

## Bender announces intent to leave post

Saying he is tired with the job pressures, ASU College of Law Dean Paul Bender announced Wednesday that he will step down from his post next semester. He is credited for making the University's law school nationally recognized and respected.

Bender, 55, said he has not decided what he will do after he leaves his post at the end of spring semester in 1989.

"If President Reagan is looking for somebody to fill a spot on the U.S. Supreme Court, I'm available," Bender said, laughing.

"I'm taking the plunge, yeah," he said. "It'll be five years at the end of this year. I've felt a disconnection from the substance of law. The day-to-day pressures and frustrations of administration are tough. You need a lot of enthusiasm to do a job like this."

"It's not that I'm leaving this to do something else. It's good to have a turnover every once in a while."

A national search is expected to be started this month to name a new dean. The law college is home to about 450 students, and since 1983, its enrollment has grown nearly 5 percent.

Bender said he and his wife, Margaret, may consider returning to his hometown, Philadelphia, where their two college-age sons live.

"The time (until resignation) gives me some targets."

Bender has overseen a multi-million dollar addition to the college's building and the implementation of programs to involve Hopi Indians with the school.

"It's that kind of thing that I was going to have do something else. We just finished a building and got some programs going and there's another building coming up. It'll be good to have somebody else to get that going."

Bender said the new building will be a law library, adding he will concentrate this year on raising private capital to build the library.

"I think the school has gotten more of a national reputation. We've hired some very good people."

Bender was praised for the connections he has established with the legal community in the state. During the impeachment trial of former Gov. Evan Mecham, Bender, a noted constitutional scholar, was frequently called on for his opinion to the proceedings.

William French, one of the state-appointed prosecutors in the Mecham impeachment trial, said he was "amazed and disappointed" at Bender's plans.

"It's certainly a negative for the school," French said. "He's an excellent, outstanding dean. I got to know him during the impeachment process, and he is universally respected. He'll be tough to replace."

"If he becomes an active member of the bar, it'll be good for the legal profession."

Tom Zlaket, president of Arizona Bar Association, was shocked at news of Bender's resignation.

"Is that right? I saw him about a month ago and he didn't let on about it," Zlaket said. "It's a great loss to ASU. I hope he stays on as a professor. This is a complete surprise to me."

"He's a wonderful human being and a fine, fine lawyer. He's as classy a lawyer as I've ever seen."

"He's brought the school a long way in terms of stature and reputation. I've spent many hours with Paul Bender and he's a brilliant legal scholar."

Arizona Attorney General Bob Corbin, a republican, said that although he differs philosophically with Bender, a democrat, he "highly respects him."

"I like him. I think he's been a fine dean," Corbin said. "He's very intelligent and well-respected. He's leaving, huh? I'll be darned."

Bender said he told ASU President J. Russell Nelson in February of his plans, which, ironically, was about the same time Nelson has said he decided to step down at the end of spring semester in 1989.

"He's an outstanding person and internationally known for his work," Nelson said. "He made important steps in bringing the College of Law forward in the profession."

"He was very good for the University."

Andrew Hurwitz, a fellow attorney who also is a member of the Arizona Board of Regents, said Bender is a dean of "national stature."

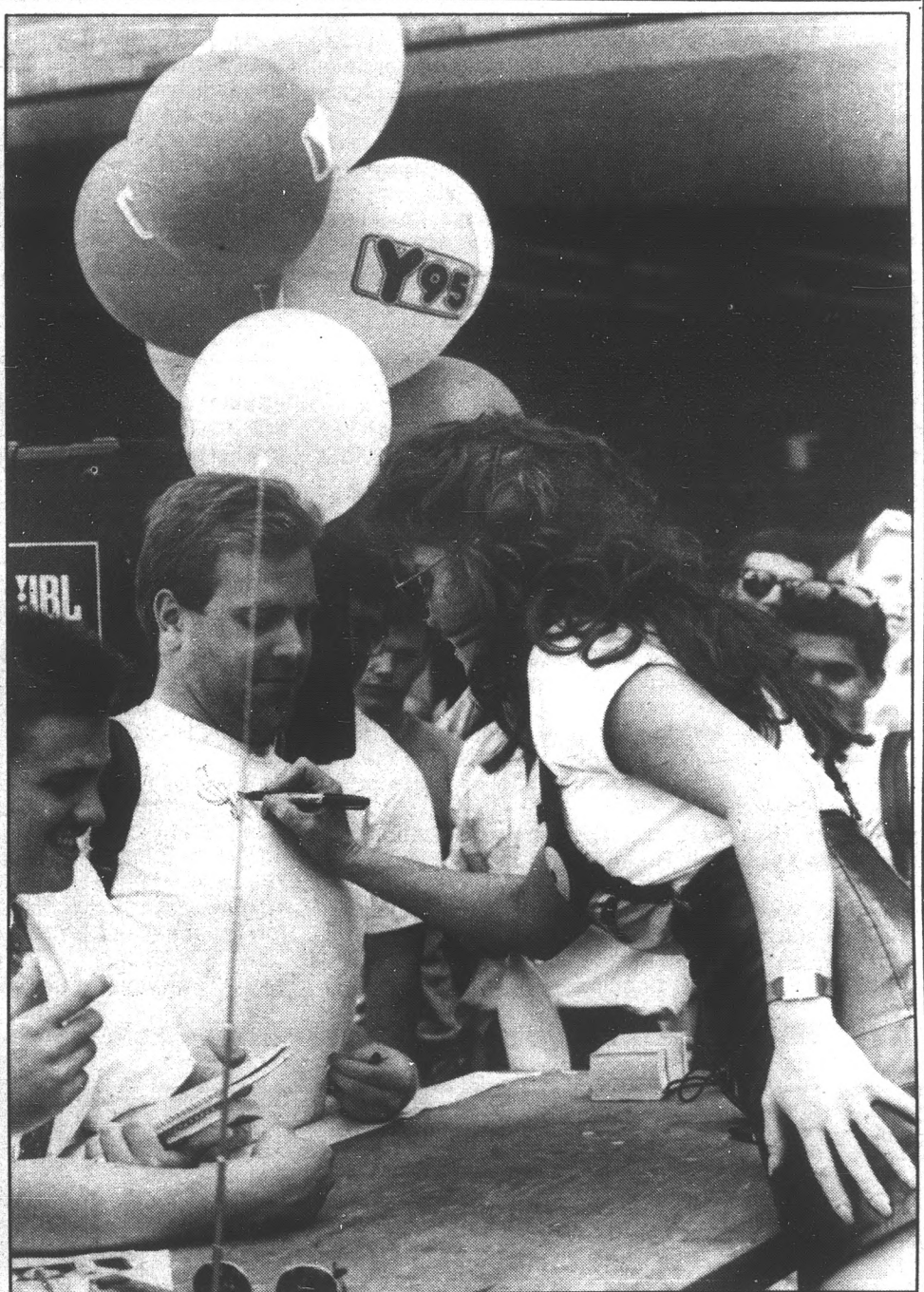
"Paul has been a marvelous dean," Hurwitz said. "He has continued to promote the recruiting and retention of good faculty."

