Rogers 'guarantees' most players will pass courses

ASU Football Coach Darryl Rogers said Wednesday he "guarantees" most of the players on his team will pass their classes despite a report showing that 82 of the 102 players received a mid-term semester grade lower than a "C."

The Deficient Scholarship Report, a document used by the athletic department to monitor the academic standing of team members, stated 34 of the 82 players are deficient in one course, 30 received notices for two courses, 13 are deficient in three courses and five received notices in four classes.

The State Press received the document Tuesday from an athlete who requested anonymity.

"I am sure these grades won't be the final grades," Rogers said. "These grades are only a warning."

"I am always concerned with how the athletes do academically," he said. "I know that our kids are doing better," than the report indicates.

Rogers said athletes who do not pass their classes will either take the course again next semester or during the summer session. Football players must maintain a 2.0 grade point average to remain on the team.

Many athletes face pressure from playing football and going to school simultaneously, Rogers said.

"I am the only one who really knows how these kids do," he said.

"I know this student won't finish with an 'E,' and this student won't get a 'D,'" Rogers said, pointing to the deficiency report.

He said the document is not always accurate.

"At least eight of the students listed are not even football players," he said.

One reason for a student to receive a deficiency slip could be a lack of a test that was not made up yet, Rogers said. Another

reason could be that the student dropped the course, or maybe never enrolled in the course "and the computer made a mistake," he said.

Rogers said he is concerned about the document being reproduced and distributed.

Deputy Athletic Director Frank Sackton said the document should never have been distributed.

"The fault is on the athletic department," he said. "There is one individual in this athletic department who is not aware of the Buckley Amendment."

That amendment, also known as the Privacy Act, protects students' privacy rights by limiting access to educational records without written consent.

David Bodney, an attorney with the Phoenix law firm of Brown & Bain, said the distribution of such a document violates the Buckley Amendment.

He said such a violation could cause a loss of state funding to the University.

"It has to be a regular practice of distributing such a document to violate the Buckley Amendment," Bodney said. "It would not be a violation if the distribution was an accident."

Sackton said the athletic department follows a specific plan of action when it becomes aware of an athlete having academic problems.

"When we receive the informal mid-term report from the colleges, we directly contact the athlete," he said. "We inform the athlete of the deficiency grade and inform him of a tutor to contact."

ASU Athletic Academic Adviser Susann Tomek is on a leave of absence and could not be reached for comment.

Sackton said Jim Ferguson, assistant athletic director for student services, is temporarily in charge of academic progress with the athletes while Tomek is gone.

Ferguson was in Oregon Wednesday and could not be reached for comment.

Research park contractor approved by city council

The Nov. 15 Tempe City Council approval of a contractor for the ASU Research Park brought sighs of relief from the Arizona Board of Regents at its monthly meeting in Tucson last weekend, according to the park's director.

After two weeks of delay, Reginald Owens told the board the council had approved an \$8.3 million bid by Bentson Co. to build the park's infrastructure, and construction will begin as scheduled in mid-December.

The park's infrastructure includes construction of roads and sewer and water lines within the park. Plans are being made to improve roads and lines on the borders of the park, but a contractor for those jobs has not yet been named, Owens said.

"(The regents) were very pleased that we had reached this point," Owens said. "Everything is fine now."

Approval of a bidder was originally scheduled for Nov. 1, but contractors said the time schedule was too rigid, so park officials moved the deadline back one week.

Delays in finding a bank to finance the bonds used to pay for construction caused the council to delay the approval by one more week.

Bentson Co. officials complained that the setback would delay the starting date

because there wasn't enough time to organize.

Owens said the project will still begin construction in mid-December as scheduled.

Doug McQueen, assistant director at the park, said a ground-breaking ceremony is scheduled for Dec. 4 and construction will begin as scheduled on Dec. 20.

"The delay was because of financial matters," McQueen said. "It shouldn't effect the starting date at all."

Arizona Gov. Bruce Babbitt, ASU President J. Russell Nelson, members from the Arizona Board of Regents and Tempe Mayor Harry Mitchell are scheduled to attend the ceremony, McQueen said.

Other city officials and park members are attending the ceremony, he said.

"Everybody who is anybody should be at this thing," McQueen said.

The ground-breaking will be held near the intersection of Price and Elliot roads at 11 a.m., McQueen said.

The names of the park's first three tenants will be announced at the ceremony, McQueen said.

The tenants were originally scheduled for announcement in October, but minor snags in negotiations caused the delay, he added.

For the major ground-breaking event, a live Christmas tree will be decorated and lit. The tree will be planted and remain a part of the park, McQueen said.

Law students win competition

A team of third-year ASU law students took first place in the western regional rounds of the 1984 National Moot Court Competition.

The winning team members, JoJene Mills, Timothy O'Neill and Ann Scott, will travel to New York in January for the Moot Court competition finals.

The regional competition, held at ASU Nov. 15 through 17, was set as a mock appellate court appeal.

"Moot court is a pretend courtroom case except you don't have a client who will hang in the morning if you do badly," Law Professor Hannah Furnish said.

Mills, who has competed in similar events before, said her team never won an event by more than five points.

"In the end, we won by about 2/3 of a point," said Mills, who judges named as the competition's outstanding advocate. Brigham Young University took second place.

ASU's team won after a four-round, double-elimination competition, Mills said.

"All of the competition was close," said Mills.

