Allied planes destroy Iraqi bomb shelter

DHAHRAN, Saudi Arabia (AP) — Allied warplanes, in a pinpoint bombing that sent shock waves far beyond Iraq, destroyed an underground structure in Baghdad on Wednesday, and officials said 500 civilians were killed. Iraq called it a bomb shelter, the United States a military command center.

By nightfall, 14 hours after the pre-dawn attack, crews were still pulling charred bodies, some of them children, from the rubble, an Associated Press correspondent reported from Baghdad. Distraught relatives crowded the smoke-filled streets.

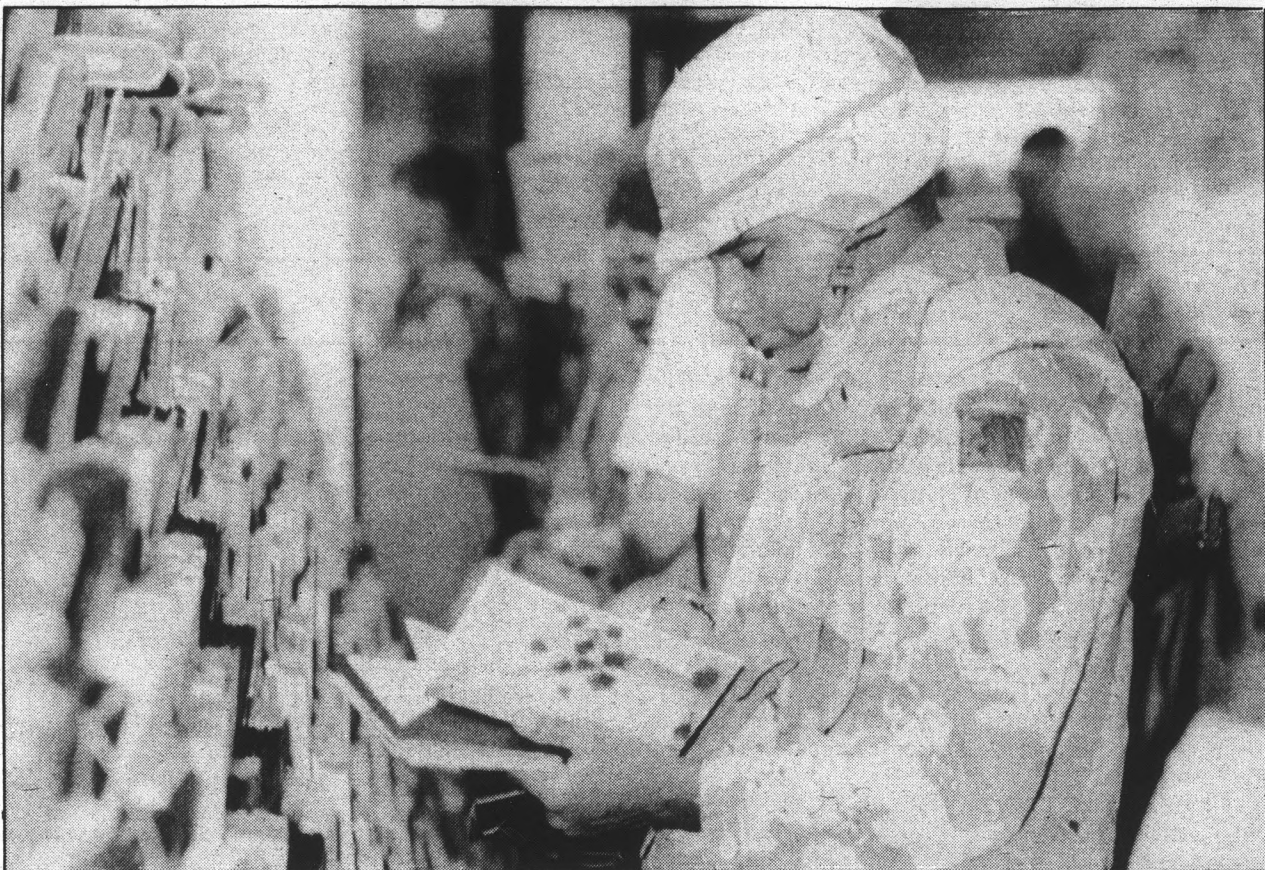
Iraq's health minister, Abdel-Salam Mohammed Saeed, described the precision bombing as "a well-planned crime."

But the U. S. command in Saudi Arabia, and later the White House, said the subterranean concrete facility had been positively identified as an Iraqi military command-and-control center, and the right target was hit.

"We don't know why civilians were at that location," said Marlin Fitzwater, President Bush's spokesman. American officials blamed Iraq's leadership for the tragedy, saying it had put civilians "in harm's way."

The AP correspondent, Dilip Ganguly, inspected the ruins

Liberal Arts could lose up to 300 courses in fall

Thousands of students trying to register for fall courses in the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences could be turned away unless emergency funding is provided by the University, a dean at the college said.

An expected 300 courses — 143 lower division general studies requirements — could be sliced from the college, said Brice Corder, assistant dean for academic programs at the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences.

ASU President Lattie Coor admitted that finding money for the College would be difficult, but said every effort will be taken

to spare educational programs.

"It means we will have to continue trimming from every place we can," Coor said.

The College of Liberal Arts and Sciences is the largest college at ASU and provides more courses than any other.

Corder said students will not be able to get the classes because there is not enough money in the college's budget to pay the instructors.

"There's going to be a lot of angry students and a lot of angry parents down here," Corder said, adding that the impact will be "enormous" because each class consists of 25 students or more.

Despite pleas to the administration from the college, there is little chance the University can find money for the courses, he said.

"Every year we operate on crisis funding, but this year I just don't think we have it," he said.

Interim Provost Elmer Gooding said budgeting will depend on how much money the state Legislature allocates to the University.

But courses likely will be cut, he said. "The budget will have a drastic effect on the University, and we are very concerned about that," Gooding said.

He said it is too early to determine how

ASU will suffer, adding that the University's first priority will be to protect educational programs.

Associated Students of ASU President Matt Ortega said he feels confident that the University is committed to saving as many courses as possible.

"I know the University community is doing everything it can not to dip into educational monies," Ortega said.

But Corder maintains inadequate funding and faculty hiring incapacities is an ongoing problem for the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences.

"I deal with this every year — and I am

ASU students outraged over racial flyer

A racially-degrading flyer posted on a resident's door at Cholla Apartments has outraged members of the ASU community, and about 50 minority and non-minority students gathered Wednesday night to express their anger.

"It hurt big time," said junior justice studies major Nichet Smith, who is black.

A white student living in the C-wing of Cholla Apartments allegedly placed the flyer on his door Tuesday. The flyer, a derogatory statement aimed at black and Hispanic students, was titled "Work Application (Simplified form for minority applicants)."

"That hit so hard. I wonder how many people actually feel that way," said Smith about the flyer, which contained questions full of racist stereotypes.

Meanwhile, turnout at Cholla Apartment's hastily-scheduled race relations forum Wednesday suggested that white students were also outraged by the episode.

"It's offensive for me as a white person because it looks like all white people feel that way," said sophomore Tami Trawhella.

"It's offensive to me because I have (minority) friends."

The Cholla residents, half of whom were white, were applauded for organizing the forum by Campus Environment Team Chairman Charles Calleros, who said it was "a picture-perfect example of how these things ought to work."

However, Calleros said the flyer was protected under the First Amendment of the U. S. Constitution.

"They (the students responsible for the flyer) can't be disciplined," he said. "They can't be made to take it down." "But they can be (informed of) how people feel about it." Leon Shell, associate vice-president for Student Affairs, agreed that the action was "unacceptable" even if it came under the heading of "free speech."

"It's not going to be ignored, that's for sure," Shell said. "It's going to be addressed in the most effective way possible."

But members of ASU's Chicano-Hispano Coalition advocated suspension or expulsion for the students involved.

"You try to set things straight but, no, you get punks like this. I can't believe this is still happening," said senior liberal arts major Mario Diaz.

"It really hurt me. We have to hold them accountable," he said.

Coalition leader opposes MLK proposal

A pro-King Day coalition spokesman said Wednesday he opposes an ASU initiative to garner 500,000 signatures by October to force the state Legislature into adopting an interim holiday.

"We don't want any special favors," said Arnie Zaler, a spokesman for Unity, which is advocating a new vote on the MLK issue. "Why don't we just do it the right way?"

However, Associated Students of ASU Fine Arts Sen. Sean Colins said something needs to be done on a temporary basis to "heal the wound" caused by November's defeat of a proposition that would have created a paid King Day.

Petition may force interim King Day to be enacted

"The petition is still being passed around," he said, adding that "an outrageous landslide of signatures" would force the Legislature to reconsider the MLK issue.

But Zaler predicted an interim holiday would backfire, causing Arizona to lose its last chance at gaining King Day.

"It's a scam. It's a sham. It's a way to get the big boys big bucks," he said, charging

that the interim holiday is an effort to get the Super Bowl to Arizona.

Zaler said he wanted to see the issue presented to the voters in the November 1992 general election.

"Let's vote in November of '92, and we'll win, and it'll be forever," Zaler said. "Let's get it right this time."

However, Zaler and Colins agreed that AZSCAM has affected the drive, causing

coalition leaders to think about adapting their efforts.

"Everybody's sitting back to see what the Legislature will do," Colins said.

But he added that the legislative sting, and especially the indictment of Sen. Majority Whip Carolyn Walker, is not expected to hurt the King Day efforts.

"Most of the people in the Legislature were so noncommittal," Colins said.

Officials from Rev. Warren Stewart's office, whose Victory Together — One Clear Choice coalition is spearheading the effort to win a paid King Day, confirmed that 25,000 signatures have been gathered.

"I believe if it went to the people again, it would pass," Colins said.

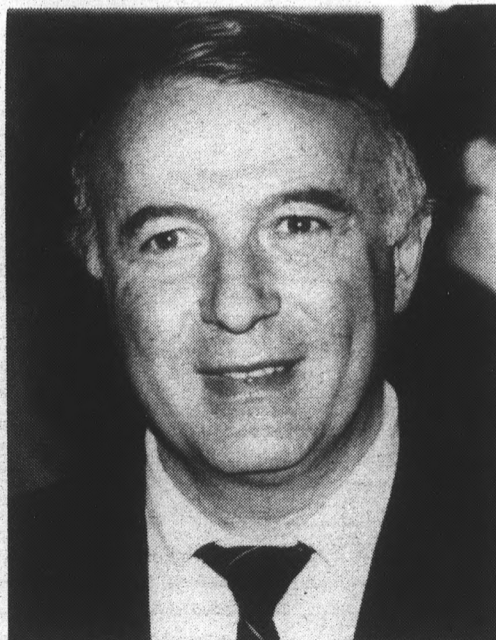

Syria expected to recognize Israel

DAMASCUS, Syria (AP) — Germany's foreign minister announced Wednesday that Syria was ready to recognize Israel's right to exist as part of a postwar Middle East settlement.

But Syrian leaders quickly issued statements that suggested there had been no change. Israeli officials were skeptical of the report.

