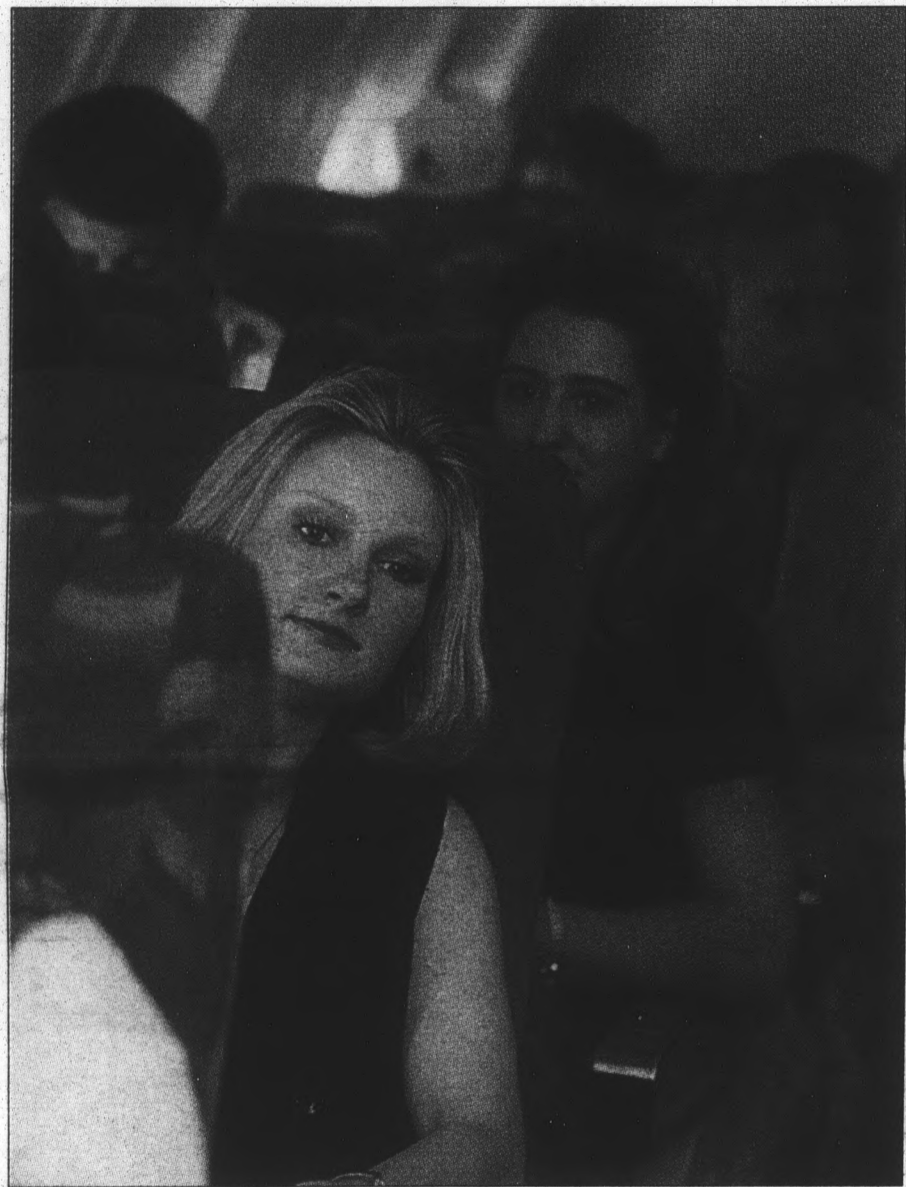

## Cops arrest students in insurance scheme

An ASU police tip-off to Tempe police foiled a plan by ASU students to fake a car theft and collect insurance money, as well as some cash stored in the car.

A parking attendant and two ASU students were arrested Saturday after all three were found to be involved in the scheme, police said.

Police arrested Joshua Finesilver, an 18-year-old freshman broadcast major, and Matthew Maher, an 18-year-old freshman engineering major, on charges of theft. Kerry Ann Horsfall, a parking attendant for

Central Parking Systems at Fifth Street and Ash Avenue, was arrested on a charge of conspiracy.

Police said Finesilver and Horsfall planned to steal Horsfall's 1996 Geo Prism, which contained an unspecified amount of cash Horsfall collected while at work that day, Tempe police Lt. Jay Spradling said.

Maher was brought into the plan at the last minute to drive Finesilver to the car and help him dispose of the it, Spradling said.

Parking attendants for Central Parking Systems reportedly keep money in their car until it is deposited.

## ASU scientists prepare for Mars Pathfinder landing

With 80 days left until the Mars Pathfinder reaches its destination, an ASU researcher prepares to uncover what secrets are blowing in the dusty winds of the Red Planet.

Ronald Greeley, regents' professor of geology and project co-investigator, said he is testing the different components of a windsock on the craft that will measure how the Martian atmosphere interacts with the surface.

The instrument is a component of the Pathfinder's imaging system connected to the spacecraft's lander. A smaller rover — called Sojourner — will explore the area

around the ancient Martian flood plain Ares Vallis after Pathfinder touches down on July 4.

"Right now we're testing the camera which will take pictures of the windsock," he said. "We're interested in how the wind blows the sand on Mars."

The camera will start making observations of the instrument, which consists of three 3-inch windsocks attached to meter-long metal arm, every hour during the Martian daytime as soon as Pathfinder enters the atmosphere.

Images then take 20 minutes to reach Earth, where scientists will begin to sort through the data.

## AZ Senate passes bill limiting scope of Prop. 200

An initiative passed by Arizona voters by a two-to-one margin in November has lost out to a higher authority.

The Arizona Senate passed a bill yesterday that implements the controversial Proposition 200.

However, Proposition 200 supporters say the bill destroys the original intent of the initiative.

House Bill 2518, which passed today in the Senate by a 17-13 vote, was intended to implement the passage of the proposition.

But the bill, unlike the proposition, allows the use of marijuana for health purposes only if the Food and Drug Administration recognized its medicinal value.

The original wording of the proposition allowed doctors to write prescriptions for certain patients to obtain marijuana and other Schedule I drugs, including crystal methamphetamine and heroin.

"This bill guts Proposition 200," said Sam Vagenas, campaign consultant for the proposition. "This vote will go down as one of the most notorious in Arizona's history. It turns patients into criminals."

Gov. Fife Symington plans to sign the bill, said Doug Cole, the governor's spokesman.

"The fact of the matter is that the state said (medicinal marijuana) was legal while it's still against the law nation-

ally," Cole said.

Sen. George Cunningham, D-Tucson, said he voted against the bill because it "undermines the voters, who understood that the bill would mean that people with terminally ill diseases like cancer and AIDS would be able to seek some relief by using marijuana."

Barnett Lotstein, special assistant to the Maricopa County Attorney's Office, said the county "was very pleased that a reasonable and rational bill passed through the Legislature."

"Proposition 200 had a lot of unintended consequences," he said.

Lotstein said proponents of the proposition created "slick commercials that were deceptive" to voters.

"It mentioned that 'marijuana and drugs like marijuana' could be prescribed for certain diseases," he said. "What they didn't mention was that 'drugs like marijuana' included LSD, heroin and PCP."

The banning of other Schedule I drugs is a legislative smoke screen, Vagenas said.

"Marijuana use will be gravely affected," he said.

Lotstein said that a poll sponsored by the Walter Cronkite School of Journalism and Telecommunication after the election showed that 60 percent of those quizzed believed the proposition should be outlawed and 85 percent thought it should at least be modified.

Other polls on the subject have showed the proposition

still has very strong support, however.

Referring to the ASU survey, Lotstein said 87 percent of those polled thought marijuana shouldn't be prescribed without FDA approval.

"(Maricopa County Attorney) Rick Romley has insisted that medication be tested before it is used," he said.

That would mean FDA approval.

