## Student regent selection near

Gov. Fife Symington's office has interviewed the three finalists vying for the student position on the Arizona Board of Regents and could possibly announce its choice as early as Friday, a Symington aide said.

Current Student Regent Abedon Fimbres' term of office is up at the end of June and his replacement will begin on July 1.

It's possible the governor will announce his choice while at a meeting Friday in Flagstaff with the Arizona Students Association and the regents at NAU, said Nancy Mendoza, the governor's executive assistant on education.

All three candidates for the appointment are NAU students, since the position is rotated among the state's three universities.

Fimbres, an ASU student, was preceded by Danny Siciliano, who is now president-elect of the UofA student government.

Mendoza said the candidates were interviewed last week.

## ASU student beats bank in ATM heist

An ASU freshman took on a Goliath of the banking industry — and won after a two-month legal battle.

David Mellon, a communications major, took Bank of America to court after his ATM card was stolen and \$1,340 disappeared from his account in six transactions.

When Mellon reported the theft, Bank of America officials said they believed the withdrawals were authorized by Mellon, and refused to reimburse him.

Tuesday night, the two sides met in Tempe Justice Court for an hour trial.

Mellon learned Wednesday that he

won his suit and will collect \$1,290, plus an \$18 court fee and 10percent interest.

"It's going to come to probably around almost exactly what I lost," Mellon said.

"I had to go through a lot of bureaucratic bull and I felt like giving up time and time again," he said.

"I think (Bank of America) kind of knew all along that they were wrong, but they figured, hey, I was an 18-year-old kid, what was I going to do?"

The theft occurred in the first few days of February, and shortly thereafter, Mellon's account was drained.

"It was all the money I had," he said, adding, "I went through hell this semester, borrowing money from friends."

## ASU student makes sky the limit in dream to be a pilot

As David Dolenar was growing up, he would sit off the runway at a California Air Force base and watch the Blue Angels practice their death-defying maneuvers every chance he got.

In February, the Arizona Chamber of Commerce named him Airman of the Year.

"When I was a young-un I loved to sit and watch the Blue Angels," said Dolenar, a six-foot, 175-pound, Air Force Reservist and an administrative justice junior.

Dolenar, who grew up near El Centro Air Force Base in California, recounted his early interest in flying. "My dad had total access to the base and I'd sit right off the flight line and watch them.

That was my inspiration. I was fascinated with airplanes," he said. "It is an honor to be able to represent the Air Force and the Reserves."

Still, he downplays his accomplishment, saying he "just kind of lucked out, being in the right spot at the right time."

Dolenar competed against more than 1,000 other reservists from Arizona before being selected for the prestigious awards. Air Force Chief Master Sgt. Al Godinez said Dolenar's honor is significant.

"It is no small feat that he accomplished," Godinez said. "It is a very, very high honor and it is quite competitive."

"I sat on the Airman of the Year board and I recall being very impressed with him. He's an inspiration to have around because when you see guys like him you really get pumped up."

Dolenar attends ASU full-time and he works full-time for the Target district office, where he monitors customer safety, conducts audits and investigates thefts.

He joined the Air Force after graduating from Chandler High School in 1988.

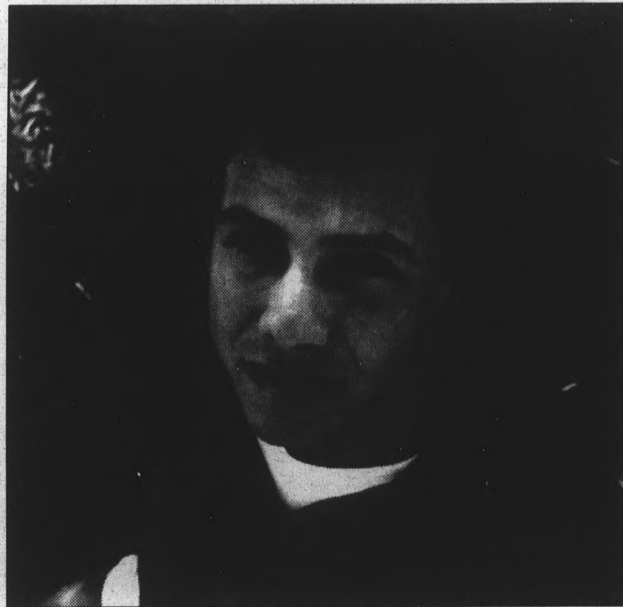
His roommate, Chandler Police Officer John Shearer met Dolenar while "working together arresting shoplifters."

"He's a phenomenal human being," Shearer said. "There is never a dull moment around David and that's the honest-to-God truth."

"He has so much energy — I wish I had half of his energy. He's the type of person who will be successful in life in whatever he ends up doing."

Dolenar said he wants to finish college and become an Air Force officer so that he can fly planes, "but with all the military budget cuts, you never know how they are going to arrange the military from now on."

"I'll have to see what happens but for now that's my primary goal," he said adding that he would also enjoy working for the F.B.I. or C.I.A. if he could not obtain the commission he wanted.

# Phoenix news anchor recalls climb to top

He tells his adventure story with rapid-fire words that prick up the ears.

His words match technicolor images, and he provides details and side-notes that help the audience see the big picture.

It's a style that now comes naturally to Dave Marquis after 12 years as a television news reporter.

"I went down to Mexico with my crazy younger brother the other day — up into the Pinacate Volcano wilderness — it's a Mexican national park most Americans have never even heard of," he said.

"We camped out in the rain the first night, and the next day I climbed the second highest peak in the park.

"Then alone, without my brother, I went on and climbed the highest peak in the park — up into the swirling clouds and the majesty of this primordial volcanic area, and got caught in a sleet storm and almost got lost on the wrong side of the mountain."

As a child, and even as a young man, Marquis often felt lost. His parents were Presbyterian missionaries and each assignment brought the family to new, and often exotic, locales. Many times, Marquis felt like an outsider.

"When you grow up moving all over the

world, and you're constantly uprooted, you begin to feel alienated."

But Marquis believes the experience of again and again being a stranger in a foreign land has paid off, as reporters must be willing to travel in unknown territory.

As a field reporter for Phoenix's Channel 12 News, Marquis follows a trail of discovery every day.

"Last night, I did a story about a trailer park with its power turned off because of code violations. You can argue that is was a limited, narrow story, but the fact of the matter is, there are people who live all over this state in tiny, dilapidated trailer parks that aren't up to code."

Dave has turned his own childhood feelings of being isolated and ignored into compassion and hope for all people. Because he is an optimist at heart, he looks at the struggles of his life as a learning experience.

He calls himself a humanistic existentialist, though he said his Presbyterian upbringing has left a mark on his decidedly non-Christian world view.

