

## Faculty Senate supports student regent vote

The ASU Faculty Senate unanimously passed a resolution Monday supporting an Arizona House of Representatives bill granting voting rights to the student member of the Arizona Board of Regents.

Student Regent Pat McWhortor urged passage of the resolution.

"I am the 11th student to serve on the Board of Regents," McWhortor said. "I want to be the last non-voting student."

Faculty senators, however, expressed concern over the lack of a faculty representative on the board. McWhortor said he is personally in favor of bringing a faculty member

onto the board.

The Senate also passed a resolution calling for a change in curriculum requirements for returning students.

The new rule would affect students who have left the University for not more than two semesters, consecutive or nonconsecutive. Under the proposal, returning students would have the option of returning under the academic catalog under which they originally enrolled or re-enrolling under the catalog in effect at the time of their return.

Current rules require that all returning students' graduation requirements come from the catalog in force at the time of their return to the University.

Continuing students would continue to have the option of

changing to a more recent catalog than the one under which they originally enrolled.

In other faculty Senate business:

•Resolved 48-24 to support the ValTrans proposal, which will be up for a public vote March 28.

Associated Students President John Fees asked faculty members to approve the resolution. The ASASU Senate is expected to officially endorse ValTrans at its meeting tonight.

•Unanimously resolved to eliminate the bachelor of science business major in General Business and the bachelor of science engineering major in Engineering Science.

## Amerasians come to U.S. to escape discrimination

Dung Thanh Vo sits on the couch in the small apartment he shares with his mother, half-brother and sister. On the table in front of them lays a photograph of an American in fatigues and eyeglasses.

Vo is Vietnamese, but tall and husky unlike most men from his native land. The man in the picture is the father he never knew.

Vo 16, is a *my lai*, an American half-breed in the native tongue in which he largely prefers to speak. In the United States, Vo is an Amerasian; the son of an American serviceman and a Vietnamese woman.

A calendar from a Vietnamese

supermarket, some pictures of sportscars, and an illustration from a Vietnamese folktale adorn the walls. The apartment smells vaguely of nuoc mam, a fermented fish sauce and Vietnamese staple food. A worn rack stereo is against one wall.

The family came to the United States in 1985 from the village of Song Bei, leaving a country wher Vo and others like him are discriminated against and ostracized as living representatives of the war. Also called *bui doi* or "dust of life," the majority of Amerasians, mostly teenagers now, survive on city streets by begging, stealing, and selling cigarettes.

Vo was one of the lucky few. His brother Hung, 20, said the family was worried for Vo in 1975 when the North Vietnamese Army swept across the south and ended the war. They took care of him. Instead of being cast out on the streets, Dung attended school.

Other students harassed him because of his obviously American parentage. Three years after a mechanism was set up by the United Nations and the Vietnamese government to safely emigrate refugees, the family decided to travel to the land of Vo's father.

Now, Vo is a sophomore at Washington High School in Phoenix. He plays football and soccer and wants to be a house painter. He says he doesn't like the black or Khmer students at Washington High, extending centuries-old animosity between the two cultures to north-central Phoenix. Vo says he likes the Laotian students instead.

### My Lai in Phoenix

Vo's story is representative of many *my lai* refugees who now live in the Valley. There are approximately 4,500 refugees living in Phoenix, 100 of whom are Amerasians, according to Maureen Webster, Director of Programs at Catholic Social Services.

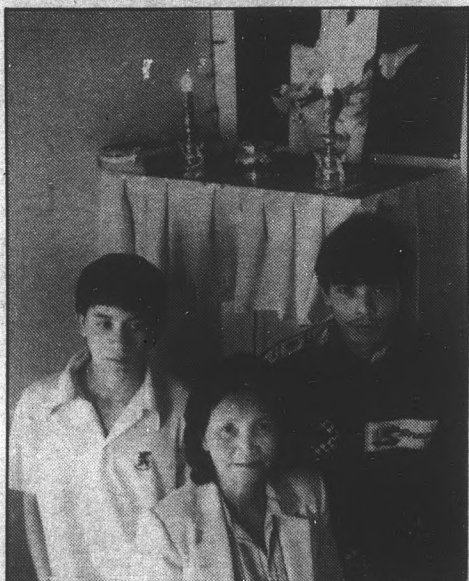

## Fees: Talks begin to lure Reagan to ASU

Negotiations to lure former President Ronald Reagan to an ASU speaking engagement are underway between his agent and the Sun Angel Foundation, Associated Students of ASU President John Fees said.

Fees said Reagan, who is reportedly considering speaking at the Insuring Tomorrow Conference, March 17-19, will come to ASU for the conference, providing a \$50,000 fee and private jet transportation are guaranteed.

Ann Wold, Reagan's agent with the Washington Speakers Bureau, would neither confirm nor deny that negotiations were underway and said she was not at liberty to discuss the actual fee requested.

"There have been primarily inquiries but no dates have been confirmed," she said.

Meanwhile, Fees said, "We have confirmed that he has the day open on his calendar and now we are trying to confirm with the Sun Angel Foundation to see if they will put up the money."

Fees said the possibility of having Reagan come to ASU would be a "win-win" situation.

"It could help the foundation to attract a permanent corporate sponsor for the (Insuring Tomorrow) program, which could have difficulties continuing without the funds," Fees said.

Marshall Magruder, the Sun Angel Foundation chairman for the Insuring Tomorrow program, said the foundation has discussed guaranteeing the money, providing a private jet and security. He said a final decision will be made later this week.

"Reagan is the hottest thing around, and if we do put up the money, I don't think there will be a problem getting it back because he has no problems drawing crowds," he said.

To offset the cost, Magruder said tickets will be sold to the lecture, which is to be held in the Activity Center.

"The place sits about 14,000 people and we plan to charge \$10 for students, \$100 for business people, and so there should be no problem raising the money," said Magruder.

### North lawyer says Reagan gave favored treatment to countries

WASHINGTON (AP) — Former President Reagan "participated personally and directly" in giving favored treatment to countries that supported the Contras in Nicaragua, lawyers for Oliver North said in a court filing aimed at having charges against their client dropped.

North attorney Brendan Sullivan, opposing a compromise between the independent counsel and the Justice Department, said in court papers released Monday that the proposed deal on keeping certain secrets out of the trial would prevent him from introducing this evidence which he said was central to North's defense.

He also criticized Attorney General Dick Thornburgh for declining "to take the political heat" and make a separate secrets-protecting move that could lead to charges being thrown out.

Sullivan said, "At the heart of this case are the quid pro quo and other third-country arrangements with which the Reagan administration obtained military support for the resistance during the so-called Boland Amendments, and the policy that those third-country arrangements would not

be disclosed outside a limited group of executive branch officials."

The Boland amendments, passed by Congress, restricted and at times prohibited the spending of federal funds in support of the guerrilla war against the leftist government in Nicaragua.

### Dukakis' wife is doing well at alcohol treatment clinic

BOSTON (AP) — Kitty Dukakis is doing well and is grateful for all the encouragement she has received since checking into an alcohol treatment clinic a week ago, her father said.

"She's had a tremendous outpouring of affection and support from everyone and Kitty is very grateful for it. It means a lot to her," Harry Ellis Dickson said after a visit Saturday to Edgemoor, a private treatment center in Rhode Island.

"The mail has been tremendous," Dickson added. "Nancy Reagan and Barbara Bush both wrote warm, encouraging letters, just as many other people from all walks of life everywhere have."

"Kitty is very optimistic about getting better," Dickson

told *The Boston Herald* on Monday. "She has a very positive attitude and she seems very happy."

Mrs. Dukakis, 52, checked into the center Feb. 5 for treatment of bouts with excessive drinking that her husband blamed on exhaustion, stress and the letdown after his loss in the presidential election.

### Thousands of farmers protest government agricultural policy

SEOUL, South Korea (AP) — Thousands of militant farmers burned cars and hurled firebombs at riot police in Seoul on Monday, protesting what they called the government's disastrous agricultural policy.

Police fired tear gas to end the two-hour protest by an estimated 15,000 farmers who gathered in front of the National Assembly, which opened a special 20-day session Monday.

The South Korean news agency, Yonhap, said at least 15 farmers and seven riot police officers were injured. Six cars were set ablaze and two others were smashed with sticks, it said.

Police said 25 protesters were arrested.

## Condo sale profits to boost scholarship fund

The sale of an ASU-owned, Scottsdale condominium will boost a scholarship fund for the University's handicapped students to \$600,000, said Lonnie Ostrom, ASU's director for development.

The Arizona Board of Regents Friday approved the sale of the condominium located at 7940 E. Camelback Road. The condominium, which sold for \$52,000, was willed to the University by Andrew Brown in January 1987, along with more than \$500,000 in cash.

"This is a building that came to us as part of an unexpected bequest," ASU President J. Russell Nelson said. "It (the money) is intended to support a scholarship fund for disabled students at ASU."

Ostrom said he doesn't know why the Browns left the money to ASU.

"We were not even aware until they had left this to us," he said. "We do not have a great deal of information on them."

Nelson said that the scholarship fund is important to ASU's handicap program because the campus is "friendly" to handicapped students.

"We have an important program for disabled students at ASU," Nelson said, adding there are more than 600 students with various forms of physical and learning disabilities.

Nelson said the ASU campus is "friendly" because it has flat surfaces and the buildings are accessible to handicapped students.

There also is a training program working with members of the faculty to understand how to adapt course materials that will be suited for disabled students, Nelson said.

Four appraisals of the condominium have been conducted since 1985. The first appraisal listed the property's value at \$85,000. The value has declined with each subsequent appraisal.

In October, the board approved the sale of the property at public auction.

An auction was conducted in April 1988 at Kerr Cultural Center. A minimum bid was set at the February 1988 appraised value of \$60,000, but there were no bids offered.

At its June meeting, the board approved that the property be listed for sale with a licensed real estate broker.

A written offer for \$52,000 was submitted through the real estate broker. The offer coincides with the most recent appraisal from December 1988, which listed sales of comparable condominiums from \$50,000 to \$53,000.

Ostrom said he is pleased that ASU's program received money for a scholarship fund although more money is needed.

"We still need equipment help," he said.

### Health Center to sponsor CPR education day

The ASU Student Health Center will be sponsoring "A Matter of the Heart," a CPR education day on Saturday, Feb. 25 in the MU.

