## Senate confirms regent nominees

A controversy surrounding the ASU student regent selection came to a head Tuesday as the Associated Students of ASU Senate confirmed three nominees, thereby squashing an attempt to add three additional nominees to the pool sent to Gov. Fife Symington for consideration.

In a surprise move, College of Law Sen. David Jordan reversed his plans to challenge a selection committee's nominee choice after hearing pleas from Arizona

Students Association members to send a message of student unity to the governor.

"I'm going to eat a lot of crow for this," Jordan said after the meeting. "I had no intention of backing down, and it was a very hard decision for me to make."

The selection committee, comprised of three ASA officials from each university, sent the names of its three choices — Joy Cain, Mark Ebert and Abedon Fimbres — to the governor, who can choose from the candidates or make his own selection for student regent.

But it did so without prior ASASU student government approval — as is required by state law.

Consequently, several senators, led by Jordan, had charged that an Arizona Student Association committee — not ASU — had made the final selection of the three student regent nominees.

In addition, Jordan questioned the committee's choice not to include current ASA State Relations Director Rob Miller in the pool of nominees for the post, which rotates among the three universities each

year and will pass to ASU June 1.

Jordan speculated that Miller had "stepped on a few toes" of ASA delegates from UofA and NAU.

"I'm not a fan of Arizona Students Association," he said. "I think they were more interested in choosing somebody who will do what ASA tells them instead of choosing the best student regent."

But Jordan relented and agreed to confirm ASA's choices. Jordan said he was heavily swayed by Pat McWhortor, ASU's

## McCune fails to attend final election forum

Presidential candidate Frank McCune failed to attend Tuesday's candidates forum, missing his final chance to garner last-minute support before all votes are cast in the run-off election for ASU student government's top executive seats.

McCune's campaign manager, Barb Bloss, told the crowd of about 200 that the Associated Students of ASU activities vice president missed the forum because he was taking a test.

The forum was to feature the four candidates for president and executive vice president.

Reading from a prepared statement, Bloss tearfully expressed McCune's dissatisfaction with what he claims has become a "tainted" elections process.

McCune later criticized the *State Press* for its publication of "character assassinations," and its neglect to "depict the scenario in the right light."

"The press is giving space to personal attacks and reducing space on answers to issues," he said. "That's a shame."

McCune said Bloss' emotional behavior was a reaction to his campaign being victimized by "other people's problems."

## Newspapers dumped in trash on first day of run-off elections

More than 5,000 copies of the *State Press* were taken from campus racks and dumped into nearby trash cans early Tuesday morning — the first day of student government run-off elections.

A campus custodian told ASU police he saw a Hispanic male dump an armload of what appeared to be *State Press* newspapers into a nearby trash can early Tuesday morning.

The report states the suspect was accompanied by a white female.

Custodian Robert Contreras said that at

first, he didn't realize the person was stealing the papers.

"But then later, I heard about all of the papers being missing, and I put one and one together," Contreras said.

Sgt. William Wright of the ASU Department of Public Safety said police are actively pursuing various leads in the case.

"We certainly are taking aggressive action on this," Wright said. "We do want to prosecute."

Meanwhile, College of Social Work Sen. Nancy Mork said there were rumors circulating throughout the Associated Students of ASU that people working to promote candidates took the newspapers.

"I heard various people say they suspect it was people working on campaigns," Mork said. "And doesn't it seem likely after seeing today's paper—"

The *State Press* Editorial Board endorsed presidential candidate Gregory Mechem and Christian Hageseth, candidate for executive vice president, in Tuesday's edition. In the same issue, staff-written editorials criticized candidates Frank McCune and Adrian Fontes.

Charlene Cole, assistant dean of Student Life for judicial affairs, said if the police charge a suspect with the theft, she may launch an investigation to determine whether ASU Code of Conduct regulations

were violated.

"If it is a code of conduct violation and a crime, it will be up to the victim where to charge," she said. "If after investigating, I find there is enough evidence of a code infraction, I can levy a sanction of some kind."

In the meantime, police will continue their investigation, Wright said.

The male suspect in the case is described as 5-foot-10 to 5-foot-11, about 150 pounds, and was last seen wearing stone-wash blue jeans and a white shirt. The female has brown hair and was seen wearing baggy brown shorts and a white shirt.

## Democratic budget challenges Bush

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House Budget Committee approved a Democratic \$1.46 trillion budget for 1992 Tuesday that would reshuffle some of President Bush's domestic priorities and could set the tone for a year of confrontation between the White House and Congress.

Work on the budget came as lawmakers returned from their holiday recess and as Democrats and Republicans girded to battle over a host of contentious domestic issues, including civil rights, crime legislation and parental leave.

On Wednesday, a House Judiciary subcommittee will consider the so-called Brady Bill, named for former White House press secretary Jim Brady. The legislation would impose a seven-day waiting period on people seeking to buy a handgun. The administration has criticized the bill.

The Budget Committee approved the Democratic plan on a voice vote after rejecting on another voice vote the Bush budget, which Republicans offered as an alternative.

House Budget Committee Chairman Leon Panetta, D-

Calif., predicted the House would approve the committee's spending plan next week.

The budget proposed by Democrats neither raises nor cuts taxes but reverses multi-billion dollar cuts Bush would make in Medicare, veterans' pensions and other benefit programs.

It also shifts about \$10 billion Bush would spend on science, space and other programs to social initiatives such as education, child care and job training.

"The main thrust is to focus on working men and women," Rep. Leon Panetta, D-Calif. and the budget committee chairman, told his panel. "I think that's an important responsibility, particularly in times of recession."

Constrained, however, by record federal deficits and budget rules that strictly limit spending, many of the Democratic efforts to reshape Bush's budget were modest.

For example, Democrats would redistribute just \$10 billion from about \$200 billion Bush would spend for domestic programs, excluding benefit programs such as Social Security.

"That's \$10 billion out of a \$1.4 trillion budget," said Rep. Amo Houghton, R-N.Y., emphasizing the tiny fraction of spending that was being changed.

Still, there were differences. Rather than cutting \$226 million from job-training initiatives, as Bush has proposed, Democrats would raise spending on such programs by \$23 million. They would boost spending for the National Aeronautics and Space Administration by \$377 million, well below the \$1.1 billion increase Bush has requested.

Adhering to limits included in last fall's five-year budget agreement, both Democrats and the White House envision defense spending next year of about \$295 billion with a federal deficit exceeding \$280 billion.

## Secret message in poem causes stir in China

BEIJING (AP) — Eight lines of poetry in China's leading newspaper have caused a political sensation because of a hidden message — a call for Premier Li Peng to step down.

The premier tried Tuesday to brush the matter aside.

"That's a small incident and it's not worth mentioning," he said with a slightly embarrassed smile at a news conference. Li holds a news conference for foreign and Chinese reporters once a year, after the closing of the legislature's two-week session.

"It comes as no surprise that some individuals oppose the current policies of the Communist Party and the government," he added. "I don't think that the people who wrote the poem could represent the will of the general public."

He said he expected to finish serving his five-year term, which ends in 1993.

But China's State Security Ministry has taken the poem very seriously. Sources said Tuesday the ministry sent a team to the People's Daily, the Communist Party newspaper, which published the poem March 20 in its overseas edition.

