Libyan conflict brewing for long time, prof says

A United States-Libyan confrontation Monday in the Gulf of Sidra was the result of a conflict that has "been brewing for a long time," an ASU political science professor said.

"I'm not surprised," Patrick McGowan said. "President Reagan has long held (Libyan leader Colonel Moammar) Khadafy as an international bad boy."

McGowan's remarks were in reference to a confrontation in which a U.S. Naval fleet on maneuvers in the Gulf of Sidra was fired upon by a Libyan missile base. The U.S. fleet proceeded to sink two Libyan patrol boats, killing at least 27 crew members.

It was also reported that American naval fighter planes destroyed a base that had fired six Soviet-made SAM-5 surface-to-air missiles at the fleet.

Khadafy has said the gulf is in Libyan territorial waters, but the Reagan administration has long contested that it is international territory.

McGowan also said he believes the American public would support more retaliatory action by the President.

"If this doesn't escalate into a U.S. and Soviet situation, I would suspect that the public will be behind Reagan's position," he said.

Marvin Alisky, also an ASU professor of political science, said he thinks the Libyans did not intend to hit U.S. aircraft or naval vessels.

"It was a cosmetic gesture," he said. "I don't think their aim is that bad."

"It was kind of a grandstand effort. Khadafy is not a rational person. He was testing the water. They were wondering what our reaction would be, and now they know."

Both McGowan and Alisky said there is a chance the incident could escalate into a confrontation between the United States and the Soviet Union, but added that it is unlikely.

"Could this escalate into a U.S.-Soviet battle? It's a small possibility," McGowan said. "(The Libyans) are going to claim U.S. aggression for sailing in those waters."

"Of course, we don't recognize them as Libyan waters. I would suspect the Soviet Union to echo the Libyan charges."

Alisky said he does not think the Soviet Union will become involved directly in the conflict.

"As for North Africa, (the Soviets) can't control Khadafy," he said. "They'll just hope that he will act in such a way that they will benefit."

"They can't control him. He's not rational, but they might suggest he retaliate against the U.S."

Theft of ASASU signs forces more campaigning

Student executive candidates probably will spend more time campaigning on Cady Mall to compensate for the loss of 650 campaign signs that were stolen or destroyed over the weekend, a presidential candidate said Monday.

Chris Cummiskey, Associated Students of ASU executive vice president, said the incident also has raised questions about campus security at night.

"I'm glad it was something as trivial as campaign posters, instead of something as serious as someone being injured or possibly raped," he said.

ASASU Elections Director Laurie Levin said the destruction probably was a group effort, but the elections department has no idea who the vandals are.

Cummiskey said the destruction of the signs must have taken at least an hour and the vandals must have had a vehicle on campus to haul away the posters.

He said the signs were destroyed by something that was "sharp enough and long enough to slash the signs in one swoop."

Campus Affairs Vice President Amy Young, who oversees the elections, said campus police are not at fault.

"They only have about two officers on the graveyard shift, and they cannot have their police cars on campus so they must cover campus on foot," she said.

A University policy prohibits vehicles on the campus malls, but Young said exceptions are often made for maintenance vehicles.

"It's more of an administration error because if they could go on campus, they could patrol the campus every hour," she said.

College of Liberal Arts Sen. Bridget Shelton, who is running for executive vice president, said it looked as if the signs were destroyed with a hatchet.

"It is scary that this type of thing can go on without someone seeing it happen," she said.

Rodney Middelkamp, a candidate for activities vice president, said he will not replace his posters.

"I did a lot of sign work in the dorm areas so I'm covered there, but all my signs on campus were shot down," he said. "I can't afford to replace them. I'm financially unstable."

Levin said the vandals caused \$2,000 worth of damage.

"The candidates can deduct the loss from their financial statements, but most candidates won't have more signs made because they wouldn't be done in time for the election," she said.

Levin said she and Young rode around campus Saturday night to survey the damage.

"The signs had obviously been thrashed with hatchets," she said. "They were split in half, and stakes were broken in five pieces."

Executive vice president candidate John Vezina said he will not be hurt as much as other candidates.

"Money-wise it is bad because the signs cost so much, but I

have plenty of signs that I held back," he said.

"A lot of students think the Associated Students elections are a joke, but the candidates are spending a lot of money. For someone to steal and thrash our signs is really sad."

Young said the candidates have to file individual police reports about the vandalism.

