ASASU Senate votes to disband itself

The Associated Students Senate has voted almost unanimously to abolish itself.

Pat Norris, ASASU first vice-president, said the decision, which was made Monday, will go into effect for the 1975-76 school year if approved by a faculty and senate council, the student body and President Schwada.

The Senate approved a complete revision of its constitution Feb. 7, which eliminates the Senate and replaces it with a First Council comprised of two representatives from each College Council, she said.

The Senate presently comes between the executive branch of ASASU and the college student councils, removing the student body a step farther from their representation, Norris said.

"What we're doing is just taking out a layer," she said. "We'll still have student representation, but the administrative leadership will be united with the great body of the student; we'll be closer to the student."

Even the new preamble to the constitution is "more clear, concise — getting to the point, as compared to the old preamble, she said.

The newly approved preamble says ASASU's function is to "provide an opportunity for student participation and service in the University community and to administer student programs in the most efficient manner possible."

Norris said the new constitution directs duties into four divisions: the Executive Officers, the Executive Committee, the First Council and the College Councils.

The College Councils, comprised of students selected by each college, will hear organization budget requests, formulate college council budget, initiate and administer programs within their respective colleges, and relay student opinion to the First Council.

Norris said the First Council will take over most of the Senate's duties.

Two students from each college council will be appointed or elected to the First Council, she said.

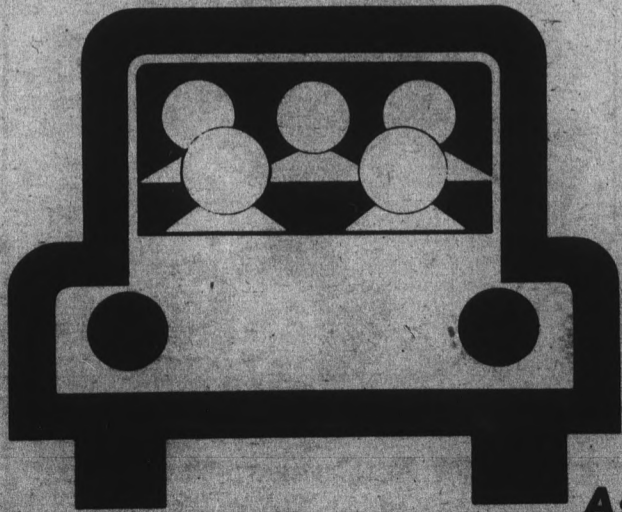
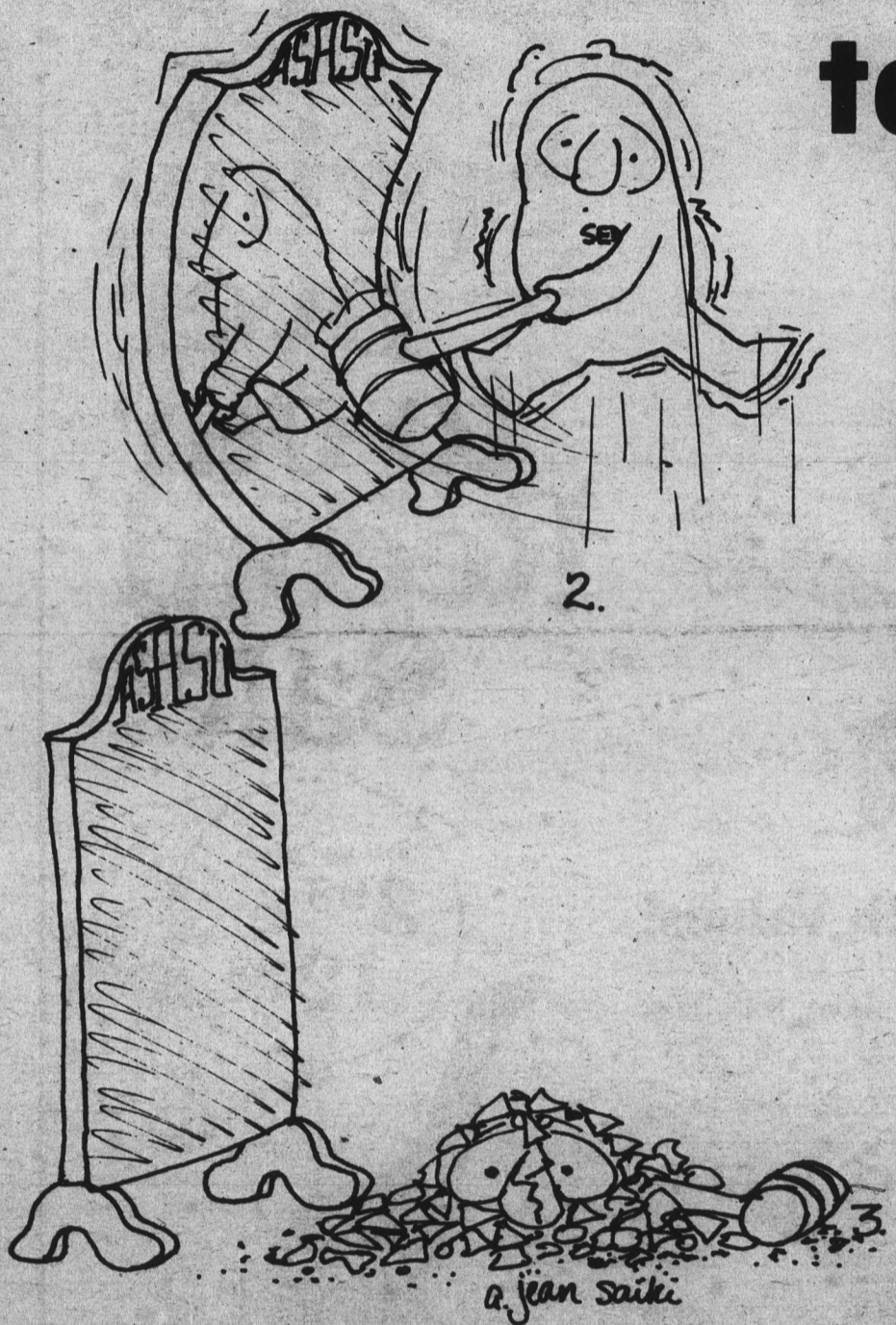
Norris said the First Council's duties will be to conduct hearings and approve the annual ASASU budget, and approve and make revisions to the by-laws.

