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New gay group wants now-empty stadium for socials

Polack's pigskin program pops

Athletic director Jed Grinder, in an emotional news conference Wednesday, announced ASU will eliminate football from its sports program for "social and humanitarian" reasons.

"I know we had a great team coming back for next season," said Grinder, as tears streamed to the floor. "Maybe we could have won the national championship. But I just couldn't justify all the money and emphasis we place on football at ASU."

Grinder said Sun Devil head coach Frank Tush, who turned down a \$38 billion contract to coach in the pros, will be transferred to the foreign language department, where he will teach Polish humor.

"I'm delighted!" beamed Tush. "Especially for the player's sakes. Now those dummies can go to class and graduate on time like they should have been doing all along."

Grinder said he is "fully aware" that the loss of revenue from football tickets could cause a budget crisis in the athletic department.

"But there's more to an educational institution than worrying about bringing in enough money to buy new jockstraps, Grinder snorted. "The guys can make do with the old ones."

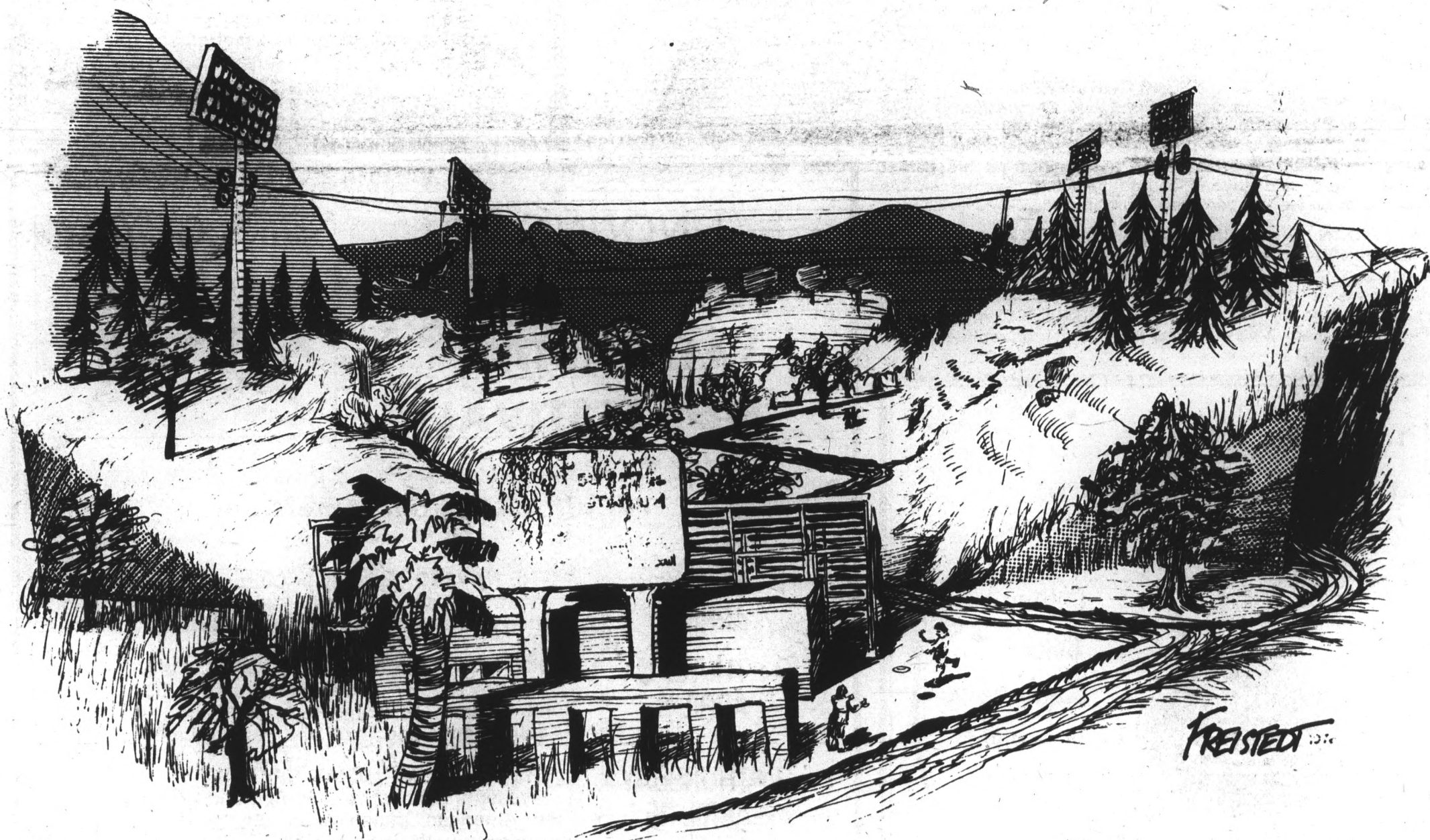
Grinder said he will make the stadium available to any academic group or campus