The case tried by the moot court considered a hypothetical situation: Should four Caribbean nationals, intercepted by the U.S. Immigration Department while illegal-

ly attempting to enter the U.S., remain in a maximum security prison because their home country refused to take them back and because the attorney general issued a regulation denying parole to illegal immigrants?

All teams were required to argue as both the plaintiff and the prosecutor.

O'Neill, the swing-man for the team, argued both sides of the case — working with Mills to defend the immigrants' rights, and then with Scott for the prosecutor's position.

Chief Justice William A. Holohan and Vice Chief Justice Frank X. Gordon, Jr., of the Arizona Supreme Court, and two judges from the 9th Circuit Federal Court of Appeals, were the judges for the competition.

Each team received 40 percent of their points for their written brief, with the remaining 60 percent riding on their oral argument, O'Neill said.

Mills said she entered the competition to improve her advocacy skills after performing poorly in a similar contest last year.

Thirteen teams from seven law schools, including those at ASU and BYU, participated in this year's regionals. Also competing were the University of Arizona, the University of Colorado, the University of Denver, the University of New Mexico, and the University of Wyoming.

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Official blames colleges for lack of humanities in education

WASHINGTON (AP) — Many American college graduates lack "even the most rudimentary knowledge" of history, literature, art and philosophy, and the blame rests with faculty and administrators who have lost faith in the humanities, a Reagan administration official charged Sunday.

William J. Bennett, chairman of the National Endowment for the Humanities, in a report crafted with the advice of prominent scholars and college leaders, called upon the academic community to place "study of the humanities and Western civilization . . . at the heart of the college curriculum."

"Most of our college graduates remain shortchanged in the humanities," Bennett wrote. "the fault lies principally with those of us whose business it is to educate these students."

By their "indifference and . . . intellectual diffidence," too many educators have abdicated "the great task of transmitting a culture to its rightful heirs," Bennett said.

He cited these statistics:

— The number of majors in English has dropped by 47 percent since 1970; in philosophy by 41 percent; in history by 72 percent; and in modern languages by 50 percent.

— A third of all colleges required some foreign language study for admission in 1966, but only 14 percent in 1983. And less than half now require foreign language study during college, down from nearly 90 percent in 1966.

— Students can graduate from 75 percent of U.S. colleges and universities without studying American literature or history; and from 86 percent without studying ancient Greek or Roman civilization.

Salvadoran government, rebels schedule second meeting

SAN SALVADOR, El Salvador (AP) — A second meeting between officials of the government of President Jose Napoleon Duarte and leftist rebels will be held on Friday, the top Roman Catholic Church official in the capital said Sunday.

Monsignor Arturo Rivera Damas, archbishop of San Salvador, announced the date in his Sunday homily, saying, "An agreement also exists on the place, which will be made known later for reasons of security." He said the site will be announced by Thursday and will not be in San Salvador, the capital.

Duarte has said he would not himself take part in this meeting because it is between two commissions which are to arrange for a second meeting between high government officials and rebel leaders.

Both sides recently accused each other of using the process for propaganda purposes. Both the rebels and Duarte have said they do not see the talks as a route to an immediate end to the five years of fighting.

Sources close to the government told reporters on Sunday that Duarte is to be represented by one of his chief advisers.

The church has been acting as a liaison in the talks, and Rivera Damas attended the first talks, held Oct. 15 in the town of La Palma in northern El Salvador, in an area that has been a guerrilla stronghold. At that meeting Duarte and the rebel leaders agreed to arrange another meeting for late November.

"We cannot have illusions that peace will come like a Christmas present," Damas said.

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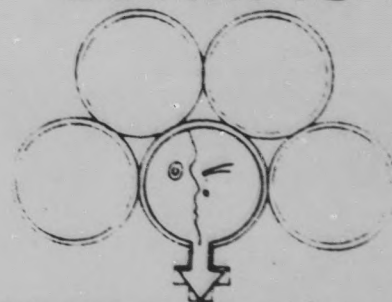
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ASASU Senate to consider CISPES funding request

If a vote taken Tuesday by the ASASU Senate Appropriations Committee is any indication of how the Senate will vote, one campus club representative said her group's attempt to receive funds will be "an uphill battle."

Sue Huppenthal, a two-year member of the Committee In Solidarity with the People of El Salvador (CISPES) asked the committee to consider funding some of the group's planned activities for the year. The committee was asked to fund honorarium, advertising and travel expenses for David McMichael, a former CIA analyst who worked in Central America and who speaks around the country about the Reagan administration policy in that area.

The committee was also asked for money to pay for rental for "On Company Business," a film Huppenthal said was shown at the MU Cinema two years ago.

The appropriations committee subtracted \$100 that was to go for the film from the total requested and voted 3-1 with two abstentions to send the bill requesting \$580 to the Senate for approval.

Earlier in the year, CISPES asked the Senate for funding, but was refused because of what turned out to be a misunderstanding on the part of some student legislators.

During the committee meeting Campus Affairs Vice President Nancy Parks said the Associated Students' policy is to not fund "extreme" political groups.

"I'm opposed to this bill," she said. "I do not feel that Associated Students should be responsible for bringing in this kind of speaker."

However, Chris Cumiskey, College of Public Programs senator and chairman of the Appropriations Committee, said he had been under the same impression at the beginning of the year, but later learned that Senate policy states they should not fund groups promoting the interests of a political candidate.

