

## ASU ticket policy makes fans fume

Hordes of ASU Sun Devil fans spent most of Tuesday night and Wednesday waiting in a seemingly endless line to buy season football tickets for home games of the 1987 Rose Bowl champs.

But some left without much to show for their dedication and blamed the athletic department for selling an unlimited number of tickets to each student.

The number of season passes sold was unavailable at press time Wednesday.

"This is total confusion," said James Calles, a finance major. "Nothing has been done to regulate the number of tickets."

But even Calles, standing at the ticket window sporting a handful of student ID cards and cash, took advantage of the unlimited sale policy.

"These are for co-workers, friends and moochers," Calles said, adding he charged up to \$40 for each \$28 set of tickets.

Tom Sadler, athletic events coordinator, defended the policy, which allowed students to buy one pass for each valid student ID presented.

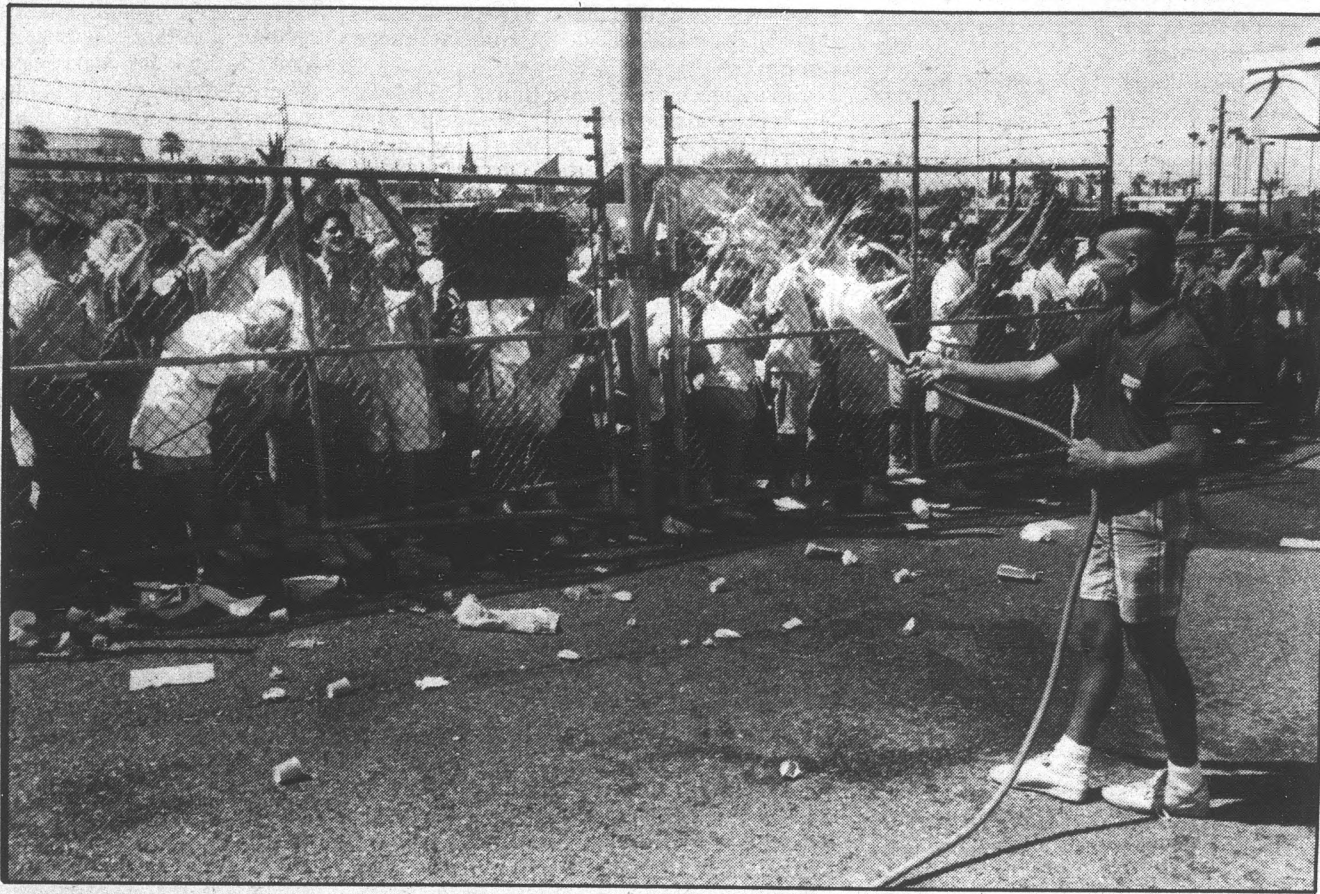
"What we are trying to do is expedite the selling of tickets," he said. "The rationale was we'd rather have one person buy (multiple season passes) than have each person waiting in line."

But some students griped about their peers, calling them profiteers who were only out to make a quick buck.

There are some real entrepreneurial types out there," said Kelly Buntjer, a third-year law student who joined the line at 4 a.m. "If you're a Joe Blow on a tight budget, you don't have a chance."

ASU athletic ticket manager Dianne Yeager said some students bought 10 to 20 passes apiece but claimed that most sales were to individuals.

Another student criticized ASU's fair-weather fans. "They should accommodate those people who have been following (ASU football) for the past 10 to 15 years," said Matt Weber, a sophomore accounting major.

Weber said last fall, he rushed to buy season tickets and found a line that was much shorter than Wednesday's.

"I'm mad at people who come now just because they won the Rose Bowl," he said.

Yeager agreed that the massive line was due to last year's Rose Bowl victory.

"I've worked in the ticket office for 10 years, and I've been the manager for five, and this is the biggest crowd I've ever seen," she said.

Student season passes, which account for 10,000 of the 70,000 available passes, went on sale at 6 a.m. Wednesday.

Students rushed the gate in a line that wrapped around the University Activity Center.

Tommy Hemstreet, a senior purchasing major, said he

arrived at 2 p.m. Tuesday to become the first person in line.

"Guys were telling us we were crazy," he said. "Now look at them — they're way back there. Guess you could say we got the last laugh."

Buntjer said she joined the line at 4 a.m. and by 7 a.m. the "line got humongous."

"There was this huge bottleneck and then the line dissolved," she said.

At 9 a.m. security erected barricades in an attempt to prevent people from cutting in line. But many students complained that not enough was done to control the crowd.

"They should have taken numbers or put a rope up," said Buntjer.

## Club funding questions revived during senate meeting

Controversial campus club funding guidelines that plagued Associated Students last semester returned as the No. 1 topic during the senate's first meeting this week.

Denise Heap, co-chairman of the Lesbian and Gay Academic Union, which has been denied funding since 1984, attended the meeting Tuesday night to speak against a proposed funding bill and to begin pleas for support.