The team has failed to track down the author, but has decided that People's Daily editors were merely negligent in publishing the poem and did not know about its hidden message, the sources said.

The sources, who work at the People's Daily, spoke on condition of anonymity.

The poem, written in a florid style, ostensibly is about the coming of spring.

But readers noticed that the words "Li Peng, step down, assuage the people's anger" ran diagonally through the poem from top right to bottom left. The words could not have been juxtaposed by coincidence.

The poem's final line also is regarded as

having political significance: "Wait, sacred land, spring is everywhere." Many Chinese refer to the crushed 1989 democracy movement as the "Beijing spring."

Although relatively few ordinary Chinese subscribe to the overseas People's Daily, news of the poem spread rapidly through Beijing by word of mouth. Many Chinese said they and co-workers rushed to reading rooms at their workplaces to find the paper and copy the poem. Copies passed from hand to hand.

The sources at the People's Daily said authorities attempted, too late, to recall the edition. They said the paper's director, Gao Di, was away at the time the edition was published.

Investigators from the State Security Ministry broke into the desk of the editor who handled the poem, looking for information on how it was received and who approved it, the sources said.

The poem was signed Zhu Haihong, who was identified in the paper as a Chinese student in the United States. The investigators determined it was a pen name.

The State Education Commission regularly solicits essays and poems from Chinese students abroad and submits them to newspapers for publication. It apparently also failed to notice the message.

Li, formerly education minister, is widely disliked by students and scholars, who regard him as inept. He became even more unpopular after he declared martial law in Beijing during the 1989 democracy movement.

Efforts to improve his image recently have failed. The television news has shown him visiting citizens' homes and holding babies, and newspapers have written articles on his home life, describing him as a model husband who helps with the housework.

## Americans do little despite more knowledge

WASHINGTON (AP) — A national survey released Tuesday found impressive gains in Americans' knowledge and attitudes about the dangers of high blood cholesterol but little resulting change in their eating habits.

Researchers called the results puzzling and said they think people are doing more to improve the way they eat than the survey suggests.

"It's not disappointing; we're just sort of befuddled," said Beth Schucker, who directed the study. "Everything else was moving along quite dramatically in a positive direction."

Overall, she said, two 1990 surveys by the National Heart, Lung and Blood Institute show that doctors and the public are becoming better informed about cholesterol and the importance of a good diet.

Other studies indicate "Americans are changing their diet and are adopting components of a heart-healthy diet," she added.

The institute's 1990 survey of the public found that 65 percent of adults reported having their blood cholesterol level tested, up from 35 percent in 1983.

In addition, 74 percent of Americans said they believed that lowering high blood cholesterol would have a large effect on coronary heart disease, up from 64 percent in 1983.

## Woman faked breast cancer for 2 years

NEW YORK (AP) — A woman jilted by her fiancé sought sympathy by faking terminal breast cancer for two years, shaving her head and dieting away 20 pounds or so, a psychiatrist says. She even fooled a cancer support group.

The woman, who also feigned listlessness and loss of appetite, built up a network of close friends among support-group members.

That was gratifying for somebody who usually had trouble establishing relationships, and who faced the aftermath of the broken engagement.

"She felt that the process of rebuilding a social life for herself was simply overwhelming. She needed a shortcut," said Dr. Marc Feldman.

Feldman, a psychiatrist in Birmingham, Ala., is a co-author of a report on the case in the spring issue of the journal *Psychosomatics*.

The woman had what psychiatrists call a factitious disorder. In this condition, a person consciously fakes an illness for some psychological gain. A well-known variant is Munchausen syndrome, in which a person virtually makes a career of being a patient.

Nobody knows how common factitious disorder is, said Dr. David Folks, a professor in the department of psychiatry and behavioral neurobiology at the University of Alabama School of Medicine in Birmingham.

But, he said, "on any one day, you could probably go into your local hospital and find one patient who either had factitious disorder or was a Munchausen patient. So it's not rare by any stretch of the imagination."

Feldman treated the woman after her ruse was discovered and while he was director of psychosocial programming at the Duke University Medical Center's cancer center in Durham, N.C.

The woman, who by then was 35, began the charade while working as a corporate secretary. She told co-workers that the cancer had already spread and that her prognosis was grim. She modeled her symptoms on the genuine cancer of an acquaintance.

After experiencing a gratifying outpouring of warmth from co-workers, she joined a support group because it was a ready-made social network, Feldman said in a telephone interview.

"The groups there really work to be unconditionally supportive, very nurturing and warm. ... The very first day she showed up she was embraced and welcomed."

Yet, he said, "she was quite confrontative at times in group with other cancer patients, saying that they needed to face their illness head on, needed to be much more direct in dealing with the issue of cancer."

The charade was uncovered when a routine check of medical records showed that she had never seen the cancer specialist she claimed was treating her.

When confronted, the woman confessed immediately, which is unusual for factitious disorder, Feldman said. Then, distraught and remorseful, she contacted Feldman and agreed to be hospitalized, he said.

She was diagnosed with major depression and a personality disorder.

## ENDORSEMENT

Today is the final day to vote in the run-off election for Associated Students of ASU executive positions.

It is essential that students select their candidates wisely to ensure a governing body that is representative of the entire campus.

The *State Press* Editorial Board endorses Gregory Mechem for the position of president of ASASU.

Mechem has shown, above all else, that he is sincere about promoting students' interests. Consistently he has questioned why students always seem to get treated as less than equal to the administration.

Mechem realizes that a major cog in improving the quality of education at ASU is that the administration cuts classes before it cuts secretaries and assistants or hires outside firms to conduct research.

Mechem does not have the political experience Frank McCune has at ASASU but we do not feel this is a detriment. On the contrary, Mechem said students don't need a politician but instead a leader — someone who is dedicated to serving and guiding the student body. Someone students would feel comfortable approaching with any issue.

Although McCune appears to be polished in his self-promotion, Mechem has given better answers to tough questions and issues.

First, Mechem is in favor of tearing down all the barriers between ASASU and the students.

Second, he supports activism as much as he supports lobbying. Lobbying is useless without the activism to follow through on a plan. Mechem knows he can't do it alone and is more than willing to unite the student body to help.

Third, Mechem has no problem working with his opponents to use their abilities to the student's advantage. "I carry no grudges," said Mechem. He is most concerned with hiring the best people for the job.

Fourth, Mechem wants students to know their rights. He proposes a student bill of rights to be addressed by ASASU. He wants the students to know about programs that affect them. For example, the Violence Against Women Act, a piece of legislation drafted by Sen. Joseph Biden that gives money to universities to promote safety for women. Specifically it advocates education about rape.

Finally, he feels the students are apathetic because they are not informed by their student government. His take-down-all-the-barriers approach is refreshing and offers the only positive step toward unifying this campus.

Mechem's opponents claim that he does not have the experience to approach legislators and other official bodies. But the last few years have shown that knotting a tie and donning a suit is not a prerequisite for positive changes.

Mechem has also demonstrated he is fiscally conservative. He spent under \$10 on his campaign and has offered to work as ASASU president for free.

The *State Press* also endorses Christian Hageseth for executive vice president.

