## Secretary of State Jane Dee Hull to become governor

After nearly four months of awaiting his fate, Fife Symington on Wednesday announced his resignation as governor within two hours of being convicted on seven of 23 federal charges of financial fraud.

Secretary of State Jane Dee Hull will become governor effective Friday at 5 p.m.

Two charges were dismissed earlier in the trial, which began May 13. Symington was found not guilty on three charges and jurors were deadlocked on 11.

Sentencing is Nov. 10.

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According to federal sentencing guidelines, Manella said "under normal circumstances," Symington would not be eligible for probation on at least one charge, wire fraud, and faces possible jail time on all seven.

Nora Manella, the U.S. attorney who oversaw the investigation, said she was "pleased with the outcome," but added the deadlocked charges may be sent back to trial.

She added the outcome was a "vindication of what he truly is."

"[Symington] is anything but a successful realtor and deeply in debt," she said.

At an emotional, standing-room-only press conference, Symington emerged to long applause by a throng of supporters. Well-wishers jumped to their feet in a rousing show of support for the beleaguered governor, but their eyes were teary.

"The future lies ahead of us now and not behind, and others will now be entrusted to lead us there," Symington

said as his wife Ann stood silently by his side.

Hull would not comment directly to the media Wednesday, but through a press release said she hopes to make the transition "as seamless as possible."

"In light of the conviction of Gov. Fife Symington and pending succession, I want to reassure Arizonans that I will meet the challenge with great determination, enthusiasm and dedication," she said in the prepared statement.

Assistant Secretary of State Anne Lynch said Hull was "maintaining a low profile and not stepping on the Governor's toes," and had not yet selected a cabinet.

Lynch will take over as Secretary of State.

Symington said he would leave the

Governor's office knowing he has "done his best."

"I am returning to private life with my head up, spirits high and my heart full of gratitude," Symington said.

John Dowd, Symington's attorney, said Symington would appeal and pursue dismissal of the deadlocked charges.

"We're not through and we're going to keep fighting," Dowd said.

Dowd remained loose-limbed and easy-going as he spoke and said the whole case was built on "petty errors that don't matter to anyone."

Dowd added that Mary Jane Cotey, the juror dismissed Aug. 19, will be "key" to Symington's appeal.

Symington still faces bankruptcy proceedings.

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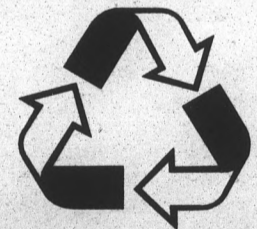

## Royals' stoic mourning too stiff for London

LONDON (AP) — There is a royal way of mourning: stoic, dry-eyed, private. For many in a nation grieving for Princess Diana, it has left a sour taste.

They were the Britons wondering at the sight of her young sons, sitting stiffly beside their father, being taken to Sunday church, right on time, mere hours after she was killed in a Paris car crash.

And they are the ones who have since besieged St. James's Palace by the tens of thousands to be near Diana's coffin, while the royals have remained 500 miles distant, out of sight, largely silent, at Balmoral Castle.

That is the royal family's style — stiff upper lip, stern and unflinching as the family disasters pile up — and the way, too, of the British upper classes.

It was not the way of Diana, however, and to many Britons, now pouring out their grief with very un-British public tears, flowers and tributes, it seems bleak, old-fashioned and even cruel.

"It's just a typical reaction of the royal family. Stick to protocol, don't worry about human emotions," said one woman waiting to sign one of the condolence books at St. James's.

"And it proves, if anyone ever doubted it, that the royals are not like us," the mass-circulation tabloid *The Sun* declared. "They are an alien breed from a planet which is stuck in a 19th-century time warp."

To traditionalists, the royal forbearance spells dignity and courage — comparable with the enduring vision of a dry-eyed Jackie Kennedy, along with her tiny son solemnly

saluting the coffin of the assassinated U.S. president in 1963.

"They are dealing with it in their own way," Ronald Allison, the queen's former press secretary, said of the royal family's stoicism. "It may not be our way."

Charles Moore, editor of the conservative *Daily Telegraph*, smartly slapped down a suggestion that the queen make an address at the funeral.

"It simply is not the way that these things are done," Moore said in a BBC radio interview. "If they are constantly being interviewed and constantly being asked their opinions about things, this actually wears away at the whole system."

It's an argument Diana didn't accept. And she was popular for it.

## Prosecutors want psychiatric examination for Kaczynski

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (AP) — Defense attorneys want to block the government from forcing Unabomber defendant Theodore Kaczynski to submit to psychiatric tests, saying that would violate his rights.

Prosecutors on Tuesday asked U.S. District Judge Garland Burrell Jr. to allow the government to have its own experts examine Kaczynski in preparation for his trial, set to begin Nov. 12.

Defense lawyers suggested in June that they would seek to introduce expert testimony on Kaczynski's mental health. They have said they do not plan to argue that he is insane, but may try to show that the former Berkeley math professor lacked the mental capacity to form the intent to commit a crime.

Assistant U.S. Attorney J. Douglas Wilson told Burrell on Tuesday that if the defense planned to offer testimony about some mental health claim, it was only fair to allow prosecutors to examine the defendant.

"There is a wide range of mental disorders that could be at issue here — a huge

number of diagnoses and subdiagnoses ... that the defendant could rely on," Wilson said.

Defense lawyer Gary Sowarts countered that the issue should be how far Kaczynski's privacy will be invaded.

"The Fifth Amendment disappears if the court can compel a mental health examination," he said.

Burrell said he would rule later.

Kaczynski, 55, is charged with committing four of the 16 bombings attributed to the Unabomber. The former mathematician turned recluse has pleaded innocent. If convicted, he could receive the death penalty.

Kaczynski is charged separately in New Jersey in connection with a fifth bombing.

## Plane crashes in flames at Phnom Penh airport

PHNOM PENH, Cambodia (AP) — A Vietnam Airlines jetliner crashed in a ball of flames Wednesday on a landing approach to Phnom Penh's international airport. Police said at least 62 people were killed.

The Soviet-built Tupolev 134 plane, arriving from Ho Chi Minh City, went down in a rice paddy about a half-mile south of the runway during a heavy downpour, clipping palm trees and exploding into flames on impact, witnesses said.

The cause of the crash was unknown.

The wreckage was still burning more than one hour after the 1:40 p.m. crash.

Access for firetrucks and rescue workers was made difficult by a narrow, flooded dirt road that was the only way to the crash. A plume of smoke rose over the airport.

South Korean Ambassador Park Kyung Tai said 18 passengers from South Korea were on board. Taiwanese state radio, citing Taiwanese businessmen and lawmaker Tseng Chen-nung from Phnom Penh's airport, said at least 21 Taiwanese had been aboard.

## Tobacco deal hinges on quick action by Congress, negotiators say

WASHINGTON (AP) — Architects of the proposed \$368 billion settlement with the tobacco industry said Wednesday the deal could be in jeopardy if Congress fails to quickly write it into law.

"I've got my foot on his neck right now," Mississippi Attorney General Mike Moore said of a lawyer for the tobacco industry sitting next to him at a Senate Labor Committee hearing. "Let's don't miss this opportunity."

President Clinton is expected to come out as early as next week with ideas on how to improve the plan. Moore said the president will essentially endorse the settlement reached with the industry last June.

But congressional leaders remain unenthusiastic about tackling the complex issue this year. Senate Majority Leader Trent Lott, R-Miss., said Wednesday it was conceivable that Congress would act, but: "If

the House doesn't indicate they want to try to do it this year, we're not going to go out into that thicket if they're not."

Senate Minority Leader Tom Daschle, D-S.D., noting how complicated the issue was, said it was increasingly unlikely it would be taken up this year.

State attorneys general, private lawyers and the tobacco industry reached an agreement under which the industry would pay \$368 billion over 25 years and steps would be taken to restrict advertising and combat underage smoking. In return, 40 state lawsuits seeking to recover Medicaid money would end, as would 17 pending class-action lawsuits by smokers.

Congress must ratify the pact for it to take effect, but it has faced strong opposition from some lawmakers and public health organiza-

tions who say it is not tough enough on the industry.

Delay could be fatal to the deal, said Lonnie Bristow, a former American Medical Association president and the only physician involved in the negotiations.

"This issue must be resolved this calendar year," he told the panel, one of many in Congress holding hearings on the issue. "Do not allow this opportunity to be consumed by the fires of those who prefer vengeance to saving lives or who value process over outcome."

The deal may be flawed, said Matt Myers of the Campaign for Tobacco-Free Kids, another participant in the negotiations. But it is "the best vehicle for fundamental long-term change. The opportunity must be seized and not lost."

### Paparazzi taint image of respectable media

We're bracing for the backlash — "we" being members of the media.

The recent death of Diana, Princess of Wales, has forced us to prepare for the inevitable. In France, with the seven paparazzi photographers blamed for contributing to Diana's death being revealed, the rest of the global media is certain to be the object of blame soon enough.

It's understandable that people would be angry at the seven paparazzi for their part in the deaths of Diana and Dodi Fayed. Rather than aid the people in the wreck, the paparazzi opted to shoot photos of the crash. Pursue the story, cast aside humanity. Indeed, it's heartless.

All the members of the *State Press* would have assisted those in the crash without question. The same could be said of those at any other respectable publication.

Before students at ASU erupt in a hue and cry to lynch all members of the media, one word of warning should be issued: there's a huge difference between paparazzi and the rest of the journalism community.

Prepare yourself for Journalism 101.

Tabloid journalists (of which the paparazzi are members) and the rest of the media are like Dennis Rodman and the NBA's Chicago Bulls.

The tabloids, like Rodman, are flamboyant, controversial and entertaining. We just can't get enough of both.