The German minister, Hans-Dietrich Genscher, made the remarks after meeting for more than two hours with Syrian Foreign Minister Farouk al-Sharaa. He said

Syria agreed that if Palestinians were given the right of self determination, that would mean "Israel's right to exist is recognized and secured."

Syrian President Hafez Assad issued a statement a short time after Genscher's remarks saying that Syria remained committed to a 1973 United Nations Security Council resolution.

Assad said Syria seeks "a just and comprehensive peace in the Middle East, based on the U.N. resolutions, including Resolution 338 that provides for the

convening of an international peace conference on the Middle East and for Israeli withdrawal from occupied Arab territories, and securing the inalienable national rights of the Palestinian people."

His statement did not specifically mention the issue of recognizing Israel. Officials from the Jewish state gave varying interpretations of Genscher's remarks.

Israeli Defense Minister Moshe Arens welcomed the news and said Israel was "prepared to talk to Syrians about peace. Anytime, anyplace, without any

preconditions."

"But I have my serious doubts whether (Assad) would be ready to have such a meeting," Arens said in an interview with NBC. "First of all, it would be very nice to hear that directly from the Syrians."

Avi Pazner, a senior adviser to the Israeli government, said: "I do not think we see any change in the substance of their position."

Another Israeli official, government press office director Yossi Olmert, who is

Witnesses refuse to testify against Winnie Mandela

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (AP) — Two key state witnesses said they feared reprisals and refused Wednesday to testify against Winnie Mandela, dealing a severe blow to the prosecution's case.

Kenneth Kgase and Tabiso Mono appeared in the Rand Supreme Court but their refusal to give evidence left the state without its main witnesses in the trial against Mrs. Mandela, wife of African National Congress leader Nelson Mandela.

She and three others have been charged with four counts each of kidnapping and assault.

Prosecutor Jan Swanepoel said the state's case was based on the testimony of Kgase, Mono and Gabriel Mekgwe, three of the four young men allegedly abducted and beaten at Mrs. Mandela's Soweto home in December 1988. The fourth, 14-year-old Stompie Seipei, was found dead in a field a week later.

Mekgwe disappeared Sunday. Swanepoel said he was kidnapped, and Kgase and Mono said they fear for their own lives.

The South African Press Association reported that a man claiming to be Mekgwe called the news agency Wednesday night and denied he was kidnapped. The caller said he was in Harare, Zimbabwe, and left South Africa voluntarily to avoid testifying against Mrs. Mandela and other ANC members, SAPA reported.

"As someone involved in the (anti-apartheid) struggle and

'Dances With Wolves' leads Oscar nominations with 12

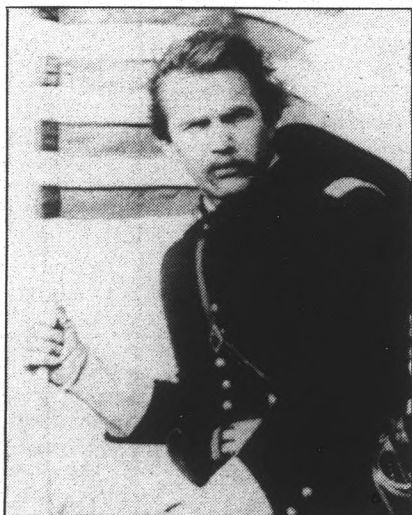
BEVERLY HILLS, Calif. (AP) — The panoramic "Dances With Wolves," Kevin Costner's five-year quest to revive the epic Western, swept Academy Award nominations Wednesday with a leading 12 selections.

It is the first Western in 21 years to receive a nomination for best picture.

The three-hour frontier drama about an Army man who is absorbed into Indian life was nominated for best picture, as well as best actor and director for Costner, who made his directorial debut in "Dances With Wolves" and has never been nominated for an Oscar.

Tying for second-place with seven nominations apiece were Warren Beatty's "Dick Tracy" and Francis Ford Coppola's "The Godfather Part III," which continued the saga of the Corleone family.

"Dick Tracy," with its comic strip characters and extensive use of primary colors, excelled mostly in technical categories but drew a supporting actor nomination for Al Pacino's portrayal of the gangland figure called Big Boy Caprice. "The Godfather Part III" scored a best picture selection and a supporting actor nomination for Andy Garcia, who portrays Sonny Corleone's out-of-wedlock son.

Among the more commercial selections were a best actress nomination for Julia Roberts, the bubbly streetwalker in "Pretty Woman," and a best picture honor for the sentimental, life-after-death love story "Ghost." Both films were major winners at the box office but were deemed mediocre by critics.

At least 51 die in Mexico Ash Wednesday church stampede

CHALMA, Mexico (AP) — At least 41 Ash Wednesday worshippers suffocated or were crushed to death when a tightly packed crowd began pushing and shoving in a church famed for a religious icon believed to have miraculous powers.

Thirteen of the victims were children. At least 21 people were hospitalized with injuries suffered in the panicked crush of about 3,500 people at the Sanctuary of Our Lord of Chalma, 40 miles south of Mexico City, officials said.

The confusion and stampede apparently started when street vendors inadvertently blocked a narrow alley leading to the church, according to a statement by the state of Mexico government in Toluca.

People coming in and out of the church became frantic at the congestion and began pushing and shoving, the statement said.

"There was an avalanche of people. We were leaving and those that were coming in squashed the people leaving," said Maria Velazquez, who lost her 9-year-old niece in the tragedy.

"Some people were trampled and others suffocated inside the church in the atrium," said state spokesman Carlos Mota.

Mota said authorities had trouble finding enough ambulances to carry the injured to hospitals.

Hours after the disaster, people continued to pour out of the church. A file of young men carried 40 empty coffins through the narrow streets to a school, where the bodies were laid out in a courtyard under blankets and shawls.

Identification tags scrawled on notebook paper were pinned on the bodies.

"I came on a bus. I will be going back with the hearse," said Juana Patina, 56, whose sister-in-law Perfecta Rojas, 40, was killed.

Gov. Ignacio Pichardo Pagaza immediately gave orders for a second street to be constructed to the hilltop sanctuary, which draws pilgrims from all over the nation who pray before an icon of the crucified Jesus.

Some believers say prayer before the icon can cure the sick and lead to other miracles.

Candida Arenillas, 51, said she visited the shrine from a village in neighboring Puebla state, with an older relative and an 11-year-old child. The older woman was killed in the crush, she said.

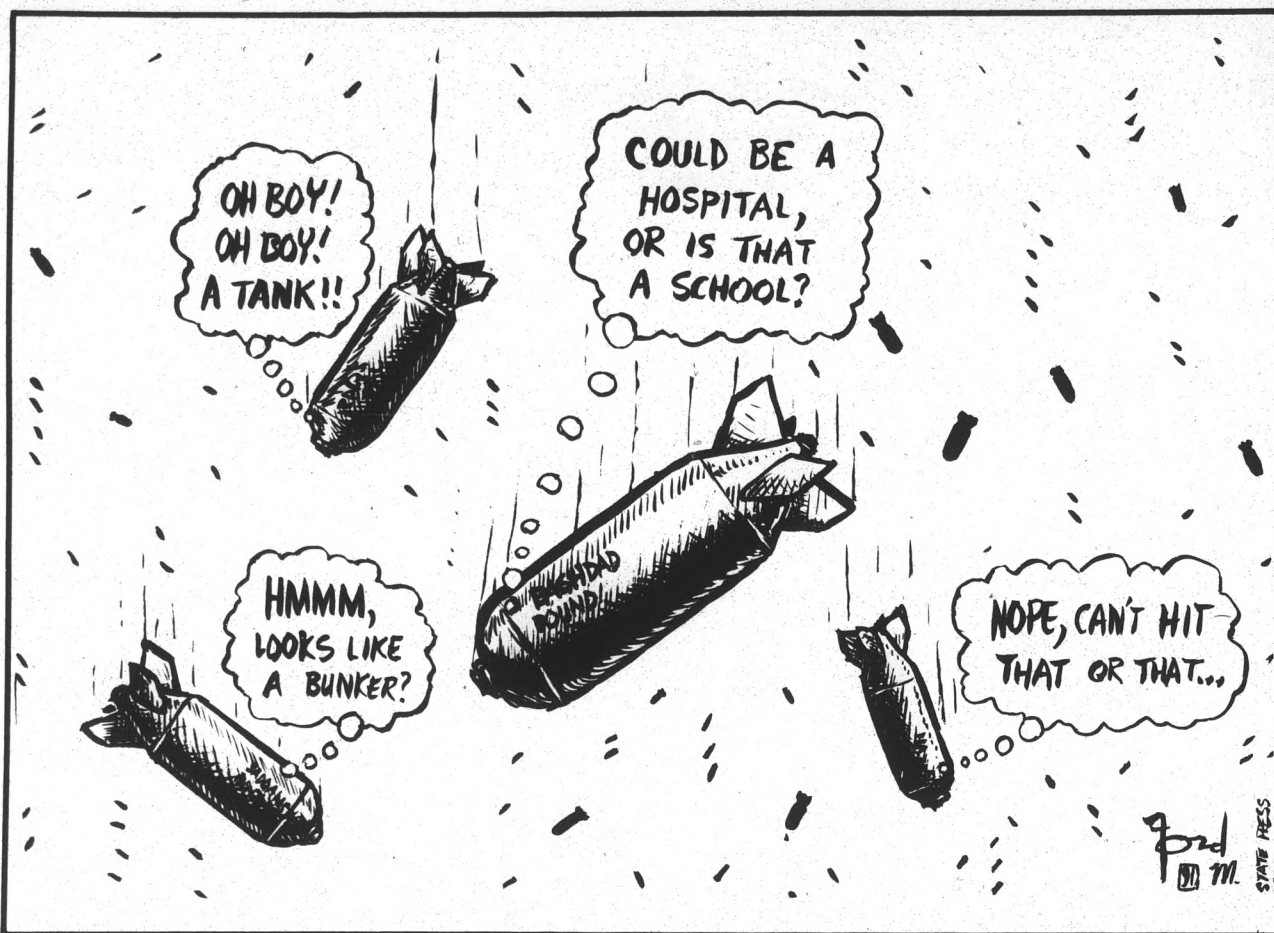
"I didn't know who to protect — the child or the senora," she said.

"We were saved by a miracle — because we yelled to Our Lord of Chalma to save us."

When Spanish priests arrived in Chalma in 1537, they found Indians worshipping the god Tezcatlipoca in a cave. A band of Roman Catholic hermits moved into the cave in 1623 and built a chapel nearby. Such usurpation of pagan rituals by the church was common in colonial Mexico.

Work on a larger sanctuary began in 1680. It has been rebuilt and renovated several times since.

Ash Wednesday marks the beginning of Lent, which culminates with Easter celebrations.

Self test

Exam casts doubts on dos and don'ts

I received some startling information while I was reading a cover story in Time magazine.

The story itself wasn't depressing. It was about the obsession for physical fitness that has become a part of American life.

I don't mind reading about how millions of people jog, whack balls, wrestle with exercise machines, ride 12-speed bikes and otherwise punish themselves to squeeze into a pair of designer jeans. Just as long as I don't have to take part.

