Demos skipped Senate race for wrong reason — Kimball

A former Arizona corporation commissioner said Wednesday he decided to run against John McCain for the U.S. Senate because other Democratic candidates were declining for the wrong reasons.

Richard Kimball, in a question and answer session before 40 ASU students and faculty in the MU Coconino Room, said he is opposing U.S. Rep. John McCain, R-Ariz., because potential Democratic candidates felt they would not be able to defeat McCain.

"I know he is a prisoner of war, and I have read all the reflections and comments on his Vietnam experiences," Kimball said. "I have the sincerest respect for him, but if people vote on the basis on that respect, then they will vote for John McCain."

"John has a tremendous loyalty. I can't compete with that."

Kimball and McCain are running for Barry Goldwater's vacant Senate seat in 1986.

A former state senator from Tucson, Kimball was a sponsor of the Equal Rights Amendment in the Arizona Legislature and has been a supporter of civil rights and environmental conservation.

"Those are the most accurate mirrors of the things I have done and the job I will do in the future," he said.

McCain was a naval fighter pilot during the Vietnam War and received the Legion of Merit, Purple Heart and Distinguished Flying Cross.

He was shot down in 1967 and was held as a prisoner of war for six years.

Kimball said he does not believe in offering political promises but that people should judge him by his accomplishments.

"I am not going to run this campaign by getting into John McCain," he said. "It will be based exclusively on the issues."

Kimball said many people have written off his campaign because of McCain's popularity.

"When I entered this race four months ago, I was told the race was considered over," he said. "Because no one would run, I have every confidence that we are going to pull this off and win this election."

Because of his late decision to oppose McCain, Kimball said he has spent the last three months designing his platform, a process he said should begin before a candidacy announcement.

Kimball added that he will announce his platform later this month.

Kimball said he also considered his relationship with *The Arizona Republic* and *Phoenix Gazette* before making a final decision to enter the race.

"The R and G is the most powerful adversary a candidate can have," he said. "And they definitely have not been a friend of mine over the years."

However, Kimball said he has received fair treatment from *The Republic's* reporters but not from its editorial writers.

"The R and G and myself are sworn enemies," he said. "Their endorsement doesn't mean that much, but the long process of misinformation that comes from their editorials does."

If he is elected, Kimball said he would focus on balancing the federal budget by organizing government more efficiently.

He said he would favor federal legislation regulating the military like large Arizona utilities.

"Military is the most wasteful and largest unregulated government utility," he said. "There is no competition, no incentive to make a profit."

"You have got to force government services to suffer and benefit under the same natural economic system that other businesses run under."

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Committee kills legislation limiting length of regents' terms

PHOENIX — Legislation that would have limited Arizona Board of Regents' members to two four-year terms was killed Wednesday by the Arizona House of Representatives' Education Committee.

House Bill 2213 was defeated when a motion for action on the legislation was not seconded by another committee member.

The legislation, proposed by Rep. Sterling Ridge, R-Glendale, was passed up by the committee in favor of another bill that would shorten regent terms to six years.

The second piece of legislation, House Bill 2307, which was proposed by committee member Rep. Bev Hermon, R-Tempe, was held indefinitely by committee members and may be recalled for future discussion.

Both pieces of legislation were opposed by Regent Jack Pfister, who testified before the committee on his own behalf. The board has not decided formally to reject the legislation, but Pfister said he believed board members would vote to oppose it.

Regents currently are appointed to eight-year terms by the governor and approved by the Senate. If HB 2307 is approved by the House and Senate, it would not affect any current board members.

Pfister, who is also general manager of Salt River Project, said the Arizona Legislature should refrain from changing the terms of the regents because eight-year terms are necessary for board members to become acquainted with ASU, NAU and UA.

"One of the most difficult lessons I had to learn as a manager is 'if it ain't broke, don't fix it,'" Pfister said. "I would urge you not to fix something that is not broke."

The legislation stems from the reappointment of Regent Esther Capin to her second eight-year term by the Senate last week.

Regent President Donald Pitt also was reappointed to an eight-year term. Pitt has served three years on the board and was appointed by Gov. Bruce Babbitt to fill a vacancy.

Ridge said: "I have no problems with Mrs. Capin and Mr. Pitt. It's not a personal thing."

"I think 16 years is far too long for anyone to serve on the Board of Regents, or 24 years or 32 years as the law allows."

