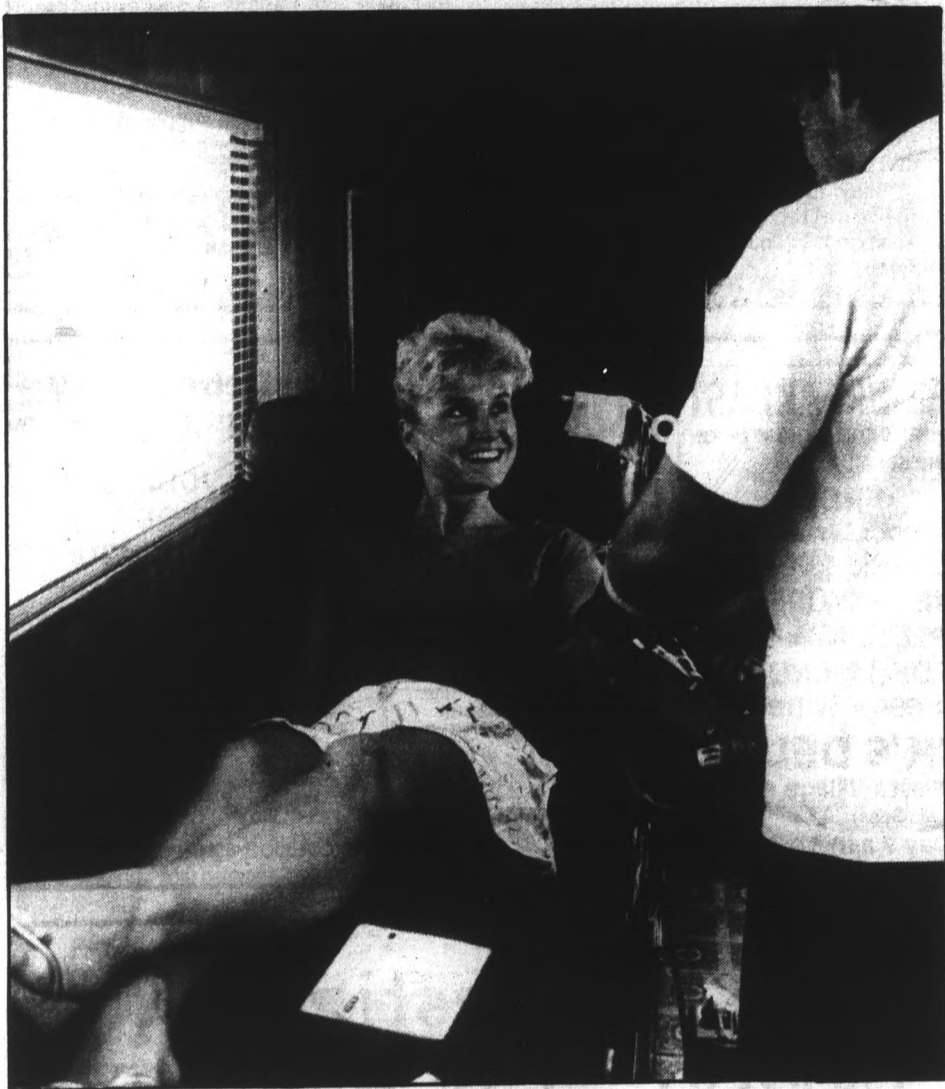

Concrete slabs mark structural beginnings at ASU West campus

Structural development of the ASU West campus, slated to open in the early 1990s, began last week with the insertion of many 65,000-pound concrete forms for the mile-long utility tunnel, the campus' vice president said.

"This is just a report of progress; I wouldn't call it a major step," Gerald McSheffrey said. "This is just the first big thing that you see going into the ground."

ASU West, a 300-acre site located at 43rd Avenue and Thunderbird Road, is expected to serve up to 12,000 upper-division and graduate students upon its opening.

The utility tunnel, which will consist of 159 of the three-sided concrete forms, will contain water pipes, sewer systems, and electrical, telecommunications and gas lines.

"It will be just like plugging into an electrical socket," McSheffrey said. "All the buildings will fit right into the tunnel."

"Once this utility tunnel goes in, we can follow up with the central plant and then the library. From there, the other buildings will follow."

The library, a four-story, 200,000-volume facility, will be the first building to be completed. Work will begin on the first 80,000 square feet in September.

