## Coor: Governor Hull will treat University fairly

ASU officials said they expect Jane Hull to continue her hands-on approach to the University and higher education once she takes office.

Hull assumes the governorship today at 5 p.m. following Gov. Fife Symington's resignation after a jury found him guilty Wednesday on 7 counts of fraud.

"Jane Hull has been a familiar and active participant in committees at ASU," said Lattie Coor, ASU president. "I have every confidence that we will be treated fairly. I have no doubt that she will continue to stay active — she's that kind of leader."

Much of the optimism about Hull's ascension to the governorship comes from her support of higher education. Unlike Symington, Hull has been directly involved with ASU in the past, Provost Milton Glick said.

"She has always been concerned about higher education," Glick said. "She will be very concerned about the quality of education. We are going to move on with a new governor committed to education."

Coor concurred.

"We are extraordinarily fortunate to have the leadership and commitment to higher education of Jane Hull," Coor said.

Allan Price, vice president of Institutional Advancement, also agreed with the administrators' views on Hull.

"Our experience with her is that she is a fairly hands-on person," Price said. "She has been a supporter of higher education. Hull has been someone we've dealt with for many years. I would assume that would continue as governor."

Darwyn Linder, president of the Academic Senate and president of the Academic Assembly, said it would appear that Hull has an open mind about higher education in Arizona.

Hull has also added an ASU faculty member to her transitional staff.

"ASU faculty member Jack Pfister, of the College of Public Programs, will become part of Hull's staff," Price said.

## ASU scientists cart hi-tech equipment to local schools

Science education is moving out of the classroom and into the community through the efforts of ASU scientists and local educators.

Students in middle school, high school, community college and at the university level can now benefit from the Interactive Nano-Visualization in Science and Engineering Education (IN-VSEE), a project which focuses on community outreach and science education.

"We are working with Chandler High School, Chandler Gilbert Community College and Mesa Community College to reach and educate students," said Dr. B.L. Ramakrishna, director of the IN-VSEE Project and scanning-probe microscopy.

Through the project, students have access to scanning-probe microscopes, high-tech instruments that magnify an object or piece of matter into a three-dimensional image, which are accessible in the IN-VSEE van. The van is taken to schools throughout Maricopa County that do not have lab facilities.

The National Science Foundation funded \$4 million for outreach, lab research, and education. The Arizona Science Museum, the University of Arizona and Motorola are counterparts in the IN-VSEE project.

Ramakrishna said they hope to travel beyond Maricopa County to provide research opportunities for students without lab access.

"Not only do we want to make IN-VSEE available for education, but we want to amplify education," he said. "We want to

train students and prepare them for careers."

Twelve principal investigators are also working on campus to give students hands-on experience with lab research.

ASU students in liberal arts and sciences, applied sciences and engineering and the College of Education have access to four research labs which utilize scanning-probe microscopes. Ten scanning-probe microscopes are available in the labs.

Anil Vuppu, a graduate student in chemical engineering, is one of the students using the research tools on campus.

"This is part of my Ph.D. thesis," Vuppu said. "This project is helping me develop imaging techniques in nano-auto radiography."

Ramakrishna said chemistry, physics, biology, geology, mathematics and engineering work together in an interdisciplinary nature to investigate scientific structures and properties.

"IN-VSEE can help remediate problems by providing students with experiences that systematically demonstrate the interconnectedness of science, engineering and mathematics," he said.

Students and researchers are currently working with enzymes to see how they attach to DNA, Ramakrishna added. DNA is a code of genetic instructions passed along in the reproductive process of living organisms.

The microscopes are also being used for cancer and red blood cell research.

"This is just a testing stage, but it leads the way for research and development in the next three to five years," Ramakrishna said.

## ASASU decreases funds for concerts in wake of loss

While the Associated Students of ASU activities department budget has increased by more than \$5,000 over last year's, the money earmarked for concerts has dwindled from a whopping \$50,000 in the 1996-97 academic year to just \$12,000.

The drop in concert funds is a result of a change in priorities, said Autumn Ness, ASASU activities vice president.

Kolby Granville, last year's ASASU activities vice president, pooled money from inactive committees in order to sponsor what turned out to be a failed Seven Mary Three homecoming concert.

ASASU lost more than \$40,000 from the concert, which sold only 921 tickets.

This year's activities budget totals \$90,000, compared with \$84,000 last year.

Ness said she has a different idea of what is important to students.

"His priorities were different," she said. "His big goal was to have one huge event. He honestly wanted to do something that would attract a lot of students. In my opinion it wasn't researched well."

"I want to do something that's going to directly affect students everyday. One big event is cool, but I hold office for 12 months."

One way Ness is affecting students is through the new ASASU free concert series sponsoring local bands every Thursday at Palo Verde Beach.

"It's free music for the students," said Matt Brough, ASASU concert director. "ASASU doesn't have to spend any money and the students don't have to spend any money."

The bands play for free in the sweltering heat because they want the exposure, Brough said.

"They do it because they love it," he added. "We're using it as a promotional tool for them. It's an opportunity

There is also a feeling of more stability for the University with Hull assuming command of the state.

"Hopefully now the political climate can be stable," Linder said. "The governor (Symington) was not supportive of the University in the last budget, but turned out to be a strong supporter to allocations to the University this year. He has been a variable quantity."

"We hope that she (Hull) has a consistent open-minded response from the governor's office. It would make it easier for the University to plan ahead."

There were times when Symington supported the University and times when he did not, Price said.

Coor said that he is relieved the trial was finally over.

"I think it's always difficult for a state when something like this happens," he said.

However, the trial has cast a negative shadow on the state, by many accounts.

"Having a governor convicted is a problem for the state — no matter what side you are on," said Glick. "But we still have the same legislature, and the last year or two they have treated us fairly."

As far as the immediate future, ASU officials plan to work with Hull in her new position.

"We'll make sure that she is knowledgeable about what are needs are," Glick said. "Our job is not just to make the governor aware of our needs, but how we can partner with the governor. We need to make sure the governor knows how we can help the state and how the state can help us."

for them to promote upcoming shows."

Ness said the free concert series is a good way to show students what ASASU has to offer.

"That's what we're here for — to do something for the students because when someone says, 'ASASU — What's that?' We can say, 'That band you saw last week, that was us,'" she said.

But with two of last week's three concerts canceled, the series hasn't been a huge success.

"The reason we're doing (the concerts) is because we want something free for the students to do," Ness said. "The problem we're running into is lack of interest and the heat."

"It's trial and error. I'm not a concert promoter by trade, but we're learning."

Brough said a consistent time and location for the concerts as well as effective advertising should increase concert attendance.

A day-long "Lollapalooza-type event" is being planned by the concert department for the spring semester.

"Right now we're figuring what it's going to cost," Brough said. "Then we'll know how much money we'll have to spend on bands."

Ness said she learned from last year's mishap.

"I've learned from (Granville's) mistakes," she said. "When we do a big concert I want to do something that's safe — like a top-40 band."