In an emotion-filled statement, Heap said: "I don't believe that any of you want to discriminate against us. But the bill is not specific, well-written or something to laugh about."

Senate Bill 1 states that to be eligible for funding, an ASU activity must either be of potential interest to a broad

segment of the student population, assist students in furthering career objectives, further the educational objectives of the University or enhance student cultural awareness.

The bill also requires the senate to analyze the number of students who could benefit from an activity, student participation, the group's previous use of funds and its efforts to generate funds or student services.

The proposal, assigned to the ASASU Government Operations Committee for discussion next Tuesday, is almost identical to a bill vetoed by former ASASU President Chris Cumiskey last spring.

The vetoed bill would have reinstated funding guidelines that were deleted Feb. 17 because they prohibited funding of

"controversial" groups.

The senate deleted its funding rules after the LGAU filed a lawsuit, claiming the ASASU senate infringed upon the group's constitutional rights by denying it funding.

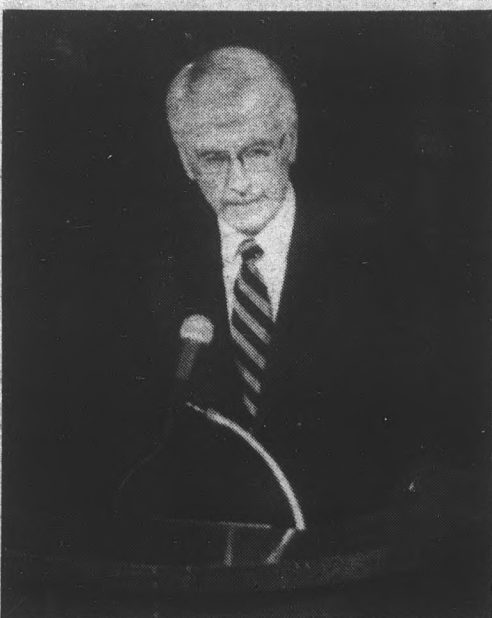
The lawsuit was judged "moot" June 5 by U.S. District Court Judge William P. Copple.

Cumiskey's veto was not overridden by the senate before the semester's end, and the question of funding guidelines became the first item of business this fall.

Heap said she plans to talk to senators and be at the Government Operations Committee meeting next week.

"I don't think the senators realize what the possibilities of the bill are," she said. "They need to be educated and we

## 8 ASU victims of Flight 255 mourned in campus service

Ten days after the crash of Northwest Airlines Flight 255, family and friends of the eight ASU victims aboard were told Wednesday in a campus memorial service that "life will be forever changed, but it is not ended."

"In the face of an unpredictable and seemingly random tragedy such as the one that grips us today, we are changed," ASU President J. Russell Nelson said in his eulogy.

"When young lives are so abruptly ended, we grieve with the families; we grieve for the community and along with them. At this moment we feel suddenly unprotected and vulnerable to what Shakespeare called 'The Thorns and Dangers of Life.'"

About 400 mourners gathered at Gammage Center at noon to remember the students, faculty and a staff member who

died Aug. 16 when a DC-9 jet crashed on takeoff from Detroit Municipal Airport, killing 156. Four-year-old Cecelia Cichan is the only survivor.

Arizona Board of Regents President Donald Shropshire said the bereaved should recognize "emotions which remind us of our humanity, and how much we need each other."

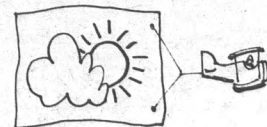

## Reagan praises arms bid calls for Soviet openness

LOS ANGELES (AP) — President Reagan on Wednesday applauded West Germany's willingness to destroy its Pershing 1-A missiles and declared that the Soviet Union must not "erect additional barriers" to a superpower agreement on the global elimination of intermediate-range missiles.

In a speech to the Town Hall of California, a civic organization, Reagan also challenged the Soviet Union to bring a spirit of "glasnost" or openness to its military affairs and said past U.S.-Soviet arms pacts have been "too often violated by the U.S.S.R."

The address, billed in advance by White House officials as a major assessment of U.S.-Soviet relations, came as Chancellor Helmut Kohl said in Bonn that West Germany will destroy rather than modernize its Pershing missiles if the superpowers scrap all their medium- and shorter-range missiles in the Intermediate Nuclear Force, or INF, class.

The Soviet Union has said it would not sign a disarmament agreement unless it includes the 72 Pershing 1-A missiles, which are owned by West Germany but have nuclear warheads controlled by the United States.

## Federal court reverses order banning Alabama textbooks

ATLANTA (AP) — A federal appeals court Wednesday reversed an Alabama judge's order that had banned 44 textbooks from Alabama public schools on the grounds they promoted a belief in secular humanism.

In allowing the textbooks to remain in use, a three-judge panel of the 11th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals ruled that U.S. District Judge Brevard Hand's order had turned the First Amendment requirement that the government be neutral on the subject of

religion "into an affirmative obligation to speak about religion."

The ruling, which also ordered Hand to dismiss a lawsuit brought by parents, cleared the way for the textbooks to be used in Alabama classrooms.

The appeals panel said there was no question that the purpose behind using 39 history and social studies books was secular, and that selecting a textbook that omits a topic for non-religious reasons is different from requiring the omission of material because it conflicts with a particular religious belief.

## South African mineworkers vote to reject contract offer

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (AP) — The National Union of Mineworkers voted Wednesday to continue a 17-day-old strike, rejecting an offer by the top mining companies that slightly improved benefits but not wages.

Hundreds of thousands of miners voted by show of hands in hostels and unions halls in South Africa's longest and costliest mine strike.

The management offer would have slightly improved death benefits and holiday pay, but it did not address the union's demand for a 30 percent wage hike, the main reason the strike was called.

Union officials say 340,000 miners are on strike at 45 gold and coal mines in the biggest legal walkout in the country's history. The chamber puts the number of strikers at 210,000 at 29 mines.

## Iran rejects compromises in 7-year-old war with Iraq

NICOSIA, Cyprus (AP) — Iran accused the United States and Arab nations Wednesday of trying to impose an "ignominious peace," and rejected any compromise in its 7-year-old war with Iraq. The comments by Prime Minister Hussein

Musavi of Iran appeared to be a reaction to an Arab League ultimatum Tuesday that Iran accept a July 20 cease-fire resolution by the U.N. Security Council by Sept. 20 or risk a mass break in relations by Arab nations.

His remarks, reported by Iran's official Islamic Republic News Agency, made no direct reference to the demand.

U.S. delegates are consulting with other members of the 15-nation council about imposing sanctions on Iran for failing to comply with the resolution, which the Reagan administration shepherded through the council.

Iraq has not attacked shipping in the gulf since the resolution was passed. Its news agency praised the Arab League action and called Wednesday for a boycott of Iran that would force it "to accept a comprehensive and lasting peace" in line with the U.N. resolution.