At the age of 6, Marquis's family moved to the Philippines.

"My dad worked with college students in Manila providing educational opportunities for disadvantaged youngsters," he said.

"World War II had only ended 13 years before, and it was a wonderful time to be overseas if you were an American, because we owned the world in those days. Americans were still loved and respected

for their accomplishments during World War II. We hadn't entered the dark era of Vietnam yet."

As a broadcast news instructor at Arizona State University, Marquis sees similarities between his generation and the generation going through college today.

"I'm seeing, at least with the kids I'm working with, a real need for direction and substance. Today's college students are looking for more both in the educational process and in their lives," he said.

"They're asking seriously what they're going to do and what their lives are going to be about. It's not so much that there's a new idealism — there's really a new pragmatism."

At 40, Marquis said he has finally put most of his demons to rest.

"I was a very intense kid, and often my own worst enemy. But as I've worked these out in my life, I've become more and more able to celebrate my life," he said. "I really had to learn to love myself and accept myself is what it came down to."

Marquis said working in the television news business has been both a benefit and a bane.

"A lot of very intense, highly-focused people end up in television news because it provides a direction and a release for their energies and intensities that becomes a very positive thing," he said.

"But it's brutal on relationships because your time is so scattered."

Marquis television career began 12 years

ago in Yuma, when his mother saw a want ad in the newspaper for someone with communication skills.

The advertisement turned out to be a position at a local television station. Marquis got the job, and within a few months had become an anchor, and later, news director.

During the early 1980s, Marquis worked in Texas before landing his current job at Channel 12. While he said he is very satisfied with his job right now, he would like to travel more. "I wouldn't mind working in a shop where I'd get to do some overseas assignments," he said.

Marquis said working at the network level is not appealing anymore.

"I used to think that the ultimate goal was to become a network correspondent, until I discovered the reality of being a network correspondent was living out of a suitcase, fighting with ruthless producers back in New York or Washington who don't care if you live or die, and that it's a frantic, ulcerous lifestyle that can kill you.

"I value my quality of life — my family, my loved-ones, my friends. I guess I've gotten kind of comfortable in my old age.

"I'd like to live to be 100 because I want to see the year 2051 — that's one of my goals. I just want to see what a madhouse planet this is in another 59 years, because it is a marvelous and magnificent odyssey that we're all about.

"For me, the question isn't really being afraid of death, it's afraid of dying in life."

## Aquittals spark rage, violence in L.A.

### Motorists beaten; looters pillage stores; fires rage

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Scattered violence erupted following the acquittals of four white policemen in a black motorist's beating. Looters ravaged stores, four motorists were beaten and demonstrators rushed police headquarters.

In the worst outbreak, an intersection in predominantly black South Central Los Angeles was plunged into chaos, with looters running free and motorists pulled from cars and attacked. Police and paramedics were ordered to steer clear.

Several small fires were seen burning in the area.

City officials, including Mayor Tom Bradley and Police Chief Daryl F. Gates as well as leaders of the black community appealed for calm.

In a scene that was captured by news helicopters and broadcast live, a truck driver was pulled from his tractor-trailer rig, beaten and clubbed with a tire iron as looters went through a nearby liquor store, gas station and auto parts store.

Men who beat the truck driver raised their hands and smiled.

The man's pockets were picked and he was kicked before he was able to stumble to his truck and drive away.

In another attack, about 25 people stood around as looters pulled a man from a vehicle at the intersection, beat and kicked him.

The man staggered about in the street, his head bloody, looking for help or a way

out. After several minutes, two good Samaritans emerged, their hands raised for a halt to the violence. They led the man away.

A man in a white truck had his window smashed and was pulled out of the cab and beaten.

A motorcyclist was seen shooting a shotgun at passing cars at the intersection, and at least one other person was wounded.

At Parker Center, the downtown police headquarters, demonstrators demanding Gates' resignation threw rocks and uprooted plants, breaking some glass doors and windows.

About 50 of the crowd of 200 menaced two police officers who were trapped outside the building, but no one appeared to be injured. Police in riot gear later moved in and some officers were hit with what appeared to be rocks. Officers wrestled a demonstrator to the ground and formed a protective wall against the demonstrators.

The four white Los Angeles police officers were acquitted of all but one assault charge Wednesday in the videotaped beating of black motorist Rodney King. A mistrial was declared on one count.

The verdicts, in the seventh day of deliberations, came after a year of political uproar sparked by the graphic videotape of a black man being beaten by white officers, denounced in many quarters as brutality. The backlash brought down the Los Angeles police chief. "My client and I are just outraged," King's lawyer, Steve Lerman, said after the verdict. "It sends a bad message. It

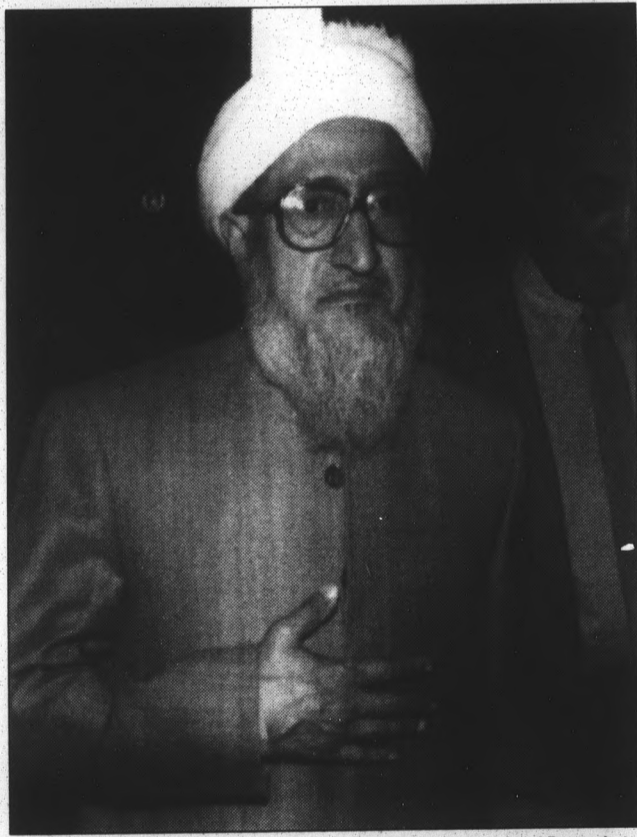

says it's OK to go ahead and beat somebody when they're down and kick the crap out of them."

"I'm stunned beyond belief," said Los Angeles City Councilman Mark Ridley-

Thomas, former head of the local Southern Christian Leadership Conference.