But at the end of the story there was one of those self-testing quizzes that magazines and newspapers like to print.

You've seen them. They're usually labeled something like: "Do You Drink Too Much?" or "How Happy Are You?" or "Are You Under Stress?" or "Are You Courting a Heart Attack?" or "What's Your Rating as a Lover?"

You answer the questions, then add up the points, then look at the bottom to find out what kind of shape you're in. And depending on the kind of quiz it is, it says something like:

"Ten to 20 points — You are a deeply unhappy person and will probably jump off a bridge soon."

Or: "Ten to 20 points — Your heart probably sounds like a slush maker."

Or: "Ten to 20 points — You are a terribly inadequate lover and your mate is surely carrying on with somebody else."

I usually skip these quizzes because I know the results in advance. If you don't know if you drink too much by the red of your eyes, then you're probably too shaky to take the quiz in the first place.

But the headline on the quiz in Time had a title that made it impossible to ignore. It said: "How Long Will You Live?"

That is an intriguing question. If you know the answer to it, then you have time to make plans for your future. For example, you might buy a new Mercedes-Benz knowing your children would be stuck paying it off. Or you could stop slobbering on your boss's shoes and tell him what you really think of him and his wife.

So I took the quiz, which consisted of about 30 questions in two categories: personal facts and lifestyle status.

The personal facts included whether I lived in a city or small town; the longevity of my grandparents; health of my parents' marital status; and earnings. The lifestyle questions had to do with how much I smoked, drank, exercised, slept, weighed and whether I was easy-going or an aggressive, angry person.

It was a simple test. I started with 72 points, each of which represented a year. Then each question was worth plus or minus points or years. I just added or subtracted as I went along.

When I finished I looked at the final number. Then I looked for further instructions. Most quizzes tell you to multiply by two or something like that.

But there were no further instructions. The final number was it.

"That can't be right," I told myself. And I took the quiz again. But the results were the same.

According to the test, I died seven years ago. I couldn't believe it. I went to a co-worker and said: "I just took this test in Time magazine. It says that I died seven years ago."

He nodded and said, "I'm not surprised. You haven't looked well lately."

Hoping to show that the test gave inaccurate results, I asked a friend who doesn't drink, smoke, swear, get mad and stays in perfect physical shape, to answer the questions. The final figure was 82 years.

"How did you do?" my vice-free friend asked.

"I died seven years ago."

"Nonsense. Only the good die young."

At first I was depressed. I've always known that my lifestyle isn't recommended by most phys-ed instructors, but I didn't think the situation was that serious. After all, I take vitamin pills and get regular exercise by walking down escalators.

And I know others who have the same habits and have made it to ripe, old ages. After I took the test, I sought one of the oldsters out in the nearby bar and asked him: "Oldtimer, how long have you been living this way?"

"As far back as I can remember," he cracked.

I looked at his wrinkled, withered face, his frail, stooped shoulders, the liver spots on his hands, and said: "To what do you attribute your remarkable old age?"

He said: "What the hell are you talking about? I'm only 38."

The joint does have poor lighting.

Now that the initial shock has worn off, I don't feel as bad about the test results. In a way I find them complimentary.

For one thing, I took the test again, basing the answers on the condition I was in seven years ago.

Those results showed that I wouldn't have died until last year. So that tells me something, although I'm not sure what.

You can look at it this way: "I must be a truly amazing physical specimen if I'm in such awful shape that I should have died seven years ago, but I'm still walking around today."

Nevertheless, there's a warning in the test results, I guess. So I'm going to immediately change some of my bad habits.

By doing so, I can make a dramatic shift in the results and add about 10 years.

For one thing I lost three points (or years) by answering "yes" to the question: "Do you work behind a desk?"

I'm going to add those three years by moving out from behind my desk and sitting on my sofa when I write.

Also I failed to pick up two years by answering "no" to the question: "Did any of your grandparents live to be 85?"

Actually, one grandfather would have surely made it, but he died at 82 in a barroom brawl with a sneaky young Greek who had a knife hidden in his sleeve.

Finally, instead of losing three points by being "intense, aggressive and easily angered," I'll gain three by becoming "easygoing and happy."

And I'll drink to that.

Impossible to protect, civilians sure to suffer

The latest on the Persian Gulf Theater of Operations is as follows:

- U. S. pilots have started to carve up Kuwait and Iraq into "killing boxes." Forgetting the appropriate euphemism, these boxes are oblong areas several miles wide slated as targets for constant bombardment.

- Several Jordanian refugees reported that an allied air attack struck a bus and killed 30 refugees near the Iraq and Kuwait border.

- Cuba and Yemen are leading a push to keep the first U. N. Security Council debate on the war from being held in closed session.

- Iran's spiritual leader Ayatollah Ali Khomeini said, "The use of power by American leaders and their allies cannot be considered politics. It must be considered a crime."

- Saddam Hussein appears to be receptive to a Soviet proposal for peace offered by Yevgeny Primakov in Baghdad Wednesday.

- Iraqi Foreign Minister Tariq Aziz is to meet with Mikhail Gorbachev in Moscow for further discussions on the possibility of peace.

- Iraq unleashed western reporters on what Iraq claims are the remains of a civilian bomb shelter and the 500 or so civilians who were killed when the allies bombed it.

- U. S. Army Gen. Thomas Kelly, in a Pentagon briefing Wednesday, claimed that the building was a reinforced command and communications facility and that he felt it was stupid of Saddam Hussein to put civilians in a military target.

For an entire 45-minute Pentagon briefing, reporters tried to gain information as well as explanations about the horrible pictures coming from Iraq. Kelly and his boy, Pentagon Spokesman Pete Williams, explained that the United States is not going to target civilian areas and that Iraqis would be best served to stay in their homes instead of going to a shelter. Their reasoning was that since the United States is not targeting their "neighborhoods," they would be safe at home.

So the general inadvertently is calling bomb shelters military targets. He also boldly stated that he wouldn't put it past Saddam Hussein to either stage the whole event or order the civilians into the installation so it would get blown up and Hussein could take advantage of the video to pursue the propaganda war.

The whole controversy is about whether the building was for civilians or the military.

By the time the ground war starts, there can't be any way to distinguish what is military or civilian. The American public is stupid if it thinks the war will be fought with a standard of decency so as to protect civilians.

What do people think happens when the military installations are destroyed or continually bombarded? Do they honestly think — as Gen. Kelly said, "We know of instances where military equipment is being stored in civilian areas and we have stayed away from those locations" — civilians will be spared?

First of all, the Iraqi army will take homes and schools for command and control and shelter. The civilians will be forced to cooperate with every demand.

So when it comes time to root them out, there will not be a spot in the sand that will be left safe.

The battlefield will be the schools, homes, churches and shops of Iraq and Kuwait. There is no way around that.

But everyone knows this will not be another Vietnam.

Kelly was asked if it was unavoidable to have some of the handcuffs on the military as in Vietnam. This is in regards to sanctuary areas and civilian shelters and their role in forcing the United States to avoid confrontations in those areas.

Kelly said, "I'm not sure. Those decisions come from above."

If this will not be another Vietnam, that means that civilian shelters will be targets. Then, as the army seeks safe haven, the powerful U. S. military will be forced to chase them into homes and schools. U. S. forces will be forced to shoot those who cooperate with the enemy.

Vietnam was different. It was fought in a jungle.

There will be no mercy shown for the people of Iraq. Every male from 17 on will be treated as the enemy. But what happens when women and children start shooting at the troops?

After all, at that point the U. S. will probably have killed at least one member of every Iraqi family.

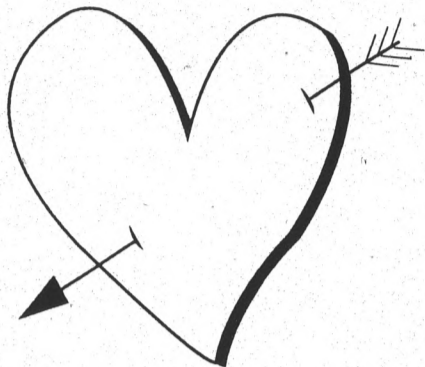

Despite extensive play, bad news not only news

If individuals have to receive good news and bad news, they prefer to accept the dosage at the same time rather than separately. That's the conclusion of Gregory W. Fisher and Patricia W. Linville, two scholars associated with Duke University's Center for Decision Studies, who have recently published their joint research in the *Journal of Personality and Social Psychology*.

The scholars contend that individuals have only a finite set of resources in which to digest bad news. Too much poor or unfavorable news has a means of overwhelming them.

In this regard, given the ritualistic regularity in which the news business focuses on unfavorable current events, it's refreshing to note that not all is coming apart in our world. Though a half-million American men and women are engaged in battle abroad, life goes on at home. Individuals, families and institutions are doing their best to cope with the elements and tackle life's unpleasanties. Unfortunately, news of such struggles rarely make the evening news.

In this city, a new security partnership between the local police and the Chicago School Board is paying off. It has resulted in more than 4,000 arrests in or near the city's schools since the beginning of the program to keep schools safe started up last September. Under this novel program, two Chicago police officers protect each high school in the 408,000 student district while another mobile team of police patrols adjacent school property. Not surprisingly, gang intervention triggered the largest number of arrests on school grounds.

The spirit of cooperation between Chicago authorities is being duplicated throughout the country in similarly less heralded ways. Here are but a few other encouraging examples:

- In Detroit a contract between local business and senior and junior high school students is succeeding. Under the agreement, students pledge to improve their test scores, attendance and curriculum. In return, local businesses give the most promising students summer jobs and needs-based college scholarships. Last summer, jobs went to 114 high school students and 128 junior high kids, in addition \$70,000 in college scholarships to graduating seniors. By the end of this year, 16 schools

will participate in the program.

- Nationally, for the fourth consecutive year, the percentage of high school seniors who say they have used an illicit drug during the past month has decreased. Whereas 14 percent of the kids in the class of 1990 admitted to smoking pot recently; 16.7 percent of the seniors in the class of 1989 said they did likewise. Obviously some students are starting to hear and act on the anti-drug message.

- The Peace Corps and the U. S. Bureau of Indian Affairs have agreed to let Peace Corps volunteers teach in understaffed Indian public schools around the country. In the past the Bureau of Indian Affairs has had difficulty recruiting teachers for their schools.

- In Fairfax, Va., the board of education, in conjunction with community members, has agreed to restructure its progress reports for elementary grade students by including grades for effort as well as achievement. The new report card will include ratings for social skills and initiative. Other school districts nationwide are experimenting with similarly new tools in which to judge students.

- How about a training ground for future diplomats? Beginning this spring, 360 students at six junior high schools in Georgia, California and Pennsylvania and five schools in Moscow and Leningrad will work together in solving ecological problems by exchanging comments through a computer hookup.

Colleges nationwide are clamping down on campus crime, including sexual violence. At Antioch College in Yellow Springs, Ohio, for example, students or faculty members accused of a sexual offense must appear before a hearing board within 72 hours of the accusation. At Brown University, sexual assault is now a formal disciplinary charge. And at the University of Rhode Island, students who commit crimes under the influence of alcohol must do community service or face dismissal.