## Former Senator withdraws from GOP nomination race

WASHINGTON (AP) — Former Sen. Paul Laxalt announced Wednesday that he is withdrawing from the race for the 1988 Republican presidential nomination after "a careful and realistic assessment of our financial situation."

In the statement, Laxalt, a former Republican senator from Nevada, said his committee has "thoroughly tested the political and financial waters for the past four months."

Laxalt, 65, never formally entered the race but said on April 28 that he was forming an exploratory committee and that his decision to run was "as close to final as one can get," with financing the only question to be answered.

His departure from the GOP race leaves three announced candidates, former Delaware Gov. Pierre S. du Pont IV, former Secretary of State Alexander Haig, and Rep. Jack Kemp of New York, in the competition.

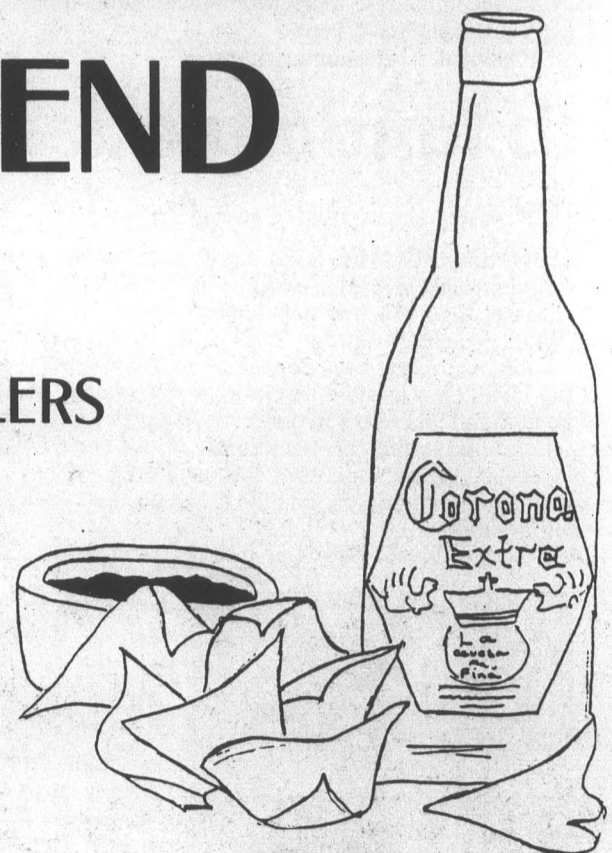

# Fighting back

## Group formed to protect air passengers' rights

Airline passengers unhappy with air travel service or tired of long delays and lost baggage can join a new consumer group "created out of sheer necessity," an aviation attorney said.

Jack Corbett, general counsel for Airline Passengers of America (AP/USA), told reporters at Sky Harbor International Airport Wednesday that the 4-week-old group wants to protect consumer rights.

"Passengers believe that our nation's airlines can no longer be counted on to provide good service," he said. "Everyone has their own horror story.

"Passenger complaints have increased 600 percent since July of last year, air traffic delays are up, and airline pilots are concerned that we have increasingly shrinking margins of aviation safety."

Corbett said AP/USA is seeking members in Phoenix and around the nation to work toward improvements in national air transport services. Membership fees are \$48 a year, and the group currently has 250 members.

Corbett said the government has a cache of \$5 billion in the Aviation Trust Fund, and the group plans to pressure federal officials to use the funds for aviation safety.

The 8 percent tax on airline tickets also is

not used to enhance safety or combat airline delays, Corbett said.

Corbett called AP/USA "pro-aviation" and said its goal is to improve the consumer experience.

The group also wants to inform consumers about which airlines are safe and efficient, and provide air travel updates similar to those provided to motorists, he said.

Corbett said airline competition strictly based on prices is a concern for the group because service is equally important.

AP/USA membership provides: a newsletter, a 24-hour toll-free number for emergency help for substitute flight options, baggage tags with the AP/USA phone number, information about ground transportation, passenger services, supplemental insurance coverage and in-airport discounts on some services.

## Recall official says malls shirking duty

Valley shopping malls have failed to assume a necessary role of public servant, the president of the Mecham Recall Committee says.

Garry Smith was reacting to this week's court decision that upheld a ruling that prevents petition gatherers from collecting signatures on malls' property.

In cities today there are "no more downtowns" where people can gather and assemble, Garry Smith said.

Tower Plaza is one of the few Valley malls that provides an information desk where people can "exercise their First Amendment rights," Smith said.

"Malls need to continue where the downtowns left off. They must realize that although they are private property, they must take an active role.

"Demographics are changing," Smith said. Although the mall decision was "disappointing," he said, it "doesn't really affect us" because Arizonans are returning from vacations and universities are back in session.

"It's a matter of timing," he said. Despite school schedule difficulties and settling into an academic routine, many ASU students are volunteering their

time to the Mecham Recall Committee at ASU, according to the group's leader.

Amy Rosenhaus said students are volunteering to register students in front of the MU, making them eligible to sign.

But with the increase of volunteers comes the confusion of constantly changing schedules, making it hard to keep the tables manned everyday, she said.

As the changes become permanent in the next two weeks, the campus committee will have more people out there on a consistent basis, Rosenhaus added.

ASU is not the only location with people wanting to assist in the recall.

Smith said the recall will sponsor an "Adios Mecham Day" in Nogales Saturday to gather the signatures of townsfolk in one day.

In Phoenix, Smith claims nearly 12,000 volunteers are working for the recall.

Smith said that although 216,674 signatures are needed by Nov. 3, recall organizers say they are not worried about missing the deadline.

As of Aug. 13, 30 days after the recall drive began, 103,379 signatures had been obtained, accounting for 48 percent of the signatures required to force a recall election.

The ASU Athletic Department's decision to allow the sale of an unlimited number of football tickets to individual students has turned the annual ritual of gridiron ticket purchasing into a futile 15-hour ordeal for many fans.

## Weak Greek

### ASU frats should pledge to blacklist *The Review*

A few of us down here in the *State Press* newsroom are really worried.

You see, we've just become aware of a rival publication that concerns us greatly. We've just found out that we have to compete with "one of the biggest and best Greek newspapers ever published anywhere." At least, that's what the publication's editor, Steve Azer (Phi Sigma Kappa), calls it.

We're all a-tremble.

His comments on page four of the *ASU Greek Review*, positioned under a painful attempt at a GQ pose, are brief, simple and egotistical. He says that "When it comes to sports, social life and Greek involvement, we're definately (sic) the powerhouse of the Southwest."

As a reader moves through the pages of the *Greek Review*, the fare is exactly what one might expect. It's the Fall rush issue,

and the idea is to get people to "Go Greek!" All the standard fraternity hype about brotherhood and social life and intramural banners and test files and sorority girls and little sisters — it's all there.

