

## Faculty, staff club seeks Tempe members

A social and dining club for ASU faculty and staff is still more than 250 members short of the 800 members it needs to occupy the Fine Arts Annex.

The University Club board of directors is waiting for responses from 75 letters sent to selected Tempe community and business leaders nearly a month ago. The University Club is opening the club to community members in an effort to hike its membership.

The club will not be able to occupy the Fine Arts Annex unless it has 800 members under a rule created by ASU President

J. Russell Nelson.

"We're still in the process of soliciting people from the outside community," said Michael Nielsen, president of the club's board of directors. "We have had interest and several phone calls."

Faculty, staff and administrators will pay a \$25 initiation fee and a \$300 contribution for renovation of the Fine Arts Annex. Community members will pay a \$200 initiation fee and a \$300 renovation fee.

Corporate memberships covering three people will cost \$1,250, including a \$750 donation for renovation. Corporate sponsors for six members costs \$2,500, including a \$1,000 initiation fee and \$1,500 renovation

donation.

Also, a \$25 monthly fee will be charged to members once the club is open.

Once the 800 membership mark is reached, ASU's administration has promised to let the club "have access" to the historic Fine Arts Annex, Nielsen said.

The club has about 540 members including faculty, staff and administrators. Organizers hope to get another 260 so the club can open.

"I'm optimistic that we will be occupying the club within the next 18 months," Nielsen said.

Both the Faculty Senate and the Faculty Association have worked on the concept of a

University Club on and off since the 1960s.

In the fall of 1984, Nelson appointed a task force of faculty and professional staff members to propose to him a location and an organizational structure for the club.

The task force's report was submitted to Nelson in December 1984 and he appointed a University Club Steering Committee.

About 4,600 letters were sent to full-time faculty and administrative staff, academic professionals, classified staff and professors emeritus in November 1986.

All ASU staff, faculty, administrators and selected community members will be allowed to join, Nielsen said.

## Memorial services set for student who died Friday

Memorial services are scheduled for Tuesday at 4 p.m. at the Newman Center for 21-year-old ASU student Kelly Fife, who died Friday of viral pneumonia.

Kim Johnson, an ASU broadcasting student and Fife's roommate, said Fife died at Tempe St. Luke's Hospital after being hospitalized for six days.

"Things just happened too fast, there were no warnings," Johnson said. "First she went to the Student Health Center and they said she had bronchitis, then one night when we were home she said she wasn't feeling well and her boyfriend took her to the hospital and now she is gone."

A funeral will be held Wednesday in Naperville, Ill., where Fife's family lives.

Fife, a senior who would have graduated in December, was majoring in business management. She is survived by her parents, Joe and Diane Fife, and a sister, Katie.

While attending ASU, Fife was a member of the ASU chapter of the Alpha Chi Omega sorority and was a former vice president of the organization.

"Kelly was just the kind of person you wanted to have around," Johnson said. "She smiled a lot and always had something uplifting to say, not only to her friends but to other people as well."

"I guess I've learned that no matter what, it is best to make the most of out of life."

Jennifer Clarke, the ASU chapter president of Alpha Chi Omega, said the memorial service is open to everyone.

Clarke said donations, which will later be given to a charity of the family's choice in memory of Fife, are being accepted by the sorority.

## Safety Escort Service plans to add more women to staff

ASU's Safety Escort Service wants to change its image by having more women as escorts, said service director Mark Winfield.

"Women think we are a protection service," Winfield said. "(We are) not a protection service but a companion service."

Winfield said use of the service has decreased in recent years, and attributed the decline in women viewing the service as a protection agency.

"We never intended to be a protection service," Winfield said.

Winfield said the service needs 13 more escorts and has had three women applicants.

He said the service does not train the escorts as bodyguards, but rather in radio procedures. The escorts carry radios to allow them to alert the ASU police in the case of an emergency, Winfield said.

Since its inception in 1982, the service has not had anyone attacked while with an escort, he said.

The service has 16 volunteers who give about two hours a week to the service, Winfield said.

There are two women dispatchers, but no women escorts, he said.

Winfield said either a male or female escort can provide a safe atmosphere for the student.

"There is safety in numbers," Winfield said. "When people are walking together, (other) people are not likely to attack."

Whether or not the safety escort is male or female does not make a difference to some students as long as the safety aspect is there.

"Just having someone with me would make me feel safer," said Eva Shivers, telecommunications major who uses the service. "If I were to go way out where there is not a lot of people, I would be scared."

But Stacy Leiser, a freshman, said she would "not be as comfortable" with a woman safety escort when she walks to Lot 59.

"I think that people are more apt to attack a woman more than a guy," she said.

### Cargo door locks suspected in United Airlines tragedy

HONOLULU (AP) — A failed lock may have caused a United Airlines jumbo jet's cargo door to pop open at 22,000 feet, ripping a huge hole up the side of the plane and sending nine passengers to their deaths, federal investigators say.