The jury acquitted the officers of the more serious assault charge and

## New Afghan government starts rule

KABUL, Afghanistan (AP) — Ahmad Shah Masood, Afghanistan's most powerful guerrilla commander and its new defense minister, arrived unannounced in Kabul Wednesday with 10,000 troops to impose order on the embattled city.

Masood drove after nightfall to the headquarters of the Kabul garrison, responsible for the capital's security, said American journalist Richard Mackenzie, who accompanied the convoy of jeeps, 100 tanks and truckloads of mujahedeen fighters.

Mackenzie, who has covered Afghanistan for seven years, said the guerrilla commander ordered his forces not to fire in the air to celebrate their arrival. Many of them had flowers in the barrels of their AK-47 assault rifles, he said.

Masood has said he would enter the city only after a new Islamic government was in place, a condition met on Tuesday with the formal transfer of power to new president Sibghatullah Mojaddidi.

Forces loyal to Masood and the day-old Islamic government have been fighting partisans of fundamentalist firebrand Gulbuddin Hekmatyar in Kabul.

The convoy assembled at Bagram air base, about 30 miles north of Kabul, and entered the capital at 8 p.m. after a three-hour drive to streets darkened by a city-wide power failure.

During the day, fighting tapered off between an alliance of pro-government forces and Hekmatyar's Hezb-e-Islami, but skirmishes continued on Kabul's southern outskirts where Hekmatyar's partisans had retreated.

Occasional rocket blasts and gunfire rattled the city.

The city of 1.5 million fell under almost total control of Masood's men Tuesday night when Hekmatyar's fighters surrendered their stronghold in the Interior Ministry complex after a three-hour battle. About 260 mujahedeen were taken prisoner.

Mackenzie said Hezb-e-Islami forces, positioned on the new road between the air base and the capital, had dug trenches, apparently to harass the convoy as it passed.

Masood shifted direction and came to Kabul along another route, bypassing Hekmatyar's men.

Nobody appears to be running the empty offices of the former Soviet-backed government of President Najibullah, who was in hiding. Civilians stayed off streets except to buy food and the international airport has not been open to civilian traffic since a control tower was hit by a rocket on Tuesday.

Najibullah was toppled April 16 after a devastating 14-year civil war in which at least 2 million people were killed and 5 million made homeless. The starkly beautiful countryside is a wasteland in many regions, poisoned with thousands of mines.

The new government has promised amnesty to all Afghans except Najibullah.

Militiamen allied with the mujahedeen, or Islamic fighters, captured a man they suspected of being an agent of the Khad, or former secret police. They beat him, shot him to death and left his body beside a burned-out building in the capital. There was no indication the gunmen were acting on government orders.

Hekmatyar is a longtime enemy of both Masood and Mojaddidi, with differing visions of Afghanistan's future.

## Government says once-promising fuel may cause pollution

WASHINGTON (AP) — Ethanol was supposed to be a great deal for corn growers and an answer to the nation's environmental problems. Trouble is, the government says ethanol could cause pollution, not prevent it.

Farmers and ethanol producers thought an anti-pollution law passed two years ago would create a huge new market for their product in smog-choked cities where cleaner-burning gasoline would be required.

But the Environmental Protection Agency proposed a standard for the new lower-polluting gas that almost guarantees that the additive of choice will be a compound made from natural gas, not ethanol, officials say.

The EPA rule, which led some producers to shelve or hold off on expansion plans, is the subject of a furious lobbying effort on Capitol Hill and the White House.

"It's an election year. If for some reason EPA would not include ethanol in reformulated gasoline it's going to be a huge loser for the president, particularly in the Midwest," said Bruce Lear, assistant director of national affairs for the American Farm Bureau Federation.

But critics say an EPA exception for ethanol in the standard for "reformulated" gas would defeat the purpose of the Clean Air Act.

"Ethanol aggravates ozone problems," said Patricia Wright, a spokeswoman for

Amoco Oil Corp., a maker of the competing additive, known as MTBE. "If we're writing legislation to deal with air pollution it doesn't make a lot of sense to make exemptions for fuels that increase pollution."

Congress rewrote the Clean Air Act in 1990 to address two separate pollution problems in the nation's cities — carbon monoxide in the winter and smog in the summer.

Ethanol, or grain alcohol, helps with the first problem, reducing carbon monoxide emissions by adding oxygen to gasoline. That means it is likely to be used widely in some 40 cities where drivers must start buying oxygen-rich fuels this winter.

But ethanol also makes gasoline more volatile, releasing vapors that form smog in the summer. That's where the new EPA fuel standard comes in.

Under the Clean Air Act, drivers in nine cities with the worst smog problems must switch by 1995 to cleaner gasoline formulas.

EPA invited three dozen people, including representatives of farmers, ethanol producers, oil companies and car makers, to help write the standard that is now at issue.

"The Clean Air Act said that there can be no increase in nitrogen oxides. Unfortunately for the ethanol industry, ethanol would increase" those emissions, said Martha Casey, an EPA spokeswoman.

## Greenhouse alarmists ignore climate evidence

With the upcoming Earth Summit in Rio de Janeiro, pressure will undoubtedly increase on President Bush to not only attend the meeting, but also sign an agreement to reduce greenhouse gas emissions.

The recent Earth Day activities suggest that many of us fear global warming, and we too would like to "act now" to avoid future calamities.

This global warming storyline is presented to the public in a simple manner—the developed world has emitted huge amounts of greenhouse gases into the atmosphere. These gases are thought to warm the earth by trapping heat energy, and in the absence of some reduction in global emission of these gases, continued warming could force ice caps to melt, sea level to rise, droughts to more frequently occur in agricultural lands, super-sized hurricanes to attack coastlines of the world, and on and on. In an effort to keep the developing world from committing the same environmental sins and exacerbating the global warming problem, many believe that the United States must provide financial programs for assuring development throughout the world with a minimum emission of greenhouse gases.

The underlying foundation for this position can be found throughout the scientific literature. Numerical climate models from centers around the world certainly predict significant global warming, ranging from 1 degree Celsius to 5 degrees Celsius, for a doubling of the atmospheric concentration of greenhouse gases.

Importantly, the planetary temperature of the past century is on the rise, and the 1980s and 1990s produced many years of record high global temperatures. Despite these apparently consistent theoretical predictions and climate observations, newspapers continue to publish reports of increasing uneasiness in the scientific community regarding the greenhouse issue. Examination of just the global temperature record of the past century provides the following observations that are causing many climate scientists to rethink their position on the greenhouse issue.