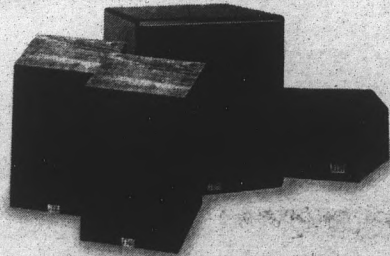

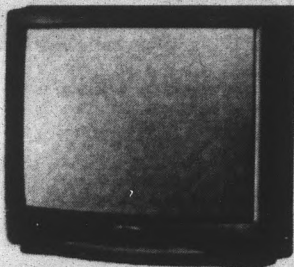

## Bombs explode in the heart of Jerusalem

JERUSALEM — Bombs exploded — once again — in the heart of Jerusalem on Thursday, spraying rusty nails into a crowd of shoppers and late-summer tourists on the city's main pedestrian walkway.

The blasts, claimed by the Islamic militant group Hamas, killed seven people — including three suicide bombers — and struck a new blow to peacemaking just as hopes for improvement were rising. At least 192 people were wounded.

Israel stepped up pressure on Yasser Arafat to crack down on Islamic militants and sealed its borders with the West Bank and Gaza Strip. A previous closure had been eased only two days earlier, ahead of Secretary of State Madeleine Albright's planned visit next week.

That closure was imposed after twin suicide bombings in a Jerusalem market killed 17 people on July 30.

In Washington, President Clinton denounced Thursday's bombings and said Albright would go ahead with her trip. Clinton urged Arafat's Palestinian Authority to "do all it can to create an environment that leaves no doubt that terror will not be tolerated."

The three nail-studded bombs exploded shortly after 3 p.m., as hundreds of shop-

pers, including many tourists, crowded the Ben Yehuda pedestrian mall, which is lined with cafes, gift shops and American fast-food restaurants such as Burger King and Sbarro.

Israel's Channel Two television said the bombers stood outside three stores on Ben Yehuda Street, close enough to make eye contact, and blew themselves up within seconds of each other.

Ambulances rushed to the chaotic scene, and rescue workers treated some of the victims on the sidewalk, where cafe chairs and umbrellas lay scattered amid piles of broken glass. Emergency workers rushed a toddler into the back of an ambulance. Paramedics splashed water in the face of a weeping man.

A charred smell hung over the mall while ultra-Orthodox burial squad volunteers searched for pieces of flesh in the debris — a familiar scene to Israelis.

Abie Mendelson, 18, a Jewish seminary student from Los Angeles, was having a drink with friends when the bombs went off.

"We had just clinked our glasses and heard the explosion," he said afterward from Jerusalem's Ein Kerem Hospital, where he was being treated for burns to his face and head.

"I heard my friend screaming. I looked down to make sure I could walk."

The two victims identified by late in the day were both Israelis.

Hamas, which has carried out 13 bombings in four years of Israeli-Palestinian peacemaking, claimed responsibility for the attack and threatened more bombings unless Hamas prisoners held by Israel were released by Sept. 14.

Arafat condemned the attack, and a senior Palestinian official pledged full cooperation with Israel on security matters. But Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu said the deeply troubled peace process could not go on unless Arafat crushed Hamas once and for all.

"No peace process can exist when the Palestinian Authority enables the leaders of the terrorists to walk around free with their arms, demonstrations and flags in cities that have become refuges for terrorists," Netanyahu said.

Later Thursday, Albright telephoned Netanyahu, who told her the Palestinian Authority was not doing enough to fight terrorism, the prime minister's office said.

Ahmed Abdel Rahman, secretary of Arafat's Cabinet, said the bombers apparently wanted to stop Albright from coming. Hamas opposes the peace agreements between Israel and the Palestinians.

"We are ready to coordi-

nate with the Israeli side and to cooperate with them to face this terrorism and this criminal act," Abdel Rahman said.

Israel rejected the offer of cooperation as too little, too late, and Israel radio said Netanyahu canceled the plans of his security chiefs to meet with Palestinian and U.S. security officials.

Hamas leader Abdel Aziz

Rantisi said he did not think Arafat would crack down on Hamas as he did following a spate of suicide bombings in early 1995: "They know that a crackdown is not for the benefit of the Palestinian people."

"Without a solution for the agony of our people inside and outside and without a return to our homeland, I believe that the bloodshed

will continue," he told The Associated Press at his home in the Gaza Strip.

In response to Thursday's attack, Israel once again barred Palestinians from entering Israel from the West Bank and Gaza Strip. Israel also imposed an internal closure, meaning Palestinians could not travel between West Bank towns and villages.

## 'Hurt' royals show they're in mourning, too; queen will address nation

LONDON — The royal family, saying it was hurt by public attacks over its remoteness since Princess Diana's death, suddenly took to London's streets and airwaves Thursday in a show of solidarity-in-grief with Britain's mourning millions.

Queen Elizabeth II, who has rarely reacted to public pressure in the past, even scheduled a televised address to say more to her nation on the eve of Saturday's historic funeral.

The ceremony promised to be a star-studded spectacle. Buckingham Palace announced, in a gesture to Diana's pop-star celebrity, that her friend Elton John will sing a version of one of his top-selling songs at the Westminster Abbey service.

But Diana's brother, Charles, the Earl Spencer, demanded that seven invited guests stay away — British tabloid newspaper editors. He blames pursuing photographers for the fatal crash Sunday in Paris.

The funeral program also showed that no member of the royal family will speak — reflecting the divorced status of

the Princess of Wales.

Criticism of the royal family had built for days, while it remained secluded and largely silent in Scotland in the aftermath of Diana's death. While they stayed at Balmoral Castle, tens of thousands of British commoners flocked to London's St. James's Palace to be near Diana's coffin and sign condolence books.

"Your people are suffering — Speak to us Ma'am," the tabloid Daily Mirror blared on Thursday's front page.

The pressure finally drew a response.

In a highly unusual on-the-record statement, the queen's press secretary said, "The queen has asked me to say that the royal family have been hurt by suggestions that they are indifferent to the country's sorrow at the tragic death of the Princess of Wales."

Press secretary Geoffrey Crawford described Diana as "a much loved national figure" and said her sons — Princes William, 15, and Harry, 12 — "miss her deeply."

"Prince William and Prince Harry themselves want to be with their father and grandparents at this time in the quiet haven of Balmoral," he said.

The palace announced the queen would make a broadcast to the nation on Friday — time unannounced. Friday is also when Prince Charles returns to London with the two boys, to go to the Chapel Royal at St. James's to view the coffin.

The family also went out into public Thursday. Charles' younger brothers, Princes Andrew and Edward, walked through the crowds of mourners and into St. James's to enter their own offerings in a condolence book reserved for VIPs.

And in what many will see as a concession to public opinion, television cameras captured Charles holding Harry's hand as the family looked at floral tributes laid outside Crathie Church, near Balmoral Castle.

"It's about time. In my opinion, it's a disgrace they've kept quiet for so long," said engineer John Bradley, who traveled to London from Devon in southwest England to pay his respects.

Some sympathized with the monarch. "I admire her for changing her mind. I think she has probably just been astounded by the response of the people," said Christine Davie, 56, a nurse who spent her day placing flowers at Westminster Abbey.

### Highlights of plans for Princess Diana's funeral at Westminster Abbey on Saturday:

**The Opening** — As the cortege enters the church, the abbey choir will sing: "I am the resurrection and the life, saith the Lord" and other verses from Scripture.

