Snap course offered for ASU journalists

Professors in the mass communications department have discovered a three-day snap course in "Basic Malicious Intent" that can be used by journalism students to guarantee jobs after graduation; the *State Depressed* has learned.

The department values the course enough to donate \$25 worth of yellow paper and red ink to almost 400 journalism students who

attended the seminar in the past year.

Students who want to earn an hour of upper division 'A' credit also can enroll in a highly popular class, "Guilt by Association," taught by tIRED, Inc., a group of libelous journalists who investigated the nuances of the reputation-killing business in Arizona.

Mass communication

department officials deny the class will insure jobs, but stress the class "teaches what every dedicated journalist should know and develop," seminar leader Bruce Itule told the *State Depressed*.

The one hour of 'A' credit enabled former *State Depressed* reporter Flack Gazelle to weasel a job out of the tIRED, Inc., group, currently investigating the

organized crime connections of Soggy Foods, he said.

Itule, infamous professor in the journalism department, said the class is impossible to flunk because he writes all the stories.

"I have an extensive background in the finer points of libel, misquotation and gutless journalism," Itule said. "Having worked for the *State Depressed* and the *Phoenix Gazoo*, I can

transmit years of experience to these naive and well-intentioned journalists."

Itule denied the seminar was used by students to obtain an hour of 'A' credit. He claimed the course merely taught students to be more aware of their abilities and to set goals for themselves, using scare tactics, thinly veiled threats and coercion.

Committee update on parking probe

On Dec. 27, 1976, the Ad Hoc Parking Committee released a 26-page report on parking problems at ASU. The committee made recommendations to solve those problems.

Though the committee diligently tried to shorten the voluminous original version into its present 26-page form, it did leave out several interesting points you should be aware of.

After many painstaking hours of reading through volumes of the report, this still slightly abridged version may give the student body more insight into the report. Here are excerpts:

GENERAL CONCLUSIONS

A parking decal or a temporary permit does not guarantee the availability of a parking space, but ask what you can do for your campus.

GENERAL POLICY RECOMMENDATIONS

When the 33rd parking violation occurs, his vehicle may be impounded or awarded to the fine arts department for sculpture.

Students will be asked to use blue cars and park in the "blue lot." Faculty will use the "red lot," with correspondingly colored cars. Staff will use the "raw sienna" lots

RECOMMENDED ALTERNATIVE PARKING OPTIONS

F. Any person may park at a parking meter upon payment of meter fee, which includes one ounce of blood and a \$20 gold piece.

H. Compact cars will be permitted to use the ASU pool near the men's gym during its "empty period," January and February.

Cars in the pool at the end of this period are subject to undertow.

RECOMMENDATION - PARKING METERS

There will be 109 different meter terms and rates. These will include: 9:40 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. meters, taking 200 pesos; 11:40 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. meters, taking four pounds sterling, and the 6:40 to 9:30 p.m. meter, taking 350 kopecks.

Tentative meter locations will be lots 11, 16 and 21, the pool, Australia, England and Taiwan.