New cancer treatment continues to look promising, researcher says

DAYTONA BEACH, Fla. (AP) — A new cancer therapy that caused an avalanche of calls from the public when it was announced in December continues to look promising in more recent results, a National Cancer Institute researcher said Monday.

"I think this is a very exciting development," said Dr. Steven Rosenberg, the institute's chief of surgery. "It represents the first example of the ability to use the body's immune system to cause the regression of even very large tumors."

The technique, called adoptive immunotherapy, begins with removing white blood cells from the patient. Then the cells are incubated in a substance called interleukin-2, a chemical messenger used by the immune system to coordinate its attack on germs. The incubation turns the ordinary blood cells into roving cancer killers that don't harm normal tissue.

The activated cells are put back into the patient, who also gets interleukin-2 to keep the killer cells active and proliferating.

U.S. receives reports of invasion by Nicaragua into Honduras

WASHINGTON (AP) — The United States has received initial reports of a large-scale Nicaraguan force crossing the border into Honduras, a senior administration official said today.

The official, briefing reporters at the White House on condition he not be identified, said efforts were underway to determine the precise size and nature of the operation.

But preliminary reports reaching the United States indicated the attack was larger than any of more than 100 previous incursions, the official said.

Nicaraguan forces have crossed into Honduras before to attack bases of the Contra rebels battling the government in Managua. U.S. officials have said that both Honduran

civilians and soldiers have been killed in previous clashes. Stressing that he was talking about initial, unconfirmed reports, the official said today that indications were that "well over 1,000 Nicaraguan troops" were involved in the operation that was said to have begun on Sunday.

Chemical company's settlement 'totally unacceptable' to India

NEW DELHI, India (AP) — The Indian government said Monday a \$350 million out-of-court settlement between Union Carbide and private lawyers for victims of the Bhopal chemical plant disaster is too low and "totally unacceptable."

"Union Carbide is taking every step to ensure that the case is settled for a very low amount," said a statement issued by the Ministry of Chemicals and Fertilizers. "The government has not endorsed any settlement on the lines reported in the press."

Conlan assures GOP of his 'team' play

PHOENIX (AP) — John Conlan, a candidate for Congress, said Monday he wanted to reassure Arizona Republicans in Congress that he will be a team player when the team's program is "best for the country."

Some members of Arizona's GOP congressional delegation told *The Phoenix Gazette* in Washington that they were concerned Conlan might not work with them as a unit representative of the state.

"I think John has a reputation of doing things his own way," Rep. Bob Stump, R-

Ariz., said. "I don't want to say he's not a team player. But he's always had the reputation of being a loner and acting on his own."

Conlan said part of the perception developed from his practice of being a "creative innovator."

"It's true I could never be described as a rubber stamp," he said. "I've always been a team player when the team philosophy and program is best for our country."

Conlan is seeking the 4th Congressional District seat that will be vacated by Rep. Eldon Rudd, R-Ariz. It has been held by Republicans since its creation after the 1970 census.

Oregon sorority charged with conduct violation

The Alpha Phi sorority at the University of Oregon in Eugene was charged by the Panhellenic Council with violating University and sorority conduct guidelines last month during winter pledge initiation.

Susie McElhaney, outgoing Alpha Phi president, said the house was charged with "embarrassing" its pledges while they were serenading during initiation week, but added that members were not informed by the council of any specific charges.

The council placed all Alpha Phi

members on social probation until the end of this semester, which prohibits them from holding a function with any other Greek house, but not from participating in all-Greek activities.

The sorority appealed the ruling to the university's Student Conduct Board and are awaiting a verdict.

Beth Blue, president of Pi Beta Phi sorority, sent a letter to the Panhellenic Council informing them of the alleged violations.

Pledges from Pi Beta Phi told Blue the Alpha Phi pledges were "intoxicated, blindfolded, and being led through an alleyway and up concrete stairs."

ASU student healing after Jeep accident in Mexico

An ASU student was in serious but stable condition Monday at Scottsdale Memorial Hospital, where he was transferred after being injured in a Jeep accident in Mexico during spring break.

Kirk Hill, a marketing junior, suffered a compound fracture of his left leg and internal bleeding when the rented American Motors Jeep he was driving flipped on a busy highway in Pie de la Cuesta near Acapulco on the night of March 14.

Hill, 21, president of the ASU International Association of Students in Economics and Business Management, was flown by a Phoenix-based Air Evac plane from Acapulco to Phoenix Sky Harbor International Airport Friday night and then taken by helicopter to Scottsdale Memorial Hospital.