**The Bidding Prayer** — The dean, the Very Rev. Wesley Carr, will tell the congregation: "In her life, Diana profoundly influenced this nation and the world. Although a princess, she was someone for whom, from afar, we dared to feel affection, and by whom we were all intrigued. She kept company with kings and queens, with princes and presidents, but we especially remember her humane concerns and how she met individuals and made them feel significant. In her death she commands the sympathy of millions."

**The Traditional** — The BBC Singers, with soprano Lynne Dawson, sing "Deliver me, O Lord, from eternal death," from Verdi's *Requiem*.

**The Popular** — Elton John sings his hit, "Candle in the Wind." Inspired originally by the death of Marilyn Monroe, the song has been revised by John and lyricist Bernie Taupin to begin: "Goodbye England's rose."

**The Sacred** — Prime Minister Tony Blair will read from First Corinthians 13: "Though I speak with the tongues of men and of angels, and have not love, I am become as sounding brass, or a tinkling cymbal."

**Hymns** — "I vow to thee, my country," "The King of love my Shepherd is," "Make me a channel of your peace" and "Guide me, O thou great Redeemer."

**The Personal** — Prayers will be said for Dodi Fayed and Henri Paul, both of whom were also killed in the car crash in Paris on Sunday, and for bodyguard Trevor Rees-Jones, who was seriously injured.

**The Family** — Diana's sisters, Lady Sarah McCorquodale, 41, and Lady Jane Fellowes, 40, will read poetry. Their brother Charles, the ninth Earl Spencer, will deliver a tribute.

**The Finish** — The congregation will remain standing as the cortege leaves and the choir sings "Alleluia. May flights of angels sing thee to thy rest," to music by John Tavener, after which silence falls for two minutes, broken by the ringing of the abbey's bells, half-muffled.

## STATE PRESS Boos & Bravos

**Bravo** — To federal prosecutors, whose tireless efforts and years spent accumulating evidence against Symington paid off Wednesday. Slick, arrogant and corrupt businessman like our soon-to-be ex-governor are masters at covering their tracks, but to the experts who knew crimes had been committed, the hunt was worth it. While it's tough for Arizona residents to face the reality of having the last two elected governors leave office in shame, the feds can't be faulted for doing their job.

**Boo** — To laws that allow armed bounty hunters to invade someone's home without first contacting police. The slaying of Chris Foote and Spring Wright is one of the most appalling and scary crimes in recent history, made all the more so by its apparent blessing by Arizona statutes. Not only does the law need the prompt attention of legislators — perhaps even in the fall session lawmakers are considering — but perhaps capital punishment should also be applied to second-degree murder cases, at least in the case of bounty hunters who "goof up."

**Boo** — To those who accuse the paparazzi of "killing" Princess Di. It's obvious to all media consumers that fanatical attention by celebrity-hunters can be an annoying, frustrating experience, but those same consumers are helping pay the paparazzi's salaries. How many of those who accuse the paparazzi of doing something wrong will wake up in the middle of the night Friday to tune in to Di's funeral? The driver apparently had a blood-alcohol content four times the French legal limit — twice the Arizona limit — and was going 121 miles per hour. He's the only one to blame.

**Bravo** — To Maricopa County Superior Court Judge B. Michael Dann, who on Wednesday dismissed the conviction of a Guadalupe convenience store clerk. Maria Hernandez-Jaimez shot a man accused of stealing beer as he ran out of her store. She claimed she had felt threatened and was unused to handling a weapon. Whether or not Hernandez-Jaimez actually intended to shoot the man may never be known, but one thing is clear — jury members did not want to see her go to jail. Judge Dann admitted he had erred in giving instructions to the jury, which influenced the way they voted. Justice does occasionally prevail.

**Boo** — To Student Health, for relying so heavily on a suspect survey. Karen Moses, assistant director of health education and wellness at the Student Health Center, said the survey results will be used to guide educators in programming at the residence halls this year. But is that wise? Statistics experts say the method used to get those results was unscientific and possibly resulted in skewed results. The results could be accurate. Trouble is, no one will know until a valid, scientific poll — the kind that should have been done in the first place — is completed.

## Symington debate calls to question voter responsibility

Those who do not know their history are doomed to repeat it. Arizona is learning this lesson the hard way.



There has been a long tradition of bizarre and unpredictable events surrounding the governors of Arizona. When Gov. Fife Symington was found guilty Wednesday on seven counts of bank fraud, the newest chapter was written.

This will mark the fourth time in two decades that a high-ranking government official will be checking out in midterm. It also marks the second time in Arizona's history that a governor faced felony charges. Evan Mecham, also a Republican, was eventually acquitted of accepting illegal contributions, but not before being impeached in 1988.

Symington announced his resignation as governor within two hours of being convicted on the felony charges, which pretty much assured his departure from office.

Now Arizona stands poised for a new leader. Secretary of State Jane Hull is set to take over the office at 5 p.m. Friday and many are hoping she will be able to take the reins and lead us far away from the troubled roads down which her predecessors have taken us.

However, when all the controversy subsides and Arizonans begin to settle comfortably into the Hull administration, what will we have learned from the whole experience and what will we choose to remember?

Some may choose to recall the early Fife

Symington, who claimed to be a moderate Republican with a sound business record who would govern fairly, compassionately and responsibly. They may even feel Fife got a bum deal.

Others may remember Terry Goddard, who challenged Symington's image as a successful businessman seven years ago during their race for governor. They may wish they had listened harder.

Still others will remember the anger they felt when a man they respected, believed in and ultimately voted for was convicted of a felony and forced to leave office. They may be left feeling betrayed by their former leader.

For most, the Governor's resignation brings with it an air of extreme sadness. This once-prominent political career, which displayed so much potential and promise, is over and will undoubtedly be grouped with the likes of former Gov. Mecham, who embarrassed his party with his numerous public insults and tainted appointments to his administration.

The Symington administration was also plagued with problems which ultimately seemed to overshadow some of the innovative and optimistic changes the Governor made. This is not to say he was a supreme leader; both the school funding system and the health care system in Arizona are in major need of reform.

Nevertheless, the plagued administration was able to keep a good deal of its campaign promises. Symington administration cut taxes and revived the idea of limited government. Arizona achieved

unprecedented economic prosperity and huge surpluses, not to mention the annual rate of growth of the general fund budget was much slower during his tenure than it was under any of his predecessors.

These, however, are not what most Arizonans will remember. Granted, Symington has nobody to blame but himself for the state of his affairs, but the voting public, whether they feel betrayed, angry or simply apathetic about the matter, must remember who put him there.

Of course, nobody could predict these events, but there is a larger issue at hand than just a governor who had business troubles. The fact that the man was able to get into office in the first place illustrates that we, as voters, are not doing what we should. We are not getting involved or asking enough questions. We take information spoon-fed to us and fill out a ballot on election day. Many don't even do that.

Symington and all the other politicians in Arizona's history who have let us down are responsible and should be held accountable for the mistakes they made, but enough mistakes have been made throughout the years for the public to try and stop such mistakes before they start.

Jane Hull will take office Friday and become the 20th governor of Arizona. Only time will tell whether she will break from tradition and give Arizona something that it hasn't had in quite some time — a leader.