FDA spokeswoman Rosario Vior said the group has not approved the use of medicinal marijuana because they haven't received an application.

She said the responsibility "is not on us, but whoever produces the product."

Vagenas said there will be action taken against this bill.

"We're going on a full-court press. We're planning on lawsuits based on the Voter Protection Act when the bill becomes law," he said. "The work of three years has gone down the drain."

A federal judge in California, which also passed an initiative allowing prescriptions for marijuana, barred the government from prosecuting doctors who prescribe it.

"The Legislature of Arizona has taken a very responsible course of action — requiring FDA approval of any drug before it is declared to be medicine — as required by law," said Bob Weiner, spokesman for the White House National Drug Policy Office.

Police said the theft happened about 12:25 a.m. Saturday at Fifth Street and Ash Avenue. Maher and Finesilver, who had duplicate keys for the Prism, went to steal the car.

But police were watching.

Tempe police learned about the theft after an anonymous source tipped off ASU police, saying the crime would occur Friday or Saturday night in the Chase parking structure.

ASU police passed the information on to Tempe police, who set up surveillance on the vehicle and watched as Maher and Finesilver stole the car, said ASU police Sgt. Alan Clark.

Police arrested the two near McDuffy's sports bar. Horsfall was later arrested after she called to report her car stolen.

Finesilver had planned to either take the vehicle to a chop shop to be destroyed or take it out in the desert and burn it, Spradling said. He added that Finesilver and Horsfall planned to split both the money she had collected at work and the insurance money. Police do not know what money deal had been made between Finesilver and Maher.

Spradling said police have information that the three were involved in a prior incident in Mesa.

Geology researcher Rob Sullivan said in the project proposal that the experiment will allow direct measurement of the wind on Mars for the first time.

"(It) can measure wind speed close to the surface where wind energy is transferred to potentially mobile materials," said Sullivan, designer of the windsock.

Greeley said the stereoscopic camera — designed and built in part by UofA

researcher Peter Smith — will also help determine where Sojourner travels.

Greeley said the images obtained by the instrument will help generate several research papers by himself and other geology graduate students.

Scientists will continue to receive data from Pathfinder for up to two years. After that, its batteries and other components will begin to wear out.

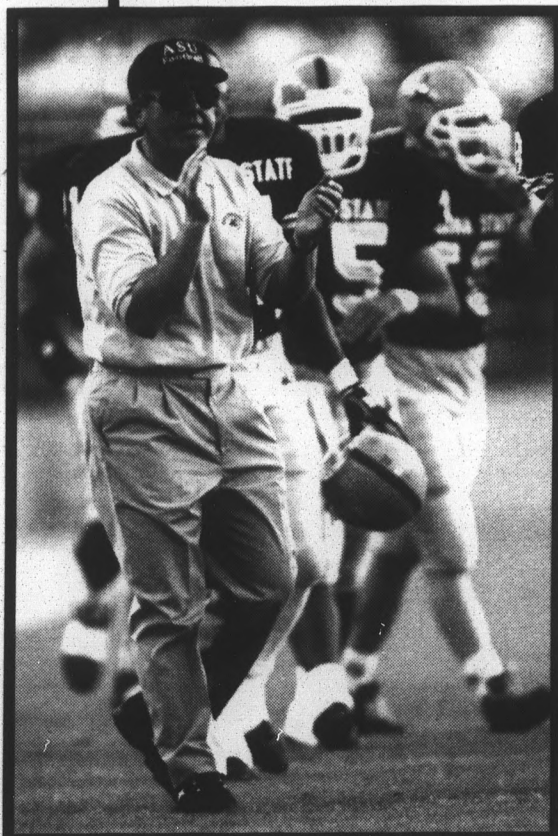

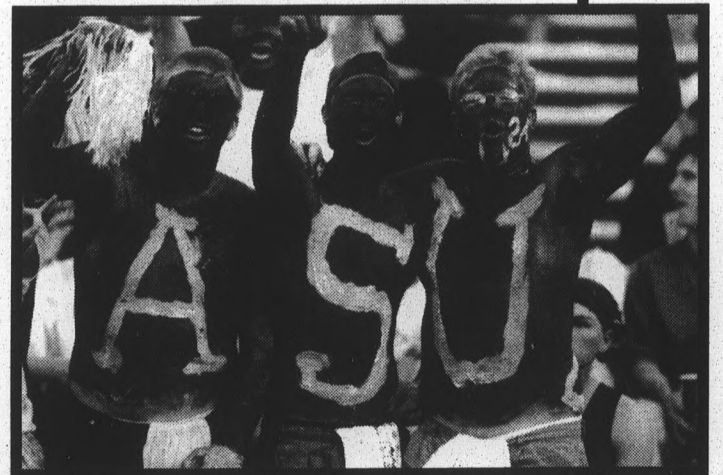

## FBI lab produced inaccurate testimony

WASHINGTON — FBI crime lab agents produced flawed scientific work or inaccurate testimony in major cases such as the Oklahoma City bombing, the Justice Department inspector general said Tuesday. He recommended discipline for five agents and transfer of the original whistle-blower.

But Inspector General Michael Bromwich concluded in his report that agents of the world-renowned crime lab did not commit perjury or fabricate evidence.

Attorney General Janet Reno said the damaging findings already have been raised by defense attorneys in 13 court cases and "there has been no change in the outcome of the case." Hundreds of prosecutions that used lab evidence remain under review.

Despite "significant instances of testimo-

nial errors, substandard analytical work and deficient practices," the lab is still "capable of performing its mission," Reno said.

Bromwich also criticized lab management and the qualifications of agents in its explosives unit, where he recommended that only scientists be employed. He emphatically endorsed the FBI's current effort to get the lab accredited by outside experts for the first time.

In a typical criticism of work on high-profile cases, Bromwich blasted lab supervisor David Williams' 1993 testimony that a 1,200-pound urea nitrate bomb damaged New York's World Trade Center. FBI chemists found no explosive residues at the site.

Williams' testimony was "inaccurate and incomplete" and appeared to be "tailored to the most incriminating result," Bromwich said.

The FBI accepted nearly all of Bromwich's recommendations. To avoid any conflict, the Justice Department, not the FBI, will rule on Bromwich's proposals to punish agents and transfer the chief whistle-blower, scientist-agent Frederic Whitehurst.

"There was a clear and serious failing in not adequately detecting these problems and, in many instances, not moving swiftly enough to resolve them," FBI Deputy Director Bill Esposito said. "The improvements ... must and are being made."

FBI Director Louis Freeh is looking for an expert outside the FBI to head the lab and the bureau will hire more scientists, Esposito added.

Bromwich said Whitehurst, who triggered the investigation, should be transferred because his "overstated and incendiary" allegations have poisoned his relations

with other lab workers.

"The problems and deficiencies that Whitehurst brought to our attention are extremely serious," Bromwich said, "but they are a far cry from the rampant and intentional wrongdoing alleged by Dr. Whitehurst: ... Perjury, fabricated evidence, obstructed justice and suppressed exculpatory evidence."

Bromwich said those deciding Whitehurst's future "must weigh the significant contributions he has made" and avoid discouraging others from reporting misconduct.

Whitehurst predicted, "Ultimately, they will put me back into the laboratory."

"This is a beautiful day," Whitehurst said in an interview. "That report essentially validates all the major concerns I had. It's the beginning of the correction process" and outside oversight of the FBI.

## Pilgrim's camp engulfed by fire in Saudia Arabia

MINA, Saudi Arabia — Fires driven by high winds tore through a sprawling, overcrowded tent city Tuesday, trapping and killing pilgrims gathered for a sacred Islamic ritual. The official death toll was 181, but witnesses said at least 300 died.

Saudi Arabia said more than 800 pilgrims were injured in the fire, which witnesses blamed on exploding canisters of cooking gas.

Most of the dead were Indians, Pakistanis and Bangladeshis, many of them elderly, witnesses told The Associated Press. Some were trampled to death as pilgrims fled the fire on the plain outside the holy city of Mecca.