Both also serve a purpose: Rodman aids the Bulls by pulling down rebounds; the tabloids entertain us by giving us the latest poop on celebrities and headlines like "Illegal aliens abducted by aliens" or "Elvis spotted at Graceland wearing pantyhose."

At times, both can go too far. Rodman hurts the Bulls when he's ejected from a game, the tabloids hurt the rest of the media when they relentlessly pursue a celebrity for a story or photos.

Still, the rest of the media aren't saints. We have our moments of controversy, too. But a distinction needs to be made between tabloid journalism and the type of journalism you see in the *State Press*, *Los Angeles Times* and *USA Today*.

Not all of us working members of the media are evil underlings ready to relentlessly pursue celebrities at the cost of their lives. We at the *State Press* are willing to do things the right way.

Diana's death is tragic. Some of us at the *State Press* are old enough to remember seeing her wedding to Prince Charles. We won't forget her soon. The seven paparazzi may be indirectly responsible for her and Dodi's death, but if any blame or hate is to be delved, remember that not all media are members of the tabloids.

### Practice tolerance in religious diversity

As most people know, religion sets us apart from each other more than practically any other issue. Whether one believes wholeheartedly in one particular religious tradition, or whether one is more eclectic in his or her approach, religion inflames passions like few other subjects.

As students, we are lucky enough to attend a University where we are exposed to many different forms of religious expression on a daily basis. In a sense, we of different faiths are thrown together for a brief time and forced to confront religious expressions different from our own, whether those expressions are rooted in traditional Western religion, or in a religious culture alien to our own.

Most of us walk away from this unique experience with a broader sense of what constitutes true religion as we see it. By gaining this exposure, we learn that our own religious rituals, practices and beliefs are not the only ones that are capable of providing meaning, beauty and purpose to human existence. While our particular form of religious practice may provide meaning in our eyes, we hopefully respect other religious traditions as having meaning for their adherents. This process of respecting other traditions could be called the art of tolerance.

There are a minority of students, of course, who are not satisfied with simply sharing their religious views with others. These people do not represent

any one religious tradition, but represent small factions of many religious traditions here at ASU. These people believe that their religious orientations are the one and only true religion (all other traditions are false) and that unless all others accept the "correct" tradition, dire consequences await those who are in "denial" of the truth, either in this life or in the hereafter. These people could be called "true believers" in the sense that they only see their way as the "correct" way to live.

Why would some students not acknowledge that other religious orientations have meaning? Why would they believe that only their way of religious

ritual and belief is "correct" for everyone? The only answer I can come up with is that these kinds of students are not truly secure in what they profess to believe in. People who are secure in their beliefs are able to learn from the rituals and beliefs of others and incorporate them into their own

value system without condemnation of those different beliefs. They realize it's easier to learn from others rather than condemn them. It also allows them to keep that all-important quality of an open, searching mind.

Students who don't keep that open, searching mind when it comes to religious traditions can only be described as narrow-minded souls. They choose to blind themselves to the fact that not everyone looks, dresses and sees things the way they do. The only thing they really have going for them is the "certainty" of their positions. With "certainty" like that, I'll take uncertainty any day.

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## ASU, *Press* should ban advertisement of alcohol

I was very impressed by the *State Press* article about the LSU student who died as a consequence of an alcohol binge. It reflects just one of the many morbid aspects of alcohol consumption in our colleges and universities. The article published on Aug. 29 talks about the tragic loss of the student and goes on to mention statistics about alcohol consumption and some of its consequences, including date rape and drunken driving, just to mention a few. As a habitual reader of the *State Press*, I have read many similar articles about the tragedies that students experience from alcohol-related problems. My frustration stems from the fact that the *State Press*, ASU and various schools and related organizations encourage the consumption of alcohol among students who are not legally or mentally capable of dealing with the responsibility of drinking.

On a typical day at ASU, I will read *The State Press* and encounter full-page ads from different bars, pubs, dance clubs, etc. that solely advertise alcoholic beverages. I know many people will say that those establishments have a right to advertise and I agree; but they don't have the right to explicitly advertise alcohol consumption that knowingly targets many minors. Why is Joe Camel gone? Because it targeted minors. ASU and *The State Press* are doing exactly the same thing by allowing establishments and their alcoholic beverages that target minors. If anybody thinks I am making this up, just turn to the Police Report on *The State Press* and see how many ASU students are arrested each day for underage consumption of alcohol or DUI. It is embarrassing.

ASU is a fine institution of learning and enlightenment. *The State Press*, like it or not, is a reflection of ASU. The encouragement of alcohol consumption by

this institution or its publications cannot go on. We have too much knowledge to allow it to happen. We cannot teach the effects and prevention of drunk driving, date rape and effects of alcohol in the body or society in our family studies, health, physiology or economics classes if we encourage it as soon as the student leaves the classroom. ASU must practice what it teaches. If not, what is the point of this institution? Taxpayers should be appalled to know that even one cent of their money goes to publish material that encourages alcoholism among one of the most impressionable sectors of the population. How many articles will I read this year in the *State Press* about alcohol-related deaths among our own students, or girls who were raped in a drunken stupor? How many accounts of students arrested for underage consumption or DUI, which will hinder their acceptance to professional schools or jobs in the future due to a criminal record? The fact remains that it doesn't have to be that way. A college education is a wonderful experience and the best way to expand our minds and knowledge. The experience does not have to be ruined by grief and regret due to alcohol-related incidents.

I challenge ASU and *The State Press* to be proactive in this matter and lead the way among our colleges and universities by allowing advertisement of the establishments, not the alcohol. There are many ways to advertise a business without having to list a menu of alcoholic beverages and the "fun" related to their consumption. I hope ASU will be the first university to ban advertisement of alcohol and alcohol-related activities on its campus.

## 'Equal time' for origin theories not practical

I am writing in response to your Aug. 29 article on the controversy surrounding the new Institute of Human Origins. As a new student at ASU, I attended a graduate-student orientation at which Dr. Bianca Bernstein, dean of the Graduate School, spoke with pride about the Institute of Human Origins coming soon to ASU and the expected arrival of the most famous fossil remains in the world: Lucy, that young woman from the dawn of our species. Lucy will be on permanent display at the Institute (which will be headed by her discoverer). This will translate into prestige for ASU and increased donations by alumni and others (which means more scholarships for students).

The controversy raised by Regent Kurt Davis is unfortunate. To maintain that ASU must provide "equal time" to "alternate theories of human origins and evolutions" as a condition to Arizona Board of Regents approval of the Institute is to damage the effectiveness and integrity of the University. A similar controversy raged around the Church and Galileo. Today, no one calls for equal time for teaching that the Sun revolves around the Earth. Theology has come to

terms with a heliocentric solar system.

Similarly, today there is a preponderance of evidence in support of Darwin's work. Of course, there is the fossil record, but beyond this, there are the recent advances in the study of DNA. The genetic material of humankind and the genetic material of the great apes are extremely similar in structure. This DNA evidence may be regarded as the "smoking gun." And, over time, theology will come to terms with evolution also.

This concept of equal time can breed much mischief. It is but a small step to say that alternate explanations of the Holocaust—that there was no genocide, those who died in the camps were the victims of disease, etc.—must be taught in equal numbers of courses at ASU. Rally around President Coor — you may be sure that on an issue such as this, it is indeed lonely at the top. The University has been put at risk, and the students, faculty and alumni should defend it.

## Elegant princess didn't have to die

Di is dead. After years of public scrutiny, exposés and confessions, after a fairy-tale wedding which ended up rocking the royal family and English tradition, the youthful country girl who caught the eye of even the American public was killed recently in a tragic car crash.

Princess Diana, Dodi Al Fayed and the driver, Henri Paul, all died after the crash. The sole survivor, bodyguard Trevor Rees-Jones, has yet to recover from his injuries and has not been interviewed by Parisian police. The accident occurred during a high-speed chase as Paul attempted to avoid the attentions of seven celebrity photographers on motorcycles.

After the crash, these "journalists" swarmed the car and continued snapping pictures, all the while interfering with early rescue efforts. All seven are under formal investigation and two are forbidden to work while the case is pending.

Although it was determined that Paul had a blood-alcohol level three times France's legal limit, I cannot condemn him as solely responsible for the crash. What's the deal then? you ask. Why not let the photographers take their pictures and be on their way? Why endanger others' lives by speeding through a tunnel, and drunk at that?

The answer is simple — harassment. Princess Diana's life, perhaps even more than any other public figure, illustrates the highs and lows of fame along with other controversial issues. Yet the one constant in her life has been publicity. How long can anyone stand an array of flashbulbs exploding in their direction without any sign of diminishing? Can anyone truly desire to be in the public spotlight 24 hours of the day? Her pleas for privacy disregarded, her every move captured on film and published within hours if the story was "hot" enough, the princess was hounded by a mass of mongrels who ran towards any sounding of an editorial hunting horn.

And now, those dogs finally killed their prey.

In my opinion, regardless of fame, harassment is harassment. Every human being has the right to privacy and no journalist, for any reason, has the right to stomp all over individual rights. Granted, the famous will attract a certain amount of attention, but what happened to Princess Diana was nothing short of despicable.

Di's brother read a statement soon after the incident, charging the press at large to examine the blood on its hands. But his statement could have easily been enlarged to the media's public. The paparazzi would not exist without a paying readership. Shouldn't we all take a moment to consider our role in the death of a princess?

I hope this unfortunate incident to be the harbinger of world peace. I hope that all the people of the world today (including all international leaders, presidents, dictators, monarchs and governments) to stop and think and realize how much it hurts to see someone close to you go away, or someone be taken away from you (and us), or have our lives taken away in any form or manner against one's well-being.