### Web classes offer opportunities, convenience for many students

This is in response to the editorial "Web classes can't replace standard education" (Aug. 29), comparing WWW courses to the standard education. It is true that many courses and degrees are not suitable for Web delivery for various reasons. While the results of a recent study showed that convenience is increasingly more important to college students, delivering courses via the Web is more than about convenience. Web-based courses and degrees are not designed to replace the standard education. Courses that are available anytime, anyplace are increasingly appealing to both faculty and students as teaching and learning continue to change and our efforts are becoming more student-focused.

The typical college student on campus is older than the 18-21 age range. Older students have many situations and pressures that are part of daily life, such as commitments to work and family. Working adults are expected to continually increase their level of skill and contribution to the employer's bottom line. All these pressures mean many working adults find it extremely difficult to obtain the education needed to progress to the next step in their career.

The value of virtual courses goes far beyond convenience. Access is perhaps a stronger reason that several institutions are involved and enthused about offering courses through the Internet. Anytime, anyplace, learning opportunities provide courses to those who might have difficulties such as time, travel, physical handicap, etc. It means that a person living far from a campus can access opportunities which may not be available within hundreds of miles. For others, it also simply means more options and the freedom to select from educational resources that best meet their needs.

Many faculty at ASU have recognized the opportunity to use the Web to reach new student markets. Most institutions offering Internet courses have programs to assist faculty through teams of instructional designers, programmers, and others to produce courses. Through such programs, faculty are able to dedicate their time to course content and instruction rather than battle with HTML programming.

The definition for a standard education will continue to change. Those who learn best by having an instructor physically present should continue to do so and take advantage of that opportunity. Those who teach best by having students physically in front of them should also continue to do so. However, individuals limited by time, travel, etc., will find the Web does offer many opportunities to pursue an education, whether one course or an entire degree is the goal. While studies exploring online learning opportunities perhaps are yet in progress, the growth in content and courses available has been tremendous. If students and faculty were not enjoying the experience, perhaps they would vote by not participating. Just the opposite seems to be true — new courses are being offered at almost an exponential rate.

Web courses are not designed or intended to diminish quality in the learning experience or to replace faculty. Both learning experiences, on-campus and Web-based, create options for students to adapt opportunities to their own needs. The Web has created options: many individuals are now able to access a variety of educational resources and at times and locations that work best for them.

### Claims about Di, media 'ridiculous' Editorial inaccurate, insensitive

Legislative power in Britain is held by the Parliament, and the highest-ranking political figure is Prime Minister Tony Blair. The monarchy holds a mostly symbolic position in Britain. Walterscheidt also states that Diana had no "official function" as a result of her divorce from Prince Charles. Diana was not stripped of her title, "Princess of Wales" and continued to reside at Kensington palace, a royal estate. This is aside from the fact that members of a figurehead monarchy serve very little "official function" to begin with.

These details are somewhat inconsequential and serve mainly to demonstrate a lack of research and/or general knowledge of the author. What is more disturbing to me is the complete lack of respect for human life displayed in the article. I should probably expect as much from anyone who describes the brutal murder of Gianni Versace by a suicidal serial killer as a "human interest story." The death of Princess Diana may have meant nothing to the author personally. However, the amount of media coverage is certainly justified by her humanitarian actions around the world, such as her fight against the use of anti-personnel land mines that have killed and maimed thousands of children in Angola and other war-torn areas. To many people in Britain and around the world, Diana represented something that few Americans can comprehend. Someone with immense time and resources, using them for the good of others rather than themselves. While the personal indiscretions in the

lives of the royal family have raised serious questions about the future of the monarchy in recent years, it becomes clear to anyone who has seen the tons of flowers piled at the gates of Buckingham and Kensington palace that Diana was much more than tabloid fodder.

Another problem with the article is its inability to prove a point. I am not even a member of the "ASU Lady Di fan club," but to see a so-called member of the media criticize the media for covering a major story seems absurd. It is not necessary to be a journalism major to know that the media latches onto a story, beats it to death and forgets about it. Comparing this week's coverage of Diana's death to Yitzhak Rabin's assassination nearly two years ago is ridiculous. I could understand Walterscheidt's argument if both tragedies had occurred in the same week and Rabin's assassination was being underplayed. It is blatantly obvious that Diana's death will not have the type of long-term effects as the assassination of Prime Minister Rabin had in the Middle East. As far as I know, the media frenzy surrounding the Princess's death revolves around the grief of her family and her admirers around the world. The media may be building her image a little larger than life, but to borrow Mr. Walterscheidt's own words, that is the nature of the beast. If he doesn't like it, he may be in the wrong business.

### Man charged with threatening Delta jet crew

CINCINNATI (AP) — A man in federal custody in Arizona has been charged with threatening a Delta Air Lines crew during a flight to Phoenix after he was told to extinguish his cigarette, the FBI said Thursday.

None of the 149 passengers aboard Delta Flight 847 from Cincinnati to Phoenix on Friday were harmed, but many were shaken after James Christopher Hodge threatened to kill them and the flight crew last Friday, the FBI said.

Hodge, 30, of Las Vegas, had been hospitalized before for manic depression, but evidently had not been taking his medication to control the condition, his lawyer Jon Sands said Thursday.

"When he's on medication, he's fine. When he's off medication, he's not," said Sands, an assistant federal public defender in Phoenix.

A federal magistrate in Phoenix has ordered a psychiatric examination to determine whether Hodge is aware of what is happening and can assist his lawyers, Sands said. Hodge appeared Sunday before U.S. Magistrate Morton Siver.

A Cincinnati police officer found Hodge sleeping under a tree, put him on the flight and informed Delta personnel that Hodge was manic depressive but was safe to fly, FBI agent Robert

Seymour said in a complaint filed in Phoenix federal court. But Lt. Tim Schoch, a Cincinnati police spokesman, said Thursday he had no record that Cincinnati police had been involved with Hodge.

Delta spokeswoman Tracey Bowen declined to comment.

The FBI and Phoenix police arrested Hodge when the jet landed. Hodge was charged with two counts of interfering with a flight crew, FBI spokesman Jack Callahan said. If convicted, he could get up to 20 years in prison.

Hodge was in Cincinnati to visit his parents in nearby northern Kentucky, authorities said. He flew from Cincinnati/Northern Kentucky International Airport.

"He had a round-trip ticket to Las Vegas," Sands said. "He wanted the 8:30 (p.m.) flight, but they hustled him on to the earlier one."

Hodge has been hospitalized before in the Cincinnati and Las Vegas areas for treatment of manic depression, Sands said.

Hodge began threatening passengers and the flight crew after he lighted a cigarette and other passengers complained that smoking was not allowed, the FBI said.

# Young bus rider fights school to sit wherever she wants

SAN PASQUAL, Calif. (AP) — Kimberly Carpenter can now sit on whichever side of the bus she likes.

The 10-year-old had been fighting a nearly 50-year-old policy that requires girls to sit on one side of the bus and boys the other in the San Pasqual Union School District.

District Superintendent Jeff Felix officially waived the

rule Tuesday morning, the first day of school.

"Today I got to sit wherever I wanted. I sat on the left side and then the right. ... It felt pretty good," Kimberly said.

Kimberly had been fighting the policy since last spring, when she asked her father why she couldn't sit wherever she pleased. Her father, Harold Carpenter,

took the issue to the school board, which agreed last month to end the policy.