organization "willing to clean up after."

Several campus organizations have already expressed interest in Miller's proposal. A spokesman for ASU's new gay group, Oliver Closet, said he will request the stadium's use for the gays' Thursday-night socials.

"We'll need the biggest facility we can get," Closet said. More than 40,000 applications for membership have been turned in by students and faculty, he said, which would mean the entire campus population is gay.

"We're going to ask Jed to go ahead with his plans to expand the stadium," he said. "If you meet someone at ASU who says he doesn't like gays, chances are he's lying."

Erotica Motel acquisition reveals Swata's desires

The Arizona Board of Regents Saturday approved an ASU request to purchase The Erotica Motel, 2400 E. Van Buren, for conversion to coed student housing.

The Erotica Hall will be the first coed facility in the history of ASU.

In an unprecedented burst of candor, University President John Swata confided to a female Stale Mess reporter that he is

"tickled pink" with the regent decision.

"Now that we're providing a coed dorm, those student government people will have to find another issue to whine about," Swata said.

He added he has had "a secret desire" to see coed housing tried out at ASU, but if the reporter quoted him, he would see to it she never got in.

The facility is scheduled to open in the fall, according to

Russel Flattery, ASU housing director.

Mike Callahault, Associated Stoooges vice president for thilly things said ASASU will plan "a wide variety" of activities for residents in the new dorm.

"We'll be leaving the closed-circuit TV sets in each room," Callahault said, "because we're organizing a series of educational films the students can enjoy during their leisure hours."

Era Now, president of Organization for the Relaxation of American Group Sexual Mores (ORGASM), said she hopes the Erotica Hall will be the first of many such conversions.

"We are large, and we are optimistic," she said with a low moan. "We hope Swata will encourage the conversion of every dormitory to coeducational housing."

Official returns call; reporter's heart fails

Stale Mess reporter Scoop Tulumello collapsed and died of heart failure Wednesday after a top ASU administrator returned his telephone call within a month after it was originally made.

Witnesses said Tulumello's face became contorted with "shock and disbelief" as he slumped to the floor when Dr. Hemlock V. Sherdflerger, vice president in charge of fence building, returned Tulumello's call of March 5.

Stale Mess staffers reacted angrily to what they charged was "an unprecedented and radical departure from administration policy." The administration's communications manual requires that reporters run a six-month "Accessibility Obstacle Course" before they are permitted to speak to top-flight intellectuals such as Dr. Sherdflerger.

Funeral arrangements are pending. Administration

spokesman Arnold Ziegler said ASU "regrets the incident" and promised the University will construct a bikepath, "the Tulumello Trail," in his honor.