- In a matter of months the Bush Administration is expected to ask Congress to allow the National Assessment of Education Progress to conduct a national achievement test for all high school seniors, so that student performance can be measured more accurately.

None of these initiatives are meant to suggest Americans have all of their social ills in check. To the contrary, we as a people are often overwhelmed by what faces us. But these examples underscore that the future is in our hands and we're coping. Communities throughout the country are recognizing that their children's lot will be limited in the future unless greater steps are made to invest creatively in people. And so it's being done, sometimes too quietly.

Main campus population down

University officials are satisfied with a recent report that shows enrollment on ASU's main campus declining by more than 2,500 students compared to last spring.

Decreased enrollment figures are the result of efforts to downsize the main campus and lower the student/faculty ratio in the classroom, officials said.

This semester, 38,025 students attended the main campus — down from 40,564 students last fall, according to Tuesday's registrar's office report.

The spring enrollment report does not reflect specific areas such as minority enrollment or resident/non-resident enrollment.

ASU President Lattie Coor said the decrease is planned, adding that coupled with increases in classes and faculty members, undergraduate education will benefit.

"Last fall we added over 300 sections in the (undergraduate) courses, and we will be adding more faculty to get a better balance," Coor said.

The freshman class experienced the

sharpest declines, Coor said. "It is due to the tapering of high school graduating classes."

Coor estimates the total enrollment rate to reach close to 60,000 within 10 years.

Another reason for lower main campus enrollment is an increase in ASU West campus enrollment, officials said. The west campus saw an increase in their enrollment from 3,950 to 4,083 this semester, the report stated.

Susan Clouse, director of undergraduate admissions, said increased west campus enrollment is due to the growing needs of West Valley students.

"There was such an interest on the west side, and the school is really trying to identify where the need is," said Clouse, who heads ASU's Enrollment Management Committee.

Christine Wilkinson, vice president for Student Affairs, said students are not being pressured or forced to move from the main campus to the west campus.

"It's a matter of choice — once the campus was physically located, they started moving in that direction, and we think that's good," she said.

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
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

considered an expert on Syria, said in Jerusalem that he wanted to wait to see if Syria elaborated on the statements.

"First of all, we did not hear this directly from Syria," he said. "Second, we wish it was true, as we welcome any change in the position of Arab states which indicates willingness to move towards a peace accommodation with Israel."

Syria has been one of Israel's main foes since Israeli independence in 1948, and is among the majority of Arab countries that do not recognize Israel.

Syria and Israel have fought wars in 1948, 1967 and 1973, and clashed in Lebanon in 1982.

Genscher said the Syrians also told him the territorial integrity of Iraq must be a firm part of the Middle East after the Persian Gulf War. Syria is a member of the multinational coalition trying to drive Iraq out of Kuwait.

Genscher said the Syrians held a

"constructive view" on the future Middle East peace order. He said Syria wants to play a major role in the process, and also expected Germany to make a contribution.

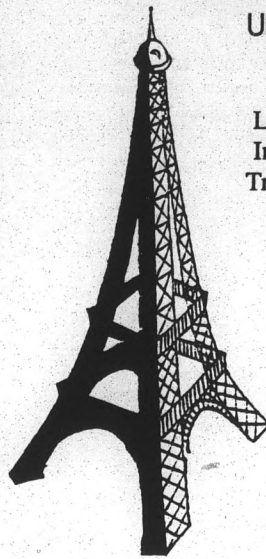
There has been wide speculation that Syria would extract some sort of guarantees for participation in the coalition against Iraq. It has long sought return of the Golan Heights, territory seized by Israel in 1967.

In one example of the enmity between the countries, Syria's representative to the United Nations Human Rights Commission, Nabila Chaalan, urged last week that the organization's members read a book that alleges Jews murdered non-Jews to obtain their blood for the Passover holiday meal.

The United States on Wednesday lodged a protest with the U.N. The chief U.S. human rights delegate, J. Kenneth Blackwell, called Chaalan's remarks "profoundly racist" and said they had damaged the credibility of the 43-nation human rights organization.

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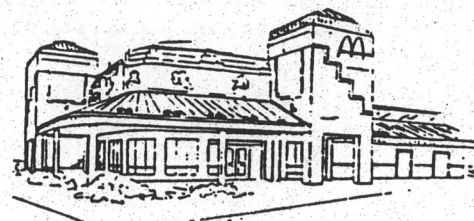
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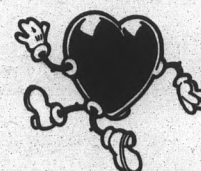
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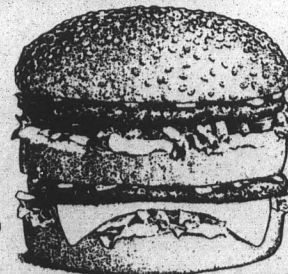


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UofA president admitted to hospital

TUCSON (AP) — Chest discomfort over the last three weeks has forced UofA president Henry Koffler to enter the University Medical Center, a hospital spokesman says.

Koffler, 68, was admitted Tuesday and was scheduled to undergo coronary bypass surgery today, said UMC spokesman George Martinez. He was listed in good condition late Tuesday.

Koffler, who last year announced he will retire as of July 1, suffered a heart attack in 1980.

Martinez said Koffler had been experiencing episodes of chest discomfort for three weeks. Cardiologist Dr. Gordon Ewy, Koffler's attending physician, performed a coronary angiogram Tuesday that showed significant blockages in two of the three major coronary arteries but that his heart muscle function was good, Martinez said.

Dr. Jack Copeland, chief of cardiothoracic surgery at the center and associate director of University Heart Center, scheduled triple bypass surgery for this morning.

An angiogram involves injecting a dye into the coronary arteries through a catheter, with X-rays taken to show the extent and severity of blockage and heart disease.

Such blockages usually result from cholesterol-caused plaques that restrict blood flow in the arteries. They sometimes can be treated by a procedure called balloon angioplasty.

But Ewy said the procedure, in which the plaques are flattened by a balloon inserted and inflated through the catheter, was not recommended for Koffler's blockages and should be corrected by surgery.

Martinez said that after Koffler had a similar but less intense episode of chest discomfort, he underwent diagnostic angiography at UMC but no surgery was recommended then.

Koffler, an Arizona graduate, was named to his present post in 1982 after serving as a top administrator at the University of Massachusetts.

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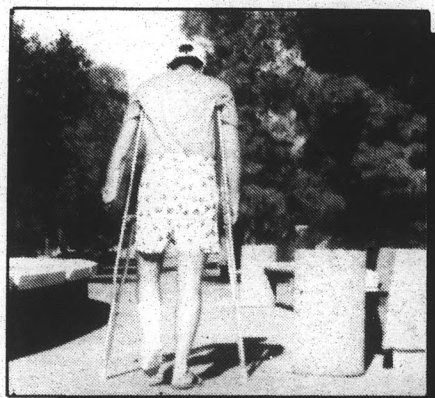
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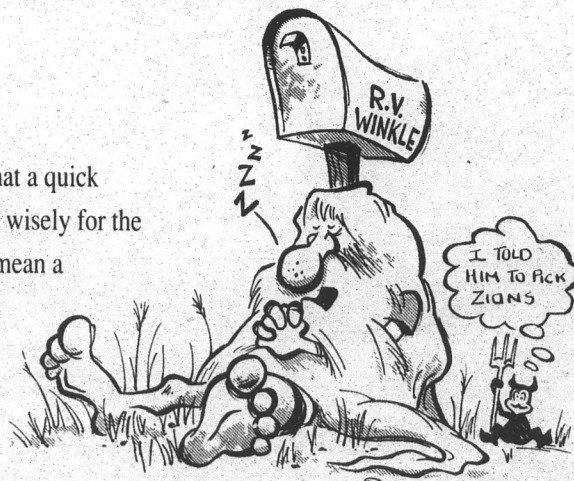
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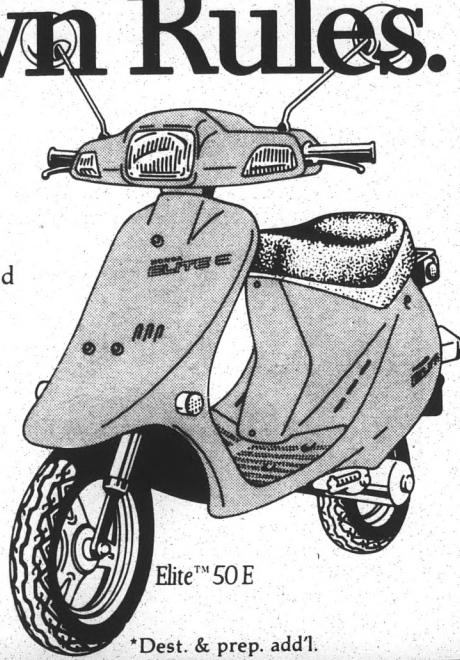

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Earth's 'watchdog' speaks at ASU

A relationship between Americans and the environment has not evolved, although society is taking significant steps in improving their surroundings, said William Reilly, the nation's number one environmental watchdog, in a public forum Wednesday.

"Fundamentally, what we're trying to do is build a new and sustaining relationship between humans and the environment," Reilly told about 150 people, mostly students, in the MU.

"But we have not yet arrived at a point where we are in a harmonious relationship with nature, one that we can sustain and that will, over time, sustain us."

But Reilly said after the first Earth Day in 1970, significant changes have occurred that demonstrate a major public policy commitment in the environment's restoration.

"Over that period, that commitment was the most successful one a country has ever made," he said.

But Reilly said the Environmental Protection Agency needs employees to continue to accomplish their goals and urged

ASU students to enter the industry.

He said there has been a recent reduction of sulfur dioxide, carbon dioxide and particulates in the air in response to the restructured Clean Air Act, which was passed by Congress and signed into law by President Bush in November 1990.

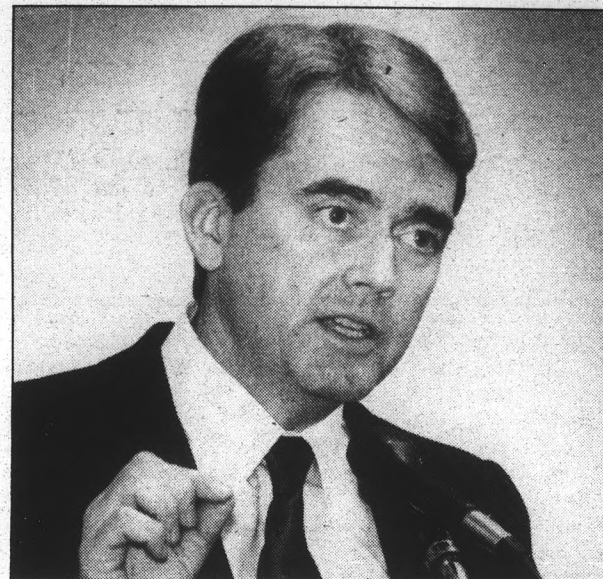
The law has cut sulfur dioxide pollution in half, reduced air toxic emissions and created realistic timetables and commitments to assure steady progress in reducing ozone in cities that have not attained air quality standards, Reilly said.