The Executive Committee will contain three First Council members, the activities vice president, campus affairs vice president (a joining of the current Associated Women Students vice president and the administrative vice president), and the president.

The Executive Committee will do most of the work, Norris said. They will determine policy, approve emergency budget measures and represent the students on relevant issues.

The executive officers will administer student programs and oversee the ASASU boards.

"This simplified structure of ASASU will be easier to work with and more efficient," Norris said. "It gives a larger say to the College Councils — they have greater responsibilities and play a more important roll."

Norris said proposals for a total revision of the ASASU constitution originated in the 1972-73 school year.

In the fall of 1973 she appointed a special committee that drafted the new constitution.

If the revised constitution is approved by the faculty and Senate committee, the student body will vote on it at the time of spring student elections, Norris said.

Vets seek higher benefits

A letter campaign sponsored by the ASU Veterans Association is gathering support on campus for increased G.I. benefits.

Larry Dray, ASU Veterans Club president, said, "We want to bring the G.I. Bill into comparability with what the WWII vet received."

Currently before the House sub-committee, the bill calls for a 13 percent increase and an extension of the deadline to use the G.I.

Bill from 8 to 10 years. Also being considered is a change from a 36 month to a 45 month eligibility use, allowing the veteran two more semesters.

Dray said President Nixon has stated vets are to receive priority with regards to education and then Nixon turns around and says he will sign nothing that calls for more than an eight per cent increase.

The letter campaign is being sponsored nationally on all campuses by the

National Association of Concerned Vets and statewide by the Intercollegiate Veterans Association. Tuesday the accumulated letters will be taken to the Federal building.

"The majority of the people called upon put on a uniform and fought just like WWII vets," Dray said. "We had killings just like WWII. We fought on foreign soil just like in WWII, and we want benefits equal to that of WWII vets."

Prize-winning photographer speaks on 'Writing with Light'

The winner of the 1973 Pulitzer Prize for feature photography, Brian Lanker, will speak on "Writing with Light" at 8 p.m. Thursday, in Murdock Hall 101.

Lanker was awarded the Pulitzer Prize for a series of photographs of the birth of a baby. He began his career in Phoenix and has been a news photographer for the Topeka Capital-Journal since 1969.

The National Press Photographer Association has named him "Regional Photographer of the Year" five times and in 1971 voted Lanker "Newspaper Photographer of the Year."

His lecture's sponsored by the Public Lectures Board. Admission is free.

Faculty urged to seek active involvement

Teachers at ASU can no longer be complacent and rely on tenure but must take an active part in University affairs, said Bert Bender, assistant professor of English.