I send Princess Diana's two children my deepest condolences. I cannot imagine how devastated they are to be all alone without their closest parent — their beloved mother.

# GOVERNOR'S DISGRACE

## Hull to select 2 new regents

Although seven of the nine Arizona Board of Regents members were appointed by Gov. Fife Symington, the job of replacing the two retiring board members now falls into the lap of Jane Hull.

"Had Symington continued to be governor, he would have appointed the next two regents," said ABOR spokesman Tony Seese-Bieda. "Now that he will not be around, that duty will fall to Jane Hull."

Regents Eddie Basha and Art Chapa end their terms on the board later this year. ABOR has not received notification as to who Symington considered as the replacements.

"There have been no announcements as to who Symington would have appointed or how far along the selection process was," Seese-Bieda said.

Not only did Hull land the job of regent appointer, she is now the Ex-Officio ABOR member.

"The governor is an ex-officio member," Seese-Bieda said. "As governor, Hull will be able to vote as early as the September meeting."

As for Hull's new position, Regent Kurt Davis said, "we will obviously continue to work hard and in cooperation with Governor Jane Hull. She is a very qualified individual."

Davis said although it is a sad day for Arizona, the Universities continue on.

Continuing without comment on his gubernatorial plans, Basha issued a statement asking people to pray for the state, the state's leaders and the Symington family.

Other board members were not available for comment, but yesterday's verdict touched a soft spot for the Associated Students of ASU.

"(If Symington's) guilty or whatever, I wish we could just move on — which is what we're doing up here (at ASASU offices)," said Autumn Ness, activities vice president.

Steve Mena, director of Devils' Spirit, said the mistakes of public officials are looked at more closely than private individuals.

"You make your bed, you lie in it," he said. "You make a mistake as a leader and you're going to be scrutinized. It happens at every level."

Symington's decision to step down was met with approval among ASASU representatives who also expressed concern for the reputation of the state.

"I think he should have stepped down a long time ago — for the good of the state," Ness said. "Step down and leave the state out of it because it's now a state issue, not just a Symington issue."

Damon Pace, government relations director, said it wasn't the governor's duty to resign, but that it was a necessary step to leave Jane Hull the opportunity to establish her office.

Josh Carr, ASASU vice president, said he was not surprised with the verdict.

"I've never been impressed with Fife Symington," he said. "I expected some sort of outcome like that. I think everybody wants the perfect person to represent them but it just kind of upsets me that kind of filthy business can go on up there."

"Deep down inside I think he may not want to step down because of pride. But pride can get in the way of justice."

Senator Paul Frost had a different, more optimistic view.

"It's too bad he was guilty of so many things," he said. "Better luck next time."

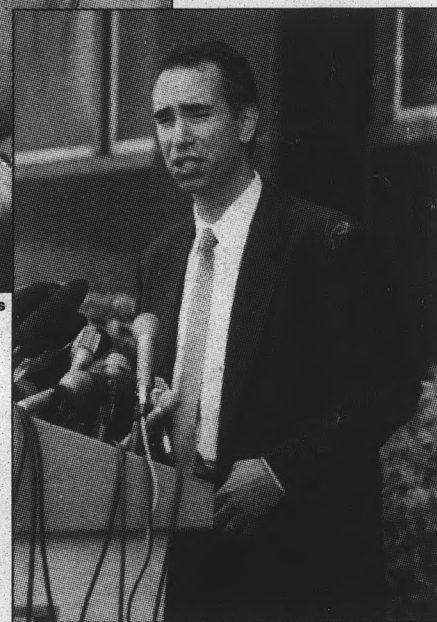

## Symington guilty of 7 financial fraud charges

A federal grand jury convicted Gov. Fife Symington Wednesday afternoon of seven of the 23 financial fraud charges leveled against him.

The governor was found not guilty on three counts and the jury was deadlocked on 11 charges. Two charges were dropped earlier in the trial.

The breakdown is as follows:

Charges one through 16 involved making false financial statements to a financial institution, including charges that Symington submitted two different financial statements to different banks on the same date. The jury was dead-

locked on charges one through three and five through eight. Symington was found not guilty of count four and convicted on counts 10, 11, 13 through 16.

Charges 17 through 21 relate to wire fraud, including wire transfers from a Citibank loan in Delaware to make payments on another loan at Valley National Bank in Arizona. The jury deadlocked on 17 through 19, found the governor not guilty on count 20 and guilty of count 21.

Symington was found not guilty on count 22, attempted extortion by placing pressure on creditors to force ASU Downtown Center, a satellite campus, out of the Mercado shopping center.

Jurors also deadlocked on count 23 — making false statements under oath in bankruptcy court in October of 1995.

The governor's resignation will take effect Friday at 5 p.m. Sentencing is scheduled for Nov. 10.

## Prosecutors may pursue 11 stalemated charges

While the atmosphere at the State Capitol following Symington's conviction was surprisingly upbeat, the prosecutor's conference gave a sense of unfinished business.

A crew of tight-lipped attorneys stood behind a lone table in an unfinished room, discussing the remaining 11 deadlocked charges as well as the seven convictions, and refusing to comment on many questions.

While Symington was greeted by an overflowing room of supporters and media in a plush Capitol building conference room, the prosecutors faced a small crowd of reporters and dozens of cheap plastic chairs.

While faxes flooded Valley newsrooms from Symington friends and foes, few bothered to even acknowledge the prosecution's tireless hours spent on the three-month trial.

The attorneys may have more work ahead. Manella said prosecutors may pursue the 11 charges, but added they were not out to persecute the governor.

"Seven is more than sufficient," she said. "Getting the governor out of office was the farthest thing from our minds — we don't even live in Arizona."

# Autopsy planned for Tucson woman found dead in an airplane restroom

OMAHA, Neb. (AP) — A Continental Airlines flight made an emergency landing Wednesday after a passenger was found unconscious in a restroom. Attempts to revive her failed and she was pronounced dead at a hospital.

An autopsy on the body of Lila M. Shakerdge, 36, of Tucson, showed there was no evidence of foul play but toxicology reports were pending, said Omaha police spokesman Jim Murray.

Passengers on Flight 1740 from Las Vegas to Cleveland told officials that the woman appeared to be intoxicated.

She apparently went into the restroom and when she didn't come out for an hour, a flight attendant checked and found her unconscious.

"She was not breathing, there was no pulse," said Sarah Anthony, a spokeswoman for Continental, which is based in Houston. The crew called Continental's medical service, which advised the quick landing, Ms. Anthony said.

The flight, which had about 135 passengers, was resumed after about a two-hour delay.

Donald L. Smithey, executive director of the Omaha Airport Authority, said there have been several incidents during the past few years in which people suffered heart attacks or died from other illnesses on board the plane.

"Since we're in the middle of the country and most major airlines fly in here, we get a lot of these," he said.

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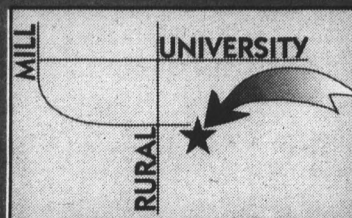
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# FBI accidentally releases Amtrak sabotage suspect to press

PHOENIX (AP) — After nearly two years of silence, the FBI faxed news organizations a confidential memo describing a suspect in an Amtrak derailment that killed a crewman and injured 78 others. A spokesman for the agency said the memo was sent by mistake.

The memo, sent Tuesday to The Associated Press, *The Arizona Republic* and other news media, says the suspect in the sabotage is a man with law enforcement and firefighting experience.

It names the man and offers details about his employment history, including the fact that he had been fired from three jobs in the area in the two years before the derailment. It also says that when agents interviewed him the man produced a large folder about the derailment, named another man as a suspect and provided a theory about the derailment.

The man recently moved out of Arizona, the memo said.

FBI spokesman Jack Callahan said today the memo was sent by mistake, either through a malfunction in a fax machine in the Phoenix office or through a clerical error. He wouldn't

comment on the contents of the memo, saying it was a confidential document.

A cover letter says the fax was meant for the U.S. Attorney's Office in Phoenix and originated from the Phoenix office of the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

It's the first public word on the progress of the investigation into the derailment Oct. 9, 1995, near the town of Hyder, about 60 miles southwest of Phoenix. The Sunset Limited plunged into a dry gulch after a warning signal was disabled and spikes were removed to loosen rails.

The memo refers to the man as "an additional suspect" in the derailment.

According to the memo, the man volunteered extensive knowledge of the crash when interviewed last year by federal investigators. It said the man had access to a spike puller and pry bar, tools believed to have been used by the saboteur.

The memo said interviews with friends and associates of the suspect showed he has many of the traits described by FBI profilers.

He's said to have known the crash area well, having taken pictures of it shortly before leaving Arizona, according to the memo.

Additionally, he's said to be a middle-age white male of above-average intelligence and a loner with signs of paranoia but no criminal record.

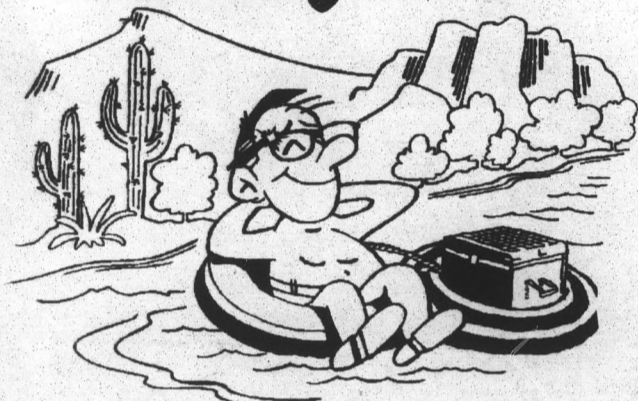
Friends also said he had access to lights that might have been used to illuminate the site. A pilot and passengers flying over the site that night saw what appeared to be lights shining on the tracks a few hours before the crash, the memo said.