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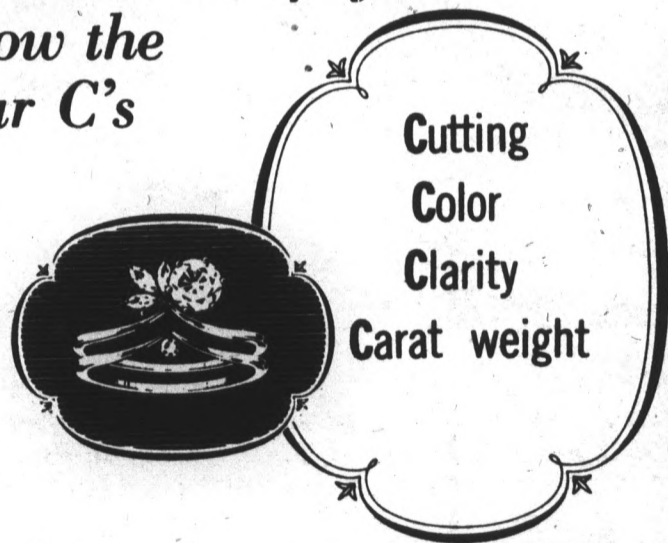

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Captured Swata now SLA recording star

Issues taped message telling of dedication to revolution



University President John Swata has been unavailable for comment lately. His secretary said, "He's been all tied up."

University President John Swata, who three weeks ago was dragged half-clothed and screaming from his home by a surviving band of Symbionese Liberation Army terrorists, issued a taped message Wednesday declaring he has joined his captors.

In a terse communique taped in an SLA hideout somewhere in Papago Park and deposited in an ASASU "Bitch Box," Swata said, "Death to fascist regents! I have joined the revolution!"

Swata's friends and family expressed shock at his conversion, some asserting that he must have been brainwashed. A psychologist suggested SLA members may have broken Swata down by dressing up as reporters and demonstrators and marching around him, demanding comment on anything.

But authorities said they began to suspect that Swata had changed his loyalties when witnesses claim they saw him take part in a robbery of the MU Movie House cashier that netted \$27.

Polaroid snapshots of the heist showed SLA members with slingshots aimed at Swata, but close examination of the photos showed the

weapons were not loaded, although the robbers were.

After Swata's capture three weeks ago, SLA spokesmen sent a message via passenger pelican to Sidney Whoose, Arizona Board of Regents chairman, demanding that 35,000 copies of the University Budget be distributed to ASU students in exchange for Swata's release.

After negotiations, the SLA accepted Whoose's counter offer of 500 copies given to fraternity members, but Whoose asked for proof that Swata was unharmed.

The SLA released a photograph found under a coed's mattress in Manzanita Hall showing Swata tied with ropes but apparently in good spirits.

Police were forced to quell riots that broke out when helicopters flew over fraternity row dropping copies of the budget. Some frat men got only torn pages, while others were seen running away with several whole documents.

SLA messages denounced the botched budget distribution, and authorities feared for Swata's life when the latest message came.

Committees committee sets subcommittee study

A subcommittee of the University Committee on Committees agreed unanimously today to study the Bicycle subcommittee of the University Safety Committee to determine whether the subcommittee has inadvertently spent the entire past two years studying the same thing as the University Parking Committee.

The chairman of the parking committee, Bob Succeeds, charged in a memo that street curbs are the jurisdiction of his committee.

Succeeds has stated publicly that he disagrees with the bicycle subcommittee's proposal that the University paint the bikepaths maroon and the curbs gold.

The parking committee, Succeeds said, has studied the problem of color coordination for two years. Exterior decorators from around the country are reported to have been flown in at University expense to testify before the committee.

"We have determined that rust orange is the proper color (for the curbs)," Succeeds said. He refused to comment on a possible bikepath color.

The subcommittee of the University Committee on Committees will discuss the committee's charges against the subcommittee at the next subcommittee meeting, August 3, according to the committee chairman of the committee on committee subcommittees.

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PANIC orders

Don't walk on malls

In a desperate effort to clear up congestion, the University Police Action Now Interim Committee (PANIC) has ordered students not to use campus malls between classes.

Committee Chairman Snarl Banitfelt said the action is "bound to be controversial," but said something had to be done to end the fatal accidents and crises which have occurred daily at ASU.

"This decision is final," Banitfelt warned. "There'll be no study, review or appeal. Students keep griping about the University bureaucracy, claiming nothing ever gets done. Well, now we're doing something."

PANIC member Marjorie

Lighthead said the new procedure may cause students to be late for classes since they'll be unable to leave buildings until break times have passed.