Damage to the plane is consistent with the cargo door popping open under pressurization of the cabin as the jet gained altitude and atmospheric pressure outside the aircraft declined, National Transportation Safety Board investigator Lee Dickinson said at a late Saturday news conference.

Coast Guard cutters and aircraft continued their search Sunday 100 miles south of here for more debris from the plane as more than 70 people, including 16 from the NTSB, investigated the cause of the accident.

United Flight 811, carrying 354 people, had taken off Friday for New Zealand and was about 100 miles from Honolulu when the fuselage ripped open over the Pacific Ocean. Nine passengers were sucked out and are presumed dead.

### Tower issues extreme pledge not to drink alcohol if confirmed

WASHINGTON (AP) — Defense Secretary-designate John Tower said Sunday he is not an alcoholic and issued an extraordinary pledge not to take a single drink if he is confirmed by the Senate to head the Pentagon.

As Tower defended his reputation in nationally televised

interviews, Senate Armed Services Committee Chairman Sam Nunn, D-Ga., accused the White House of leaking information from the FBI report on Tower and threatened to reopen the hearings on the nomination and subpoena anonymous witnesses quoted in the agency review.

The committee voted 11-9 along party lines last Thursday to recommend that the full Senate reject Tower's nomination, with Nunn citing allegations of excessive drinking by the nominee.

The full Senate is expected to take up the nomination Wednesday.

### "French Connection" dwarfed by \$1 billion heroin bust

NEW YORK (AP) — It wasn't like the "French Connection" heroin bust. There was no careening car chase, no "Popeye" Doyle cracking the case.

But agents who smashed a Hong Kong-to-Chinatown narcotics ring last week stumbled onto the largest heroin haul in U.S. history when they seized \$1 billion worth of the drug packed in hollowed-out golf cart tires.

"This seizure is much bigger than the 'French Connection,'" said U.S. Attorney Andrew J. Maloney, who prosecuted some of the cases stemming from the drug ring that inspired the Oscar-winning 1971 film.

Federal authorities on the night of Feb. 20 hit three locations in the borough of Queens, grabbing 828 pounds of 90 percent pure heroin from Southeast Asia — enough to supply one out of every five U.S. heroin addicts for a year.

### Police bar leading dissident from Bush's farewell banquet

BEIJING (AP) — Police blocked China's leading dissident from attending a banquet held by President Bush on Sunday, then tailed him for an hour and a half after ordering a taxi and a bus not to pick him up.

Bush had invited Fang Lizhi, an internationally respected astrophysicist, as a gesture of support for Chinese intellectuals who have called for greater political freedom, White House officials said.

"This really shows China's attitude toward human rights," Fang said later in a telephone interview.

He described the police action as "weak and scared" and added, "All I wanted to do was shake the hands of the president and Mrs. Bush."

### Mandela tells wife not to speak publicly about controversy

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (AP) — Imprisoned black leader Nelson Mandela has instructed his wife to make no public statements about the controversy surrounding herself and her bodyguards, Winnie Mandela's lawyer said Sunday.

Mrs. Mandela, recently ostracized by major anti-government groups, spent more than three hours Sunday with her husband at Victor Verster Prison outside Cape Town.

She did not speak to waiting journalists when she left the prison.

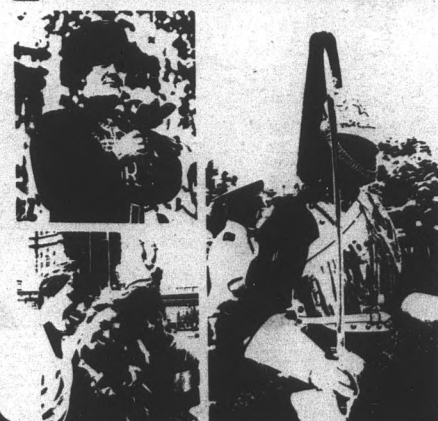

# Rally slated to preserve Roe vs. Wade

The ASU student chapter for the Arizona Right to Choose, a group in favor of women having a choice about abortion, will hold a rally Tuesday from noon to 1 p.m. on the lawn next to the Cady Fountain.

The rally will feature ASU associate history professor Mary Rothschild, associate justice studies professor Peg Bortner and a clinic escort and former ASU instructor, Chiquita Rollins, who will offer a personal perspective on abortion.

Rothschild will speak on the history of abortion and Bortner will speak on individual choice and social policy.

Jody Horn, co-chair of ARC at ASU, said she believes there is wide-spread support for the pro-choice movement on campus. She said the ARC has been collecting petition signatures urging the Supreme Court not to overturn *Roe vs. Wade*, the 1973 decision which legalized abortion.