The program will have wellness assessment, fitness assessment, nutrition education and CPR classes.

### Panel recommends tobacco be regulated by FDA

Tobacco should be classified as a drug and regulated by the Food and Drug Administration, a move that could lead to a "tobacco-free society by the year 2000," a presidential panel said last week.

The National Cancer Advisory Board, which conducted a series of public hearings on cancer prevention, also recommended that smoking be banned on all airlines and other public transportation, in the workplace, public buildings and all schools.

Smokeless tobacco, the report stated, should be banned in schools, and it called on professional athletic organization to campaign against its use.

Congress should pass legislation declaring tobacco to be a drug and place it under the control of the FDA, a move that would help to "intensify the pressure and activity in America to eliminate smoking and tobacco use, creating a tobacco-free society by the year 2000," the report stated.

### Report warns AIDS could permanently plague U.S.

The AIDS virus may become a permanent part of the American scene, unless those most at risk change their sexual activities and drug habits, according to a report released Wednesday.

The study, conducted by the National Research Council, also recommended that a massive survey of the most intimate details of life in the United States be conducted.

The report called for AIDS blood tests to be conducted in key elements of the population, including newborns and women seeking abortions, improved sex education techniques among the young, "safe injection" education for drug users and more frank communication about AIDS on television networks.

"Our committee believes that the public health threat posed by AIDS is so great that we must find ways to overcome social and cultural taboos that stand in the way of improved AIDS prevention, and we must do so quickly," Lincoln E. Moses, a Stanford University professor who chaired the NRC committee, said at a news conference.

### New drug may rejuvenate brains slowed by age

Brains dulled by age may be restored to the quick brightness of youth by a new drug developed for treatment of stroke, a Chicago researchers' report stated Friday.

Experts at Northwestern University medical school say that a drug called nimodipine was able to re-invigorate aging brains with the fast learning ability of youth in a laboratory test using young and middle-aged rabbits.

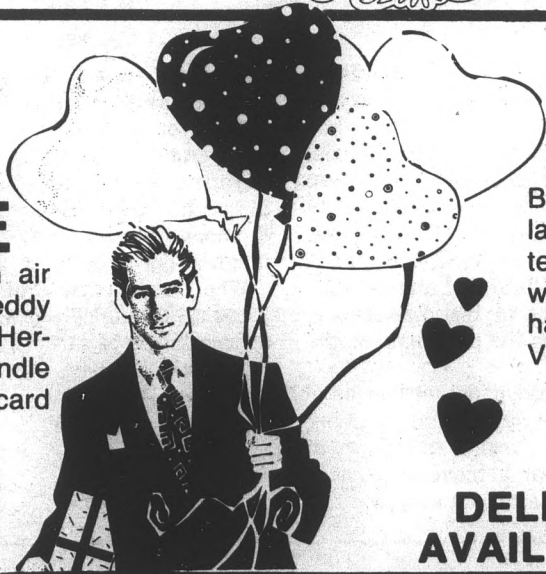

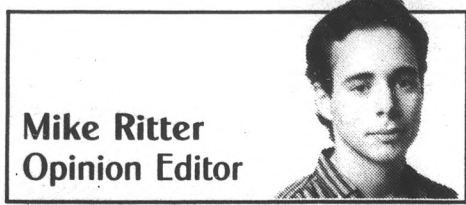

## NRA: Will the real psychopaths please stand up

There's no need to rehash the body count, every new day seems to offer still more incidences: "Para-military madman slays family, self" . . . "Gun-wielding 'Rambo' sprays schoolyard." The tragedies have almost taken on a sick familiarity.

Any rational, humane person who ponders the climbing frequency of these senseless killings must come away with the only sane conclusion — and I contend there is only *one* sane conclusion. But now I'm getting ahead of myself.

The most recent of these gun-related rampages was the murder of five elementary school students last month on a Stockton, Calif., playground. The children were killed by Patrick Edward Purdy, who used a semiautomatic AK-47 assault rifle to fell the five children as well as wound 29 other students and one teacher.

Now, I doubt anyone would argue that the horror stories of bloody, gun-related massacres broadcast on the evening news with such regularity are not the work of mentally deranged psychopaths. The people responsible for these crimes are sick. They are incapable of sensing the cruelty, immorality and evil inherent in these acts of mindless violence. It is their sickness, in fact, which renders them incapable of preventing these things from happening. And please note now, I'm not talking about the gunmen alone.

Indeed, the range of raving sociopaths spreads beyond the single individual who pulls the trigger. And the willing

accessories in that outer loop continue to walk freely among us. They go about their daily business just as if they were stable, rational, productive members of society.

I am speaking, of course, about the members of the National Rifle Association, the Citizens Committee to Keep and Bear Arms and countless other people who advocate the indiscriminate distribution of military firearms. These people — who collectively spend millions of dollars each year lobbying for Mr. Purdy's right to

Purdy was carrying out the aims of the multi-million-dollar gun lobby to their logical conclusion. Those kids were undeniably human beings.

Sen. Howard Metzenbaum, D-Ohio, summed up nicely the insanity behind the "hunting-rifle" claim when he pointed out that the AK-47 was not meant for use in a "duck blind."

Metzenbaum was speaking last week at a Senate Judiciary subcommittee hearing focusing on a bill introduced by the Ohio

believes should have looked into Purdy's background. How that was to have been done without a waiting period eludes me. Now again, I'm no expert, but Snyder's logic screams to me of schizophrenia.

But the lunacy exists on both sides of the legislative process. Here in Arizona, Rep. Dave Carson, R-PreScott, has introduced legislation that would make it legal to carry concealed weapons. The "logic" behind this bill is that criminals might think twice before committing any heinous act if they knew their potential law-abiding victim might be packin' a rod.

Maybe it's the high altitude up in Prescott — maybe it's some congenital aberration — but either way, Rep. Carson, seek treatment. You've lost touch with reality.

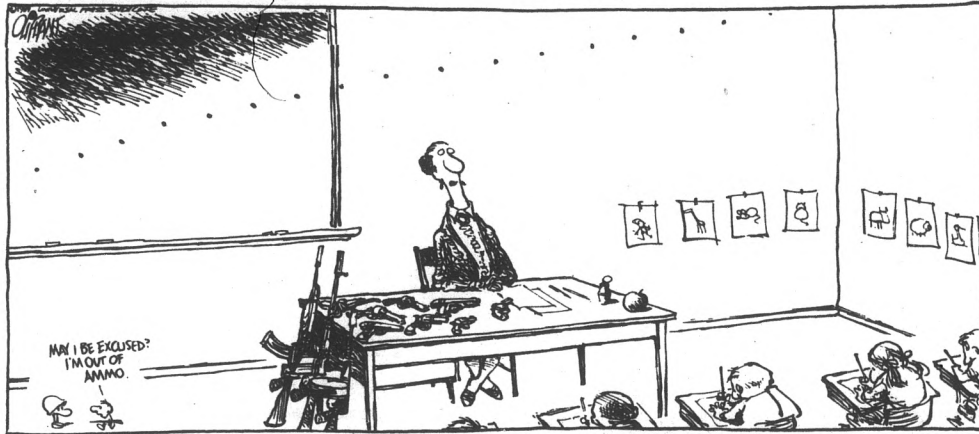
There is no logic or sensibility in the gun advocates' cause. They demand harsher sentencing for killers, yet Purdy — like most other such killers it seems — took his own life.

They hide behind the "sanctity" of the Second Amendment, and yet the amendment clearly states that the right to bear arms is meant to facilitate a "well-regulated militia." Purdy wore military garb when he shot his victims. In the eyes of gun lobbyists the children he killed must indeed be martyrs of the highest order.

The "sane conclusion" to which I earlier referred is to closely regulate the sale of most firearms and impose an outright ban on others. Those who deny the necessity of this action (and those who work diligently to thwart such legislation) are just as guilty, just as inhumane as the person who ultimately pulls the trigger.

If I may paraphrase: "Guns don't kill people — people who are nuts enough to let any schizo off the street buy a gun kill people."

A bit wordy for a bumper sticker, but it's a lot more honest.



murder children — are the true sociopaths in this scenario.

They are sick, and they need our help.

## Something smells funny

### Angler who visited Cuba hooked by fishy crackdown

Russia points nuclear missiles at us and we point ours at them. We spy on them and they spy on us. Our subs stalk their subs and their subs stalk our subs. Despite the slight thaw in our Cold War, we're not exactly chums.

But business is business, a buck is a buck, a ruble is a ruble. So we put aside our differences and do deals.

While our missiles point and our spies peek and our subs stalk, we sell more than a billion dollars a year in products to the Soviet Union.

They may be godless commies with designs on our freedom, as any good conservative will tell you, but that doesn't mean we can't ship them farm products, chemicals, machines, soft drinks and all sorts of material goods. We're even showing them how to build a golf course.

And they sell us about half a billion dollars in products we need or want.

The same holds true for China, with whom we fought a genuine shooting war in Korea. They might be no-good godless commies, too, but the merchandise is flowing both ways, profits are being made, and their American tourist business is picking up.

So while our ideologies are in conflict and

we might occasionally kill some of each other and we're constantly poised for mutual destruction, that doesn't mean we can't jingle each other's cash registers.

Except when it comes to going bass fishing in Cuba. You try that and you're in big trouble.

Some readers may have seen a recent photo in our sport section showing a fisherman proudly holding a huge bass.

What a bass it was. About 20 pounds, only a couple of pounds short of the world record.

But it's also a no-good, godless commie bass. Actually, I doubt if the fish knows much about God or communism, but it was caught in a communist lake in communist Cuba.

And that means the fisherman, to use the words of our current commander-in-chief, is in deep doo-doo.

The fisherman, a professional guide named Dan Snow, has been indicted for fishing in Cuba.

By going there to catch fish, and taking avid fishermen with him, he violated the law that forbids all but certain select Americans from visiting Cuba.

If convicted, he could be sentenced to 100 years in prison and fined \$500,000. (That's an expensive lunger bass. It comes to five years and \$25,000 a pound.)

The feds nailed Snow only recently, although he's been going fishing in Cuba since 1977, when then-President Jimmy Carter eased travel restrictions to that country.