There's a piece called "Greek Mythology" that lists several objections to "going Greek," and one- or two-paragraph refutations of them. Take Myth No. 3: "I'm afraid being in the fraternity will hurt my grades." The paragraph that follows it talks about "scholarship programs" (their spelling, not mine), test files and brothers who will help you with your homework.

Perhaps I'm being hasty, but it seems that a group of guys who can't spell "scholarship" are unlikely to indulge in it. It's misspelled twice, eliminating the possibility of typographical error.

But, as I said, perhaps that is a hasty generalization. I really ought to find some authority that will substantiate my suspicion that joining a fraternity will lower one's GPA. But where could I find that kind of statement?

How about the next page of the *Greek Review*? It contains a list of "The Fifty Biggest Lies at ASU." Lie No. 14: "Joining a fraternity won't hurt your grades."

Apparently the lie was too big for them to spit out with a straight face. They felt

compelled to let the audience in on the joke.

But all of this is reasonable in comparison to what is to be found on page 17. On page 17, a Greek author who shall remain nameless — only because he was too spineless to identify himself — has a few pointers for incoming freshmen on "Making All the Right Moves."

First, the unnamed Weak Greek tells his readers that they are all "lonely worms," and that "no one . . . could even care if you hung yourself from the MU."

Then he creates a scenario: Ima Dork and Joe Sharpstud come to ASU. Ima Dork lives in a dorm and his life is hell. Joe Sharpstud joins a fraternity and has "cute coeds" just "busting out of their tank tops to go out with him." Joe winds up marrying Betty Blondbush — a name obviously coined by someone who holds womanhood in high regard — and becoming president of a Fortune 500 company.

If Jonathan Swift had taken pen in hand with the purpose of satirizing the stereotype of Greek life, he could scarcely have been more absurd. It's little wonder that the author declined to reveal his identity. Chances are the average sorority member

would rather date Ima Dork than a guy who thinks of women as "Betty Blondbushes."

But then again, that shouldn't surprise them. Lie No. 6 back a few pages was, "We treat our little sisters with respect."

It's too bad that the leadership of the *Greek Review* contributes to the stereotypes of Greek life. Although I am what some Greeks refer to as a GDI, I have known a lot of people in fraternities and sororities, and they never struck me as people who viewed themselves as Sharpstuds and the rest of the world as Dorks. Well, not most of them, anyway.

In any event, if everybody in the Greek system reads the *Greek Review* — and I suspect most of them do — they should give some serious thought to the image that is being dictated by the leadership of the publication.

Publishing is serious business. It allows room for humor — which I assume was the unattained purpose of the "Fifty Lies" list, for example — but one must always bear in mind the potential ramifications of that humor. In this case, the consequences are an ongoing perception in the minds of most non-Greeks that fraternity men are shallow, self-satisfied buffoons.

We, as ASU students and fanatical followers of Sun Devil football, have attended every home game for the past three years, as well as several games in California. We have never had occasion to write the *State Press* previously, but we are compelled to cry out against the atrocities that befell us Wednesday morning in our attempt to obtain season tickets.

Dianne Yeager, ASU ticket office manager, was quoted by the *State Press* as saying, "We expect the student section to also sell out very quickly" and "we're even expecting a return to people lining up for tickets (the night before they go on sale)." # Women's caucus faces tough political choices in '88

PORTLAND, Ore. — From its beginning 16 years ago, the National Women's Political Caucus (NWPC) has been pro-choice. On the issues of reproductive freedom, including the abortion option, the caucus and the women's movement remain single-minded and strong.

But the biennial convention here last week showed the 1,000 or so delegates — and presumably the 77,000 other activist women who belong to NWPC's state affiliates — are struggling with other choices.

Democratic women members, almost all of whom fall on the liberal end of the spectrum, are torn between the emotional appeal of the prospective presidential candidacy of Rep. Patricia Schroeder (D-Colo.) and the practical considerations that have taken many of them into leadership roles in the campaigns of the seven male contenders.

The mood of the Republican women was captured on the button worn by Sharon Hageman of Riverside, Calif., head of the NWPC resolutions committee. Between an elephant and an equal-rights symbol were the words, "It ain't easy."

Republican women of NWPC feel they are being shunned by their party. Kay Orr of Nebraska, the only new woman governor elected last year and the head of the 1988 Republican platform committee, did not come here to discuss the issues. Nor did Maureen Reagan, an avowed feminist who is co-chairman of the national Republican Party.

All of the prospective presidential candidates were invited; five Democrats and no Republicans accepted. The GOP gentlemen, said Mary Stanley of Fresno, co-head of the GOP women's task force, "are afraid to come here because word might get out to the New Right, Ronnie-come-lately Republicans that they said something we liked."

Nor did any of the prominent Republican women attend: not the widely admired Elizabeth Dole, one of the "founding mothers" of NWPC, nor the much-loved Mary Louise Smith, former Republican

national chairman and a leading supporter of George Bush.

Tanya Melich of New York, a founder of NWPC and veteran Rockefeller Republican, told fellow-partisans that after years with a "split personality, I have decided the stress and strain of being effective both as a Republican and a feminist are too difficult."

For now, Melich said, she is going to subordinate feminism, "support the nominee, be a good loser and then move in." In time, she said, she and like-minded people may be able to wrest control of the GOP from conservatives and even "elect a woman Republican president by the year 2000."

Others are discouraged that not one Republican presidential contender is running on a pro-choice, pro-Equal Rights Amendment platform. They are either planning to sit it out in 1988 or put their feminism first by supporting Schroeder. Martha Ezzard, who made a credible losing run for the 1986 Republican senatorial nomination in Colorado, quit the legislature last month and switched parties. Several other GOP women, Washington, D.C., to Marin County, Calif., said they were contemplating enlisting for Schroeder.

On issues as well as candidates, the women activists have moved beyond symbolism. When convention speakers mentioned the ERA, there was none of the fervent shouting of those initials one heard at earlier NWPC conventions. "It doesn't have the same emotional intensity," Lewis said. "It remains an important symbol, but people are much more focused on electing more women to office at all levels, making our impact felt on the presidential platforms and campaigns and defeating the (Robert) Bork nomination."

In a similar vein, Republican Hageman said she found this year's NWPC resolutions debates (from which the press was excluded) "less strident, more focused than ever before." A proposed constitutional amendment to allocate half the House and Senate seats to women got short shrift in her committee. "I simply asked the sponsor if she wanted me to work against Pete Wilson (the Republican senator from California) at the same time I'm lobbying him on the Bork nomination, or did she propose to double the size of the Senate," Hageman said.

Symbolism is out. Hard choices and hard-boiled judgments are in.