The memo also speaks of two Arizona men having been named in a pair of anonymous letters received near the first anniversary of the derailment but doesn't say they are suspects.

A letter signed "Sons of the Gestapo" was found at the site but was said to do little to clear up the mystery. Investigators apparently considered that it might be a ruse and figured that the saboteurs were familiar with railroads and may have been motivated by vengeance, perhaps against Southern Pacific, which owned the tracks, or against Amtrak.

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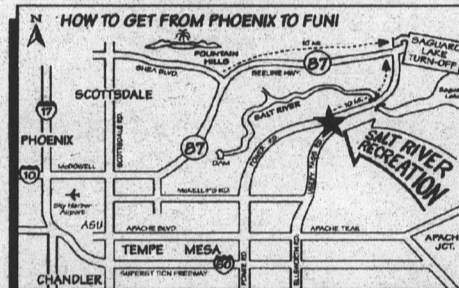

NEW YORK (AP) — Johnny Galecki has a simple goal for his acting: undesirability.

Galecki, who played the good-guy adolescent David on *Roseanne*, has made three movies since the series ended.

In *I Know What You Did Last Summer*, he plays a hapless murder victim. In *Bean*, he's a motorcycle riding freak and in *Suicide Kings* he's a compulsive teen-ager.

"I don't know what it is, but something always drives me to make my characters as undesirable as possible," Galecki told *Movieline* magazine in its September issue. "For *Suicide Kings* I wanted John Turturro eyes and Kramer-esque hair."

He said his role as *Roseanne's* son-in-law had advantages.

"A friend told me that his sister and his assistant agreed that if they could choose only

one actor to sleep with it would be Robert Downey Jr. If there was only one they could date, it would be Johnny Depp. And if there was only one they could marry, it would be David from *Roseanne*."

MONTERREY, Mexico (AP) — Lucha Villa, one of Mexico's most popular singers and actresses, has virtually recovered from a coma apparently caused by liposuction, her doctor said Wednesday.

Villa, 61, can open her eyes, move her limbs, talk and breathe without the help of a respirator, Dr. Jose Luis Assad Morel told reporters. Assad, head of a medical team attending her at Muguerza Hospital, said it will take several more days for Villa to achieve full recovery.

"She is not in danger anymore," he said.

She collapsed Aug. 28 and went into shock at another Monterrey hospital after undergoing liposuction to remove fat from her midriff. She was under anesthesia during the procedure.

Villa has made more than 100 films and is best known along northern Mexico and in Hispanic communities along the U.S. border for her ranchero music, a Mexican style of western.

LOS ANGELES (AP) — George Clooney plans to "spend every free moment" making it easier for celebrities to sue for libel.

The *ER* hunk and latest *Batman* star likened the tabloids to drug dealers in the wake of the Paris crash that killed Princess Diana, her companion Dodi Fayed and their driver, who authorities said was drunk as they were chased by paparazzi.

Clooney singled out National Enquirer editor Steve Coz.

"I wonder how you sleep at night," Clooney said at a news conference Tuesday. "You should be ashamed."

Clooney said tabloids hide behind the legal requirement that public figures accusing media organizations of libel must prove stories were motivated by "malicious intent." He called that a nearly impossible hurdle to overcome.

"They are the two words that every ethical journalist says is the loophole tabloids hide behind," he said. "They are two words in the law that I will spend every free moment trying to change."

Contacted later, Coz said: "Let's allow the facts of this tragedy to speak for themselves rather than have celebrities twist it to fit their own publicity agenda."

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

# Higher enrollment necessitates more Education advisers

College of Education students at ASU are finding that the new advising system implemented this semester makes the graduation process, well, elementary.

With increased enrollment in the college, the new advising system couldn't have arrived at a better time.

Two new advisers have been added to the college's staff. The addition increases the number of advisers to seven and has helped ease the workload.

In addition, the college's new advising system is expected to help identify and nurture students for its professional programs. It also is making things easier at the college's advisement office.

Heidi Hagen, coordinator of communications for the college, said the new advising system was implemented in response to increased enrollment. The College of Education currently has approximately 4,500 students enrolled in its programs.

"More people are applying for the college right now than in previous years," Hagen said. "The College of Education, at this time, doesn't feel it should have to be

turning away this many students."

Hagen's view isn't unique.

"Campus-wise, we're the fourth-largest program at ASU," said Richard Daniel, director of the College of Education. "Last year, we were short-staffed and that added to some of the pressures of the office. Because of the fact that we were short on resources, we weren't able to provide the kind of services that we would have liked."

Daniel said the new advising system's goal is to accommodate as many students as possible in the College.

He added that using the new system is also a way for the college to be more efficient in the way it handles students — especially upper-class students ready to enter the college's professional program.

"It makes it even that much smoother," Daniel said. "It's not guaranteed that when a student hits junior standing, 56 hours, that they'll be admitted into our program. Now, they get to work with an adviser one to one and the adviser can begin to share information and give them advice on things they should be doing."

Daniel said almost 50 percent of the students in the col-

lege's elementary program are denied entry. The new system will alleviate that number by spotting students who are strong candidates for certain programs and by re-routing other students into programs.

Last year, students were not assigned a specific adviser. Then, students were able to see any adviser they wanted to, making the previous advising system chaotic, Daniel said.

Now, students are alphabetically assigned an adviser who is kept up to date on each individual's academic progress.

Daniel also said the new system makes the advisement process more personal — students now have more contact with just one adviser, who guides the student from their freshman year to graduation.

"I think that's the critical piece (of the system) that we've been able to implement — that one-to-one relationship that the student should have with an adviser," Daniel said. "That bond and trust factor. Now the student can rely on one person to make sure that things get done. There's a shared responsibility now that wasn't there in the old system."

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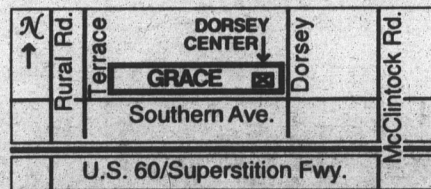
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# Senate considers spending for youth smoking crackdown

WASHINGTON — The Senate today reversed course and agreed to the Clinton administration's request for \$34 million to pay for a national crackdown on illegal sales of tobacco products to youths under age 18.

The Senate in July approved only \$4.9 million for the Food and Drug Administration program, but on a voice vote agreed to an amendment to the agriculture spending bill adding \$29 million. An effort to kill the amendment failed by a 28-70 vote.

"The issue is whether or not kids under 18 ought to be able to buy tobacco," said the main sponsor, Democratic Sen. Tom Harkin of Iowa. "It's about our kids and protecting them from the ravages of tobacco."

The House has approved \$24 million for the FDA youth anti-smoking program. Differences between the House and Senate spending bills will have to be resolved in a conference committee.

Today's Senate vote came after Vice President Al Gore

told senators in a letter that the FDA needs the full amount requested if all 50 states are to check whether stores are complying with new rules requiring identification checks tobacco buyers. The stores are supposed to check anyone buying tobacco who looks younger than 27.

The lower amount would be enough for only about 10 states to implement the compliance program.

"It is critical that the Food and Drug Administration's request for \$34 million in funding be granted in order to stop these illegal sales to our children," Gore wrote in the letter made public Tuesday.

More than \$1 billion in tobacco products are illegally sold to minors each year, Gore added.

A similar amendment by Harkin in July was defeated, but the new version has one key difference: Instead of assessing the tobacco industry for the cost, the money would be shifted from Agriculture Department accounts that pay for computers.

"This is round two in the effort to snuff out youth smoking," Harkin said. "Thirty-four million dollars is a pittance compared to the \$50 billion in smoking-related medical costs our nation pays out each year."

Rather than taking political risks by arguing the amendment itself, opponents complained that Harkin is sidestepping a Senate agreement to speed up passage of spending bills by forcing lawmakers into a second vote on a measure that already failed once. Harkin's earlier version was supported by 48 of the 100 senators.

"To permit this procedure to prevail in having us vote twice on the same amendment we've already disposed of, I think, should be rejected," said Sen. Thad Cochran, R-Miss., chairman of the Senate Appropriations panel on agriculture.

"We're all for doing everything possible to persuade young people, minors, not to smoke. That's not the issue here," he added.



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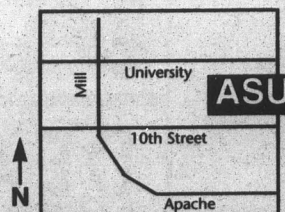
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# Proposed bonus plan to recognize exceptional professors

The faculty of Arizona's three major universities are awaiting \$4 million in bonus pay, contingent on a final distribution plan.

The money, which will be used in the Teaching Incentive Program (TIP), will be given out for the 1998 fiscal year. It will be divided up among ASU, the University of Arizona and Northern Arizona University, said ASU President Lattie Coor.

"The provosts of the three universities have to come up with a common plan for the Regents meeting," said Darwyn Linder, president of the Academic Assembly and Academic Senate.

After they have made their recommendations, the presidents will have to review it.

"The three presidents will have to make a final recommendation," Regent Kurt Davis said. "Hopefully it will be done soon."

With the Arizona Board of Regents meeting in two weeks, there will have to be some type of closure.

"The three presidents will have to make the recommendations," Provost Milton Glick said. "There is a Board of Regents meeting on September 20. Things have to be done by that time."

This is a process that has been ongoing for the universities' presidents.

"The three universities are working hard to establish a set of principles," Coor said.

Those principles have to be accepted by ABOR. They include developing a common method of distribution of the TIP funds among the three universities and a way for the faculty who qualify for the TIP to receive a salary increase that is more than those who don't qualify for TIP.