Why does Snow fish in Cuba? Because it's

a bassin' man's paradise. It has more than 800 lakes, teeming with big ol' hawgs. (This is the way a real bassin' man talks.)

They're big because bass grow larger in warm climates, where they can feed all year. And they're plentiful because Cubans are indifferent to bass fishing.

So after Carter eased the old restrictions, almost 1,000 Americans a year started going there to fish.

But in 1982, President Ronald Reagan decided this was unpatriotic. He didn't want Americans spending money in Cuba on food, lodging, rum drinks and bait, because it would help a godless, commie economy.

And he ordered that only government officials, journalists, scholars and Cuban exiles could go to Cuba. No fisherman or anyone else who would put a nickel in Castro's pocket.

However, Snow, 50, a sharp Texan, thought he spotted a loophole in Reagan's order. He said he was doing scientific research by bringing back Cuban bass to be bred with our bass, so our bass might get bigger. This, he said, made him a scholar.

But the feds figure he was just telling a fish story. They believe his main reason for going there was to make a profit by organizing fishing charters.

So the government has come down on Snow with both big feet, presumably to make an example of him and let others know that they are watching.

Although I don't condone law-breaking, I find this case confusing.

Every year many thousand Americans visit the Soviet Union, some as tourists,

some as businessmen. And they spend large sums to eat godless communist borscht.

Thousands of Americans also visit China, where they spend vast sums on godless, communist egg rolls.

Thousands of others visit Yugoslavia, Czechoslovakia, Bulgaria, Poland and other commie countries, spending big money on godless, communist pierogi and other godless, communist dishes I can't pronounce or spell.

So I ask: If Americans are permitted to spend money in communist countries to eat godless, commie borscht, egg rolls and pierogi, why can't an American spend money to catch a godless, commie fish?

I don't visit communist countries, since I feel nervous anywhere you can be arrested without being able to call your lawyer and a bondsman.

But if I had to make a choice, I'd much prefer going to Cuba, with its fine beaches and bass fishing, than to Moscow, which is as cold as Chicago, without our fine saloons.

And if they are going to go after Mr. Snow, they could be less harsh. A century in prison and a \$500,000 fine is kind of stiff just for doing what thousands of American businessmen, including many conservatives, do regularly — trade with communist.

Why, we don't even impose that kind of punishment on those who sold weapons to the crazy Ayatollah.

The prosecutors should take another look at Mr. Snow, then throw him back. He's really not a keeper.

# ASASU petition hustle begins

Prospective candidates vying for Associated Students executive and senatorial offices will hustle about campus in search of students to sign petitions today, beginning the first of a series of events leading to the ASASU general election March 21-22.

Student hopefuls running for any one of the four ASASU executive offices must obtain at least 750 student signatures to be listed on the ballot for the general election.

Candidates for Senate are required to solicit 150 signatures or 10 percent of their college enrollment.

Petitions for all offices are due Feb. 28 at 10 a.m.

Campaigning officially begins March 12.

In an initial candidate meeting Monday, Elections Coordinator David Cavecche informed 29 prospective candidates of the rules and regulations of campaign conduct developed by ASASU and stated his

expectations for the election.

"I hope we can have a good, clean election, this can be a learning experience for all of us," Cavecche said.

Cavecche also told prospective candidates that despite the lack of restrictions on campaign spending the rules regulating time, manner and place for campaigning will keep the election fair.

"All candidates should feel an ethical obligation to follow the procedures," Cavecche said. "If you want to play hard ball you can, but that will not benefit anyone."

Petitions and packets, which contain campaign information including schedules of campaign events, the ASASU constitution and bylaws and the bulletin of campaign codes and conduct regulations were available at the meeting.

Cavecche said students who missed the initial meeting Monday should contact him or drop by his ASASU office to pick up petitions and campaign packets.

# Fake cop swindles \$50 from motorist

He walked like a cop, talked like a cop and looked like a cop — but he wasn't.

Heather Jernigan learned the hard way Friday after the man in a brown uniform and shiny silver badge asked her to write out a \$50 check.

Jernigan, 23, of Mesa, was driving west on Fifth Street near Maple Avenue about 12:30 p.m. when she was pulled over by a man driving a small brown car with a "bubble light" on the roof — the kind that officers in an unmarked squad car might use, said Officer Roger Austin, a Tempe police spokesman.

Austin said the man, wearing a brown uniform with no patches and a small, oval silver badge, seemed to know police procedure because he asked Jernigan for her license and registration.

The man was so convincing that Jernigan wrote him a \$50 check made out to the City of Tempe for a traffic violation and gave it to him, Austin said.

It wasn't until the man left that Jernigan realized she did

not get a copy of the citation. She became suspicious and called Tempe police, Austin added.

Police aren't taking the incident lightly.

"It sure makes our job harder," Austin said. "It reduces our credibility and compliance with the law."

Austin added that Tempe police wear blue uniforms with patches and that unmarked cars do not usually pull people over for traffic citations.

"Our procedure is if an unmarked unit needs to pull someone over we'll call for the assistance of a marked unit," he said. "If an unmarked vehicle has to pull someone over — that would be very unusual for the City of Tempe."

He said if an unmarked car tries to pull someone over, the driver should slow down and pull into a well-lighted place with other people and a telephone such as a convenience store or a gas station.

Police described the suspect in Friday's incident as a white male in his mid-30s, 5-foot-11 with a medium build. He has a heavy face, dark curly hair, dark eyes, thick eyebrows, a large hook nose, stubby fingers and a deep voice.

# 'Duct tape' murder suspect arrested by Tempe police

A second suspect has been arrested in connection with the April 1988 killing of a Tempe man whose head was wrapped in duct tape before he was shot, police said.

James David Allen III, 30, of Mesa, was arrested by Mesa police about 8:15 p.m. Friday on suspicion of crimes in that city, said Tempe police Lt. Steve Graehling, head of the department's homicide investigators.


Allen is being held without bond at the Maricopa County Jail on one count of first-degree murder, a jail spokesman said. His preliminary hearing is set for Feb. 17.

He is a suspect in the April 12 slaying of John Allen Colyott, 27. Colyott was found lying in an townhouse in the 800 block of South Casita Drive with duct tape wrapped around his head and a gun shot wound to his side.

Police said the slaying may be drug-related.

In June, police arrested Charles F. Denson, 33, in connection with the slaying. He also is being held without bond at Maricopa County Jail on one count of first-degree murder.



# My Lai refugees adjust to new lives, search for fathers

Approximately 4,000 Amerasian children have arrived in the United States since 1982, said the Rev. Welch Hill, a youth counselor with CSS in Phoenix who works with *my lai* as well as other refugees.

CSS is part of the U.S. Catholic Conference, the largest voluntary resettlement agency in the country.

Hill graduated from seminary as a Protestant minister and started working with Laotian and Vietnamese boat people in New Orleans for Associated Catholic Charities. Years later he was in Phoenix and saw an opening to work with refugees. Now he deals mainly with the 14- to 22-year-olds for CSS in Phoenix.

What he encounters when working with the Amerasian refugees is mostly culture shock.

"Everything from the trauma of coming into this country itself, getting acclimated to society here, problems in school; everything from that to guns and shootings," he said.

Hill, a smooth-faced man who speaks with a soft Southern accent, spent four years on an aircraft carrier in the Orient during the Vietnam War, and partially attributes his interest in Asian peoples to the time spent there.

He says that there isn't any one major hurdle, such as the language barrier or the cultural climate, to be overcome in the leap to U.S. citizenship.

"You're coming from a war-torn situation," Hill said. "You don't know whether you're going to live that day or not. You don't know whether you're going to get shot or not."

"That kind of instability, like the Cambodians went through. The boat people just made it with their lives; they were attacked by Thai pirates, they have incredible stories of how they got out."

"Sometimes they're ostracized by their own people and sometimes they're accepted, depending on the community they live in in Vietnam."

## Discrimination in Vietnam

Anh Kim Thi Nguyen lives off the Black Canyon Freeway, in the McClellan complex a few blocks away from Vo. Like Vo, she experienced discrimination in her homeland. Anh Kim's mother, Anh Anh, answers most of the questions. The family is from Saigon (now named Ho Chi Minh City) and arrived here last July.

Anh Anh says Anh Kim was hit in school in Vietnam because of her obviously American parentage.

"People told us to go away," said Anh Anh.

When asked if she likes the United States Anh Kim says, "Like." She smiles shyly and says that she doesn't like school. She is 17 and has just been married. Her husband, a full Vietnamese, works in an electronics factory and Anh Anh wants to study typing next year.

The apartment is small, but filled with a big gray couch and seats. A lace scarf hangs over the door into the kitchen. The family is watching a movie subtitled in characters on a large television set, one from the stack of Asian videos on top of the VCR.

## Few manage to contact fathers

Before he leaves, Anh Anh says to Hill that she wants to find Anh Kim's father but doesn't know how. He speaks slowly, using simple English and a lot of gestures to communicate with her and the children. Hill gives her a phone number at Catholic Social Service.

Fifteen percent of Amerasians manage to contact their

fathers, but only 2 percent are reunited with their fathers.

"A lot of them have very high hopes when they come into the country. In Vietnam, they get their identity through their father — 'I want to go to my father's land,'" Hill said. "A lot of them expect to see their father at the airport. 'When can I see my father?' Sometimes they'll make a phone call and sometimes the person hangs up real quick or they'll continue talking."

Hill says that "it's not so much that they want money or that type of thing, they just want to talk to their father."

"They wonder what he looks like, some of them have never seen their father because their photographs were torn up when the Communists came down in 1975. They were afraid they'd get in more trouble, so they got rid of the evidence."

Vo's father, James H. Gourdon of Oakdale, La. kept in touch with his mother, but was killed after he returned to the United States. Some, like Anh Kim, don't know how to get in touch with their fathers.

Tran Thi Bun Tran has two *my lai* sons, Hai, 18, and Thinh, 21. The family is from Da Nang and entered the United States almost a year ago. She was working as a cashier in a post exchange in 1967 when she met their father, who she says was

a civilian.

"He got information about the Communists," Mrs. Tran said of her children's father during an interview in her apartment last Monday, which was Tet, the Vietnamese lunar New Year.