The library is scheduled to open in the spring of 1988, replacing the temporary library currently located at the ASU West-Alhambra, 4510 N. 37th Ave.

Construction of the central plant will begin concurrent with the library, followed by the first classroom building.

Classroom laboratories and student service building will get underway in 1988. Work will begin on the computer lab and research lab in 1989.

ASU West, established by the 1984 Legislature as a branch campus of ASU to serve west-side Maricopa County residents, officially began physical construction in February with groundbreaking ceremonies.

Preparation for structural development started in May, when workers began preliminary preparations, such as digging trenches and laying concrete, McSheffrey said.

ASU West is currently offering classes at temporary locations on the Valley's west side. Nearly 2,700 students registered for spring semester classes, a 16 percent increase over the enrollment from spring of 1985, according to ASU West registration figures.

Temporary sites are located at ASU West-Alhambra; ASU West-Montbello School, 2636 W. Montbello Ave.; the American Graduate School of International Management, Greenway Road and 59th Avenue; and Glendale Community College, Olive Avenue and 59th Avenue.

ASU West will offer degrees in Business, Education, Engineering and Applied Sciences, Fine Arts, Liberal Arts, Nursing, Public Programs and Social Work. Others will be added as the west-side University develops.

Travel openings limited over holiday, agents say

Airlines booked up for Fourth of July weekend

If you are planning a trip to catch the waves over the July Fourth weekend, chances are you will be spending the holiday at Big Surf in Tempe.

Two local travel agents said almost all flights leaving Phoenix are sold out and only expensive first class or coach fares are available.

"You will find all of your reasonable priced fares sold out," said Max Morris, owner of Sun Devil Travel in Tempe. "Anyplace in Southern California is sold out. Denver is sold out. Las Vegas is sold out."

He said even flights to smaller cities are booked up because of the inexpensive fares on regional airlines.

"I had a gentlemen who was sitting here who wanted to go to Sacramento," Morris said. "All the flights to there were sold out on America West (Airlines)."

He said it is typical of the Independence Day holiday for people in California to come to Phoenix and people in the Valley to head for Southern California.

"That is what makes the airlines very popular," Morris said.

Lindsay Soule, owner of Apollo World Travel, said because most airlines are booked for July 3, many people are now making reservations for the Fourth itself.

"There is no way you could leave on July 3 and return on July 6," he said. "Those dates have been booked by people for the past three months."

Soule said that even if one were to drive to San Diego or Los Angeles, they would have a difficult time finding a hotel.

"In San Diego, the only thing available is the airport hotel

and the expensive hotels," he said.

Those hotels in San Diego are running \$140 to \$180 per night, Soule said.

Although the largest celebration on the Fourth will be in New York City for the anniversary of the Statue of Liberty, Soule said it is not sold out and there are some spots still available for the gala event.

"I just received one of my trade magazines and there is a possibility of getting to New York," he said, adding that those trips will be "extremely" expensive.

He said if someone wanted to travel over the long weekend, he should plan on flying on July 5, because that "is a non-travel day. Things tend to be a little lighter on the planes."

Soule said he would suggest checking into one of the resorts in Arizona which offer discount rates during the summer.

"Their prices are very low because of the off-season," he said. "And it is kind of nice to go to these resorts, which are quite lavish."

Soule said most of the resorts in the Valley offer such activities as golf, tennis, horseback riding and swimming.

Both travel agents said that booking early is the only way to guarantee an airline and hotel reservation.

Supreme Court upholds Georgia sodomy laws

WASHINGTON (AP) — A sharply divided Supreme Court Monday upheld a Georgia law that makes sodomy a crime, ruling that consenting adults have no constitutional right to private homosexual conduct.

The 5-4 ruling represented a defeat for the numerous gay rights organizations that had mobilized against the Georgia law.

In the case, the court reversed the federal appeals court ruling that the Georgia law, which defines sodomy as "any sexual act involving the sex organs of one person and the mouth or anus of another" infringes on a "fundamental" constitutional right.

Leader of largest union in South Africa detained

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (AP) — The head of South Africa's largest labor federation has been detained under the state of emergency, the union said Monday. It warned that the government crackdown could spark widespread strikes.