"Our goal is to get 10,000 signatures on campus," Horn said, whose group has gathered 2,660 signatures on the petition this semester.

The signatures will be sent to the Supreme Court as part of a national movement called the National Abortion Rights

Action League, she said.

Horn, a doctoral candidate in justice studies, said she hopes the rally will help to educate people about the abortion issue and mobilize them into action.

Colleen Hogan, 27, an ASU sociology student and a volunteer at the ARC booth on Cady Mall, said she favors the pro-choice stance because women should have the freedom to make their own choices about their own bodies.

"I don't think it's right that women who are victims of incest or rape should lose their right to abortion," Hogan said.

Patrick Mooney, a Mesa Community College student and volunteer at the Students for Life booth on Cady Mall, said that women shouldn't have the right to take another life under any circumstance, even in cases of rape or incest.

Mooney said the goal of Students for Life is to distribute information to the public "about the killing of babies and the wrongs it (abortion) is causing."

A debate on the abortion issue will be held from noon to 1 p.m. in the MU Cochise Room Wednesday. The debate is presented by the American Criminal Justice Association and will feature three pro-life and three pro-choice speakers.

# Car slams into damaged vehicle, kills woman, 68

A 68-year-old Phoenix woman was killed Thursday night in a car accident at Warner Road and Stanley Place.

Rose Mary Shulman died at Scottsdale Memorial Hospital-Osborn after she was flown there by medical helicopter after the 9:57 p.m. accident.

The accident occurred while Shulman was sitting in the back seat of a 1987 Cadillac that was involved in a minor accident. While waiting for police to arrive, the Cadillac was hit from behind by a 1978 Buick driven by Michael Boyle, 40, of Chandler. Boyle was not injured in the accident.

The accident is under investigation and no citations have been issued.

ASU student Caroline Francis Gottsacker, 24, of Tempe, was arrested Thursday on charges of attempting to purchase a narcotic drug and misconduct involving a weapon. She was booked into Tempe City Jail.

Community members will be "those which are closely associated with the University," he said.

The first floor of the University Club is expected to include a formal dining room that can be used for both lunch and dinner. Also on the first floor, there will be a room for serving light meals, a lounge and a club room filled with chairs, reading lamps and tables for card-playing and board games.

The second floor of the club would provide banquet facilities and a room for private parties.

Nielsen, who is an associate professor in ASU's College of Architecture, said a dining and social club is needed at ASU.

"It's a very, very necessary element to a truly collegiate campus," he said. "It provides a place that faculty and staff

have an opportunity to join together."

Associated Students' President John Fees agrees with Nielsen.

"I think it is a needed addition to the campus," he said. "I think our faculty really need something like this."

Fees said that the only concern he has is to ensure that students' tuition is not used to operate the club.

"It needs to be self-supporting," he said, adding that he does not expect funding problems.

Should the club be established, ASU would join a number of universities nationwide with social clubs. ASU is a member of a 105-school association of faculty clubs that includes schools like Notre Dame, Harvard and Temple University.

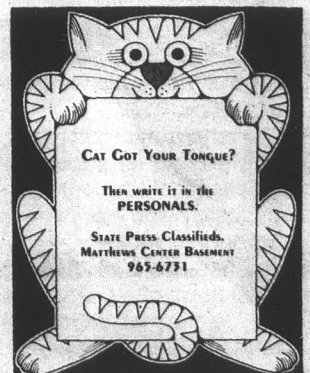

### Limiting enrollment

For too long, Arizona's three state universities have operated on the principle "the more, the merrier."

The more students — in and out of state — who could be coaxed, prodded or cajoled into enrolling at Arizona schools, the happier the Board of Regents, administrators and the state Legislature seemed to be.

These years — the decades of the 1960s, 70s and 80s — should be thought of as the adolescence of the state schools, the period during which growth was the most important university activity. Size was the distinguishing attribute that the universities sought. Like the schoolyard bully whose size brings him notoriety, state officials believed that by gobbling up large numbers of students recognition and respectability could be brought to the little-known desert schools.

But those childhood days are done.

And it's time for the universities to start acting like adults.

Bigger isn't necessarily better, as Arizona has discovered following its 30-year growth explosion. Instead of gaining respectability, the universities' open-door policy of low admissions standards and inability to "just say no" to any applicant gained them a reputation as the source of "easy degrees." And if state institutions continue to admit students at the rate they have during their immature past, they will soon find themselves in the same quandry as middle-aged men who continue to eat and drink as they did when they were teen-agers — sluggish, inactive and in possession of an

unsightly, unhealthy paunch around the belt.

It's time to limit enrollment in state universities.

The fruits of ASU's recent unrestrained growth can be seen everywhere — in the costly building expansions springing up all over campus, in the spiraling number of students in every class, in the crowded area parking lots and in the inability of the University to pay for and maintain enough sections of required freshman English and foreign language classes.