Mrs. Tran is representative of the mothers of Amerasians. Not all worked as "bar girls," as is stereotypically thought. Most were secretaries, nurses, seamstresses, or workers in cafeterias, laundries, and other military base positions.

Now Mrs. Tran is laid off. She was working in a business upholstering furniture, but she was "too slow."

Amerasian children not only are ostracized by the Vietnamese society, but often are neglected by their own mothers.

"It's strange, sometimes the mother herself will not accept the child although they used the child as a way to come into the country," Hill said. "Once they're here, they won't have anything to do with them. They don't want to be reminded. You'd think it'd be different."

Sometimes, with a black Amerasian for instance, the children are abandoned and then adopted by a grandmother or a sympathetic woman in Vietnam as a baby. The adoptive mothers bring them to the United States.

At the single-story beige block of apartments where Vo and his brother live, a black rooster and chicken strut in front of the doorways. Den Van Le, 18, is eating with four friends around a coffee table jammed with plates of food and cans of Budweiser.

Le, who lives with his mother, is the son of a black serviceman. Until one notices the high cheekbones of the Indo-Khmer, Le looks startlingly like a full American. He said that when he first arrived in the United States, people couldn't understand why he didn't speak English. Most Amerasians are indistinguishable from white Americans.

Le stands outside the door to his apartment, holding one of the black chickens that live in the courtyard. He came to the United States to find his father and has spent four years looking for him.

Le says that he's "still pretty mad" that he can't get in touch with the parent he's never seen.

While Le says that he wasn't treated badly in Vietnam, he likes it better here because he "couldn't find a job in Vietnam." He works at a parts manufacturing plant.

## Mothers come over with children

Le was one of the roughly 80 percent of *my lai* who come over with their natural mothers. Many immigrate to the United States without any relatives at all. Abandoned by their fathers, their mothers either dead or disappeared, they face perhaps more unequal odds than Amerasians with at least one parent.

Nhan Trong Tran lives a few doors down from the Tran family. Tran is 16, and an orphan. He arrived in the United States last November with his sister. His mother died in a refugee camp in Thailand. Tran speaks very little English, but he's learning.

The apartment has a strong smell of nuoc mam; the walls are bare except for a small Buddhist shrine in a corner, high on the wall.

Tran displays a calendar from a Vietnamese restaurant with pictures of girls on it. He smiles and nods, but otherwise is unaffected by the presence of visitors. Tran also attends Washington High School, where about 70 refugee children are enrolled.

Tempe police also reported the following incidents Monday:

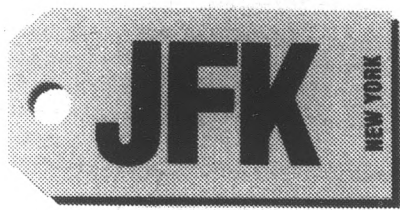
A 39-year-old Tempe man was injured critically Friday when he was struck by a car on the 1700 block of East Baseline Road.

Some 30 different dialects are spoken at Washington High, according to Marilyn Becker, a credentials secretary at the school. The district-wide percentage of first-generation American students in Glendale is 2.7 percent Asian and Pacific Islander, said Bruce Florence, communications specialist with Glendale District Union Office.

There are no teachers that speak Asian languages at Washington High. Hill said that the school has one teacher who instructs the English as a Second Language program that serves students who are natives of countries ranging from Romania to Laos.

Lisa Win also attends Washington High. She came over to the United States six months ago from Ho Chi Minh City with her mother and sister. Lisa, 15 and shy, has moved three times.

Hill says that it's common for many people in the refugee community to move frequently. He said someday he'll go into

an apartment and the occupants and their belongings will be gone.

Approximately 800 refugees live in Sunnyslope, the largest refugee community in Phoenix. The value of apartments in Sunnyslope was boosted because refugees paid the rent on time and filled the complexes, Hill said.

CSS picks up the tab for initial housing until refugees get jobs and are able to support themselves.

Hill said that CSS is in the process of gathering suggestions on how the Arizona business community and city government can aid Amerasians. Vietnam veterans are getting involved at their behest to set up Big Brother-type programs.

Between 100 and 150 refugees are expected to arrive in Phoenix this year, said CSS program director Webster.

The Trans, Nhan and his sister, Win and Vo all came to the United States the same way. Instead of making the dangerous voyage by boat and risking pirates, starvation, and storms, they took advantage of the Orderly Departure Program.

There are three channels through which Amerasians can make their way to a new life: fleeing by boat or through the jungles

into Thailand, ODP or the Amerasian Immigration Act.

## Attacked by pirates

Hai-Yen Duong, 16, is a friend of Lisa and lives in the same apartment complex. While Hai-Yen is full Vietnamese, she and her family faced equally great difficulties in leaving their homeland. They fled by boat in 1986 to West Malaysia.

Hai-Yen's father and the other men on the boat made a pact to defend their families should they be attacked by pirates. In the middle of the night, the boat was rammed by Thai pirates who prey on refugees and sparsely-staffed tankers in the Gulf of Siam.

During the attack, a heavy object was thrown on to the Thais' boat. The pirates thought that it was a grenade and left the refugees in peace.

"I cried," Hai-Yen says now with a big smile.

The Duongs made it to Malaysia and later came to the United States through ODP, which was established in late September 1982 to facilitate the immigration of both Amerasians and Vietnamese.

## Orderly Departure Program

ODP was created by the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees and the Vietnamese government in 1979. It provides a legal and safe alternative to the exodus by boat.

The first Amerasians to leave Vietnam through ODP were those whose fathers had filed papers for them. The State Department expanded ODP to include Amerasians without firm documentation but who appear to have been fathered by an American.

When the program was set up, posters were displayed at police stations and word got around by mouth. Some, like Dung Thanh Vo and his family, heard about ODP from neighbors but waited until other people decided to go. They were afraid that the Vietnamese government would send them to work in undeveloped areas of the country as forced labor.

To leave Vietnam, immigrants first need to obtain exit permits from the government and then satisfy the eligibility criteria of the nation of which they wish to live, according

to a Catholic Conference report on the Amerasian refugees.

## Amerasian Immigration Act

The Amerasian Immigration Act was passed by Congress in 1982. The law gives top priority immigration to Amerasians in Kampuchea, Korea, Laos, Thailand and Vietnam.

Immigration is granted only to those children known to have been fathered by a U.S. citizen. Mothers and half-siblings are not permitted, according to a report prepared by the executive director of Migration and Refugee Services of the U.S. Catholic Conference.

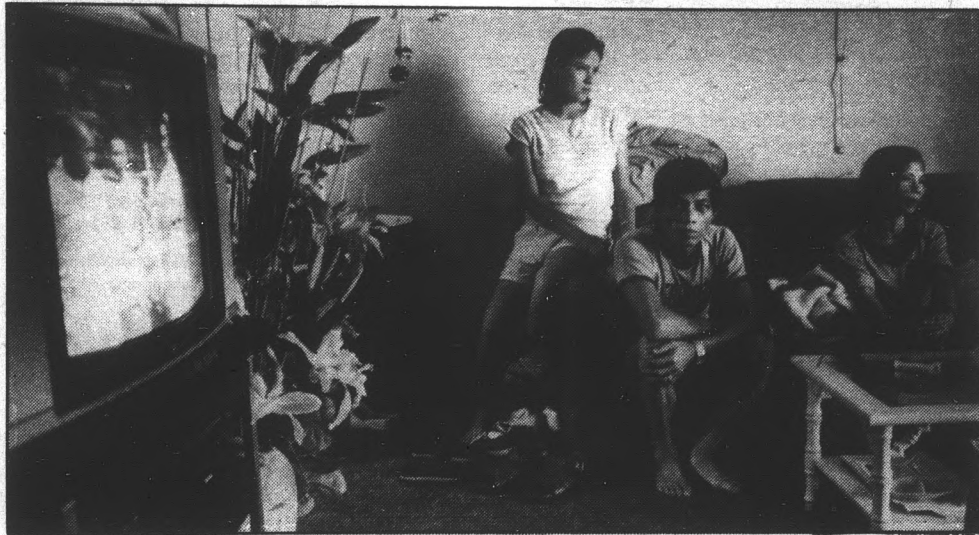
While American involvement in Vietnam may have provided the impetus for the Amerasian Immigration Act, the law has no applicability whatsoever to the thousands of *my lai* remaining in the country because the United States has no diplomatic relations with Viet Nam, the report said.

Most refugees fly out of Vietnam to the Philippines. They spend six months in one of three refugee camps learning basic English before they continue on to the United States.

When asked if they would like to go back to their homeland, almost all of the *my lai* say yes.

"I'd like to go back and see my brothers and sister," says Le, looking at his rooster.

Adds Vo, "It's too cold here; it's never cold in Vietnam."

# California, Washington consider gun control laws

Lawmakers in California and Washington state on Monday considered attempts to control semi-automatic rifles, such as the AK-47 used in a schoolyard massacre earlier this year in Stockton, Calif.

In Washington, the state Senate Law and Justice Committee approved a measure to toughen penalties for private possession of machine guns. The machine gun bill was applauded by the Washington State Council of Police Officers and the King County Outdoor Sports Council.

But a sports council representative testified his group would oppose a proposal

to ban ownership of all semi-automatic weapons other than handguns that can fire more than nine rounds at a time.

In California, Attorney General John Van de Kamp condemned the AK-47 as a weapon "designed for mass murder," and Assembly Speaker Willie Brown crushed an AK-47 with a 3½-ton road roller at the front steps of the Capitol to dramatize his stand against the weapons.

Patrick Purdy used an AK-47 on Jan. 17 when he opened fire on 400 children on a playground outside the Cleveland Elementary School in Stockton, Calif.

Five children died and 29 children were

injured as well as one teacher.

But taking the opposite side at an informational hearing before the 80-member state Assembly, private firearms expert Harold Johnson said it is impossible to come up with a legal definition of the assault weapons used by street gangs that some lawmakers want to outlaw without also banning semi-automatic hunting weapons used by tens of thousands of sportsmen.

The rare "committee of the whole" hearing included more than three hours of testimony from 15 persons invited as expert witnesses. They represented the variety of

viewpoints on gun control proposals that have flooded the Legislature in response to the almost daily gang killings in Los Angeles, as well as the Stockton killings.

But the hearing was limited to a general discussion of gun issues, with hearings on specific bills scheduled to start Feb. 28.

