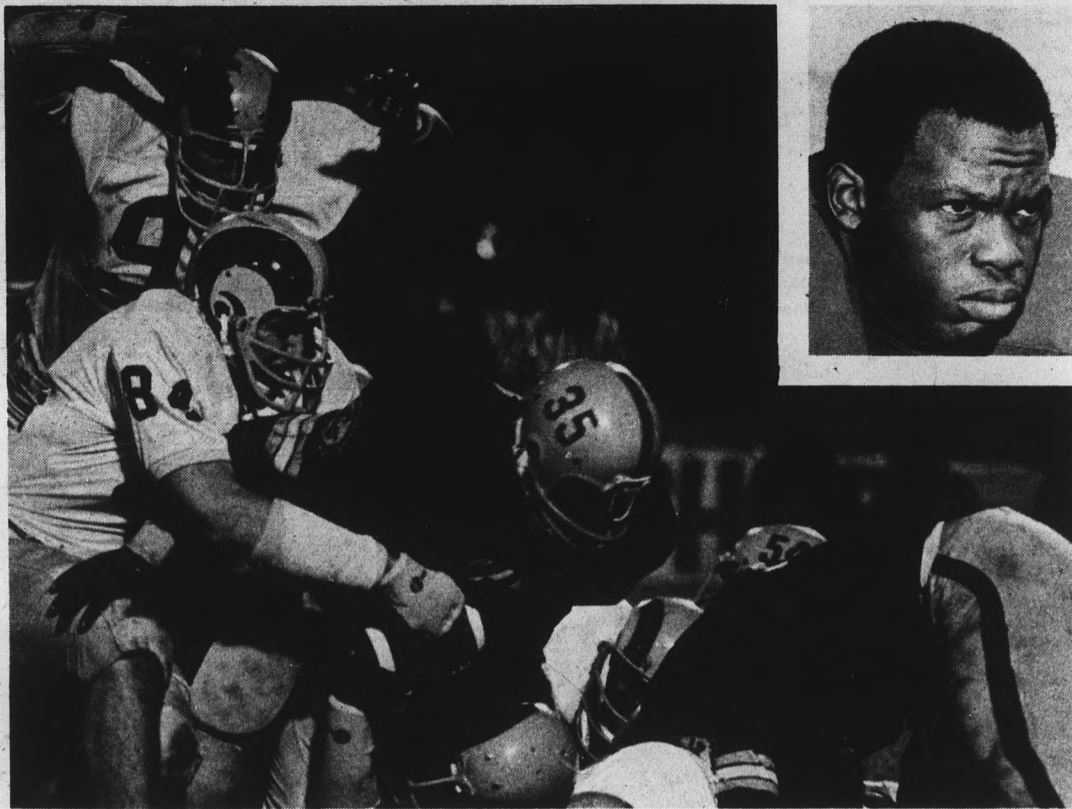

Garland was the fifth Evans brother to play at Barstow, leaving him a lot to live up to.

"It was expected that each brother would be better. Since I was fifth I had the most pressure on me," he said.

Garland was recruited by about 12 colleges, including New Mexico and San Jose State, but decided on ASU.

"ASU seemed to want me more, and besides, I wanted to play on a winning team," he said.

Robert didn't do much in the way of urging Garland to attend San Jose.

"I guess I really didn't encourage him to come here because the coach who was recruiting him (Dewey King) played favorites, regardless of the player's ability. It didn't matter how

good you were, all you had to do is be one of the coach's special players," Robert said.

The freshman year at ASU was a trying one for Evans.

"It's something I wasn't used to. Every freshman, even those not in sports, is confronted with it. You're more on your own. Just being away from home is a big change," he said.

The combination of dormitory life, studies and coach Kush's practice sessions required a period of adjustment for Evans.

He is pleased with the way this season is going, especially after his two fine performances against Colorado State and New Mexico.

"I would like to play more but Benny (Malone) is a senior and I have two more years. He had to wait for his chance and I'll wait for mine."


The soft-spoken Evans, who doesn't drink, smoke, or swear, is beginning to think about his future.

"It's too soon to tell about a professional football career, so I'm going to start talking to some people to help me decide what to do about school and finding another profession."

It appears that Evans will be ready for whatever comes along.
