Airport incompatible with ASU East, Coor says

Potential site at Williams AFB 'wouldn't work'

ASU President Lattie Coor responded negatively Wednesday to a governor's study that identifies Williams Air Force Base as one of two sites that could be used for an international airport.

Coor said an international airport at Williams would not be compatible with plans to locate a third campus of ASU — ASU East — at that site.

"Just as it wouldn't work to have ASU Main smack up against an airport the size of Sky Harbor (International Airport in

Phoenix), so, too, is there a scale that would not be consonant with the campus itself (ASU East)," Coor said.

Don Meyers, chairman of the Arizona Partnership for Air Transportation, said: "Although no one has committed to an actual site, the governor's study named two areas which would be good locations for an international airport, and they are south of Casa Grande and Williams Air Force Base."

Coor said, "That would not fit what the campus should be. We understand that air traffic is part of Williams base and there is a substantial compatibility with the general

plans that have been discussed as a reliever airport."

However, Coor said he does foresee the development of a smaller airport at the defunct Air Force base.

Jane Siddoway, an administrative assistant to the APAT chairman, said wherever the proposed international airport is located, its goal would be to grow to the size of Sky Harbor International Airport.

"The idea is to start out small, but to have the capabilities and enough land mass to compete with Dallas-Fort Worth and Las Vegas (international airports)," Siddoway said.

Tempe Councilman Joseph Lewis said he is in favor of creating freight-style airports

that could eventually develop into passenger airports.

"I just think we're shortsighted if we don't start planning for an international airport for the future. We have to do this now," Lewis said.

APAT Executive Director Jean-Marc Eloy said that the landing strips at Sky Harbor Airport, which are 10,600 feet in length, will be too small to handle the 777-type jet airliners that will be used in the future. He added that a new international airport would stretch the strips to 14,000 feet in length to accommodate the planes of the future.

"Arizona is in an area that could really

Official proposes increase in workloads for faculty

23 additional minutes per week touted to create 'efficiency'

A legislative budget official told a committee of the Legislature Wednesday that increasing faculty workloads would generate funding needed to raise faculty salaries to the level of other state's universities.

John Lee, associate director of staff for the Joint Legislative Budget Committee, told the State Senate Appropriations Committee during university budget hearings that the average faculty teaching load was 7.8 hours a week during the 1992 spring semester.

Lee did not elaborate on how the proposed change would generate new funds. One potential scenario would be eliminating faculty who become unnecessary by the increased workload, freeing up funding that could be applied to pay equity.

The Legislature's budget committee has proposed a pay raise for all state employees — including those on state campuses — by about 2.5 percent. It recommended no money for faculty pay equity.

Adding an average of 23 minutes a week per faculty member for teaching would increase efficiency by 5 percent, Lee said. That would generate money to bring faculty salaries up to market value, he said.

Sen. Stan Furman, D-Phoenix, said even if funding for fac-

ulty market equity is raised through heavier workloads, other university employees will still have problems.

"I would like to express my concern for not having extra funding that was requested by the universities to bring non-faculty employees up to parity with state employees," Furman said.

"We're not doing anything in the JLBC's or governor's recommendations to bring them up to parity with other state employees."

Lee responded by saying that tuition waivers are available to university employees.

"You've got to consider one little factor," he said. "University employees are getting tuition waivers, along with their children.

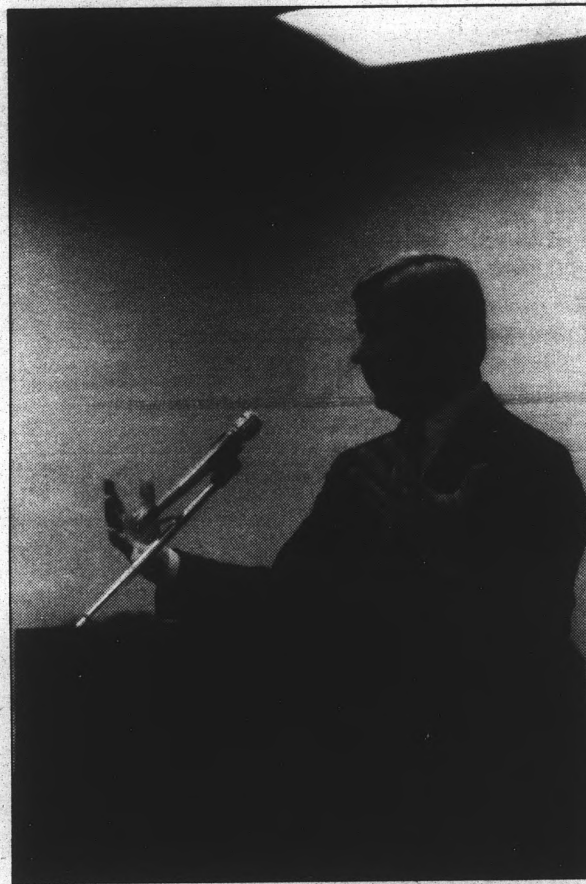
"If you have two children, the savings would be \$2600. They have these intellectual benefits."

Sen. Larry Chesley, R-Gilbert, said faculty workers at the public universities are not part of the state's personnel system, and their salaries are low because of university management.

"They have their own system," he said. "It's a management problem at the university, not a management problem at the state level and certainly not at the Legislature."

Sen. John Huppenthal, R-Chandler, said he believes that spending more time teaching than doing research earns faculty less.

Police arrest suspect in gas dispute shooting

Phoenix police on Wednesday arrested a man wanted in Tempe for shooting and killing a Tempe man last month after an argument over who was first at a gas pump.