About 30 states are considering some sort of control or ban on semi-automatic weapons. Last Friday, Los Angeles Police Chief Daryl F. Gates told a U.S. Senate Judiciary Subcommittee considering a ban on the sale of military assault weapons such as the AK-47, that "the police of America are pleading with you."

# Woman arrested for leaving baby in closet for 8 days

PHOENIX (AP) — A woman who left her 18-month-old daughter in a closet for eight days without food and water was arrested Monday after being discharged from a hospital, police said.

Kathy Lee Lyons, 21, was booked into Maricopa County Jail for investigation of one count of child abuse, said Officer Andy Hill, a police spokesman. The woman also was booked for an outstanding misdemeanor shoplifting warrant, Hill said.

Earlier, the grandmother of Janaya Lee said the girl has recovered enough to recognize relatives.

Lena Jackson said the girl recognized her Sunday night during a visit to St. Joseph's Hospital.

"She cried out and held her arms out to me. She didn't say nothing, but she's doing real good," Jackson said.

Lyons said she put Janaya in a bedroom closet before firefighters took her to Phoenix Memorial Hospital for delivery of her third child Feb. 2.

The woman told reporters she deceived others about the toddler's whereabouts because she feared authorities would take away her children.

She said she was in labor when she left for the hospital and couldn't figure out what to do with Janaya.

"I was just scared. I tried to call a friend and tell her where (Janaya) was, but she just scared me. She told me they going

to put me in jail, they going to take her away from me, they going to call the child protective people and I'll never see her again," said Lyons, who took her 3-year-old son, Jamaine, with her to the hospital.

The boy later was moved to the Maricopa Medical Center nursery and left for several days before Jackson picked him up Feb. 7.

Officials said Child Protective Services asked police to visit the apartment Feb. 4, and Jackson visited the apartment Feb. 6 or 7 to pick up a few things for the new baby, a boy.

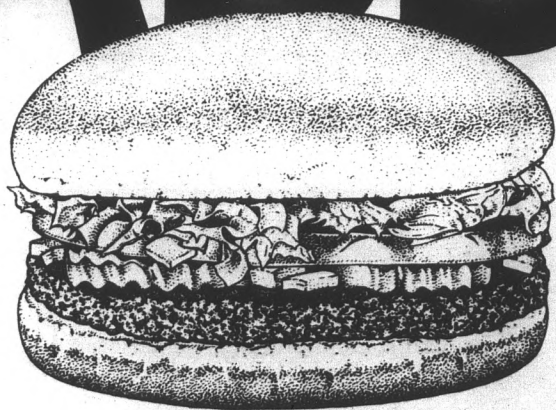
Neither police nor Jackson heard Janaya.

# Mofford signs bill to fund high-tech plan

PHOENIX (AP) — A bill to subsidize the Instrumented Factory for Precision Gears by \$3.75 million if Arizona lands the high-technology project was signed into law Monday by Gov. Rose Mofford.

The House and Senate, meanwhile, held ceremonies to commemorate the day in 1912 that Arizona was admitted as a state.

In other action at the capitol, representatives of several anti-smoking groups urged support for bills aimed at discouraging smoking among teen-agers.

The high-technology project, known as INFAC, would get most of its funding — \$37 million — from the Pentagon's U.S. Defense Logistics Agency.

Arizona State University is competing against schools in several other states for the project, and backers of ASU's efforts said they needed a \$750,000-a-year state commitment for five years to show that Arizona is as serious about the project as other states.

Legislative leaders, aircraft industry executives and ASU officials clustered around Mofford as she signed the bill Monday, making it the first law approved this year.

The state lost out to other states on bids for the Superconducting Super Collider and Sematech, but the \$3.75 million allocated on Monday will not actually be spent unless Arizona lands INFAC; Mofford said.

The anti-smoking lobby is focusing its attack on the over-the-counter sale of cigarettes to minors, distribution of free tobacco products samples at sporting events and cigarette vending machines, said Dr. Andrew Nichols of the University of Arizona College of Medicine.

"We do know that most adult smokers began when they were teen-agers," Nichols said. "We do know that cigarettes are used repeatedly and widely in our schools today. We do know that cigarettes are readily available to children."

The coalition is backing legislation sponsored by Rep. Dave McCarroll, R-Phoenix, that would increase the penalty

for selling cigarettes to minors, and by Rep. Peter Goudinoff, D-Tucson, that would ban all cigarette vending machines in Arizona.

Under McCarroll's bill, selling tobacco to a minor would be a Class 1 misdemeanor, punishable by fines of up to \$20,000 for a corporation or \$1,000 for an individual, and up to six months in jail or three years' probation.

McCarroll and Goudinoff acknowledged that the current law banning cigarette sales to minors is rarely enforced. But Goudinoff said increasing the penalties could help change that.

"If we say it's a Class 1 misdemeanor, we're sending a message to law enforcement first off that we consider this very important," he said. "Secondly, it's the same message being transmitted to sellers, school teachers and parents."

Goudinoff's bill would ban cigarette vending machines anywhere in Arizona and require anyone selling tobacco products to ask for proof of age. It also would prohibit the distribution of free tobacco samples.

He called the legislation an important step in fighting drug abuse.

"The making of a penalty is just the first step," Goudinoff said. "Then once that's established, you have to go to the other prevention and intervention strategies, which we have not pursued in this state."

The ceremonies marking statehood day including lectures and songs from historians as well as prizes for winners of a statewide writing contest aimed at grades 7 through 12.

The winners were George Stickney of Carson Junior High in Mesa, Rebecca Mello of Christian School, Dee Wilkins of Round Valley Junior School, Lisa Blevins of Apache Junction High School, Delbert Black of Colorado City High School, Tara Doherty of Chaparral High School, Michele Bodeman of Chaparral High School and Diana Allen of Apache Junction High School.

## Ducks take two from ASU in home opener

The ASU softball team dropped both games of a doubleheader last night to Oregon, 3-0 and 2-1.

For the Sun Devils, it was both their season and Pac-10 opener because they were rained out last weekend in San Diego.

Oregon upped its record to 6-0, 2-0 Pac-10, in front of a crowd of 150 in Sun Devil Club Stadium.

The Ducks struck first in the opening game, when first baseman Kathy Gray singled in catcher Julie Calvanugh in the first inning.

In the sixth inning, shortstop Vicki Fry hit an inside-the-park homerun scoring designated player Kim Manning from second.

The Devils had an opportunity to score in the bottom of the second, but failed to convert. ASU catcher Brandi Hust and first baseman Michele Gravatt put together back to back singles with no outs.

But an unfortunate double play with one out ended the Sun Devils' hopes. Designated player Becky Davis hit a line drive to second baseman Danielle Senner who doubled up Hust off second, to run ASU out of the inning.

Both pitchers Terri Carnicelli of ASU and Duck Katie Wiese went the distance. Wiese gave up nine hits and struck out two, while Carnicelli allowed six hits, while striking out four.

"Terri pitched terrible tonight," ASU coach Mary Littlewood said. "We gave up

too many hits to win the game."

The Sun Devils captured the early lead in the second half of the twin-bill.

In the third inning, centerfielder Cheryl Smith drove a single to leftfield. Smith moved to second on a fielders' choice and advanced to third on a sacrifice fly to rightfield by catcher Karen Fifield. Shortstop Ann Rowan then singled in Smith with an infield hit to second base.

Catcher Julie Cavanugh opened the sixth for the Ducks with a single. One batter later Duck designated player Cheryl Coryell tripled in Cavanugh, and later scored on a wild pitch by ASU hurler Gravatt.

ASU used two pitchers in the second contest, Gravatt and Melinda Cook. Cook pitched 6 $\frac{2}{3}$  innings and gave up one run on five hits. While Gravatt pitched  $\frac{1}{3}$  of an inning and allowed one run, and one hit.

The Devils were without the services of starting catcher Christi Serritella, who was out with the flu.

"I think the loss of Christi hurt us tremendously," Littlewood said. "You really hate having to take (second baseman) Karen (Fifield) out of the infield to put her behind the plate."

"I thought that the (rained out) games in San Diego hurt us, because there's a lot of pressure playing your first game in Pac-10 competition."

The Devils play host to the University of Toledo on Wednesday. The contest is a double header with play beginning at 6:00 p.m. at Sun Devil Club Stadium.

## Collins excels as two-sport athlete for Sun Devils

Track and football have been a big part of Shane Collins' life ever since he was in the fourth grade.

"From day one my dad always had me doing something," he said. "I became interested in track first."

The shot-putter on the ASU track and field team has come a long way since those days of "pee-wee leagues." Last season in track he threw a second-place toss of 59-11 at the Pac-10 Championship, the best effort in ASU history.

But the sophomore business major does not limit himself to throwing a shot — Collins is also a member of the Sun Devil football team.

The defensive lineman led the team last year with four quarterback sacks and was fifth in tackles with 67. He redshirted his freshman year at ASU.

Even though football and track are very different, Collins said this is the reason he enjoys each of them so much.

"Football is a team sport," he said. "It is a great feeling to

be a part of the team.

"Track is an individual sport. When things go wrong you can only blame yourself.

"This is why I like both sports."

When Collins participates in track this season, he will not be representing ASU — the 6-foot-4 shot-putter will redshirt this year, competing unattached during the indoor and outdoor seasons.

On his own, Collins will have the opportunity to throw at more meets across the country than he would have if he competed for the Sun Devils this season.

"I'm doing this instead of wasting a whole year," he said. "Because there are only four home meets I will probably have better competition this way."

ASU was placed on a two-year probation last summer and is limited to home meets.

Collins will compete in the ASU meets, but his status will be "unattached."

He will make his indoor debut Saturday in the Skydome at

NAU.

Although the probation is stringent and taxed the team last year while Pac-10 investigations were being conducted, Collins said he is not letting it affect his performance.

"There's nothing I can do about it," he said. "I just want to keep getting better and better. I think you just need to accept it and go on."

Collins added that the probation is not a big issue on the track.

"No one really talks about the probation," he said. "They are focusing on what they have to do."

While the 245-pound Sun Devil talked about collegiate track, he compared it to high school.

Collins was the 1986 national high school shot put champion and recorded the nation's best prep throw, 65-4, when he competed at Bozeman Senior High School in Montana.