Bender said teachers can start their involvement by attending a joint meeting of ASU faculty groups.

He wants to discuss how the faculty can participate in the University decision-making process and become actively involved in University government and budget problems.

Groups represented at the meeting will include American Association of University Professors, The American Federation of Teachers and the Faculty Association.

The meeting is open to all members and perspective members, he said. The "sack lunch" meeting will be from 12 to 2 p.m., Thursday in SS 211.

Bender said Southern Illinois University (SIU) set a precedent by firing 104 faculty and staff members, some tenured, because SIU was asked to cut their budget by five per cent. And "those fired weren't given the benefit of hearings," he said.

"The outcome might have been different at SIU had faculty participated in budget making decisions," Bender said.

ASASU sponsors car pool

A car pooling system has been set up by Associated Students for the University community. The plan is similar to one used by local businessmen and will make use of the ASU computer.

A map on pages six and seven breaks down the area which is bordered by Bell Road (north), Pecos Road (south), Bullard Avenue (west) and Greenfield Road (east).

Schedule information is broken down into Monday-Wednesday-Friday, Tuesday-Thursday, and daily sections. Completed forms should be brought to the ASASU office, MU 208, or the State Press office, Stauffer Hall.

The information will be computer sorted by location and time, hopefully within one week.

A print-out will appear in the State Press listing the students who turned in schedule information, their addresses and phone numbers.

Using the print-out will entail locating a commuter with a similar class schedule to your own and getting in touch with him to work out a car pool schedule. The print-out will indicate if commuters want to ride, drive, or both.

The carpool plan was devised by a group of faculty staff and students. If you have any questions, information is available in MU 208K or at 965-3142.

ASASU petitions available

If you wish to become an active part of the political system at ASU, your time has arrived. Petitions are now available for the Associated Students elections.

All ASU students with a class load of seven hours or more and a 2.2 cumulative grade index are eligible for ASASU Senate membership. To become candidates students must get a petition for their respective college from the ASASU office and secure the required number of signatures.

For example, if you are a qualified architecture student seeking office, you need to get a petition for the College of Architecture, get six signatures and then return the petition by 4 p.m., Mar. 5.

The number of signatures required varies with each college as does the number of senate seats available. Fact sheets with this information will be supplied with petitions.

Executive offices of President and First Vice President require 75 semester hours of credit, attendance at ASU last semester and a grade point of 2.2. Offices of Activities Vice president and Administrative Vice president and President of the Associated Women Students require 45 semester hours.

Those interested in running for office should get the necessary forms in MU room 208. Petitions must be completed and returned by Mar. 5.

The primary elections will be Apr. 2-3 and the general elections will be Apr. 9-10.

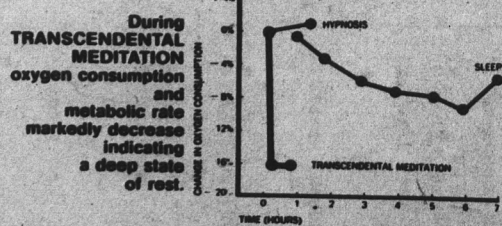

Low income students may receive medicaid

College students with low incomes are among those who may benefit from two health care bills being considered by the Arizona legislature.

Both health care packages are designed to qualify Arizona for funds from Medicaid, a federal program of health care for the poor. The bills were drawn up by Rep. Howard Adams, R-Phoenix, and Sen. Scott Alexander, R-Tucson.

Both Adams and Alexander agreed that medically needy students could profit from the passage of either bill. But they added that neither measure contains special provisions for students.

Currently, health care for Arizona's poor is provided by the state's 14 counties. Adams said if the counties discontinue their programs and send the money back to the state they are now spending for them, the bill would not heap an additional burden on the state's taxpayers.

Adams' bill, currently being considered in four House committees, would provide a statewide system of health insurance, with Arizona paying for the Health premiums of needy persons.

Adams' bill defines needy as a person who is an Arizona resident and who can not join an employe health care plan. The annual income of his household can't exceed:

- \$4,000 for one person;
- \$6,000 for two people;
- \$8,000 for three or more people.

Adams said if the health care plan is passed, it could be operating by 1975.

Alexander's proposal, which was introduced Monday into the Senate Public Health and Welfare Committee, would make indigent health care for the responsibility of the state. Currently Arizona's 14 counties provide medical services to the needy, Alexander said.