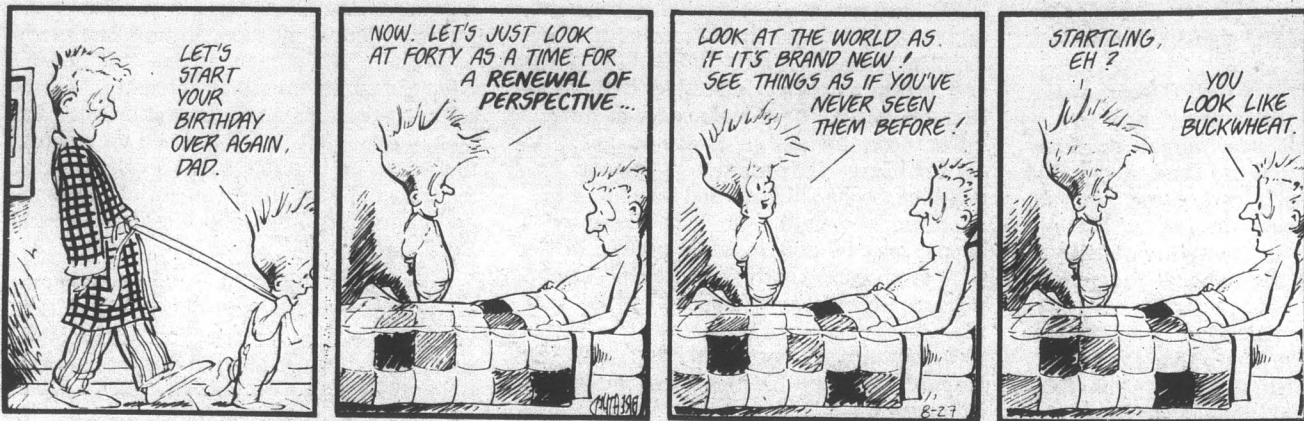

Regents to review construction plans

The Arizona Board of Regents' capital review committee will meet this afternoon at 2:30 p.m. at the regents' Phoenix office to discuss construction at ASU, ASU-West and NAU.

The committee will discuss three aspects of campus construction:

- Upgrading utilities and renovation of existing buildings.
- The status of major projects (more than \$400,000) already approved by the regents.
- Review of projects submitted for approval.

Regent Herman Chanen, a committee member, said each university has submitted a five-year plan for review.

John Ordini, ASU assistant director for administration and space management for planning and construction, said the meeting is to inform the regents of upcoming funding requests and to update them on current projects.

Committee members will consider each plan and either make recommendations for action to the board or request more information from the universities, he said.

# Many Valley schools closing Sept. 14 for Papal visitation

Classes at ASU and many Valley elementary and high schools will be canceled on Sept. 14, when Pope John Paul II makes his first journey to Phoenix and the Southwest.

ASU main and ASU West classes are rescheduled for reading day, Dec. 11, traditionally set aside for students to study.

The pontiff will visit St. Simon and Jude Cathedral, 6351 N. 27th Ave., at 12:30 p.m. Sept. 14, where he will make a short address before an expected crowd of 1,200.

Traffic surrounding the cathedral will interfere with access to the Montebello ASU campus, six blocks south of the church, Dean of Faculty at ASU West Dell Felder said.

Phoenix College officials have cancelled all classes before 4:45 p.m. on the day of the pope's visit, but those also will be rescheduled.

The college is in the heart of the Pope's 9:40 a.m. motorcade route along Central Avenue. The parade will restrict Phoenix College campus entrances except from the west, said Candace Hughes, a college spokeswoman.

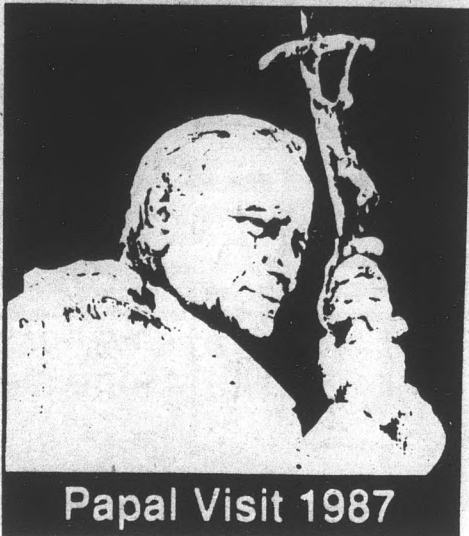
"It would be difficult for students to come to campus on that day," she said.

Major thoroughfares between Osborn Road and Monroe Street and 7th Avenue and 7th Street will be closed Sept. 14. All side streets leading to Central Avenue will be closed at 6 a.m. and reopen when specators disperse.

In addition, Rio Salado Community College morning classes in central Phoenix will be canceled because of the parade.

However, Mesa Community College will remain open and classes will be conducted.

Traffic in Tempe will not create a delay

for faculty and students coming to campus that day, said Howard Greenlee, a spokesman for the college.

"MCC is right on the Superstition Freeway and we are the only college in town that's on a freeway," he said.

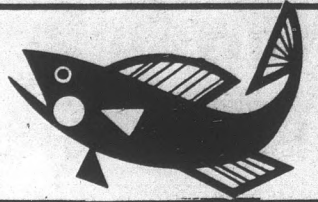
All Valley Catholic elementary schools and high schools will be closed Monday so students can see the pope and attend mass at Sun Devil Stadium, said Marge Injasoulan, a spokeswoman for the Diocese of Phoenix.

Phoenix Union High School District classes will be canceled for its eight high schools and vocational center, said Roger Romero, a spokesman for the district.

Altogether, the visit will affect more than 20,000 Valley high school students, he said.

Central and North High Schools will be affected the most by traffic congestion caused by the thousands of people expected to line Central Avenue, Romero said.

# New tuition formula may cause increases

A new formula for setting tuition simplifies the Arizona Board of Regents' job, but may mean more tuition hikes for students, the director of the Arizona Students Association said Wednesday.

Mick Dalrymple said the formula, which calls for a one-half to 1 percent tuition increase during the next five years, would "provide some predictability for the regents" by eliminating the annual tuition adjustment process and providing a base for future tuition hikes.

But the plan also will increase the percentage Arizona students pay for their education from 20 percent to 25 percent.

Michael Konz, ASU Associated Students' State Relations director, said he is "not sure" the plan will work. But the idea is to provide a predictable increase for budget planning and eliminate the "emotional factors" of yearly tuition hikes, he said.

Konz said the plan will allow Arizona universities' tuition costs to remain among the lowest one-third in the nation.

Bob Lawless, chairman of the regents' finance committee, said the new plan would provide more predictability in tuition increases because tuition would rise by an almost set amount each year.

But Lawless said it will not "totally take away" the yearly problem of setting tuition.

"There's still a small range (about one-half percent) of variability," he said.

The present tuition policy is based on the cost of education, using instructional, student service and institutional support budgets.

Registration fees are based on 20 percent of the cost of education, but the new plan would call for an automatic annual increase of one half to one percentage point.

Dalrymple said he would like to see tuition based on the state budget plan and an accompanying financial aid plan.

Financial aid for ASU, NAU and U of A will be reviewed at a regents' finance committee meeting next Thursday in Tucson.