The government Bureau of Information said eight more blacks were slain on Saturday and Sunday, bringing the weekend death toll to 12. At least 93 people have been killed since a state of emergency was imposed June 12.

Among the victims were three blacks killed in clashes Sunday between militant Soweto youths and supporters of Zulu Chief Mangosuthu Buthelezi, authorities said. At least 48 people were injured.

No 'firm' leads found in child abduction case

TUCSON (AP) — Investigators continued to sift through dozens of leads, but police said they had turned up "nothing firm yet" in the apparent abduction of a 2-year-old Tucson girl.

Zosha Lee Pickett disappeared late Thursday night or early Friday from her bedroom. Police said they found evidence that her bedroom window had been forced open and a hole had been cut in the screen.

Groups of volunteers canvassed the girl's neighborhood on Friday and Saturday without finding a trace of her, Police Capt. James Hobbs, midtown division commander, said.

"We have numerous leads and information provided through anonymous sources and 88-CRIME," Hobbs said.

Palo Verde's Unit 2 reactivated after test

WINTERSBURG (AP) — The Palo Verde nuclear plant's Unit 2 reactor, which had been out of service since Jun 25, was restarted Monday and was operating at 3 percent of capacity, a plant spokesman said.

The reactor shut down automatically as part of the "loss of oversight power" test, said Dan Canady, a spokesman for the Arizona Nuclear Power Project, operators of the triple-reactor power plant.

He said the unit was supposed to shut down during the test, which simulates a loss of external power. The unit remained out of service while technicians gathered and analyzed data and performed minor maintenance, Canady said.

U.S. should not give islands to Soviets

It came as a total shock to me. What I thought was just another publicity letter in the *Summer State Press* mailbag turned out to be one of the most incredulous things I have ever read.

Our wonderful U.S. State Department has decided to give five islands off of the Russian coast to the Soviet Union because "it will make the international borders easier to define."

According to U.S. Representative Mark D. Siljander, the State Department held talks with the Soviets in 1984 and decided that five strategic islands will be handed to them.

Now, while that may seem somewhat unbelievable, it is true.

The five islands include Wrangell, Herald, Henrietta, Bennett and Jeannette which add up to more than 2,900 square miles of land located directly north of Siberia.

Not only are the U.S. islands great outposts for eavesdropping on the Russians, but they are oil rich and that is to our benefit if we hope to end our dependency on the Arabs.

While this issue is not making the front pages of the newspapers, it is worth noting

that the meeting with the Soviets in 1984 was done secretly and the State Department refuses to release the names of those who "bargained" for this country.

Some may say that we will probably get something in return for these islands.

We get nothing!

The United States stumbled upon these islands in the late 1880s and were rightfully and legally claimed by this country. Even during the Alaskan purchase in 1867, the Russians made no mention of taking these islands.

But now, they want these islands and the State Department seems too ready to hand them over.

What will we get out of this?

According to the documents received by Siljander and "State Department Watch," a citizens' watchdog group, the deal is being made so that there will be a formal boundary between the U.S.S.R and the United States, meaning everything west of the Bering Strait is the Soviet Union's and everything east is the United States'.

The idea of a "formal boundary" should never dictate what islands are ours and what should be turned over to them. Those islands were rightfully established by this country and no one made any counter-claims until some 70 years later.

It is the height of irony that we, as Americans, may let these islands slip through our hands in the name of "detente." Even the International Courts have held that the Soviets do not have any claim to these islands, but the United States does.

What is most upsetting about this incident is the fact that the State Department went ahead with its deals without letting the American public have a word.

Whoever the boob is that decided to give away precious islands off of Siberia should be shipped there for a 10 years sentence for stupidity.

Next thing you know, we will be giving the Hawaiian Islands back to the Polynesian kings that ruled the islands decades ago so that we will have a "formal boundary" with all nations of the Pacific.

Don't forget Guam, the Virgin Islands, Puerto Rico and American Samoa. Let's just give them away.

While it all may seem hopeless — like it did when the State Department gave away the Panama Canal — the agreement has not been officially recognized by Congress and there still may be time to make a difference in this incident.

If the State Department does get its way and the Soviets gain control of these islands, let's hope some heads will roll.

I plan to write my Congressmen and let him know America is getting the royal shaft from its own State Department.

I'll keep you posted on the response.