"If they do not prove themselves in four years then I hardly think they should be on (the board) for eight years."

Hermon said she proposed the legislation as a method of attracting possible regent appointees who would like to serve on the board but do not want to make an eight-year commitment.

"It gives the person enough time to become thoroughly familiar with the operations of the board, but shaves off two years," Hermon said. "I don't think anyone on this committee wants people serving 16 years."

But Rep. Jim Skelly, R-Scottsdale, said the term limitation may have an adverse effect on the board and the Arizona university system.

"That is why we elect a governor — to make appointments," Skelly said. "What do we do when we have a super, creative, dynamic regent? It might be a pipe dream on my part, but one never knows."

Skelly said he would support elections for members of the board, but opposed the bills limiting terms.

"You then prohibit people that in your estimation may be the greatest thing since sliced bread from being reappointed," Skelly said.

Ridge said: "Mr. Skelly, you may not be replaceable, but many of us are."

"There are many intelligent people in our state that would serve well on the Board of Regents. I don't think there is a monopoly on brains in this state."

Aquino warns Reagan about election results

MANILA, Philippines (AP) — Corazon Aquino warned President Reagan on Wednesday against supporting the National Assembly's expected proclamation of President Ferdinand E. Marcos as winner of last Friday's presidential election.

The assembly, dominated by Marcos' New Society Movement party, is to begin official tabulation of votes this Friday, using what the opposition has said are fraudulent local vote tallies.

"I would wonder at the motives of a friend of democracy who chose to conspire with Mr. Marcos to cheat the Filipino people of their liberation," said Aquino, who claimed anew that she has already won the presidency.

Reagan asserted at a news conference Tuesday night that the elections were marred by fraud on both sides, but his remark was disputed by several U.S. election observers who said they had seen no evidence of fraud by Aquino's supporters.

NASA still investigating cause of explosion

WASHINGTON (AP) — NASA insisted Wednesday it is not yet convinced a booster rocket caused the explosion of space shuttle Challenger and said both the rocket's manufacturer and space agency experts agreed to the launch in unusual sub-freezing weather.

At the same time, the space agency released internal documents that showed a history of concern with the "O ring" seals where the four segments of the solid rocket booster are joined. The huge

rubber-like rings' elasticity and ability to contain gases were mentioned as critical items to be looked at in several reports.

Attention has been focused on the seals because films of Challenger's Jan. 28 liftoff show a plume of flame appearing to spurt from the right rocket booster toward the shuttle's main tank loaded with volatile fuel.

"The cause is still an open issue," William R. Lucas, director of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration's Marshall Space Flight Center said.

Cyanide different in Tylenol cases, FDA says

WHITE PLAINS, N.Y. (AP) — The type of cyanide that killed a woman who took Extra-Strength Tylenol capsules last weekend differed from the poison that killed seven people in Chicago in 1982, the Food and Drug Administration said Wednesday.

Diane Elsroth, 23, of Peekskill died Saturday after taking two capsules of Extra-Strength Tylenol, at least one of which contained potassium cyanide, Dr. Millard Hyland, county medical examiner, said.

Tests conducted on two of three poisoned capsules found in the bottle used by Elsroth showed that the cyanide had a different chemical profile from the chemical used in Chicago in 1982, FDA spokesman William Grigg said Wednesday.

The FDA inspected the factory where the pills were made and determined that "there were no indications that (the contamination) could be the result of the manufacturing," he said.

Chayrez recovering after second implant

TUCSON (AP) — The first person to twice undergo artificial heart implant surgery remained in critical condition Wednesday but was "fully awake and alert," three days after the second implant, a hospital spokeswoman said.

Bernadette Chayrez, given a second mechanical heart after a transplanted human heart failed, slept well Tuesday night, said Nina Trasoff, chief spokeswoman for University Medical Center.

The 40-year-old Phoenix woman remained on a respirator, and a tube in her throat prevented her from speaking,

Trasoff said.

"She is continuing to gain strength. She is fully awake and alert. There is no sign of bleeding," Trasoff said.

She said doctors had not resumed administering an anti-coagulant to prevent potential stroke-causing blood clots from forming. Doctors believe the drugs caused persistent bleeding after the first implant, on Feb. 3.

Bleeding associated with the first mini-Jarvik heart forced doctors to perform the human heart transplant Friday, sooner than originally planned.