"Men panicked and ran in every direction," said an Indian pilgrim who spoke to The Associated Press by telephone and identified himself only as Irfan. Helicopters dropped water from above while civil defense workers used firetruck hoses on the flames.

Hundreds of thousands of pilgrims were stranded after the fire destroyed an estimated 70,000 tents, which the pilgrims use for shelter in the final days of the Hajj. Civil defense forces from Mecca and nearby Jiddah and Taif rushed to the scene, handing out tents and supplies.

Prince Majid bin Abdul Aziz, the royal family's representative in Mecca, ordered that new tents be provided to all pilgrims affected by the fire, Saudi television reported Tuesday.

King Fahd, the Saudi monarch, expressed his sorrow for the victims and their relatives and friends. "I ask that God gives them patience to cope," he was quoted as saying by the Saudi Press Agency.

The fire erupted shortly before noon as Muslims gathered for the hajj, or pilgrimage, were beginning to move to Mount Arafat, where the Prophet Mohammed delivered his final sermon in the seventh century.

There, 2 million Muslims will stand together in prayer Wednesday in the climax of the pilgrimage to the

Muslim holy sites.

The hajj has been the scene of several recent tragedies, including the deaths of 1,426 people in a 1990 stampede.

Less than an hour before the fire began Tuesday, security forces had thrown up a cordon around the entire plain, closing it to new arrivals to stop further overcrowding, witnesses said.

The fire was started by exploding gas cylinders, which pilgrims use for cooking in the tents, they said.

Fanned by winds of nearly 40 mph, it swept across the plain and quickly spread chaos through the camp, crammed with row after row of white tents.

"There was chaos everywhere. ... Panic spread

through the camps as fast as the fire," said a newspaper reporter at the encampment who spoke on condition of anonymity.

The injured were carried away on stretchers and in people's arms, while others wearing white robes for the pilgrimage fled along smoke-filled alleys between the tents.

Witnesses said they had seen hundreds of bodies. Saudi newspaper reporters who visited the site said at least 300 had died, most of them trampled underfoot in the pandemonium.

Three hundred fire engines helped battle the blaze, and helicopters dropped water, witnesses said. The fire was brought under control in about three hours.

## Brain-damaged cop who emerged from comalike state dies

CHATTANOOGA, Tenn. — Gary Dockery was locked inside a mute, motionless world for eight of his 43 years.

The brain-damaged policeman broke through that silence

just once: Last year, for several fleeting hours, he emerged from his comalike state and thrilled relatives with unbridled conversation, recalling camping trips, his green jeep and the names of his horses and telling his sons, 12 and 20, he loved them.

On Tuesday, Dockery died.

An autopsy was scheduled to determine the cause of death.

In 1988, Dockery was shot point-blank by a drunken man angry at police for reprimanding him for making noise that bothered his neighbors. The officer fell into a stupor.

Then, on Feb. 11, 1996, he stirred and started talking. Doctors couldn't explain it. And although he later grew more alert and was able to speak short phrases, Dockery returned largely to silence.

On Tuesday, the paralyzed officer, who had to be fed intravenously, was bathed and dressed as usual and was waiting his turn for physical therapy when something went wrong.

Susan Shwalter, a spokeswoman at the Alexian Village of Tennessee nursing home on Signal Mountain, about 10 miles from

Chattanooga, said only that he was "in distress." He was taken to a hospital and pronounced dead.

"I still had hopes we'd be able to help him," neurologist Bruce Kaplan said Tuesday. "But his death may prove to be a relief for Gary and his family. We'd never be able to give him back more than a fragment of his former life even if we had kept trying."

Dockery's family was said to be too distraught to speak with reporters.

In January, relatives said they were encouraged by what they called the small wonders that followed his speaking spree. Dockery had learned to operate a motorized wheelchair, which he moved by listening to a nurse's command and pushing a lever.

Doctors conducted brain tests and experimented with various drugs to reproduce or

understand why Dockery started talking, but the results were inconclusive. Dr. James Folkening, Dockery's physician, did not return calls Tuesday.

The catalyst for his burst of speech appeared to be a life-threatening case of pneumonia he developed. His family believed he overheard them in his hospital room discussing whether to allow his illness to run its course or risk surgery.

He started talking four hours later, which convinced them he should have the surgery and another chance for life.

They then said that if Dockery died, they were thankful for one last time to talk to him.

"We did have that one day," said his brother, Dennis. "It's a chance most people don't get. How can you not be happy about something like that?"

### Gutting of Prop. 200 questions democracy

It seems the powers that be in this desert habitat of ours are at it again. Arizona state senators passed a measure not only monkeying with the voter-approved Proposition 200, but also attacking the very spirit under which the law was penned.

On Tuesday, the Senate voted 17-13 to require federal approval of marijuana prescriptions before allowing seriously ill patients to purchase their smokable medicine.

Requiring licensed care professionals, i.e. doctors, to obtain a federal permission slip before they can prescribe marijuana borders on total lunacy. We can understand state officials raising concerns over radical, fringe doctors passing out dope indiscriminately. But the majority of men and women with the authority to scribble their illegible signatures on prescription slips will use the judgment and ethics bestowed upon them in medical school.

Senators' actions raise many questions about their confidence in modern medicine. For example, why should we trust or be expected to trust doctors for any medical procedure when state lawmakers view them with such contempt? If doctors cannot be trusted to carry out simple prescriptions (in the eyes of legislators), how can they be entrusted with the lives of surgery patients? Apparently, the 17 bipartisan members of the Senate believe we should not trust physicians with the responsibility of prescribing drugs.

Besides having one of Earth's most hostile climates, Arizona is widely known as a retirement haven for senior citizens. Unfortunately for them, seniors need more medical attention than, say, college students. Hence, state officials who should be ensuring an environment conducive to medical experimentation are actually approving measures that publicize legislators' perception of physician competence, or incompetence, as the case may be. This is not the only problem with the revisions, however.

Advocates of the originally-crafted proposition argue that senators are not just tearing away the will of the people of Arizona, but are also preempting the entire process by which voters are allowed to enact their ideas into law. In a democracy (a.k.a. rule by the people), what better group is there to implement laws than the people? Elected officials? Surely not.

If we gave one person the authority to do just about anything they wanted to the people, it would be a dictatorship. That holds true for a group (i.e. legislators) of people as well. If, in fact, the people have no real process to introduce and enact laws government should not even string the public along, making them — us — believe in a system that is nothing more than a cheap facade.



## Homosexual 'flaunting' is merely everyday expression for heterosexuals

It was a slow day at the amusement park where I worked two summers ago, so a 16-year-old colleague and I somehow started discussing homosexuality. When he asked me the standard "you're not one of them, are you?" I saw a rare opportunity to conduct an ultra-obtrusive sociological experiment.

"Well," I asked, "have you ever heard me discuss women?"

At that, he turned red, ceased eye contact and backed away, mumbling, "Oh God, Adam, how could you?"

A few minutes later, he was talking to a 12-year-old park guest; they were both laughing and he was pointing at me. The guest then approached me, said "Hey you," and made a limp-hand gesture in my direction.

Needless to say, I was shocked that my colleague would interact with a guest in such an inappropriate manner. I was not at all surprised, however, by his attitude.

Nor was I surprised by the reaction of a 40-year-old colleague when I continued the experiment during my break. "You people should crawl back into the toilet where you came from," she said.

It was enlightening to be able to walk a mile in someone else's shoes without incurring the blisters. As I exercised my freedom to end the experiment and return to my heterosexuality, I gained a new appreciation for the predicament faced by those who can't exercise that liberty.

Some say that homosexuals are unworthy of legal protection because, unlike ethnic minorities or women, they

can hide their "status." This ridiculous assertion ignores an obvious reality of human behavior.