The result is obvious — a declining quality of education for all.

The solution is equally so: Raise standards for admission to universities, thus reducing the number of students who qualify for admission.

Raising entrance requirements is a painful task. Inevitably, there will be those who must be turned away from the universities' gates. The universities' on-going effort to recruit more minorities will be hampered, as many minority youths come from disadvantaged backgrounds and low-quality high schools, and are likely to feel the adverse effects of tougher university standards. But with proper development of the community college system and increased funding for public schools, that problem can be corrected — and no one will be shut out of an education.

Then Arizona universities may be able to achieve a reputation for quality, integrity and academic excellence, rather than for the numbers of students that crowd their campuses.

### ASU parking situation 'lousy'

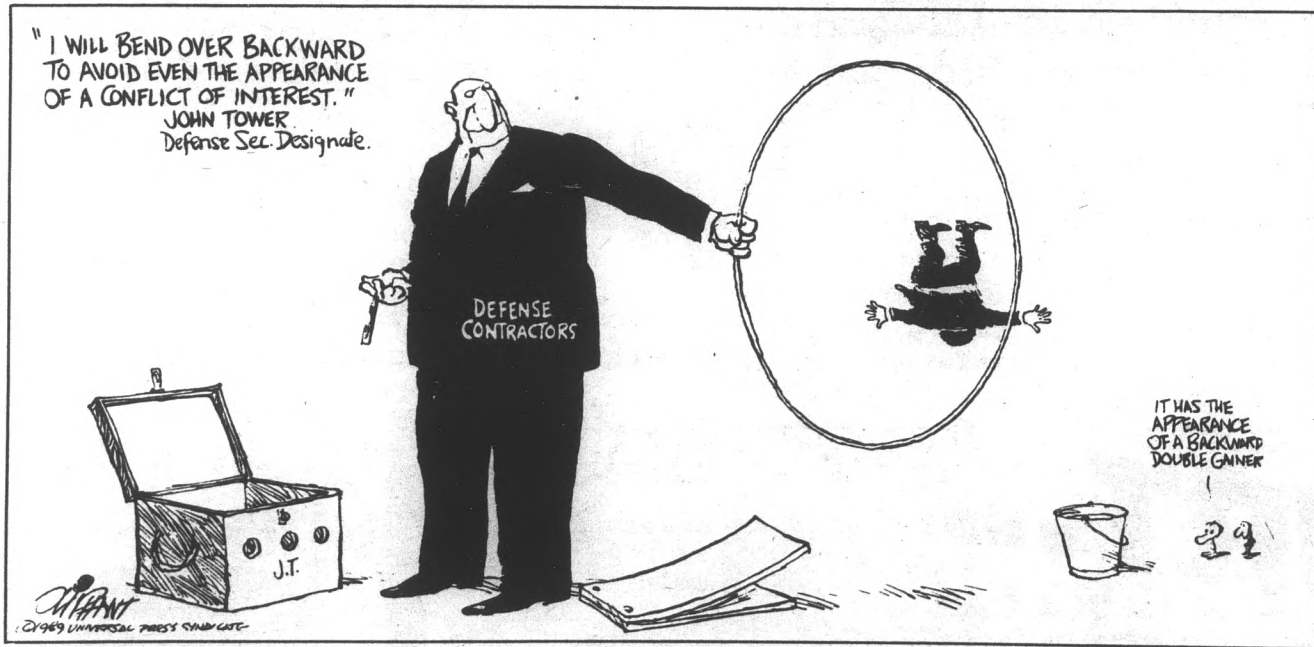
Editor:

## Cabaret!

After more than 20 years production is given new life

Well old chums, life is not the same old 'Cabaret.' Instead of being a revival of the original, the Tony award-winning play is a brand new production that arrives at Gammage 8 p.m. Tuesday.

The original production of 'Cabaret,' which focuses on the alluring decadence of Berlin in the 1930s, premiered in Broadway's Broadhurst Theatre on Nov. 20, 1966. Now, more than 20 years later, the play has been revamped into a new production.

However, some things have stayed the same. Joel Grey, who portrayed the Emcee in the original production as well as in the Oscar Award-winning film, is back to repeat his performance once again.

"Here's a guy that has done this for more than 20 years, and he's the one, if anybody that should be bored. But he's found a way to keep it fresh and give it new meaning every night," said Brian Sutherland one of the principle actors performing with Grey in 'Cabaret.'

Sutherland portrays Clifford Bradshaw, an American writer who is the boyfriend of Sally, one of the girls that performs at the Kit Kat Club.

"I really enjoy doing this one (character) a lot. I've been doing it for a few months now, and I'm not sick of it," Sutherland said. "It's a character that I empathize with. I feel very close to the man that Clifford Bradshaw is."

Sutherland believes his portrayal of Bradshaw is one of his more realistic characters.