Chief surgeon Jack Copeland has said he plans to use the second implant as he did the first, as a bridge to another transplant.

Because the architecture of USC resembles that of an ivy-league college, particularly Harvard, it was chosen as the primary location for outside shooting, said Don White, assistant director of the show's film crew.

The fee to film on campus is \$1,800 per day for outdoor filming, and \$2,200 per

day for indoor filming, said Leslie Morrow, filming coordinator for the university.

The outside of the university's auditorium and library were the primary locations for the filming of the last episode, she said.

White said he loved working outdoors, and he felt the university students were an asset because they were "very cooperative and interested."

The film *Paper Chase*, as well as the subsequent television series, were both adapted from John Osborn Jr.'s book of the same name, and both starred John Houseman.

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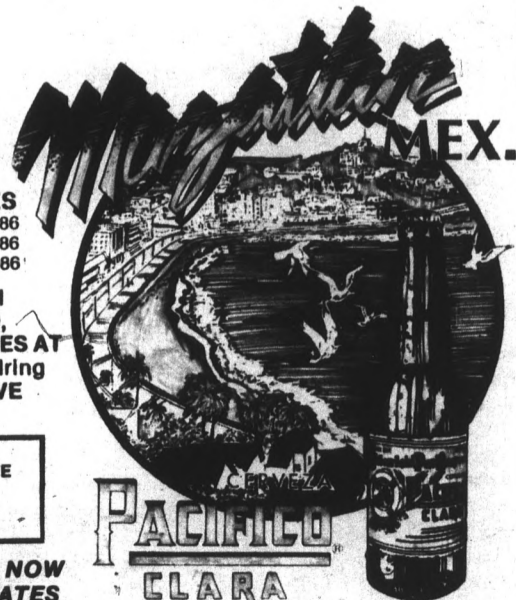

police said.

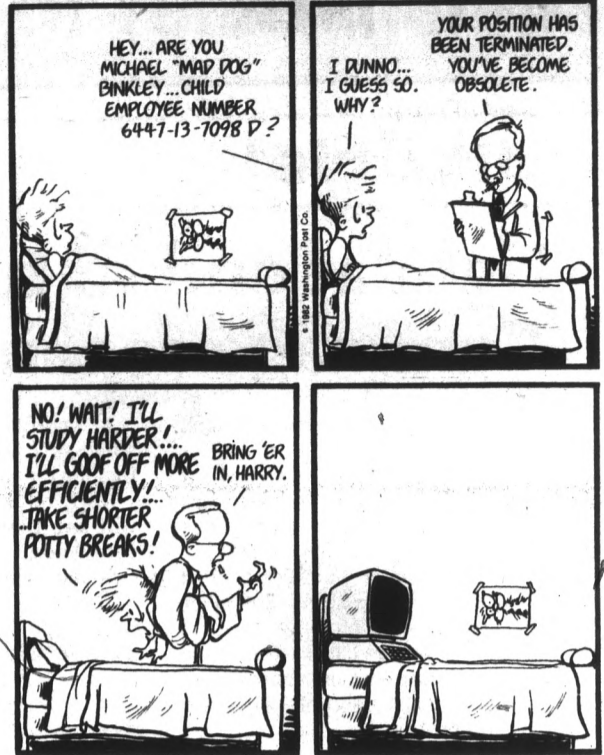
The owner told police \$180 has been withdrawn from her account at three different automatic teller machines since the theft occurred.