Peter Gunther Koernig, 18, was arrested by Phoenix police, transferred to Tempe and charged with second-degree murder and attempted second-degree murder in the shooting death of 41-year-old Robert Sims. Tempe police spokesman Tom Ryff said.

Sims was being driven home by a co-worker, 20-year-old Tinika Jones, when Jones stopped at the Circle K at 40th Street and Southern Avenue to fill the car with gasoline. As he was filling up the tank, Sims apparently got into an argument with a man police believe to be Koernig.

Rape suspect facing 20 charges

Transient arrested in Phoenix

A man police believe to be responsible for a recent rash of sexual assaults committed in the Valley was arrested Wednesday and slapped with 20 felony charges.

Robert Earl Kroncke, a 25-year-old transient, faces charges in Phoenix, Mesa and Tempe for sexual assault, sexual abuse, kidnapping, attempted kidnapping, aggravated assault, and auto theft, Phoenix police detective Leo Speliopoulos said.

Speliopoulos said Wednesday that Kroncke and his brother were placed in custody Tuesday evening by undercover officers of the Phoenix Police Department's Special Assignment Unit.

"They were working in an undercover capacity in the area, looking for that suspect vehicle, and lo and behold

there it was at 10th Street and Indian School," Speliopoulos said.

Kroncke was inside Pancho's Mexican Buffet, 1003 E. Indian School Road, with his brother — who police refused to identify — and two female companions. Speliopoulos said that when the foursome emerged from the restaurant, Kroncke and his brother were taken into custody.

After being questioned by police, Kroncke's brother was released and Kroncke was booked at 4:15 a.m., Speliopoulos said.

Speliopoulos declined to comment on whether any weapons were seized from Kroncke, but Kroncke reportedly used weapons in his attacks, including a knife and a gun.

Kroncke's 20 felony charges include three for attacks in Tempe, six for attacks in Mesa, and 11 for attacks in Phoenix.

Kroncke will be charged with one count of sexual

benefit from another airport primarily because the Los Angeles airport is land-locked and cannot expand," Eloy said.

The Arizona Partnership for Air Transportation is a private organization which receives grants from cities to promote business within Arizona.

Randy Gross, an assistant to the

mayor of Tempe, said the city has given \$51,000 to APAT over the past four years, including the \$12,750 recently approved by the City Council for this year.

"The international airport will benefit the entire state, and they (Valley cities) recognize that," Meyers added.

Jones said the man followed them home from the gas station and fired two shots into her car as she pulled into the driveway of one of Sims' neighbors. Sims was hit in the chest and declared dead on arrival at Scottsdale Memorial Hospital-Osborn.

Phoenix police were informed of Koernig's whereabouts by an anonymous tip through their silent witness program, Ryff said.

Ryff said the caller notified police last night that Koernig was staying with friends at the Ann Arbor apartment complex, 8028 S. Central Ave. Police set up a surveillance and arrested Koernig about 2 p.m. Wednesday as he tried to leave.

Ryff said Koernig will appear before a judge Thursday morning.

assault, one count of aggravated assault and one count of kidnapping for an attack on a 17-year-old girl in Tempe, Tempe police spokesman Tom Ryff said.

The attack occurred Jan. 31, when Kroncke allegedly forced the girl into a small white pickup at knife point. She was cut on the hand with the knife and forced to perform oral sex on the man.

The most recent attack linked to Kroncke occurred Monday when a 14-year-old Horizon High School girl was abducted at gun point, pistol-whipped and raped, Speliopoulos said.

Tribal leaders, lawmakers confront mutual concerns

PHOENIX (AP) — Indian leaders, lawmakers and Arizona's governor gathered Wednesday in a ceremonial and historic joint meeting that had its roots in confrontation.

Three years ago, federal agents raided five tribal gaming operations in Arizona. The then-U.S. attorney said the operations were illegal because Arizona and the tribes hadn't signed compacts as required by the federal Indian gaming act.

The action brought together the leaders from many of Arizona's tribes in an effort to figure out how to respond.

It also led to renewed negotiations with the state and ultimately to gaming compacts with 13 of Arizona's 21 tribes.

During the ceremonial session, speakers repeatedly described it as a historic meeting representative of a new spirit of understanding and cooperation to resolve mutual concerns, instead of the adversarial practices of the past.

Controversial crime bill gets go-ahead from Senate

PHOENIX (AP) — A Senate committee has approved a far-reaching juvenile crime bill, including a controversial provision allowing violent juveniles to be automatically transferred to adult court.

The Senate Judiciary Committee passed the bill at the conclusion of a marathon meeting late Tuesday. The bill passed 7-1 despite the opposition of at least three committee members to the automatic transfer of violent and repeat juvenile offenders to the adult system.

"In 99.9 percent of the cases, the people who need to be transferred already are being transferred," argued Sen. Stan Furman, D-Phoenix.

Aide in Kerrigan attack applied for police job

PHOENIX (AP) — The man who admits to driving the getaway car in the attack on Olympic figure skater Nancy Kerrigan applied for a job a police officer a few weeks before the attack.

The *Arizona Republic* said Wednesday police department personnel records show that Derrick Smith, 29, applied for a job late last year.

Police department spokesman Leo Speliopoulos said he knew nothing of Smith's application.

The newspaper said records show that Smith submitted an application in November, took a written test in early December, and was notified Dec. 13 that he had scored among the top applicants.

Serbs agree to withdraw weapons NATO allies discuss deadline for ending siege

BRUSSELS, Belgium (AP) — NATO allies tentatively agreed today to set a deadline for Bosnian Serbs to lift their murderous siege of Sarajevo or face air raids, diplomats said.