According to Executive Vice President Brian LaCorte, the Senate is advised on what they should not fund but can actually fund any group they want.

"We receive a legal opinion that advises against funding religious groups and groups that would promote a political candidate," LaCorte said.

"We have got to get out of looking at the extreme position of a particular group and look at what the programs are," he said.

After the bill was passed, Eddie Goitia, senator from the College of Business Administration, addressed the committee.

He said he has attended CISPES meetings and has tried to speak but has been "stifled" by Huppenthal.

Huppenthal said Wednesday she had not seen Goitia before the committee meeting Tuesday.

"We have small meetings," she said. "Lately we have had close to 20 attend. When someone new comes in, it's obvious."

She said, "I definitely would have remembered" if she had attempted to stop someone from speaking at a CISPES meeting.

A bill to give American Humanities \$335 funding to send a student to a required national conference in Kansas City, Mo., was withdrawn until further information could be obtained.

Participation in the conference gives one credit hour to a recreation major with youth services, which is required by the Department of Leisure Studies from every graduate.

The Appropriations Committee also approved a bill for \$86 for the Student Association of Architecture to publish a directory listing information on architecture students, professors and staff.

The approved bills will be brought before the Senate Tuesday.

The parents also attended the game.

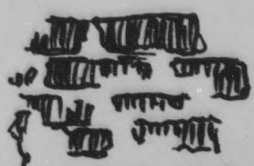
The day's activities apparently tired out the group, because most of the children dozed off to sleep before their parents arrived to meet them in the Law College parking lot