"We believe that performance should be rewarded year in and year out," Coor said.

To be a qualifying faculty member for the TIP, a minimum of six credit hours must be taught with a satisfactory performance rating. Dissertation, thesis, and internship

supervision as well as 21 student credit hours of independent study also qualify faculty.

But there are some concerns with the way teachers qualify for the TIP.

"Any system that rewards solely on the quantity of anything is short-sighted," said Thomas Callarman, associate professor of operation management. "Rewards should be based on quality — better than satisfactory. There are a lot of faculty that provide a lot of learning for students, that go beyond the six hours."

Another problem is the faculty who are on sabbatical right now.

"There are people on sabbatical that are excellent teachers," Linder said. "They have huge teaching loads when they are here and don't qualify for the increase because this is the semester to qualify."

Whether these types of issues will be addressed in the final proposal remain to be seen.

"I feel that the final proposal will be fair," Coor said.

## Newest town in Pima County not home free yet, officials say

TUCSON (AP) — The City Council will appeal a recent ruling that found a new municipal incorporation law constitutional, and that puts the future of Pima County's newest town at risk.

The Board of Supervisors approved Tortolita on Tuesday, including acceptance of several pockets that otherwise would have been unincorporated areas cut off from other such areas, something state law

doesn't allow.

The board conditionally excluded a portion of the Tortolita area annexed by Marana pending a determination whether a referendum drive opposing the annexation succeeds in reaching the ballot. If the drive isn't successful, the parcel becomes part of Tortolita and that could lead to a lawsuit.

Meanwhile, Oro Valley Mayor Cheryl Skalsky removed an obstacle by saying she

has no plans to continue pursuing annexation of 2,100 acres within Tortolita.

"I'm very happy that the area has control over its own destiny, the way they see fit," Skalsky said.

The law that Tucson is continuing to challenge waives a requirement under an older state law that areas within six miles of a previously existing city get the existing municipality's approval before they can incorpo-

rate. Tucson contends it's unconstitutional because it applies only to Pima County.

Tortolita is the first new town in Pima County since Sahuarita incorporated in 1994. The board has approved a Nov. 4 incorporation election for Casa Adobes, and residents in the areas of Catalina and the Tanque Verde expected to decide later this month whether to start efforts to gather signatures.

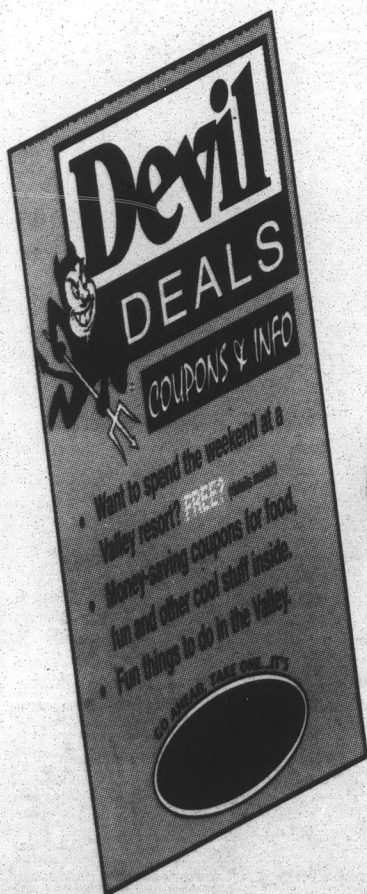

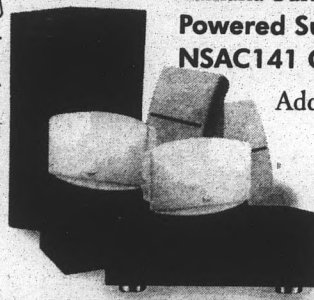
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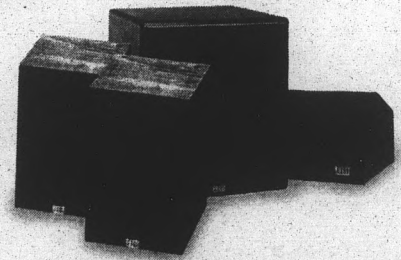


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# JonBenet ransom note published; still raises questions

DENVER (AP) — JonBenet Ramsey's mother gave conflicting accounts to police of the morning she said she found a ransom note, a New York magazine reported Wednesday.

A lengthy article in *Vanity Fair* also publishes a full transcript of the ransom note and reports allegations that Patricia Ramsey's handwriting was the only one of 74 tested that "set off alarm bells." The magazine says affidavits for arrest warrants of both Patricia and John Ramsey "have been ready to serve since May."

The magazine provided media outlets with advance copies of the story, which will be in the October issue that appears on newsstands in New York City Sept. 10 and Sept. 16 nationally.

Six-year-old JonBenet's body was discovered in the basement of her home the day after Christmas, eight hours after her mother, Patricia, said she found the note. The little beauty pageant queen, whose father is a millionaire businessman, had been beaten and strangled. Police have made no arrests.

*Vanity Fair* quoted Boulder policeman Richard French in a police report as writing that Mrs. Ramsey told him at first that she had gone into JonBenet's room at about 5:45 a.m. (Dec. 26) to wake her up. She said she found the room empty and went down the spiral back stairs where she discovered the note.

French said Mrs. Ramsey later told him she found the note on the spiral back stairs when she went down to make coffee, then ran to JonBenet's room, according to the magazine.

The text of the 2 1/2-page note was published in *The*

*Rocky Mountain News* in its Wednesday edition. The newspaper said it obtained it from an advance copy of the next issue of *Vanity Fair*.

The Denver Post published excerpts in its Wednesday edition.

The writer of the ransom note purported to represent "a small foreign faction" and threatened to kill the girl for "any deviation from our instructions."

But *Vanity Fair* quoted "an investigator closely involved with the testing of the ransom note" as saying of the 74 names submitted for testing, "Patsy's handwriting was the only one that set off alarm bells."

The magazine also quoted a Colorado Bureau of Investigation report: "There are indications that the author of the ransom note is Patricia Ramsey, but the evidence falls short to support that definitive conclusion."

Investigators have said John Ramsey has been ruled out as a writer of the note, but not Mrs. Ramsey.

Published reports have described various aspects of the note, including that it was purportedly from a foreign group and that it asked for \$118,000.

The only known copies were in the hands of the Boulder district attorney's office, the police department and the Ramseys' lawyers. They all denied providing the note to *Vanity Fair*.

In a statement, Ramsey attorney Hal Haddon called the *Vanity Fair* article "tabloid trash." He said publication of the ransom note — which Boulder officials refused to allow the Ramseys to release because they said it could damage the investigation — "warrants criminal and disciplinary investigations."

According to the transcript published by *Vanity Fair*, the ransom note instructed JonBenet's father to take an "adequate size attache to the bank" to pick up \$118,000. It said he would be called at home between 8 a.m. and 10 a.m. and told how to deliver the money. The call never came.

"Any deviation of my instructions will result in the immediate execution of your daughter," the note said. "You will also be denied her remains for proper burial."

"Speaking to anyone about your situation such as police or F.B.I. will result in your daughter being beheaded. If we catch you talking to a stray dog, she dies. If you alert bank authorities, she dies. If the money is in anyway marked or tamper with, she dies. You will be scanned for electronic devices and if any are found, she dies."

"You are not the only fat cat around so don't think that killing will be difficult. Don't underestimate us, John. Use that good, southern common sense of yours. It's up to you now, John," the note also said.

The ransom note ended with, "Victory! S.B.T.C." There has been speculation the initials, previously disclosed, could be a reference to the Subic Bay training center in the Philippines, where Ramsey served in the Navy.

*Vanity Fair* also quoted a source as saying that a flow of privileged, confidential information critical to a case against the Ramseys has been leaked from the district attorney's office "to the Ramseys' lawyers with the efficiency of a sieve."

"The Ramseys' best defense attorneys are right inside (DA Alex) Hunter's office," the source told *Vanity Fair*.

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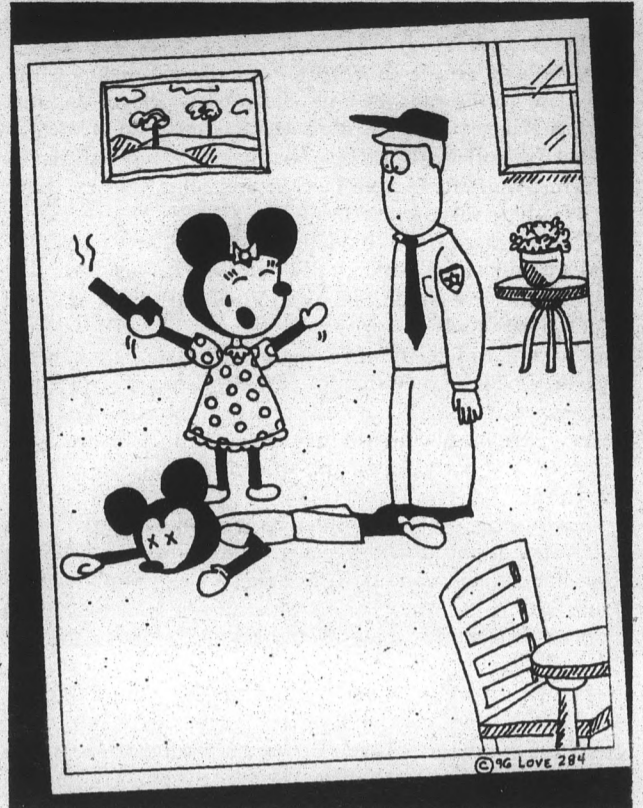