In high school he said he was the only shot-putter, but then he came to ASU and realized there were top-caliber throwers

For example, Brock said when he needs to make travel arrangements or visit with an athletic department administrator, all he has to do is walk down the hall.

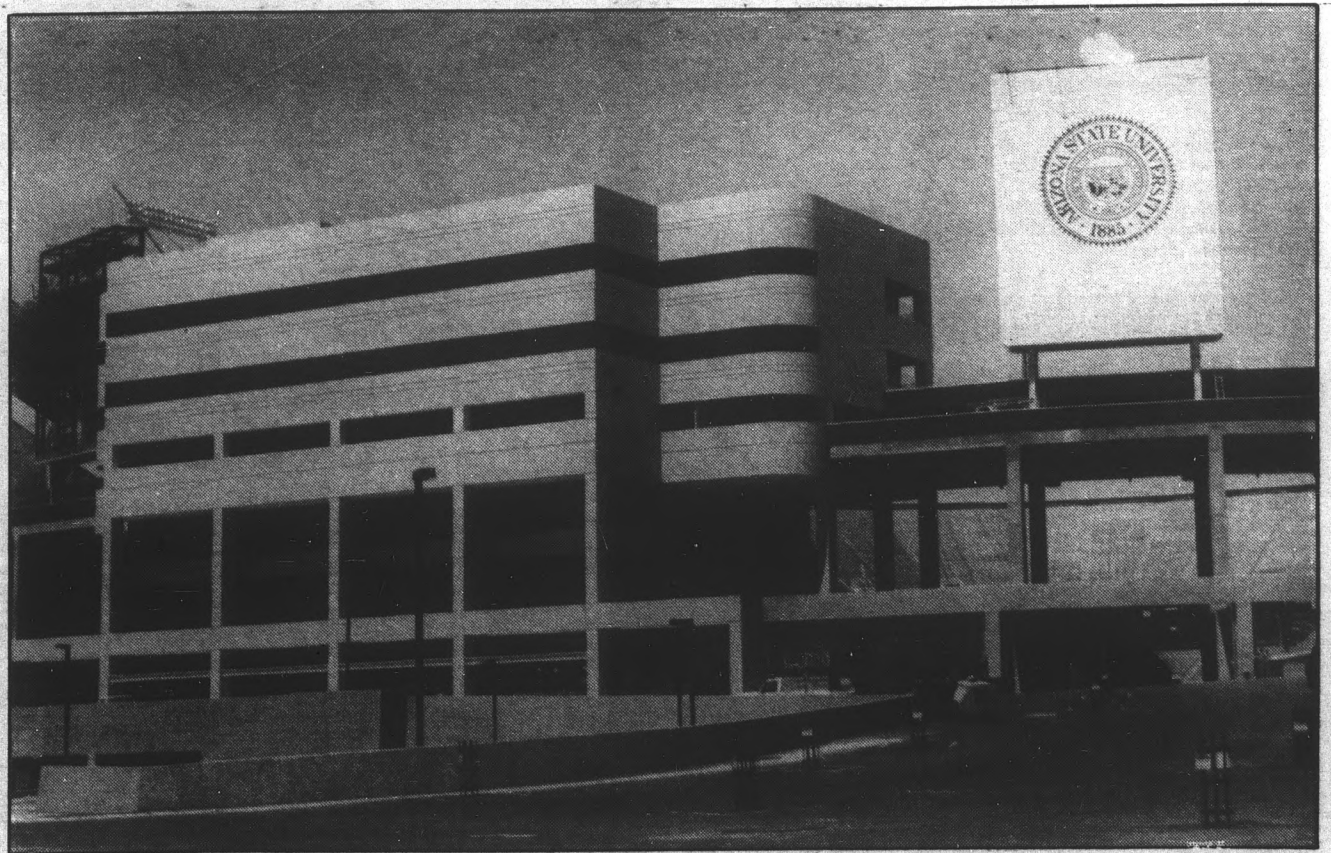
The \$9.5 million six-story ICA building was completed last fall and contains coaching and administrative offices, a weightroom, and classrooms.

# Senior emerges as top performer

After 500 years the phoenix rose, renewed from its ashes.

From the depths of the Pac-10 standings, the ASU women's basketball team rests. But one Sun Devil has now emerged.

Following ASU's loss to the Oregon Ducks Friday, the junior guard Rosalind Senior stood above the rest.

Senior, 5-foot-7, came off the bench against the Ducks to score a career-high 22 points. She excelled for the Devils from the outside, hitting on six-of-seven shots from 3-point range.

For the year, Senior leads the Pac-10 in 3-point shooting, connecting with 57.7 percent (30-52) of her attempts this year. She is also ASU's all-time career leader in 3-point shooting, making good on 40 of 69 attempts (58 percent).

Senior, who averaged 6.7 points a game last season, has improved to 9.6 points per game. She has scored 192 points, a total that surpasses last year's total of 180.

"I feel I can be a consistent shooter," Senior said. "All I can do is just focus out all the distractions and concentrate on the basket and the shot should fall."

Senior, who played the point guard position last year, has adapted to shooting guard this season.

"The move really helped me," Senior said. "I think the point guard position requires so much thinking on the court. I really admire those who can play the position well."

ASU head coach Maura McHugh agreed that the move was beneficial for Senior.

"Rosalind is a great shooter," McHugh said. "She plays the transition game well, she can run the floor, and pull up and hit the

jumper."

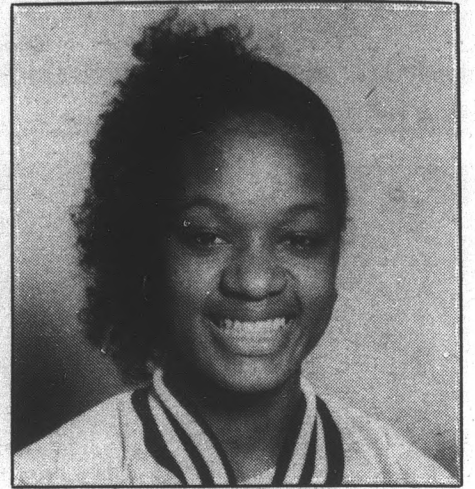
Senior said Mark Senior, whom she married in August, provides a strong support system for her on the court.

"I have to say the motivation of him being there every night really pushes me to do well," Senior said.

A native of Inglewood, Calif., Senior said she also looks to Sun Devils point guard Karen O'Connor, offguard Carolyn DeHoff and center Fran Ciak for support.

"I look to all of them for inspiration," said Senior. "First of all I look to Karen because she plays a position I used to play and she plays it well. Carolyn may not be the fastest player, but she is so court smart — she's constantly thinking on the court. Fran is the leader underneath because she'll fight, bite scratch and kill for you underneath."

Senior says she has three primary goals for this season.

"I would like to end up the season scoring 14 points a game," Senior said. "I would like to be able to play better 'D' (defense) and I would like to see us win the close ball games."

"I think the last one would be really nice."



Schermerhorn said the new building is good for recruiting.

"We have our own little complex here," he said. "We have our own little family and it's easier to get things done."

Women's softball coach Mary Littlewood said she is happy with her new office.

"We are all close together now," she said. "It's nice to have that kind of a view."

Athletic director Charles Harris said: "This is the first office I've ever had with a window."

His fifth-floor office overlooks Sun Devil Stadium, while Brock, Robinson and Schermerhorn and Littlewoods' offices overlook the ASU campus.

Brock and Robinsons' first offices were in P.E. West, the building that used to house the athletic department.

"There wasn't much to it," Brock said about the P.E. West office he worked in 18 years ago.

Similarly, Robinson said: "It's a dump. It's an old, old building."

Littlewood began her coaching career at ASU in an office also at P.E. West 23 years ago. Then, P.E. East was built a couple of years later, that accommodated most of the offices for women's sports.

"It was a nice office," she said. "At that time it was brand new."

Then in 1974 all of the coaches took a step

up when they moved to the \$8 million University Activity Center.

But with time, Harris said, the building became too small. In some cases, storage rooms had to be converted into offices as the women's athletic program expanded, he said.

Littlewood's office was a storage closet in the basement, but despite the confinement, she later rejected an offer to move to an office upstairs.

"It was in the middle of the hustle and bustle," she said. "I enjoyed the quiet (of the basement office)."

Also, athletic personnel had to contend with UAC events, such as concerts, that were going on.

"It might be a concert for them," Harris said, "but it was just another day for us."

Brock said he was not content with the size of his UAC office.

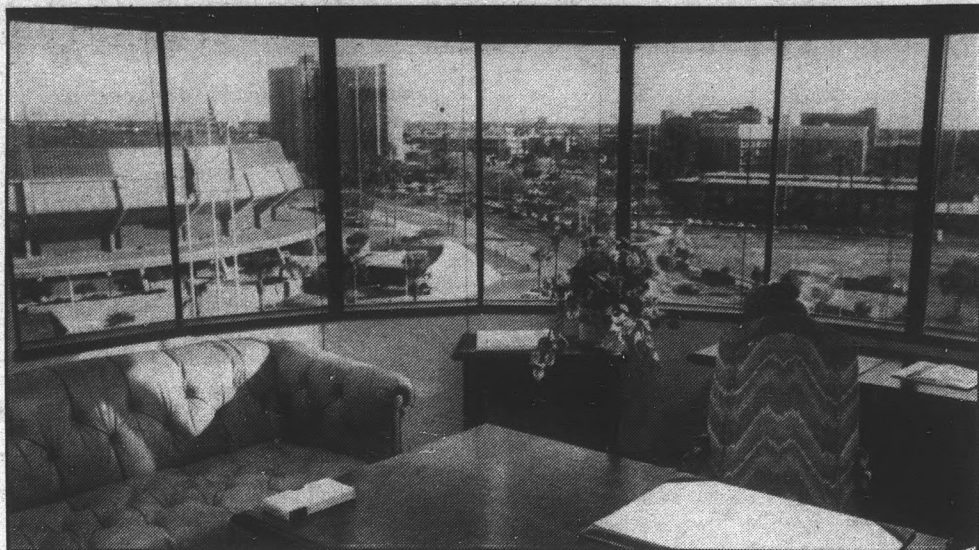
"That office was one-half the size of my office now," he reflected.