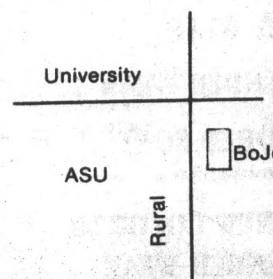

Coroner: Rogers' death caused by cocaine use

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (AP) — A cocaine overdose triggered a massive heart attack that caused the death of football star Don Rogers, according to a coroner's report released Monday.

Laboratory tests on blood, urine and other body fluids taken during an autopsy of the Cleveland Browns defensive back revealed the presence of the same drug blamed for the June 19 death of University of Maryland basketball All-American Len Bias.

Sacramento County toxicologist James Beede said the 5.2 milligrams per liter of cocaine found in Rogers blood was a "fatal level" of the drug.

Coroner Charles Simmons said the tests revealed the cause of death was due to "cocaine poisoning," and ruled the method of death accidental, with no other drugs involved.

Rogers, who died Friday one day before he was to be married, "had enough drugs in him to kill an elephant," said coroner's senior investigator Roger Kaseman.

Pathologist Dr. Joseph Pawlowski, who conducted the autopsy on Rogers on Saturday, said the results of tests on Rogers' blood, bile and urine confirmed his belief that Rogers died of a drug overdose, despite many claims by friends and teammates of the player that he never used drugs.

Rogers, 23, was a Rose Bowl hero for UCLA, a No. 1 pick by the Cleveland Browns in the National Football League's 1984 college draft, and the AFC Defensive Rookie of the Year. He was voted the Browns' hardest worker in each of his two seasons.

Unlike Bias, Rogers had a history of heart trouble. An NFL scouting group had him take a stress test before he was drafted out of UCLA, which Rogers passed. His mother also has a weak heart; she was treated for a heart attack Saturday.

Dr. John Bergfeld, however, said he knew of no heart trouble and that Rogers was in

perfect health.

Browns owner Art Modell had hopes for the effects of Rogers' death.

"Tragically, in death Don Rogers may have contributed more to society than he could have on the playing field. Let's hope his death serves as a warning to those who want to try or have used drugs," Modell said.

That sentiment was echoed by Browns coach Marty Schottenheimer.

"We can only hope and pray that Don's death makes more people realize the necessity of avoiding drugs," he said. "The shock of it must be felt by anyone who is curious about or who has taken drugs. Only in this way can we begin to prevent this kind of tragedy."

Teammate Curtis Weathers said, "I'm really speechless as far as the whole matter is concerned. Donny was well-liked, and not just because he was a good player. He was a leader and a good person."

Terry Donahue, Rogers' former coach at UCLA, expressed shock.

"This is a tragedy of unbelievable proportions," he said. "Don was one of the greatest football players in UCLA history, and he had his whole life ahead of him. This is a great loss and we feel for his family."

In four years at UCLA, Rogers averaged more than 100 tackles a season, and was second in the Pac-10 in interceptions as a senior.

Bias, 22, was an All-American forward for the University of Maryland and a No. 1 pick by the Boston Celtics in the recent National Basketball Association draft.

He too was a "picture of health" according to doctors. He died June 19 of a cocaine-induced heart attack.

In both cases, friends and family said that the men were not habitual users of cocaine or any other drug.

Funeral arrangements will be made for Rogers when the coroner releases his body.

Navratilova defeats Demongeot 6-3, 6-3

WIMBLEDON, England (AP) — Defending women's champion Martina Navratilova and 10th-seeded Gabriela Sabatini led the way into the Wimbledon quarterfinals today with easy victories.

But like the warm, sunny weather that has graced much of this year's tournament, the upsets continued as the second week began on the famed grass courts.

Manuela Maleeva, the women's eighth seed from Bulgaria, was beaten in the fourth round by Betina Bunge, a West German who reached the semifinals here in 1982. The scores were 3-6, 6-2, 6-3.

Navratilova, the top seed from the United States who is seeking a fifth consecutive Wimbledon champion, defeated Isabelle Demongeot of France 6-3, 6-3, while Sabatini, of Argentina, downed Italy's Raffaella Reggi 6-4, 1-6, 6-3.

Bunge won three of the last four games of the opening set and eased through the second and third sets to join Sabatini in the quarterfinals.

Maleeva was the seventh seed among the women and 16th overall to be eliminated in the tournament's first four rounds.