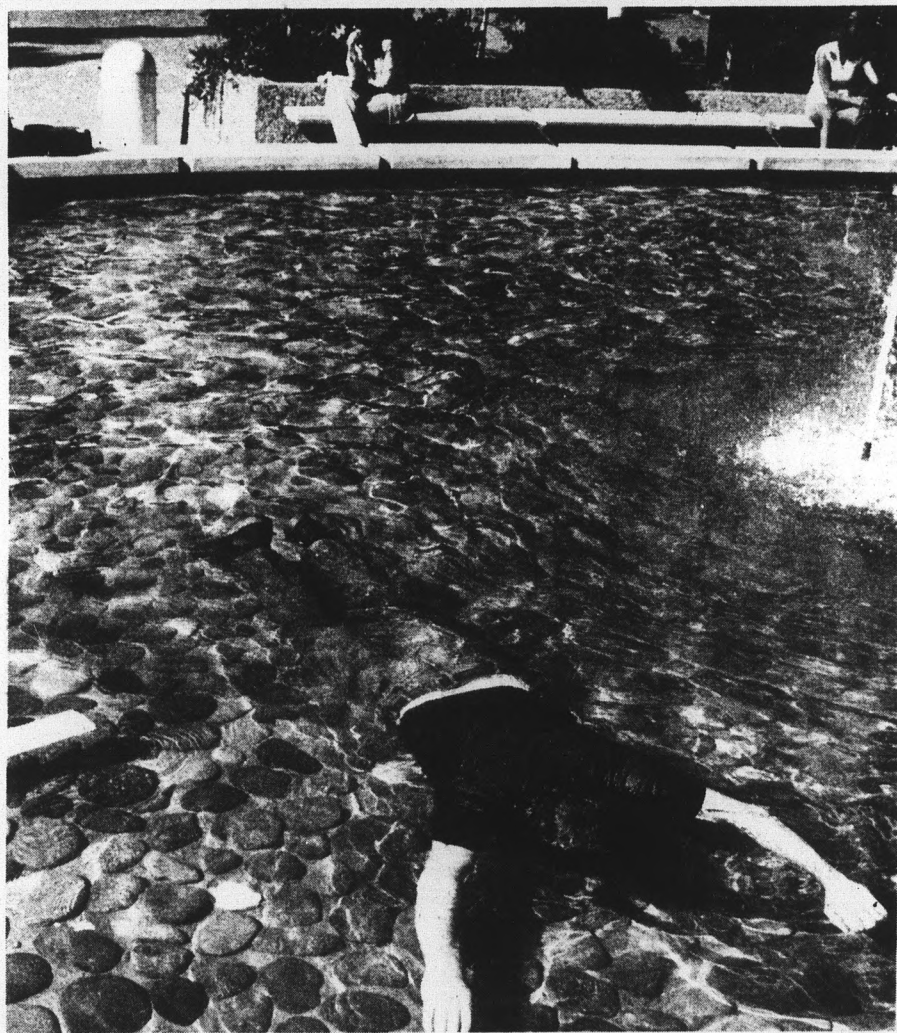

A *State Depressed* reporter has become the second Valley newsman in one year to suffer a violent death under mysterious circumstances.

Flack Gazelle, 29, was found floating face down at 3:40 p.m. in the Cady Mall fountain by a senior recreation major who went into the water to retrieve her Frisbee.

University police said there has been no confirmation of allegations made by the *State Depressed* that Gazelle was murdered.

State Depressed Editor Stan Dinkel said Gazelle was on his way to a secret rendezvous with an informer when he was found drowned.

"We recovered his notebook from the fountain and are attempting to decipher his illegible scrawl to see if there are any clues to the identity of his killer," Dinkel said.

"Flack was a hell of a reporter, even though he was irresponsible and acted like a real asshole at times."

Gazelle's corpse was taken to Dumpy Hospital where an autopsy was performed. Doctors said they found no marks on the body, and the only extensive organ damage was to the liver.

This discovery suggests Gazelle may have been given poison by the informer, Dinkel said.

"That son of a bitch would drink anything. He didn't care what it tasted like. A lot of reporters are like that."

BRONZEWATER STILL 'IN'

LOS ANGELES — Former California Gov. Ronald Bagle said in a speech to members of the Republican Big Ears Club that the conservative element of the GOP has not spurned Sen. Barry Bronzewater, R-Ariz., for his alleged involvement in Arizona organized crime. "No, I vehemently deny any shunning of Barry. The senator has, does have

and will have a definite part to play in reshaping the Republican organization, and as soon as we find out what party that is, he's going to rejoin the team."

U.S. AFRICA GET NOBELS

STOCKHOLM — Americans and Africans shared top honors in the 1977 Nobel Prize awards, which were announced here Thursday. Uganda's president VeDe Amin Dada, as expected, garnered the Peace Prize, while Rhodesian prime minister Ian Smith took top honors for philosophy. Former vice president Spiro Agnew won the Literature Prize, while former president Gerald Ford surprisingly reaped the award for medicine, in recognition of his swine-flu inoculation program.

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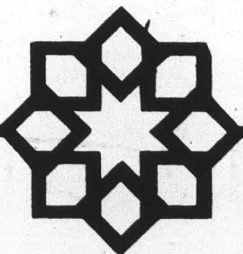

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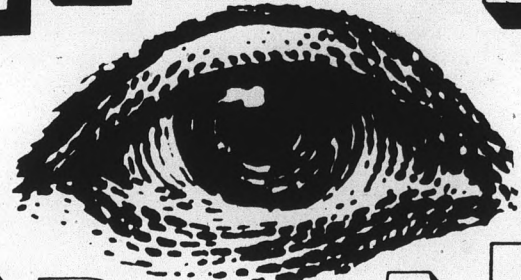

Big Daddy cruises campus; Uganda to join WAC in '78

President of Uganda for Life V.D. Amin Dada dropped in to see some old friends at ASU Thursday. He spoke at a dedication and said he had a whole lot of fun in the three days he has been in the United States.

"Oh, I loves dis place. I too would be an imperialist if I came from such a place," Amin said.

Amin came to Tempe from Hollywood, where he said he discussed a sequel to the documentary film about himself he produced three years ago. The working title for the project is "Big Daddy's Roots," he said.