(1) The equivalent carbon dioxide level (an index that summarizes the effect of carbon dioxide, methane, nitrous oxide, chlorofluorocarbons, and other minor greenhouse gases) has shown a 42 percent increase over the past 100 years; its value has gone from near 305 parts per million (ppm) in 1890 to 432 ppm in 1990. We have gone almost half way to doubling equivalent carbon dioxide in the last 100 years!

Yet, during this time period, the planetary temperature, as measured from near-surface thermometers around the globe and expressed as deviations from normal conditions, has increased by .45 C (Figure 1). Even if all of this increase has been forced by the buildup of greenhouse gases, the amount of global warming experienced over the last 100 years points to the low-end of the model predictions. At first glance, the empirical temperature record suggests a 1 C global

temperature rise for a doubling of equivalent carbon dioxide.

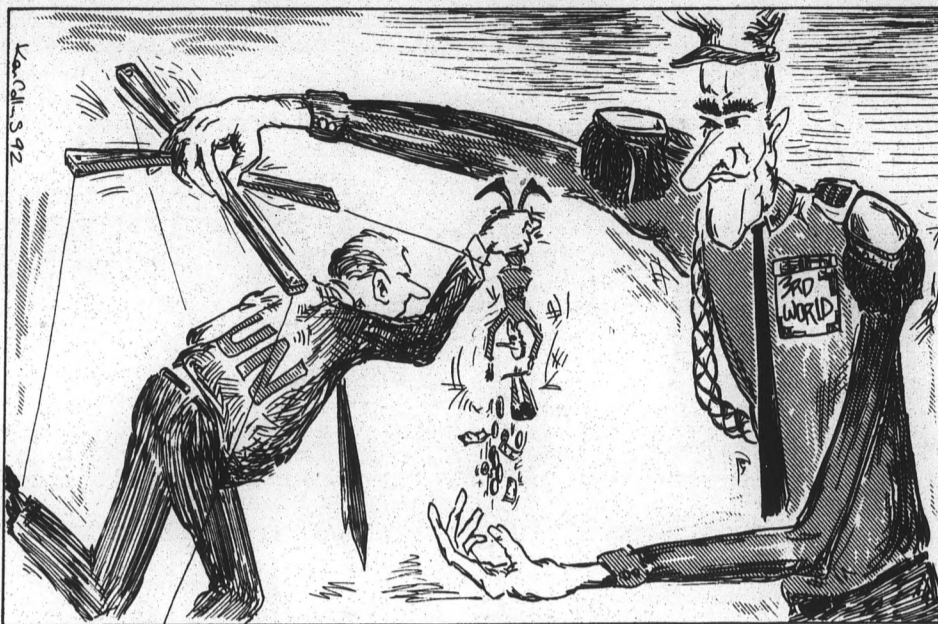
(2) The amount of global warming from 1891-1990 is calculated at .45 C; however, the amount of global warming from 1891-1940 is .34 C. Fully 75 percent of the temperature rise of the last century had occurred before the Second World War—the timing of the warming of the past century is not consistent with the exponential rise in greenhouse gases that characterized the post-World War II era.

(3) The notion that all of the .45 C of warming can be related to the greenhouse gases has been more carefully scrutinized in the past few years. As cities grow, they get warmer, and their long-term temperature records may reflect this urban heat island phenomenon.

Today, after several years of intense research, most climatologists concede that about .05 degrees Celsius of the global warming is far more related to the heat island effect than to any planetary-wide warming. Similarly, evidence is mounting that areas undergoing desertification also produce a warming signal not related to any greenhouse effect; a desertification signal on the order of .05 C during the past century seems reasonable.

Climate scientists also are aware that volcanic dust in the stratosphere can control the planetary temperature by blocking the incoming radiation from the sun. Recent studies show that approximately .15 C of the warming of the past century can be explained statistically by the observed levels of stratospheric dust. Others are arguing that solar influences, air-sea interactions, measurement errors, and natural variability of climate also influence the temperature trend of the past 100 years. While there are significant uncertainties in the estimates, the unexplained global warming during a time when equivalent carbon dioxide increased by over 40 percent is less than half of the observed .45 C.

(4) In the eyes of many greenhouse advocates, the record breaking warmth of the 1980s and 1990s is convincing evidence of the reality of the global warming phenomenon. The thermometer network of the globe shows a warming of .16 C during the period 1980-1990, and the eight warmest years of the past century occurred during this period. However, satellites orbiting the planet also produce estimates of planetary temperature thought to be accurate to within .02 C. While the near surface thermometers show .16 C of warming in recent years, the satellite data show a global warming of only .07 C. If we assume that the satellite data are superior to the thermometer records (and there are many reasons for



such an assumption), we must further reduce the estimated rate of global warming.

(5) Within the past few years, many climatologists have recognized the cooling effects of sulfur dioxide (SO<sub>2</sub>). Here again, the storyline is relatively simple—human activities have exponentially increased the atmospheric concentration of SO<sub>2</sub>, and the SO<sub>2</sub> and related sulfate aerosols cool the earth by reflecting incoming solar radiation, brightening clouds, and extending the life span of low-level clouds. Many climate scientists now believe that the global cooling effect of the increasing SO<sub>2</sub> levels is nearly equivalent to the warming effect of the increasing concentration of greenhouse gases.

Clearly, there is little evidence in the global temperature record to support claims of a dramatic temperature rise in the next century. But greenhouse advocates continue to bombard the public with predictions of 3 C of imminent and catastrophic warming. Within much of the scientific community, there is a growing understanding that the actual temperature rise is not likely to be more than .5 C to 1 C over the next half century.

If 4 C of greenhouse warming is coming, then, according to the famous Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC) report, realistic global policies can spare the earth about 1 C of the warming. If doubling of equivalent carbon dioxide (with continued SO<sub>2</sub> emissions) produces a rise in planetary temperature of only 0.5 C to 1 C, then the climate impact of realistic policy is on the order of a few tenths of a degree. Hopefully, the policymakers at the United Nations will recognize these facts and build their policies on solid science, not on the hype and hysteria that continues to surround the greenhouse issue.

#### ASASU unfair to foreigners

The international students at ASU have been striving for recognition on this campus for a long time. We have constantly approached ASASU and the administration in an effort to educate them about the various concerns that need to be addressed. However, all our attempts have been met with endless red tape.

When told that we do not participate in campus activities, the International Students Council, an umbrella organization for all on-campus international student groups, made a valiant effort to rectify the situation this year.

The bill to include the international students into ASASU was introduced in the Senate by Sen. Bouzari about a year ago. It was the responsibility of Senate University Affairs committee to talk to the international student community and determine the validity of this bill before making recommendations to the Senate. We fail to understand why the committee never attempted to contact the International Students Council on this matter, and why the International Student Office director was not contacted until last week. We feel that this was just another way to side step the issue and deny us the recognition we rightfully deserve. We are sure that the Senate would have acted promptly had the proposed bill benefited other members of the student population.