Regent Jack Pfister said, "I agree that he has done an outstanding job at the ASU law school. I'll be sorry to see him go."

Regent Doug Wall also said he will be sorry to see Bender step down.

Associated Students President John Fees complimented Bender for organizing legal debates and forums for students.

## Dean's patio becomes 'zoo' as Hahn appears on campus

What began as a promotional event for the College of Business' awareness week turned into a zoo of sweaty, hopeful faces, Playboy magazines and silly comments when self-proclaimed media creature Jessica Hahn was paraded on campus Wednesday.

Hahn and members of KOY-FM's "Y-95 Morning Zoo" were in the "dean's patio" of the business college for a live broadcast to promote the college's professional business fraternity rush.

But with the station's faulty broadcast equipment and Hahn, September's Playboy covergirl who was seated on an elevated stage in the center of the pandemonium, the radio business became secondary as a mob scene re-

sembling the early 1950s game show "Silly For Dollars" formed around Hahn.

Amid the chaos, Hahn flipped her red hair from shoulder to shoulder and straightened the black leather suspenders to her black leather skirt, saying, "Now, let's give everyone a chance." Then she giggled.

The rest of the "Zoo crew" was less at ease.

Glenn Beck, one of the radio station's morning DJs, called a reporter "media scum" when she pressed him for answers concerning the broadcast.

Meanwhile, a cool, well-rehearsed Hahn gave make-up stained T-shirts, which she had used as blotting towels, to eager fans.

## Alcohol banning 'simply an option'

While rumors of banning alcohol at ASU fraternity houses are spreading around the Greek system, ASU administrators say the idea is simply an option that is being considered.

A University committee was formed recently to study alcohol use on campus, primarily in fraternity houses. But committee members say a total ban is currently not the best solution, though it is not out of the question.

"As an educational institution, I'd like to keep in more of a teaching role, and I think we can teach responsible behavior surrounding the issues of alcohol and other types of substance abuses without banning things," said Fred Najjar, associate director of residence life and a member of the committee.

"I don't know if banning alcohol lessens the issue of alcohol misuse or abuse. That's not one I advocate right now."

### Delta jetliner crashes, claims 13 lives in Texas

GRAPEVINE, Texas (AP) — A Delta Air Lines 727 jetliner burst into flames as it crashed on takeoff Wednesday, killing 13 people. But 94 passengers survived, some cradling infants, scrambled out of the shattered fuselage through "a pit of fire."

At mid-afternoon, six hours after the crash in hazy sunshine at Dallas-Fort Worth Airport, Delta spokesman Bill Berry in Atlanta said 13 fatalities, including an infant, were confirmed, but the numbers of victims could continue to fluctuate. The count was complicated by the difficulty in determining how many babies were aboard, he said.

Thirty-four survivors were hospitalized, Berry said. Survivors included the captain and two other pilots, one of whom was working as a flight engineer, he said.

"We were just terrified," passenger Mona Thomason said. "We jumped on the wing, but it looked like we were

jumping into a pit of fire." She reported seeing a woman with two children, "She got one of them out, but I'm afraid the other one was caught in the fire."

Investigators had no immediate indication of the cause of the crash, said Michael Benson, a spokesman for the National Transportation Safety Board in Washington.

### Mandela moved from hospital to private clinic

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (AP) — Jailed black nationalist Nelson Mandela has been moved from a hospital to a private clinic while he recuperates from tuberculosis, the government said Thursday. The move sets the stage for a possible release from government custody.

Mandela, 70, was transferred on Aug. 12 from Pollsmoor Prison, to nearby Tygerberg Hospital, where he was diagnosed with the disease.

Mandela, leader of the outlawed African National Con-

gress, has been in prison for 26 years.

He has been making a speedy recovery from his illness, his doctors have said, and was moved late Wednesday night to the Constantiaberg Clinic in Cape Town, a spokesman for the prison service, Danie Immelman, told the independent South African Press Association.

### Smoker allegedly shoves TWA flight attendant

LOS ANGELES (AP) — A smoker became outraged and shoved a flight attendant across an aisle when he was told he couldn't light up, a prosecutor said Tuesday, but a defense attorney argued that the man didn't touch any airline employee.

James Tabacca, 34, a mortician, was on board a Trans World Airlines flight from Boston to Los Angeles in December when it was announced shortly before take-off that smoking would be banned on the flight.

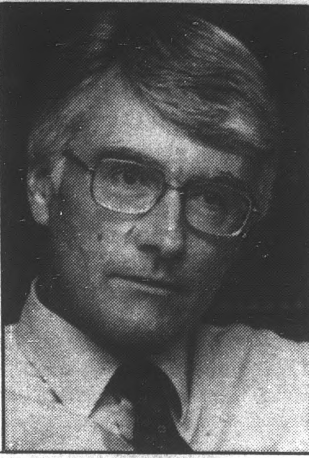

### Goal set at \$155,000 for United Way drive

This year's goal for ASU's United Way drive is \$155,000.

The campaign will kick off Oct. 4 with a luncheon hosted by ASU President J. Russell Nelson. He will address 130 faculty and staff members who will work with the fundraising drive.

Co-chairs of this year's campaign are Michael Alden, assistant athletic director for administration at the University Activity Center, and Mary Lou Galligan, associate journalism professor.

### Future ASU doctoral student to compete in Olympic Games

Dan Durben, a 29-year-old incoming doctoral student at ASU, will be one of 26 American shooters representing the United States at the 1988 Summer Olympic Games in Seoul, South Korea.

Durben has already won a silver medal in Air Rifle at the 1986 World Championships, a team gold in the 1987 World Air Gun Championships, a silver for Free Rifle in the 1988 World Cup held in Mexico City and a gold and silver in the 1988 World Cup held in Rio. He has been a resident athlete at the Olympic Training Center for the past four years.

Durben will compete in Men's Free Rifle 3-Position at the Olympic Games. This event is shot with a .22-caliber rifle. The event is fired in three positions: prone, standing and kneeling at a distance of 50 meters. Four shots are taken in each position for a possible score of 1,200. The bullseye target is used with a center approximately the size of a dime.