Dalrymple said the board has made an effort to increase financial aid, but the state has not.

"The regents increased tuition waivers by 10 percent last year," he said. "And they're expecting to increase 10 percent this year."

On the other hand, Arizona is ranked 49th in the 50 states for state-supported financial aid.

A regents' financial aid task force is set to begin investigating student aid problems in September.

Dalrymple said ASA members will work on the task force to lobby for grant programs and against loans because of problems students face in repaying loans.

The tuition plan will be reviewed at the regents' Sept. 11 meeting in Tucson, but Konz said 1988-89 tuition rates probably will not be set until December.



# Broken gate-access arm causes jam in parking lot

Fifty-five cars with valid decals were forced to park along red no-parking strips in Lot 42 after the lot's gate-access arm broke down early Wednesday morning.

But the illegally parked cars were not cited because no legal spaces were available in Lot 42, said Ron Kucera, ASU Parking and Transit program coordinator.

Kucera said the inoperative access gate was left open to allow cars to enter. It also was left unmanned, and cars without proper decals entered, forcing late-arriving cars with Lot 42 decals to park illegally.

The cars were redirected to Lot 40 while the problem was being addressed, Kucera said.

Dorothy Herren of Parking and Transit ticketed cars without proper decals, but she said, "There haven't been many."

"It's a big mess," Herren said. "It causes a hazard for the (trams) having to weave in

and out."

Richard Landreth, assistant director of Parking and Transit, said the problem was not a result of overselling decals.

However, he said, "In the first week, there is always usage far above what we sold for."

Students who normally are not on campus at the same time often swamp the campus during the first week to conduct business, Landreth said.

The inconvenience upset some students. Senior liberal arts major Robert Wegner said he was told by a Parking and Transit officer to go to Lot 59, where he parked last year.

"I didn't pay \$75 to park in Lot 59," Wegner said.

Another student left a note on his car threatening a lawsuit if the parking situation was not remedied.

Lot 59 decals cost \$37, while Lot 42 stickers cost \$75.

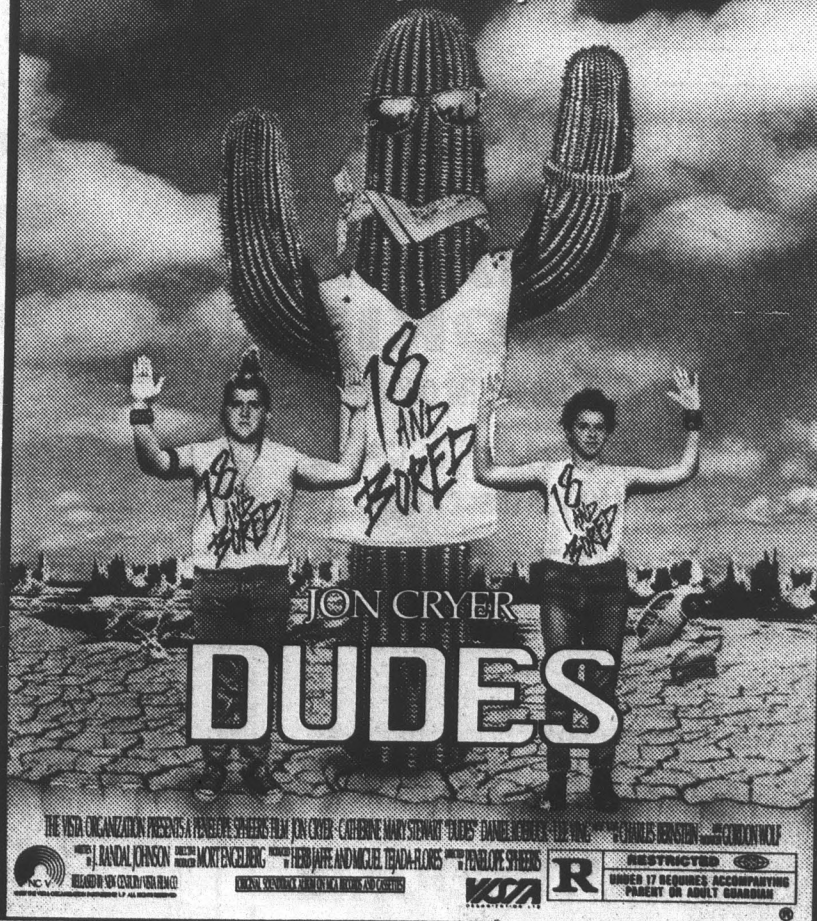



# U of A to initiate telephone registration

U of A students will be able to "let their fingers do the registering" with a registration-by-phone program to begin in spring of 1988, but ASU officials say they have no plans to follow suit.

Walk-through registration, the time-consuming process when students have to pick-up class cards spread out in arenas, is about to become a thing of the past for U of A students.

ASU last used the walk-through method in 1979 and will stick with its current on-line registration, according to the University registrar.

"We have little interest in the telephone registration system at this time because the current on-line registration is better for the students and the school," Registrar Enos E. Underwood said. "This will be the case unless the problems (we see with the system) are overcome."

"We have reviewed the system for the past two years and we will not implement (a telephone registration) program . . . because only half the students would use it (and) it would be grossly unfair to the others."

Students enrolled in the Colleges of Architecture and Environmental Design, Engineering and Applied Sciences, Fine Arts, Law, Nursing, Public Programs, and Social Work would be excluded from telephone registration since the programs require adviser approval before registration and during the drop-add period, Underwood said.

Postage costs are an expensive disadvantage for the

program, he added.

"When the student registers over the phone, we would have to send them a billing statement. Now this would be fine except we would also have to do this with drop-add and this would more than triple the postage cost if stamps cost 22 cents and you have around 40,000 students."

Underwood said community colleges are the best candidates for telephone registration.

"This system would be ideal for community colleges since most of their students do not require adviser signatures because most are undecided, and are just taking general courses to prepare for universities," Underwood said.

A U of A official said he is not concerned with the postage costs, adding the telephone method will probably lower them.

"Given our postage cost now to the one that we will start in the spring, it will be cheaper," U of A Associate Registrar Dexter Schubert said. "Although we will send mail to students, the bulk will be smaller than the one they would receive from the old registration."

Rather than proceeding to on-line registration from the old walk-through method, Schubert said telephone registration is the best method to save students time and money.

"We are bypassing (on-line) registration altogether because the telephone method will save our students and employees time."

"All the student has to do is talk to the adviser and then register by answering computer-generated queries (by) pushing numbers and codes on buttons of their phone," Schubert said.

### 2 women escape injury during trailer home fire

Two Tempe women escaped serious injury early Wednesday morning after a deliberately set fire caused \$5,000 damage to their trailer home, Tempe police said.

Dorothy Imperiale, 19, and Cheryl Hill, 17, of the 4600 block of S. Priest Drive, escaped through a back door of their trailer while its front was engulfed in flames.