"It's a milestone that will bring cleaner fuels and cars into our environment," he said.

Reilly said because of science, progress has been made in river restoration, adding that the Great Lakes are returning to normal.

But ecological threats such as the destruction of species, the loss of the habitat, ozone depletion and air pollution are still in existence, he said.

"There is no better instrument than science to assess the problems threatening the environment," he said.

with other journalists and said he saw no obvious sign that it had a military use.

Coupled with continuing civilian deaths elsewhere, the Baghdad bombing was sure to inflame an international debate over the war's costs and tactics. A senior Iraqi official said earlier this week that "thousands" of civilians have been killed in the air war.

Another new report of civilian casualties came from Jordanian refugees who reached their homeland Wednesday from Kuwait. They said allied warplanes last Saturday attacked their bus as it left Kuwait, killing 30 of their countrymen.

At U. N. headquarters in New York, where Third World diplomats sought an open Security Council discussion on the conflict, an African delegate, Bagbeni Nzengeya of Zaire, said the civilian deaths "will make everyone think again about the scope of the war" — a war fought under the authority of Security Council resolutions ordering Iraq to end its occupation of Kuwait.

The Soviet Union, meanwhile, announced another step in its search for a negotiated settlement to the Persian Gulf war.

Iraq's foreign minister, Tariq Aziz, will fly to Moscow this weekend to meet with President Mikhail S. Gorbachev, a Soviet spokesman said. A Soviet envoy's talks Tuesday with Iraqi President Saddam Hussein in Baghdad "give cause for hope," the spokesman said without elaboration.

The Soviets have said an Iraqi withdrawal from Kuwait is a first condition for peace. Iraq has insisted, however, it will never give up the emirate.

The deadly Baghdad air strike was among 2,800 sorties mounted by Operation Desert Storm on Wednesday in favorably clear skies.

About one-third of the missions were directed at targets in southern Iraq and Iraqi-occupied Kuwait, aimed at

"softening up" the dug-in positions of Iraqi troops before the expected ground offensive by the U. S.-led alliance.

The refugees who reached Jordan attested to the fury of the non-stop bombardment in Kuwait.

"There is constant bombing, not on the city but all around, and there are fires burning everywhere," said one woman, Amal Saleh al-Korani, 24. "Our house was shaking from the bombs and the windows broke."

Saudi officers reported that one of their attack planes, an F-5, was lost on a bombing mission against ground forces in Iraq, and the pilot was listed as missing.

Before word flashed from Baghdad of Wednesday's devastating attack, U. S. officers told reporters in Riyadh, the Saudi capital, that the Iraqi military had managed to maintain communications links despite more than three weeks of nonstop bombing. It was clear U. S. strategists were anxious to knock out more of these command-and-control networks.

The night's raids on Baghdad, described by residents as among the worst of the air war, began about 8 p.m. Tuesday and lasted 12 hours, Ganguly reported. Telecommunications centers in two Baghdad districts were among the sites bombed.

At about 4 a.m., it was the turn of the 40-foot-deep underground structure — which U. S. officials acknowledge was built as a bomb shelter — in al-Amerieh, a middle-class neighborhood.

Iraqi officials said 400 to 500 people had moved into the facility after the bombing began Jan. 17, and hundreds more joined them because this week's bombing was particularly intense.

At least two weapons — U. S. spokesmen said they were two bombs from planes — struck the shelter, one slamming into the entrance and cutting off the lone escape route with debris, the second piercing the 9-foot-thick roof and exploding inside the structure, the Iraqis said.

Emergency teams and local residents who rushed to the site found an inferno. Rescue efforts proceeded slowly, but by

mid-morning more than 40 charred bodies were laid out on the ground, Ganguly reported.

Some of the recovered bodies were children, mutilated beyond recognition, he said.

By nightfall, Abdul Razak Hassan al-Janaby, a supervisor of the facility, said 235 bodies had been recovered and at least 300 more were believed still trapped in the wreckage.

Iraqi authorities denied that any military personnel used the underground structure. Ganguly said water containers could be seen in the rubble, a sign outside identified it as a bomb shelter, and the site was equipped with loudspeakers that apparently were air-raid alarms.

Later, at the daily news briefing in Riyadh, an emphatic Brig. Gen. Richard Neal, speaking for the U. S. command, told reporters: "I'm here to tell you that it was a military bunker. It was a command-and-control facility."

He said military radio traffic had been detected coming from the location. Although originally built as a civilian bomb shelter in 1985, during Iraq's war with Iran, it had since been converted to military use, and it became more active in the past two weeks, Neal said. He said the roof recently was painted in camouflage.

The Marine general expressed "complete confidence" that the site had been properly targeted and the correct target hit.

"We don't understand why civilians were in this military command-and-control bunker at 0400 in the morning," he said.

He said the U. S. military was "saddened" by the civilian deaths, but he suggested the Iraqi leadership was to blame because, he contended, it placed military facilities in residential areas.

In Washington, Fitzwater went further, implying the civilian deaths were part of an Iraqi design.

That so many apparently were killed in the underground structure "tends to lend itself to our suspicions that they were there on purpose and they were made vulnerable on purpose," the White House spokesman said.

frustrated," Corder said.

Corder said department chairs can only afford to hire faculty associates or teaching assistants for the lower division courses, many of which are required by the University.

Faculty associates are instructors who teach as many as five courses per semester and sign a contract on a semester basis. Teaching assistants are full-time graduate or doctoral students who can teach no more than two classes.

Wendy Wilkins, chairwoman of the English department, said that there are currently 35 faculty associates teaching 92 sections in the English department.

Wilkins said she is planning for 30 fewer

sections next fall.

"I know we're going to have students up here in tears and there's nothing we will be able to do for them," Wilkins said.

Although Wilkins said her department will be hit hard by the budget crunch, other departments in the college likely would suffer more.

"More of the funding is internal here," she said.

The English department has some money set aside in its budget to hire faculty associates — a luxury other departments do not have.

Most faculty associates are paid in a system called "salary savings." The college pays the salaries of the instructors with money it saves when full-time professors

leave on sabbatical, Wilkins said.

But Corder said the salary savings money cannot be guaranteed from semester to semester.

"We have lived on salary savings, which is temporary funding for jobs that will always be there," he said. "It just doesn't make sense."

Corder said departments such as foreign language, which rely heavily on salary savings for hiring, will be "devastated."

"The reduction in the number of Spanish classes offered is going to be ridiculous," he said. "The reductions in all the high-demand classes will be ridiculous."

The only solution is University-wide reallocation of funds, Corder said.

"It's true that this college gets a lot of

money, but you have to look at the number of credit hours and the number of credits this college provides," he said.

While Corder described budget reallocation as a "painful" process, Coor said it has already been accomplished to some extent throughout ASU.

"We have reallocated funding from the administration into educational functions," Coor said.

Meanwhile, Gooding said the situation with courses will be closely monitored and more could be offered in May after preregistration.

"We are trying to build a budget in a responsible way, and students need to know we're committed to their needs," Gooding said.

as a member of the ANC Youth League, I cannot betray my comrades," SAPA quoted the man as saying. It said a SAPA reporter familiar with Mekgwe said the caller's voice was similar to the missing witness'.

The caller said he did not feel safe in South Africa because he knew he could be detained for refusing to testify, SAPA said.

Kgase and Mono could receive up to two years in prison for refusing to testify, but Kgase said he preferred that to possible physical harm.

"I really like my life, I want my life," Kgase said.

Kgase's lawyer, Paul Kennedy, said his client had been prepared to testify until the disappearance of Mekgwe. He argued that his client should not be imprisoned because the case was extraordinary, with Kgase facing possible recrimination long after its completion.

Judge M.S. Stegmann said he would rule Thursday on whether the witnesses would be imprisoned, which could effectively halt the trial.

The case could damage relations between the ANC and the government as they prepare for negotiations on a new constitution to end white minority rule.

Mandela flew to Cape Town on Tuesday and held a lengthy meeting with President F.W. de Klerk. In a joint statement, they said they had ironed out problems in the ongoing talks between the ANC and white-led government. Mandela has given no indication the talks will be jeopardized by his wife's trial.

He accompanied his wife into the courtroom Wednesday and sat in the public gallery, watching the proceedings impassively. The defendants appeared relaxed, smiling and laughing with their lawyers before the session began.

Outside the court, a scuffle broke out when a white man unfurled a banner that read "Hang the Murderer Winnie and (Nelson) Mandela." Two ANC members wrestled the banner away from the man, and one of the ANC men was arrested.

Swanepoel later said the case may be postponed for months to resolve circumstances surrounding Mekgwe's alleged kidnapping.

Kgase, Mekgwe, and Mono all testified last year at a separate trial that they were abducted with Seipei by members of Mrs. Mandela's controversial bodyguard team, the Mandela United Football Club. They said they were taken to Mrs. Mandela's house, where she and others assaulted them.

Jerry Richardson, head of Mrs. Mandela's former bodyguard unit, was convicted in that trial of murdering Seipei.

On Wednesday, Kgase said he and the others had been afraid to appear at the previous trial because they "believed their lives were in danger." When asked why he eventually testified, he said, "I had no choice."

Mrs. Mandela and seven others have been charged. But four of the eight defendants skipped bail and have failed to appear since the trial began last week. Mrs. Mandela and the three remaining co-defendants pleaded innocent Monday.

If convicted on all counts, they could face the death penalty.

Prosecutors allege Mrs. Mandela's bodyguards were motivated by accusations that Kgase, Mono, Mekgwe and Seipei had sexual relations with a white Methodist minister who ran a center for troubled youths.

The Methodist Church has cleared the minister of any wrongdoing.

Competing against "Dances With Wolves," "Ghost" and "The Godfather Part III" for best picture in the March 25 awards presentations will be "Awakenings," a sentimental drama about medical Rip Van Winkles, and "GoodFellas," Martin Scorsese's darkly funny look at a Brooklyn mobster who turns informant.

"Dances With Wolves," which had been turned down by several major studios because it was a Western and had only Costner as a box-office draw, earned supporting actor and actress nominations for Graham Greene and Mary McDonnell. The film was completed only after Costner, who plays Union soldier John J. Dunbar, gave back to the production \$2 million of his salary. The movie came in at \$18

million, which was below the industry average.

"Dances With Wolves" also was nominated for art direction, cinematography, costume design, film editing, original score, sound and adapted screenplay for Michael Blake.

"I was stunned. I think it's like Christmas," said Jim Wilson, who co-produced "Dances With Wolves," and attended the pre-dawn nominations ceremony. He said he promptly called Costner, who was asleep at home.

"I told him he got 12 nominations. He rolled over and said, 'What?' And I said, 'You got a dozen, buddy.'" He said Costner was elated.

No other film in 24 years has received more than 12 nominations. The dozen for "Dances With Wolves" matched the nominations for "Reds" in 1982. "Who's Afraid of Virginia Woolf?" received 13 nominations in 1967. "All About Eve" received 14 nominations in 1950.