Bosnian Serbs earlier agreed to withdraw their heavy weaponry beginning Thursday at noon from around the Bosnian capital and put it under U.N. monitoring, said the U.N. commander in Bosnia, Gen. Sir Michael Rose.

It was unclear whether it was a tactical maneuver by Bosnian Serbs to avoid the threat of air strikes. Dozens of cease-fires have been agreed to and broken in the 22-month-old conflict.

Under the U.S.-French plan tentatively agreed on, Serbs will be told to remove with-

in 10 days the more than 500 heavy guns that for nearly two years have been pounding Sarajevo. If they didn't comply, NATO would carry out the strikes. The plan was reached after months of indecision by the alliance.

NATO was expected to ask U.N. chief Boutros Boutros-Ghali to decide when to begin the 10-day waiting period, according to diplomats.

Diplomats were consulting with their capitals late today for final approval, diplomats said.

A senior NATO diplomat said earlier that Canada remained concerned about possible reprisals against its 2,000 peacekeepers in the region and was insisting on safety guarantees

for its soldiers if air strikes were carried out.

Britain and Greece were hesitant about air strikes. But in Athens, Greek government spokesman Evangelos Venizelos said that Greece, which traditionally has been sympathetic toward the Serbs, wouldn't oppose a decision to carry out NATO air strikes.

Britain's stance remained unclear. In London, a spokesman for Prime Minister John Major said on condition of anonymity today that when Britain's final position emerges, it likely will have the support of all 16 NATO members, in indication Britain will go along with air strikes.

Britain has the most peacekeepers in Bosnia after France.

Mideast agreement settles critical issues

CAIRO, Egypt (AP) — Yasser Arafat and Shimon Peres, Israel's foreign minister, reached agreement Wednesday on some critical security issues that have stalled the Israeli-PLO peace accord.

Peres said he and the PLO chairman had settled "five or six of the most complicated issues" involved in turning over control of the occupied Gaza Strip and West Bank town of Jericho to the Palestinians.

But Peres added, "We didn't complete our work." The final deal is to be negotiated between Arafat and Israeli Prime Minister Yitzhak Rabin.

The two sides were haggling over control of the crossings from the autonomous Palestinian areas to Egypt and Jordan, security for Jewish settlers who remain in Gaza and how much land around Jericho would be ceded to Palestinian control.

Among the issues left for Arafat and Rabin to decide was the size of the Jericho area, Peres said.

Still, Arafat said the new pact was "a very important step to implement the agreement from paper to the ground."

"We can say that Palestine — and the name of Palestine — has

returned to the map of the Middle East," he added.

Peres and Arafat initialed a 21-page document, complete with maps, at a ceremony hosted by Egyptian President Hosni Mubarak at the end of three days of talks.

As the two were speaking in Cairo, members of the World Jewish Congress in Washington got word of the agreement from President Clinton.

"Another big milestone has been achieved today," Clinton said. Egyptian Foreign Minister Amr Moussa had worked late into the night to smooth over last-minute disputes between Peres and Arafat, amid reports Peres was seeking approval from Rabin.

The negotiations since Monday have included at least seven sessions between Arafat and Peres. Neither has given details on the talks.

The Israeli withdrawal will clear the way for limited Palestinian self-rule in the territories. It was to have begun Dec. 13 according to the PLO-Israel peace accord signed in Washington in September.

Uri Savir, the chief Israeli delegate, described the negotiations as a process of working "sentence by sentence, word by word."

Emboldened by Zapatistas, peasants carry on protests

TEOPISCA, Mexico (AP) — Peasants seized city hall and blocked the main road into this southern farm town, carrying on the protest begun by rebels last month, only without the arms and the uniforms.

Similar protests were reported Tuesday in other communities across impoverished Chiapas as well as in two other states. Peasants demanded the resignations of their leaders and echoed rebel demands for land, economic help and better treatment of the nation's minority Indian population.

They said the uprising on Jan. 1 by the rebel Zapatista National Liberation Army has emboldened them to stand up against the rural bosses who have controlled their people for centuries.

"The Zapatistas really opened our eyes," said Jose Juan Garcia Ruiz. "They're peasants and Indians just like us."

The uprising and resulting political backlash threatens the hegemony of Mexico's ruling Institutional Revolutionary Party, or PRI, which has held power since it was founded in

1929. The PRI's control of the countryside through the rural bosses has long been a pillar of the nation's monolithic political system.

Unlike the Zapatista rebels, the peasants in Teopisca and other communities in upheaval are not armed and do not dress in the rebel uniform of dark clothing, ski masks and red bandanas.

Teopisca's peasants seized the city hall on Monday, charging that Mayor Hector Alvarez, a member of the PRI, was corrupt. They blocked the Pan-American Highway leading to the town on Tuesday with stones.

Alvarez denied the charges and said the protests are simply election-year politics.

Teopisca is on a list of 21 allegedly corrupt municipalities the Chiapas state Council of Peasant and Indian Organizations recently presented to President Carlos Salinas de Gortari.

In Las Margaritas, one of several towns rebels occupied briefly, residents are asking the governor to remove the mayor, whom

they accuse of wrongfully imprisoning peasant leaders.

There were similar protests underway in the towns of Huehuetan, Cacaohatan, Tuzantan and Mapastepec, none of which the rebels occupied, the official Notimex news agency reported Tuesday.

Several hundred miles away in the border city of Tapachula, peasants have blocked the community's center for two weeks, accusing banks of charging excessive interest for farm loans.

The demonstrations haven't been limited to Chiapas state.