"This is just one of the rule's shortcomings that will have to be ironed out," Lighthead said. "Students will just have to schedule their classes close together, like in the same building."

The committee made its decision after a lengthy 20-second debate with a group of undistinguished students who wandered into the MU Barrel Cactus Room, searching for the Thoughts and Illusions Committee presentation of "Suicide: Its Effect on Your Future."

Student sympathizer

Joseph Nitwad said, "This ridiculous measure will turn our malls into huge bike highways, throw our classes into chaos and turn every mall-walker into a long distance runner."

"So what's wrong with a brisk sprint between studies?" countered Lighthead.

University Police Chief Gorge Buoy said his force will "go all-out" to enforce the order.

"We may fail to apprehend the rapers and bike thieves, but anyone who sets foot on that pavement between the half hour and 20 minutes 'til is gonna get zapped — no warnings," he said.

"God knows we've tried," cried Banitfelt.

Hardhats, shrinks stomp on concrete

A five-year study by the psychology and engineering departments has found that sidewalks at ASU are too hard for students' feet.

The study was financed by Buildmore Construction Co., which has already placed bids for the construction of new walkways.

Dr. More E. Libida, psychology professor, said the number of students walking around campus barefoot has caused a "crisis problem in education."

"The concrete is just too hard for their feet," he said. "Our study has shown that sore feet has resulted in a high number of dropouts and inattention in class, because students are preoccupied with rubbing their aching feet."

Libida recommended that classes supply foot-baths for afflicted students.

John Erectar, an engineering professor who was responsible for the technical end of the study, said his group has drawn up plans to resurface the whole campus in a rubberized material similar to that used on the Joe Sellout track.

Legislators have voiced unanimous support for the idea of the resurfacing and will soon consider a \$80 million proposal for emergency funds for construction.

W.W. "Slick" Backslapper, speaker for the Arizona House of Representatives and major stockholder in Buildmore, says the house will be getting to the issue as soon as it decides whether to change Lincoln's birthday to Frank Tush Day.

Candidates quit; voting turnout will be big

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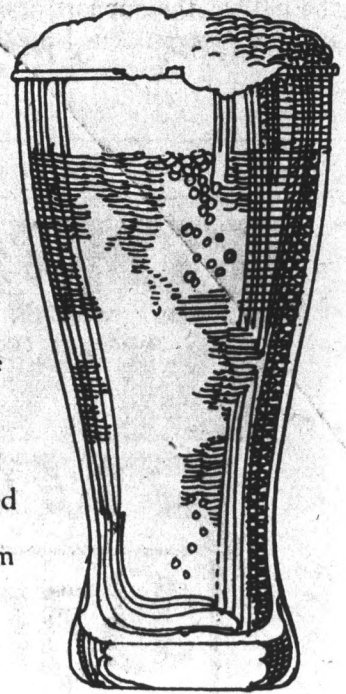

Sex bill will forbid pinko procreation

Rep. James Smelly, R-Phoenix, today introduced a bill in the Arizona Legislature that would ban almost all forms of sexual relations. The taboo would forbid sex by anyone or anything, except for purposes of procreation.

"With all these scurrilous Commies around here, you can never tell what horrible sins against the laws of nature are being committed even right here in the b-e-d-rooms of our beloved state," Smelly said.

"This way, anyone who wants a family will have to be licensed to procreate. Then the pinkos won't overrun Arizona with dirty hippie commune miscegenations," he added.

Smelly's proposal calls for the establishment of a Bureau of Conception, headed by a committee of five men who will evaluate each couple's application for intercourse.

The bill has the support of state Republican leaders, the Sun City League of Voters, the Phoenix Forty, the City of Mesa, Homer "blessed is the nation whose God is the Lord" Lame and the Keep God White Committee.

Scrubbers see bill, Senators eat lunch

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Surgery exhibition kills liberal student

A 19-year-old liberal arts major died Wednesday after an unsuccessful surgery demonstration in the Great Hall of the College of Law.