Upon returning from the Olympics, Durben will enter ASU's doctoral program in chemistry. He has attended Eastern Kentucky University and West Virginia University.

### MacKinnon appointed director of Center for Asian Studies

Stephen MacKinnon, a professor of history, has been appointed director of ASU's center for Asian studies.

He succeeds Sheldon Simon, a political science professor who held the post for eight years. Simon plans to devote more time to teaching and research.

MacKinnon, who speaks fluent Chinese and accompanied ASU President J. Russell Nelson on a 1987 trip to China, will start the position immediately.

MacKinnon said he plans to expand the center's community outreach and develop more student activities in Asian studies.

He joined the University's faculty in 1971.

"Hey, I could sell this!" one fan said. "Jessica! We're still on for tonight, aren't we? 'Cause I gotta go to class," David Plote, a senior business major, called out.

The nearly 300 people had waited for more than an hour for Hahn and the radio team, which was 45 minutes late.

"No, I was in church," she said. As the crowd pressed the stage for autographs, radio station officials signed Hahn's name to press photographs to expedite the lines.

The photos featured Hahn's well-publicized breast enlargement, nose job and new front teeth.

Apparently, the recent hype surrounding Hahn and her recent signing of a 30-day contract with the station is working to bring in listeners.

"She's not very professional, but I find myself tuning in," said Troy Goodwin, a senior business major who was manning a business fraternity booth.

## Dean of Business College writes letter regarding Hahn's ASU visit

The dean of the College of Business delivered a letter to the offices of the State Press to distance the college from Wednesday's hoopla that surrounded radio disc jockey and Playboy cover-girl Jessica Hahn's appearance on campus.

"The College of Business does not support or encourage the image of women as portrayed by Jessica Hahn, and I am certain the women and men of the Business College Council do not endorse her lifestyle," Dean John Kraft writes in a letter that appears in today's letters section of the newspaper.

Hahn appeared on campus Wednesday with colleagues of her new employer, KOY-FM radio, as part of the Business College Council's recruitment week.

"Any of the students attending this recruitment week activity should not be identified with supporting Jessica Hahn's lifestyle," Kraft writes.

Hahn, who was involved in an alleged sexual scandal with the former head of a ministry, recently underwent \$12,000 of cosmetic surgery, the results of which are in the latest edition of Playboy magazine.

A former resident of the magazine's mansion, Hahn is living in Phoenix to be a member of the radio station's morning team.

Kraft's letter states that the college did not invite Hahn to appear on campus, and he apologized for "the unfortunate association with the College."

"I am certain that unfortunate side effects were not intended."

# Friendship

## The value and maintenance of our most neglected relationship

For a large majority of people 40 or under, traditional values literally have no meaning. They are lost concepts. The result is a generation psychologically and morally damaged by shattered relationships, drug abuse, economic and sexual exploitation, self-doubt and disorientation. The situation will improve only as society begins to recover its moral bearings. In this context, friendship can play a redemptive role.

In recent years erotic love has become a popular obsession, while friendship has gone almost unnoticed. As one of the world's foremost thinkers commented not long ago, "It is one of the curious examples of the impoverishment of modern thought that the theme of friendship has almost completely disappeared, if not from our actual life, at least from our contemporary thought and discourse."

Why is this the case? First, most people don't know the difference between pleasant associations and genuine friendship. What Thoreau remarked about his time is even truer of ours: "To say that a man is your friend means commonly no more than this, that he is not your enemy."

Second, the predominant theme of our age (unlimited personal freedom to do whatever we want with our lives) has had a withering effect on our relationships because it concentrates our attention on ourselves. It carries away the very foundations of friendship, which cannot exist in the presence of selfishness.

Third, modern Americans are in perpetual motion: we move on the average of once every seven years and are much more concerned with upward mobility than with visiting the people who live next door. In most parts of the country we have suburbs rather than neighborhoods.

Fourth, our competitive drive for professional achievement and corresponding financial rewards has long since taken precedence over most human relationships. Consequently, friendship is impossible because it requires very significant investments of time as well as intelligence and moral resources.

The sociological equation linking friendship, virtue and the welfare of society was devised long ago, first by Aristotle in his "Ethics" and later by Cicero. Both stressed the importance of friendship to individuals as well as to the state, insisting repeatedly that it is the best possible environment to nurture virtue and happiness.

It is profoundly regrettable that the concept and reality of friendship have been all but lost, because genuine friendship can be one of life's richest experiences as well as a matrix for the common good.

In Aristotle's acclamation of friendship, he wrote that "It is one of the things which life can least afford to be without. No one would choose a friendless existence on condition of having all the other good things in life." Cicero was even more lyrical:

cal: "They take the very sun from the heavens, I should say, when they take friendship from life."

It is unreasonable, of course, to expect people to invest in an unfamiliar commodity. Friendship has to be clearly defined.

C.S. Lewis, one of the few 20th-century thinkers to discuss the subject, borrowed much of his definition from his classical and Christian predecessors: a friend is an "alter ego...who first reveals to you that you are not alone in the world by turning out (beyond hope) to share all your most secret delights."

Explicitly or implicitly, almost every book on friendship, starting with Plato's "Symposium" and finishing with Lewis's essay in "The Four Loves", is precise in isolating and evaluating specific types of

friendship.

The first is called "adolescent friendship." It is inspired by the pleasure that two or more people have in each other's company. Examples abound in urban cruising areas and two-for-one bars.

The second category is "utilitarian friendship," which is based on the profit motive. Two or more people invest in each other because they believe that the association will be mutually beneficial. Despite its obvious limitations many, perhaps most, professional relationships fall into this category.

Personal experience during the last 10 to 15 years persuades me to add another category to the ones already mentioned. I call it "pleasing or amiable companionship." The boundaries of this category are not easily determined. Depending on the character and personality of the people involved, it can cut across adolescent and utilitarian friendships and into the territory of "real friendship", enclosing parts of all three.

Personal experience also compels me to say that an accurate definition of true friendship can defeat its own purpose by putting us in the position of admiring some-

thing we consider so far beyond our capabilities that we do not even try to obtain it. It also provokes the fear that in the acquisition of a few close friends we may lose the comradeship of numerous others who also have an important place in our lives. These anxieties are understandable but unnecessary if we keep in mind the wonderful advantages conferred by nature and grace.

Realistically, all the authorities on friendship agree that mutual attraction

best for them and even make great sacrifices on their behalf, but this is charity, not friendship.