Opposition protests, initially begun to protest the PRI's disputed wins in state elections last November, are beginning to heat up in the state of Mexico, which surrounds Mexico City on three sides.

More than 90 peasants blocked the main highways Tuesday, demanding land and financial assistance.

Peasants in the Tabasco state, which borders Chiapas on the north, have threatened to

join the Zapatista rebels unless the state oil monopoly pays for damages to their homes and fields from a weekend explosion in a natural gas line.

In Chiapas state, more than 100 people were killed in early January when the army was sent in to quash the uprising. A cease-fire has been in effect for nearly a month.

The rebels and the government both say talks seem close, but no time or place has been announced.

Salinas, meanwhile, is trying to demonstrate that his government is working to ease the poverty and injustice in Chiapas.

"We will not abandon you," Salinas told Gov. Javier Lopez Moreno and 13 mayors from the southern state during a meeting Tuesday at his official residence in Mexico City. His comments were carried in a communique released by the president's office late Tuesday.

Off to fantasyland

Now here's a great idea. How can the state Legislature raise the money to pay for that pesky salary equity the faculty at ASU, NAU and UofA keep demanding?

Simple! Just increase the amount of work faculty members do, pay them a fair amount for their original workload, and fire a bunch of 'em to break even.

Such seem to be the dreams of the Joint Legislative Budget Committee, personified by its presenter to the Legislature, Associate Director of Staff John Lee.

The proposed plan, it seems, would increase the average teaching load of professors by 5 percent, an increase (based on the average teaching load of 7.8 hours) of 23 minutes a week.

For the suspicious, the assumption here seems to be that if faculty teach another 5 percent, the Legislature can approve the "reduction" of ASU's staff by 5 percent — and use the monies saved to fund the equity.

Yes, by increasing workloads, firing their friends and still paying lousy wages, the faculty at Arizona's universities will be content.

Wait a minute. That doesn't sound right.

Oh, no wonder. We forget the copious perks — faculty members receive tuition waivers for themselves and their children. A value of up to \$2,600 if a faculty member has two children, for example.

Of course, the JLBC and Lee are neglecting to mention the fact that nearly every other major university offers such a tuition waiver. So what's to keep a faculty member from saying, "Hmm, if I transfer to USC, Duke or Stanford, I receive a value of \$80,000 in tuition waivers?" Yes, and receive a fair salary as well. Hmm.

Yes, in order to keep the State of Arizona's university system competitive in attracting and maintaining faculty, the Legislature is looking at maintaining their traditional policy: who cares?

Oh, but the JLBC/Lee Theory could have even better applications at ASU! Heck, why not apply the Lee Theory to the overworked, underpaid classified staff as well?

Sure, tack on 2 unpaid hours a week to the staff, to boot. After all, the universities have been getting fat and lazy living off the sweat and blood of our industrious legislators.

All right, Lee. Let's tune in to Planet Earth.

The pay situation at Arizona's universities is ridiculous, both for staff and for faculty. Playing fun fiscal games of "let's hide the funding" may be cute, but it's not going to solve the problem.

Raise faculty — and staff — pay to compare to national levels. Now.

Or watch as the faculty and staff recognize the situation, and leave ASU, NAU and UofA like the sinking ships they'll have become.

BOMBING THE SERBS ?



Vegetarians unfairly targeted, judged by meat-eating society

"And, I don't eat meat, because I'm, uh, a veterinarian," says a ditzzy blond on a recent Home Box Office commercial. And I am yet to hear the end of it from my friends.

Yes, I belong to that radical group that seems to challenge everyone else's eating habits without saying a word.

I'll admit it, I am a vegetarian.

I've decided to give up eating out. It's not just for financial reasons, although that will be an added bonus. I'm just tired of everyone looking at me like I'm a freak because of my order.

My typical restaurant experience includes me pouring through the menu to find something without meat or dairy products in it. Usually, I end up choosing the sandwich that comes with the most vegetables on it and ordering it without meat. This brings hysteria to the servers and cooks, offering to replace roast beef with chicken or turkey or tuna — do I really want it plain?

No one can figure out why I special order everything I eat, but to me it's just a routine of eating out. I'm not trying to harass whoever got unlucky enough to serve me, I'm just making sure what I pay for fits my diet.

For some reason, it's socially acceptable for people to abstain from anything from red meat to alcohol for religious or health purposes, but becoming a vegetarian based on animal rights or environmental morals is like joining the Communist Party.

It probably stems from people feeling threatened by being told not to eat what they eat.

I don't care what anyone else eats; I just expect the same courtesy.

I don't give sermons at every meal explaining where that dead grilled cow came from, how it was raised, the chemicals that were pumped into it, or how immoral and inhumane it was to kill it.

I don't explain how the fat and cholesterol from that steak

will plug up your arteries, cause you to spend thousands on a bypass or make you more susceptible to many forms of cancer.

I don't rant and rave about how many acres of the rain forest were chopped to raise the cow that steak comes from or how many people could have been fed with the grain it took to keep the cow alive.

I'll admit there are a few vegetarians who do give sermons at every meal they eat. This behavior is admittedly obnoxious. 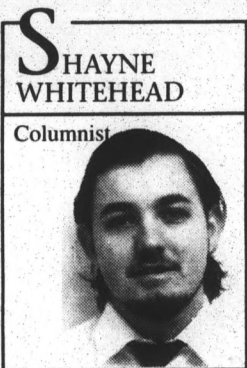
Since then, millions of people have followed his example, seeking publicity through foolishness. From dangerous publicity stunts to ludicrous lawsuits, here are some examples.