Christian also presents a different view of ASASU. The status quo has got to go according to Hageseth. His interest in promoting the student agenda is a perfect parallel to Mechem.

Fiscal responsibility is what separates the two candidates. Adrian Fontes believes the system needs to be reworked. Hageseth wants the system revamped.

To begin with, Hageseth wants ASASU to figure out a way to spread out to the community. ASU effects many people in its surrounding community and needs to be responsive to its community. For example, ASU's population uses Tempe facilities and Tempe companies as well as surrounding areas. These businesses rely on student spending as well. Therefore, it should logically follow that there should be a partnership.

Hageseth understands this and would like to see just how supportive the community is. Hageseth wants to facilitate support for students by inviting the business community to sponsor events and organizations. No one will dictate how the money is spent.

The real world and ASU are actually the same. It is in the companies' interest to develop leadership and talent for tomorrow. At the same time, funding for programs will be supplemented.

Hageseth is the one of the two that has vision. He knows that to continue student activities and services, ASASU must look beyond it's backyard. The money to fund these necessary events is not hidden in a drawer in Lattie Coor's desk as Fontes would like students to believe. It's just not there. And therefore, going to outside sources is a must.

Hageseth has the vision to do just that.

# McCune's record suggests he's unfit for office

This year's Associated Students of ASU presidential race has boiled down to a single question: Not who is the better candidate, but rather who is the worse.

And next to an unsavory character like Frank McCune, even the ponytailed Populism of Greg Mechem looks good.

"Boss" McCune, who arguably bought the Activities vice presidency last year (he spent \$1,362 on his campaign against Mary Moran — more than any other executive candidate) amid allegations of backroom deals, is this year aiming his oily political machine at ASASU's highest executive office.

McCune's record suggests that he is possibly the smarriest creature to ever slither into Associated Students. His behavior in office and on the campaign trail leaves students with the thought that never before has ASU seen a student politician so utterly vile and contemptible, so thoroughly unfit for office.

During his 1990 bid for the Activities V. P. spot, McCune's sneaky behavior could easily be sniffed by anyone who bothered to stick his nose into the ASASU political scene. One incident from that muddy campaign has come back to haunt him.

McCune came under fire from political opponents for allegedly signing a backroom agreement with Students Against Racism founder Vernard Bonner, an Activities vice presidential candidate eliminated in the general election, which promised that, if McCune was elected, at least one paid directorship would be given to a minority student in exchange for Bonner's endorsement.

While an agreement of this nature would be likely to stir grumblings of tokenism and shady politics, the harshest criticism of the incident stemmed from the fact that McCune continually denied making the deal to students and the press.

At the time, there was little question that the under-the-table agreement was signed. All that was missing was someone with the courage to come forward and go on the record.

McCune refused to admit to making any deals with Bonner. When pressured by a *State Press* reporter (who happened to be myself) to respond to the allegations with either a "yes" or a "no," McCune said, "No, no deal was made."

As recently as last Wednesday, McCune was still denying the deal.

In a letter published in the *State Press* last Tuesday, J'Lein Liese, last year's Activities vice president and McCune's former boss, said that McCune had confessed to signing the agreement.

Liese also said she saw the signed paper.

"I couldn't believe it when he said he signed an agreement, so he showed it to me," Liese said. "I was in complete

disbelief."

Liese's letter was also endorsed by Jeannie Moran, McCune's ex-campaign manager and his former executive assistant in the Activities Department, and Chris Kieselbach, another ex-McCune campaign worker and the former Lecture Series director.

Moran said she "happily signed" Liese's letter and that she "would testify in a court of law that (McCune) told me he signed (the agreement)."

Kieselbach said she became aware of McCune's involvement in the deal while working on his campaign last year.

"I heard it through the grapevine that he had signed this deal, so I asked him about it and he sat down and explained it to me," Kieselbach said. "At that point, I quietly removed myself from the campaign."

"At the time we were all so confused, so we all kind of kept our mouths shut."

The publication of Liese's letter also stirred up the ire of two representatives of the Chicano Hispano Concilio, who responded last Thursday with charges that the letter "offended a great many people, especially the underrepresented students who have EARNED (emphasis theirs) their positions on the third floor of the MU by implying that many 'minorities' have their positions because of some kind of 'deal.'"

They make a good point; those underrepresented students do have a right to be offended. But they should direct their anger towards Frank McCune, the man whose slobbering hunger for votes caused him to sacrifice their credibility for a political endorsement.

Bonner said he had "no comment" on the alleged agreement.

"I'm not going to say Frank did or didn't, but I don't personally see anything wrong with it because people do it all the time," Bonner said. "I think it's healthy that all people should be involved in the political process."

"Now whether Frank lied about it or not, that's an ethical matter that he has to deal with," he said. "I'm not going to get into that."

Bonner also said that "a lot of people came to me with deals last year."

"A lot of people wanted my endorsement; a lot of people won because our votes carried them over," Bonner added. "I think there's a little bitterness there."

"In exchange for votes, people need to get representation," he said. "You want to pick the best candidate, but you also want to pick the the candidate who's going to look out for your interests."

Interestingly, one Activities Department director, who happens to be a minority, had little good to say about McCune or his leadership ability.

Political Union Director Natalie Young, who is black, submitted her letter of resignation on Monday, ending a turbulent professional relationship with the controversial Activities vice president.

Young said she presented a grievance to the Campus Environment Team earlier this semester, charging that

McCune made comments to her that were "racially undertoned."

McCune said, "The entire situation is complete interpretation and I never said anything."

CET Chairman Charles Calleros refused to comment on the case, citing confidentiality concerns.

Young said that McCune's complete lack of managerial savvy is responsible for the Activities Department's high turnover rate of personnel.

"His leadership style is very abusive and ruthless, and I think his leadership style is really what has caused all the problems in the department," Young said. "The problem is he doesn't deal with people as people."

"I know that he has lost a lot of people," Young added. "A lot of people walked out of the office really disenchanting about ASASU."

Young also confirmed the existence of the signed agreement between McCune and Bonner.

Young isn't the only person to take formal action against McCune — about a month ago, Jeannie Moran filed a complaint with the University's Affirmative Action Office charging "discrimination based on gender."

"Basically, I was fired and we both knew that I shouldn't have been, but I didn't want to continue working for Frank," Moran said. "(After filing the complaint) I received the two-weeks pay that I didn't get, and my record was cleared."

"If I wanted to take it any further I would have had to go through one-on-one sessions with Frank and I just didn't want to deal with it anymore," she said.

McCune dismissed the charge by saying Moran was just mad about "the way she was terminated."

"Jeannie was my campaign manager and we dated for six months," he said.

Somehow, somewhere, Frank McCune has picked up an elitist attitude and has become the epitome of ASASU snobbery.

"He will not hold himself accountable," Liese said. "Charges have been filed but he will not acknowledge them. 'He tries to pretend that they don't exist,'" she said.

This arrogance extends towards opponents and students who question him.

At an executive candidates forum last Tuesday, McCune unconvincedly feigned amnesia when confronted by Mary Moran, his opponent for the Activities V. P. job last year.

"Oh, were you the person I ran against last year?" he asked in his breathy, sing-song "politician" voice (when behind a microphone, he always sounds like a reject from the Toastmasters Club), as if she were too insignificant a flea to remain in his memory.