"He's holding his own," said Hill's mother, Evelyn. "But we're pretty sure one kidney is gone."

She said Kirk's doctors have not scheduled surgery on his leg or kidneys because in his present condition he might go into cardiac arrest.

"He's in excellent spirits, though," she said. "He's smiling and talking." But she added he still cannot receive any visitors.

Hill began the trip March 7 by taking a train from Nogales

to Guadalajara with a group of friends and flew from there to Acapulco on March 10.

Chip Young, a finance/international business junior, said he and Hill rented a Jeep March 14.

Around 10 p.m., Hill and Young drove toward Acapulco along an "uneven and eroded" road that followed the coastline. Young said they had not been drinking.

"It was really busy and dangerous," Young said. "Cars were speeding around slow-moving trucks."

Young said they were going about 45 mph when the Jeep's back right side hit three stone posts on the side of the road and flipped.

"I was airborne," he said. "I flew forward around 25 to 30 feet. When I hit the ground, I heard the Jeep roll and crash."

"I got up and looked back. Kirk was 15 to 20 feet behind me, lying in the middle of the road, illuminated by the headlights of cars that had stopped. His pants were shredded."

"I called his name six or seven times, and he opened one eye and looked at me. He couldn't talk but was moaning. I just had a scraped-up leg. It was amazing."

Ten onlookers lifted Hill into a taxi, which took Hill and Young to Sanatorio Sagrado Corazon, a small clinic in Acapulco with an emergency room.

Hill's left lung had collapsed and was filled with blood, Young said. Along with massive internal bleeding in his

abdomen and intestines, Hill's left thigh bone was broken in several places and had come through the skin.

Doctors put a chest tube through Hill's side to drain the lung and then operated on his abdomen on the morning of March 15.

"Basically, they saved his life," Young said. "The doctors were good, considering the conditions they had to work in."

"The conditions were terrible. That place made M*A*S*H look like the Mayo Clinic."

Hill's leg was not set, but a pin was placed in his left shinbone and attached to a line weighted down by a jug of water for traction.

Young said the clinic also was not very sanitary.

"After they took the tube out of his lung, it laid on the floor all bloody under his bed for days," he said.

Young, who speaks Spanish, said he stayed nearby to serve as "translator and placater" for Hill.

William Hill, Kirk's father, flew to Acapulco on March 16 after Young called to say Kirk's condition had worsened.

The elder Hill, a retired Marine who served a year with the Red Cross in Vietnam, attempted to have his son transferred immediately to a U.S. hospital, but the doctors waited until Friday when Kirk stabilized to transport him home.

"Kirk handled it all so well," Young said. "He never lost his sense of humor."

Truck hits electrical pole, causes power outage in Tempe

A truck plowed down an electrical pole at 5th Street and College Avenue Monday morning, causing a power outage in northwest Tempe.

Neither the driver of the truck nor any ASU students were injured, said Roger Clay, a Tempe Police Department public information officer.

Brad Parker, an Arizona Public Service spokesman, said the truck hit the pole at 8:18 a.m., tearing down the electric wires and laying them across the railroad tracks

in front of Sun Devil Stadium.

Stoplights along Mill Avenue and at the intersections of University Drive and College and also Forest Avenue and University did not work for about 40 minutes.

The stoplights were working again at 9:17 a.m.

While the stoplights were out, the intersections were directed by Tempe police officers.

Parker said the electricity could not be rerouted by an APS remote electrical switchboard but had to be done manually.

"We sent linemen out to splice and fix the lines, but because of the danger involved it took longer than normal to fix," Parker said.

He said the linemen spent the rest of the day replacing and fixing damaged wires.

If a train had crossed the lines, an accident might have occurred, he said.

The outage affected certain areas of campus.

Scott Cole, assistant director of the Physical Plant, said the Architecture Annex Building and Tower Building reported

power problems but the dormitories did not report any trouble.

The loss of power surprised students and Tempe police.

Lori Davis, a senior nursing major, said: "I didn't know about the lights being out until I got to the crosswalk. There was an officer directing traffic, but it didn't seem to take any longer to cross the street than usual."

When asked about the power loss, Clay said: "Our power was out for a half hour. This is the first I've heard about why."