Welded to trust is loyalty, which is the bedrock foundation of every true friendship. In the case of friendship, obligation is imposed by the heart, not by principle or

conscience or even a commitment to integrity (good and necessary as these all are). Friends are loyal not because they are supposed to be but because they cannot be otherwise.

Generosity is another attribute that friendship requires. Although the first to write about it, Aristotle was probably not the first person to understand that "friendship surely consists in giving rather than receiving affection." Friendship cannot always be expressed by means of material generosity and need not be. All of us have substantial gifts to give, beginning with our affection, time and presence.

Honesty is another vital component of

ship, serious vices and flaws in character are the greatest obstacles. All the classical authorities warn their readers against seeking friendship with people who exhibit any of the following weaknesses: habitual anger, pride, hypocrisy, deceit, suspiciousness, disloyalty and gossiping. Realizing

that there is a vice behind every virtue, including love, the medieval authority on friendship, Aelred of Rievaulx, wisely urges his students to "be especially careful not to allow possessiveness to stand in the way of greater service. It's possible that you might hesitate to part with a friend or impose a burden on him because you love him more. But if you know that he will really be more fruitful somewhere else, the right order is for reason to rule affection."

I am inclined to add to the list of friendship-subverting vices immovable self-centeredness, envy, jealousy, cynicism, humorlessness, terminal sanctimoniousness, constant moralizing and the need to control every situation (lurking inside this weakness are chronic fear, distrust and anxiety).

Friendship calls for a practical strategy. The following suggestions should apply in any setting, provided, of course, the foundation is in place (compatibility, merit, sufficient time, etc.):

- Make an inventory of personal characteristics, interests and goals. We have to know ourselves in order to know who would be compatible with us.
- Consider carefully Aelred's primary emphasis: "To lay a solid foundation...build firm principles of spiritual love into the structure itself...This firm foundation is the love of God. Everything must be referenced to it."
- Develop both insight and wide-angle perspective in order to see things as other people do.
- Learn how to be openhearted and grateful, expressing encouragement readily and accepting reinforcement gracefully.
- Learn how to manage time more efficiently so that there is a place in each day for friends.
- Concentrate on being a friend rather than having a friend.
- Get into the company of people who are trying to develop strong moral character and aren't embarrassed if others know it.
- Find a model, a person who embodies honor, generosity, loyalty, etc. (One telling sign of outstanding character: frequent praise of other people when they are not present).
- Develop the virtue of aggressive cheerfulness, the ability to keep things in perspective, to think the best of people and keep smiling.
- Make an unconditional decision to avoid gossip.
- Root out vices and develop contrasting virtues one by one, starting where the going is easiest. After winning some battles and acquiring confidence, take on the more formidable vices.

Who would deny that this struggle is long and demanding. It takes courage to begin and courage to begin again after failure and disappointment. But no one who has true friends would think that Aelred of Rievaulx exaggerated when he summed up the case for friendship:

"It is worth more to the poor than a place of courage to begin and courage to begin in society, better for the sick than medicine, more honorable to the dead than life itself... Honor, renown, praise and admiration surround committed friends." Despite its medieval context, the conclusion of Aelred's again exhortation might be worth some consideration even in our more sophisticated age: "It is not difficult for a friend of man to make the transition to being a friend of God."

and compatibility are essential. No matter how commendable people might be, if they don't share similar characteristics, inclinations and tastes they're not going to have the materials required to build a friendship. It's not necessary to have a perfect match, however. Some joys of mine are not joys of yours. So much the better for both, for we will be united but not consumed.

The decisive factor is always the intensity of shared experiences and the amount of time spent together. Time is vital in developing a friendship and maintaining it.

Trust and loyalty are two other essential components of genuine friendship. It is humanly impossible to befriend people who cannot be trusted. True, we can hope the

true friendship. At the beginning we must disclose our true interests and inclinations. To falsify our personality or to pretend we have similar interests is unjust and wasteful. Pretense is too weak to support a substantial relationship. It is also exhausting and eventually collapses under the weight of truth.

The briefest reflection indicates that one friend's honesty depends upon the other's humility. Most of us dislike criticism of any kind, and few people will listen to moral criticism from anyone except those whom they love and trust. Even then, pride, stubbornness and resentment often wage a fierce rearguard battle which cannot be won without the strength of humility. (In discussing virtue as a cause and effect of friendship, one should not overlook the so-called social virtues, such as tact. Tactless criticism, no matter how well-intended, is unfriendly and unavailing.)

Another indispensable prerequisite and certain sign of true friendship is a forgiving heart. Sometimes, for the sake of the relationship, friends have to crucify their ego, hurts, resentment, the temptation to get even, and even their realization that they are undoubtedly right in a situation.

It makes sense to think carefully about the value of virtue in any relationship. Who makes a better friend: a person who is unselfish, honest, forgiving, dependable and loyal, or a person who has little regard for such things?

Inasmuch as virtues are the quintessential and greatest elements of true friend-

# Hispanic youth program enters five ASU freshmen

When Jo Anne O'Donnell, associate dean of student life, founded the Hispanic Mother-Daughter Program five years ago, there were doubts the eighth-grade girls in the program would make it to ASU.

This semester five of them are entering freshmen. "The program made it very easy for me to cut through the red (tape)," said Sonia Torres, a graduate of Central High School in Phoenix. "Before I joined this program all I knew about ASU was that it was in Tempe, but now I know why it's important for me to go to school if I want to get ahead."

The program, which is funded by the AT&T Foundation and ASU, focuses on eighth-graders from Valley schools

and works with them through high school and into college.

Before joining the program the girls are recommended by their teachers. When they join, the girls participate with their mothers in writing and computer labs and field trips to local industries. They also spend a weekend on campus, staying in a residence hall, while they are in high school.

O'Donnell said the program has been a success because "Hispanic women seem to have stronger family ties.

"Hispanic females who attend school and work closely with their mothers achieve a higher level of success than those who don't."

O'Donnell said that although universities offer many programs that acquaint students with higher education, most of the programs miss the family link of involving parents with their children's education.

Alam Estefano, a coordinator in the program, said she is grateful that O'Donnell started the program.

"I am excited about this program because it has really created some special bonds between the mothers and their daughters," Estefano said.

"In fact, the program has worked so well that it has created a ripple effect where the mothers have gotten so involved in the program that they too are thinking about going to school."

O'Donnell said: "It is really important for these girls to succeed because they will reduce the cultural barriers imposed on Hispanic women who suffer from 'triple oppression' by the virtue of their sex, low socio-economic status and the internal male dominance (machismo) inherent in the Mexican-American culture."

# Student recreation center director candidates wait patiently

Although some candidates for director of the new Student Recreation Center say the job should have been filled long ago, they say they will wait patiently.