But Littlewood said her UAC office was bigger than her present office.

Now the coaches are all housed in the ICA building.

Robinson said because his gymnastics team competes in the UAC, it was convenient to use his office there during meets.

But he said he only has to walk a little bit further to his new office in the ICA building.

"I think the building as a whole is great," Robinson said. "It enhances the whole program."

Similarly, for sports such as men's and women's basketball the move could have been an inconvenience because office space was more easily accessible during games held in the UAC.

But Harris said basketball meeting rooms are still available in the UAC.

"The only thing that has changed for them is that they have more room," he said.

However, Harris said that there is always a transitional period with any move.

"It always takes time to get settled in and this is no exception," he said.

But Brock seems to be making the change.

"We are as happy as we can be," Brock said.

## Switzer suffers another setback in Oklahoma program

NORMAN, Okla. (AP) — FBI agents arrested Oklahoma quarterback Charles Thompson Monday night on a complaint of selling cocaine to an undercover agent, authorities said.

FBI spokesman Dan Vogel said Thompson was arrested about 8 p.m. in Norman on a federal complaint that he allegedly sold 17 grams of cocaine for \$1,400 to an undercover agent on Jan. 26.

Thompson will appear before a U.S. magistrate on Tuesday, Vogel said.

Earlier Monday, Oklahoma coach Barry Switzer suspended Thompson from the football team, making him the fifth player to be suspended since the NCAA placed the

NCAA on three years' probation in December for recruiting violations.

Switzer said he had suspended Thompson and was moving him out of the athletic dormitory pending an investigation and would not comment further.

Since the NCAA placed Oklahoma on probation, the football program has been plagued by unrelated incidents that have resulted in five suspensions from the team.

Starting cornerback Jerry Parks was suspended when he was charged with shooting with intent to injure teammate Zarak Peters on Jan. 13 in an athletic dorm. Parks is home in Texas awaiting his preliminary hearing and is not enrolled in school, Treps said.

Last Friday, Nigel Clay, Bernard Hall and Glenn Bell were suspended from the university for two years when they were charged with first-degree rape stemming from a Jan. 21 complaint at the athletic dorm.

When Switzer was asked if it was a difficult decision to suspend Thompson, who took over for Jamelle Holieway midway through last season, he said, "No, not at all."

Thompson and Holieway shared time at quarterback last season before Thompson took over for good in the first quarter against Texas. He started every game until he broke his leg on the final play in a 7-3 loss to Nebraska and was unable to play in the Citrus Bowl.

# Devil matmen face another tough road challenge

Iowa coach Dan Gable and his Hawkeye grapplers are cocky individuals — but they have reason to be.

Gable's wrecking crew (16-2) upset the two No. 1-ranked teams in the country over the weekend.

ASU and the Oklahoma State Cowboys shared the top billing in the college rankings before they toured Iowa City. The end result — Iowa knocked off the Sun Devils, 20-13, and defeated OSU, 20-17.

History repeated itself for ASU (15-3-2) as it earned the top position and was dethroned by an Iowa school. Last season, the Sun Devils were edged by Iowa State.

"We wrestled them (Iowa) close until the end," Sun Devil 118-pounder Zeke Jones said. "We lost two pivotal matches that would have made a difference."

The two ASU matches Jones spoke of were the 177-pound and 118-pound matches.

Senior All-American Jim Gressley made his debut two days earlier at Iowa State since returning from a neck injury. He lost to Hawkeye Don Finch, 7-5.

Jones grappled with No. 2-ranked Steve Martin, the same wrestler who prevented him from gaining a Midlands title in December. This match proved the same results, Martin came out on top, 7-5.

With the pair of victories Iowa is the favorite to earn the high honor. The

Hawkeyes were ranked fifth going into the two matches.

But the loss will not set the Sun Devils back. The intensity level is beginning to increase as the national championships are only a month away.

"They (Iowa) are going to be No. 1," Jones said. "But as far as Arizona State wrestling is concerned we want to be at the top at the end of the season. They can be No. 1 in February."

The Sun Devils, however, are not taking the defeat lightly.

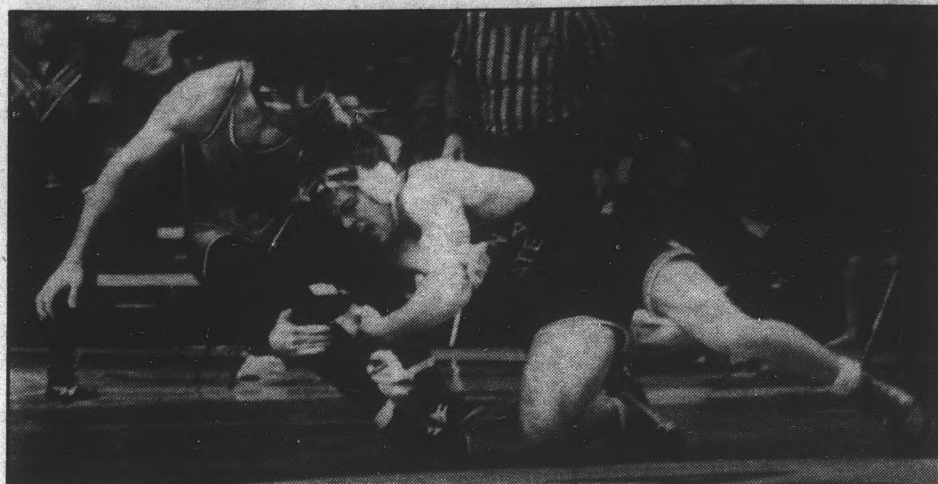
"We learned from it," Jones said. "We talked about what it took to be national champions last year, and what we are going to have to do to make that sacrifice again — to be national champions."

ASU has another big match coming up this weekend in a fourth meeting with the Cowboys. OSU will be looking to avenge the loss suffered Feb. 4, in the University Activity Center and this time have the home crowd advantage.

"Our focus now is thinking of OSU and nationals," Sun Devil 190-pounder John Ginther said.

Ginther scored the biggest highlight of the roadtrip. The two-time All-American defeated Iowa State's Eric Voelker, who was the top-ranked man in the country in his weight class.

"I felt that I had it in me," Ginther said, "and I brought myself to his level of

competition. I feel I am on the road to being a national champion. I think my wrestling is at that caliber."

The ASU middle weights again proved its dominance as they scored three wins against Iowa and two at Iowa State.

Junior Saunders (142 pounds) won twice over the weekend as did Dan St. John (158 pounds), who is 34-1 on the season. Thom Ortiz (150 pounds) lost to top-ranked

Cyclone Tim Krieger but battled back to score a 15-7 defeat over Iowa's Doug Streicher.

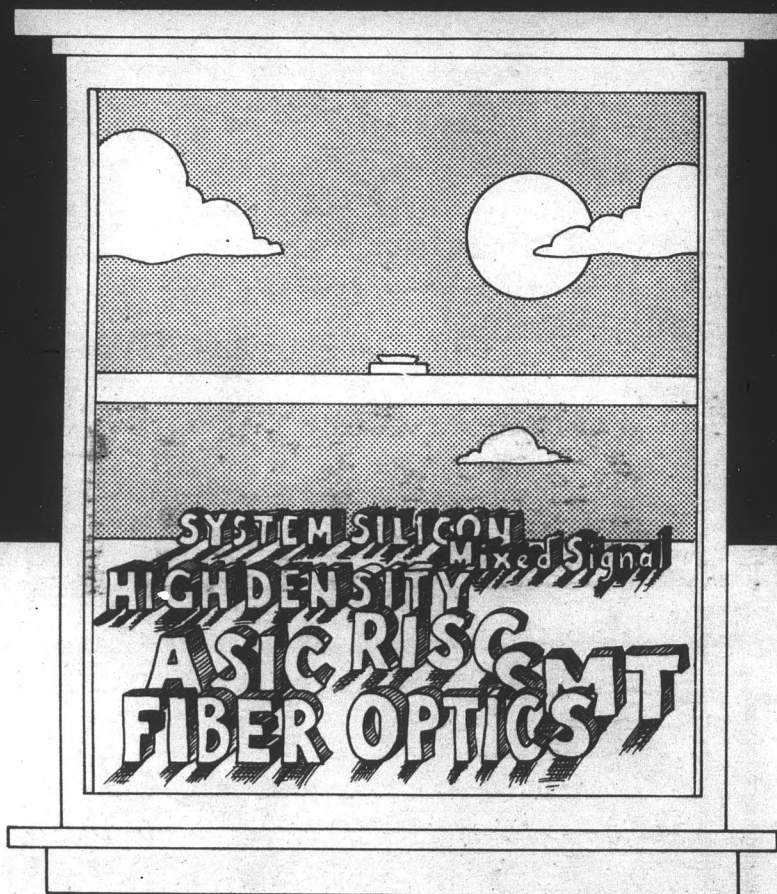
Sun Devil Ginther also recorded a major decision over Brooks Simpson, 15-5, to leave the Midwest with two wins under his belt.

ASU travels to Stillwater, Okla., this weekend to duel the Cowboys.

"A win in Stillwater will help going into nationals," Jones said. "It will also help the seedings (at nationals)."

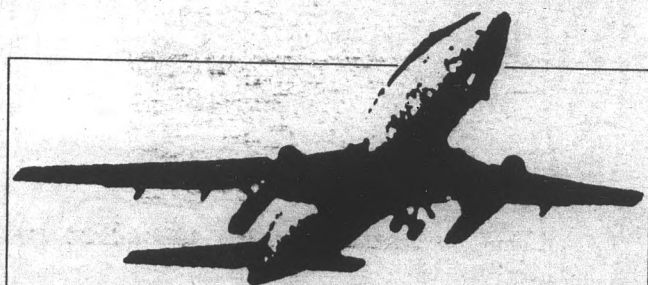

•Institution where Michaels earned his diploma.

Come on, this is a gimme. Think, think *real hard*. The answer is, "What is Arizona State University?"

Sports fans, for a wrong guess on this question, you will be sentenced to read Mike Ritter's column on the Opinion Page before returning for final jeopardy.

And now it's time for the moment you have all been waiting for — Final Jeopardy. Brace yourselves — this is a nailbiter.

# Time to heal tumblers' ailments

Experiencing late-hour traveling and Los Angeles traffic is not the best way to spend a weekend.