We hope that none of the senators who abstained from the special session did so in order to prevent the bill from passing. Given the scandals surrounding the Senate, it would not surprise us if this was the case.

The postponement of the bill to the fall semester has been a major setback to our dreams. However, we have overcome all prior obstacles with grace and this one won't be any different. We look forward to educating the new Senate on the issue and anticipate the buck to stop with them. We would like to thank Sen. Bouzari and the *State Press* for their continued support during the past year.

freshman in political science and education who is an at-large member of the ASNAU Senate.

Evans said she is a "middle-of-the-road" Republican. Some of her major concerns as student regent would be to improve communication between the regents and the Legislature.

Evans said she thinks the tuition freeze was good for this year, but it would be unrealistic to expect it to last.

She is adamant, though, about her desire to see that

tuition revenues stay at the universities rather than going into the state general fund, as they now do.

Evans said she likes the principles behind Symington's project SLIM, which is supposed to reduce waste and save money in state government.

Layvas, also a Republican, was a member of Teen-age Republicans as a high school student.

He said he is not in favor of extending the tuition freeze, and thinks the universities should become more realistic about how much money they can expect from the

state.

Darland was not available for comment Wednesday.

In other news Wednesday, Randy Udelman, ASA executive director, said the agenda for ASA's meeting Friday with Symington will include "recommendations for the current year's university budget, planning for future enrollment growth, access to higher education, alternative funding sources and financial aid programs.

Today ASA will hold its "transitional meeting" during which the outgoing ASA board will turn over the reins to the new board.

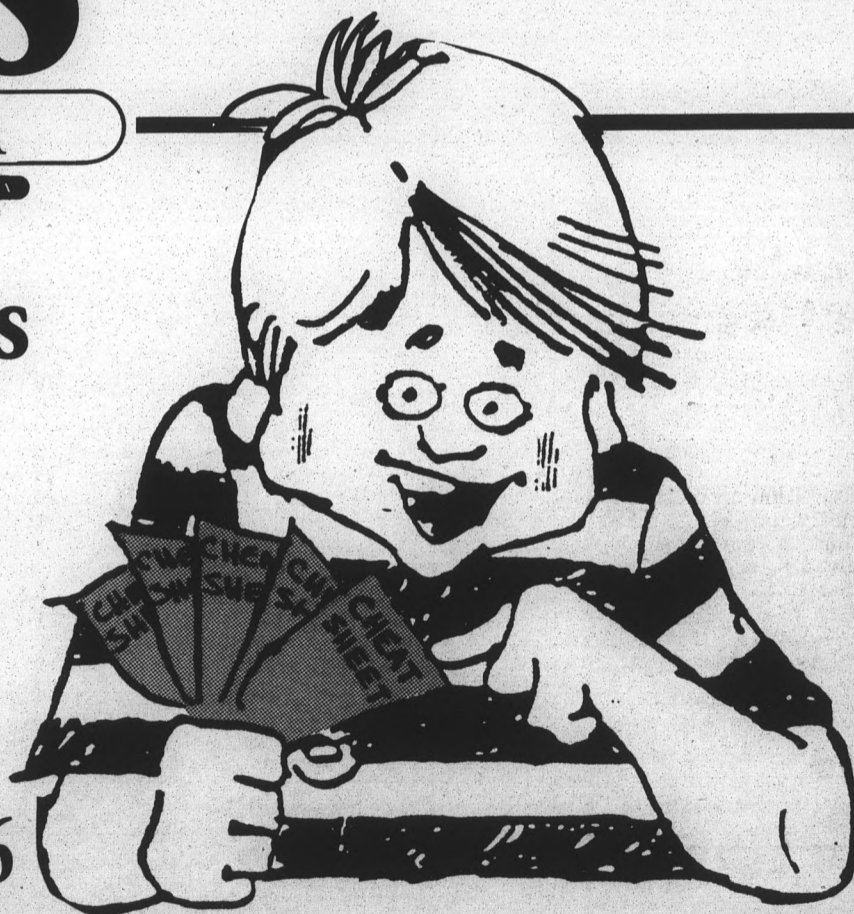

Bank of America, which could not be reached for official comment on the case, had a "real poor attitude," Mellon said.

"They think they can take advantage of people and I proved them wrong."

Mellon's roommate David Ellenbogen, a freshman pre-law major, said the bank's policy regarding theft of ATM cards predisposes it to winning.

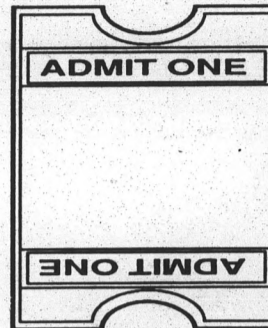
Ellenbogen said Bank of America officials asked Mellon to sign a form stating that he did not give his personal identification number to anyone else. With that, they concluded that no one

could have taken the cash without Mellon's knowledge, because no one else knew his PIN.

The bank also had pictures of the man who took the money, taken from a camera at the bank machine during the transactions, but would not release the pictures to Mellon.

"They put every obstacle in his way," Ellenbogen said, adding that Mellon prevailed nonetheless.

"This is basically a story of a little guy taking on big corporation — and kicking ass," he said.