As every healthy human knows, the emotion of love is the most powerful force in our daily lives. Even as I sit in my office trying to finish this piece, I am bombarded with love imagery: Michael Bolton is howling romantic drivel on the radio, the magazine on my desk is open to a perfume ad, and a fellow student is on the phone with her boyfriend.

The point is, "hiding" one's homosexuality means more than simply amusing bosses and colleagues with stories of an imaginary wife. It means laboring through life without being able to express, to all but a few people, some of the most fundamental personality elements. It often means forsaking the most natural of all desires in order to fit into a society that tells you your version of that desire is unnatural.

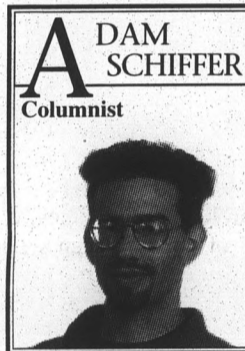
During the discussion that followed my summer experiment, someone said, "I don't mind homosexuals, but I hate when they talk about it and flaunt it." Heterosexuals take for granted the extent to which we flaunt our sexuality daily. Wedding rings, pictures on desks, personalized

license plates and answers to the question, "What did you do this weekend?" are so incorporated into our routines that we don't even realize that we are "flaunting" until we see equivalent actions by homosexuals.

If you are not used to being in the presence of homosexuals, then their so-called "flaunting" might make you uncomfortable.

Too bad. It is in everyone's best interest for society to accept the existence of all sexual orientations and appreciate the difficulty homosexuals encounter while doing things — such as talking about weekend activities — heterosexuals take for granted.

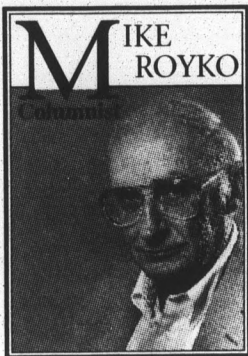

## Boredom in the courts is cause of mischievous acts

(Mike Royko is ill. In his absence, we are reprinting some old favorites. This column was originally published on May 3, 1978.)



It was a routine case in traffic court, except the policeman testified that the motorist used filthy language.

Then, according to a spectator, the judge peered at the motorist and sternly asked: "Do you know what happens to people who foul-mouth policemen?"

The motorist shrugged. "The police sometimes shoot them," the judge said. "And maybe more of them ought to be shot!"

The spectator was so shocked by the judge's words that after his own case was finished, he called us and indignantly protested the way the judge had talked.

We called the judge to find out if he was really encouraging policemen to ventilate citizens who swear at them.

"Yeah, I remember that case," the judge said. "I guess I shouldn't have said that. It slipped out. ... It was an uh, ober dicta."

A what?

"An ober dicta."

Is that Latin?

"Yeah."

What does "ober dicta" mean?

"I don't know."

I later checked a dictionary and found "obiter dictum," which indicates that the judge's Latin isn't much better than my own. It means "something said; saying."

Based on that, I guess the judge doesn't really want cops to shoot people who swear at them. He probably just likes to enliven his courtroom.

And I can't say I disagree with that. Most courtrooms, especially traffic court, can be a dull place.

I knew one judge who tried to wake everyone up in night traffic court by occasionally issuing a surprising ruling.

One night, a man showed up who obviously had been

drinking. He was charged with running a red light.

"How do you plead?" the judge asked.

The man mumbled something. The judge told him to speak up.

The man insolently said: "You don't hear too good, judge. I plead guilty."

The judge asked: "Don't you know it isn't smart to plead guilty?"

The man, still insolent, said: "So what? You wouldn't give me a break anyway."

The man's wife started to say something to him, but the man told her to shut up.

The judge said: "All right. I shall enter a plea of guilty. And here is my sentence."

"You shall be given into custody of the sheriff of this county, and on the 15th of the month, he shall cause a bolt of electricity to be passed through your body until you are dead dead dead."

The man staggered backward, his red eyes popped wide open and his jaw dropped. His wife gasped. Everyone in the courtroom sat up straight.

"Just for running a red light?" the man cried.

"No, for being dumb enough to plead guilty. Ah, but on second thought, I'll just fine you \$15 and costs. You are not worth frying. Go, and sin no more."

Nobody else became insolent in the courtroom that night.

Which reminds me of the most sadistic, cruel, mean and funny thing I have ever heard done in a courtroom. An elderly policeman told me the story. He swears it is true.

It happened many years ago, before policemen began living in squad cars, talking into microphones, using computers and taking themselves too seriously. One night, a paddy wagon brought a big, drunken steelworker into the South Chicago police station. He had been arrested for throwing several of his drinking companions through the window of a neighborhood tavern.

He was of Eastern European origin and apparently had anarchistic tendencies, because he bellowed at the room full of cops: "When we haf revolution, we going to take all you red-nose Irish bastards and shoot you by wall."

The desk sergeant, who wasn't too sober himself, said: "Book this man on disorderly conduct and high treason."

While papers were quickly filled out, the rest of the cops went upstairs, where there was an empty police court.

They took the steelworker upstairs to the courtroom. A detective was pretending to be a judge. Another became the prosecutor. Others became clerks, bailiffs and the public defender. Several more sat in the jury box. A few winos were brought from the lockup to sit in the spectators' seats.

The trial was held, evidence presented, and when it ended, the "judge" said: "I find you not guilty of disorderly conduct. But I find you guilty of high treason. I sentence you to be executed by means of electrocution as quickly as the sentence can be carried out."

They rushed the dumbfounded man out of the courtroom and to the lockup, where he was asked what he wanted for his last meal. Somebody ran out to an all-night diner and got a hamburger with fries for him.

As he ate, the lights in the cell blinked on and off several times.

"What's that?" he yelled.

"We are testing the electric chair," he was told.

When he finished the meal, they led him into the squad room, where they had rigged a large chair with wires. A detective had turned his collar around, so he looked like a clergyman. He loudly prayed over the steelworker, who began weeping.

They strapped him into the chair, and atop his head they place a bowl-like gadget they had taken off a lamp.

"Be brave, my son," the clergyman-detective intoned. "You will meet your maker any minute now." The steelworker began wailing.

At that moment, the door burst open and a cop rushed in, shouting: "Stop the execution! The governor has given him a reprieve!"

The next morning, he was taken before a real judge on the brawling charge. He immediately began babbling: "Last night I was in the electric chair ... the governor saved me ... high treason ... a thing on my head."

The judge sent him to the state hospital to be examined. When he got out of there, he resumed drinking in the neighborhood tavern. But from then on, he always went home after two drinks.

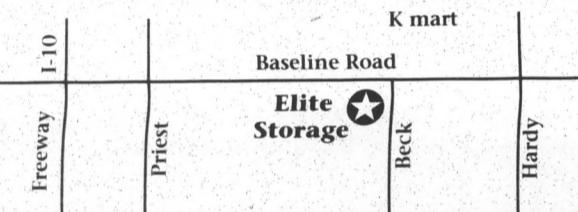

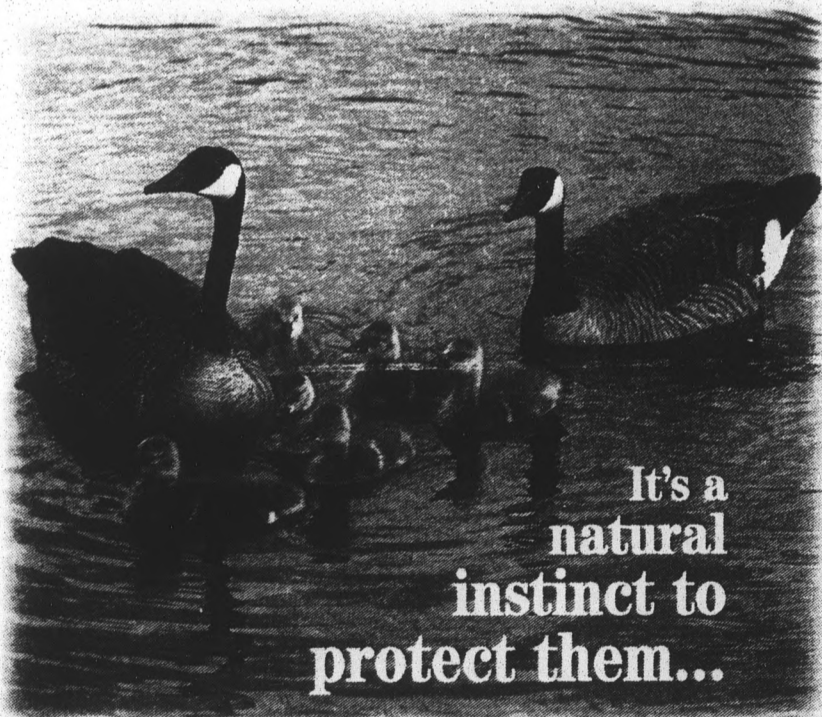

## Professor offers distinct view of religion's affect on science

Rather than squabbling about proving religious phenomena scientifically, religious leaders should remain focused on the aspects of religion that are impossible to prove, a visiting professor said Tuesday.