"When you sit in a car for two hours, it's not relaxing," ASU men's gymnastics coach Don Robinson said. "We drove for two hours to get to Santa Barbara (from Los Angeles) and after the meet we left at 10 p.m. to drive back (to Los Angeles) for competition the next day."

Although illnesses, fatigue and back-to-back gymnastic meets took their toll on the Sun Devil squad last weekend, ASU will have two weeks to recuperate and to prepare for the Feb. 25 Southwest Cup at the University Activity Center.

"I'm very happy that we have a week off to give us time to focus on the Southwest Cup," Robinson said. "We know where we stand and what we have to do."

The Sun Devils could not overcome the obstacles or the top-ranked teams that stood in its path during the California competitions last week. But even though the team suffered defeats in both meets, ASU assistant coach Scott Barclay said new life could emerge from the setbacks.

"The losses could be to our benefit," Barclay said. With four meets remaining in the regular season, ASU has more than a month to make amends before the Pac-10 Conference Invitational, March 24-25.

Robinson said he expects ASU to improve the team score to 276 to increase the chances of competing in the NCAA championships in April. The Sun Devils are determined in working harder and performing more routines in practice.

In the Santa Barbara Invitational on Friday, the Sun Devils produced a 269.85 team score. ASU, who was ranked seventh in the nation in recent balloting, was outscored by No. 4 Illinois, 277.40, Minnesota, 275.30, and No. 2 UCLA, 274.30.

ASU's scoring leader, senior Paul Linne, did not make the trip for the first meet due to the flu, but competed in Los Angeles. Senior Scott Hohman and sophomore Rhode participated, even though both were also recovering from the flu.

"Nobody in athletics ever gets a night off of competition because the team is sick," Robinson said. "When you have a job, you can take a sick-leave from work. In school or athletics, when you are sick you either go or you don't go."

I wish we could say this one doesn't count because we didn't feel good."

Although the Sun Devils averaged 72 percent on executing their routines during the meet, Barclay said the gymnasts were not performing to the best of their abilities. The major downfall for ASU was on the pommel horse, he said.

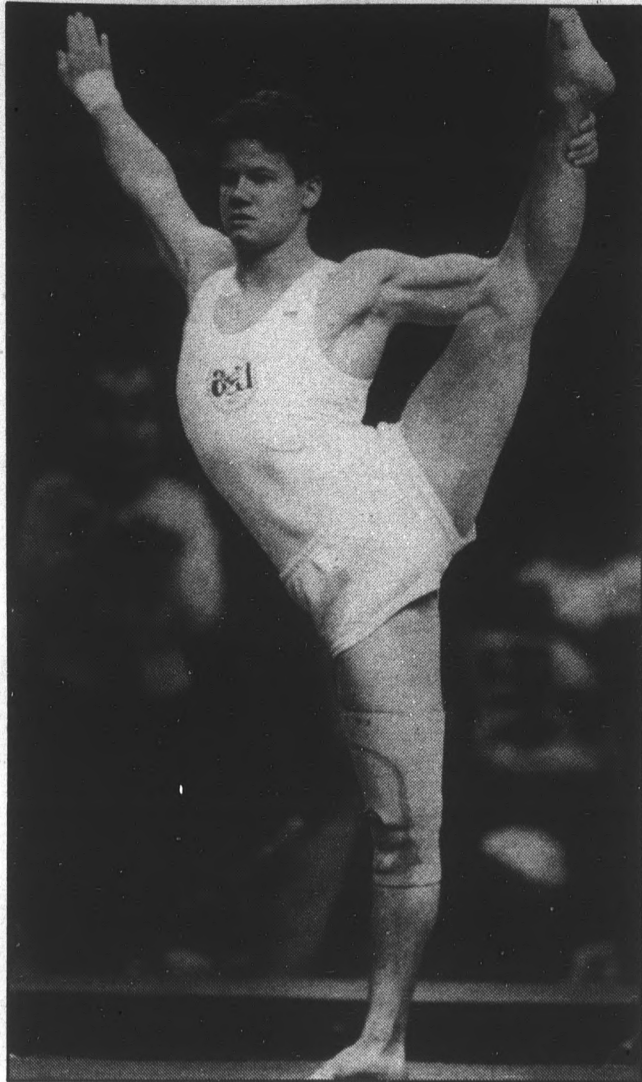
"Other than on pommels, we hit everything, but we didn't hit it clean," Barclay said. "We just weren't sharp. When we hit we didn't hit good."

Barclay said the gymnasts should at least score a 9.0 on each apparatus and 45.0 as a team per event. ASU only cleared that mark once, scoring a 47.0 in floor exercise.

Hohman topped all scores with a 9.75 in floor exercise. In other performances, Rhode finished fourth in pommel horse and Newman tied for third in still rings and placed fourth in vault.

Newman finished highest overall for ASU, taking seventh place in the all-around with a 55.2 score.

Although the routines did not appear to be any better in the second meet, Barclay said the ASU scores were higher. The Sun Devils averaged between 60 and 65 percent on hitting their routines, he said.

The Sun Devils improved their team score to 272.65 on Saturday, but still only managed a fourth-place finish in the UCLA Invitational. ASU trailed Illinois, 279.20, No. 5 Nebraska, 278.65, and UCLA, 277.85.

The second meet revealed downfalls similar to those exposed in the first meet. The Sun Devils performed poorly on the first event, vault, but gradually improved through the remainder of the evening's competition, Barclay said.

"Having Paul there added some momentum, enthusiasm and incentive," Barclay said. "We really missed him (the previous night), not only in performance but in moral support."

Linne produced the highest individual score of the meet, earning a 9.85 for top honors on the horizontal bar.

"It looked like a '10', which you don't see very often," Robinson said. "I thought he was underscored."

Newman tied for first in floor exercise with a 9.70 score, and Rhode tied for third in pommel with a 9.50 score. Newman led the Sun Devils overall, earning a 56.10 total in the all-around for a fifth-place finish in the meet.

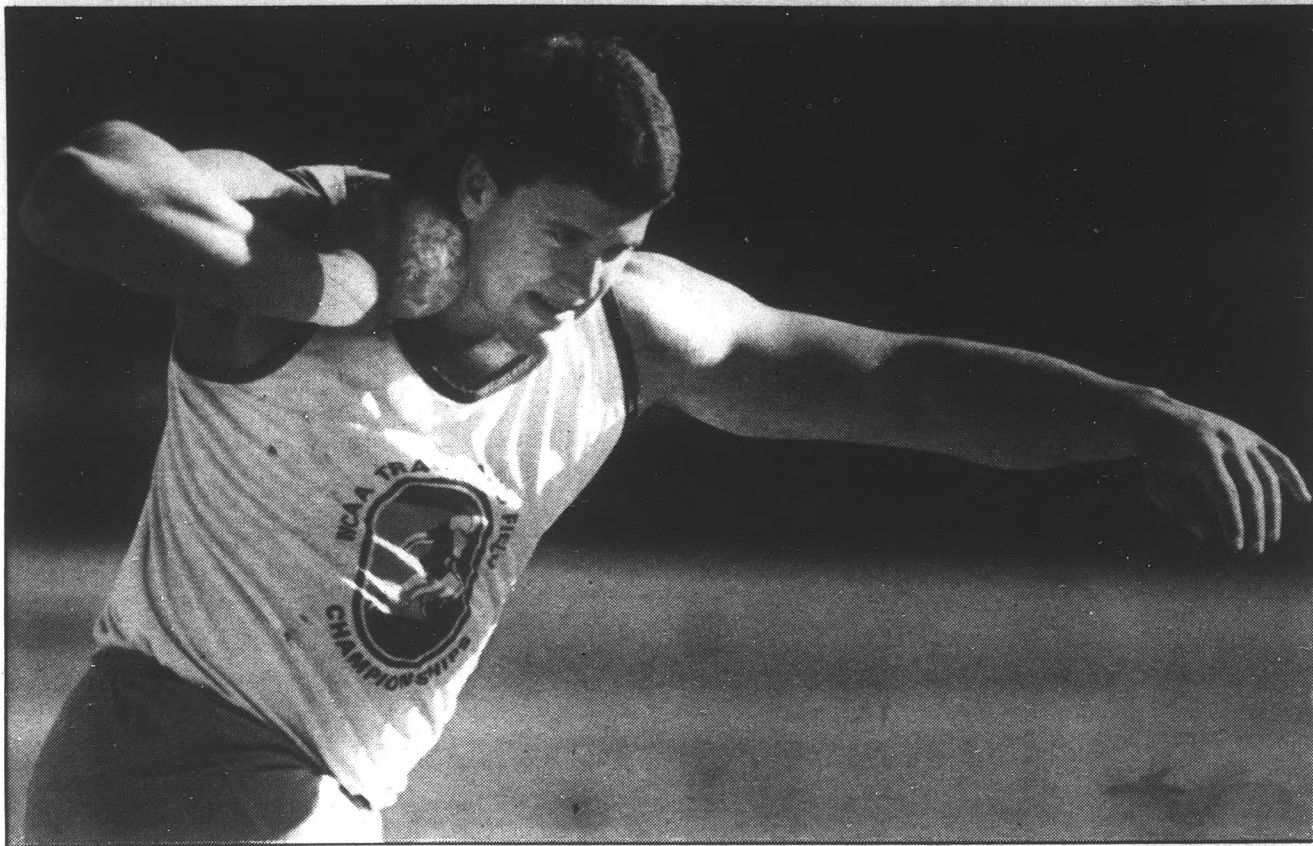

at every school. However, Collins said he likes it this way. "If there was no reason to get better, then why get better?" he said. The trackster said he spends a lot of time working on his throwing technique. Because there is no set way to throw, Collins studies films of other shot-putters to gain helpful tips. "I'm throwing with the big boys now," he said. "I have a lot of time to get better." Collins said most world-class shot-putters reach their peak at 27 years of age. He said he would like to play professional football or participate in the Olympics, but if he doesn't it will not be a major setback. "Those are dreams of mine," Collins said. The trackster said he enjoys Tempe's pleasant weather. He said last week it was "100 degrees below zero" back home in Montana, but in the summer it reaches 115 degrees in the Valley. "I don't know which is worse," Collins said.