At Monday's run-off forum, when asked by College of Liberal Arts Sen. Vicky Levine about his lack of participation in the Students Are Voting Everywhere in 1990 program, McCune haughtily responded: "You're the tent-setter-upper; I'm the co-chairman." The crowd responded with the appropriate boos and hisses.

Frank McCune is trying to turn bad taste into a political career. Luckily, the ASU student community isn't as likely to swallow his snake-oil sales technique as he may think.

## Yo, Adrian Fontes born with foot in mouth

There's one thing College of Education Sen. Adrian Fontes, ASASU executive vice president hopeful, has proven he can do effectively: change his mind.

Last week the Sen. Fontes decided to swap majors from education to English. Granted, it's not unusual for a college student to trade majors halfway through their academic careers. But with the rearrangement, Sen. Fontes consequently changed his college classification from College of Education to College of Liberal Arts and Sciences.

What does this mean?

Not much to the average student, but a lot to a junior politician striving for a new office.

Simply put, in order to be eligible to represent the students of a given college, one must be a member of that college.

He rattled off something about preregistration deadline and that, "My education comes first— before anything else — and if I have to make a choice between ASASU and my education, I'll take my education."

That was at 12:30 p.m. on Monday.

Sometime during the course of that afternoon, Jeanette Wiedemier informed Fontes of his options — resign or face impeachment.

So, Fontes rang me again. He said that the *State Press* "shouldn't worry" because he was switching his major back to education.

That was at 5:30 p.m. on Monday.

Fontes said he was switching back to an education major because, "I made a boo-boo and the students in the College of Education shouldn't suffer because I made a boo-boo."

He continued saying, "I switched so that I could get the classes I wanted. I

know it looked bad. I messed up. Then I came to the realization that I could switch back into education and then switch back to English this summer—I'm going to work the system to my advantage."

But then Fontes said, "But my heart is still with the college (of education)."

Another "change of heart" that Fontes experienced Monday was a verbal agreement between himself and Christian Hageseth, his opponent in the run-off election for the executive vice president's position.

Hageseth said, "Fontes and I met for lunch before the campaign started and we both agreed that we really wanted to keep this focused on the issues. It was a really loosely worded agreement, but a very specific agreement."

Well, if anyone happened to be watching Monday's forum, or even passing by, they would have probably been hit with a few mud pies via Fontes.

Fontes chose to soak up his "two minutes" with derogatory statements about Hageseth's experience — not his stand on the issues.

Fontes' remarks focused mainly on the fact that after Hageseth ran unsuccessfully for an ASASU senatorial spot last year, he didn't bother getting involved with ASASU. Fontes rattled, "If you really wanted to help the student body you would have been here. I've been here, where have you been?"

A bewildered Hageseth responded, "If mudslinging is going to be the way of this campaign, then so be it."

Later that day, Hageseth spoke about the forum.

"(Fontes' remarks) were a personal attack away from the issues. He swayed from the issues and tried to mar and smear my character."

At one point, I asked Fontes why he reneged on his clean campaign promise.

Fontes replied, "Well, people were coming up to me before the forum and telling me that 'it didn't look good' and I got scared."

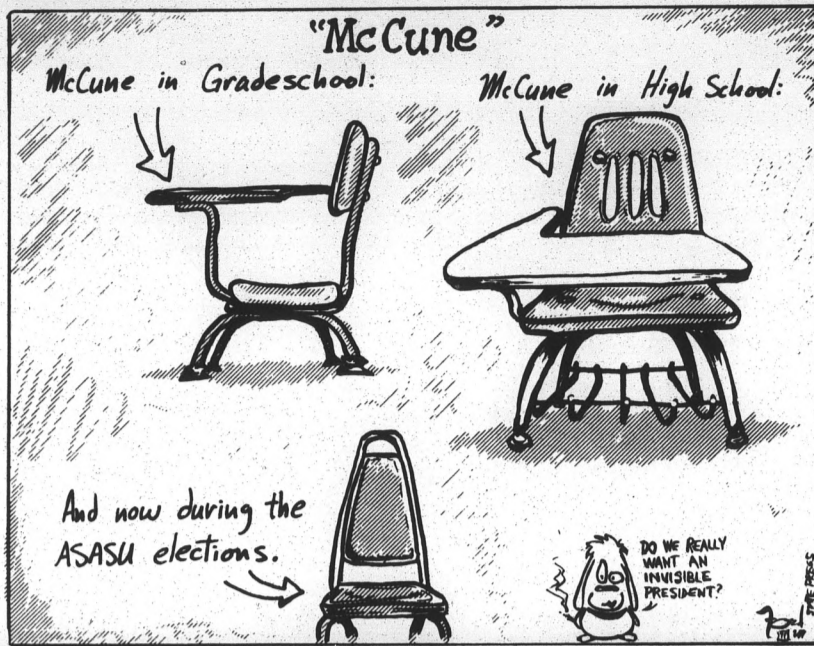
So, Fontes tried to muddy Hageseth's name in a last ditch effort to pull ahead of a race he thought he might lose.

Well, it shouldn't come as a surprise.

Considering Fontes' experience consists of a list of well-documented buffooneries, the last thing Fontes should be doing is attacking Hageseth's experience.

# Speaker stresses importance of Native American pride

The hands of 20 Native American students shot up instantly during a motivational speech on self-esteem Tuesday when the associate editor of Native Peoples Magazine asked if they were proud of their heritage.

"It is essential — it is vital for you to be proud," said Margaret Clark-Price, who is half Native American and half Irish.

The event, part of ASU's American Indian Cultural Week, was sponsored by the American Indian Student Council, a coalition of the Indian student organizations on campus, and the American Indian Institute.

"Each one of us is a puzzle piece. We have so much to offer," Clark-Price said, urging students to trade in their

"mud-colored glasses for rose-colored ones."

Clark-Price, who said the purpose of her appearance on campus was to make students think, referred to her visit as an effort to "open up (the) file drawers and clean out the cobwebs."

It is not negative to be Native American, said Clark-Price, who is affiliated with the Wyandotte, Chippawa and Shawnee Indian tribes. Although Native Americans did not invent space shuttles and high-tech buildings, she said they have made a greater contribution.

"He (the Native American) lived in complete harmony with his environment," Clark-Price said, referring to the balance Indians maintained with the land by living off of it without polluting it.

"We made our contribution by example, and it's been ignored. Now everyone's scrambling — how do you undo what's already been done?" she said.

Clark-Price said that "slamming" among tribes does not develop a sense of pride.

"We need to start saying what's good about each other," she said. "We had a way of life that has never been surpassed. That in itself should make you proud."

Clark-Price challenged students to help each other reach their goals by lending a hand instead of suppressing each other.

"We all are looking for an edge," she said, urging students to "sharpen the edge" by getting a degree.

Native Americans can educate simply by being someone else's friend, Clark-Price said.

"We all have something to contribute — everyone of us — even our non-Indian friends," she said.

Clark-Price stressed the importance of the capital letter "I" in the alphabet, saying that "I is me" and caring about oneself is the only way to "clean up" the future.

"If you learn the true value of the capital letter 'I,' " she said, "you cannot help but take on the tribe; you cannot help but sharpen the edges; you cannot help but reach out to one another."

last student regent, who urged the Senate to honor the selection process.