Steven Goldberg, a law professor from Georgetown University, presented material for a book he is working on to a crowd of about 60 at the ASU College of Law.

A graduate of Harvard University and Yale Law School, Goldberg is an expert on law and religion. He said his purpose in presenting his theory was to obtain comments on his ideas before publication of his book.

"I think it is a mistake for religious leaders to look at the Bible as a set of scientific hypotheses," Goldberg said. "My view is that religious groups should have the freedom to speak out, but my hope is that they would have a distinctive voice."

Goldberg said his arguments originated after learning that a group of religious leaders supported a ban on gene code patenting.

"Religious leaders might offer some limits to science," he said. "Instead of worrying about whether religion is scientifically provable, religious leaders should worry about what we should do."

Goldberg said science and religion each have their limits and strengths.

"I am anything but anti-science, but science can't do everything," he said. "I would hate to see it swallow up the distinctive perspective religion could offer."

Audience members questioned what Goldberg meant by "distinctive perspective."

Goldberg said he thought religion could provide statements about being human that science could not.

"I don't think I'm just the sum of my genes," he said.

## Man sentenced to wear sign reading: 'I'm a convicted thief'

GULFPORT, Miss. (AP) — As punishment for burglary, John Smith must stand on a street corner for three hours at a time carrying a sign that reads: "I'm a convicted thief."

Circuit Judge John Whitfield's three-day sentence to Smith last week was just his latest use of shame as punishment.

In October, he gave a man 20 years in prison and ordered him to send a \$1 check

every week for the next 10 years to the parents of a 4-year-old girl he struck and killed while driving drunk. On the check, the man must write that the payment is for "the death of your daughter."

Last month, Whitfield ordered a woman to wear a sign reading: "Selling prescription drugs is a crime; I'm a felon because I sold prescription drugs."



# Air Force officials go back to beginning to look for clues

EAGLE, Colo. — The search for a missing Air Force jet has been unsuccessful, so officials plan to look backwards for clues by re-interviewing witnesses and bringing in "fresh eyes" to re-examine evidence.

Tuesday was another frustrating day for officials, as ground searches of New York Mountain, where the plane is believed to have crashed, turned up no clues.

"We're going to keep working and doing the best we can," said Col. Denver Pletcher. "We're just not going to give up hope."

Despite the fruitless searching, Pletcher said he was sure that they were searching the right area.

There were no flights Tuesday. Instead, officials are focusing on analyzing data already collected, and forming a team to look for clues that might have been missed.

"We will not constrain anything the team does. We are asking them to take all of the evidence we've seen and ana-

lyze it anew," Lt. Gen. Frank Campbell said.

Capt. Mike Richmond called the team "a fresh set of eyes." "We're going to give them a mountain of evidence and step away," Richmond said.

Investigators also planned to re-interview local witnesses, and take one witness back to the mountain area where he had reported seeing a glow nearly two weeks ago.

More than 200 search flights across the snow-covered peaks and wooded valleys in the Rockies southwest of Vail have turned up no sign of the \$9 million A-10 Thunderbolt, the four bombs it was carrying or its pilot, who veered away from an Arizona training flight April 2.

The cost of the search so far is estimated at \$740,000, or about \$50,000 per day, Pletcher said. He added that about \$600,000 of those costs would have been incurred even without the search. The flights are counted as training missions for the pilots, and would be conducted elsewhere if the search was not taking place.

The military says there is a slim chance that Capt. Craig

Button is alive.

Maj. Chuck Mitchell, a fellow A-10 pilot based at Davis-Monthan Air Force Base in Tucson, discussed the survival gear that Button would have had with him on the plane.

"We're given all the tools we need to survive both in a warm desert climate and in a cold climate," Mitchell said.

Any A-10 would have the same survival equipment, regardless of whether it was based in a cold or a hot climate, he said.

Mitchell also said Button could have ejected without activating a radar-emitting device that would have aided searchers.

"In the event of hostilities and a shoot-down, it should be obvious we don't want the enemy finding him," Mitchell said.

Button, 32, and his twin-engine plane disappeared during a training flight west of Tucson. Radar data and witness accounts indicate he broke away from his formation and flew to Colorado — about 800 miles off course. Air Force officials said they don't know why he would do that.

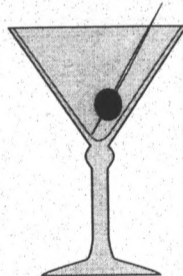

**Militia members' trial postponed until June**

(AP) — A federal judge again postponed the trial of two Viper Militia members Tuesday because a defense attorney is still recovering from a heart attack.

U.S. District Judge Earl Carroll accepted a motion by attorney Jose Padilla to continue the trial to June 3.

Padilla, 47, of Phoenix, who represents Christopher Floyd, suffered a mild heart attack March 28. He said he has since undergone three procedures to clear blocked arteries and was advised by his doctor to take it easy for several weeks.

Carroll halted the start of testimony on April 1, saying it would be too stressful for Padilla in light of his condition.

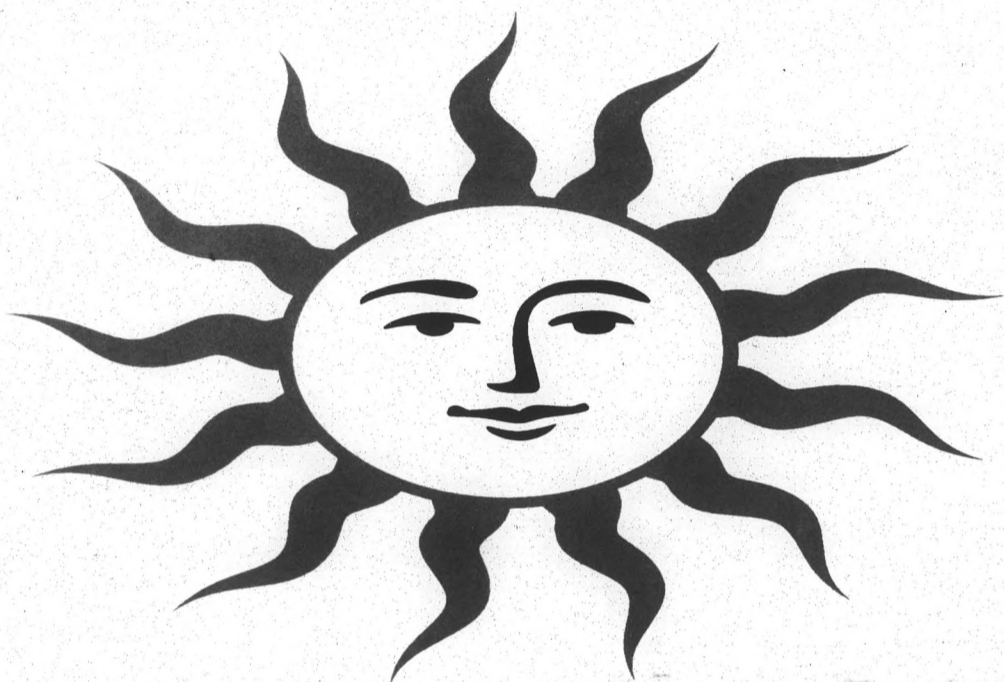
Floyd and Charles Knight are the only ones of the 12 Viper members to plead innocent in the case in which the Phoenix-based paramilitary group was accused of conspiring to blow up various federal buildings in Phoenix.