Jewish attacks on Farrakhan limit future cooperation

Much has been said during the last two weeks regarding anti-Semitism. Clearly, it must be understood that those who are called Jews have taken the word Semitic to refer exclusively to them.

For the purposes of this article, this so-called reference will remain intact; however, it must be properly understood that the word Semitic, as defined in the Webster's Dictionary refers to any of a group of Afro-Asiatic languages, and a Semite is one who is a member of a people whose language is Semitic. Some Semitic languages are Arabic, Hebrew, Aramaic and Ethiopic. Other Semitic people are Arabs, Babylonians, Canaanites and Phoenicians.

The Anti-Defamation League of B'nai B'rith has for a long time been the champion of civil rights for the Jewish people. Along with its history of uncovering bigotry directed against its people, it has also held great power and influence over black organizations. Take it or leave it. I have more proof than I need.

Jews assisted in the formation of many black civil rights groups, the most notable of them being the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP). Many black leaders have their names smeared, if they hold views that are inconsistent with the views of the ADL. Many black leaders have been limited in their effectiveness because they said something that the Jews didn't like. (I am using the ADL and the Jewish people interchangeably and intentionally because I haven't heard any Jews denouncing the ADL, so I will take their silence as silent consent of their methods and activities.)

Jesse Jackson is still trying to win the hearts of Jewish people after the comments he made regarding "hymietown." Because he was not strong enough to stand up to the onslaught, he has now been relegated to the role of sound bite specialist and rhyme reciter for the evening news.

Former Mayor of New York David Dinkins went to Israel and prayed at the wailing wall and cried for the holocaust victims. Did that help him get re-elected? No! The Jewish community never forgave him for the death of Yankel Rosenbaum, a Jewish student who was stabbed to death in the Crown Heights section of Brooklyn.

Former Atlanta Mayor Andrew Young, former Los Angeles Mayor Bradley, Nelson Mandela, the African leader, and even George Bush who was usually a great friend of

Israel and the Jews, have been called anti-Semitic. There is much behind the two stories listed above, likewise much that led to the title anti-Semite being placed on those men, however time and space are limited. Suffice it to say that the Jewish people have a long memory, except when it is convenient for them to forget.

You see, now the charges of anti-Semitism are hurled at people simply with the desire to stifle opposing viewpoints. Jews call on Blacks to denounce other Blacks, but rarely are Jews called on to denounce other Jews nor whites to denounce other whites. If there have been any cases of Jews denouncing Jews, I would like to know of them. I'm not saying that there aren't any cases, but I have looked and haven't seen any. Maybe they should try to denounce the Jews who assisted the Nation of Islam in writing and researching "The Secret Relationship Between Blacks and Jews." In that book, the amount of Jewish activity in the slave trade in which over 250 million blacks were murdered is explored in depth. But that wouldn't work because their own Jewish scholars spoke and documented their role in the slave trade. Another article for another time.

Let's look into the ADL's activities. Many of their activities include spying, and keeping information on all types of organizations — white, black, Arab, and even other Jewish groups who are not consistently aligned with them. Is this the American way? Let us deal with this.

Last April, an ADL spy network was uncovered in San Francisco. This network had compiled lists and dossiers on American people, and some organizations. It was said that the information in these files was sent to Israel and South Africa. Eventually, the trail led to a man named Irwin Suall who was the director of the "fact finding" department of the ADL in New York.

Abraham Foxman, national director for the ADL, released a statement saying this information was used only to fight bigotry. So I guess it never made it to Israel and South Africa because bigotry is alive and well, unless the information was used for other purposes.

Eventually, the ADL, plea bargained and got the charges dropped. In exchange, the ADL contributed \$75,000 to a reward fund to fight hate crimes and to teach cultural diversity and antidiscrimination. How philanthropic. Not a bad way to avoid charges of treason, and not to mention the possible civil liberties violations.

A report compiled by the ADL entitled, "Mainstreaming Anti-Semitism: Legitimation of Louis Farrakhan" reported that the ADL has an "information bank" on the Honorable Louis Farrakhan going back many years, including incidents of pressuring mayors who had awarded Farrakhan the keys to their cities.

The ADL has tried to stop Nation of Islam Security from getting grants for stopping crime in drug infested neighborhoods. The ADL report has done this time and time again to organizations who are not ideologically lined up with them.

Now think about how quickly certain black leaders lined

up to denounce Louis Farrakhan and the Nation of Islam, the most notable of them being Jesse Jackson.

The report of the ADL said that it would aim for the leaders in the black community who "have long been envious of Farrakhan's ability to reach large enthusiastic black audiences."

Farrakhan just recently, about two weeks ago, spoke in front of 12,000 black men who pledged to clean up their communities and stop killing each other, 6,000 were turned away for lack of space. Isn't this what everyone wants? Get tough on crime time, right? Why wasn't that in a full page ad in the *New York Times*?

Twenty-one thousand in New York, 19,000 in Los Angeles, 53,000 in Atlanta. These are the crowds that Farrakhan speaks to. Not to mention audio and video cassettes.

In addition, Farrakhan's "Stop The Killing" talk delivered on Dec. 18 at the Jacob Javits Center in New York was played on C-SPAN several times, and so was the press conference held a week ago. Farrakhan beaming all over the planet asking black people to stop killing each other and strive for self-determination and unity. Is this what the ADL and others who try to malign him and the Nation of Islam fear?

Farrakhan is talking and somebody is listening.

To compare the Honorable Louis Farrakhan to Hitler, as has been done in the past, is wicked, to say the least. Hitler was responsible for the death of 6 million Jews, Farrakhan has murdered no one. To make

that comparison, and compare black leaders and scholars like Kwame Ture and Leonard Jeffries to the people who were with Hitler and aided him in carrying out his diabolical plan is an evil and poisonous lie.