Three other senators who had supported Jordan's original initiative abstained from the vote.

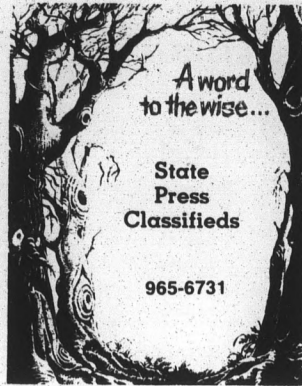
Maren Lee, an ASA delegate who headed the committee, said the governor's office understood that the names still had to be confirmed by ASU's student government, adding that a Senate rejection of the three would have sent a confusing message to Symington.

Although ASA representatives insisted the student regent selection should remain

"apolitical," some expressed fears that the governor would choose any Republican candidate over the selections committee pool — three Democrat nominees.

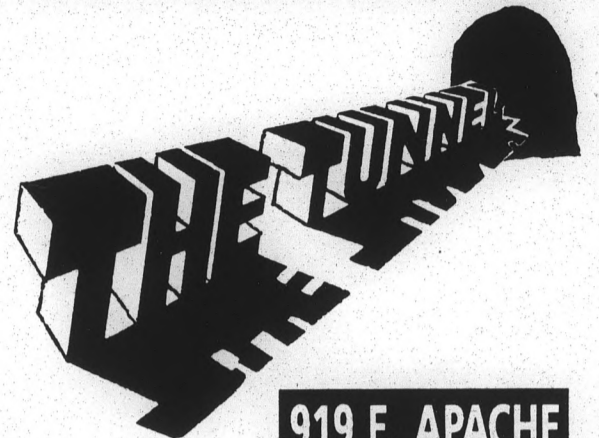
Larry L'Heureux, ASA's executive director, said the addition of Republican candidates to the pool would make the original three nominees "dead on arrival."

"The politics involved in this issue are deep and messy," he said. "If we give even the opportunity for Gov. Symington to appoint his own person, it will set a precedent that will come back to haunt us for years."

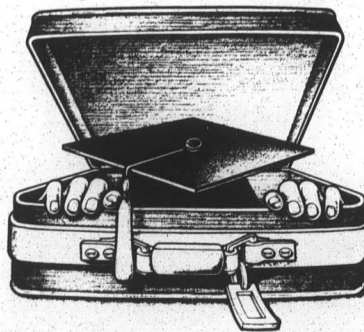

He added that students are being forced to vote on the basis of hearsay, when his campaign has "worked hard to define what student challenges are."

Assistant Elections Coordinator Randy Hawkins said McCune tried twice to have forums postponed on the days of elections.

"He didn't spell out why, because we said no every time," Hawkins said.

However, McCune said the discussion concerning the postponement of forums never amounted to any conclusive discussions and was only minor conversation.

Tuesday's forum was the last chance for the four run-off candidates to take to the stage before final elections results are announced on Thursday. Elections end today.

At the forum, presidential candidate Greg Mechem said he must answer to attacks concerning his stance on cultural diversity.

Mechem then addressed the crowd in a number of different languages, and said he "knows what's going on."

"Yeah, I think I know a little about culture," he said. "And God willing, I will learn more and more."

None of the four run-off candidates were able to win a

majority vote plus one — the necessary vote tabulation to take office — in last week's elections.

In the race for executive vice president, candidate Christian Hageseth thanked opponent Adrian Fontes for his behavior at the forum after Fontes challenged Hageseth's competence in Monday's event.

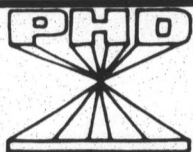
"Thank you Adrian for getting away from that minor episode," he said. "I'm glad we can get back to the issues."

Hageseth said he has made a "true effort" to learn the important issues facing ASASU and continued to stress the importance of involvement of college councils in the organization.

"I know as much about these issues as anyone up here," he said. "I haven't had the experience Adrian has had, but what's needed is a level of competence and open-mindedness to get the job done."

Fontes criticized the *State Press* for being narrow-minded in its editorial judgments, and inaccurate when it recently identified him as a candidate for campus affairs vice president.

He continued to stress the importance of experience within ASASU in dealing with tuition hikes, and said he would work with ASASU State Relations to slow down tuition increases.

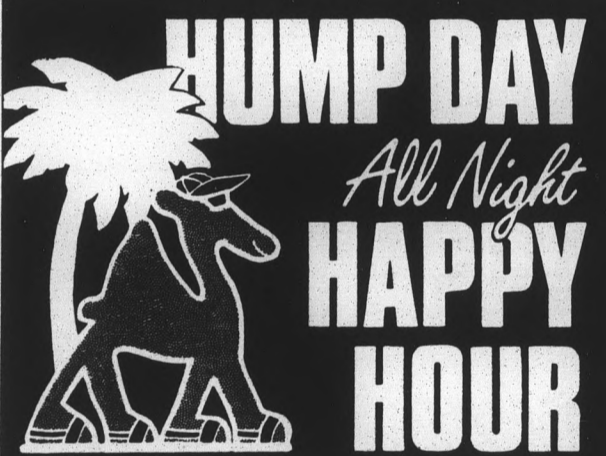

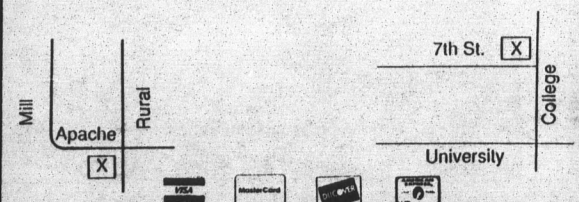

# Televised panel focuses on dropouts

An ASU official will be a panelist today in a nationally televised discussion that will address the problems of high school dropouts and students finishing school ill-prepared for college.

John Lincoln, program director of the Project to Improve Minority Education in ASU's Downtown Center, will join host Bill Moyers and nine other education experts following the airing of the documentary, "All Our Children: America's Young People in Crisis and the Programs Trying to Help Them." The show is scheduled for 8 p.m. on KAET-TV, Channel 8.

Lincoln said he's been "kept in the dark" about the exact

nature of the discussion, so he can be "fresh for the panelists' questions."

Project PRIME, initiated in January 1989, works with high schools in the Valley, interacting with their curriculum to improve test skills and motivate students, said Raul Cardenas, the program's assistant director.

"It's a 'Stand and Deliver' type of program," he said.

The project currently is underway at Carl Hayden, South Mountain, Dysart, Peoria, Tolleson and Chandler high schools, Cardenas said, adding that 22 other high schools and 55 elementary schools across the state also have implemented the program.

- Police arrested a 21-year-old man Monday night and accused him of two counts of public sexual indecency.

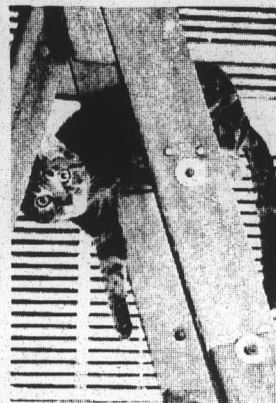

# Ugly To Watch

**T**here is nothing so wrong with "The Marrying Man" that an ax, 10 gallons of gasoline and a blow torch wouldn't fix. Considering all of the incredible talent involved with this project, the themes touched on by the script and the time period setting ('40s and '50s), the film should have been a masterpiece. Unfortunately, first-time director Jerry Rees pulled out his 16-pack of crayons and then blindfolded himself.