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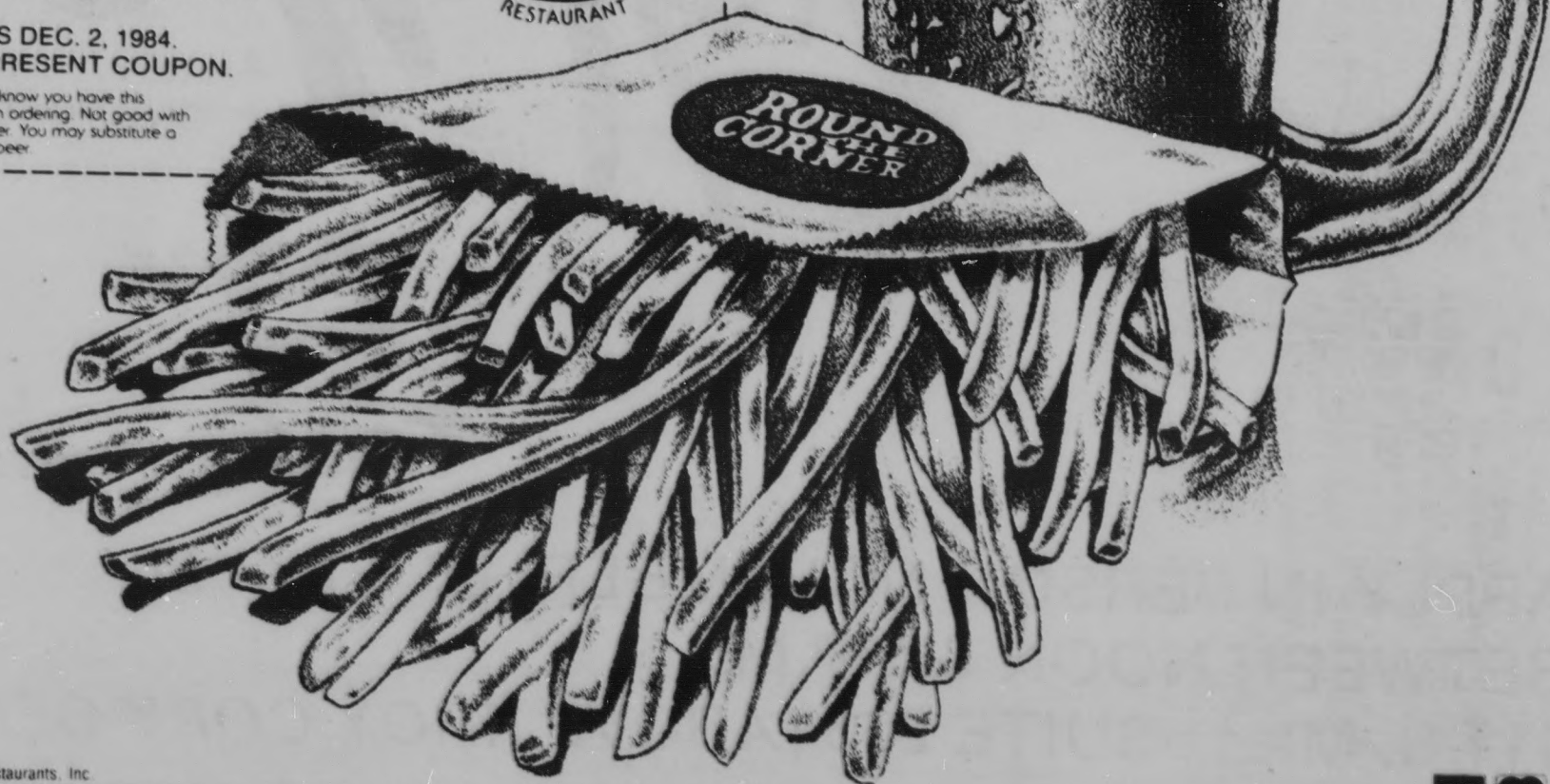
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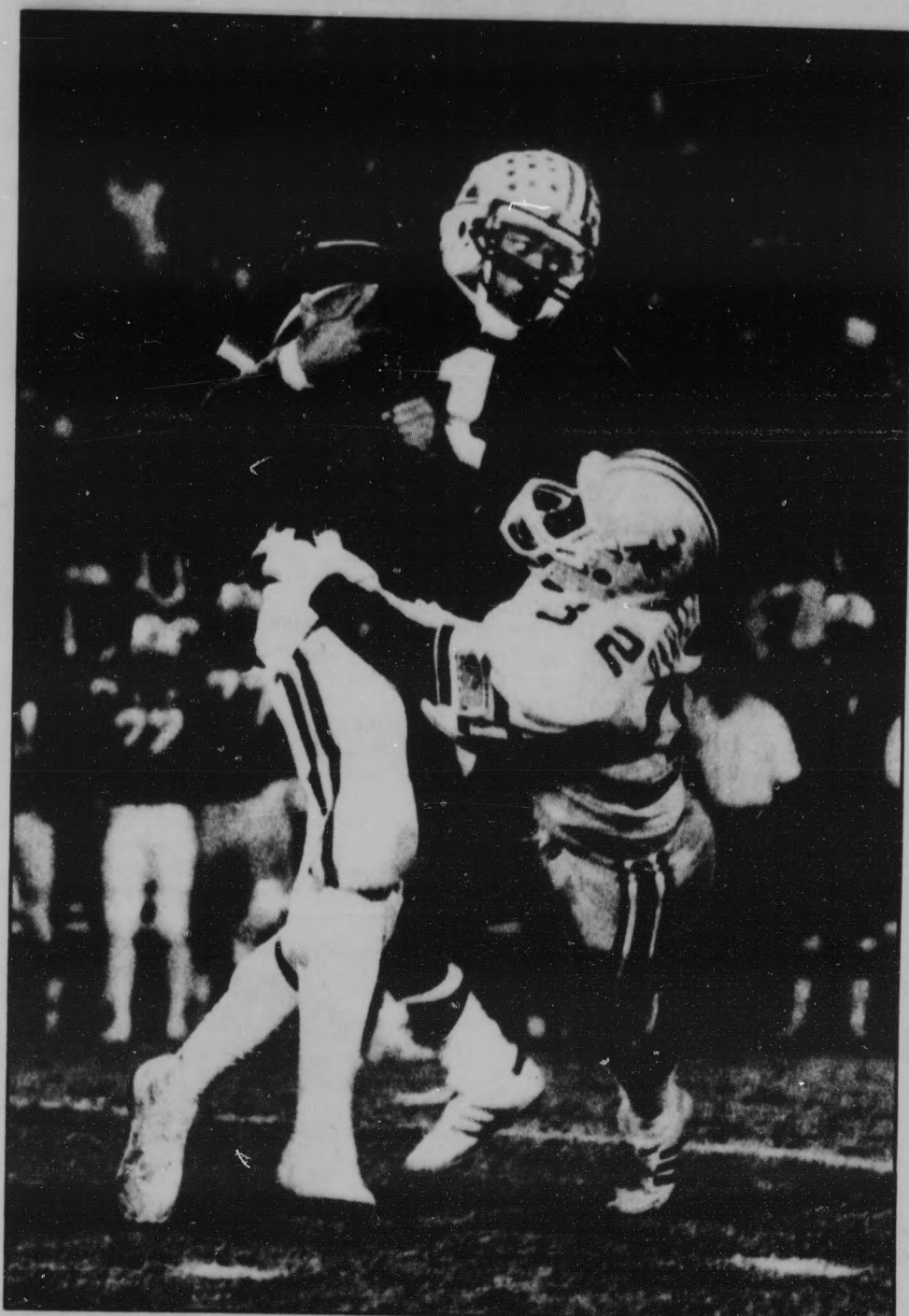


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Hat trick

Devil mistakes ruin chance for Tucson revenge

TUCSON — ASU football coach Darryl Rogers sat by his locker, cornered by reporters, with no visible means of escape.

Rogers answered the questions fired at him, but his body language was speaking louder than his words.

His expression was glum, his eyes were red. His hands worked over a plastic Pepsi six-pack holder, the kind designed to stretch out long before breaking.

He made mincemeat of it. Finally he hurtled it to the ground in disgust.

The facts rankled on him. Losing season. Three losses in a row to the hated rival. Wasted promise of a team once ranked No. 1 in the nation by some.

Rogers' Sun Devils had fallen once more, this time to Arizona 16-10.

"I know we've lost three in a row," Rogers said. "I know it (the loss) didn't endear me to anybody, including myself."

"I honestly can't say which one was the worst. I felt all of them were sick. I haven't felt good about any of them."

The Sun Devils (5-6 overall, 3-4 Pac-10) were in large part a victim of their own mistakes. They were intercepted five times, dropped several other passes, gave up three sacks and were called for three critical holding penalties.

Still the Wildcats (7-4 overall, 5-2 Pac-10) did not polish ASU off.

U of A held a slim six-point lead when the Wildcats' Troy Lawton had a punt partially blocked for the second time in the contest.

Arizona got a favorable roll, but the Devils still had good field position at the Arizona 43-yard-line with 3:20 left in the game.