"Sally (another character) and I have the realistic scenes and Joel sort of carries the abstract concepts of the show," Sutherland said. "(Clifford is) a very realistic and down to earth character."

One of the changes for the new production involved a switching of songs for Sutherland's character. In the original production of 'Cabaret,' Clifford sang a song called "Why Should I Wake Up?" which has now been replaced by a new song called "Don't Go."

"It (the original) is kind of a dreamy song, sung more to himself than anybody else," Sutherland said. "The new song is sung to Sally. He's basically asking her to stay when she's ready to leave, and it works very well into the framework of the scene."

Sutherland doesn't mind the new changes with his character — in fact he seems to enjoy them.



"Actually, I had never really seen the original production. I didn't even get to see the movie until I found out that I was going to do this tour," Sutherland said. "So to me it was all new."

Even though 'Cabaret' may be new to Sutherland, he is not new to the Broadway scene. Some of his other productions include "Cats," "West Side Story," "Kiss Me Kate," as well as a national tour with Sandy Duncan in "Peter Pan."

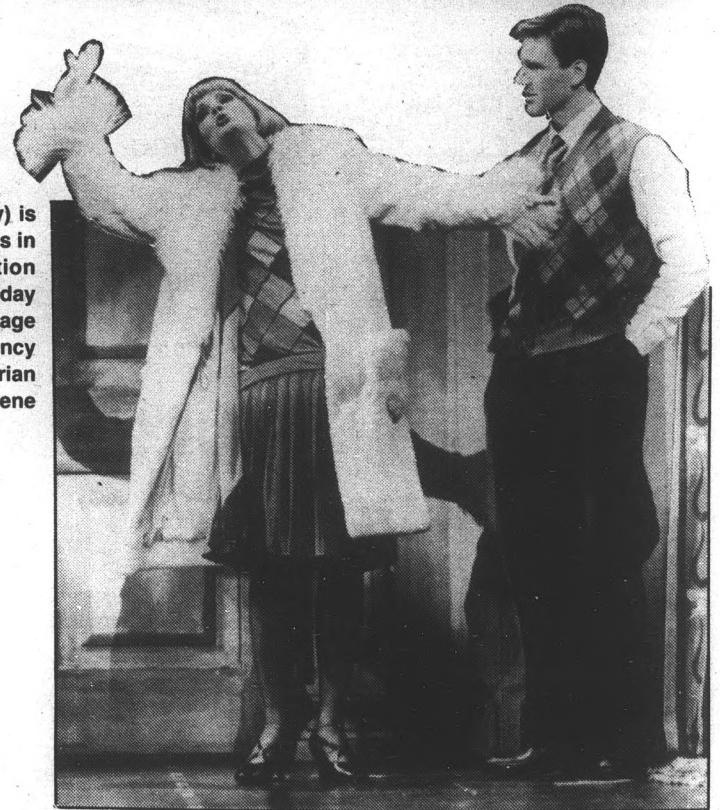
"She's (Duncan) terrific. She's really incredibly talented but I'm very pleasantly surprised with the people in this company," Sutherland said. "I think they're all uniquely talented and it's really a great pleasure for me and I've learned a lot by watching them."

Although Sutherland is having a good time with the cast and script, he also hopes that audiences will understand the deeper meaning that 'Cabaret' tries to put across.

"What I hope people think about, is what it means to them in today's world,"

Sutherland said. "I think what's important about the play is that it takes place in 1931 but it is relevant to today."

## Male dancers to strut their stuff at Celebrity

It's the stuff fantasies are (re)made of. A night spent with nine men who are as close to perfection as you can find: tall, muscular, good looking — and charmingly flirtatious. They are the Chippendales men, in town this Tuesday night to perform their show, appropriately titled, "Welcome to Your Fantasy."

Recognized throughout the world as the premiere name in ladies' entertainment, Chippendales represents the ultimate "girls night out." An all male dance revue, touting some of the hottest looking — and dancing — men around. The combination of hallmark hunks and state-of-the-art dance moves results in a production both artistically sophisticated and wildly appealing to its female audience.

This "Disneyland for women" is broken up into 14 (or so) scenes, designed to move its audience like it's never been moved before. Six lead dancers slither sensuously around the stage, as three professional back-up dancers accentuate these high voltage movements accordingly. Scenes include such themes as "Risky Business" and "An Officer and a Gentleman." Mainstream rock, pop, and heavy metal

Contrary to popular belief, this is by no means a sleazy strip show. According to Gene Alshon, a seven-year veteran of the Chippendales group, "We do take off our clothes. But there's no gyrating and dancing on tables. The whole show is tastefully choreographed for a classy audience." Or, quite simply, they take it all off except for their g-string. And there's no dollar bill stuffing allowed, either.