"The Marrying Man" was written by Neil Simon — arguably one of the most brilliant screen and stage writers of our time. He is responsible for such classics as "The Odd Couple," "Brighton Beach Memoirs" and "Biloxi Blues," and just opened an instant classic, "Lost in Yonkers," on Broadway three weeks ago, to rave reviews.

By nature, any Neil Simon penned film is always billed as Neil Simon's (title here). It's a trademark as instantly recognizable as "Steven Spielberg Presents" or "A Martin Scorsese Picture." The "Marrying Man" is just called "The Marrying Man." Simon had his name yanked from above the title, due to his feeling that his script had been massacred. His name is proudly relegated to the small script in the opening credit sequence. He must be happy.

What happened?

According to the Hollywood Reporter, the project was in dire trouble from day one. The director was a new face in the industry and was asked to play wet nurse to the likes of lovers Alec Baldwin and Kim Basinger. The lovers apparently had their little love spats right there on the set. Due to the grand nature (and

names) of these stars, you are better off doing nothing to control the situation. Also reported was that Basinger stormed off the set a number of times because she felt that the crew was staring at her too much. Again, what is a first-time director to do? Neil Simon did not get to where he is today by having his name associated with troubled projects like this one.

Baldwin stars as Charley Pearl, the multi-millionaire baron of a toothpaste company. He plans to marry Adele Horner (Elisabeth Shue), the daughter of Lew Horner (Robert Loggia) — movie studio guru. On the way to Charley's bachelor party in Vegas, Charley and his stereotypically '50s greasy-haired cronies, stop at a roadside bar and sit back and watch Charlie fall for a sexy lounge singer, Vicki Anderson (Kim Basinger).

Who cares that Vicki is the current lover of Bugsy Siegel (Armand Assante), the mobster who founded Las Vegas? Charley is rich, so he doesn't. He follows her home, sneaks into her place through an open window, and runs a full test on her erogenous

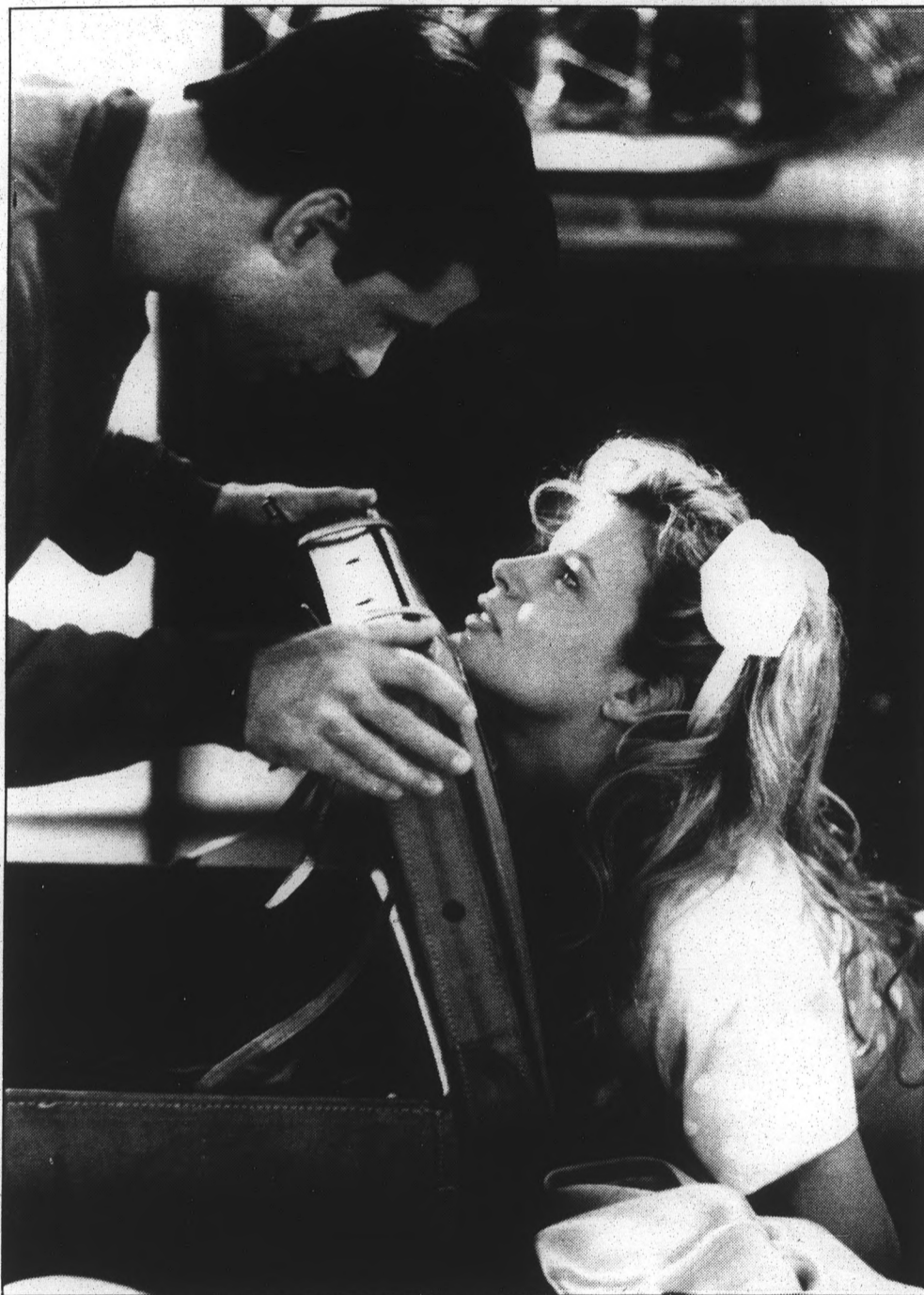

zones. Bugsy discovers them in the act and forces them to get married at gunpoint.

What is intended as a whimsical farce, congeals into heavy drama under the oppressive directorial hand of Mr. Rees.

Throughout the rest of the film, Charley and Vicki get divorced and then remarried when the ink on the divorce is dry. The cycle turns endlessly three or four times. In the end, Charley loses all of his money trying to save his toothpaste business, and Vicki makes millions as a singer and movie star. In the very last scene they remarry for the fourth time and end up having a bunch of kids. When asked why he would marry the same woman four times, Charley responded, "It fits." Pivotal question, weak response.

I'll say it again. Good concept, bad execution. It happens far too often in the movies. The saving grace for "The Marrying Man" are two technical aspects. The first being the soundtrack of terrific Cole Porter and Cole Porter influenced classic songs from the era. They are sung quite well, oddly enough, by Kim Basinger. The second "highlight" is Donald Thorin's luscious, autumnal photography that makes "The Marrying Man," strangely, beautiful to look at, yet still ugly to watch.

So for a really good time buy the soundtrack and get your hands on a couple of slides from the film. Or if you are patient, wait for Barry Levinson's Bugsy Siegel to be released this Christmas. "The Marrying Man" is for slobbering stargazers only.