Conspicuously missing from the pages of newspapers across the country and televised newscasts was the statement in which Farrakhan said, "I am calling on the black community to alienate this spy organization (ADL) and establish proper relationships with Jewish organizations and leaders who are not as self-centered, bigoted and malicious as the ADL." You see, he touched on the possibility of working with other Jewish groups, and if he is supposed to be anti-Semitic, it wouldn't sound right. Deception. There are several sides to every story.

The Jews are looking for the messiah. He has come. It is written in the pages of the Bible that Jesus said, "If Abraham was your father, then you would do the works of Abraham." It is interesting, why don't the Jews use scriptures to justify their positions as opposed to relying on lies and deceptive tactics?

There is the possibility of a working relationship between blacks and Jews, but it cannot be established unless the slanderous and libelous campaign of the ADL is exposed and abandoned so that the light of truth and understanding may shine where the veil of lies and deception once laid.

Women, men not treated equally at ASU, dean says

Despite progress in women's status at ASU, the former chairwoman of the Commission on the Status of Women said people must change their attitude toward women if more progress is to be made.

"We need a cultural transformation where people accept and understand women's desires to work in a supportive environment where they fully share in the power within that environment in a way that's non-threatening," said Anne Schneider, dean of the College of Public Programs.

Schneider, who completed her one-year term in January, said ASU has progressed in the last year, but more work is needed. Women's conditions at the University are similar to other national institutions, she said.

"There's been an increased awareness of these issues and we're moving closer to actually doing something about them," she said. "But these are very deep issues. They're very long-term kinds of issues. They're not things that you can just make a rule and fix."

Despite progress, Schneider said women experience backlash from their male counterparts when they move up to the same level of power as men.

"Women have left this University because of chilly climates and hostile environments," she said.

About 12 to 15 female employees and students have talked to her in the past five years, complaining that they were treated unfairly because they were women.

"They're very fearful of going forward because those who they feel are involved in creating this hostile environment have a great deal more power than they do," she said.

Taking action is difficult because the accused men can defend themselves by claiming they aren't making a hostile environment or that the accuser is paranoid. Also, she said

men say a women is being "put up" by someone who doesn't like the accused.

Women also suffer in pay, she said. A 1992 survey showed associate professors are paid \$1,600 less than male counterparts. She called for more research to determine the causes of the difference.

"It's possible that the performance ratings of men at the associate professor level are different, but I don't think that that's the case," she said.

Barbara Hoks, the commission's new chair, said the commission's goals are to continue working on the major issues pursued in the last two years: lower salaries for women, gender equity, family medical leave, child care

and campus safety.

She also serves on the ASU Council of Hispanic Women and previously belonged to University Career Women. Hoks' goals are to increase awareness of the commission's goals and push for action on outstanding issues.

"I feel that I am knowledgeable about the issues that women have here on campus, and I can bring forward a lot to the commission as a result," she said.

Hoks, who has served on the commission for two years, said she looks forward to serving as the chairwoman because the University has made progress in women's issues.

The commission is preparing to release a progress report in the next few weeks.

Baseball ravages Southern Utah

The 10th-ranked ASU baseball team destroyed Southern Utah in a doubleheader at Packard Stadium Wednesday afternoon 22-5 and 14-3, in a final tune-up before traveling to No. 2 Florida State for a weekend series.

However, the Sun Devils (7-1) lost the services of utility-man Todd Delnoce for the season during the sweep, putting further pressure on an injury-weakened middle infield.

Delnoce, who has played second base, shortstop and left field effectively this year, tore his medial collateral ligament and knee cartilage after being taken out while trying to turn a double play during the fourth inning of the second game.

"It's really a shame," Coach Jim Brock said. "Here's a guy who works for four long years to get his chance, and had a chance to be a factor this year. There's no harder worker, no greater guy, or no greater team man."

"It would be a heart-breaking thing, but I can't see it being anything else."

Women host Stanford, Cal Devils search for 1st conference victory

The saga of the ASU women's basketball team resumes as the Sun Devils welcome the California Golden Bears at 7:00 tonight and the Stanford Cardinal (13-5 overall, 6-3 Pac-10) at 7:00 Saturday night.

ASU has a chance, however, to pick up three victories this weekend if the Pac-10 decides to rule last Saturday's game against Washington State a forfeit. WSU canceled because of an illness that struck the team. It could be ASU's first conference victory of the season.

First up for the Sun Devils are the Golden Bears, also a struggling Pac-10 team. They are 7-12 overall, 1-8 in the Pac-10, and attempting to end a five-game losing streak. One other time this season the Bears endured a five-game skid, only to end it against the Sun Devils. ASU went to Berkeley on Jan. 15 and lost 79-69, thanks to Cal's 52 second-half points. Cal currently leads the series with ASU 11-9.

Cal's star center Ingrid Dixon, the Pac-10's No. 2 rebounder and her team's No. 1 scorer, is out with a right-knee ligament tear. She had surgery on Feb. 4 and is expected to miss three weeks of play. Senior Louise Nelson has filled in admirably for Dixon,

averaging 11.8 points and 5.0 rebounds in four starts.

Cal head coach Gooch Foster is in her 15th season with the Bears, and has led her team to the NCAA tournament three of the last four years. She has her team averaging 75.6 points per game, but when they allow their opponents to score more than 75 points, the Bears are 0-12.

Stanford arrives with a No. 14 national ranking and a string of 115 consecutive weeks in the AP top 25 poll, a run that stands second only to Tennessee. December of 1987 is the last time that Stanford has been ranked as low as they currently are, at No. 14.