Thirteen Westerns have been nominated for best picture Oscars, but only 1930's "Cimarron," a sprawling saga about Oklahoma homesteaders, won. The last Western nominated was "Butch Cassidy and the Sundance Kid" in 1970.

Joining Costner for best actor were Robert De Niro as a catatonic patient who briefly recovers in "Awakenings," Gerard Depardieu for the swashbuckling poet in "Cyrano de Bergerac," Richard Harris as an Irish peasant consumed by his love for land in "The Field" and Jeremy Irons as the sinister socialite Claus von Bulow in "Reversal of Fortune."

Along with Roberts, the best actress choices were Kathy Bates for an obsessed fan in "Misery," Anjelica Huston as the fading con artist from "The Grifters," Meryl Streep as a troubled actress in "Postcards From the Edge" and Joanne Woodward as the wife in a crumbling marriage in "Mr. & Mrs. Bridge." It was Streep's ninth nomination.

Costner faces four veterans in the directing category: Coppola for "The Godfather Part III," Scorsese for "GoodFellas," Barbet Schroeder for "Reversal of Fortune" and Stephen Frears for "The Grifters."



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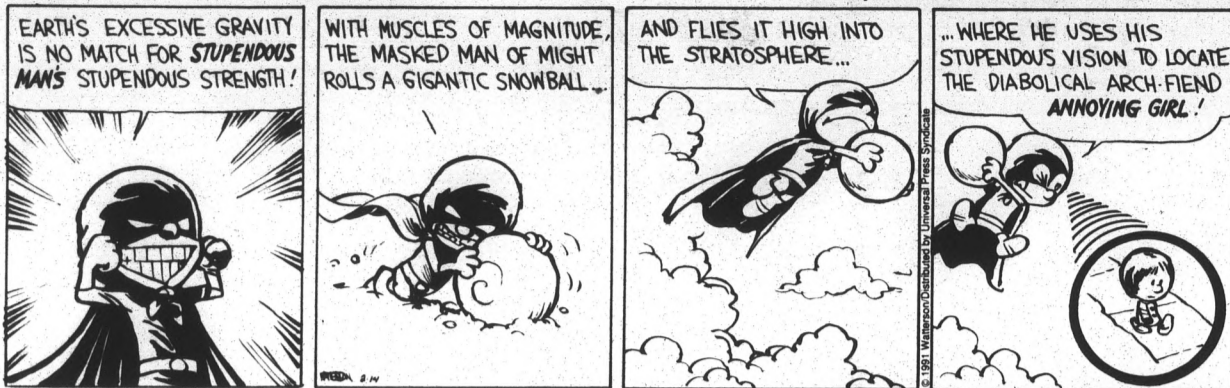
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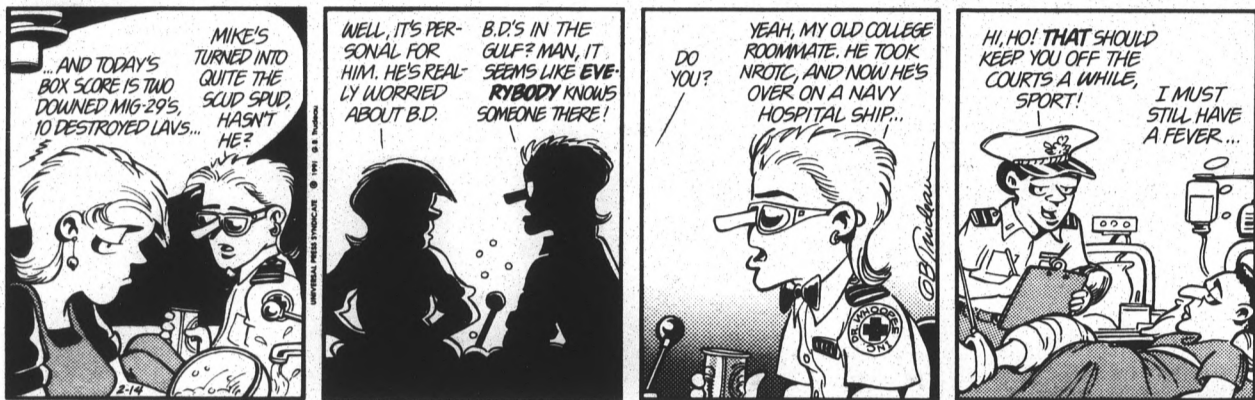

In the days before feathers

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Meind Mine

NEW YORK (AP) — When I kissed a cop down on 34th and Vine, he broke my little bottle of . . . Saffron? Ginger? Even potato juice could have been the secret elixir in Love Potion No. 9.

An expert says nutrients that cured scurvy gave New World dwellers a high they confused with love. And the lore lives on.

"Some of the 'spring tonics' and early herbs promoted a euphoria that increased the ability to do everything, including sex," says Jeannie Fernsworth, an instructor at the New York Botanical Garden.

Explorers who came to the New World centuries ago were often suffering from malnutrition, Fernsworth said. When they started eating avocados, limes, oranges and other healthy foods, they may have mistaken the subsequent energy boost for lust.

Consequently, even the most unlikely plants became known as aphrodisiacs. While researching an article on New World plants, Fernsworth ran across an observation from the 1500s that credited potatoes with promoting lust.

But love potions long existed outside the New World. In "A Midsummer Night's Dream," Shakespeare mentions a white and purple flower whose juice, placed on "sleeping eyelids," will make a "man or woman madly dote upon the next live creature that it sees."

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UofA tops ASU for 10th straight time

TUCSON — It was one of those nights where the fans in the stands were probably saying "I could do better than that."

And they were right. In a halftime contest of No. 6 UofA's 71-50 romp of ASU (14-8 overall, 5-7 Pac 10) at McKale Center, a spectator hit three 20-footers and a mid-courtier to not only win a car but also match the Sun Devils' first-half field goal total.

ASU set an arena record for lowest shooting percentage in a half (12.1) as the Wildcats (20-4, 9-3) buried them early on what was their second-worst shooting night of the season.

"I have never seen a situation where you've shot 4-for-33 in of all my 27 years of coaching at any school," Sun Devil coach Bill Frieder said. "We're setting all kinds of records up there in Tempe, so here's one we set the other way."

The game was seemingly over in 15 seconds as UofA forward Brian Williams slammed an alley-oop for the game's first basket. Before ASU could score, the Wildcats had racked up 10 while Sun Devil freshman Jamal Faulkner missed his first five shots.

ASU began to play even with the Wildcats until it went nearly nine minutes without a field goal despite getting good opportunities.

"The whole game was the first five or six minutes," Frieder said. "They intimidated us and we didn't get anything to fall. And then our kids pressed a little and it got worse."

Much worse. ASU barely reached double figures as it went into the half — down 28-11 only because UofA kept it that close with 9-for-23 first-half shooting. Faulkner led ASU scorers with five at the break, although he connected on only two of 11 attempts.

"I took some bad shots," said Faulkner, who came back with a solid second half to finish with a game-high 23. "I feel kind of responsible for this loss and I'll try to make

up for it in the next ball game.

"I feel bad, but I'm not going to let this one game overwhelm my confidence."

Faulkner was far from being at fault for this as Tarence Wheeler (0-11), Dwayne Fontana (1-9), Lynn Collins (0-5) and Stevin Smith (1-4) combined for more air balls than field goals.

"We just couldn't recover," Wheeler said. "They got the momentum going and we deteriorated from our offense."

"We didn't establish any kind of game — no inside game, no outside game. We struggled from the tipoff."

As bad as the first was for the Sun Devils, they went into the second stanza with an outside shot — but the only ones who could hit an outside shot were Faulkner and the reincarnated Matt Anderson.

Anderson was the only Sun Devil to shoot 50 percent as he scored a season-high 10 that matched the total of Isaac Austin, the team's leading scorer.

But with an exuberant crowd desiring a 59th straight home win, UofA played to its ranking long enough to make ASU look that much worse, shooting 51 percent to the Sun Devils' 38 in the second half.

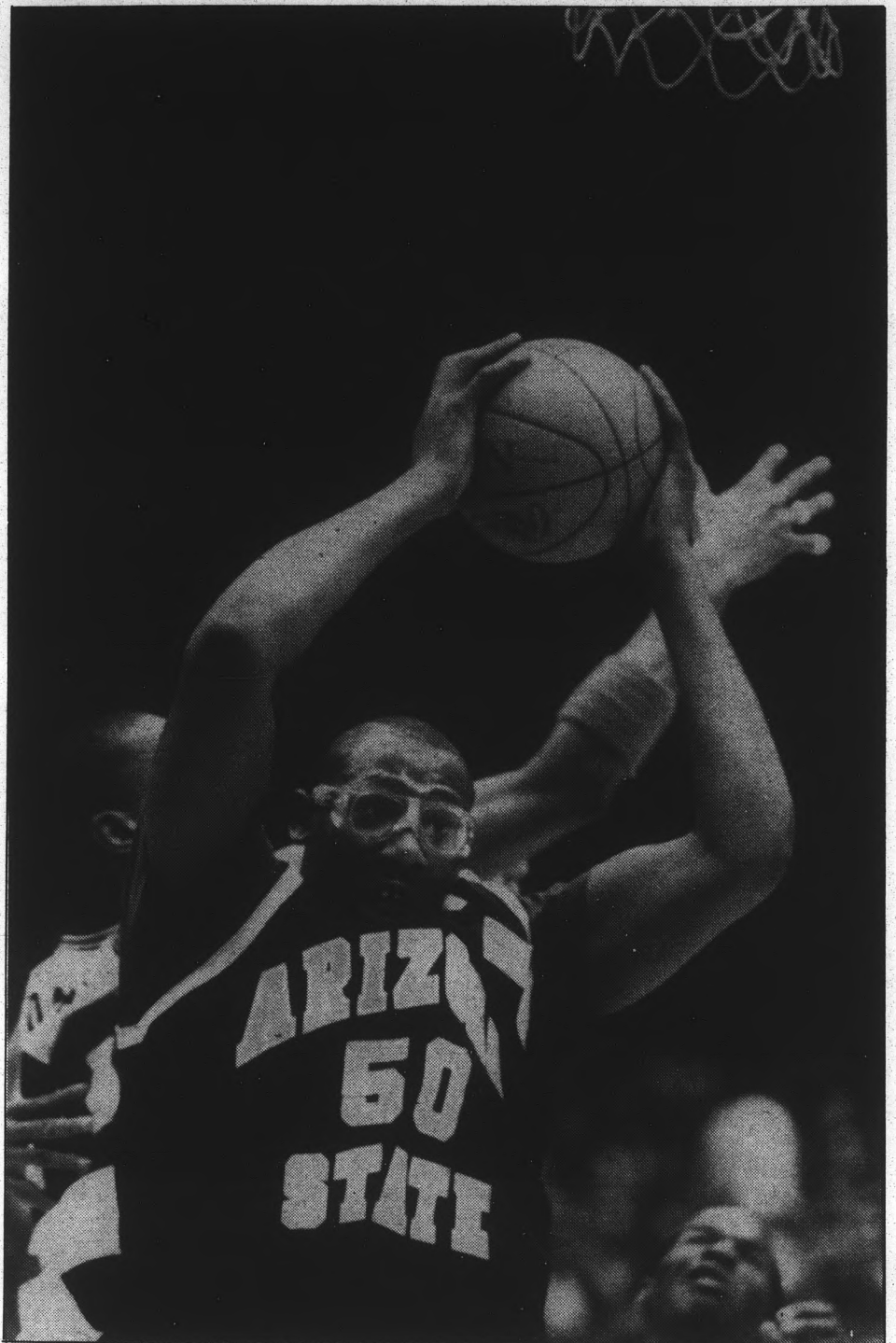
"We were not very effective offensively but neither was ASU," UofA coach Lute Olson said. "The difference was that we penetrated more for baskets underneath."