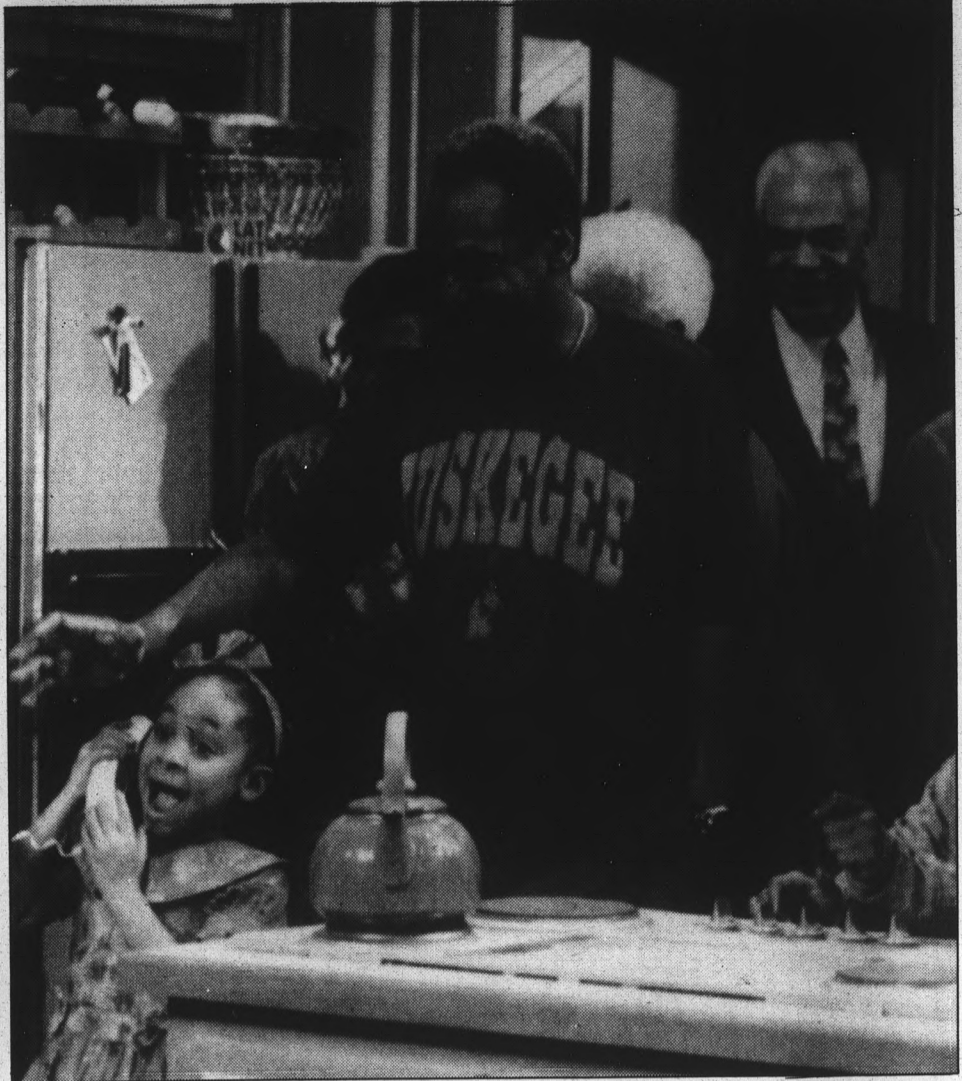

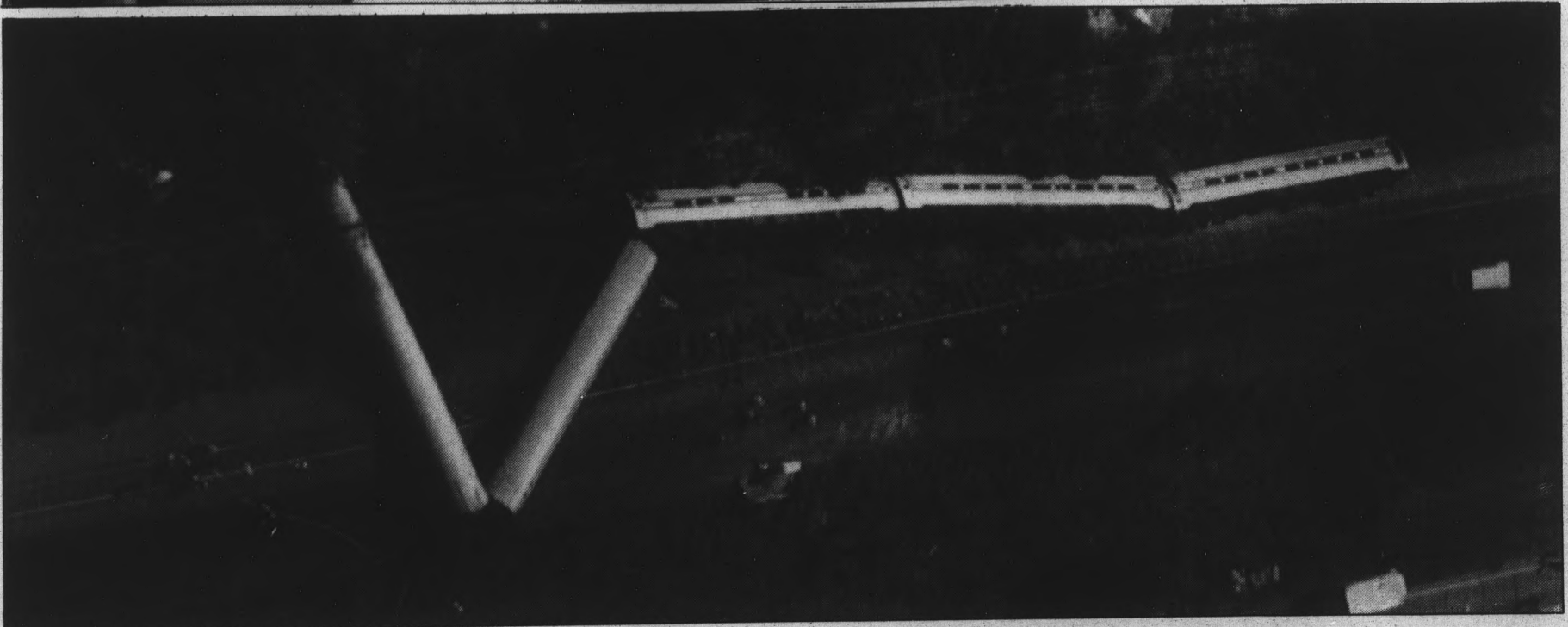

● ANNAPOLIS, Md. (AP) — Seventeen seniors at the U.S. Naval Academy have declassified details of their daring raid on an enemy base: the capture of four Army mascots from West Point on the eve of last year's Army-Navy game.

The mules were locked in a veterinary compound at the U.S. Military Academy at West Point, N.Y., said Midshipman 1st Class Chris Middleton of Laurel, leader of the dash behind enemy lines. He said the battle plan had been mapped out by members of the Class of 1991.

Several days before last fall's big game, members of the raiding party disguised themselves in enemy uniforms, camouflaged their vehicles with "Beat Navy" stickers and penetrated the base, driving unchallenged to the mules' stable.

There, Middleton said, they engaged enemy forces, handcuffing and gagging several soldiers and a civilian before making off with the mules.

Guards at the gate got the license number of the last car.

The Army threw its forces into a counterattack, scrambling three helicopters and alerting state police and Defense Department security police.

The Defense Department agents outflanked the returning naval force, intercepting them at the Naval Academy gate and pulling them from their vehicles.

But a lieutenant in temporary command of the naval station ordered the agents to release the midshipmen and escort them and the mules to a Navy pep rally, Middleton said.

The big week ended Dec. 7, when Navy's football team clobbered Army 24-3 — its only victory of the season.

Embarrassed Army officials never pressed charges.

The commandant of midshipmen created a unique honor for the raiders: "The Order of the Mule," certifying their exploit to be "in the highest traditions of the naval service."