ASU marched to the Wildcat 22, keyed by a fourth-and-4 pass play to Vince Amoia that went for 24 yards.

The Devils faced a second-and-5 situation with 1:35 left when ASU quarterback Jeff Van Raaphorst dropped back to pass.

Arizona's defensive rush collapsed on Van Raaphorst in the pocket as he swung his arm forward to pass.

Someone hit the quarterback's arm. The ball fell loose into a clutter of humanity. When the whistle blew, Wildcat linebacker Craig Vesling had possession of the ball for an interception.

The Cats then just had to run out the clock. Rogers said the primary receiver on the

play depended on the quarterback's read, but the tight end was open. And that's who the pass was intended for.

"I was looking for the tight end," Van Raaphorst said. "I didn't hang on to it. It didn't turn out too well."

Arizona coach Larry Smith was confident. "I felt our defense would keep it out of the end zone," he said. "Our players have character."

Van Raaphorst finished his toughest night since Oklahoma State with 26 completions in 44 attempts, one touchdown and five interceptions.

He threw for 302 yards, accounting for nearly all of the Devils' total offense.

Arizona, the nation's third-best team against the run this year, shut down the Devils' ground attack, which included 1,000-yard rusher Darryl Clack, who finished with 47 yards on 17 attempts.

"They were the best team against the rush we've played all season," Clack said. "We went to the pass hoping they would loosen up, but they didn't."

Van Raaphorst found Arizona waiting for passes to the wide outs. He turned to tight end Jeff Gallimore, who had nine receptions in his first start.

"It doesn't mean anything," Gallimore said. "We played hard and still lost to the guys down the road. That's the thing."

Arizona capitalized on the Devils' mistakes and got three field goals in three tries from Max Zendejas. ASU got a 52-yard kick from Luis Zendejas, but the older brother missed one from 49 yards.

"I think the kicks of Max made the difference," Smith said. "I think one field goal for them would have made a big difference."

Arizona got its touchdown on a 23-yard pass from Alfred Jenkins to Jon Horton in the third quarter.

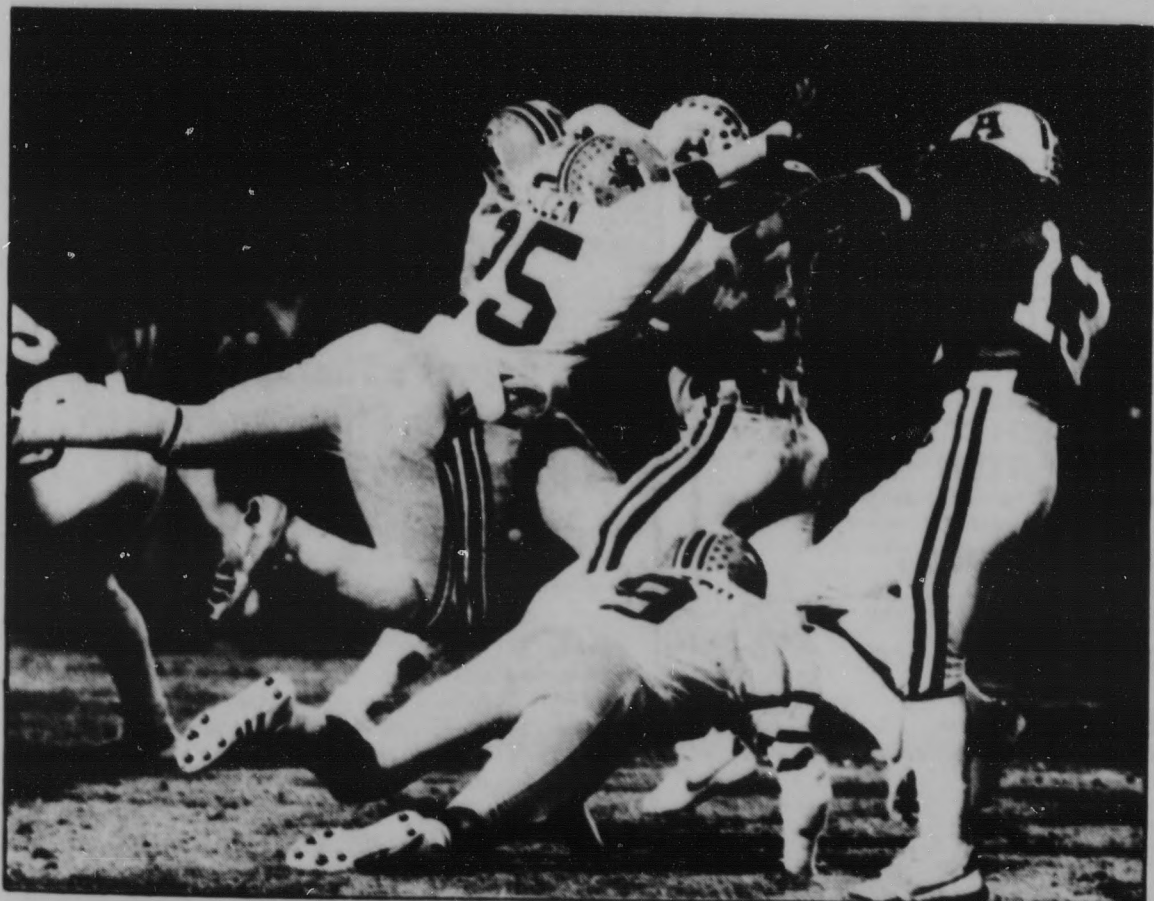
"I broke my route," Horton said. "I was supposed to streak, but I said to heck with that because I saw it open over the middle."