The search for a director to head the center, which is under construction on the southeast end of campus, has been slowed due to summer vacations, delays in forming a selection committee and the departure of a key University official.

ASU officials say a director should be hired by October, and the center should open its doors in August.

The candidates include Keith Jacobson, ASU director of intramurals; Juliette Moore, ASU assistant director of intramurals; Bill Jinski, University of Missouri at Kansas City; Sandra Musso, University of Minnesota at Minneapolis; Gary Miller, University of Michigan at Flint; and Gerald Maas, University of Wyoming.

"It (the delay) is going to affect the new director because he is going to be really behind," Moore said. "You can't just put the building up without staffing it. This is the number one concern."

An open forum for the public to question Moore was held in April.

"No one showed up for my forum," she said. "I was disappointed. This is going to be a major facility, and I had hoped there would have been more interest."

Similarly, Maas, director of intramural sports at the University of Wyoming, said he is disappointed a decision has not been made.

"I would have liked to have known before going into another year," he said.

Maas said the delay can be attributed to forming a search committee.

"You want to get a broad base of objective people together. It's tough and takes time to get such a group," he said.

A public forum will be held for Maas at

3:30 p.m. Tuesday in the MU Turquoise Room.

Miller, director of recreational services at the University of Michigan at Flint, said he anticipated knowing by July 1.

"Because I have a family, it makes it tough. I would have liked to have moved by the beginning of the year," he said.

Jacobson said the committee's slow pace is not a problem. "I'm just taking first things first," he said. "I think we've done such a good job with the details that it won't be hard for the new director to take over."

Musso could not be reached for comment.

Najjar said a ban has been suggested by committee members, but educating students about alcohol is the main topic right now.

"In the event that students on campus are unable to monitor underage drinking, whether it be in fraternities or residence halls, then we would have to look at other options," Najjar said.

The committee is made up of representatives from the Department of Public Safety, student life, business affairs, student affairs and ASU general legal counsel. They are

currently drafting resolutions and are expected to draft specific recommendations this month.

DPS Lt. Craig Emmanuel, who serves on the committee, said a ban "has to be explored in the context of the options available. But I'm not sure anyone has reached that conclusion."

Fraternity rush parties, which are used to recruit new members, have been "dry" for several years, but some fraternity members said Wednesday they don't like the idea of a total ban.

"No way," said Bob Hahn, a senior business major who is co-chair of the Greek Athletic Review Panel, which

works closely with the committee.

"I feel that the Greeks can handle social functions with an adult manner. They don't have to have anything taken away from them. The Greeks can handle themselves."

Hahn downplayed the possibility of an alcohol ban, saying, "Some of the universities across the nation have gone to that, but at ASU they're not looking at that at all."

Associated Students President John Fees said administrators and students should understand their responsibilities and decide on a solution.

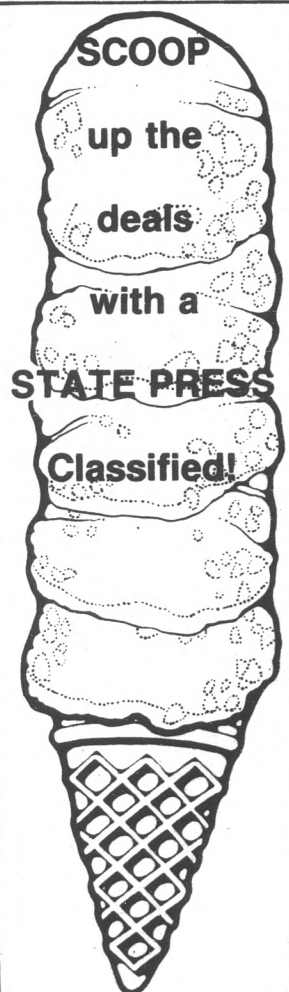
"The (committee) needs to do all it can to decrease (University) liability, but it has to be fair," he said.

# Ex-ASU students default on loans at lower rate

ASU has a lower-than-average rate of ex-students who default on their loans, according to University officials.

"It is one of the lowest in the nation," ASU Comptroller Gerald Snyder said Wednesday. He added that ASU has a 3.75 percent default rate for the Perkins student loan, formerly known as the National Direct Student Loan, which is administered by individual universities.

The Perkins student loan and the Stafford loan, formerly the Guaranteed Student Loan, are the two major loans used by students at ASU.

"We're (ASU) doing a credible job," said Paul Barberini, director of student financial assistance at ASU. "It (payback of loans) is one of the better success stories." He added that 9 out of 10 former ASU students repay their loans.

Snyder said a July 31 report by Wachovia Student Financial Services Inc., a

national student financial service that monthly calculates the default percentage for Perkins loans, listed ASU's default rate on Perkins loans as 3.75 percent. The August report will not be available until mid-September, Snyder said.

Snyder said the most recent statistics comparing ASU with the national default percentage are for 1984. In that year, the national rate was 8.96 percent, while ASU's rate was 8.07 percent, Snyder added.

ASU's default rate for the Perkins loan has gone down faster than the national percentage, Snyder said.

The percentage of former ASU students who default on Stafford loans is 8 percent, said Lee Crever, director for Arizona Education Loan Program, the state-designated agency that administers the loans.

Nationally, 13 percent of ex-students default on Stafford loans, Crever added. He said his information was based on a November report from U.S. Education Secretary William Bennett.

Barberini said the main reason students default on their loans is because they simply cannot repay their debts. He added that about 75 percent of those who default completed less than one year of college. Because these students do not have degrees, most of them cannot improve their employment status and are still making minimum wage, Barberini said.

Also, the banks that loaned students money are not doing an adequate job of communicating with the debtors about deferments and repayment schedules, he said.

Even though ASU has a relatively low default rate, Barberini warned against making more money available to students.

"We're creating a problem," he said, adding that some students rely too heavily on loans. "It can be too much of a good thing."

He said lenders need to beware of overloaning to students because in the long run, ex-students will not be able to afford monthly payments of \$200 to \$300.

For example, in 1975, 17 percent of all financial aid was dispersed as loans, but by 1985 the percentage grew to 52, Barberini said.

Currently, the Perkins loan allows freshmen and sophomores to receive a maximum of \$4,500 for their entire education, while juniors and seniors can obtain a maximum of \$9,000 and graduate students can receive a maximum of \$18,000, Barberini said.

The Stafford loan allows freshmen and sophomores to receive a maximum of \$2,600 a year while juniors and seniors can receive \$4,000 and graduate students can receive \$7,500, he added.

Barberini also cautioned against extended repayment periods, which now run up to 25 years.