● BROWN DEER, Wis. (AP) — Viola Krahn was a winner on the 3-meter diving board at the U.S. Masters Indoor Diving Championships. She had no competition. She's also 90.

"I'm only diving against my own record now," said Krahn, of Laguna Hills, Calif., who trains for and travels to national and international meets, like last weekend's Masters.

Her diving career began in 1920, when her family joined the Los Angeles Athletic Club. She won the Junior National Diving Championships in 1922, 1923 and 1924, as well as some swimming championships.

She stopped competing in 1924 when she married her coach, Fred Cady, later an Olympic diving trainer. She said she gave up diving to take care of the household because that's what women did back then.

"I could have tried out for the Olympics in 1924," she said. "I have a regret now that I didn't push myself to do it."

In 1978, when she was 77, friends persuaded her to dive again. She placed second in her first meet that year, and has taken top honors ever since.

Krahn says she has no secret to her longevity and vitality. She follows no special diet, eats red meat, loves vegetables, and adores chocolate and ice cream.

She never smoked, but says that had nothing to do with health concerns.

"I thought boys wouldn't want to kiss me if I smelled like smoke."

## Vying for the Olympics

Malone leads Sun Devil track contingent trying for Barcelona bids



One in a series of profiles of ASU athletes who are candidates to compete in the summer Olympics in Barcelona, Spain.

Arizona State track and field consistently has to fight against the toughest competition in the nation. Their competitors at the upcoming Pac-10 championships, as well as the NCAA finals, will push the Sun Devil athletes to the limit.

But for some, the training, dedication, and hard work won't stop there. Some are pursuing an Olympic dream.

Leading the way for the Sun Devils will be senior Maicel Malone, who already has had some Olympic experience as an alternate on the 1988 team. Malone, regarded as one of the best 400m runners in the world, owns nine All-American recognitions, five NCAA individual championships, 10 Pac-10 championships, two World University Games gold medals, and a gold medal at the 1991 Pan Am Games.

In addition, Malone's milestones also include seven school records, two Pac-10 records, holds the indoor 400m collegiate record, and recorded the second fastest time in the 400m for American women of all time.

Malone, who is currently suffering from an injury, has not practiced for a few weeks, but looks to return to the track shortly to begin her training for the Olympic Trials.

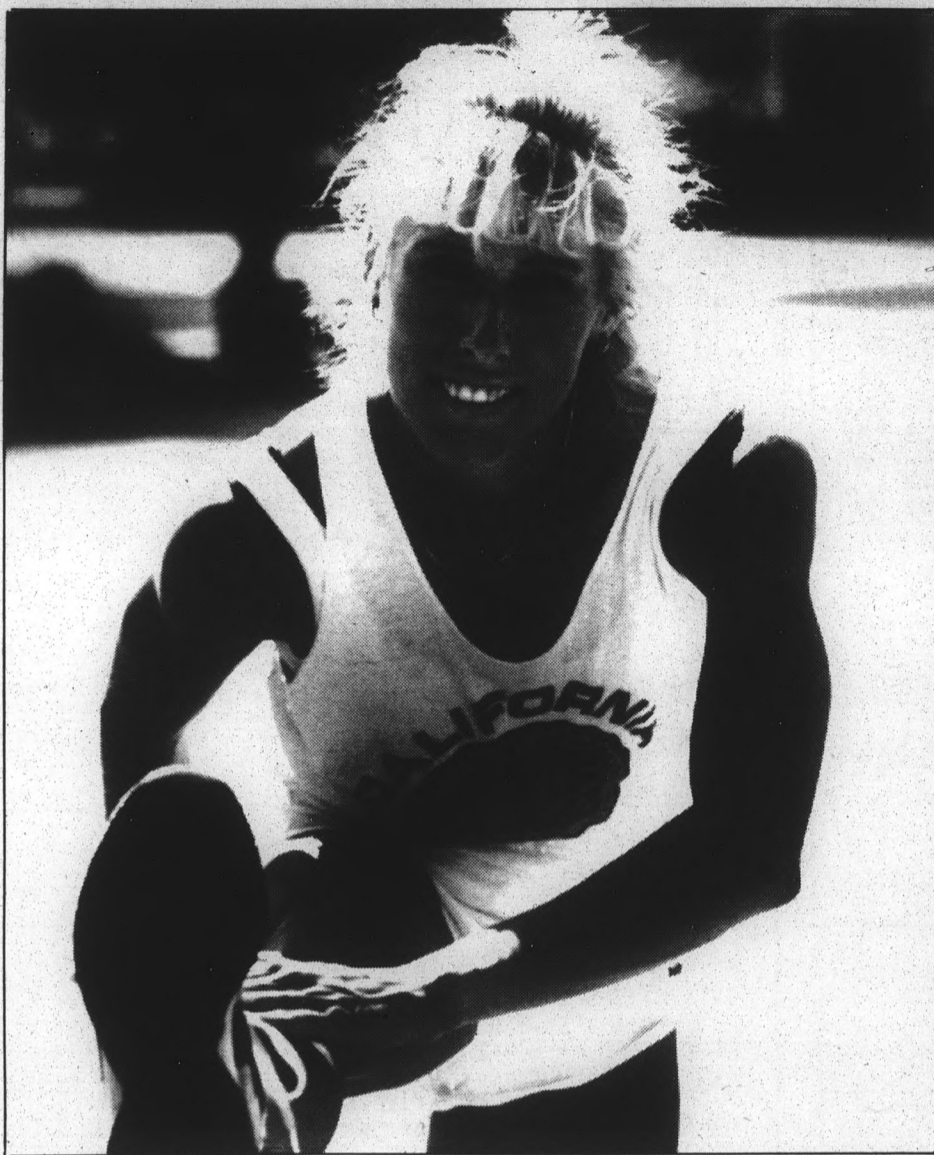
Another senior who has a shot at the Olympic team is shotputter Shane Collins. Collins, a two-time All-American and NCAA and Pac-10 champion, has already thrown 65-9/4 this year and according to track coach Tom Jones, will need a throw of 68 or 69 to be considered.

Collins, who just recently was drafted by the Washington Redskins as the 47th pick in the second round, was misquoted as saying he will pass up the Olympics for the NFL, according to assistant coach Ed Gorman. Collins stated that he would skip the Olympics only if the team that selected him demanded it.

"The Olympics takes a great deal of mental and physical preparation and it will be up to Shane and the team (Redskins) to decide what he will do," Jones said.

Collins' situation places him on the bubble, but will continue to train for the Pac-10's and the NCAA's.