Floyd, 21, and Knight, 47, have each pleaded innocent to a conspiracy charge.

The 10 other Viper members pleaded guilty to various explosives and conspiracy charges and were sentenced — some to prison terms.

Knight's attorney, Ivan Abrams, said the delay will not harm the men's rights to a fair trial.

# Company offers life insurance to people with HIV

CHICAGO (AP) — Acknowledging extraordinary medical advances against AIDS, a company has become the first in the nation to offer life insurance to people infected with HIV.

Guarantee Trust Life Insurance, a Glenview-based company that specializes in insuring high-risk individuals, is test-marketing the coverage.

"From a life insurance risk perspective, we believe many otherwise healthy HIV-positive individuals are more appropriately viewed as having a treatable chronic illness rather than a terminal disease," said Richard Holson, president of the 60-year-old company.

"We would expect that while this is the first, there will be others," said Ken Vest of the Washington-based American Council of Life Insurers, an industry group. "It fills a need."

State Farm and Allstate, two of the nation's largest insurers, said they have no plans to offer life insurance to HIV-positive individuals.

"The reasoning is, those who are HIV-positive are infected with a disease that is associated with high health

costs and early death," said Murray Payne, spokesman for State Farm Insurance Cos. "The underlying principle is the same for anyone with any other serious life-threatening disease."

An advocate for people with AIDS called Guarantee Trust's move "an incredible first step."

"I'm certainly amazed that the insurance industry is starting to recognize that there is some real hope out there for people living with this disease," said Javier Salazar, a lobbyist for Washington-based AIDS Action. "There is some hope that this may be seen one day as a chronic disease and that we'll be able to benefit from the securities that everyone has access to."

The treatment that has helped prolong the lives of people infected with the AIDS virus involves an expensive cocktail of drugs that includes a new kind called a protease inhibitor.

Guarantee Trust's policies range from \$25,000 to \$250,000 of whole-life coverage. Those who qualify must be under 49, have certain levels of the virus and infection-fighting T-cells and not have full-blown AIDS.

Guarantee Trust initially will offer the coverage only to Illinois residents.

The price will be substantially higher than insurance for an average person without an illness.

A fairly healthy 30-year-old man who doesn't smoke would pay about \$55 a month for a \$50,000 universal life policy, said Monty Edson, Guarantee Trust senior vice president for marketing. If that same person were HIV positive, the policy would cost about \$300 a month, Edson said.

Salazar of AIDS Action noted the cost would be prohibitively high for most people.

"Paying for what you need to stay alive is hard enough already," he noted. "Shelling out \$300 a month for life insurance on top of that is a benefit that few people would be able to access."

With proper treatment, adults with HIV can live 15 to 20 years after infection, and children born with HIV may soon be able to live into their teen-age years, said Dr. Daniel Johnson, a pediatric infectious disease specialist at the University of Chicago.

"It is too early to say that HIV infection is not a terminal disease," Johnson said. "It is a terminal disease in much the same way cancer has the possibility of being a terminal illness."





## Balloon pilot indicted in crash injuring passengers

(AP) — A hot-air balloon pilot faces 14 felony charges stemming from an accident last year that injured 13 passengers in northwest Phoenix.

A Maricopa County grand jury indicted Jeffrey Sherman on 12 counts of endangerment and single counts of aggravated assault and cocaine possession.

In the indictment made public Monday, Sherman also was charged with misdemeanor counts of operating an aircraft while under the influence of drugs and operating an aircraft within eight hours of consuming "narcotic or habit-forming drugs."

Sherman's arraignment is scheduled Wednesday in Maricopa County Superior Court. Sherman, owner of the Naturally High

Balloon Co., did not immediately return telephone calls today seeking comment on the indictment and neither did his attorney, James Martin of Mesa.

Sherman, 42, has maintained that the Sept. 27 crash was caused by a heavy downdraft that pushed his balloon's gondola to the ground and knocked him out of the craft as he tried to land the craft near a salvage yard.

When the balloon bounced back into the air, a passenger took over the controls. The aircraft bounced several more times before it landed in a field near Deer Valley Road and I-17.

The passengers were not seriously injured. Tests found Sherman had cocaine in his system.

# Military to allow American Indians in service to use peyote

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. — Marine Staff Sgt. Shawn Arnold, whose church prays by eating peyote and hallucinating, has spent 18 years protecting the freedom of others but has been banned from practicing his own religion.

All that changed Tuesday, when military officials said American Indian soldiers who use peyote for religious ceremonies will be allowed to follow their beliefs while they're in the armed services.

"If they're using peyote in their religious practice, it's a sacrament, not a drug, just as sacramental wine is not considered a drug," Defense Department spokeswoman Maj. Monica Aloisio said from the Pentagon.

"This opens some doors for our church, and it marks the first sanctioned use of a hallucinogen by members of the armed forces," said Frank Dayish, president of the Native American Church of North America.

For Arnold, 38, of Shiprock, N.M., on the Navajo reservation, the decision ends years of pain.

"My record book says I can't go to church. I've been threatened, two times, with court martials. I wake up every morning, and I don't have that full feeling of freedom because I have to consider that hey, anytime, it could be

this day that they decide to prosecute me," said the platoon commander stationed at the Marine base in Quantico, Va.

The new policy applies to any of the 9,262 American Indians in the service — 0.6 of the military population — who use the drug to follow their faith.

The new guidelines, still in draft form, say:

- American Indians who wish to enlist can answer "No" when asked if they have ever used drugs.
- Peyote may only be used by enrolled members of Indian tribes.
- Peyote may not be used, possessed or brought aboard military vehicles, vessels, aircraft or onto military installations without permission of the installation commander.
- Military personnel must notify their commanders of use upon return to duty.
- Additional limitations may be imposed overseas to comply with foreign laws.

Chaplain Capt. Mel Ferguson, executive director of the Armed Forces Chaplain's Board, said that while the guidelines are being finalized, he's giving chaplains a verbal go-ahead to let American Indians use peyote in religious services.

"When people are allowed to practice their faith and nourish the spiritual dimension of their lives, that promotes and enhances military readiness," said Ferguson.

Robert Perego, an attorney with the Native American Rights Fund, said Native Americans are entitled to equal rights to freely practice their religion like everyone else.

"Why should they have to interrupt their belief in the creator in order to serve their country?" Perego said Tuesday from Boulder, Colo.

Peyote is a small cactus with psychedelic properties that grows naturally in southern Texas. While it's illegal for most people to use it, federal law permits peyote use by the 250,000 members of the Native American Church, which has chapters in 20 states.

The theology centers on the belief that peyote brings peace of mind, helps people think good thoughts and heals illnesses if one sincerely believes and concentrates.

Peyote is not addictive and doesn't cause flashbacks. It is usually eaten but can be smoked. It usually causes sweating, heightened attention and wakefulness. Some people, but not all, have hallucinations they interpret as visions of truth.

And historians say it's been used for at least 10,000 years by tribes in North and South America, sometimes to increase adrenaline during battle.

The military policy change stems from the 1994 American Indian Religious Freedom Act, which allows Indians to use peyote as religious sacrament.

## Baseball honors Robinson's historic breakthrough

NEW YORK (AP) — In the years when Jesse Simms was growing up, he would hear the stories about his grandfather, about how Jackie Robinson changed his sport and his country.