Alshon, a graduate of Penn State, is pictured as the epitome of the All-American male — blonde, blue eyed, "buff," and incredibly gallant. When asked why he did it (the whole Chippendales scene), he replied, "It gives me a chance to travel. I get to meet people and see places I never would have before." While you might have thought he would've said, "For the money!" he didn't, although these men can average more than \$50,000 a year.

So these seemingly "normal" guys spend several weeks out of the year on tour, traveling across the country, and selling out the majority of shows they do. Publicity material for the show describes audience reactions that must be seen to be believed.

## Matmen wear title pin at Pac-10 tournament

The journey to the top of the hill is beginning to take its course as the Sun Devil wrestlers hold down first place in the Pac-10 tournament.

ASU advanced six grapplers into tonight's finals at 7:30 in the University Activity Center.

While earning a spot in the championship round, the Sun Devils have qualified for the NCAA Wrestling Championships in Oklahoma City, March 16-18.

After three rounds of wrestling, ASU owned sole possession of first place with 22.5 points and Oregon trails with 17 points. The rest of the pack are Boise State with 13.5, Cal State Fullerton has 11.5, UC San Barbara tallied 11 points, and Oregon State, Fresno State and Utah State round out the field.

Zeke Jones, the Sun Devils' 118-pounder, got the team started off with an impressive 15-4 win over Anthony Tamez of Cal State Fullerton. That set up the semi-final match with John Galkowski, in which Jones edged his opponent 5-4.

Freshman Marco Sanchez advanced to the semi-finals but was upended by Ahmed El-Sokkary, the tournament second seed, 7-4. Sanchez received the chance to wrestle El-Sokkary when he defeated Dan Tennant, 4-2.

But junior 134-pounder Andy McNaughton will have to go the difficult route to Oklahoma City. McNaughton suffered a first-round loss to Fresno State's Jon Pierro, 13-8. However, in the consolation round, McNaughton came out on fire to decision Chris Pratt of Santa Barbara, 16-2.

Sun Devil Junior Saunders (142 pounds)

advanced to the finals with two wins over Todd Woods with a technical fall and Steve Morris, 8-2.

Thom Ortiz (150 pounds) recorded two major defeats and moved into a chance to defend his title with a technical fall over Scott Cline of Boise State and a 16-6 victory over Scott Schumm of Fullerton.

The Pac-10's Most Outstanding Wrestler in 1988, Dan St. John returned to his award winning form as he tallied a technical fall over UC Poly San Luis Obispo's Jordan Robinson, and defeat Steve Lander (Oregon State) 9-5, and Paul Olejnik (Santa Barbara), 16-5.

Lander recored a take down in his match with St. John which was the first time since Dec. 2 that the Sun Devil has been taken down.

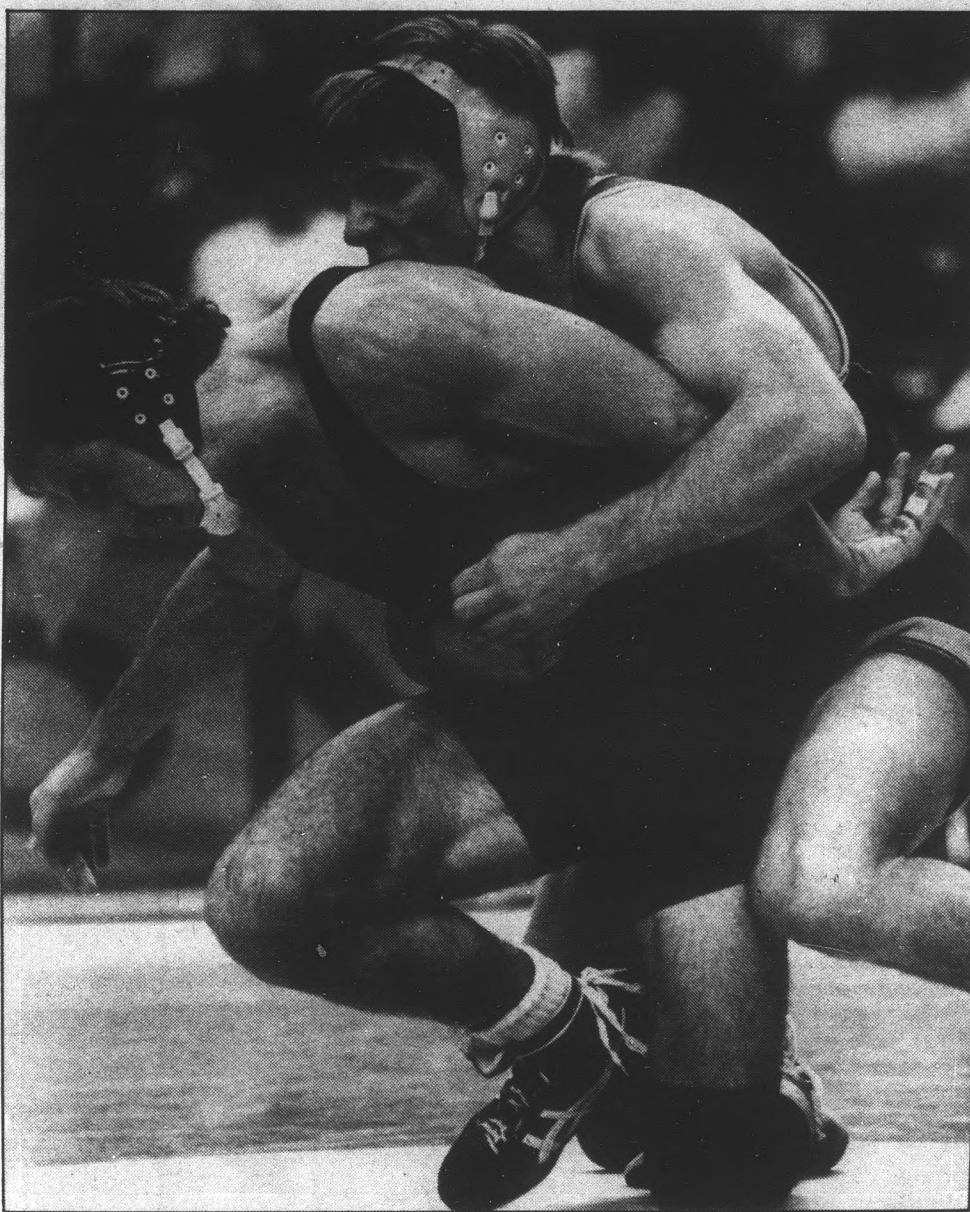
ASU lost 167-pounder G.T. Taylor in the semi-finals after a crucial overtime loss that was left in the judges hands. Taylor was beaten by second seed Dan Niebuhr, 2-2, criteria. The judge went through 10 judgements before choosing the Fresno State wrestler.