The Stanford program is rooted in tradition, and coach Tara VanDerveer is a large part of that. While at Stanford, she has accrued over 200 victories, six straight NCAA Tournament appearances, five Pac-10 titles, three Women's Final Four appearances and two NCAA titles. Stanford's home court advantage contains some big numbers, too.

Against ASU, the tradition is just as rich, because Stanford has defeated ASU in 12 of the last 13 meetings, and lead the overall series 17-7. In addition, Stanford's first victory over ASU this season was a 113-61 blowout, their second highest scoring output of the season.

Tennis faces tough UCLA team at home Davidson looks to avenge loss to Chi

Today the ninth-ranked Sun Devil women's tennis team takes on UCLA at 1:30 p.m. at the Whiteman Tennis Center.

"UCLA was pre-ranked at 11th, but they play much better than that," said coach Sheila McInerney. "Pac-10 teams are always strong."

Included in the Bruins' line-up are sixth-ranked Jane Chi and first-year player Diana Spadea. Chi is predicted to play the No. 1 singles court, competing against ASU's Kori Davidson. All-America Davidson lost to Chi at the Pac-10 Indoors in Seattle 6-3, 6-1 in January.

"I feel confident now," said Davidson. "I know how she plays. Last time I was rushing. I expected her to play better. Last time I had it in my head that she would beat me, but not this time."

Basketball hits Bay Area

The ASU men's basketball team opens the last stretch of a four-game road trip tonight in the Bay Area against No. 19 California, and prepares to face Stanford Saturday in Palo Alto, Calif.

The Sun Devils (11-7 overall, 6-3 Pac-10) come off a split with the Washington schools last week, getting by Washington 59-53 and falling 73-70 to Washington State. ASU is in a three-way tie for third place in the conference.

The Golden Bears (15-4, 7-2) sit alone in second place in the conference after handing losses to Oregon and Oregon State last week and soundly defeating Cal State Northridge (93-63) on Monday in Berkeley's Harmon Arena.

Cal is powered by point guard Jason Kidd, last year's Pac-10 Freshman of the Year, and forward Lamond Murray, who is the Pac-10's leading scorer with 23.9 points per game. Kidd averages 10.1 assists per game, while the 6-foot-7 Murray pulls down an average of 8.3 boards per game.

According to ASU coach Bill Frieder, both players are potential 1994 NBA lottery picks if they decide to enter the draft. He said the tall Cal lineup will present difficulties for the Sun Devils. Besides Murray, the Golden Bears start 6-foot-10 forward Michael Stewart and 6-foot-11 center Ryan Jamison.

"Our kids are confident they can play with them," Frieder said. "As coaches we have a lot of match-up problems with their big lineup. (Dwayne) Fontana did a great job on Murray in Tempe. Now if we put Fontana on Murray, it means (6-foot-5 forward Ron) Riley has to guard a 6-10 inside player."

However, ASU enters the contest 1-0

against the Golden Bears this season, having slipped past Cal 63-60 on Jan. 15 in Tempe. The dramatic win was secured by Stevin "Hedake" Smith's 42-foot shot at the buzzer.

Stanford (13-5, 6-3) added two wins to its record against both Oregon schools last week and faces UofA tonight before hosting the Sun Devils Saturday. The Cardinal share third place dibs with both teams.

Stanford coach Mike Montgomery said the Cardinal — who beat Cal on Jan. 20 and came within five points of beating then-No. 1 UCLA on Jan. 27 — will need to be in top form for ASU.

"We have to be ready to play," he said. "We've gotten ourselves in the position where we probably can't sneak up or at least surprise anybody anymore."

The Cardinal dropped a 78-67 verdict to ASU on Jan. 13 in Tempe. All five Sun Devil starters — Smith, Mario Bennett, Riley, Isaac Burton and Fontana — scored in double figures. Montgomery complained afterward that Stanford had trouble with ASU's pressure defense, turning the ball over too much.

"I don't know if we got it solved," Montgomery said of Stanford's turnovers against pressure defenses. "But, we have to solve it Saturday. If they (the Sun Devils) do a better job than we do and we make some poor decisions, the same thing could happen, but I think we'll play better."

Junior forward Andy Poppink, the team's second-leading scorer, poured in 24 points and collected 16 rebounds against Oregon State Saturday. Another Stanford weapon to contend with will be freshman point guard Brevin Knight, who ranks in the Pac-10's top five in steals (second/3.2) and assists (fifth/5.3).

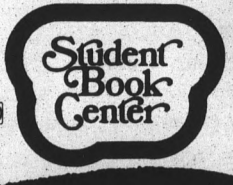
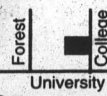

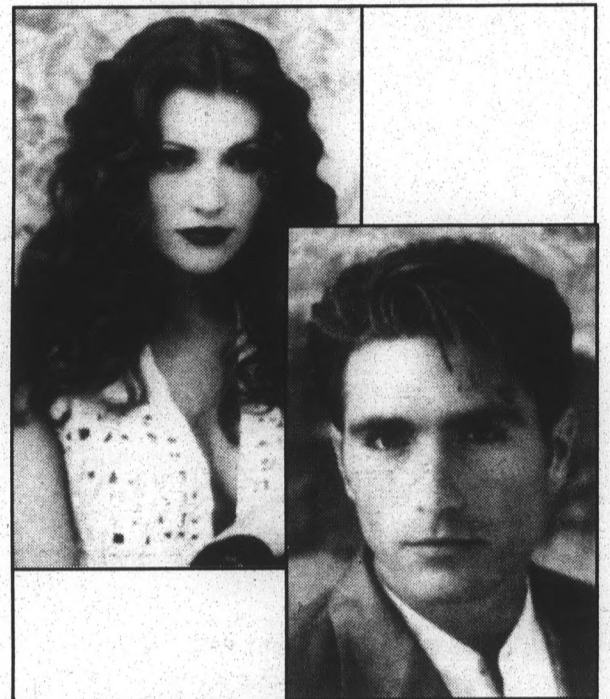

Right fielder Scott Shores was the other story of the doubleheader, as the senior punished the Thunderbirds (0-2) with a double, triple and two three-run home runs for a career-high eight RBIs in the first game. He also scored four times in the opener.