Simms threw out the first ball Tuesday night at Shea Stadium as baseball honored his grandfather with tributes far more lavish than those that noted his landmark breakthrough as the major leagues' first black player 50 years ago.

Even on this cool April night, there was a post-season mood about the game, with both the New York Mets and the Los Angeles Dodgers teams introduced and lining up at the foul lines. Hall of Famer Sandy Koufax was among the half-dozen old Brooklyn Dodgers players who were introduced.

On the main scoreboard was a photograph of Robinson in his classic white Brooklyn uniform coming down the third base line, daring a pitcher to do something about it. Next to that was a message: "He was the handsome, heroic giant of our youth who taught us determination, taught us perseverance and finally, he taught us justice."

President Clinton, on hand to address the fans later in the game, said most Americans today cannot imagine the importance of Robinson's achievement, coming years before many other parts of society were integrated.

"It was baseball. It was a statement about America," Clinton said in an interview on ESPN.

"I hope that all Americans, as we start a new century, ... go back to the lessons of that Dodger team," he said.

Rachel Robinson, Jackie's widow, also was to speak during the game.

Simms, wearing tan slacks and a black turtle-neck and blazer, tossed the first pitch to Mets catcher Todd Hundley. He shook hands with home plate umpire Eric Gregg, a black, as he came on the field and again when he left.

Robinson died in 1972, seven years before his only daughter, Sharon, gave birth to Simms. And as soon as her son was old enough to understand, Sharon Robinson explained who his grandfather

was and what he had done.

"I was in the fifth or sixth grade before I learned everything he stood for and everything he believed in," Simms said.

As the young man grew into a football player and a prospect, he began being recruited by colleges. And that was when he really heard about Jackie Robinson.

"(Penn State coach) Joe Paterno told me how he'd go to Ebbets Field to watch him play," Simms said. "(USC coach) John Robinson ... they all told me about my grandfather."

Simms picked UCLA, and will play there this fall, following in Jackie Robinson's football footsteps. He is his own man, though. He will wear his high school No. 31, not his grandfather's famous No. 42 or the No. 28 he wore at the school.

"What I strive for is to carry on his legacy and leadership values," Simms said.

When Robinson broke into the majors on April 15, 1947, there was no civil rights movement in America. It was a year before President Truman desegregated the armed services. The Brown vs. Board of Education decision by the Supreme Court was still seven years away. Martin Luther King Jr. was a sophomore at Morehouse College.

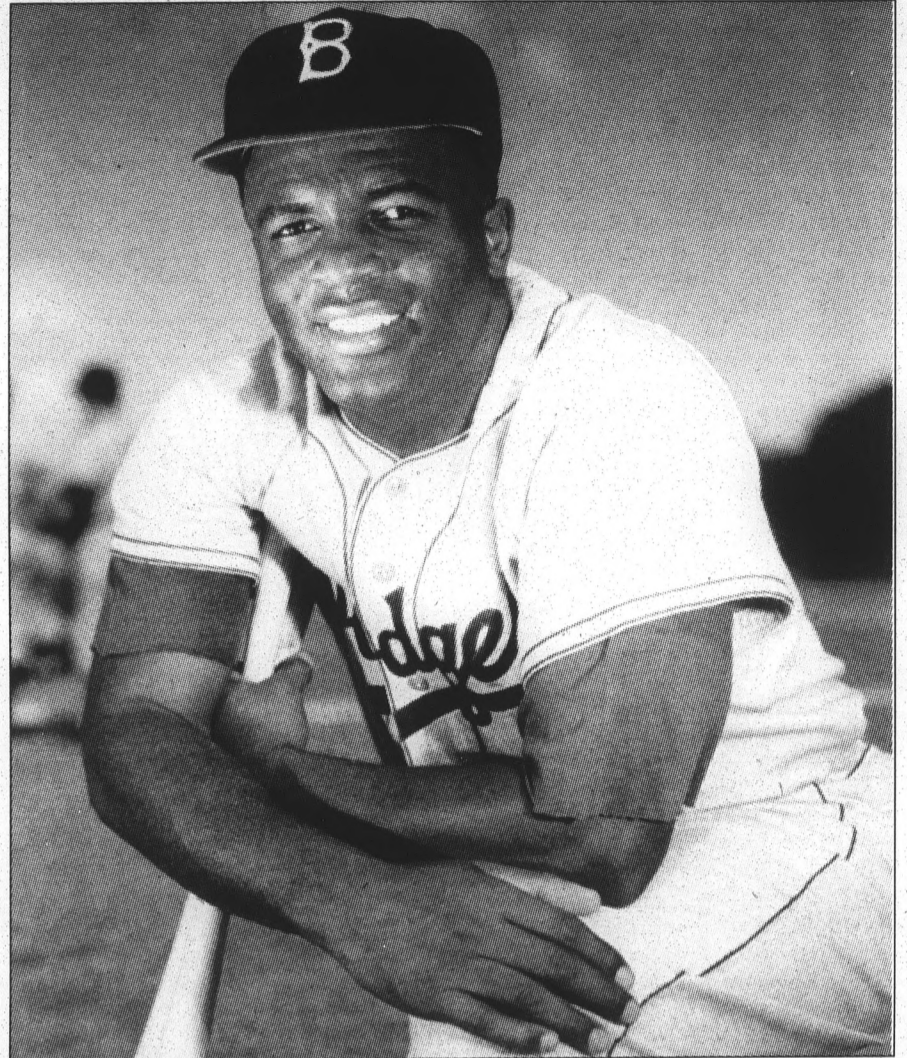
It was in that environment that Robinson embarked on his lonely odyssey, one made all the more difficult by his pledge to Dodgers boss Branch Rickey not to answer the fusillade of abuse triggered by his arrival.

"He was the right one to do it," said Buck O'Neil, who played with and managed the Negro League Kansas City Monarchs. "I don't know if others could have done it."

Former Brooklyn Dodgers pitcher Joe Black, who was Robinson's teammate, agreed.

"Young people should take time to ask who Jackie Robinson was, what he did and what he stood for," Black said. "It's more than being the first guy that played. That alone doesn't mean anything."

"He tried to improve life for everybody. He was always doing things for other people."

## Sooners snap Sun Devil streak at five with 13-4 win

The No. 12 ASU baseball team snapped a five-game winning streak with a 13-4 road loss to the University of Oklahoma on Tuesday night.

Oklahoma (27-10) helped their way to a come-from-behind win by using a four-run seventh and a six-run eighth.

ASU improved to 27-17. Dan McKinley, Rudy Arguelles, Richey Leon and Willie Bloomquist all picked up two hits each.

ASU's Jaymie Bane (0-1) was handed the loss for the Sun Devils, giving up four runs on seven hits and striking out two in 1.2 innings of work.

And while ASU ended its winning streak, Oklahoma

improved its own string of wins to seven.

The Sun Devils return to Packard Stadium on Friday to host California for a three-game weekend homestand.

**LEON EARNS SIX-PAC PLAYER OF THE WEEK HONORS**

Leon, a second baseman/pitcher, and UCLA pitcher Jim Parque were named Pac-10 Southern Division Player and Pitcher of the Week, respectively, on Tuesday.

Leon hit .583 (7-for-12) with six RBI, a double a home run, and three runs scored as he helped ASU to a 3-0 sweep over No. 2 Stanford this past weekend.

The 5-foot-8 Sun Devil also finished the weekend with a .917 slugging percentage and a .643 on-base percentage

this weekend.

He is the second consecutive ASU player to win Player of the Week honors, with left fielder Dan McKinley earning the honor last week. Sun Devil third baseman Andrew Beinbrink and lefthanded pitcher Ryan Mills also received Pac-10 honors this season.

Parque, who was a member of the U.S. Olympic team in Atlanta, improved his record to 11-0 and tossed a complete game for the second straight week against UofA.