History was made when 177-pounder Jim Gressley added his name to the list of Sun Devil wrestlers touting a 100 wins.

Gressley recorded a technical fall over Scott Galloway for the spot in the ASU annals. Following that win, he tallied a 20-6 win over Steve Buddie.

John Ginter (190 pounds) bettered his chances for a title with a technical fall over Joe Romine and a 16-6 decision over Mickey Cheff.

Along with McNaughton, heavyweight Mike Anderson suffered a setback with loss to James Knott, 3-2.

## Kelly leads Devil lumber company in UCLA sweep

Out of the blocks in the Six-Pac race, the ASU baseball team has cleared the first hurdle in fine style.

Sunday's 4-3 victory over UCLA gave the Sun Devils a sweep in their first conference series of the year. The last two games of the series were decided in extra innings, and both by the bat of Mike Kelly.

Kelly drove in John Finn from third base with one out in the bottom of the 10th inning on Sunday to give ASU (14-5) a perfect Six-Pac start.

"You couldn't ask for anything better," said Kevin Higgins, who contributed a two-run homer to Sunday's cause. "With the club we have, the mixture, to pick each other up the last two days was great for the team concept."

Finn singled to left field to ignite the winning rally, and Higgins followed with a walk. A double steal moved the

winning run to third base before Kelly drove a 3-2 pitch to the base of the centerfield wall to score Finn.

"I knew all I had to do was just make contact and I'd have a good chance to drive him in," Kelly said. "I was just trying to meet the ball and not overswing."

It was Kelly's fourth game-winning RBI of the year, and second of the weekend.

On Saturday, the Devils and Bruins got into a see-saw affair that looked like it would finally go to UCLA after they scored three times in the top of the 12th inning to take a 9-6 lead.

With two outs and nobody on in the bottom of the 12th, Finn reached on an error, Higgins walked, and Dan Rumsey singled, scoring Finn to make it 9-7.

Kelly then hit a 1-0 pitch over the centerfield fence to give the Devils a 10-7 win, and make the fans glad they stayed for the four-hour war.

"There's a crowd reaction every time he swings the bat," ASU coach Jim Brock said. "I wouldn't want to pitch to him. It's like playing Russian roulette. Sooner or later he's going to hurt you."

With Friday's 5-1 victory, the Devils stand at 3-0 in the Six-Pac with a tough six-game road trip at Stanford and California ahead.

Because the the ultimate goal is to reach post-season play, and the strength of the Six-Pac means winning the conference is not a necessity, Brock said he would be satisfied with a 5-4 record after the road trip.

"You can't save momentum," Brock said. "Things swing back and forth in the Six-Pac, but (the sweep) helps mathematically. With a young ballclub, you figure there will be tough times along the way, and when they come you want a mathematical cushion so they don't feel they've done themselves in."

## ASU men win, women take third in Southwest Cup

The ASU men's gymnastics team needed a big score to defeat some of the top teams in the nation Saturday during the Southwest Cup.