"The people of Uganda send you all their best wishes," Amin said, noting there are still 30 or 40 Ugandans left. "I would also love to be president of such a place as Tempe."

Amin was driven in a motorcade from Sky Harbor International Airport to the campus. As his limousine passed Tempe Center, he squealed with delight when he saw a white truck pull out of the parking lot with a Volkswagen van attached to the back.

"Oh, Americans are so rich day bring a spare car wis dem so day can drive it when day tired of the other one. American Towing, such a funny name."

Amin's limousine drove through campus, past a crowd who was screaming at an evangelist, but struck a woman who was blowing a long horn and yelling, "No more nukes!"

The woman was later treated and released by the naturalist on duty at the Golden Temple Restaurant.

Amin spoke in Hayden Library at the dedication of the new \$2 million Wingback Memorial Reading Room and Athletes' Study Hall. He was joined at the dedication by football coach Frank Lush and athletic director Ferd Mauler, whom Amin called "two of my best friends."

He said the invitation to dedicate the reading room impressed him so much he would pay for the facility's television, foosball tables and air hockey games out of his own pocket.

The African leader's brown eyes sparkled when Mauler announced plans for construction of a hotel near Entebbe Airport, to be owned jointly by Amin, Lush and Mauler.

"Dis will help Uganda's athletic program very much to have the rest of the world know I have such friends like these gentlemen," Amin said, adding Uganda will join the WAC in 1978.

Innocent staffer injured

Bomb blast rips news office; athletics' buddy-pal suspected

An explosion in the State Depressed office Thursday seriously injured a woman employe.

H.I. (Bubbles) Price, an advertising saleswoman, is listed in satisfactory condition at Desert Samaritan Hospital. She is a member of Phi Zappa Krappa Sorority and the reputed girlfriend of the football team's offensive line.

The blast apparently was caused by a time-fused Molotov cocktail planted under the desk of State Depressed investigative

reporter Flack Gazelle, who had authored a story concerning athletes' grades. Gazelle was not in the office at the time of the explosion, but Price was not as fortunate.

Athletic department officials had been highly critical of Gazelle's story, saying it cost several football players a chance to win Rhodes scholarships.

University Police reportedly are trying to locate a local land promoter — who is a business partner of athletic department officials — for questioning. The

land promoter, along with two men carrying violin cases, were seen leaving Stauffer Hall early Thursday morning.

But the athletic department's academic tutor John Hayseed (a former Rhodes scholar himself), denied any involvement in the attempted killing by sports-related persons.

"Murder is against NCAA rules," Hayseed said.