## Showtime

### Charity game allows players to show off talent

Eddie Johnson asks that Saturday night's Hoops for Kids charity event not be thought of as a game, but as a basketball exhibition.

"This game is made for the enjoyment of the fan," the Phoenix Suns forward said Wednesday in announcing the final lineup for the game, to be held at ASU's University Activity Center. "People don't go to these games to see a team win or lose. They come to see tricks."

"This is to showcase our talent. We'll do some things that we can't do in an ordinary game. There will be a lot more dunks, behind-the-back passes, longer shots and in-the-lane moves."

A total of 22 NBA players have committed to this weekend's festivities, held to benefit Valley Big Brothers-Big Sisters. Among those in attendance will be former ASU stars Lafayette "Fat" Lever of Denver and Alton Lister of Seattle.

"We really believe we've got a good group of guys," said Johnson, who is a spokesman for Valley Big Brothers in Phoenix and is acting as coordinator for the event. "We can't get the marquee names like Magic Johnson, Michael Jordan and Larry Bird, but these guys are really committed to this. NBA rules say they can't be compensated for these games. They are coming here for free."

Also among those participating are former NBA all-stars Mark Aguirre of Dallas and Larry Nance of Cleveland. Johnson also will be joined by Suns teammates Kevin

Johnson and Armon Gilliam and former Phoenix players Nance, Jay Humphries, now with Milwaukee, and James Edwards of Detroit.

Eddie Johnson said that the event gives the players a chance to come to the Phoenix area for a little vacation while they get in shape for the upcoming NBA season.

"Phoenix is a great vacation area," he said. "Sun, golf — that's the draw. They want to come here, relax and at the same time get in shape."

Johnson said he recently had to turn down five people who had made late requests to participate, saying he wanted to keep the rosters at 11 on each side. He said he turned one person down as recently as Wednesday morning.

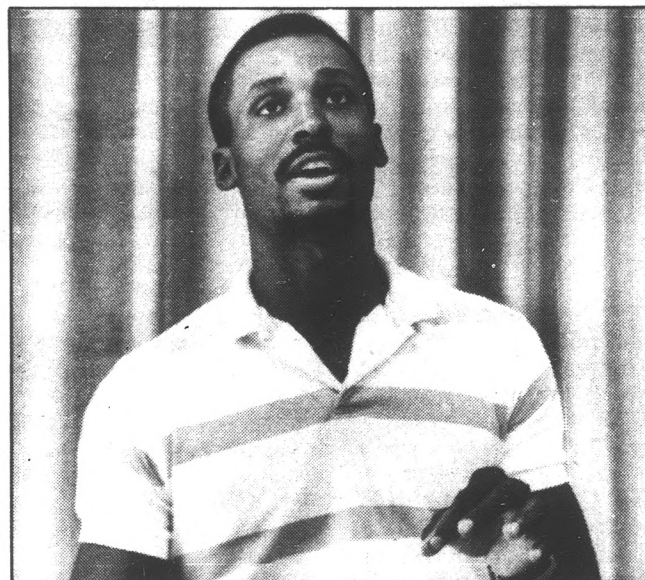
The Hoops for Kids game is one of 10 off-season charity events featuring NBA players, the most famous of which is the one put on by Magic Johnson each year to benefit the United Negro College Fund. Eddie Johnson used to host a benefit in Sacramento when he was with the Kings, and that event is still going under the direction of Sacramento center Joe Kleine.

"The NBA had to step in and sanction them," Eddie Johnson said of the charity events. "Otherwise, we would have 40 of these games. The guys want to play and stay in shape. Why not take a little vacation and at the same time play against the same caliber of competition? In these games, you know nobody's going to take a cheap shot and hurt you before the season starts."

Those expecting defense are going to be disappointed. The game is designed to showcase offensive skills, and Johnson predicted the score would be in the 180-170 range. At the United Negro College Fund game last month, both sides went over 200 points.

"It's going to be a different type game—a playground-type game," Johnson said. "If I want to shoot from the rafters, I'm going to do it. I won't be yelled at by the coach."

Coaching the two all-star squads will be Phoenix Suns assistant Paul Westphal, a former Suns player who took

Grand Canyon to the NAIA championship last season, and University of Arizona coach Lute Olson.

The rest of the player roster will include Terry Porter, Jerome Kersey, Steve Johnson and Kevin Duckworth of Portland; Rolando Blackman and Derek Harper of Dallas; Spud Webb and Reggie Theus of Atlanta; Kleine and LaSalle Thompson of Sacramento; Mike Woodson of Houston; John Stockton of Utah; and A.C. Green of the Los Angeles Lakers.

Entertainment will be provided by the Cliff Sarde Band and the Laker Girls dance group.

"We couldn't get Magic and we couldn't get Kareem (Abdul-Jabbar), so we got the prettiest Lakers instead," Johnson said.

## No waiting list for student football tickets as 2,000 unsold

Students should be aware that 2,000 ASU season football tickets are still available, Sun Devil Ticket Office manager Dianne Yeager said.

"I just hope the students don't think we're sold out," Yeager said. "Students are calling to get on a waiting list, but all they have to do is pick them up."

Tickets for full-time students are selling for \$26 at the Sun Devil Ticket Office. Students must have their ID cards validated at the ticket office, if they have not already done

so. Yeager said 8,000 tickets already have been sold, with 2,000 remaining before ASU opens its season Sept. 10 against Illinois at Sun Devil Stadium.

"Ticket sales are going really great," she said. "We're selling over a hundred a day."

During the summer, students purchased tickets by mailing an order form and payment to the ticket office. The distribution for the pre-ordered tickets began last Thursday.

Yeager said most of the pre-ordered tickets have been

claimed and that Friday is the last day to pick them up.

"We haven't dropped any one who missed their pick-up date," Yeager said. "Most of the students have already claimed their tickets. There are not too many of them left."

If the remaining 2,000 tickets are sold, the unclaimed tickets will be released and put up for sale, Yeager said.

The mail-in policy was adopted to prevent long lines for the tickets, as many students waited in lines of up to 13 hours last year.

But because of the new policy, students do not know how many unclaimed tickets are still available, Yeager said.

## Shuttlecocks come out losers; volleyball, softball next events

In men's singles division "A," Kumar Shiralogi came out on top of the six participants in this division to clinch the title.

The women's singles matches consisted of only one division with 16 participants. Jennifer Struck won the women's singles crown, while Becky Adams and Jackie Sheehan were the double's winners.

Bob Gildersleeve, assistant director of Intramurals, said all winners received a championship T-shirt, a highly coveted award.