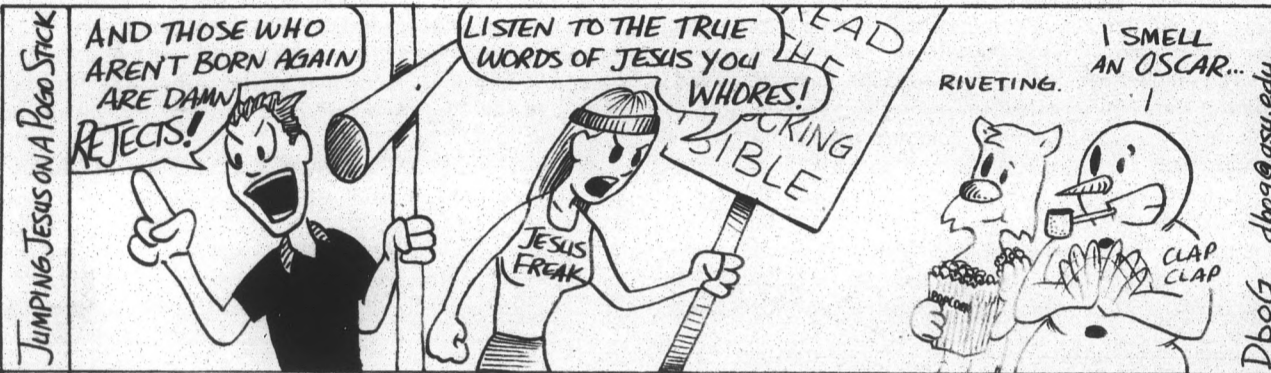

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# Park's addition makes national champs stronger

## Junior golf title holder cornerstone of ASU program's next four years

It's a story that almost belongs in a picture book.

It may even be a story to rival Tiger Woods'.

"Tiger Woods is my hero," Grace Park said with a smile. "I'm not as good as him though."

But in fact, in her pursuit of her dream to play on the ASU women's golf team, the defending NCAA women's golf champions, a program that has won the title five times in the last five years, she met Woods as the 1996 Dial Soap Scholar Athlete of the Year.

When she was 12, Park moved from Seoul, Korea to Hawaii with her aunt and her sister, to learn English and move out of, what was at the time, the obscurity of golf in Korea.

At 14, she moved to the Phoenix area in hopes of playing at ASU some day. She moved around, living with family friends in order to play high school golf first at Xavier, then Horizon.

"The strongest part of her game is being able to focus and concentrate," said Randy Petersen, Park's Horizon golf coach. "Hitting the ball long has always been a strength of her game. You can hit those great shots off the tee, but if you can't hit the eight-foot putts, the score is not going to be there."

She was the 1994 and 1996 American Junior Golf Association player of the year, competing against many of the top players she will face in her first year of collegiate golf when the dream reaches a new level.

Also, Park appeared twice in *Sports Illustrated*, was the Arizona 5A Arizona

high school women's individual state champion, was named the May 1996 Old Spice Student Athlete of the Month and earned Horizon's \$5,000 as the 1996 Dial Soap National Scholar Athlete of the year.

In between her high school season, keeping a 3.5 grade point average, and 17 tournaments on the AJGA a year, she took any precious chance she could to see her parents. Usually it was her parents traveling halfway around the world to see their daughter play.

After graduating high school on the honor roll, she entertained scholarship offers from schools on both coasts and every point in between. But in the end she decided to stay in the town she grew up in.

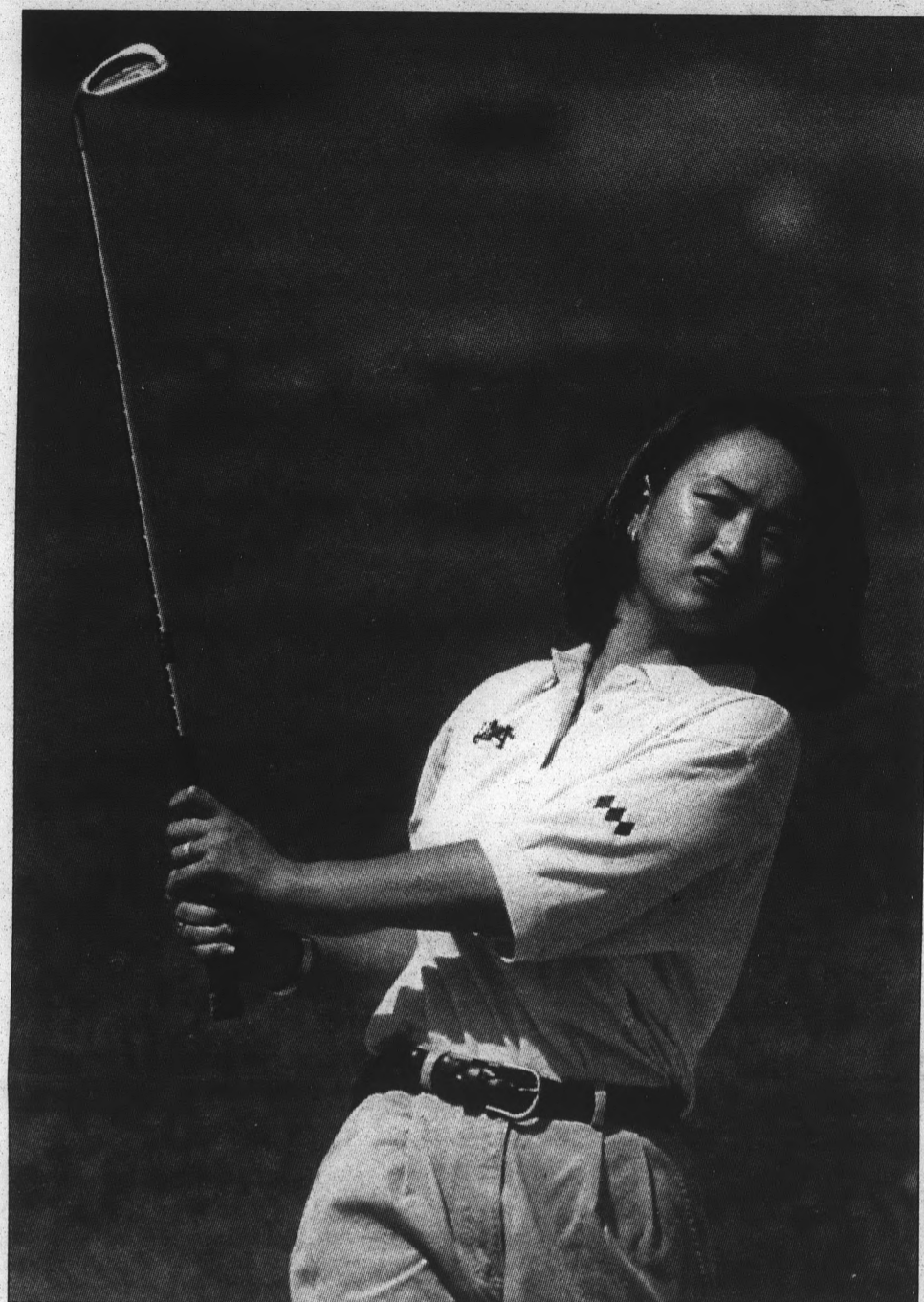
"Phoenix is my hometown now," Park said. "I moved to Arizona so I could play for Arizona State. At the last minute, I looked at some of the other schools but I wanted to stay here."

"People say, 'Oh, you're going to ASU? Oh, that's nice. Did you get a scholarship? Oh, that's nice,'" she added. "But they don't understand. Arizona (State) is the national champion. This is the best program there is."

And now, with a 71.8 stroke average on the AJGA tour last year, she was ranked third in the Rolex Collegiate Preseason Individual Preseason Rankings this year, despite never making an appearance in a single collegiate contest.

Only two players were ranked higher — NCAA Women's Individual Champion Marisa Baena of UofA and fellow Sun Devil Kellee Booth.

Both are names that strike fear in the heart of lesser golfers. But the three have

## J.R. Redmond's 93-yard scamper wins top honor

Tailback J.R. Redmond, who ran for a 93-yard, third-quarter touchdown in the Sun Devils' season-opening 41-10 thrashing of visiting New Mexico State Saturday, received the first weekly AT&T Long Distance "run from scrimmage" award of the 1997 football campaign.

Despite his extraordinary performance, Redmond was quick to give credit where credit was due—the offensive line.

"That was brilliant blocking," he said. "It was very exciting and looking (I) looked ahead and saw nothing in front."

A 6-foot, 200-pound sophomore from Carson (Calif.) High School, Redmond blasted through a large hole over right guard and raced all the way into the end zone to give ASU a commanding 24-3 edge.

It was the fifth-longest run in school history.

In honor of his "Long Distance" accomplishment, AT&T has donated \$400 to the NCAA's Degree-Completion Scholarship Program,

bringing the AT&T contributions to this fund to \$344,000.

Redmond, who finished with 176 yards rushing on 10 carries, will be given an engraved plaque in recognition of his accomplishments.

# Selig doesn't want 'Band-Aid approach' taken with current realignment proposals

CHICAGO (AP) — Baseball's realignment committee said Wednesday it plans to push for a plan with 16 teams in one league, 14 in the other and unbalanced schedules starting next season.

"The real goal isn't to realign. The real goal is to come up with very efficient scheduling which would make the season more meaningful," realignment committee chairman John Harrington said Wednesday after his group met with the sport's ruling executive council.

"Due to the complexities of scheduling ... 16-14 is probably what we would come out with," said Harrington, the CEO of the Boston Red Sox. "And all of our teams want unbalanced scheduling."

Most recent plans have placed 16 teams in four NL divisions and 14 clubs in three AL divisions. Several clubs would have to change leagues to make for good geographic matchups.