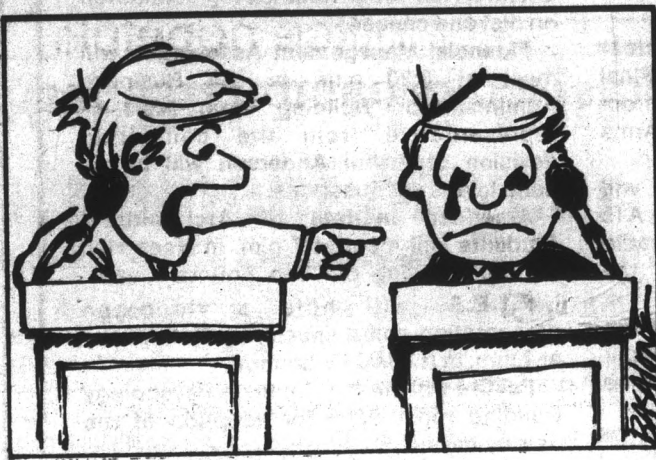

Police have arrested two Brown University students for prostitution and they say the two seniors may be part of a larger college sex ring involving several East Coast campuses, but the women arrested deny the charges.

Such incidents are rare, but in 1979 a "Glo-Worm Society" sent letters to a group of male University of Colorado students, suggesting they could buy vaguely defined sexual services for \$20.

Purdue banned its annual Nude Olympics this year because of decency laws, but about 200 students stripped down and ran the Jan. 21 race in the nude anyway.

About 150 face disciplinary actions, and now a few say they've been kicked out of the Cary Quad dorms even before they've gone through their hearings.

By the end of the first week of March - barely a third of the way through the spring break season - Fort Lauderdale police say they had already made 830 holiday-related arrests, as many as they made all last year.

They attribute the increase to enforcing some tough new laws, mostly governing public drinking.

About 200 top federal employees have fake degrees, the Federal Bureau of Investigations says. Among those with phony academic or medical degrees are a former White House staffer and an aide to the Joint Chiefs of Staff.

The agency will not release the names of the pretenders.

Sun Devil linksters win 3rd tournament of year

The ASU men's golf team recaptured its winning form last weekend, coming from behind to take the 18-team Fresno State Classic in Fresno, Calif.

Bill Mayfair, ASU's standout second-year golfer, led the Devils to their third victory this season with a one-under-par 215. Mayfair lost in a playoff to Brent Franklin of Brigham Young.

The victory snapped an ASU winless streak spanning seven weeks. Since winning the Arizona Invitational in early February, the Devils have placed fifth and seventh at tournaments in Hawaii and Mexico.

to a seven-stroke victory over Brigham Young.

Fresno held on for third at 1,130 and USC faded to fourth at 1,141.

Mayfair, perhaps ASU's most steady player, had an excellent chance to win his first tournament as a Sun Devil.

"It's a little disturbing that the two times Bill took second, the other guy (BYU's Franklin) beat him both times," Boutell said. "The other times, when Bill's about seventh or eighth, the other guy's in the 90s."

Mayfair led by one stroke with three holes to play, but Franklin stormed back with a par and a birdie to take the lead heading into 18.

"It's good to win this kind of a tournament," Coach George Boutell said. "The whole West Coast was there and we haven't won there since '74 or '75."

Victory didn't come easy for the Devils, who were pre-tournament favorites along with Southern California and Fresno State.

Heading into the final 18 holes Saturday, the Devils, in third place, trailed USC by 12 strokes and Fresno State by eight. Brigham Young loomed one stroke behind ASU.

But nine holes later, ASU began to take control.

"At nine holes, I told (my players) . . . 'We're in the middle of it.' They had no clue where we stood. I think that really fired them up," Boutell said.

ASU bettered USC by 32 strokes and Fresno by 17 on the final day. The Devils, with a three-round total of 1,121, breezed. The BYU golfer had a golden

opportunity to clinch the title on the par-5, but three-putted from a few feet away for a bogey. Franklin and Mayfair were tied at 215.

Rich Bietz, ASU's team captain, beat the rest of the field with a 220. Bietz fired the Devils' best single-round score, 70, on the final day.

Also for ASU, Tom Stankowski shot 73-87-73-224; Jim Strickland recorded a 78-80-72-230; Greg Cesario hit a 78-76-79-233; and Dale Schienbein carded a 79-79-80-238.

The Devils have been shooting lower scores recently, but Boutell said the course, San Joaquin Country Club, was tough.

"Look at it this way," Boutell said. "Jim Carter (ASU's only national champion) shot 278 at San Joaquin in the 1983 NCAA Championships. That's the highest total I've seen in my 11 years of coaching."