It was Shores' third two-home run game of the season and the most RBIs in a game by a Sun Devil since Tommy Adams drove in nine runs against UNLV on May 2, 1990. He is now batting .455 (15 for 33) with seven homers, 17 runs and 15 RBIs in the season.

"People around me say that I've always had the talent, it's just that I've never put it together," he said. "I think this might be the season where I put everything together."

Shores had a chance for the cycle, but could only homer to right-center and ground into a fielder's choice in his last two at-bats. He knew he needed a single to complete the feat, but let his power get away from him.

"On the second home run, I was trying to single to the opposite field."

Ryan shopping for better defense

TEMPE, Ariz. (AP) — There isn't much fault to find with the Phoenix Cardinals offense, but the defense needs a pass-rushing lineman and a great linebacker to play alongside Eric Hill and Ken Harvey, coach Buddy Ryan said Wednesday.

Six days into the job, Ryan said he had received at least 30 calls from free agents who want to play for him, and he predicted that the Houston Oilers would make cornerback Cris Dishman a transition player in order to keep him from joining the Cardinals.

He also said he will spend the rest of the week in Indianapolis at the annual NFL scouting combine but hasn't yet scheduled minicamps or a summer program.

Ryan left Houston after one year as defensive coordinator to become a head coach again and run the Cardinals as general manager.

This week, he hired Houston linebackers coach Ronnie Jones as his defensive coordinator. The Cardinals still need a secondary coach, and Ryan said he was trying to get permission from the Oilers to talk to Tom Bettis about taking that position with Phoenix.

Ryan, who turns 60 next week, belied his reputation as a curmudgeon, relaxing in an Oilers-blue sweater while cracking jokes and providing insight into the team he took over Thursday, his renowned "46" defense and his plans to

acquire talent in the face of a new system of free agency.

One free-agent linebacker is asking \$3 million a year to change teams, he said.

Of estimates that the Cardinals will have between \$7 million and \$17 million of room when the salary cap kicks in, Ryan said, "At the rates these guys are asking, we might only get 15 players."

The Cardinals are 32-64 in the six years since they moved from St. Louis, but Ryan, their fourth coach in Arizona, said Phoenix ranks among the most desirable locations in the NFL in the eyes of players and coaches.

The perception of the lifestyle and the team's potential may make it possible to attract players for less money than they would ask from another franchise, he said.

"If you had your choice of going to Cleveland or coming here, which would you pick?" Ryan said.

Another potential cost-cutting measure is to carry fewer players. The NFL allows teams a 53-man roster, with another five inexperienced players on the practice squad. Ryan said he could do with fewer.

"I'd rather have one great player than 10 guys who can't play," he said.

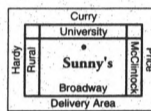
Ryan said he will handle the draft in April and court free agents, allowing assistant general manager Bob Ackles to negotiate contracts with Phoenix players.

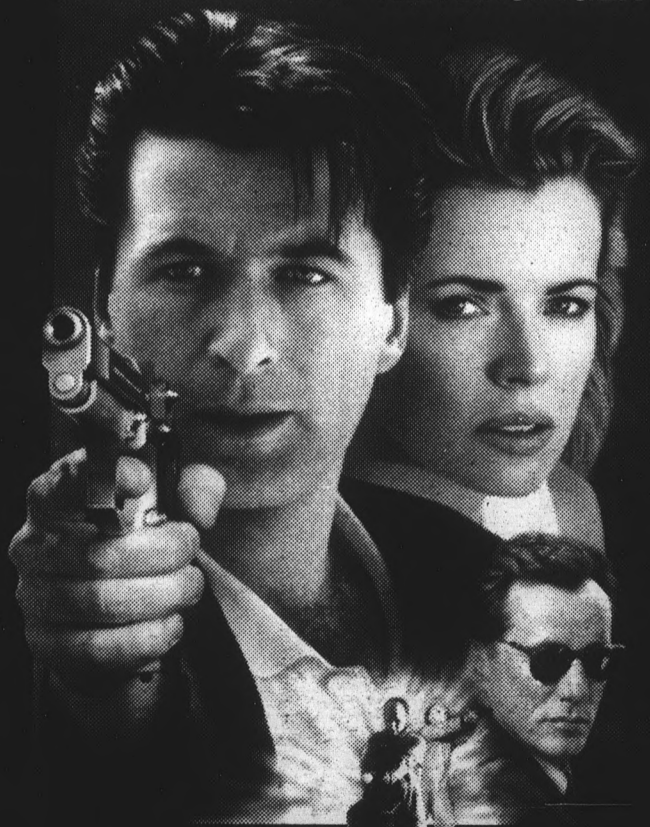

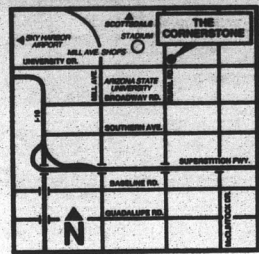