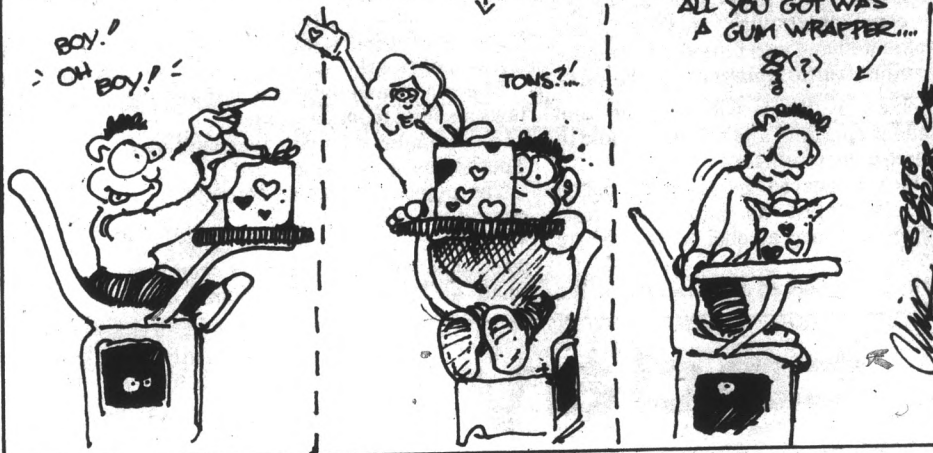

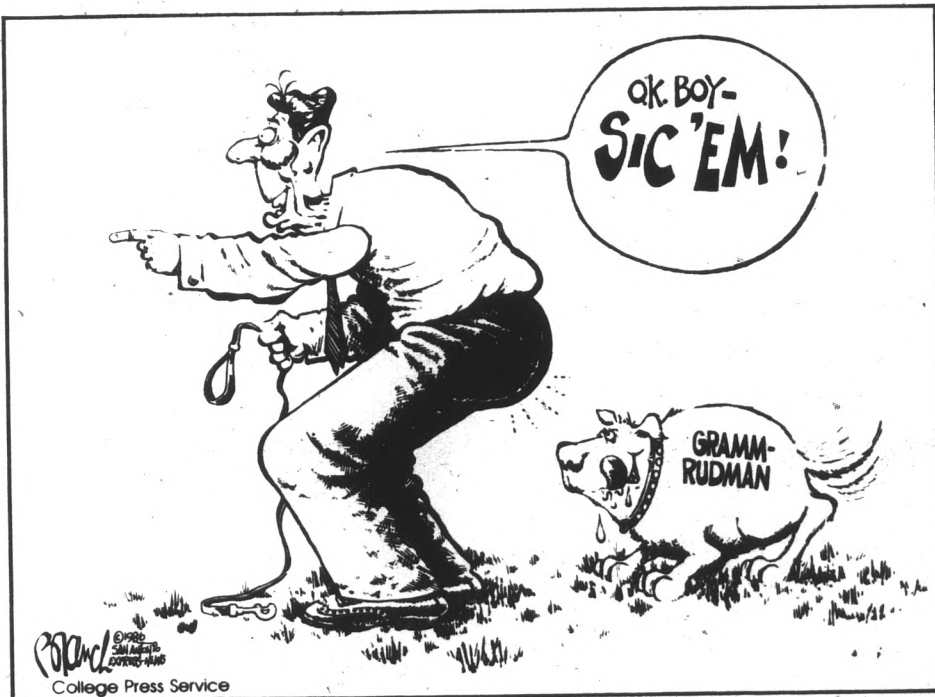
Attack on Union of Concerned Scientists invalid; falters under facts

Editor: Doug Newman's column attacking the Union of Concerned Scientists (Dec. 5) recently came to our attention. Mr. Newman dutifully repeated allegations widely publicized by Robert Jastrow and a number of right-wing columnists regarding a draft report we circulated in March 1984 on space-based missile defense. As is common in ground-breaking scientific work, erroneous assumptions were made. Two, in fact, were quickly corrected for the final draft of the study which was published as "The Fallacy of Star Wars" in October 1984. The mistaken assumptions concerned how many Star Wars battle stations would be required (if everything worked perfectly) to hit all present Soviet ICBMs. And, in a Technical Appendix, we wrongly estimated the weight of a particle accelerator which might be used for a particle beam weapon. Neither was important, which we knew at the time and

which has been born out in the two years since. The number of battle stations required to hit present Soviet forces hardly matters, since they will surely increase the size and alter the configuration of their forces to maximize the number of Star Wars orbiters. Indeed, the official "architecture" study, released last November and endorsed by the Pentagon's SDI Organization, calls for "thousands" of satellites in a seven-layer defense, not the 60 which Jastrow insists upon. The matter of the particle accelerator is also unimportant, since a particle beam is a very poor candidate for boost-phase interception and is receiving little attention from the SDI Organization. As perhaps Mr. Newman knows, all of Jastrow's allegations were soundly routed in our lengthy response to the "Commentary" diatribe. As perhaps he does not know, we granted many unreasonably optimistic assumptions in favor of SDI in our study (perfect aiming, no slew time from one target to another) which translates in our

being too kind to the Star Wars dream. The enemies of arms control are attempting to censor the responsible critics of Star Wars, even as SDI is itself wracked by scandal, failed projects, embarrassing public-relations gimmicks and wasteful bureaucracy. Star Wars will wreck the ABM Treaty and limits on offensive forces long before it can show a shred of technical promise. And it is precisely that result which the right-wing polemicists desire: the end of diplomacy and verifiable arms limits, and the beginning of ruinously costly technology competition with the USSR. That is a tragically misguided, reckless path to follow. The Union of Concerned Scientists will not be silenced in its determination to bring a sense of reality and common sense into this vital national debate.