The Sun Devils, who have averaged in the 272 range this season, registered a 278.00 score to surpass No. 3 UCLA, 277.95, and No. 1 Ohio State, 277.20, in the University Activity Center.

"We proved we are as good as any team in the nation," ASU coach Don Robinson said. "This could be the national championship."

UC Santa Barbara, No. 12, and CS-Fullerton, No. 17, scored 259.50 and 256.00, respectively.

"Tremendous. The whole night was characterized by that one word," Robinson said. "We won the meet on effort and enthusiasm."

Aside from Sparky, the Sun Devils' mascot, doing a routine on still rings, and a crowd that motivated the ASU squad, senior gymnast Paul Linne was the team's biggest cheerleader.

"I was so full of adrenaline," Linne said. "It was unbelievable — our team has not acted that outrageous all season."

The Sun Devils trailed the Bruins by six-

tenths, going into thier final competition, high bar.

"We were so intense," Linne said, "everybody started hitting on high bar."

Linne responded with the top individual score of the evening, 9.80, to give the Devils the winning edge.

ASU began the competition with the top score in floor exercise, 46.70, the only event the team boasted top honors in.

The Sun Devils were led by sophomore Jody Newman, who topped all individual scores in floor exercise, 9.70, parallel bars, 9.55, and the all-around, 57.05.

Newman performed consistently in each event, but even after sticking a routine, he wore a cold expression.

"I just concentrated on what I had to do," he said. "I just don't want to get too happy before I see a score."

Conversely, ASU sophomore Licurgo Diaz-Sandi revealed confident smiles after his routines. Diaz-Sandi's third-place score

The Sun Devils (4-7) hoped to score high in the Southwest Cup, but the wishes turned into a nightmare at the University Activity Center as they lost to third-ranked Cal State-Fullerton, 189.15, and Ohio State, 186.95.

ASU tabulated a disappointing 186.90 in the meet.

Senior Karli Urban earned third-place honors in the all-around with a 37.75, while junior Molly Carpenter scored a 37.70 to finish behind her teammate.

An unusual turn of events led to the ASU women gymnastics team third-place finish Saturday.

The Sun Devils missed on five routines on the uneven bars and turned in the lowest team score in that event, 45.40.

"I thought it was the worst night on bars I have seen in my nine years of coaching," Sun Devil coach John Spini said.

Urban, who was the first contestant on the bars, ran into problems toward the end of her routine and fell to the ground.

This set up a domino effect, as four more gymnasts would suffer the same consequences. The only Sun Devil to throw a clean routine was Carpenter, who scored a 9.45.

"Karli missed and it was a letdown," Spini said.

Urban, the team leader, agreed with her mentor.

"I am a little disappointed, needless to say," she said. "I didn't start out so well and I think it had the domino effect on everyone else."

ASU rebounded on the next event, the balance beam. Spini's crew scored a 47.15 to garner second place. Urban tallied a meet-high 9.70. Junior Suzy Baldock finished second on the beam with a 9.60 tally, while freshman Tracy Butler score a 9.55 to capture fourth place.

ASU claimed team honors on the vault with a 47.50. It was the 10th-ranked Devils first event of the night and started off strong.

Spini saw Urban score a 9.6 on the vault for first place and Colette Anderson tally a 9.55 for third place.

Still sporting a bad ankle, Marika LeSieur dazzled the crowd with a 9.5 on the vault and

in the all-around, 56.30, was the second highest for the Sun Devils.

"I knew I was going to compete against No. 1 Ohio State and No. 3 UCLA," he said. "I wanted to stay calm and consistent on what I had to do."

"If I do the best I can, I feel relaxed. If I don't, I start to get nervous."

Senior Scott Hohman said the Sun Devil gymnasts psyched each other up, verbally, and continuously hitting on routines added to the team's emotion.

"It snowballed into the best team effort we've had this season," Hohman said. "It was a major win for the season."

Sophomore Christian Rhode said ASU had a better chance to win, since the other teams were competing out of their environment.

"They have pumped scores on that side of the country (in the East) and we felt like we had to prove something which we did," he said.

Robinson said the top six teams in the nation are relatively equal, but has complained that scores are commonly boosted for most home teams. UCLA and teams in the East commonly fall in this category, he said.

But the judging at ASU is more stringent, and in some cases the Sun Devils often receive lower scores when competing at home because the judges do not want to appear biased, he said.

"We're tight, we don't give away the big scores," he said.

The Sun Devil softball team finished in second place with a 5-2 record during the eight-team ASU Invitational. Cal-Poly Pomona took home the crown, finishing with a perfect mark of 7-0, including a 1-0 triumph against the Devils on Saturday.


ASU won both games on Saturday, defeating Penn State 8-0, and slipping past University of Pacific, 2-0.