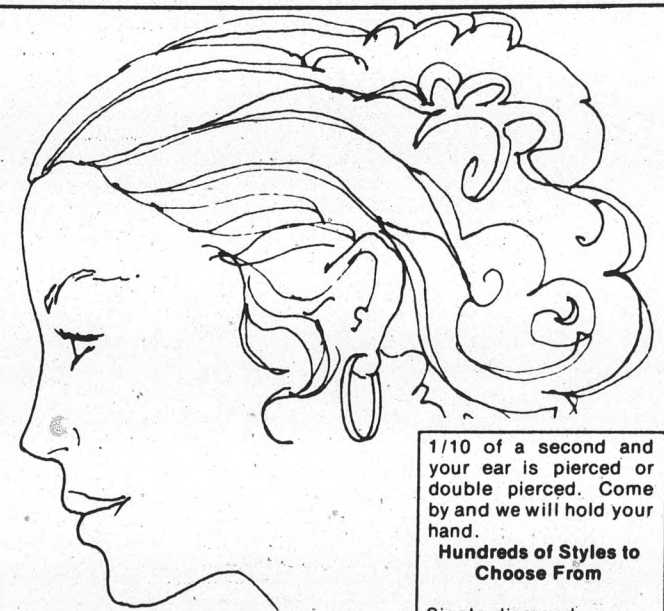

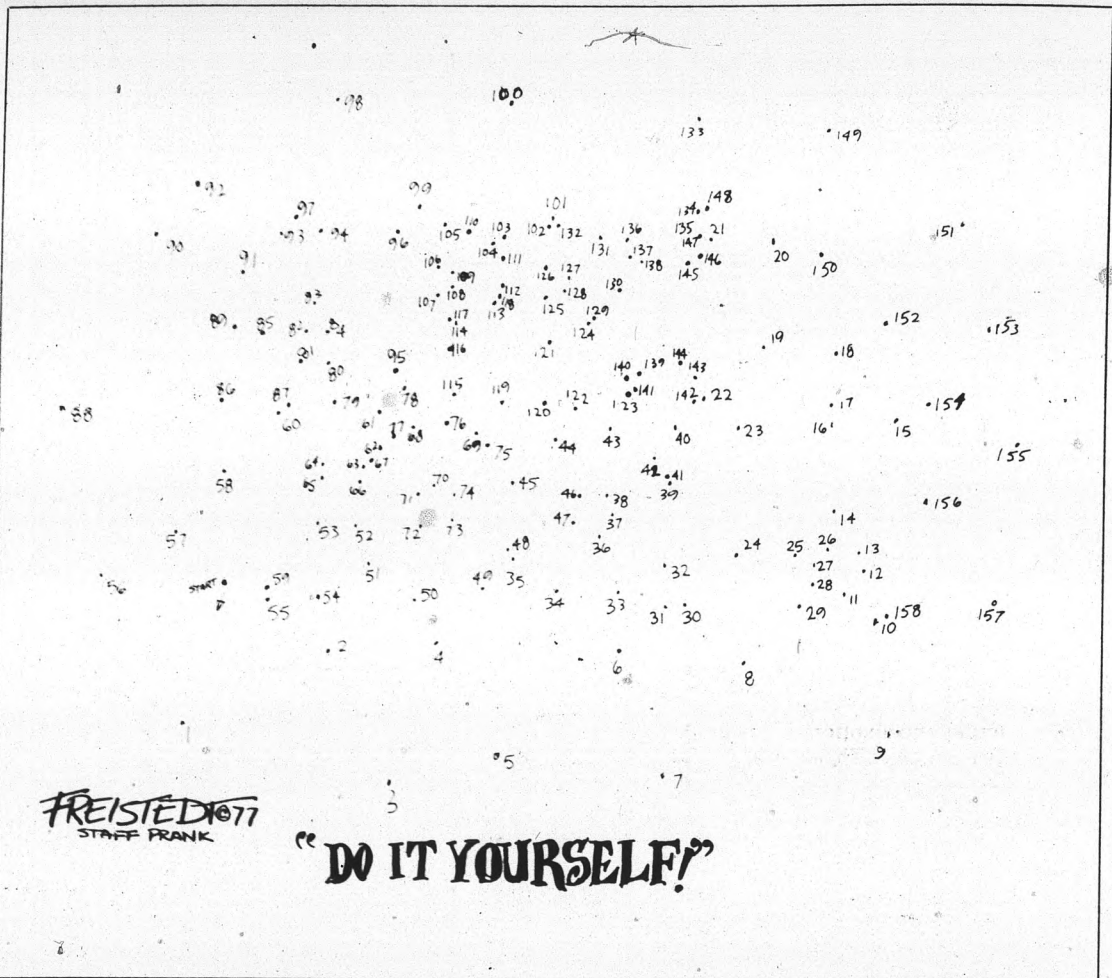

The customer comes first

Frenchie's Le Kwikie Massage and Billiard Parlour was rated tops in both quality of service and price in a recent survey conducted by Consumer Services. The price for a simple thirty minute massage was \$10, and the service provided was most satisfying.

Prices from all massage parlors are as follows: Frenchie's, \$10; Frankie's Kushy Soft Sportsmen's Retreat, \$12; Col. Slanders' Kentucky Fried Fingers, \$13; Lotta Love's, \$14; finally, Slippery Shwada's Presidential Parlour would not disclose a price to Consumer Services. Committee, of which Scobie is chairman, has found that Scobie cannot seek employment in the United States because he is an illegal alien from Nogales, Sonora.

Scobie acknowledged he rode across the border 10 years ago after jumping aboard a Rosarita truck full of taco shells. "They were delicious," he said.

Scobie said he heard he can find a job at Arrowhead Ranch, a local citrus farm.

He said he also will continue trying to accept his own appeals. He admitted that only once has he been able to break his habit of automatically rejecting pleas.

He said the case concerned a girl whose car was hit by a semitruck in the Palo Verde Main dormitory parking lot. After ambulance attendants took her remains away, an ASU policeman discovered he could no longer see the parking sticker on the back window of her car. He issued a ticket which was appealed by the deceased girl's parents.

Scobie said this case "had some merit."

Ancient records found by excavation crew

A new find at the recently discovered Hohokam Indian burial site stumped ASU anthropology professors.

Approximately 20 feet below the original find, excavators have discovered student records dating back to 1400 A.D.

"The find is invaluable, but we do have one problem — the Chuckles Amendment," said "Dirt" Mortenfind, professor of anthropology at ASU, one of the site's excavators.