"The championship T-shirt is a prized possession," Gildersleeve said. "It is a 100-percent cotton Beefy-T with our bouncing ball logo on the back and the name of the sport on the front, with each shirt a different color, depending on the sport played. There's even a saying around campus about it."

Gildersleeve said "Going for the cotton" is the popular catch-phrase he often hears about. He said the T-shirts are very popular with the winners.

Other intramural events that will take place this semester include golf, swimming and diving, flag football, pool, three-man basketball, racquetball, cross country, powerlifting and wrestling.

## USC opens Pac-10 season with game at Boston College

NEWTON, Mass. (AP) — Eighth-ranked University of Southern California, led by dazzling quarterback Rodney Peete, invades the East for the first time in 14 years to take on ambitious but unranked Boston College tonight in a 1988 football opener.

The USC Trojans, celebrating their 100th anniversary of intercollegiate football, although they did not field teams in five years of the 1890s and early 1900s, will help the BC Eagles unveil a renovated Alumni Stadium.

A sellout crowd of 32,000 is assured for the nationally televised, ESPN, matchup between the 1987 Pac-10 champs and the independent Eagles, who are beginning their 90th season since 1883.

In their first meeting in history, Southern Cal ended BC's 10-game winning streak as Peete passed for 248 yards and two touchdowns and the Trojans' defense stopped two key drives in a 23-17 victory in Los Angeles last Sept. 19.

That was in the second game of the season, and Peete and the Trojans went on to a respectable 8-4 season, despite a 20-17 loss to Michigan State in the Rose Bowl.

ASU plays host to Southern Cal on Nov. 12 at Sun Devil Stadium.

Peete set 12 Southern Cal records as

he completed 197 of 332 passes for 2,709 yards and 21 touchdowns and ranked fourth in the nation in passing efficiency.

Now, as a fifth year senior, Peete has seven offensive starters back, including his top three 1987 receivers.

"I knew he was good, but not that good," BC coach Jack Bicknell said after Peete's performance against the Eagles last fall. "He gave us fits. He's a dangerous player for any defense. But our kids feel they should have won out there and are looking forward to playing them again."

BC, which has gone to four postseason bowls since 1982, slipped to 5-6 while playing one of the nation's toughest schedules without a weekend off in 1987. Now, although overlooked in preseason ratings, the Eagles feel they're ready for another big season.

"We have a chance to be a good football team, and that's all any coach wants," Bicknell said. "I don't see any areas that are trouble."

The Eagles, inexperienced at several key positions in 1987, figure they now have the savvy needed, particularly at quarterback. Mike Power, who blossomed after throwing for 243 yards and one touchdown against Southern Cal, is back, with Mark Kamphaus an experienced understudy.

## New chance for boxer; arbitrator lifts drug ban

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo. (AP) — Middleweight William Guthrie of St. Louis, barred from the Olympic box-off because of a positive drug test, will get an opportunity to earn a spot on the U.S. Olympic boxing team.

Guthrie will box Anthony Hembrick, the Olympic trials winner, tonight at the U.S. Olympic Training Center at Colorado Springs. Should Guthrie win that bout, the two will fight again Friday afternoon.

Should Guthrie win both fights, he would replace Hembrick on the Olympic team.

Hembrick beat Guthrie in the semifinals of the trials. Despite losing before the finals, Guthrie was selected as the "most worthy opponent" for the box-offs. When he was barred, a replacement couldn't be found and Hembrick was awarded the box-off, and the spot on the Olympic team, on a walk-over.

Hembrick has won all five career meetings with



Guthrie.

Announcement of the box-off came Wednesday after Neal Bernstein of the American Arbitration Association ruled that Guthrie should be given the opportunity to make the team.

Guthrie was one of three fighters barred because of positive drug tests. Lavell Finger, a 139-pounder, wasn't in shape and decided against taking his disqualification to arbitration, while 106-pounder Eric Griffin didn't appeal his disqualification.

All three had been selected as "most worthy opponents" to challenge those fighters who had won in Olympic trials competition.

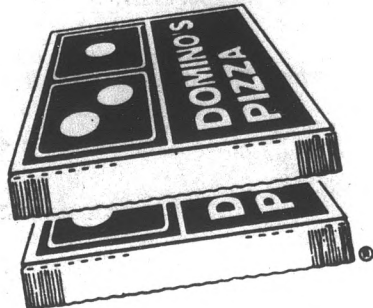

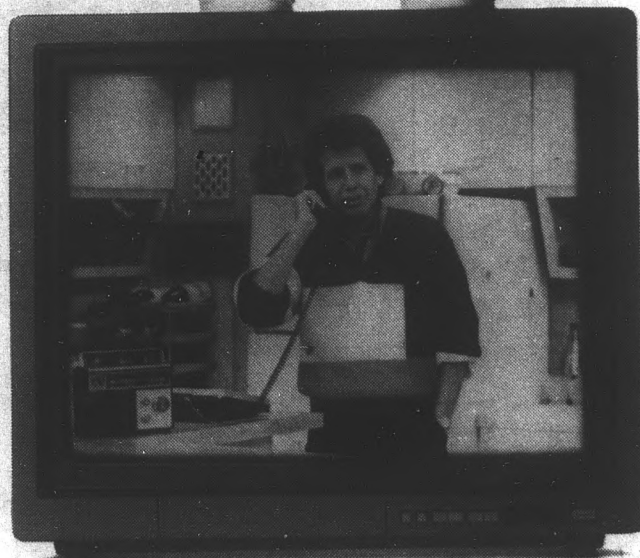

# Agent predicts high monetary damages in collusion case

(AP) — Agent Tom Reich predicted Wednesday that the monetary damages awarded as a result of the baseball owners' conspiracy not to sign free agents will involve a lot more money than has been projected by either side.

Wednesday, arbitrator George Nicolau ruled baseball teams conspired against signing free agents after the 1986 season, as owners were found guilty of collusion for a second consecutive year.

Another arbitrator, Thomas Roberts, ruled last Sept. 21 that owners conspired against free agents between the 1985 and 1986 seasons.

The Collusion II case, begun 19 months ago, centers on eight players who went past the Jan. 8 deadline to re-sign with their former clubs — Doyle Alexander, Bob Boone, Andre Dawson, Rich Gedman, Ron Guidry, Bob Horner, Lance Parrish and Tim Raines. Jack Morris, who returned to the Detroit Tigers before the deadline, is another major player in the case.

"I believe three things about the damage aspect of this," said Reich, the agent for Parrish and Raines. "One is that it will take a long time to resolve these cases in respect to the individual damages awarded top players — longer than anyone is forecasting.