Parker becomes 5th to qualify in ASU track win

Andrew Parker became the fifth Sun Devil to qualify for the NCAA Championships Saturday, as the ASU men's track team wrapped up its first outdoor win of the season over the University of Texas-El Paso.

Parker ran a 13.67, only two-tenths of a second off the track record, in the 110-meter high hurdles to make the standard and join Sammy Bryant, Jim Camp, David Ryer and the 400-meter relay team in Indianapolis this June at the NCAA's.

ASU clinched the 79-78 victory in the final race of the meet with a second-place finish (3:08.63) by the 1600-meter relay team of Tim Woods, Chip Rish, Parker and Mark Senior.

But the win was in doubt near the end of the contest as UTEP mounted a near-successful comeback.

The meet got under way at 4 p.m. with the hammer throw as the Devils took a 6-3 lead behind Terry Payne's first-place finish of 198 feet, 4 inches. UTEP cut the lead to two points after the discus throw and one point after the long jump.

Camp, who qualified for the NCAA Indoor Championships three weeks ago, gave the Devils another two-point lead with his first-place performance of 62 feet, two inches in the shot put, but after six events the Miners had their first advantage at 28-25.

After ASU regained the lead, Treg Scott and Gary Geyer took first and second in the 1500-meters (only five-hundredths of a second separated the two) and gave the Sun

Devils a 10-point cushion. Parker and Mark Boyd (13.80) finished one-two in the 110-meter high hurdles to make it 46-29 after nine events.

The Devils got their biggest lead of the day, 63-35, on another first- and second-place combination in the 400-meter dash by Senior (46.23) and Rish (46.27). However, UTEP fought back by doing the same in the 100-meter sprint. Kenny Robinson, ASU's top sprinter, was injured and did not compete in the 100-meters.

The Miners won the next six events but the Sun Devil's lead held and ASU escaped with a one-point win.

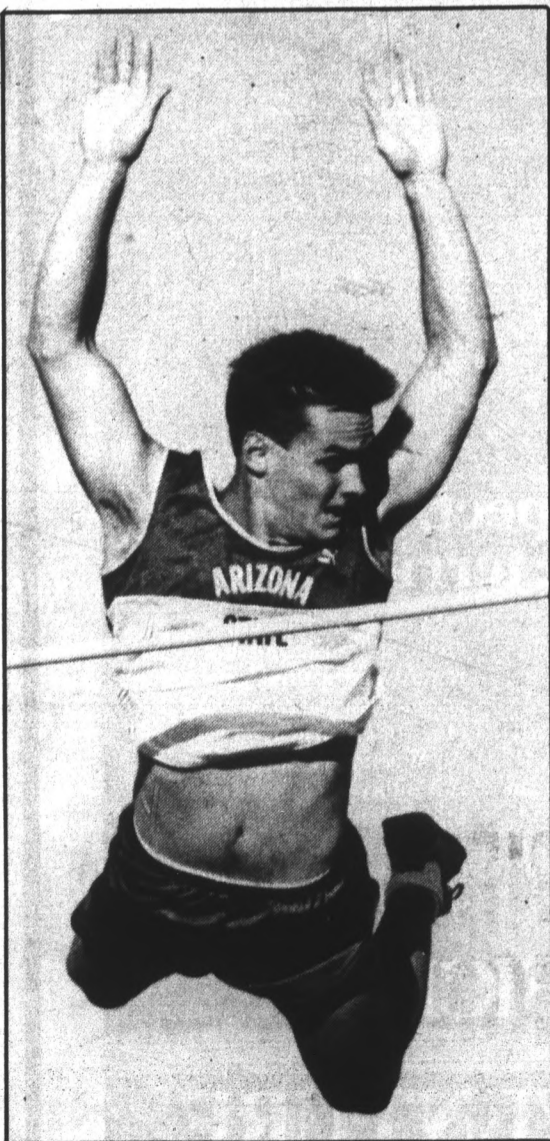
Overall, UTEP won 12 of 19 events and were led by Chris Leeuwenburgh who won the pole vault, long jump and 100-meter dash.

The women's team competed in a non-scoring meet against UTEP and won five of 14 events.

Top performances included Pam Morton's first-place finish in the discus at 135 feet, six inches; Cathy Miller in the 400-meter hurdles with a time of 1:04.53; Teresa Barrios' win in the 1500-meters at 4:38.16; and Dodie Campbell in the javelin with a toss of 158-feet and 8 inches.