Austin was denied by Wildcat center Ed Stokes early, leaving him few opportunities while the Sun Devils were shooting 11 percent from 3-point range for the game.

Things did not improve for Austin as foul trouble forced Frieder to play freshman Robert Conlisk, who fouled out in 10 minutes.

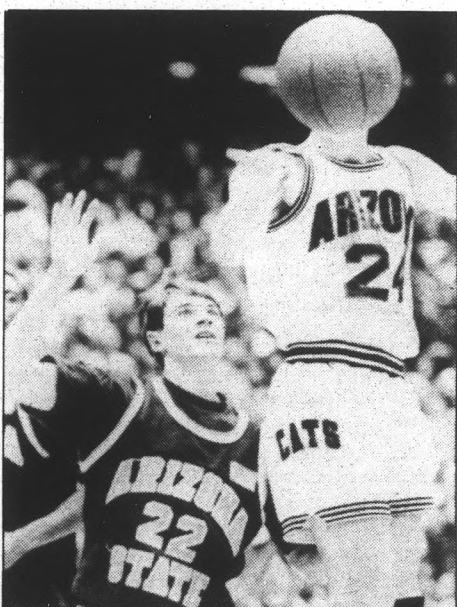
While the loss will not hurt ASU's NCAA tourney chances much, for seniors like Wheeler, losing to the rival again in an embarrassing manner stings.

"Words can't describe how I feel right now," Wheeler said. "I wanted to beat this team badder than any team since I've been here. I guess the dynasty will continue."

Wildcats' McKale support Sun Devils' downfall

TUCSON — McKale Center, home to UofA basketball, is hellish for the visiting team. At best, it is a sea of red yelling at the top of its lungs. At worst, it envelops the visitors and chokes the fight right out of them.

McKale was a little of both Wednesday night as UofA methodically hammered ASU 71-50 to raise their home winning streak to 59 games.

The crowd of 13,849 was into the game from the start. The red-clad fans were as loud for pre-game introductions as ASU fans are with two minutes to go in a 70-70 tie. Following the arena tradition of standing (and yelling) until the opposition scores, the Wildcat faithful were treated to over four minutes of continuous on-your-feet action.

Of the opening tip, UofA's Brian Williams dunked on an alley-oop pass 12 seconds into the game, and the already fervent crowd got louder.

After a Wildcat offensive rebound and put back, a blocked shot, and a 10-0 lead (with

every point coming in the paint) the crowd, sensing a shutout, grew deafening.

Only a hook shot by ASU senior center Isaac Austin at the 15:30 mark quieted the crowd a little and sat them down like some bizarre deflating red wave. But the four-and-one-half-minute blitz had taken the drive out of the Sun Devils.

"It was really a great crowd," ASU coach Bill Frieder said. "It's an excellent home crowd. You really know they're there and they certainly have an effect on the game."

It was the first trip to Tucson for five Sun Devils. Four of the quintet — freshmen Dwayne Fontana, Stevin Smith, Robert Conlisk and junior Lynn Collins — were a combined 2-for-19 from the field. The foursome had only two points in the first half, as ASU shot a pathetic 12 percent from the field.

Despite the problems, Fontana said the crowd was not a big factor.

"The crowd didn't bother me," Fontana said. "I missed shots tonight I've made my whole life. It wasn't really the crowd."

Fontana added that he tried not to be

flustered.

"I wasn't going to give up," Fontana said. "Not playing defense or not playing hard — that's being selfish."

The fifth newcomer, freshman Jamal Faulkner, led the Sun Devils with 23 points. But during the 4-of-33, 11-point ASU first half, Faulkner missed nine of 11 shots.

"We've played against adverse crowds," Faulkner said. "That's just part of the business. You're always going against bad crowds."

The McKale crowd was quieter in the second half, as the Wildcats sewed the game up with such UofA non-legends as Casey Schmidt and Kevin Flanagan while the Sun Devils lost their will.

Frieder said uneven play is to be expected out of the newcomers.

"This is the kind of thing that happens when you've got young kids on the road," Frieder said. "In a couple of years, guys like Faulkner, Fontana and Smith will handle it much better."

"We just pressed too much."

Also, freshman Meredith Geiger, playing in her first match

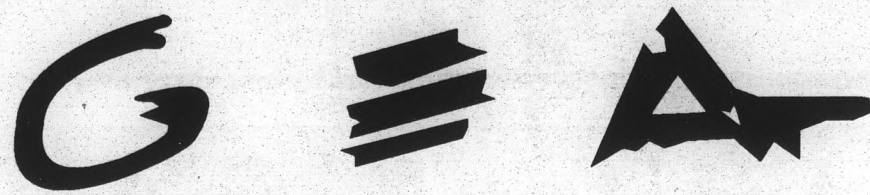
since returning from a groin injury, stretched out a 6-3, 6-0 victory over Michelle Knapp.

ASU heptathlete and defending NCAA champion Gea Johnson hates it when 3:30 p.m. arrives.

For the last four months that has been the time three days a week that the 23-year-old senior with a perfect GPA and a glamour-page smile has had to go to the Center For Sports Medicine and Orthopedics in Phoenix for rehabilitation from surgery on her right knee.

"For this year, I obviously have to deal with this," Johnson said on a recent Tuesday as she stared at her knee. "I can't be depressed because this is my last year. I want to defend my NCAA title and I'll do whatever it takes to get back there. I may be behind, but I'll give it my best shot. If victory is the result, it will be that much sweeter."

Johnson, who underwent surgery in September to split ruptured tendons in her right knee and to cut and remove 20 percent of the surrounding tissue, sees treatment as just a constant reminder that she is being kept from what she loves best — competing.

For three years, Johnson had been paraded before the press as the person who seemed to have it all both academically and athletically. Yet with the strain of every event of the heptathlon — the high jump, long jump, shot put, javelin throw, 200-meter run, 800-meter run and 100-meter high hurdles — she was etching away her physical power.

Now she is waiting for the therapy machines to help her return to glory.

The Newlywed Game

Johnson's new husband, former ASU football player Greg Joelson, waits outside Murdock Hall to drive her to the rehabilitation clinic. For the two months they have been married, he has been at her side at a time when she is facing one of her life's most difficult challenges.

As Johnson steps out of class and into the hustle of the mass of student transit along Orange Drive, she easily catches the eye.

Wearing a green tank top and mid-thigh shorts, Johnson's neatly sculptured physique features a pair of shoulders noticeably larger and more defined than those of some of the men standing around her. The frosty blonde hair, green eyes and the measurements that follow her everywhere — 5-foot-7; 36-26½-36 — also attract attention.

"The first few weeks after the operation

were hard," Johnson said. "I've learned to deal with it now, but all the limitations were frustrating. I spent those two weeks trapped in my bedroom, and I couldn't do anything. The injury has affected me in every aspect of my life. I can't do the same things I used to — I'm not the same athlete, person or student."

For the first three months after the operation, she wore a cumbersome, 15-inch plastic brace that made getting into the couple's silver Ford Thunderbird a chore.

But for this trip to the rehabilitation clinic, Johnson was able to easily rest her knee in the back seat while Joelson, 24, handed her one of her favorite delicacies — a grilled chicken sandwich and an extra-large Pepsi from Wendy's.

While Johnson, who will retain her maiden name until the end of this season, enjoyed lunch, the topic of conversation during the 25-minute drive ranged from Arizona's Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. holiday controversy to the job evaluation of Sun Devil football coach Larry Marmie.

Driving at about 60 mph on the Black Canyon Freeway, Joelson abruptly switched lanes to pass a pickup truck.

"One of these days your driving is going to ...," Johnson said from the back seat.

"Catch up to me?" Joelson responded. "... and knock you right into tomorrow," she added.

The conversation illustrates the differences in personality between the two, who were married Dec. 31. Johnson is a rather calm spirit while Joelson is a free one, a tobacco-chewing Oregon native who isn't afraid to say exactly what he thinks.

While spending time with them it is easy to wonder how they possibly became attracted to each other, but Johnson said she took notice of Joelson because of what was inside his 6-foot-3, 250-pound frame. A defensive end for the Sun Devils from 1987-88, he graduated from ASU last year with degrees in both German and international business.

"I was attracted to Greg because of his intelligence," Johnson said. "When you look at him you might not think so, but he's very bright. We're both the same — he and I have a lot of the same goals, and that helps. But I think what is most important is that we are able to laugh at each other a lot."

Upon arrival at the rehabilitation clinic, Joelson escorts his wife to the therapy room, but then changes and departs to the center's weight training facility.

Working out is not just recreation to Joelson — he played six games with the British Columbia Lions of the Canadian Football League this past season.

Since then, he has received interest from the Los Angeles Raiders and will head for Orlando, Fla., next month to try out for the new World League of American Football, which begins play this year.

After Joelson leaves, Johnson sits on one of the training tables, talking easily with nearly all of the clinic's trainers and patients who walk or hobble by.

Dan Majerle of the Phoenix Suns exchanges greetings and asks how the knee and running are coming along. Amber, a 13-year-old cheerleader receiving therapy on her dislocated kneecap, informs Johnson of the recent happenings on the daytime soap operas.

When an athlete suffers a knee injury, the entire leg needs to be rehabilitated because the muscles shut down during inactivity after surgery. Johnson said that when she first started therapy, she could not remember having such a high percentage of body fat in her leg.

The Johnson Resume

Johnson's injury will force her to miss part of the 1991 season, but she is still one of ASU's most recognizable athletes. She is one of the nation's premier heptathletes and a candidate to represent the United States at the 1992 Summer Olympics in Barcelona, Spain.

ASU Assistant Sports Information Director Richard Wanninger keeps a file on almost every athlete in the Sun Devil Olympic sports program, and Johnson's is one of the thickest.

Most of the information piled up last season, a monster campaign in which Johnson exhibited the ability expected of her when she came out of Phoenix Washington High School in 1986 as one of the most highly touted female athletes ever recruited by ASU:

- At the NCAA Championship in Durham, N. C., she won the heptathlon title by scoring 6,129 points, at the time the sixth-highest total ever by an American. She helped the Sun Devil women's team finish fourth.

- She finished second at the TAC Championship in Walnut, Calif., two weeks later by increasing her career-best mark to 6,135 points.

- She added to her school and Sun Angel

Stadium records in the heptathlon, first- and second-day point totals and all seven events.