"Two, it will involve a lot more money than anyone on the either side has projected. Ultimately, when all the dust finds the ground, you're looking at a number between \$50-

and \$100 million. There will be some very, very significant awards which are justified by the patent nature of this continuing, intentional alliance."

"This was a plain and simple price fix and total restraint of the market," Reich said. "I don't, for my part, intend to dwell on the conspiracy. We already lived through it the last three years. Whatever has to be done to compensate the players who would be harmed is going to be done."

Some of the players involved expected the decision would go against the owners.

"I'm not surprised, I expected it," said Raines, who could become a free agent after the season. "If they decided Kirk Gibson and the others could be free agents, it was evident we would end up the same way."

Raines and Montreal are currently involved in negotiations on a new deal that could pay him more than \$3 million over three years.

"It's not definite I will opt for free agency," Raines said. "I'm going to give the Expos every opportunity to sign me."

Of the 79 free agents in 1986, 37 re-signed with their former clubs, 21 switched teams and 21, including Horner, did not return to the major leagues. The union alleged that except for Dawson and Parrish, the free agents who changed clubs were not wanted by their former teams.

Parrish warned against assuming he would leave Phila-

delphia if he is declared a free agent.

"I'm very disappointed with the way I've performed since I've been here. The club got me to do a better job," Parrish said. "And in that respect I've let them down. I'm in no hurry to get out of here. If anything, I'd like the opportunity to show them what I can do."

"Basically I was very confident at the time that the arbitrator would rule in favor of the players," said Toronto catcher Ernie Whitt, one of the 79 free agents. "The only problem now is what is going to come of it."

"To me justice is what my value was in 1986. Compensate me for that. That's going to be the most difficult part, finding compensation for the players."

"I think he's (Nicolau) got to penalize the owners enough where they know they can't get away with it again. That's two years in a row that they have been guilty of sticking together to try and stop free agency."

Morris, who had talks with both Minnesota and the Yankees before re-signing with Detroit, wasn't optimistic.

"Nothing has changed in two years," the right-hander said. "I haven't heard a thing that will change anything for the players. It's the same old thing as far as I'm concerned."

Jamie Quirk of the Kansas City Royals said he didn't expect the decision to have much bearing on him.

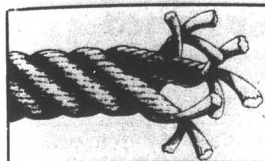

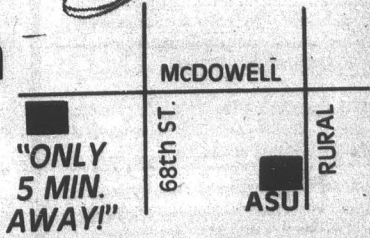

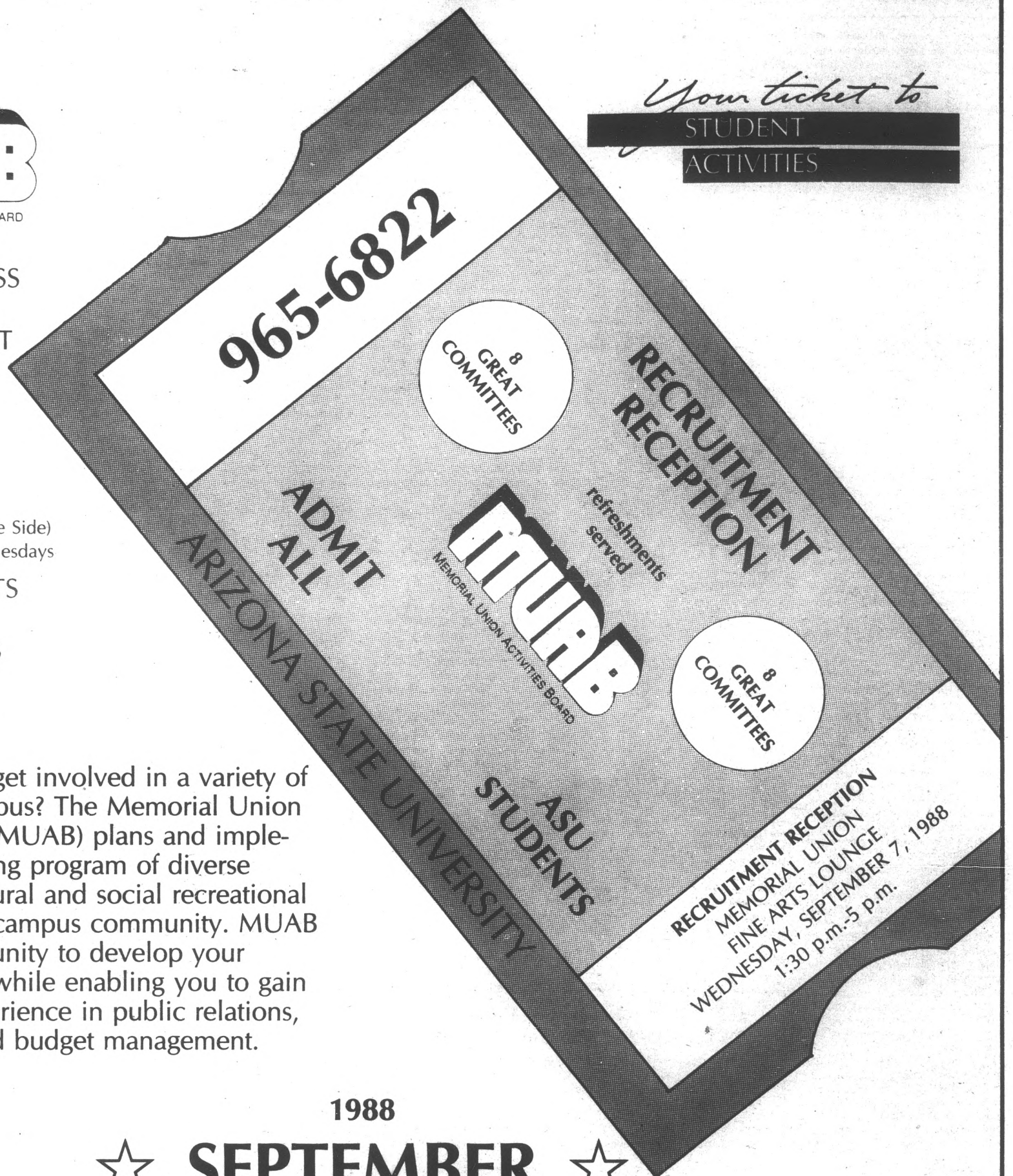