The Miners were led by Siw Bakken, Elena Salazar, Jennifer Cronin, Anna Skjaeveland, Debra Givens, Eva Duran and Debbie Greene who all scored in two events each.

The Sun Devils split their squad to take on Texas A & M next weekend at College Station, Texas, and in the Stanford Invitational in Palo Alto, Calif., and return home for the Sun Angel Classic on April 5.

Shinholster dismissed from team

'Disciplinary reasons' not divulged by Brock

ASU baseball player Vince Shinholster was dismissed from the team Monday for disciplinary reasons.

Baseball head coach Jim Brock told the *State Press* that the dismissal was intended to help both Shinholster and the team, but refused to divulge any details.

"It's in Vince's best interests and in mine," Brock said. "I think I'll just leave it that it's for disciplinary reasons. That's my only comment."

News of Shinholster's dismissal came on the heels of the Devils' second three-day roadtrip, where they dropped two of three games to California-Berkeley.

The 6-foot, 180-pound Shinholster has played for the Devils this year as a utility infielder and thrown 20 2/3 innings from the mound. He has carded a 5.23 earned run average with 17 strikeouts and 15 walks, en route to a 1-0 record with one save.

Shinholster has been unsuccessful at the plate, batting 0-11 in Six-Pac contests, and posting a .220 batting average.

Shinholster, a 1983 graduate of Loara High School in Anaheim, Calif., attained all-state, all-Orange county, all-league and all-Big A Empire status while in high school.

He moved on to Santa Ana Community College, where he was named Most Valuable Player last year. He holds most of the career records at Santa Ana, including most runs batted in during a single season.

Shinholster's replacement will be junior varsity player John Finn, a 5-foot-8-inch freshman who has appeared in seven varsity games.

Finn has two at-bats in varsity competition, and has scored twice. He is a walk-on from Skyline High School in Oakland, Calif., where he was the MVP two straight years. He also competed last year in the California State All-Star game, and earned all-city honors two years in Oakland.

Finn's role on the varsity squad has been mostly as a pinch runner.

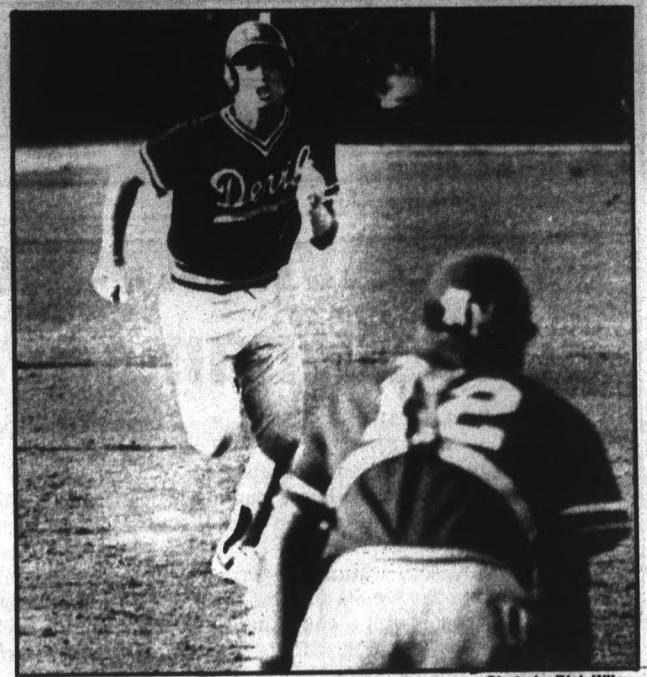

Florida St. tops this week's poll

TUCSON (AP) — Florida State remained No. 1 this week in the latest rankings of the Collegiate Baseball-ESPN poll of college baseball teams.

The swift Seminoles, 28-3, already have stolen 100 bases this season, moving within 24 of the school record, and the pitching staff has recorded 296 strikeouts in 265 innings, led by Richie Lewis' 76 and Mike Loynd's 72, each in 47 innings pitched.

Still in second place was Miami, Fla., 22-4, while Louisiana State, 21-2, moved up one notch to third, bumping Texas, 28-5, to fourth. Also staying in place were No. 5 Oral Roberts, 23-6; sixth-place Stanford, 17-8; Loyola-Marymount, 21-6, seventh; South Florida, 26-6, eighth; and No. 9 Michigan, 7-2. Old Dominion, 18-4, bumped South Carolina from the Top 10.