Supporters said that the policy had been created to keep discipline on buses.

The new rule caused no problems in the tiny school district about 40 miles northeast of San Diego, said Steven Bostrom, the district's transportation director.

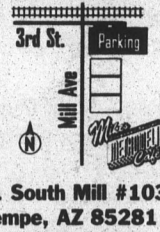

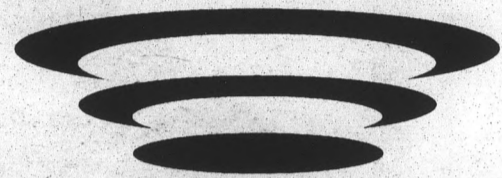

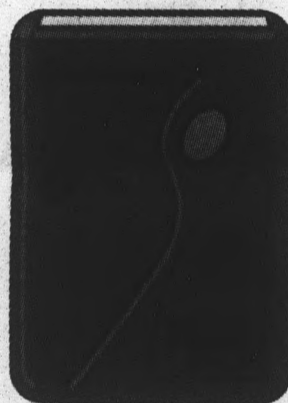

# House bill may require publication of campus police logs

Critics claiming colleges and universities intentionally hide on-campus crime statistics are pinning their hopes on legislation in the U.S. House that calls for open access to police logs.

But an ASU police official said the measure would have little impact at ASU because the department already practices open communication of police logs.

The Accuracy in Campus Crime Reporting Act of 1997, or H.R. 715, would amend the Higher Education Act of 1965 to force institutions to publish "easily understandable, chronologically ordered daily police logs."

The bill would also require logs to include:

- The time, date, nature and general location of the crime.
- The manner and attitude of the complaining party, if known.
- If tickets have been issued or charges filed, the name, address and charges against a suspect.

• If an arrest has been made, the name and address and charges against a suspect.

Radawna Michelle, crime prevention coordinator for the ASU police, said the University currently complies with most provisions of the bill.

She said that ASU police provide daily logs of criminal activity on the World Wide Web to arrest the possibility of inaccurate perception levels of crime.

"If you have accurate figures out there, you don't scare people," Michelle said. "If you hide statistics, people may have an inflated view of crime. We believe (open police logs) work very well."

Critics of the legislation, which was introduced in February of 1997 by Rep. John Duncan, R-Tenn., contend that smaller colleges simply do not have the resources necessary to operate a daily police log system.

"I don't believe some of the adverse effects (of public logs) that other universities mention ever come to pass," Michelle said.

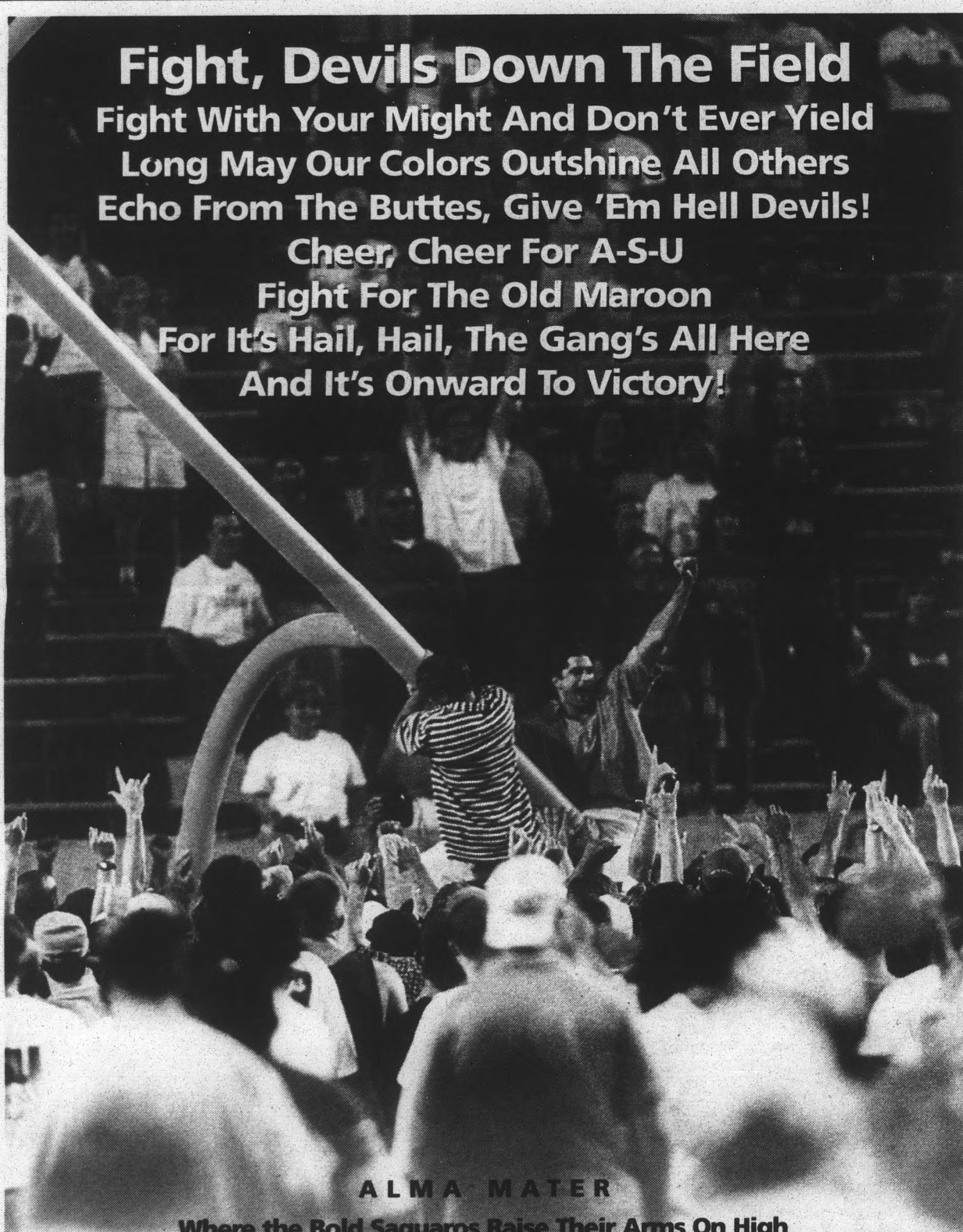
Benjamin Cleary, president of Security On Campus Inc., a non-profit group which is backing the measure, told the Subcommittee on Post-secondary Education, Training and Life-Long Learning in July that the Campus Security Act of 1990 is virtually useless because there are few avenues for officials to follow to determine if institutions are in compliance.

Under the Campus Security Act, colleges and universities that receive Federal funding must release their security policies and three most recent years of campus crime statistics.

Michelle said the general idea behind reporting information on campus crime is that people become more aware of the community surrounding their lives. Hence, they are more likely to practice personal safety on a regular basis.

She added that many of the smaller schools could benefit if the bill is passed.

"For those campuses that don't have open communications, it's definitely a good idea," she said.