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Commercialism battles true value of relationships

There's no getting away from it. The hearts, the flowers, the jewelry store commercials . . .

It's Valentine's Day, and since the beginning of time, or at least since the 1400s, lovers have been exchanging messages and gifts as symbols of undying love and devotion on Feb. 14.

Today, Valentine's Day is second in commercialism only to Christmas, with greeting card manufacturers printing more than 850 million messages of love per year.

But Valentine's Day has more in common with Christmas than the color red and commercialism. It, too, often is a day of depression for many people, reminding them of loneliness and lost loves.

"Society and the press blow Valentine's Day out of proportion, and for those of us who are not involved it can be a very depressing time," said Ginny Keller, a counselor at ASU's Counseling and Consultation.

"It's not exactly like Christmas, which is more of a family-orientated time, but it's especially hard for people struggling with relationships," she said.

Along the same line as the song that claims "You're Nobody 'Til Somebody Loves You," Valentine's Day teaches us at an early age that the amount of attention (or flowers or cards or candy) received on this day is directly proportionate to personal worth.

Who doesn't remember elementary school Valentine's Day parties, where the most popular person in the class had an envelope bulging with cards, while the less fortunate people disappointingly received only one or two valentines?

"Unfortunately, this teaches people that their value stems from other people's views," said Owen Morgan, an ASU human sexuality professor.

Keller agreed, and said, "That experience makes an impact on us, and we all still have that small child within us."

In a university community, where students are surrounded by their peers, those old feelings of jealousy and inadequacy may resurface around Valentine's Day, especially for people not involved in a relationship.

With all the people buying carnations on Cady Mall to send to their sweethearts, it's easy for a person to wonder if he is the only one who isn't involved.

Herbert Collier, a Phoenix psychologist who counsels elementary-through-college-aged students, said more of his patients express intensified feelings of loneliness and estrangement near Valentine's Day.

"If a person is between relationships he may feel much more lonely. Other people may be more independent, though, and ride right through it like it was Groundhog Day," he said.

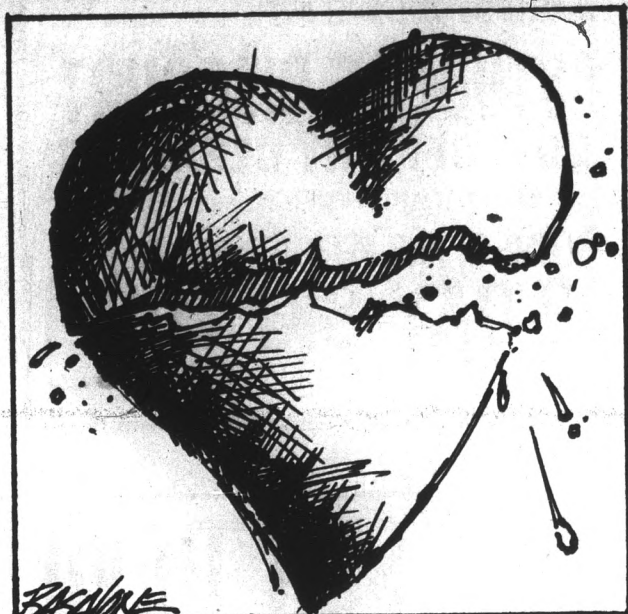
But Valentine's Day, like Christmas, should be a holiday filled with happiness and any depression felt does not have to be a direct result of not having a partner.

Keller said students can combat feelings of loneliness by realizing they are not the only ones who are feeling this way.

"They should realize that the feeling is not just within them, it's a product of what's happening around them," she said.

Collier suggested exchanging valentines with family and friends to satisfy the need to give and receive on this holiday.

Another way to combat feelings of depression is to gather a sense of self-worth from within rather than from other people.



"We're taught that you're really sunk if you don't have someone to validate you," Morgan said. "We need to learn to love ourselves first."