Acting commissioner Bud Selig reiterated that with Tampa Bay and Arizona joining the major leagues as expansion teams next season, the time for change is now. Selig and Harrington favor radical geo-

graphic realignment in which 15 teams would switch leagues.

"They talk about, 'Those dopes don't know how to grow the revenues,'" Selig said. "Well, the schedule's the most important marketing factor you have. And if you're not sensitive to that and try to do the very best ... you're denying your sport the opportunity to grow."

"The worst mistake we can make is a Band-Aid approach, do a little now. Because we're fooling you and we're fooling ourselves, and in a year or two we'd be back again and that would be unconscionable."

Selig said that while there are up to five basic realignment proposals with "lots of variations," he expects the committee to submit one plan for a vote when the owners meet Sept. 16-18 in Atlanta.

Philadelphia Phillies owner Bill Giles said simply putting Tampa Bay in the AL West — currently the only open spot — would be wrong because it would preclude the expansion team from having any geographic rivals.

Giles said most owners favor placing all the Pacific Time Zone teams in the NL, as

part of one large division or two smaller ones.

Under that scenario, he said, "Many clubs will play 150 of their 162 games in their time zone, and there would be more young people seeing games."

Radical realignment, which would put the New York Yankees and Mets in one division and put the Chicago Cubs and White Sox in another, has drawn the opposition of at least seven NL teams.

"I wouldn't say it's dead," Selig said. "Nothing is dead right now."

Selig disputed that one or two dissenting owners could block any realignment plan. Owners have said no team would be forced to change leagues against its will.

"That's open to some debate. The lawyers (say) ... that isn't necessarily true," he said, without providing details.

Selig said it's likely the designated hitter will remain an AL-only proposition, even though owners last week proposed its total elimination. Most NL clubs have voiced strong opposition to bringing the DH to their league, and the players' association has said it is against dropping the DH.

competed against each other for years in the AJGA.

"This is different now though," Park said. "Now I'm representing ASU."

"I'm honored to be ranked so high," Park said nervously. "It helps me work harder to prove I can do what they say."

"Mostly I have to get used to college life," Park said.

Petersen said he anticipates Parks having few problems facing the level of competition in Division I-A golf.

"The bottom line is she is going to have to beat the course," Petersen said. "She is going to have to play the course better than someone else is playing the course."

But ASU women's golf coach Linda Vollstedt said Park's presence does more than strengthen an already invincible looking team that has all five starters returning from last year's national championship team.

With last year's team leaders Booth and Jeanne-Marie Busuttill in their final season this year, Park could be the cornerstone on which the program will be built for the next four years.

"Knowing that Kellee and Jeanne-Marie are seniors, and they are two just solid All-American players, you know you really have to plan for your future," Vollstedt said. Bringing Grace in is very beneficial."

"Grace is definitely one of the best players ever to enter college golf," she said.

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# Fight fanatic pleas for 'No Más'

Please, *no más*.

The thought of another Sugar Ray Leonard-Roberto Duran fight just makes me want to vomit.

So there, I said it.

And I doubt I'm the only one who feels this way.

But if an Australian boxing promoter has his way, the world will watch two over-the-hill warriors duke it out sometime soon.

Promoter Mike Acri has been given an offer from Australian promoter Bill Mordey to bring Leonard and Duran to a new casino on the Gold Coast for a proposed fourth bout between the two aging legends.

But why?

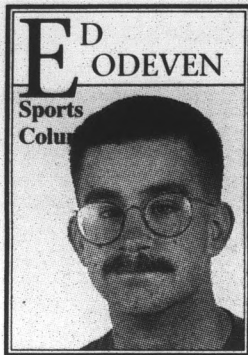
Here's Leonard's pathetic explanation.

"Ray said, 'If the money is there, I'd consider it, but I'd want to have one or two fights (before Duran) to see where I stand,'" Acri told the *Associated Press* from his office in Erie, Pa.

I'll tell you where Leonard, who has retired three times, stands.

He's far from being the flamboyant, gifted fighter he was in the late 1970s to early 1980s. He's slower, heavier and a lot less durable than he used to be.

After a five-year retirement, the 41-year-old Leonard was battered badly by Hector "Macho" Camacho on March 1 in Atlantic City. Leonard's previous fight was on Feb. 9, 1991 against the talented Terry Norris who smacked him



around for 12 rounds.

Leonard, who won an Olympic medal in 1976 and has been a professional champion in five different weight classes, has a career record of 36-2-1 with 25 knockouts.

## Durable Duran

The 46-year-old Panamanian is still a decent fighter. But now, he is slower. He is older. He has lost his "Hands of Steel." And he no longer has the intimidating presence in the ring that he once possessed.

Perhaps his biggest claim to fame came in a WBC welterweight title fight against Leonard on Nov. 25, 1980 in New Orleans when he uttered the now infamous words "no mas," after quitting in the eighth round.

And his memorable 15-round battle with Leonard on June 20, 1980 in Montreal will go down in boxing history as one of the greatest title fights of all time.

The third Leonard-Duran fight was an uneventful 12-round WBC super middle weight title fight on Dec. 7, 1989 in Las Vegas, which Leonard won by decision.

According to Mordey, there is still interest in seeing these two fight for a fourth time. (Here's a better suggestion: rent the first two Leonard-Duran fights and watch them on your VCR).

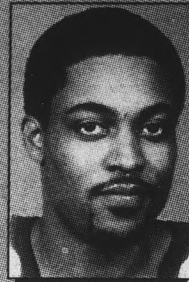
Said Mordey: "They are two of the great legends of the sport, and even though they are past their best I know I would walk across broken glass just to see them."

That's the problem. Athletes and fans don't know when enough is enough.

# Wizards' Strickland spends night in jail

WASHINGTON (AP) — Rod Strickland of the Washington Wizards was released from jail Wednesday after his arrest on charges of drunken driving and disorderly conduct.

The 31-year-old point guard appeared briefly in court and pleaded innocent. He faces trial Jan. 21.

Strickland's lawyer, Billy Martin, said his client had been treated "unfairly" and should not have been jailed overnight.

"I think he was charged as a result of driving an expensive Mercedes-Benz," Martin said. "... He was charged because of who he is. Most people who are arrested and charged with DUI or refusing to take a Breathalyzer are released from the station."

Police said Strickland was stopped early Wednesday after making an illegal left turn in downtown Washington and became a "little disorderly." He is also charged with failing to show his driver's license. Strickland refused a sobriety test.

In court, Strickland, wearing a gray, short-sleeved shirt and blue pants, stood with his hands clasped behind his back. When asked if he understood the charges, he responded "yes" in a low voice.

As Strickland waited his turn, a defendant in another case recognized him and shook his hand. Strickland left by a back door and would not comment. He got into a black BMW with several other people.

Wizards general manager Wes Unseld, who has not spoken with his player, said the matter is not one the team would "take lightly."

"Until we have further information surrounding these events, we will have no other comment," he said.

Martin, who has represented Wizard's forward Juwan Howard and Philadelphia 76ers star Allen Iverson, has requested a jury trial. Howard was arrested last November and charged with drunken driving. Howard agreed to enter an alcohol rehabilitation and education program, after which the charge was dropped.

Strickland pleaded guilty in April 1996 to hitting a former girlfriend and was ordered to attend a program for batterers.

He was acquitted of a battery charge filed in 1994 when he and a teammate got in a shoving match with a truck driver in a Chicago parking lot.

# Phillies walk away with Bronx sweep

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Kevin Stocker has 14 homers during five years in the major leagues. The one he hit Wednesday night was the first he knew was gone when it left his bat.

"That's the first time I've ever been able to watch a home run," Stocker said after helping the Philadelphia Phillies sweep a three-game series against the New York Yankees with a 5-4 victory. "That one, I knew."

Stocker, who is no Mickey Morandini, went 2-for-4 with three RBI, and Mike Stanton forced home the winning run by walking Tony Barron in the ninth inning as the Phillies handed the Yankees their sixth loss in seven games.

Stocker called the sweep of the defending World Series champions the highlight of the season for the last-place Phillies, who have played well enough to win 23 of their last 32 games.

Manager Terry Francona said the sweep shows the Phillies, 24-61 at the All-Star break but 29-21 since, are growing.

"We're looking to beat anybody we can, any time we can," Francona said, shrugging off the role of spoiler. "For us to do this is a big step forward. I don't know if something like this was realistic two months ago."

Morandini singled off Stanton (6-1) to start the ninth, but was forced at second on Gregg Jefferies' groundout. Scott Rolen and Rico Brogna singled to load the bases, and Stanton struck out Mike Lieberthal before walking Barron on four pitches.

Francona and Stocker said the key in the inning was when Rolen hustled to beat out an attempted force at second on what turned out to be an infield single for Brogna.

"There are so many people doing so many of the little things that turn out to be huge," Francona said. "That's how you win."

## Concussion could knock Young out

SANTA CLARA, Calif. (AP) — Steve Young's latest concussion looks like it might keep him on the sidelines for at least a week, and rookie Jim Druckenmiller, the only healthy quarterback on the San Francisco 49ers' roster, may make his first start Sunday at St. Louis.

Coach Steve Mariucci said Young's playing status was undecided but it was apparent he was leaning toward making him inactive this week. Mariucci said he would announce his decision Thursday and that the neurologist's recommendation Young, who has had three concussions over the last 10 months, sit out a game carried a lot of weight.

"He gave me his assessment of the situation and he made a very conservative suggestion that certainly it would benefit Steve to rest this game, give him a little bit more time in between possible hits," Mariucci said. "The concussion was much less severe than it was in the past, yet it was still a concussion and that we should proceed with caution."

"Maybe it's a time we can be conservative, because Steve's health is the issue, first and foremost, and it always will be. We've got a long season ahead of us. We're going back (to St. Louis), and there's Astroturf there. It's probably safer and more

beneficial for Steve to take some time off."