"We've got the knowledge of the ages on those records,

but unless we get authorization from the students involved, we can't even sneak a peek," Mortenfind said.

The Chuckles Amendment states records are privileged information and cannot be disclosed without the student's permission.

"We're trying to trace certain families back more than 1,200 years, but we've hit a lot of dead ends. It's hard to trace these things. The tribe has been extinct for more than a thousand years," Mortenfind added.

Nichodalethrowup isolated

Rats expire from chemical found by eager scientists

The list of substances harmful when eaten by rats is rapidly increasing due to the discovery of a new chemical, ASU research scientists announced today.

Major items to be banned from the market by the Federal Drug Administration include green vegetables, fruits containing natural sugars and three brands of toilet bowl cleaner, said Dr. Richard N. Release, head of ASU's research team.

Test rats on a constant diet of the above substances have been found to walk on their hind legs and recite haiku poetry in seven foreign tongues before dying in agony, Release said.

The chemical nichodalethrowup has been found to exist in many substances to be banned from the market by the FDA, Release said.

Dysfunction found

Nichodalethrowup, ingested in large amounts, can cause many functional and dysfunctional body disorders, Release said. Some of these disorders

include spastic paralysis, nymphomania, hang nails and cancer, he said.

"Although nichodalethrowup has been detected in small amounts only in most of the substances to be banned by the FDA, we feel that banning them is the only safe way to be sure," Release said.

2-month study

The two-month-old study conducted by Release and a team of 36 investigative reporters and editors and student interns from the nursing college releases a weekly report of its findings to the FDA for consideration. A total of 382 items have been banned from the market since February.

"The FDA must take responsibility for the health and happiness of the American people," said a spokesman for the FDA. "The only way we can insure this is to ban harmful products."

Far from complete

The list of substances containing nichodalen-

throwup is far from complete, Release said. His team is currently testing 200 brands of canned fruit and frozen pizzas, among other things.

"We are readying another list of substances to send to the FDA," Release said. "Right now, test rats seem to show an aversion to certain bread molds, chewing gum, turkey ham, excessive amounts of Colorado River water and different types of motor oil. The final results should be ready next week."

'Never be sure'

"You can never be sure," Release said. "We just want to be safe."

Dr. John Cock, supervisor of the research team, commended Release on his extensively documented study that is sending shockwaves through American society.

"And just think," Cock said. "Just three months ago we were ready to fire Release for incompetence. But just look at him now."

Lush is OK after surgery

ASU Head Football Coach Frank Lush is in satisfactory condition today after doctors removed a 250-pound malignancy from his right foot.

Doctors at Dumpy Community Hospital said Lush is resting comfortably despite sudden outbursts of obscenities and yelling, "All in all, I'd rather be in Philadelphia."

Doctors are not certain what type of malignancy was removed, but believe it may be a case of the rare Hawaiian Rocky disease. The malignancy resembled a loafing football player, they said.