Under Alexander's bill, Arizona would pay for health services to persons whose annual household income was less than:

- \$2,064 for one person;
- \$2,828 for two people;
- \$3,708 for three people;
- \$5,136 for four people.

Chances for the bill's passage are good, Alexander said.

Alexander added that Arizona's counties spend unequal amounts per person on medical care. "The bill will give equal access to medical care all across the state," he said.

The measure is based on the recommendations of the Citizens' Advisory Committee on Medicaid, which presented its findings to the state legislature last month, Alexander said.

The two teams with the best record after the second round will advance to the regional play-offs March 8 and 9 in Utah. The winner of that tournament will advance to the National Championships in March.

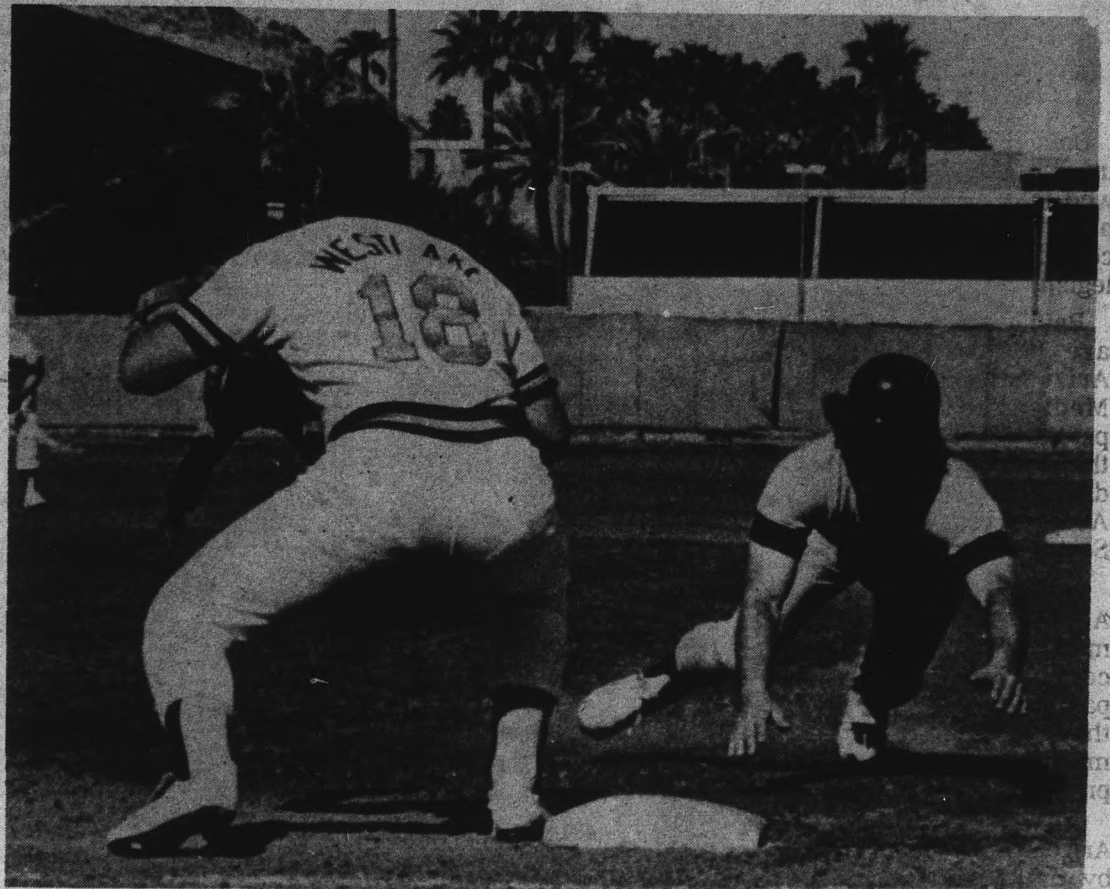
ASU, stars play tennis

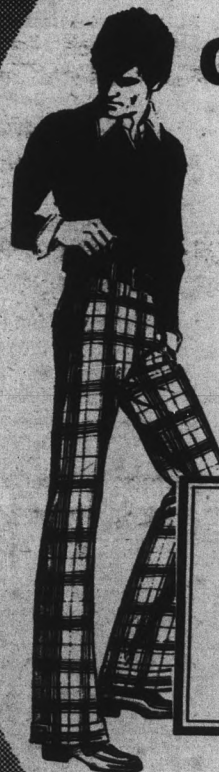