Young, who was kneed in the head in Sunday's season-opening loss at Tampa Bay, said he felt good enough to play but conceded he couldn't keep taking shots to the head and continue his football career.

Druckenmiller, the 49ers' top draft pick out of Virginia Tech, took almost all the snaps at Wednesday's practice. Young took some snaps with the scout team. Backup Jeff Brohm, who has a broken bone in the middle finger of his passing hand and a lower back injury, didn't practice but will try to work out Thursday after getting some pain-killing injections.

The 49ers plan to work out quarterback Mike McCoy, who was in their training camp this summer, and sign him if Young doesn't play. The choice on a starter could hinge on whether Brohm can practice.

"If he misses a lot of practice time, then provided we choose not to use Steve and make him inactive, we'll let the youngster go," Mariucci said.

"There's a couple of question marks right now and that's the big thing right now, what's going to happen. We're just going to have to wait and see," Druckenmiller said.

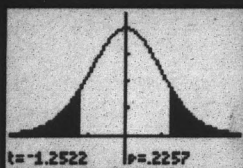
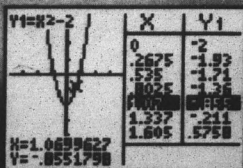
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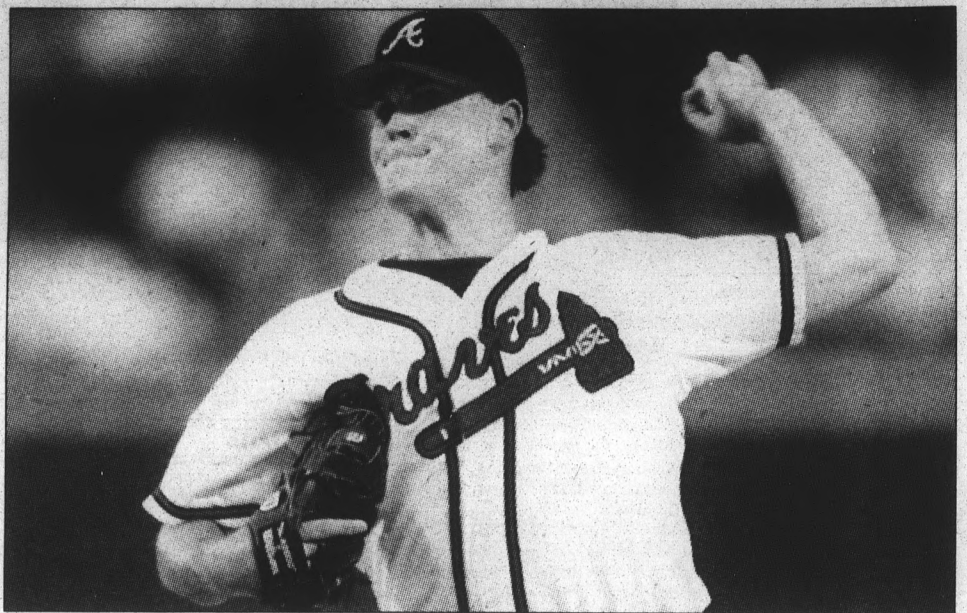

## With 19-3 Neagle, Braves seem lock for another Cy

ATLANTA (AP) — When Chipper Jones looks around the Atlanta clubhouse, he already sees three Cy Young Award winners.

"It sure would be neat to have four guys in here with a Cy Young," the Braves third baseman said.

Denny Neagle is doing his part. Supposedly the anonymous member of a rotation that includes Greg Maddux (NL Cy Young winner, 1992-95), Tom Glavine ('91) and John Smoltz ('96), Neagle is making a strong case that he's the best pitcher in the NL this year.

While Maddux is having a typically brilliant season and Montreal's Pedro Martinez deserves strong consideration with 16 wins and a microscopic 1.63 ERA, it may be impossible for the voters to deny Neagle.

Consider these numbers:

°He became the NL's first 19-game winner Tuesday night, pitching a four-hit shutout against the Detroit Tigers. With a record of 19-3, he has the best winning percentage (.864) in the majors.

°His four shutouts are tied for the major-league lead.

°He ranks fifth in the league with a 2.70 ERA and fourth in innings pitched with 209 2-3 and has held opponents to a cumulative

bating average of .232, 10th lowest in the NL.

Even Jones, who gets to see Maddux (17-4, 2.39 ERA) on a regular basis, would cast his Cy Young vote for Neagle.

"I kind of sense that no matter what Mad Dog (Maddux) does, he'll always be the front-runner," Jones said. "The fans will want to give it to him again, so Denny's got to go out there and win it. He's got that killer instinct, that tunnel vision, and he's really working his magic right now."

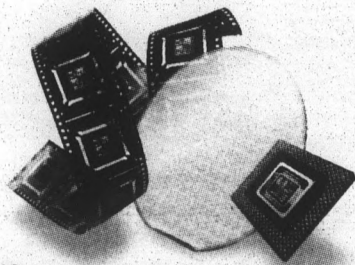
Neagle's 19th victory might have been his most impressive. He allowed only three singles and a double to the Tigers, but erased two of the runners on double plays and wound up facing only two batters above the minimum. He struck out six, walked none and kept Detroit off balance all night with his mystifying assortment of pitches.

"Detroit had no idea what was coming," catcher Javy Lopez said. "He never throws the same pitch twice in a row."

Neagle also went 2-for-3 at the plate, including his third career homer.

"I've never been a strong finisher in the second half," said Neagle, whose previous best record was 16-9 last season. "I wanted to make a point this second half that I could finish out the year on a good note."

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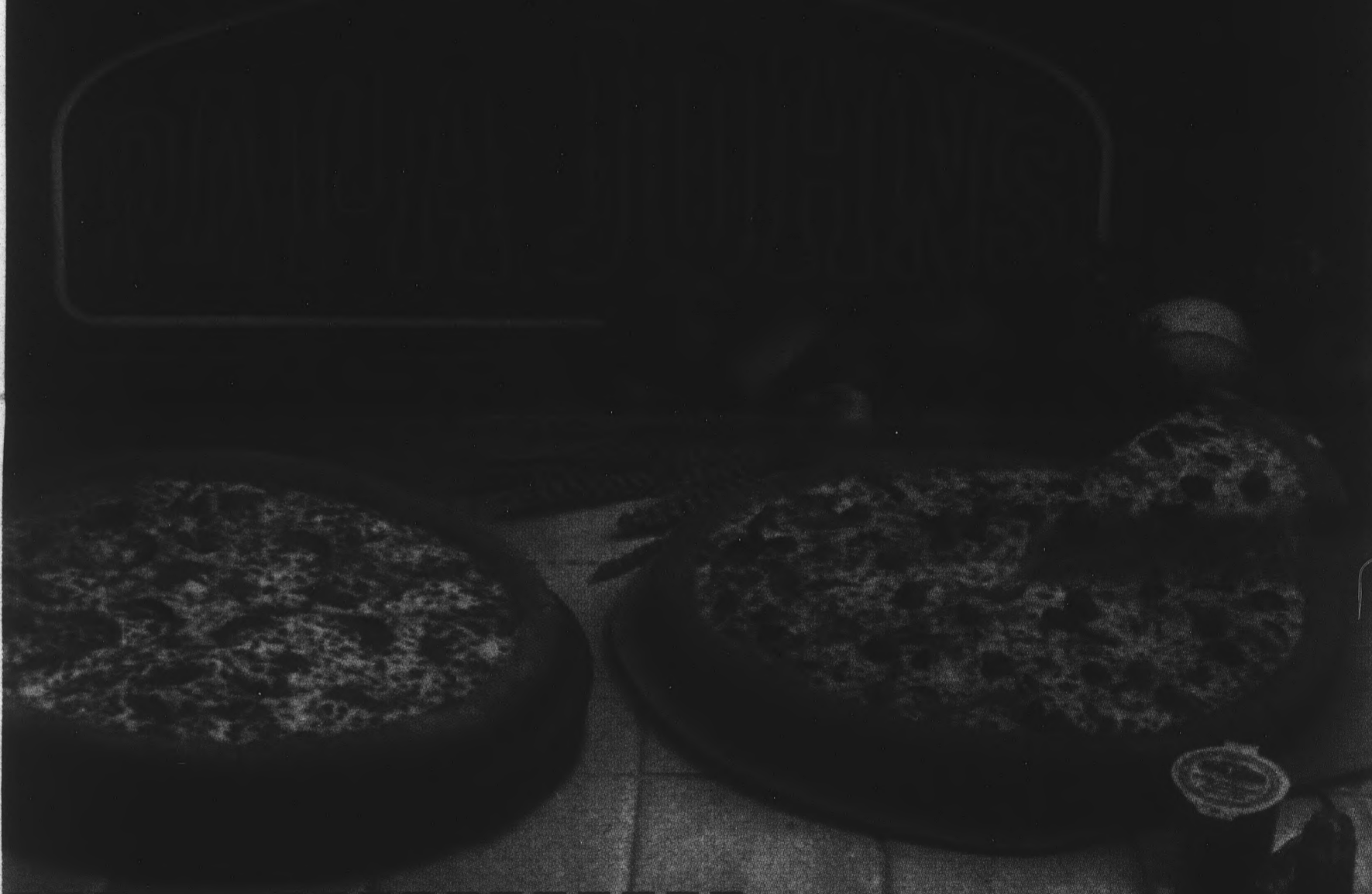

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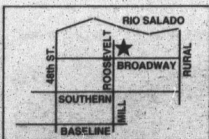

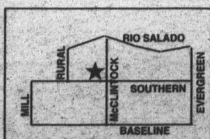
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