The Devils' touchdown came on a third-and-1 flea flicker in the second quarter. Van Raaphorst hit Doug Allen with a 44-yard pass to give ASU the first-half lead.

ASU's mistakes made the loss that much harder for the players to take.

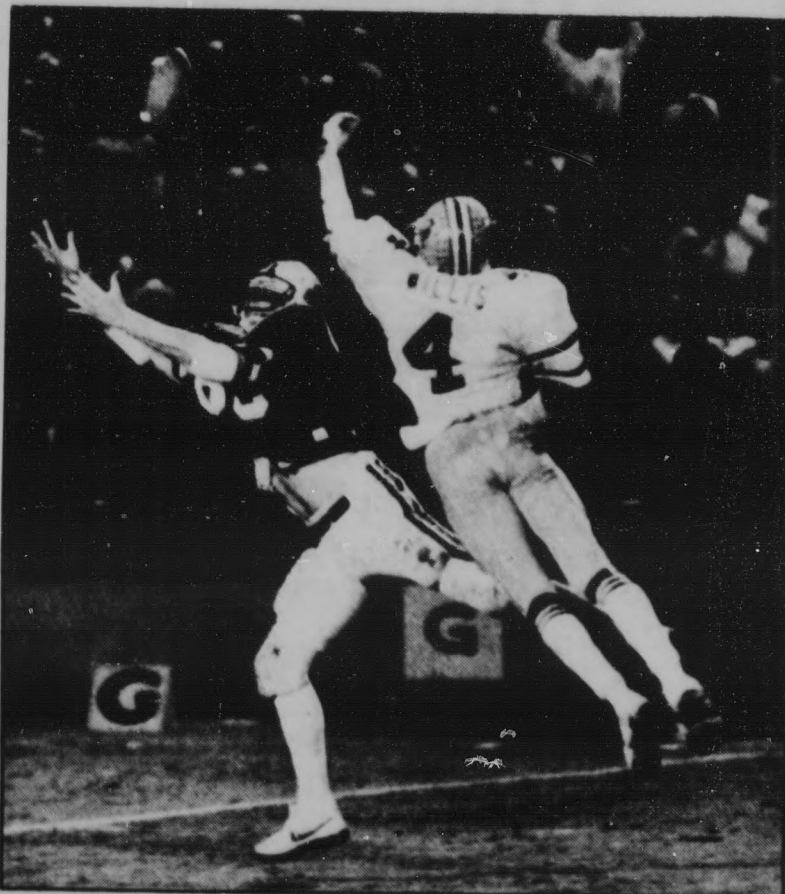
"The turnovers gave Arizona the field position," David Fulcher said. "We beat them. They didn't earn their scores."

Arizona now leads the series 32-26.

Lady cagers take 3rd in tourney

A 29-point outburst by guard Jodi Rathbun and 12 rebounds by center Camilla Mullertz led the ASU women's basketball team to an 80-57 victory over NAU Saturday in the consolation game of the Converse Classic at the Activity Center.

Coming within four points of the finals, the Lady Devils dropped a 79-75 decision to New Mexico in the opening round on Friday and had to settle for a third place finish in the four-team tournament.

Drake won the championship game, edging the Lobos 68-65 in a tight game involving 25 lead changes and 10 ties. Wanda Ford, the tournament's Most Valuable Player, led the

Bulldogs with a two-game total of 47 points and 40 rebounds. ASU coach Juliene Simpson said she was pleased with the way her team came back against NAU after struggling against New Mexico.

"We had a lot more confidence and a lot more discipline with ourselves tonight," Simpson said after the NAU game. "We were more calm. That had a lot to do with our leadership."

Simpson changed her plan of attack after the loss to the Lobos, deciding to stick with her top players for the NAU contest.

"We concentrated on staying with five people throughout the game and substituted very sparingly," Simpson said. "We definitely played much better. We rebounded better and we ran our offense and fast break better."

NAU stayed close to the Lady Devils in the early going, trailing 12-11 before ASU broke the game open, using the fast break to outscore the Lumberjacks 13-2 over the next five minutes.

ASU led 40-26 at halftime and eventually opened up a 32-point lead late in the second half.

"Tonight we turned everything into points," Simpson said. "New Mexico utilized all of our turnovers for points last night while we didn't score when they turned the ball over. But tonight we were the ones who were the aggressors."

Rathbun was hot against NAU, connecting on 10 of 14 shots from the field and nine of 10 from the line. Leading ASU scorers with 43 points for the tournament, Rathbun was named to the all-tournament team along with Ford and Julie Fitzpatrick of Drake, Alison Foote and Yvonne McKinnon of New Mexico and Julie Hanks of NAU.

"I'm very pleased with the performance of Jodi Rathbun," Simpson said. "Your point guard makes you go, and Jodi certainly made it go tonight."

Simpson said her players were apprehensive for the season opener against New Mexico.