He said we need to reach a point in our lives where we can say "Hey, a relationship would be nice, but if I don't have one, that's all right too."

Morgan puts romance into perspective. "It's really important to understand that you can value something without needing it desperately."

With the top recruits signed, speculations of the group's overall worth to the football program are running wild.

Houston-based recruiting analyst Max Emfinger told *The Phoenix Gazette* that ASU's recruiting class has a good chance of being one of the top 10 in the country.

Sun Devil coach John Cooper, although suspicious of Emfinger's knowledge, hopes his analysis is correct.

"I think it was a good solid year," Cooper said. "We are happy with it."

Perhaps the biggest disappointment came

late Tuesday night when Tempe McClintock High School running back Cleveland Colter Jr. announced that he no longer was considering ASU.

McClintock running back Art Greathouse was the first Charger to say no to the Devils last week.

In *The Arizona Republic* Wednesday, Colter was reported as saying that ASU's recruiting tactics were "unfair."

He added that ASU said if he did not go here and play, then he could not take the competition against Greathouse.

"We didn't do anything unfair," Cooper said. "If it's unfair to advise a player to stay near home and his family, then we were unfair."

Heading the list of nine in-state signers are the most prolific passer and runner in

Arizona high school history plus two junior college all-Americans.

McClintock's Kent Kiefer set a state single-season passing percentage record of .672 in 1985.

Flagstaff running back David Winsley set a new state mark of 4,880 career rushing yards.

From Phoenix College come running back Kenny Rock and wide receiver Roy Hurd.

Other in-state recruits include: wide receiver Steve Martin from Tucson Sahuaro; offensive tackle and linebacker Drew Metcalf from McClintock; lineman Kerry McDaniel of Avondale Agua Fria High School; and offensive lineman Ted Friedli of Tucson Amphitheater High School; and linebacker Jeff Johnson of Phoenix Camelback High School.

"We looked like we just got back from Hawaii or something," said Brock, whose Devils actually did return from Honolulu on Monday.

"We did some things well tonight," Brock said. "But we didn't swing with any intensity and we didn't play with any intensity. But it's a win, and we'll take that."

Freshman Jeff White (2-0) picked up the win but kept the Panthers scoreless in only two of the 5½ innings he pitched. White gave up six earned runs, 11 hits and three walks.

After a short stint by Royal Clayton, reliever Tony Harris pulled the Devils out of a jam and recorded his first save of the season.

With the Devils leading, 10-7, in the top of the eighth inning, Harris entered the game with the bases loaded and the Panther's hottest hitter, Mike Cruz, at the plate.

Cruz was 4-for-4 with two doubles and a triple, but popped out to second baseman Bryan Beals to end the inning and stifle Chapman's rally.

"I just tried to throw strikes to him," Harris said. "I knew he went to the opposite field before, so he could pull the ball. I threw him fastballs and a couple hard sliders on the outside, bread and butter pitches."

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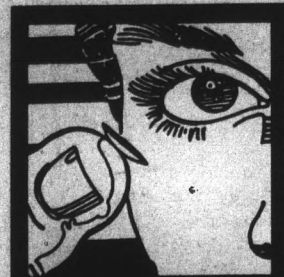

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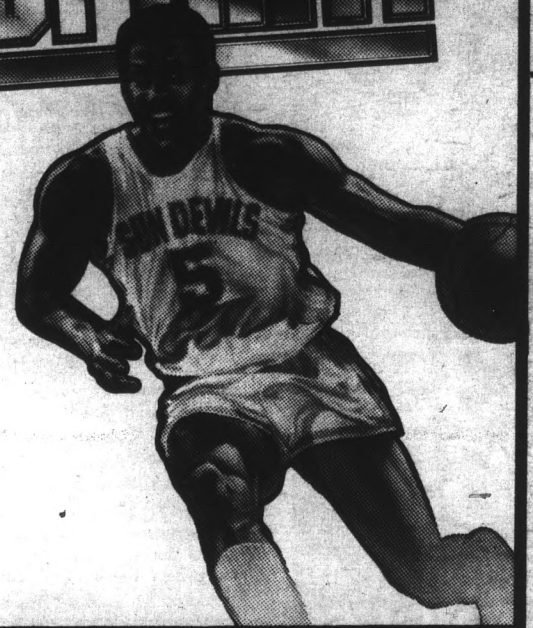
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