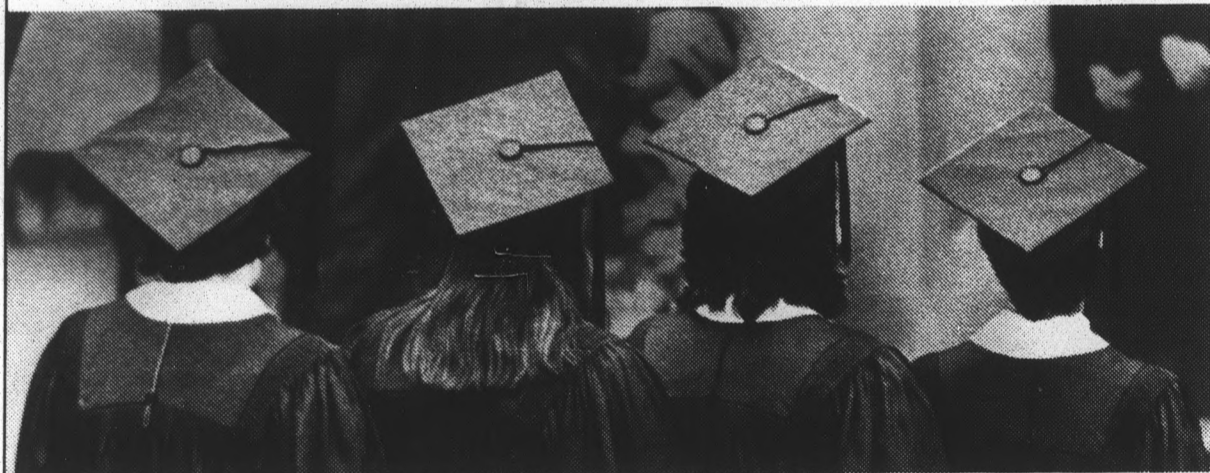

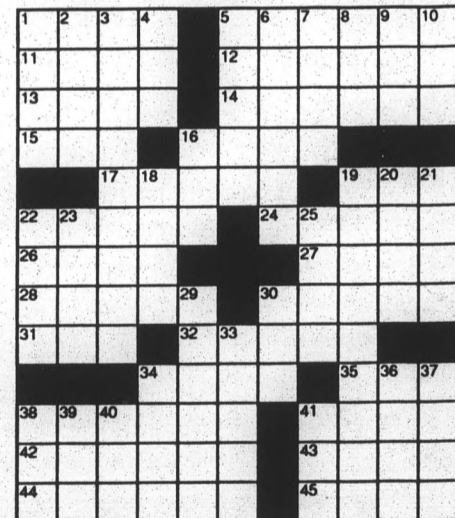

# 'The Red Tape Wars': three books for the price of one

There was a television show, some years back, called "To Tell The Truth." What does this have to do with a book, particularly a funny science fiction book?

This: the line at the end of chapter one, "My name really is ...," and that was the catch phrase for to "To Tell the Truth."

What even better, is that catch phrase is echoed three times in the first three chapters. The Red Tape Wars is a "round robin" novel. Mike Resnick, Jack Chalker and George Alec Effinger agreed amongst themselves to write just such a novel and that makes it an interesting, if uneven,

work.

The concept is simple. One writer starts with chapter one. He builds characters, scenario and conflict. The conflict rises to an insurmountable problem at the very end of the chapter and then one author turns the story over to the next guy in line. So this is a novel which has three different authors, three different styles, and each author is busy trying to top the next guy while dealing with the mess left by the last guy.

Remember, the point at the end of the chapter is to leave the next guy with an unsolvable problem. It certainly makes for entertaining reading.

The book itself is a horrible mish-mash of inside jokes, very bad humor and highly

animated plotting. All of this is combined with three different styles of writing although the authors are hard to tell apart.

What is obvious, from the introduction through the first couple of chapters, is that these authors had fun when they wrote this book. It's a relatively short novel. And it is funny.

Maybe it is hard to imagine literary slapstick humor, but that's what this book is all about. It's like a group of children telling stories and each child is trying to top the previous tale.

On another level, the story itself takes time to poke fun at the conventions of science fiction. There are the requisite bug-eyed monsters and alien invaders.

There is a woman with a thick accent (and no clothes) for most of the tale. Sentient navigational computers fall in love and spout poetry. The same computers also sulk. Each author has a trademark which is pointed out in the narrative.

The best part, though, is following the story that the three authors tell each other, through the characters. This adds to the uneven style, yet it also makes the book fun to read.

Most critics probably wouldn't waste their precious time reading this book. No, it isn't really deep or meaningful. But it is fun. Which author can outdo the others? Read the book.

While the ASU right fielder came up good in his philosophy on Tuesday, some of his teammates successfully refuted it during a 12-2 Sun Devil victory against New Mexico State in front of 674 spectators at Packard Stadium.

ASU (25-20) won for the fourth time in five games and gained whatever momentum was available before it hosts No. 1 Stanford in a crucial Six-Pac series beginning Friday.

Steverson had what he said was a good at-bat during his

first plate appearance, a walk on five pitches in the second inning. He eventually advanced to third on a single and an error before scoring the first run of the game on a sacrifice fly by first baseman Dave Robson.

"I try to concentrate as well as I can on my first at-bat," Steverson said. "Most of the time, you're facing a pitcher that you've never seen before and you try to work him until you see all of his pitches. If that doesn't work, you just go out there and swing."

The sophomore did exactly that when he came up in the third, taking the first delivery from Bobby Ockerman and losing it over the 370-foot sign in left field for a grand slam to give the Sun Devils a 6-0 lead.

The blast was the second home run in three days and eighth of the year for Steverson, who was 1-for-3 and equaled his career high of four RBI.

"It was a hanging curve ball," Steverson said. "I think I was ready for whatever he (Ockerman) was going to throw. I was very relaxed during the first at-bat and I walked, so the approach was good and I decided to do it the same way each time."

The grand slam was the crushing blow in a five-run third, but only one of the runs was earned thanks to an error by second baseman David Reyes. The miscue occurred with men on first and second during a ground ball by Scott Samuels that would have produced the frame's first out.

With the bases now loaded, second baseman Mike Scialo hit a sacrifice fly to score designated hitter Brian Smith from third base. Ockerman then walked third baseman Jim Austin to bring up Mike Kelly, who struck out swinging for the second out.

But since Kelly's strikeout should have been the third out of the inning, each of the four runs that scored on the dinger by Steverson were unearned.

One of those that shot down Steverson's first-at-bat belief was Austin, who fanned badly on his initial trip to the plate but ended the day 3-for-4. Austin delivered his biggest hit on a two-RBI double that led to the last of ASU's five runs in the seventh.

After the Sun Devils had put up three runs in the inning for a 9-2 advantage, the Aggies (14-29) replaced Ockerman with Carlos Chavez. The freshman walked shortstop Kurt Ehmann and Samuels before trying to pump a 3-1 fastball past Austin, who took the pitch down the third-base line for two runs.

"They were throwing me inside all day," Austin said. "I had to try and pull the ball because each of their pitchers were doing the same thing. A three-and-one count is a hitter's count, and they still were throwing me in. Their pitchers weren't throwing that hard, but scoring 12 runs helps us keep our confidence."