Arthur J. Sadiski, a sophomore pre med student, attempted the impromptu lobotomy on Joe Btfsfg. Witnesses said Sadiski chose Btfsfg for the operation because the subject's forehead "showed promise for study by future generations." Btfsfg was not charged for the surgery.

Known among colleagues as an innovative amateur surgeon, Sadiski startled observers in the operating theatre by using a .38 caliber revolver to make the first delicate incisions.

"It was a masterful, totally different approach," exclaimed one observer. "But I guess

Sadiski thought he had put more chromium cartridges in the chamber. After the first two incisions, the gun failed to fire."

Sadiski said he is undaunted by the operation's failure. "Everyone makes mistakes. Next time, it'll be different," he said assuredly.

However, University officials said Sadiski may have violated the Student Code of Conduct. "There'll be no more of these 'operations' until we've conducted a thorough investigation," an administrator said.

According to witnesses' accounts, Sadiski failed to sterilize his hands and went gloveless throughout the operation.

"A flagrant violation! We cannot allow these abuses to continue," the official said.

Students get shaft from usual source

Tony Bustyourmoney, ASU Bookstore mogul, has declared he is giving a 75-per-cent discount to the faculty.

An informed source said Bustyourmoney made this declaration while sitting alone in his office.

He issued a statement saying he is continuing his battle against students and their "meager purchases."

"Students think they should get some special consideration because of their so-called lower financial status. But I cannot grant the wishes of people who buy only a few books per semester. Faculty members buy thousands — thousands!!!"

Bustyourmoney's mutterings were barely audible behind his locked, chained and bolted office door. A guard stood outside.

"Mr. Tony sees no one who is unauthorized," the guard said to a Stale Mess reporter.

"When he leaves for lunch, you may go in to see him, but only briefly" the reporter was told.

Several cashiers on hand said the new faculty discount plan will replace the old 10-per-cent discount, which University administrators termed "outmoded."

Edward Hackax, Bustyourmoney's boss, said, "The new discount plan is probably unfair since students will have to be charged more for books, but there's nothing that can be done about it."

"There's nothing I, or anyone can do about it," Hackax, director of silly services said. "These things happen, you know."

Most universities have discontinued the policy whereby students subsidize faculty purchases, a situation which Bustyourmoney said "will make ASU unique."

"I admit the policy is unfair, but unfair to whom? Students? Certainly not. Even if it was unfair to them, there would be nothing I could do about it. God has willed it to be so," he said.

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

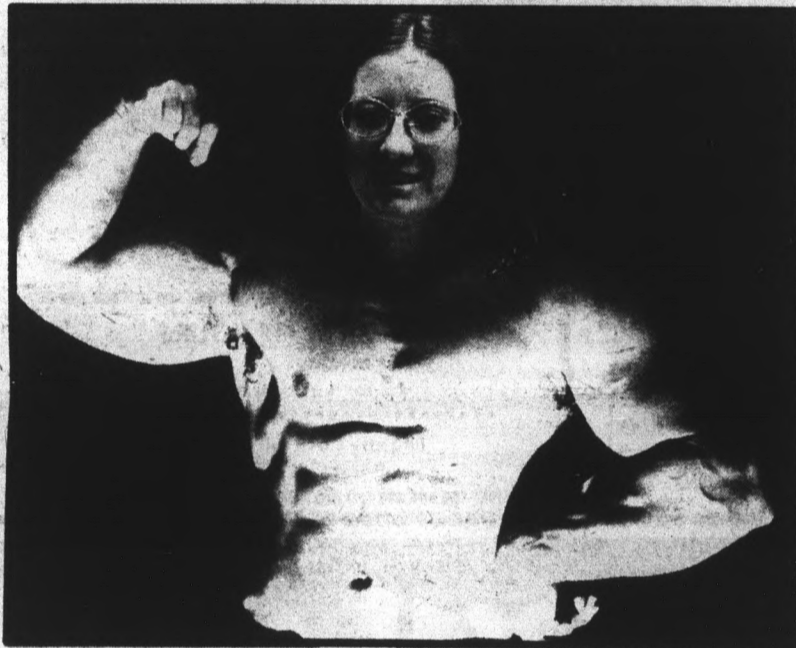
PIMPS press program pleases patrons

"Patrons will be able to sit and watch the shows from the Lyceum parking lot," Fellingsome said. "We can hook up drive-in speakers."