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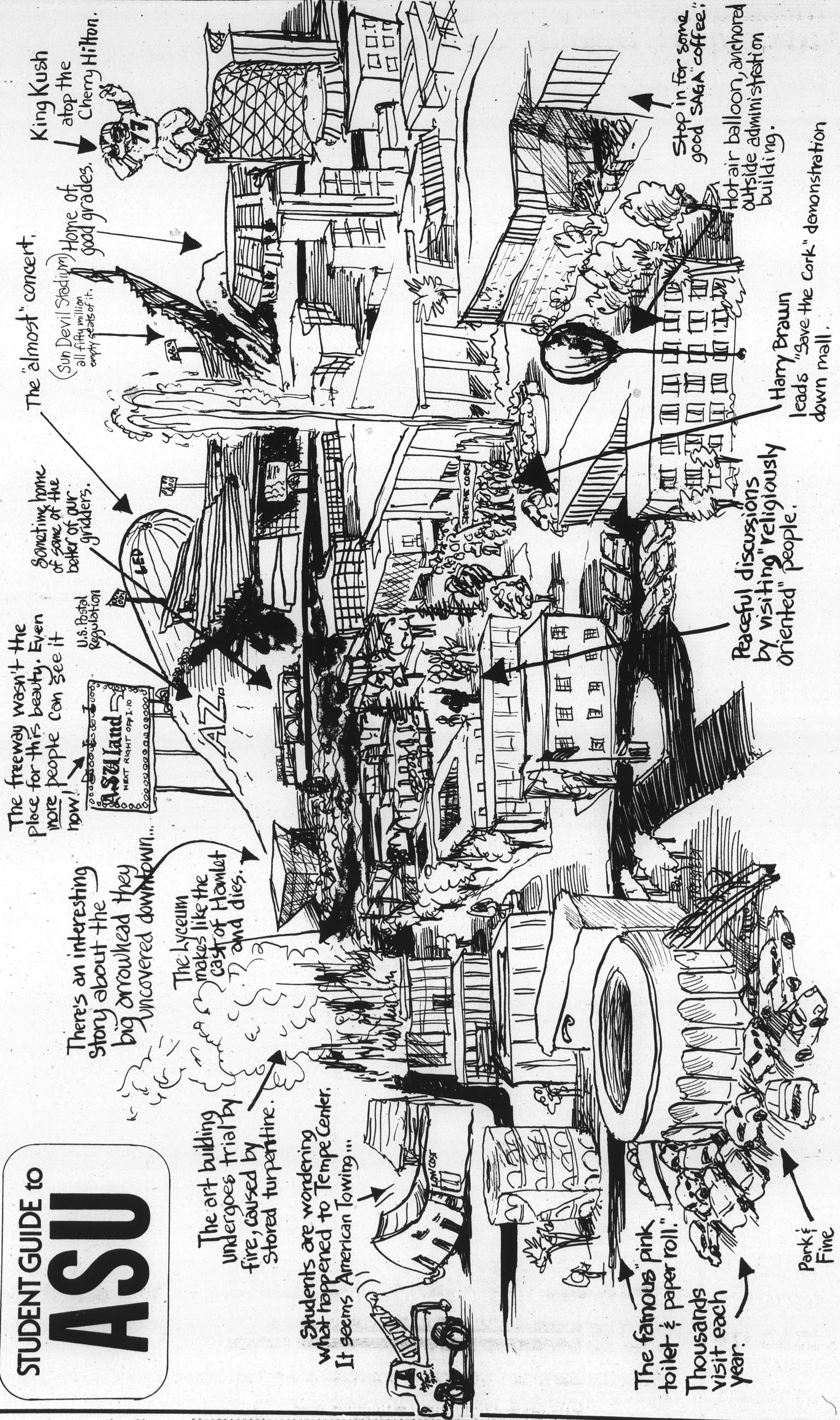

Cheapist's Rolls towed far away

The owner of Tempe Center, Milton Cheapist, had his 1977 Silver Shadow Rolls Royce towed Thursday from the center's parking lot after he broke his own infamous parking edict and crossed the no-man's-land of Mill Avenue to buy some gold fish for his pet piranha.

Cheapist's friend, Ray "Hook-em-up" Dudley, claimed credit for the hijacking of the \$30,000 car.

Dudley owns and operates Amerikan Confiscation Service and has been in the towing business along with his 1901-pound German shepherd, "S.S.," for 20 years.

Dudley credited a fantastic surveillance system which includes Rip-Off II, a spy satellite launched by VeDe Amin Dada

and two blind spotters who choose cars to be towed in an orderly hit-or-miss fashion.

"I make the owner of the car pay based on what I think he can pay. We like to use Gestapo tactics to get our money," Dudley said in a phone interview from his barbed-wire fortress in Tempe.

Dudley admitted his profits were more than \$230 million in 1976 even though his taxes amounted to only \$3.65. Dudley said he used shrewd business tactics to make his money.

An Internal Revenue Service spokesman in San Francisco said Dudley threatened to tow every car in the West if his taxes were raised above his 1948 level when he made \$28.86 as an informant for his father's towing business.

Officials told 'hands off ASASU'

An Arizona Board of Regents ruling passed today prohibits University administrators from interfering in Associated Student's allocation of student fees.

Regent Dwight Pattycake said ASASU officers have shown a good deal of prudence and responsibility in dispersal of student funds since the Arizona legislature's passage of the student fees bill.

"Students deserve to make their own judgments without University officials tampering with their plans," Pattycake said.

Administrators say their primary objections are to the most recent

ASASU projects. Included are:

—The recent construction of ASASU's official campus bar, "Flesh Devil." Administrators say their primary objection is to services rendered by the facility. Student officials argue for the bar's merit by citing the number of bartender, cocktail waitress, and dancer jobs for students, along with other money-making opportunities inherent in such a business.

—April purchase of the Erotica motel in Phoenix. Dave Rotten, ASASU president, has not yet announced plans for the Erotica, but says he intends to wait for the state legislature to grant students legal immunity for all fund-

raising activities.

—A joint contracting of Acne Construction Co. with Ferd Mauler, ASU athletic director, and head football coach Frank Lush to build an affiliation to "Flesh Devil" on the corner of University and Rural, off the ASU campus. Plans for the facility have not been finalized, but a hotel-gambling casino-massage parlor-adult book store-athletic training complex is under consideration.