ASU relief pitcher Rob Gorrell also refuted the theory, but in a slightly different fashion when he came in for Doug Newstrom with two on in the seventh.

Gorrell gave up a two-run double to the first batter he faced, outfielder Efraim Lara, but then settled down and tossed three innings of one-hit ball for his second save of the season. The junior has suddenly emerged as a viable performer by giving up only two hits in his last two appearances.

Newstrom had another successful outing as well by earning the win to improve his record to 6-1. The freshman, who tossed two innings of relief and allowed only one hit and two runs, struck out the first four men he faced and may be ready to become ASU's stopper.

"We're hoping that Newstrom can develop into a dependable short guy," Sun Devil coach Jim Brock said. "He can get guys out with his slider and is a player we're going to need, and Doug has said he wants to pitch a lot. Today, he came in and got it done for us. I'm pleased with what he did."

Sean Rees started the contest, but left after the first inning when he suffered a new blister on the middle finger of his left (pitching) hand. Brock said he is hopeful Rees will be ready to start one of the games against Stanford this weekend.

## Women's golf jumps to 2nd in Lady Sun Devil

Imagine if things went the right way for the ASU women's golf team on Tuesday in the Lady Sun Devil Invitational at Karsten Golf Course.

"We got a few bad breaks," ASU coach Linda Vollstedt said, even though the Sun Devils moved up a spot to second in the standings. "But we played really well, so I wasn't really concerned."

ASU junior Lynne Mikulas led the Sun Devils to an 8-over 296 in the second round, putting the team just two shots off the pace.

"I'm really pleased," Vollstedt said. "We played the back side extremely well."

San Jose State, whose best golfer, Pat Hurst, was forced to withdraw because of an intestinal virus, still managed to take over first place with a 36-hole score of 588.

UCLA dropped from first to fifth place after a second-round 308 ruined the Bruins' opening round of 292.

Because the greens were inconsistent, Mikulas said being familiar with them was not to her advantage.

"They made them so hard for the men (in their weekend tournament) and we haven't played them hard," Mikulas said. "They've been watered so they are getting a little slower, but it's still kind of in between."

"You need to land in front, but you can't because there's trouble."

Mikulas posted a two-day total of one-

under and finished the day four strokes behind leader Kelly Robbins of Tulsa, the winner of last year's invitational.

Robbins, who has never won back-to-back titles in her four-year collegiate career, said she cannot remember ever placing higher than third in a tournament.

"I've always played well out here," said Robbins, who has posted rounds of 71 and 68. "I like playing on desert courses. I putt well here."

After 36 holes complete, the Mt. Pleasant, Minn., native led Tulsa to a third-place finish, eight strokes behind leading San Jose State.

Robbins got off to a rough start in the round as she had to make a good putt to save par on the first hole. She missed a three-foot par on the second hole and then double-bogeyed the third, causing her to be three-over early on.

According to Robbins, her early woes were not a problem and she went on to shoot four-under the rest of the round to end up with a two-stroke lead.

"I felt pretty unlucky at first," said Robbins, who birdied five holes while bogeying just two. "I got into a couple of situations where I had no choice what to do. I couldn't go for the greens."

Robbins said she had no trouble hitting the ball long.

"As long as it goes straight, I'm alright," she said.

The lone Golden Hurricane senior said she feels confident she can finish strong today and walk away with individual honors.

"I need to get off to a quicker start," Robbins said. "If I can get through the first couple holes, I think I have a pretty good chance."

Mikulas, who is on pace to improve her 1990 Lady Sun Devil score by 17 strokes, said she must stay focused and concentrate on her game, not Robbins scores.

"I've got to take it one shot at a time," Mikulas said. "Besides, she's too good of a player to worry about."

Mikulas, who shot a steady round with one bogey on 11 and a birdie on nine, said she has been concentrating on her putting because it has been her downfall this year. According to the ASU junior her short game has suffered recently because she has been working on hitting the ball long.

She said the combined skills have fine-tuned her game and made her a consistent golfer.

"She's very steady," Vollstedt said. "I've always said she's been our most consistent golfer all year. She set some goals for herself in this tournament and I'm very pleased to see her play the course so smoothly."

ASU, which has three of its five golfers in the top 10, broke 300 as a team for the second straight day and had all of its players shoot in the 70s, two goals Vollstedt sets for each tournament.

Vollstedt said it is not a fluke the Sun Devils are playing so well, and because of it, the team is showing lots of emotion and unity.

"We've got to go out and play the best golf we know how," Vollstedt said. "We've got the home course advantage, and hopefully it will pay off."

Entered as an ASU individual, junior Kim Millies ranks in the top 20 with a two-day total of six-over 150.

The 17-team field concludes competition today with the final 18 holes teeing off at 8 a.m. and 10 a.m. The awards ceremony is scheduled to begin at approximately 3:30 p.m.

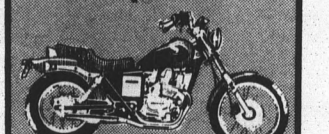

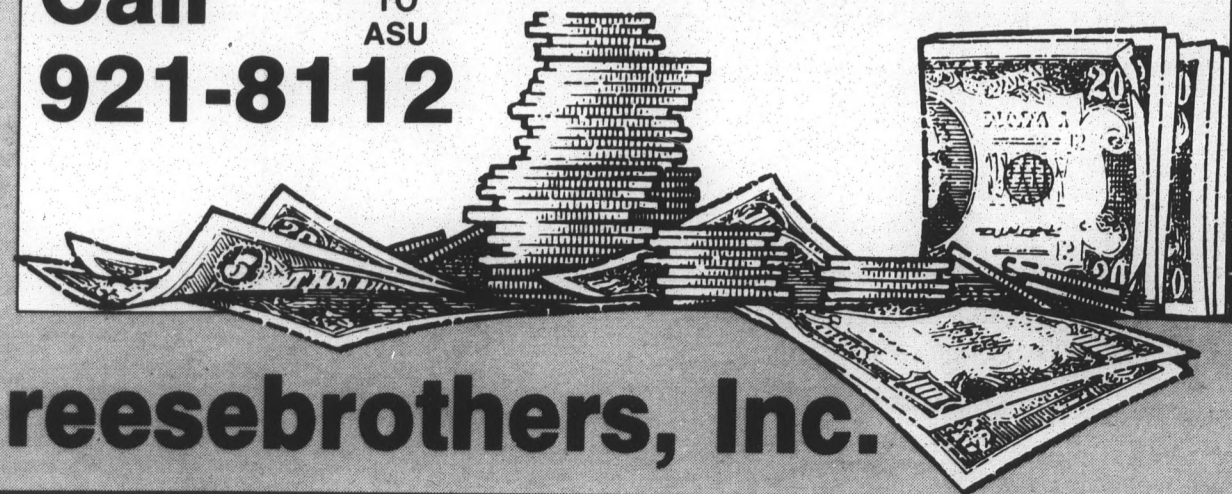

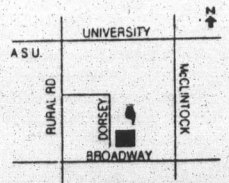