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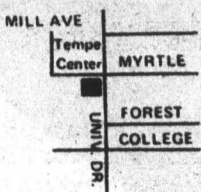
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Mayor of Tempe to give footballers honorary awards

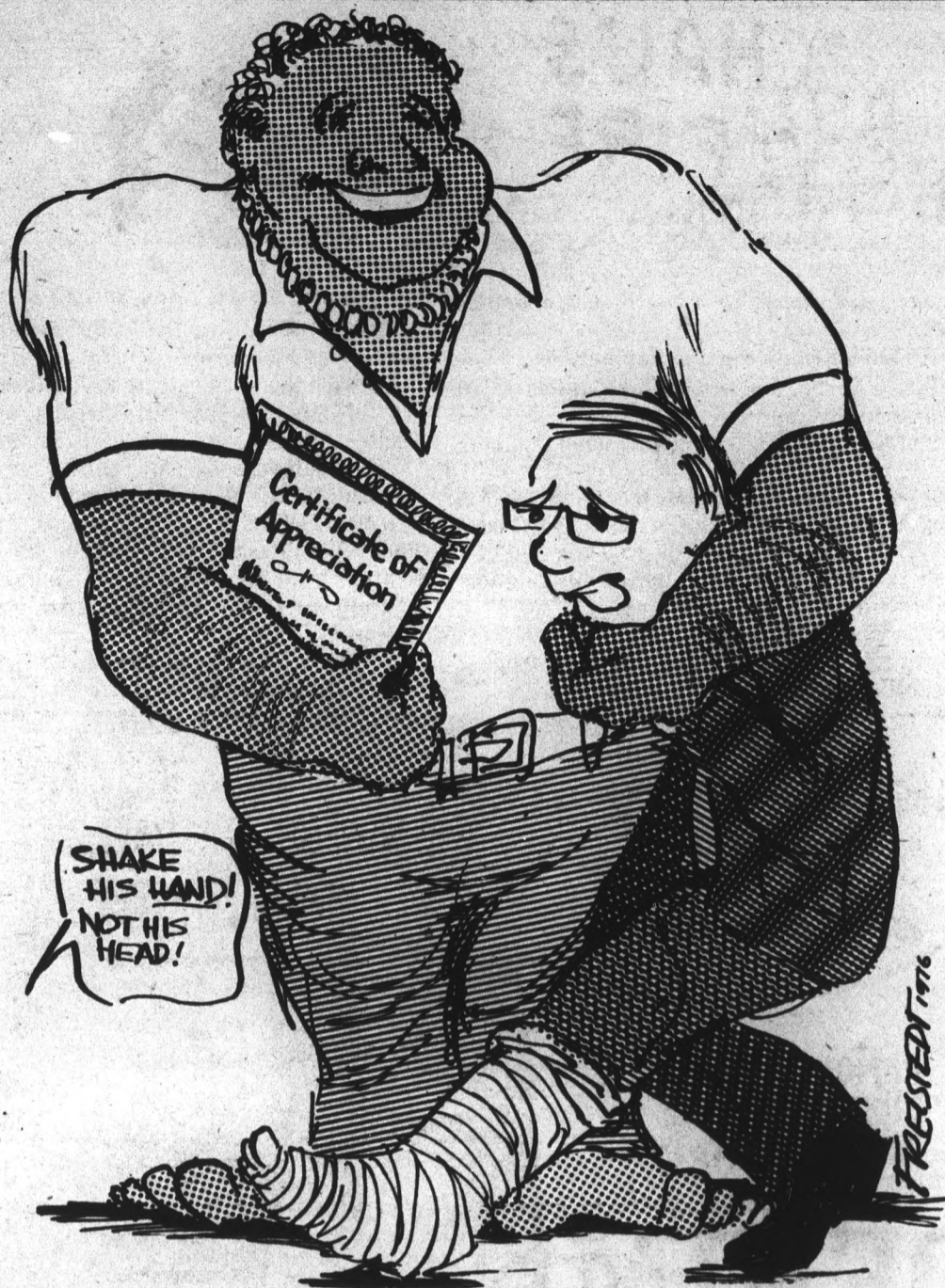

As Lucifer spoke, a small tin can fell from his pocket. A green grasshopper leaped out when it hit the ground.