Dr. George Shamm, vice president for student affairs, said he objects to ASASU's projects because college students should not be exposed to vices such as sex and liquor while pursuing

vigorous courses of study.

Pattycake defended ASASU's actions. "I am pleased to see students at ASU complementing their study programs with healthy activities," Pattycake said, "and will support ASASU to the extent of my ability in their quest to ease the terrible burden placed on students by reducing graduation credit requirements to 20."

Pattycake and his self-proclaimed best friend, Tempter Parley, millionaire owner of a Phoenix car demolition service company, are frequent visitors at the "Flesh Devil."

"I think it is in the primary interest of all students for me to come down to their level and communicate," Pattycake said.

Tightened security needed for ASU athlete's protection

Security will be tightened at all ASU athletic events next year to protect the athletes, the manager of ticket sales said Thursday.

Terry Wxzcjtlewitch said the new security measures are necessary because of the animosity shown towards athletes this year.

"During both the football and basketball seasons there were frequent shouts of, 'Kill the bums.' Dr. Mauler and I just want to make sure this doesn't actually happen.

"We are trying to keep the athletes and students separate," he said. "That way, no one will ever be able to mistake an athlete for a student and vice versa."

Wxzcjtlewitch said the new safety measures will make the gates at the Activity Center and Sun Devil Stadium look much like security in an airport.

"We will have metal detectors for each fan that enters a gate. In addition there will be armed guards at the gates and scattered randomly throughout the crowd.

"We are currently negotiating with both the KGB and the John Harvey Adamson Detective Agency to find the lowest bidder to provide the guards," he said.

Wxzcjtlewitch said the students wishing to buy tickets must also qualify for a new fingerprinted ID card

before attending athletic events.

"No longer will simply being a student qualify you to buy tickets to athletic events. We will check library records. Those who have returned books late and had to pay fines will not get an ID. We can no longer have people with criminal records attending these athletic events," he said.

Wxzcjtlewitch said the athletic department would also check a student's records for traffic tickets, report cards (for unsatisfactory citizenship) and to see if he has ever been sent to the principal. Any one of these would disqualify a student from getting an ID, he explained.

Regents get plastered, receive jail sentences

The first day of ASU's on-campus liquor sales ended in disaster as seven members of the Arizona Board of Regents got plastered and started fighting over which school was cheaper, Heber High or Arizona State.

Campus Security had to break up the disturbance with tear gas and night sticks, and took the regents off to the cooler.

Police Chief Forge Hays said, "We will have to increase precautions now that liquor is on

campus because the older generation doesn't know the difference between Fun Devil Stadium and the true campus atmosphere."

Hays said the regents would be sentenced to five day sin prison and must listen to the preaching of the Rev. George Jed Smock. Smock raised minor wrath while he spoke on the evils of womanhood and homosexuality in March at ASU.

Angles want reform

Members of the Bum Angle Foundation, a benevolent charity organization which raises millions of dollars for the ASU athletic department, have unanimously adopted a resolution calling for prison reform.

A Bum Angle spokesman denied the action was taken in response to a series of newspaper stories dealing with organized crime in Arizona. The reports have focused on, among

others, prominent members of the group, including former Republican chairman Harvey Rosenberger and Judge Walter Cretin.

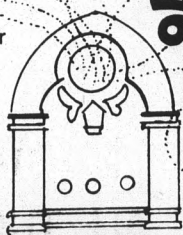
Another story, dealing with Bum Angel A. J. Promoto, who plans to build the world's largest dog track next to the athletic complex, was canceled upon advice from lawyers.

The talented editor can be seen on the corner of University and College at 8 p.m. nightly. Tickets are two bits.



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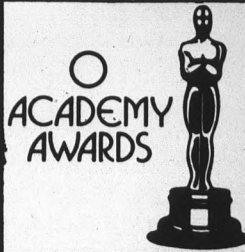