Another ASU athlete in a similar situation is sophomore All-American pole vaulter Nick Hysong, whose vault of 18-1 a week ago was not only good for the Olympic trials, but good enough for the school record.

Hysong will need a jump of at least 19 feet to make the team, and with his stringent work ethic, might have a shot at reaching that height.

Also recently qualifying for the trials was senior LaShawn Simmons, who went 13.29 in the 100m hurdles last weekend. Simmons, a multi-purpose athlete on Jones's squad, will hope to use her versatility when it comes time to put in the extra effort needed to beat out her tough competitors.

For fellow senior Tracy Mattes, who got involved with track because of a bet with her brother, a spot on the Olympic team would be a tremendous accomplishment, and with her blazing 400m hurdles times, a definite reality.

Mattes, who has broken the school record in that event twice this year so far, has recorded the fastest collegiate time in the nation and the third fastest time in the world.

"Even though my times are really good, I still can't take anything for granted," Mattes said. "I'm just going to keep practicing so that I can be in the best shape possible when the time comes."

The final Sun Devil Olympian is junior Ime Akpan, who is already a lock, having secured a spot in the 100m hurdles for Nigeria. For Akpan, traveling to Nigeria and changing her workout will be first

priority.

"It is definitely going to be difficult changing coaches," she said. "I'm going to try to get my workout schedule from my coach so I can go in prepared."

Akpan was the 1991 All-African Games 100m hurdles champion, and also might have a shot at a 100m dash if she can improve on her 11.99 time she has run so far this season.

Former Sun Devil Lynda Tolbert, a big winner in this year's Sun Angel Track Classic in the 100m hurdles, also has a strong chance at the Olympics. Tolbert had a big victory over former Olympian Jackie Joyner-Kersey, and her performance at Olympic qualifying events around the world this year has been outstanding.

Tolbert, who is a volunteer coach for ASU, has the second fastest time in the nation and this mark should also add to her stock.

"Things look good for me and if I stay healthy, I should be able to do it," she said.

Strangely enough, if everything were to pan out, there could be three Sun Devils all competing in the 100m hurdles — Simmons, Tolbert, and Akpan.

In action last weekend at the prestigious Penn Relays, the ASU quartet of Lisa Hale, Simmons, Tesra Bester, and Akpan broke the school record in the shuttle hurdle relay, finishing second to LSU.

## Cuban defector fitting in well as minor leaguer

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP) — Rene Arocha was a baseball hero in Fidel Castro's Cuba until he left it all behind last summer when he walked away from his teammates at a Miami airport.

Now Arocha is just one of hundreds of players in the American minor leagues looking for a break.

As he embarks on his dream of pitching in a free land, he patiently awaits the call that will again put him on the mound before tens of thousands of screaming fans.

"There is a tranquility here, of being able to do what you want to do," Arocha said through Spanish-interpreting teammate Jose Fernandez. Both play for the Triple A Louisville Redbirds of the American Association.

"In Cuba, he had to ask permission to do anything, even get a cup of coffee," Fernandez said. "You have to wait in line to do everything in Cuba, because they don't have very many things there."

Arocha defected on July 11, moments before departure of a plane that would have carried him back to the communist island nation. Arocha had just met with his father for the first time since he also had defected a dozen years earlier.

Arocha (pronounced Ah-ROW-cha) and the Cuban National team had been traveling to Tennessee to take on the U. S. National team and were in Miami on their way back to Havana. Arocha's father flew from Tampa to Miami to see his son during the stopover.

The player said he then disclosed his plan to defect.

"I told him when he got to the airport," Arocha said "He was very happy. I left with the clothes I had on. Everything else I left on the plane."

The 26-year-old Arocha explained that he had the idea for two or three years, but wanted to wait for the right time. He would have liked to have left through "official channels," and taken his mother, daughter and sister with him.

But because of his celebrity status, Arocha said the government wouldn't have allowed it.

"He wasn't scared and says he didn't fear retribution against his family because other people had defected and nothing had happened to their families," Fernandez explained.

Arocha was signed by the parent St. Louis Cardinals as a non-drafted free agent on Nov. 21. He worked out with the Cardinals until the last week of spring training, when he was sent to the Redbirds' minor league camp.

Redbirds pitching coach Mark Riggins said Arocha has "major league stuff" and just needs to become a little more consistent from game to game.

Arocha is 2-1 for the Redbirds, with an ERA of 2.65. He has allowed five earned runs in 17 innings while striking out 17 and walking seven.

Riggins said the language barrier has been difficult, but Arocha is a quick study visually and an eager learner.

Arocha has a "major league" average to above-average fastball, Riggins said. His pitching repertoire also includes a good slider, curveball, changeup and forkball.

Although he would like to play in the major leagues, Arocha has little knowledge of American baseball.

## Gowell, Tapper named Sun Angel athletes of year

Senior volleyball player Mindy Gowell and senior swimmer Richard Tapper have been named Female and Male Athlete of the Year by the Sun Angel Endowment Foundation.

Gowell, a native of Portage, Mich., completed her ASU career by garnering third-team GTE Academic All-American honors and All-West Region second-team recognition. Gowell, who was on the GTE second team for 1990, recorded 1,260 kills for the Sun Devils, fourth-best in school history, and 1,365 digs, which ranks second on the Sun Devils' all-time list. Her 555 kills in the 1990 season is a school single-season record. A year ago, Gowell played for the North squad in the U. S. Olympic Festival.

Gowell carries a 3.87 grade point average as a sociology major.

Tapper, of Invercargill, New Zealand, helped the ASU men's swim team to a 14th-place finish at the NCAA Championship this season with a fourth-place finish in the 500 freestyle. Tapper also was 12th in the 200 freestyle and helped the Sun Devil 800 freestyle relay team place third at the NCAA's. Tapper already has earned All-American honors in 1990 and 1991 and has been named academic All-America four consecutive years.

Tapper, a physical education major in pre-med studies, has a 3.85 GPA and was named the 1992 top senior student in exercise science. Both athletes will be honored at a banquet held at the Phoenix Country Club tonight at 7:30.

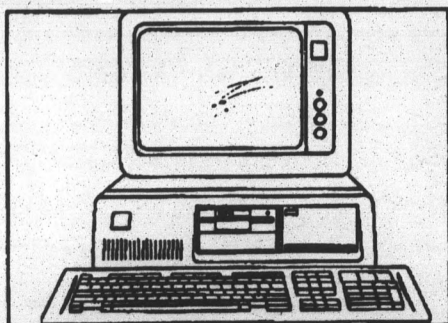

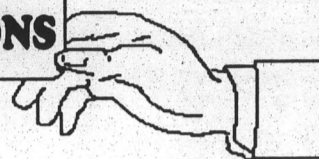