"Somebody set fire to the front entrance of their trailer," police spokesman Roger Austin said. "An unknown person poured a flammable liquid and ignited it."

Austin said the women were asleep inside the trailer when Tempe firefighters arrived at the scene at 6:56 a.m. after receiving an anonymous 911 call.

One of the women told investigators she has received threats against her life this week.

"She indicates that she recently has been receiving threatening notes and also recently had damage to her car," Austin said.

Austin said there are no suspects.

About 11 a.m., security began distributing "roll" tickets to students with valid IDs that allowed them to return and buy tickets later instead of standing in the 103-degree heat.

But even the roll ticket alternative irritated some students. "It's horrible — we've got to stand in line again," said Todd Unrein, a liberal arts student. "When we come back later, it's still going to be a zoo."

Meanwhile, security sprinkled the crowd with a garden hose, trying to cool off temperatures and tempers.

Lt. Craig Emanuel of the ASU police said there were a few arguments about people cutting in line, but no fights or arrests were reported.

Although Yeager disputed claims about individual students purchasing large quantities of season passes, she warned

students away from trusting strangers with their ID and money.

"I really caution students to be careful because unless they know that person, they aren't guaranteed of getting a ticket," Yeager said.

"There was one big group, but we had to turn them away because the bank wouldn't guarantee their check."

and we plan to educate them."

The bill's author, College of Engineering Sen. Kevin Anderson, said the guidelines are not intended to discriminate, "only to set fair guidelines for clubs to understand the policies."

Heap said another lawsuit "is not really a possibility," but added that she is "in constant contact with (the LGAU's) lawyer."

Darrel Jackson, secretary of United Campuses to Prevent Nuclear War (UCAM), also appeared before the senate for support.

Jackson said he found conflicting guidelines in the bill.

"Under two sections of the bill, UCAM qualifies for funding," he said. "But the section that defines the policies of the Political Union places us in a non-funding area."

He said he is worried about funding for his organization because of the vagueness of the bill.

"I hope the committee members are aware of these problems when considering the bill," he said.

The senate also passed a resolution approving the appointment of junior Mark Hiland as the executive assistant to the president.

Executive Vice President Will Daly proposed to transfer \$16,437 out of the fund balance to senate and executive contingencies for later use by ASASU because it was not spent last year. Daly said the money needs to be transferred or it will be cut from the budget next year.



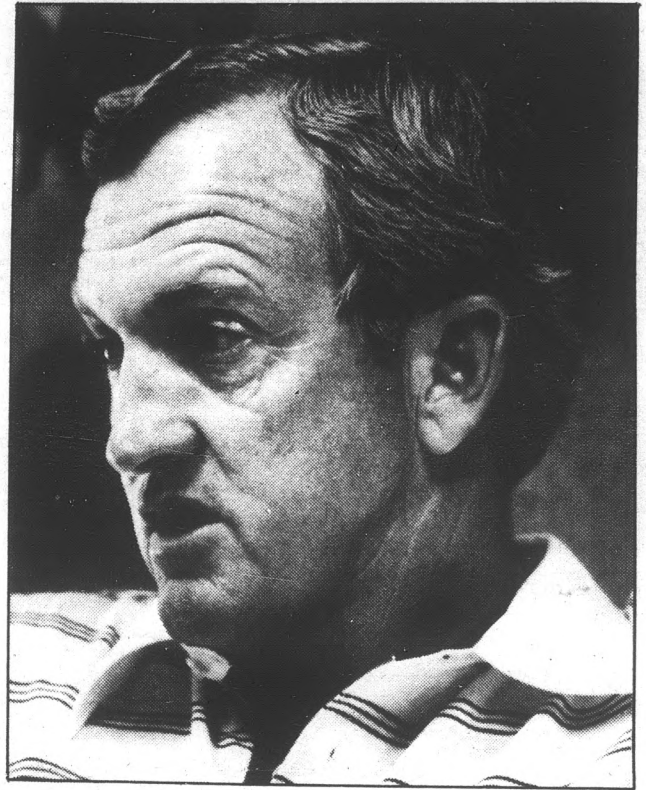


## Cooper says fan support key to Devils' success

Can the Sun Devils repeat? That was the main question ASU head coach John Cooper faced as he spoke to the Pac-10 Skywriters Wednesday. The writers travel around the Pac-10 cities and analyze each team in the conference. Cooper told the reporters the key to repeating a Pac-10 Championship would be the support of the fans, and if that is the key, they should repeat. This season marks the first preseason sellout in Sun Devil history. "They'll (the fans) be disappointed if we don't repeat," Cooper said. "I expect us to repeat, but if I had to pick a team, I'd have to pick UCLA." Cooper singled out UCLA's Troy Aikman as one of the best quarterbacks in the conference and gave UCLA credit for having one of the best recruiting seasons this year. Defensive tackle Shawn Patterson said the sellout is giving the team a boost. "It gives us a lot of encouragement," he said "The more support we have, the better." Cooper said if the crowd could win three games, the Sun Devils would do the rest. "There are three games the crowd has to win for us: Nebraska, UCLA, and Arizona," he said. "I think the biggest mistake in the Rose Bowl was when Jim Harbaugh (Michigan's quarterback) was intimidated by the crowd, the fans definitely helped us win the game." Cooper said filling the positions of 20 lettermen lost last season will be also be a key. "All we have to do this year to repeat as Pac-10 champions is find a flanker, a tight end, a right tackle, a center, a left

tackle and a quarterback on offense," Cooper joked. "On defense, we need an outside linebacker, a defensive end, a free safety and a bunch of interior linemen." Filling the positions of tight end, quarterback and devilback may not be easy. Junior Gary Knudson, a transfer from Edmonds, Wa., seems to have captured the starting tight end position, even though Cooper said he probably won't be as good as ex-Sun Devils Jeff Galimore and Stein Koss. Cooper also announced that junior Dan Ford will be the starting quarterback for the Devils' opener against Illinois Sept. 12th. "He's (Ford) the only one who has stayed healthy," Cooper said. "I don't anticipate changes." At the devilback position, Rodney Dillard is likely to start, despite missing most of camp with a leg injury. With the season opener over three weeks away, Cooper said the players just might have trouble seeing the light at the end of the tunnel. But having three weeks to work might not be so bad. "I felt a lot better about our team a week ago," Cooper said. "Right now we're a little beat up and tired." "I have a feeling we have a lot more work in front of us," Patterson said. "It might be an easier schedule but the player we're missing will make it a tougher year." Outland Trophy candidate Randall McDaniel was also present at the luncheon, and commented on what he thinks it will take for him to win that trophy. "I just want to go out and give 100 percent in games and in practice," he said. "I want to play the best game I can." "There is more pressure this year, everyone is shooting to knock us off the top," McDaniel said.