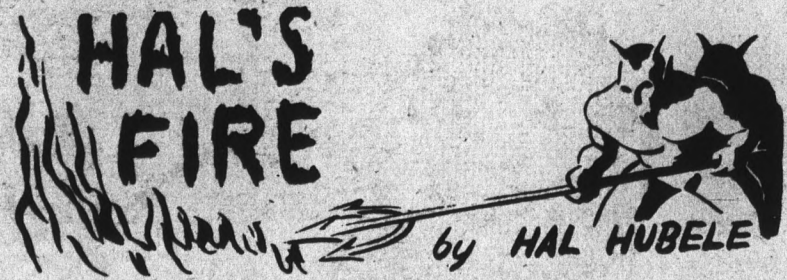
"Don't do it, Jim!" wailed the grasshopper, moments before Lucifer hurriedly scooped it back into the can and returned it to his pocket.

"It got a little rough there, though when the UCLANS dynamited the butte after each TD."



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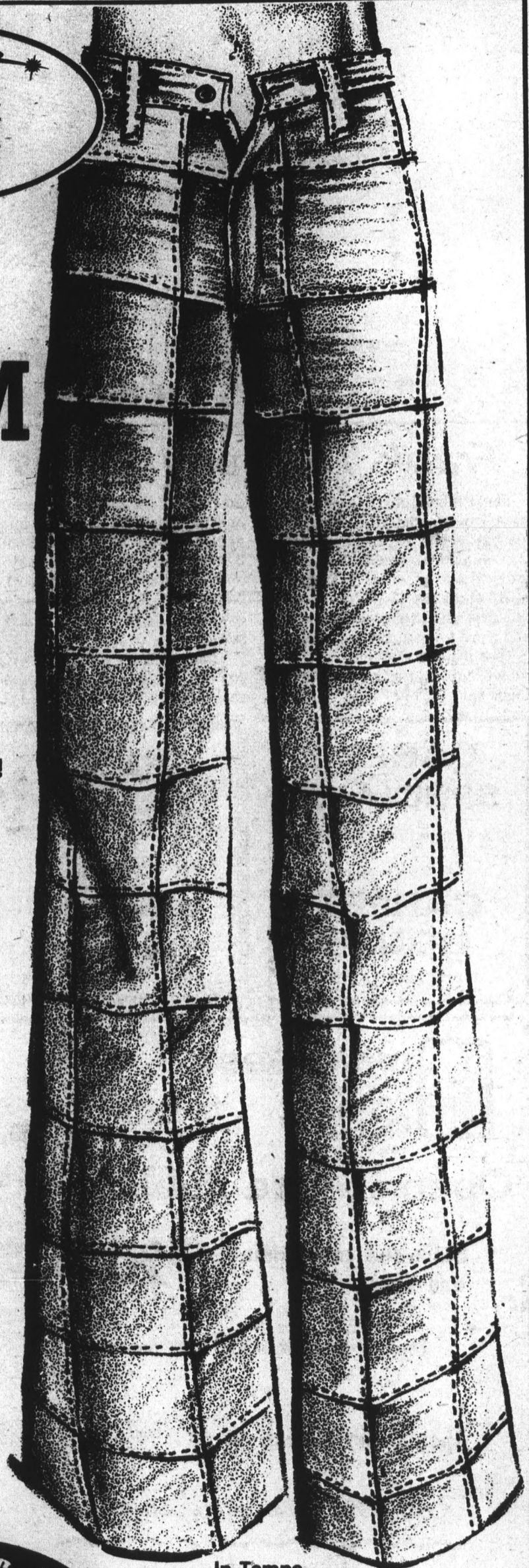
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