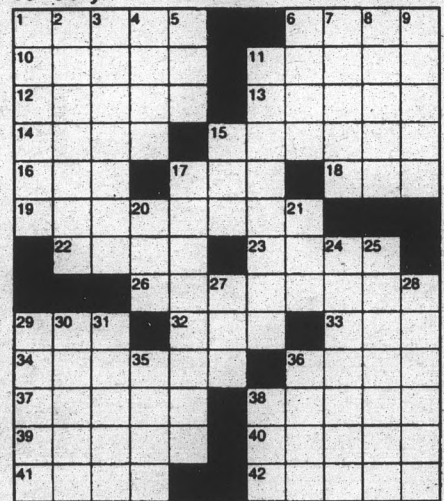

# Judge rejects request for new trial in 'Fatal Vision' case

RALEIGH, N.C. (AP) — A judge has rejected the latest request by former Green Beret Dr. Jeffrey MacDonald for a new trial in the 1970 "Fatal Vision" slayings of his pregnant wife and two daughters at Fort Bragg.

MacDonald, 56, was convicted in 1979 and is serving three life sentences.

U.S. District Judge James Fox ruled Wednesday that MacDonald had not presented a strong enough argument to allow a new trial.

MacDonald argued in April that hair and fiber evidence was withheld from his lawyers at his trial and at a 1990 hearing, and that handwritten notes in government files back up his

story that intruders killed his family.

He has said a band of drug-crazed hippies chanting "Acid is groovy. Kill the pigs" attacked him and his family.

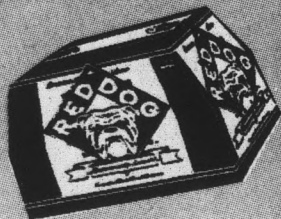
The case inspired the book "Fatal Vision" and a TV movie. Prosecutors argued that the evidence cited by MacDonald was insignificant in his conviction.

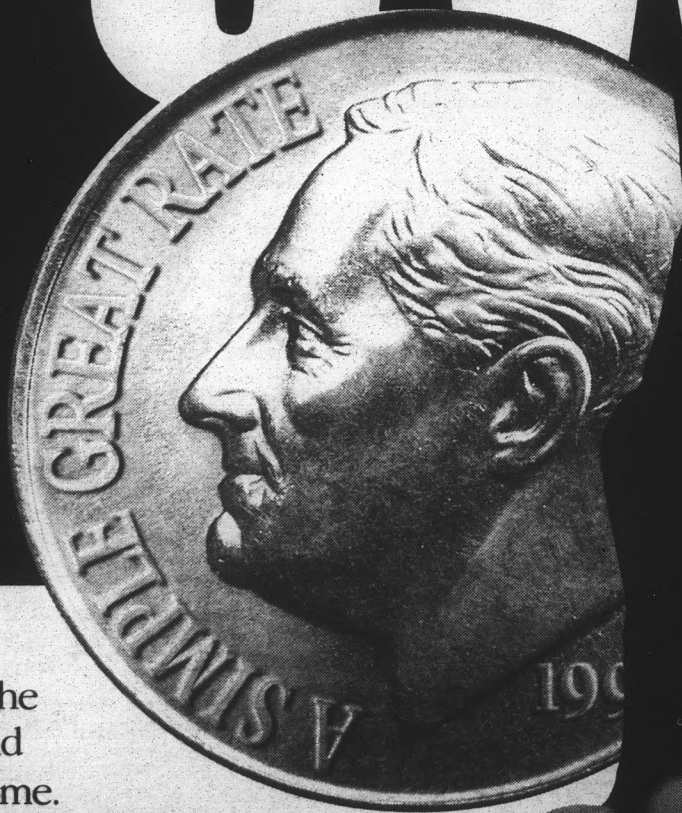

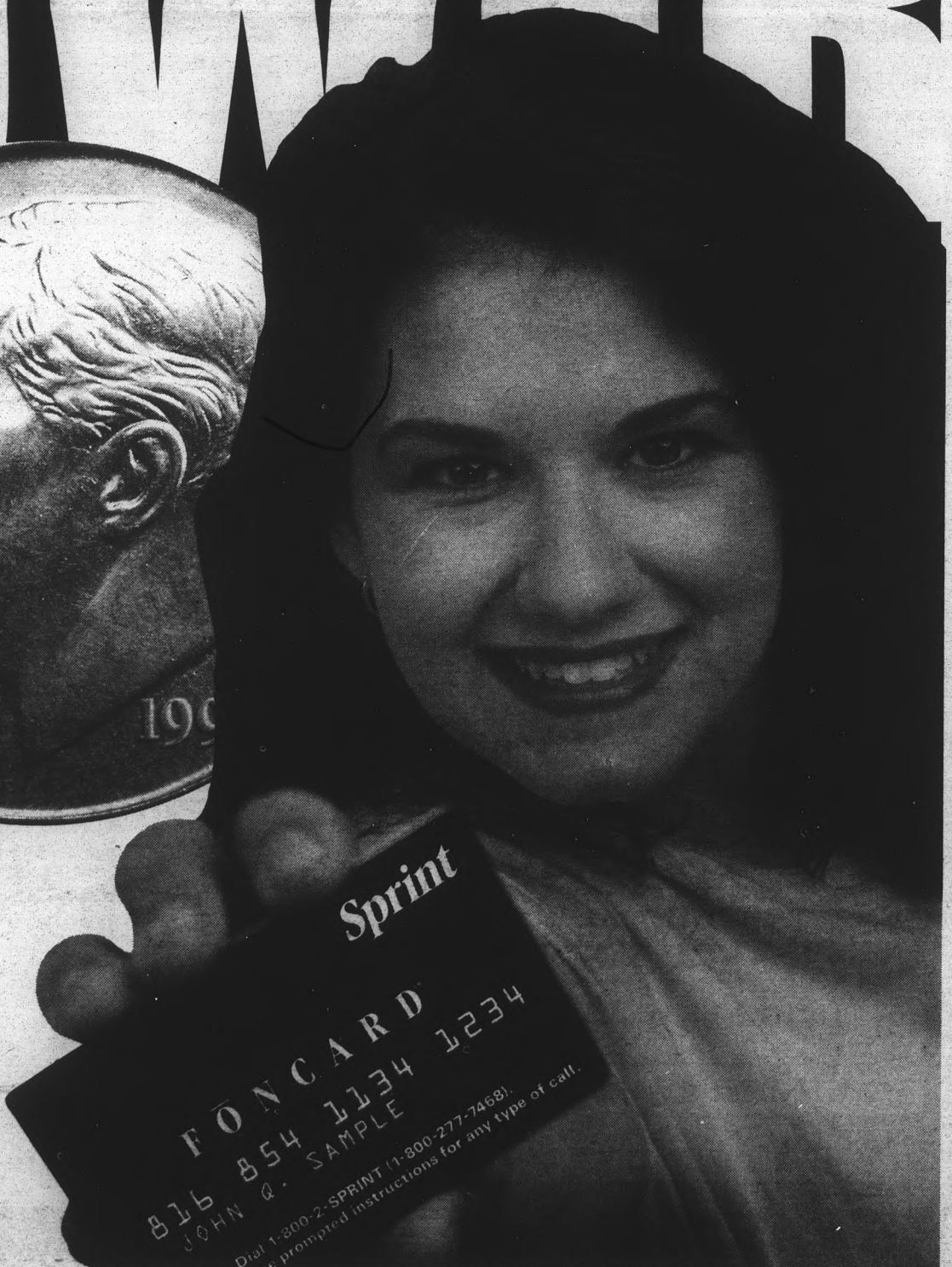

# Linebacker Trejo provides big-time replacement

Talk about making an immediate impact. Redshirt freshman Stephen Trejo was thrust into the Sun Devils' starting lineup Saturday night. And the 6-foot-3, 235-pound inside linebacker from Casa Grande made the most of his golden opportunity.