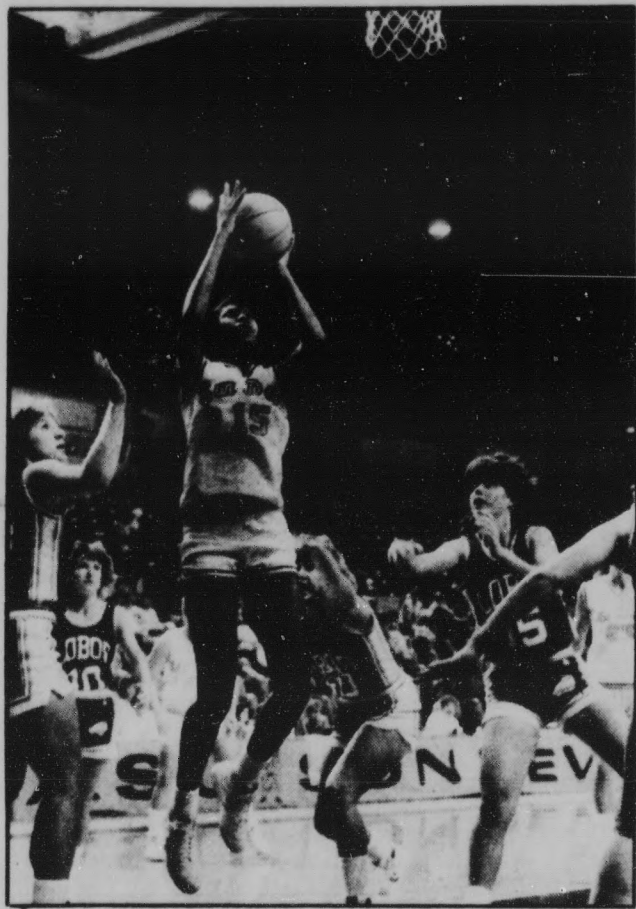
"I think they were nervous because it was their first game and we're going through a transition period after losing Kym Hampton (ASU's all-time leading scorer and rebounder who graduated last year).

"We're also a very young ball club and we played against five seniors out there with a lot of experience. That results in mental errors which turn into physical errors."

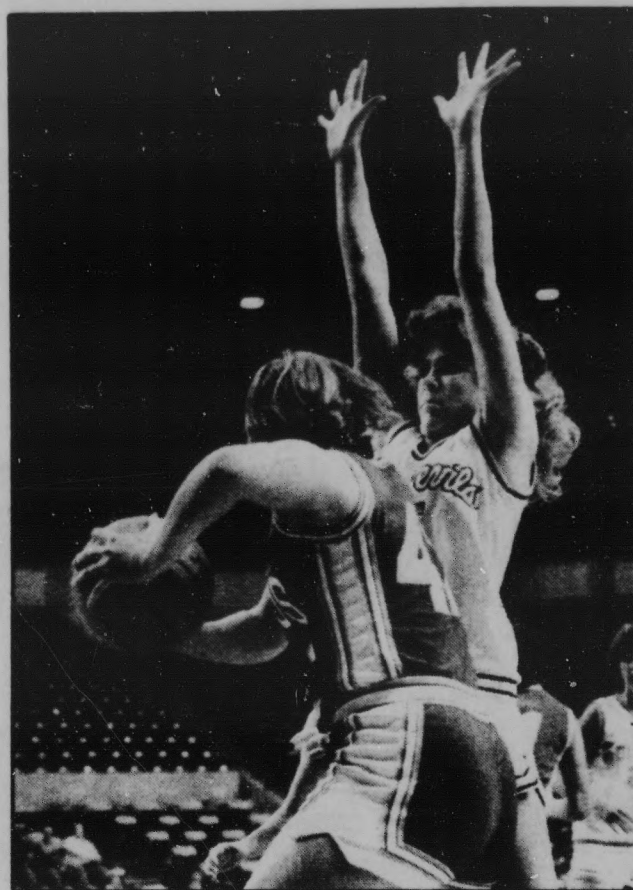
The Lady Devils dug themselves a hole early and played catch-up ball for the remainder of the game. Trailing by 14 points with less than 10 minutes to play, ASU staged a gallant comeback which fell short in the closing seconds.

At 6-foot-4, freshman Tanya Morris highlighted the comeback, tallying 15 of her 25 points during that spurt.

With 49 seconds left, Robin Connolly drove the baseline for an easy lay-up to bring ASU within one point at 76-75. But 18

seconds later, the Lobos' Tracy Satran hit from the inside to seal the victory for the Lobos.

"They did a good job fighting back," Simpson said. "They never gave up."

The potent duo of Foote and McKinnon directed the Lobo win. Foote scored 19 points and grabbed 10 rebounds while McKinnon had 16 points and 10 rebounds in only 20 minutes of playing time.

Three Lady Devils broke into double figures; Morris with 25 points, Rathbun with 14 and Sherry Poole with 13. Poole led the Lady Devils on the boards with 11 caroms while Morris added nine.

In the finals, Ford and Fitzpatrick combined for 45 points and 35 rebounds, leading the Bulldogs down the stretch. Drake took command for good with a pair of Fitzpatrick free throws at 3:33, opening a 58-57 lead. Neither team led by more than five points throughout the game.

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Committee tabs Bruins, Miami for Fiesta feast

The Fiesta Bowl confirmed reports Saturday by officially offering invitations to the University of Miami (Fla.) and UCLA.

Head coaches Jimmy Johnson of Miami (8-4) and Terry Donahue of UCLA (8-3) said they were happy with the prospect of playing in Sun Devil Stadium on New Year's Day.