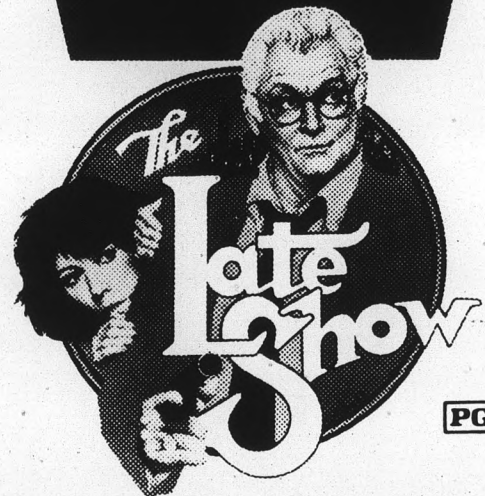

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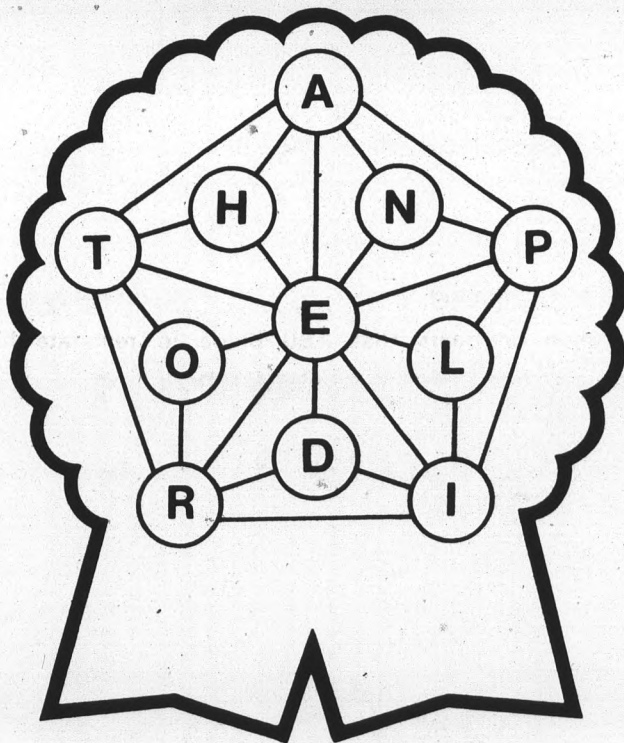
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Bulk bags basketball bonus-baby

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Academic standards here 'too high'

Pac-8 drops Devils, 'Cats

Officials of the Pacific-8 Athletic Conference have announced that ASU and UA will not be accepted into the West Coast league.

At a news conference held today in Los Angeles, Dr. I. M. Lane of UCLA read a formal statement which was signed by the athletic directors of the Pac-8.

"We feel that the academic standards the athletes of ASU and UA are required to meet are too stringent, and because of those athletes' academic prowess they would have an unfair mental advantage over our more typical athletes.

"The number of athletes at ASU and UA who maintain 4.0 grade averages is phenomenal. To earn such a high GPA the student-athlete must be studying. We feel the time spent studying will eventually be harmful to the athletic performance of ASU-UA athletes, as has been proven by recent research studies conducted by our own department.

"The power to outthink an opponent on the playing field can only be relied on for so long. Sooner or later the Fun Devils and Wildcats will suffer from 'paralysis by analysis' and will not be competitive with our teams," he said.

The action came after the Pac-8 officials had inspected the academic records of some ASU-UA athletes.

Although inspecting academic records is an invasion of privacy under a provision known as the Chuckles Amendment which everyone knows about but no one has actually read, officials of ASU and UA agreed to the inspection because they felt "it would enhance ASU and UA's chances of being eligible for the Rose Bowl by 1979."

ASU Head Football Coach Frank Lush said he was disappointed and angered by the Pac-8 decision.

"We have worked for years to get our young men to appreciate academe. It has been one of our goals to dispel the image of the 'dumb football jock.'

"We recruit our players

primarily for their mental capacities. Physical attributes are purely secondary. We want scholars at ASU. I can't describe my disappointment (at not being accepted into the PAC). If I were the 'dumb jock' type I would punch them out, but since I believe in intellectualism I am going to go read a book," Lush said.

The spokesman for the Pac-8 said the decision was final and would not be reviewed until June 3, 2005, but official observers say by then California will have fallen into the ocean anyway and the Rose Bowl would have to be moved to Yuma.

Mark Shovett, fullback on the Fun Devil football squad, said he felt the decision wasn't fair. "We deserve to play the best. Just because we go to class and study is not a good enough reason to keep us out of the Pac-8.

"Besides we want the chance to see the campuses in their

conference and hopefully sit in on a couple of classes. All the PAC schools have fabulous libraries and research facilities. It could be enriching to discuss art and philosophy with students from such a mentally fertile atmosphere.

"I can't say much for the athletes there. All they think about is playing ball and being cool. They don't spend any time studying. They really are missing a lot by not taking advantage of their scholarships. I'll bet some of them have 0.0 GPAs," he said. "Isn't that just disgusting?"

Dr. Ferd Mauler, athletic director at ASU, said he would not appeal to the PAC officials.

"If they don't want us, we will stay right here. We would rather continue with our standards of academic excellence than lower our standards just to be accepted by the sophomoric persons who run the PAC," he said.

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