With expected starter Larry Johnson sidelined due to academic ineligibility, Trejo stepped in and was a solid contributor in ASU's 41-10 rout of New Mexico State at Sun Devil Stadium.

Trejo had one solo tackle, four assisted tackles, one pass deflection and one well-timed interception in his ASU debut.

"I'd say it's a good start," he said. "Definitely I do have some things I need to work on. I have a long way to go to where I want to be and what I want to do in the Pac-10 and with this football team."

The third-quarter pick, which Trejo snatched at the New Mexico State 21, was returned for five yards. It set up fellow redshirt freshman Ryan Kealy's four-yard touchdown strike to Tariq McDonald, which gave ASU a 37-3 advantage.

Although Trejo was playing in his first college game, he still displayed poise and concentration.

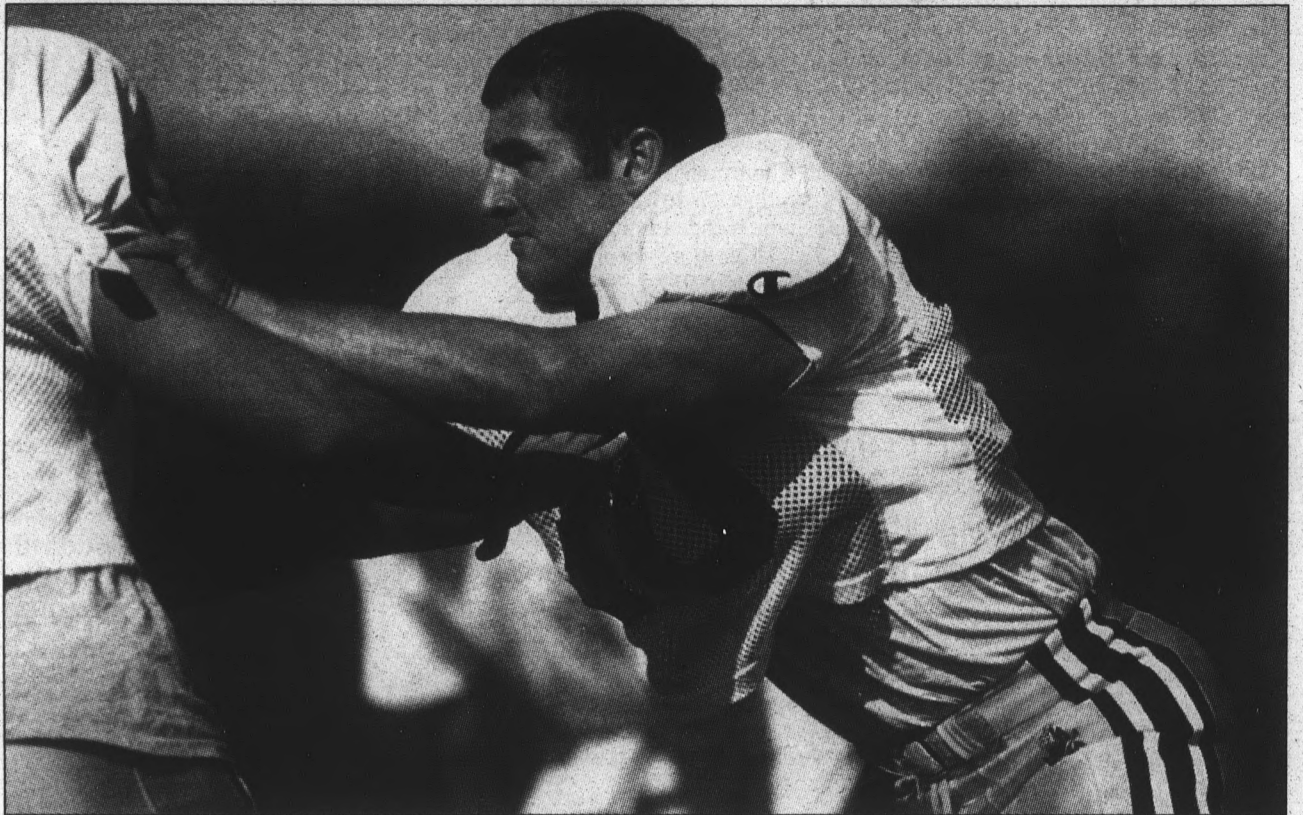
"Well, what happened on the play was I dropped back into coverage and the quarterback (Aggie Ty Houghtaling) was rolling out and I was basically just reading off his eyes because we were in zone coverage," said Trejo, recalling his first career INT. "I looked at him and I expected him to throw the ball over my head, and he just threw it within my reach. So I reached up and grabbed it and tried to get in the end zone."

He didn't make the end zone, but he did make a good impression on his coaching staff.

"He's extremely intelligent," said inside linebackers coach Johnny Barr. "He has good football savvy, so to speak in coach's lingo, and he played aggressively in the game."

ASU head coach Bruce Snyder agreed.

"Obviously we think he's got real bright career ahead of him," Snyder said. "I'm very pleased with his tackles in this game and his nice open field tackles."

Snyder also mentioned Trejo's performance on special teams. "We put the guys with the best hands (up front) on onsides recovery," he said. "And Steve's got good hands."

Trejo credits last season's veteran linebacker corps for helping him prepare for this season.

"When you are not in there, you can look at guys like Scott Von der Ahe, Derek Smith, and Pat Tillman and just learn from the different things they are doing out there," Trejo said. "And maybe pick up a few techniques out there. It was definitely a

## Cardinals come home for tilt with Cowboys, but is it home?

A quick glance at the Arizona Cardinals schedule informs the reader that the Cardinals battle the Dallas Cowboys this Sunday at 5:00.

What it doesn't say is that the Cardinals must also face a Dallas crowd in the Cardinals own home stadium while battling the bitterness of a disappointing opening week loss.