•Against what she said was easily the toughest competition she ever faced, Johnson placed fourth at the Goodwill Games last summer in Seattle.

"I've worked hard to get where I am," she said. "I guess I've accomplished a lot and I'm grateful for that, but I know there is a lot more to do. Nothing has come easy, so when things do happen, that's great. If I've accomplished a goal, then I want to move on to something else."

Johnson's success is not limited to track and field.

She is a part-time model who has been featured in more than a dozen magazines in three countries. She has done television commercials and appeared in numerous advertisements on billboards and in newspapers throughout the Valley.

NCAA rules prevent her from taking money for such endeavors while in school, but Johnson said she would like to further pursue modeling after her collegiate career.

Johnson is also a casual bodybuilder who, as a high school senior in 1986, won the Teenage Arizona Bodybuilding Championship. Later that year, she claimed the Miss National Fitness Championship by defeating some of the most established bodybuilders in the country.

But Johnson said she is most proud to be one of the country's best student-athletes. Johnson will graduate in May with a perfect 4.0 grade-point average in communication.

She has also received a number of academic and leadership honors, including the Dial Award as the nation's top high school female scholar-athlete in 1986 and the GTE Academic All-American of the Year last season.

"Gea is a top-notch student who does well in all courses I've been associated with," Dr. Owen Morgan, ASU professor of Family Resources and Human Development, said. "In my opinion, she is certainly capable of performing all the functions that a graduate assistant does. She's an extremely responsible individual."

Through it all Johnson has remained humble, never arrogant.

"Sports is in the public eye," she said. "A lot of other people do great things that no one ever knows about. People know about me through sports — that's the only difference. I'm just a person who has been fortunate enough to be involved in track and other things."

Johnson may sometimes be portrayed as a woman who has it all, but she constantly stresses she is not one who has been given it all. She said she takes pride in being humble, and one of her biggest worries used to be being viewed as a spoiled brat.

"I know I've been fortunate and a lot of good things have happened to me, but I've worked hard for everything," Johnson said. "A lot of my friends, after they get to know me, say 'You know, Gea, I used to think you were spoiled and had everything.' So that's how I know, from people who tell me."

Johnson said perceptions of others do not bother her anymore, mainly because most of her efforts are going into recovering from her operation.

Injury and Rehabilitation

Johnson always had been concerned about competing with a knee injury, although the thought of not being able to run did not enter her mind until the Goodwill Games.

"It was something that happened over time," she said. "For three months, I thought it was just tendinitis. I would rest the knee, compete and rest again, but the pain just kept getting worse. It came to the point where I was unable to run, something that had never happened to me before."

Johnson said she did consider pulling out of the heptathlon in Seattle, but waited until after the competition to attend to the knee. She took eight weeks off, hoping the pain would cease. It did not, and a multiple resonance-imaging test on

her knee shortly afterward revealed the ruptured tendon, which by that time had died and became crystallized.

As part of her therapy, Johnson's trainer, Gary L. Derscheid, uses an Intellect 500S electronic neuromuscular stimulator. Derscheid applies three stimulation pads to Johnson's knee, programs the machine and turns on the juice.

Johnson undergoes three phases of electronic stimulation for 10 minutes each to avoid inflammation and retrain the leg muscles. The neuromuscular stimulator seemingly sends out an electronic message, and Johnson's leg responds with independent muscle movements and flexes.

Although Derscheid estimated that Johnson is about 75 percent healthy, he said he saw no need to rush her back, adding that during rehabilitation it is important to schedule therapy according to the responses of the injury.

"She's a great athlete, so there's no reason to rush her," Derscheid said. "You have to look at the athlete as an individual. It's like when a football coach asks if a player's knee will be ready by the big USC game — the player knows he's playing USC, but the knee doesn't."

"Therefore, the athlete may be mentally ready for the game, but physically, the knee would stay the same. So it's important to sort of let the knee set the schedule and just go by that."

After the electronic stimulation, Johnson works on leg and hip exercises with ankle weights. She places her injured knee on a wood base for support and then Derscheid raises her ankle until her leg is straight. She then lowers it slowly until the range of motion is completed.

In October, Johnson could perform this exercise with only a 6-pound weight wrapped around her ankle. In the last two weeks, she has been able to work with as much as 30 pounds.

"Are you getting tired?" Derscheid asked after raising Johnson's ankle for about 10 minutes.

"No, I'm just fine," she said.

"Well, I'm getting tired," Derscheid said, prompting laughter from both of them.

Two things clearly are occurring during Johnson's more than four months of therapy. She is getting stronger by the week, and she has developed a warm friendship with Derscheid and his daughter, Erica, who is an assistant at the clinic.

To complete the day's training, Johnson performs inverted squats on a horizontal sliding machine and then leg extensions on a bench.

Johnson knows she has a long way to go, but she is happy that she has progressed this far in therapy. She remembers when she started, when every exercise was painful.

"It was kind of pride-damaging," she said.

Often, the psychological effects surrounding an injury can be as difficult to overcome as the physical ones. Johnson said she knows her knee will get better, but she will need to regain the competitive mindset.

"The real end of her rehabilitation won't come until she competes for the first time," Derscheid said. "Like a football player doesn't know until he takes his first hit in a game, she really won't know in her mind she's OK until the first time she jumps. She'll be back when she can look at herself and say, 'I did it. I'm well.'"

Johnson has been running, hurdling and throwing a javelin at Sun Angel Stadium three times a week, but her knee's real test will come next month when she is hoping to begin jumping drills. If all goes well, she should be able to begin competing again in mid-April.

High Hurdles

Johnson's road to the top has not been hurdle-free. Three years ago, during her sophomore year, she was not improving in her track performance and she considered leaving ASU.

"I think I'm still a good person inside, but one of my biggest problems is that I don't stand up for myself as much as I should," Johnson said while she was studying in Noble Library. "But I'm starting to get better."

Johnson said she attributes her growing resiliency to the continual support of her mother, Sally, a 48-year-old Tempe

homemaker.

"She's becoming a lot like I am now because she's getting older," Sally Johnson said. "Gea is sometimes too nice and people take advantage of her. It used to upset me to no end the way she used to let people run all over her."

That was a frequent scenario in 1988, when Johnson had not lived up to the lofty expectations placed upon her.

It was a tough time for ASU, too. Sun Devil track was mired in turmoil, fueled by team dissension and charges of improprieties in the program. Then-ASU coach Clyde Duncan admitted to violating NCAA rules by giving star sprinter Lynda Tolbert \$139 and later attempting to cover up the infraction.

As a result, Duncan was fired in March 1988 and ASU was placed on two-year probation by the Pac-10 and NCAA for 11 rule violations three months later. Johnson, one of Duncan's biggest and most vocal supporters at the time, was criticized for backing the ousted coach, and she said that led to a damaging loss of confidence.

"I started to believe all the things that were being said about me," Johnson said. "My confidence went down a lot and I dug myself into a deeper hole. I tried not to let it bother me, but I wasn't performing well and the situation didn't make it any better."

Johnson's continuing support of Duncan and comments directed toward ASU Athletic Director Charles Harris reportedly disturbed athletic department officials, and doubts surfaced about whether her scholarship would be renewed.

At the time, Johnson was displeased with her training. She announced that she was quitting the team and transferring to the University of Houston.

"I was just fed up with the whole situation," she said. "It wasn't that I disliked anybody — the situation just wasn't productive for me and sometimes you have to look out for No. 1. We had no coach, the team was in turmoil and I had to get out."

Johnson nervously played with her hands and began to look more uncomfortable with every word.

"It's something I don't like to talk about," she added. "It was a very bad time — one of the worst. But I think it was something that helped me to become a better athlete and person. It was one of those situations where you can't say things like 'What if?' You just have to go with it."

Things began to change after Tom Jones was named the new Sun Devil track coach on Aug. 10, 1988. Under Jones, Johnson said she saw a degree of continuity that had been missing from the program. When her scholarship was renewed shortly afterward, Johnson decided to return to the team.

"I was impressed by Coach Jones," Johnson said. "He's very knowledgeable in all aspects of track and he knows something about each of the events. He's not the kind of coach who talks a lot, but he sees all the little things and knows exactly what to say."

Jones said when he first arrived at ASU, Johnson preferred to have only one coach supervising her in practice. But the coach convinced her to try his system. The help of sprinting specialist Jones, throwing specialist Ed Gorman and jumping specialist Denise Gaztambide was an integral part of her 1990 championship season.

"Gea wasn't a happy camper when I first got here," Jones said. "I think she was still a little upset about what had happened to Clyde, and she really wasn't really pleased with the way I was going to run practice. But I told her just to try my system for a while and that it would work. And it has."

Family Ties

The support of her family also has helped Johnson excel. Although her parents were divorced when she was in junior high and she has not spoken to her father in three years, the rest of the Johnson clan possesses a close bond in their south Tempe home that is unbreakable.

Outstanding athletic talent runs in the family.

Usually having one Dial Award winner in the household is a big accomplishment, but sister Mya, 22, won the award in

1987. She no longer competes in organized track and is now working as a real estate agent in California.

A learning disability does not limit brother Thayne, 21, from being a part-time competitive bull rider on the rodeo circuit. He proudly tells rodeo stories to anyone who will listen, claiming that he stayed on the full eight seconds on his first bull ride.

Excelling in both volleyball and track at Tempe Corona Del Sol High School is sister Tava, 15. Brother Shay, 13, is a Pop Warner football star and a basketball player at Kyrene Junior High School.

"I can't stress enough the role my family plays in my life," Johnson said while sitting on the couch and watching television. "I want to be appreciative to my family and the people who have supported me through both the good and bad times. The love and support you get from others is so important when you're down. You find out who your true friends are."

After the Johnsons had finished watching highlights of the Phoenix Suns' victory over the Los Angeles Lakers on ESPN's "SportsCenter" Tuesday night, Joelson was heading off to The Vine Tavern to meet an old friend who was in town.

"Bye Greg!" Sally Johnson said.

"And please remember to be careful," Johnson added.

"Hey, I'll even check in," Joelson jokingly said as he closed the door.

Johnson watched through the living room window as Joelson walked across the driveway and stepped into the car. As the taillights of the Thunderbird disappeared into the night, she openly wondered what time her husband would be back — and when she would make her return as well.

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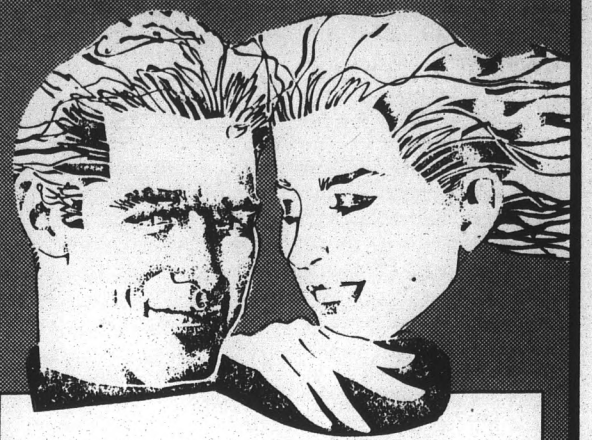