## ASU golfer makes cut; readies for tournament

ASU golfer Bill Mayfair, the top-ranked amateur in the U.S., scored an even-par 70 yesterday during the final round of qualifications, giving the Phoenix native a two-day total of 145 and tying him for fourth place. Mayfair, a three-time All-America golfer, tees off today against 64 of the nation's top amateur golfers in the Men's U.S. Amateurs Golf Tournament, Jupiter Hill, Fla. The tournament, which began on Monday, will play to a conclusion by Friday, eliminating half of the competing golfers after each 18-hole round. The field at the start of qualification rounds numbered 282 amateur golfers, including ASU golf team members senior Jim Strickland and freshman John Bizik. Strickland shot a two-over-par 74 Wednesday in the final round of qualifications, but his two-day total of 158 was too high for a tournament berth. Bizik found himself in a similar situation after shooting

a five-over-par 79. The former Oklahoma state champion now has a two-day total of 155.

The top qualifying score, according to a tournament official, was 141, with the cutoff score for a tournament berth at 151.

Mayfair blamed the weather — temperatures in the 90s with 95 percent humidity — for many of the higher-than-expected qualification scores. "The weather here is sick," said Mayfair. "It's hard for everyone."

As the action moves to regular tournament play among the top 64 qualifying golfers, the competition will get fierce, perhaps as uncomfortably hot as the climate, said Mayfair.

"The competition is tough," he said. "These are the best amateur golfers in the U.S."

## Ticket wait becomes fiasco

What began as a festive night camp-out turned into an ugly fiasco Wednesday, as students waited in line for up to 12 hours to purchase ASU student football season tickets.

Worried they might get shut-out from seeing the Sun Devils in action this year, more than 1,000 students braved lightning-filled skies Tuesday night in hopes of securing one of the 10,000 student tickets.

The crowd, which began arriving as early as 2 p.m. Tuesday, was very festive, but well-behaved.

But the parties of the night before quickly turned into headaches in the morning; and not just from hangovers.

With a 1 a.m. arrival at the scene, I knew this event was going to be special — in one way or another. The maze of people camping out stretched from Sun Devil Stadium to 3/4 of the way around the Activity Center — something nobody had really expected.

The students on hand were jovial, and many seemed to use the occasion to meet other people.

But by daybreak I realized it was going to be a long day. Not only did I not get much (if any) sleep, but when I went to pick up a copy of the *State Press*, I came back to find the line had already moved.

My roommate was sleeping at the time and, instead of moving up about 100 feet, we actually wound up farther back than where we started.

But the line moved fairly swiftly at first, and I was about halfway to the stadium by the time 8:00 came around.

And that's when the nightmare began. An hour went by.

Another hour went by, and another. The temperature was getting hotter, and so were tempers.

Only one person at a time was being allowed to approach one of the two or three ticket windows (depending on how many employees were drinking coffee at the same time).

With the slow movement, the line extended all the way around the UAC almost to the traffic light at the corner of Stadium Drive and Sixth St.

Finally, after three hours, I got about 30 feet from the entrance to the ticket office. It then took three more hours to move those thirty feet.

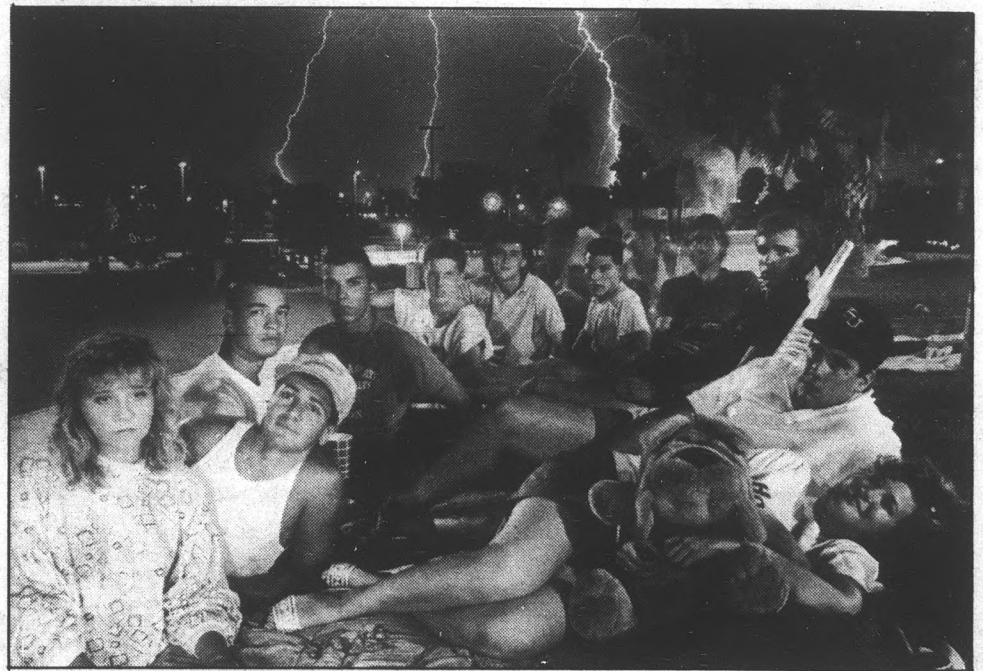
Amid the sweaty bodies that were packed together like sardines, security officials doused the crowd with a water hose — drawing the only cheers of the day from the exhausted throng. It looked like Woodstock.

In all, I finally got a ticket at 2:04 p.m. — more than 13 hours after I got in line. But even that wasn't enough. The ticket office was giving out roll numbers — which actually was a ticket that guaranteed you would get a season ticket.

The employees on duty sent us away, saying we had to come back and stand in another line after 3 p.m. to purchase the actual tickets. But, every so often, 20 people were selected to walk right up and buy tickets on-the-spot.

The ticket sales were a mess. It was terribly unorganized, understaffed and conducted in the wrong way.

The ticket office was expecting a line-up,

and they did open at 6 a.m. "so students wouldn't miss their classes."

But I camped out, and I missed my classes. So did everyone else.

The two major problems at the ticket sales, beside the time it takes (sometimes up to three minutes per student) to validate each ticket and ID, was line-cutting and excessive purchasing.

One reason a bottleneck was created close to the ticket office was line-cutting by ignorant jerks. This is a University. There are long lines here.

You would think most students are mature enough to respect the amount of time and effort it takes to stand in a line —

especially one that lasts 13 hours.

Another major problem with the lines was the fact that there was no limit to the number of tickets a student could purchase, as long as they had a validated ID for each ticket requested.

Many students at the beginning of the line were offering to buy tickets for students at prices ranging from \$35 to \$45. There were reports of people buying up to 150 tickets apiece, such as a pledge buying tickets for an entire fraternity or sorority. With each ticket taking between one and three minutes to validate, one person could conceivably be at the window for seven hours.

Maybe that explains the line.