"We're excited to be coming to Phoenix," Johnson said. "It's a great situation for all of us. I know (UCLA) is a great team."

"Myself, our staff, and the team are excited to be invited to the Fiesta Bowl," Donahue said. "One of the nice things is that this is our third New Year's Day appearance in three years. The only other team in the country to do that is Nebraska. It helps our football program to be in such a prestigious bowl game."

"We have our work cut out for us, but UCLA is the type of team to rise to the challenge. Hopefully, we'll put on a good show."

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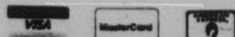
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Grapplers dominate Beavers

The ASU wrestling team utilized two pins and a superior decision Saturday to defeat the defending Pacific 10 champion Oregon State Beavers, 32-9.

Coach Bobby Douglas said he was happy with his team's performance, but there is room for improvement.

"There were some outstanding performances," Douglas said. "Any time you pin three wrestlers from Oregon State, you've had a great meet."

"We wrestle hard every time we wrestle Oregon State. But we're not where we should be in conditioning. Oregon State had the advantage there to push us hard. It was an excellent match."

After Sun Devil Chip Park lost to 118-pound Jamie Wise of Oregon State 9-5, ASU took control of the match.

ASU's two pins came in the next two weight classes. At 126 pounds, Gary Bairos took less than two minutes to pin Beaver Scott Jones. Bairos' pin meant six points for ASU and a 6-3 lead.

Marc Sprague made it 12-3 for the Sun Devils when he pinned David Boyle at 134 pounds with eight seconds left in the second period.

ASU took a 15-3 lead at 142 pounds as Adam Cohen defeated defending Pac-10 champion Cliff Berger, 7-6.

Although the match was close, Douglas said he was pleased with Cohen's win.

"Adam Cohen did a tremendous job at 142 (pounds)," he said. "He beat the conference champ. He was close to getting a fall."

ASU won the superior decision at 150

pounds where Eddie Urbano dominated Jeff Caldwell 17-2. The match was stopped with 36 seconds left because of the score.

Urbano said he was not surprised with the outcome of the match, and contributed his success to Douglas.

"I met (Caldwell) in the Pac-10 championships last year and beat him pretty badly," he said. "Coach Douglas tells me what to do, and I do it. The pin was in the back of my mind, but you can't force it. You have to disguise your offensive moves."

At 167 pounds, Jim Gressley lost to defending Pac-10 champion Pat Gibson, 3-1.

Douglas said experience was the key in Gressley's match.

"Gressley wrestled like a typical freshman. He was outexperienced. But he wrestled the Pac-10 champion. It's only a matter of time before he can handle it."

ASU put the match out of reach in the last three weight classes.

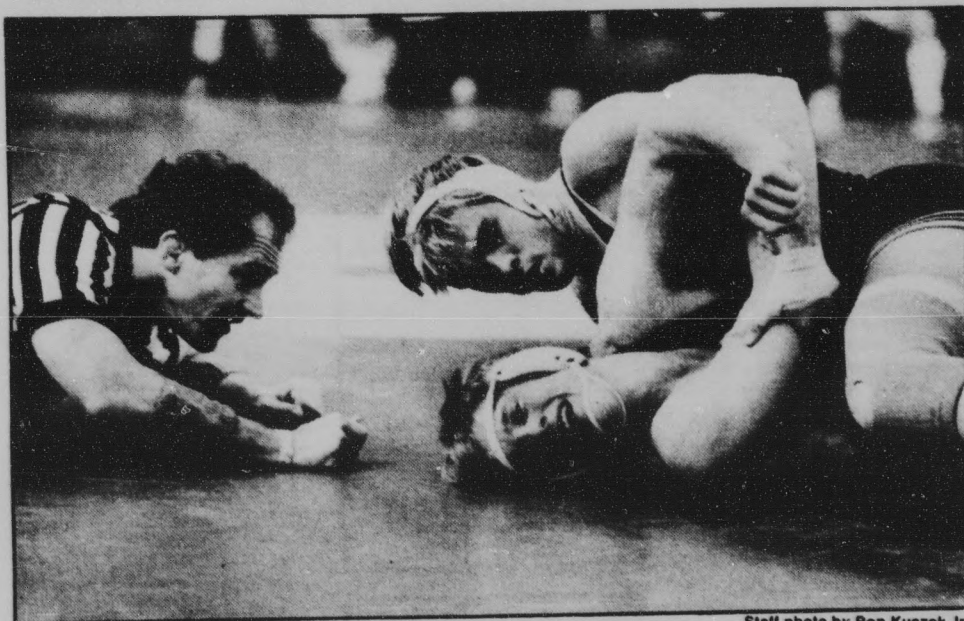
Tom Kolopus won the 177-pound weight class over Tim Mondale, 11-4. Mike Davies defeated Jeff Smyth 12-5 in the 190-pound class, and Rod Severn won the heavyweight division over Mike Mondale, 5-2.

Although Oregon State is the defending Pac-10 champ, Douglas said he did not feel the match was a true test of ASU's ability.

"Oregon State was not a really big test," he said. "At least 10 teams we'll wrestle this year are better than Oregon State."

That could be a blessing for ASU, who could meet OSU again in the Pac-10 championship match.

"This was a preview of Pac-10 championships," Douglas said. "They want to defend their championship, and we want to win it."