The Bruin hurler allowed just three runs, all in the seventh inning, on four hits, struck out nine and picked off one baserunner against the Wildcats.

## ASU set to showcase skills at Classic

Senior hoopsters Quincy Brewer and Rodger Farrington both had their last season at ASU shortened by injuries.

This week, however, the duo will be shooting, soaring and slamming again at the University Activity Center. In hopes of extending their basketball careers to the professional level, the Sun Devil standouts, along with 40 other college seniors, will participate in the fourth annual Nike Desert Classic.

The Classic, one of three pre-draft camps in the nation, runs today through Friday at the UAC. Tip-off is at 6 each evening. The seniors will showcase their talents as NBA scouts and general managers search for and evaluate the performance of potential future stars.

During Brewer's injury-riddled career at ASU, he missed 66 games, including 16 this season. In the 82 games he did play, he averaged 8.4 points and 5.3 rebounds a game. In 14 games this season Brewer averaged 13.5 points, 5.8 rebounds, and two steals.

Farrington had his best statistical season as a Sun Devil during the 1996-97 campaign. He was sixth in the nation in blocked shots, averaging 4.19 a game. Before breaking his left index finger in the third to last game of the season, he recorded 113 blocks. This total was two short of the ASU and Pac-10 record held by Mario Bennett.

# Cornerbacks top spot in '97 draft

Last year, NFL teams stocked up on wide receivers during the first round of the NFL Draft.

This year, they'll finally get some guys to cover them.

The cornerback position easily ranks as the deepest position this year, with two players projected to go among the top five. The rest of the defense isn't too shabby, either.

Continuing our week-long NFL Draft coverage, the *State Press* profiles the projected first round picks on the defensive side of the ball:

## SECONDARY

With the growing trend of big, physical receivers, solid defensive backs are a must. Teams will find them in abundance this season, starting with cornerbacks **Shawn Springs** of Ohio State and Texas' **Bryant Westbrook**.

Springs, who made the decision to leave the Buckeyes after his junior year, brings more athletic skill than any corner in recent memory. At 5-foot-11, 197 pounds, Springs isn't going to send any receiver to the hospital, but his coverage skills and quickness remind many of Deion Sanders. While the idea of Springs being No. 1 overall has been tossed around, it's a pretty safe bet that he will end up with the Seahawks at No. 3.

Unlike Springs, Westbrook rocks receivers with brutal hits. Detractors say he is sometimes overaggressive, however, and a recent injury rumor has surfaced. Still, Tampa Bay seems interested in trading up with the Ravens and grabbing Westbrook at No. 4.

Two other corners, Nebraska's **Michael Booker** and Iowa's **Tom Knight**, bring first-round potential to the draft. There are no guaranteed first-round safeties, but **Tremain Mack** of Miami and another member of Ohio State's secondary, **Rob Kelly**, may be called during the early second.

## LINEBACKERS

With many teams installing 3-4 and zone blitz schemes, the pass-rushing ability of outside linebackers has risen in recent years. In this year's crop, three players stand high above the rest, and should all be snatched with the first 15 picks.

**Dwayne Rudd**, a junior out of Alabama, has been compared to ex-Crimson Tide linebackers Derrick Thomas and Cornelius Bennett. While Rudd lacks the defensive statistics

those two had while in school, Rudd possesses a tremendous vertical leap (39.5 inches) and runs the 40 in 4.62 seconds. He is projected as a top-10 pick, either to the New York Giants or Arizona Cardinals.

The spectacular pair from Virginia, **James Farrior** and **Jamie Sharper**, are both seen as mid-first rounders. Recent talk has Farrior, who combines size and speed with considerable coverage skills for a linebacker, as a top-10 pick, possibly by the Dolphins after Jimmy Johnson trades up. Sharper, bigger but slightly slower than Farrior, is seen as a mid-first rounder, either to Cincinnati or Houston.

Colorado's **Greg Jones**, a college defensive end, could also sneak into the latter part of the first round.

## DEFENSIVE TACKLES/ENDS

As is the situation with the cornerbacks, there will likely be two defensive linemen taken in the first six picks. The only difference is that one of them, **Darrell Russell** of Southern Cal, lines up in the middle, while the other, Florida State's **Peter Boulware**, rushes the passer from his defensive end position.

Russell, at a monstrous 6-4, 321-pounds, collapses the pocket well, but some scouts question his work ethic. He has been compared to Arizona Cardinals Pro Bowler Eric Swann, which is good and bad. Swann is seen as a man with tremendous potential and relatively little accomplishment. Russell is generally considered the No. 1 overall pick, to the New York Jets.

Ironically, Boulware is most often compared to the man who lines up next to Eric Swann, Simeon Rice. Early indications show Boulware as faster and better against the run than Rice. He could easily succeed Rice as the Defensive Rookie of the Year. Boulware is seen as the fourth or fifth pick, depending on what Baltimore does with its selection.

Possibly the strongest first round position, as many as five other defensive linemen could go in the first round. Among them are ends **Kennard Holmes** and **Kenard Lang** of Miami (Fla.), **Reinard Wilson** of Florida State, and **Jason Taylor** of Akron, and tackles **Renaldo Wynn** of Notre Dame and **Rick Terry** of North Carolina.

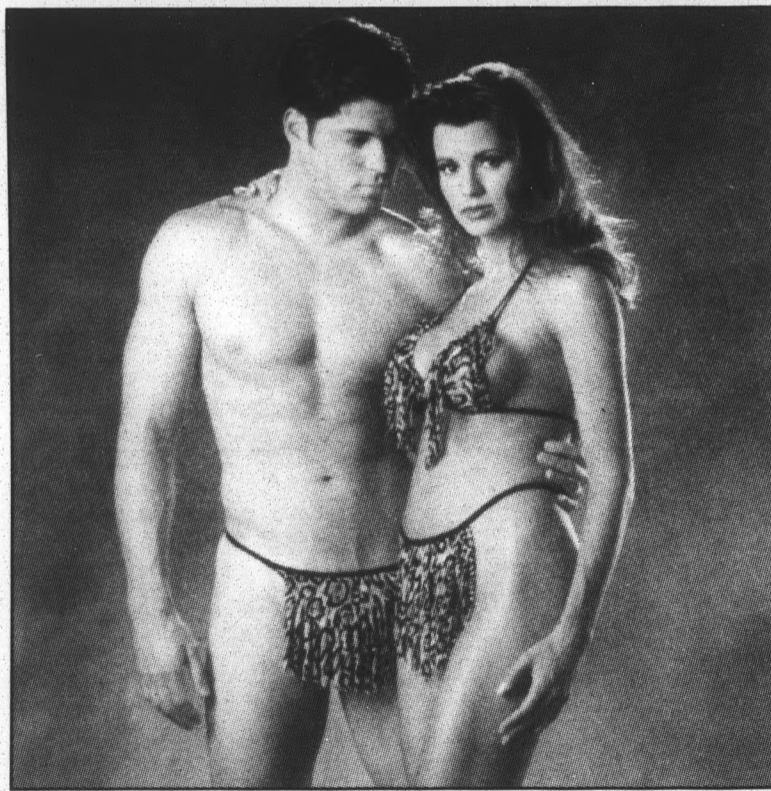

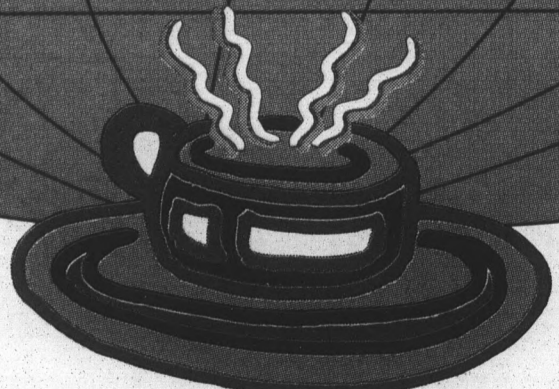