Oh yeah, the Cowboys are also a division opponent that has taken the NFC East crown

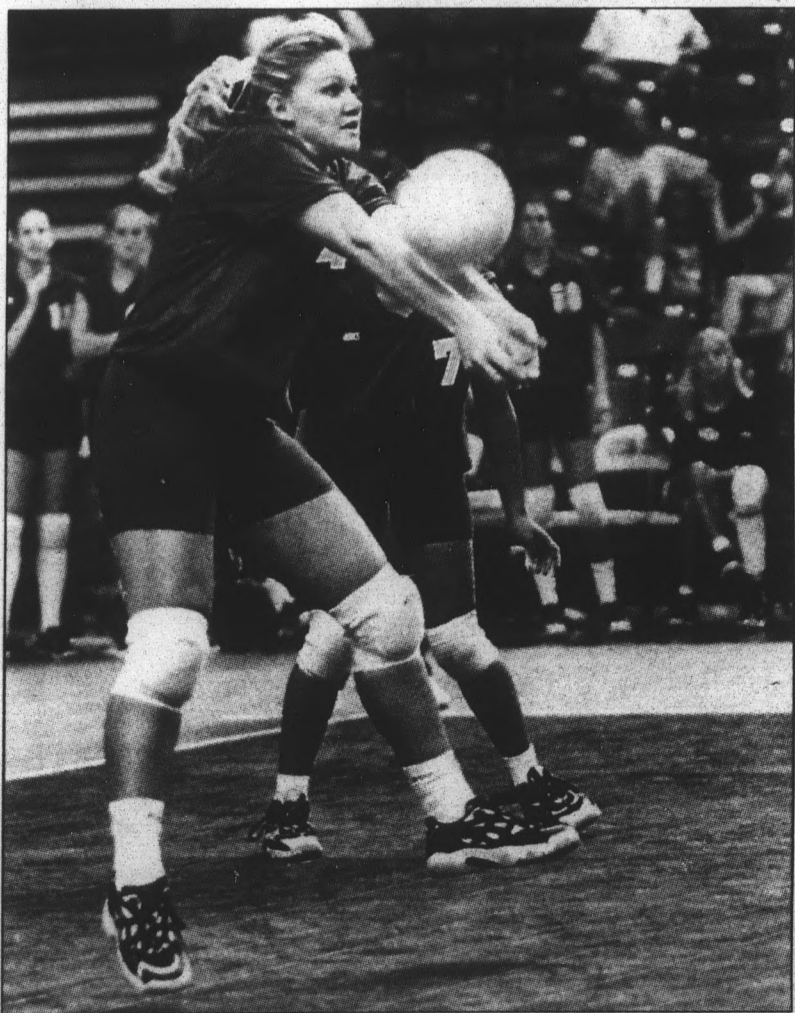

## ASU volleyball team gallops into Texas

The ASU women's volleyball team (3-0 overall) heads to Texas to participate in the LadyJack Invitational, hosted by Stephen F. Austin University today and Saturday with hopes lingering over from last weekend.

If the Sun Devils do win the tournament it would be for the second time in two weeks. Last weekend ASU won the Phoenix Airport Hilton/Sun Devil Challenge, defeating Cal Poly SLO, Portland State and St. Mary's College.

ASU left yesterday to Nacogdoches, Texas where today they will take on Central Florida at 1 p.m. and follow with North Texas at 6 p.m. Saturday it goes up against Stephen F. Austin at noon and finishes with Rice at 4 p.m.

"On paper we should beat them all and win the tournament," ASU head coach Patti Snyder-Park said.

Snyder-Park doesn't anticipate any of the teams will be more difficult than last weekend's were. However, Stephen F. Austin is the only team ASU has faced recently.

Last year the Sun Devils played Stephen F. Austin at the George Washington Invitational in Washington D.C. ASU won the match in three games, 15-11, 15-3, 15-10.

"The strongest team that might be there is Central Florida," Snyder-Park said. "That'll be the team to beat."

Senior Kirstin Mattson agreed.

"We might see a little bit tougher teams, but I don't think we should lose any of our matches this weekend," Mattson said. "We should win the tournament."

If the Sun Devils play at this tournament like they did at the last their hopes of winning should come true. From last weekend's performance junior Jen Lucero was first in the Pac-10 in digs, with 4.10 digs per game. Senior Terri Cox was second in digs with 3.55 dpg. Cox was fourth in kills with 4.64 kpg and Mattson finished fifth in the Pac in blocks with 1.55 bpg.

After last weekend's tournament win Snyder-Park is confident in the team's play and feels that the starting line-up is solid. The probable starting line-up for this weekend is Cox and Lucero as outside hitters, setter sophomore Jolynn Faatulu, middle blockers senior Mattson and sophomore Laura Hibsman. Some key substitutes include outside hitter junior Mindi Larsen-Moser and freshman setter Carmen Fusco. Last weekend Fusco had 13 digs against Portland State and 10 against Cal Poly SLO.

After last weekend's tournament Snyder-Park noted that the team needed to work on transitions, digs and passes to the net, and that there was room for improvement in blocking the middle attack. But overall she feels the team is ready and focused to play well. She will continue to make line-up adjustments in this tournament to see which players work best together.

"We're just thinking of going in and winning one game at a time," Faatulu said. "As long as we're playing as a team and concerned with our side of the net, we're fine."

ASU finishes its preseason tournaments next weekend when it heads to Santa Barbara to play in the Judy Bellomo Invitational.

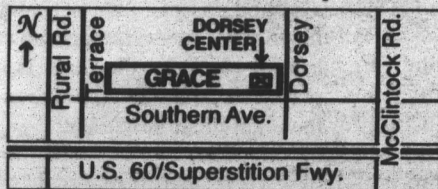

# Third win in a row goal for ASU soccer

Riding a wave of emotion following two consecutive shutout victories, the ASU women's soccer team buses down to Tucson looking for its third win in a row against rival UofA.

The Sun Devils (2-0-0 overall) defeated the Wildcats (2-0-0) twice last season, recording a 4-2 win in Tucson and a 2-1 overtime victory at home.

Redshirt freshman goalie Erin Reinke hopes to continue both streaks.

"(I'm) very excited (about the game)," she said. "It's going to be difficult. I am very confident that our team will do well. I think we don't have any one weakness. (But) if we come out lackadaisical it will be a tough game for us."

Reinke also downplayed her two shutouts, giving credit where it is due.

"Everyone's been hyping on how we won both our games in shutouts and stuff," she said. "But I just think we played well and the defense should basically take the credit for that. I mean I only had six shots (on goal) the whole weekend. I didn't do anything spectacular, but a shutout's a shutout and it goes on my record that way. I give credit to my defense. It helps out quite a bit."

Head coach Terri Patraw said she thinks UofA will be psyched for a chance to knock off the Sun Devils.

"They will definitely be up for us," she said. "They're up for us in the spring. They will play us hard. They will play us physical, but I know our kids are up for it, (and) making it 3-0 against them."

Reinke said from what she knows about the Wildcat attack, ASU should expect a lot of "boom-ball."

"They have really quick forwards," she

said. "They like to chip the ball and run after it a lot."

Leading the Wildcats, who are in their fourth season of competition are sophomore forward Jill Miocene (1 goal, 2 assists) and sophomore midfielder Krista Bogdan (2 goals).

In goal for UofA is freshman Inger Airheart, who has nine saves and a 0.50 goals against average, good for third in conference, in the two Wildcat wins.

Patraw said the Wildcats are pretty much the same team her squad has defeated twice already.

"It looks like they are pretty much the same team as last year," she said. "They are starting three freshmen from what I noticed, and one of them is a goalkeeper. And since goalkeeper's can't beat you, you know, they can keep you from beating them, but they can't beat you."

learning experience for me last year."

Apparently he has learned from those guys. "I was extremely satisfied (with Trejo's performance)," Barr said. "I think our whole coaching staff, especially the defensive guys, liked the way Steve played."

This shouldn't come as a surprise. Trejo is just playing up to his potential.

He was a highly recruited linebacker out of Casa Grande High School. In 1996, he was the seventh-best "Jumbo Athlete" in the nation, according to *Super Prep*. And he was a two-way star, compiling superb statistics on offense and defense.

Despite Johnson's regained eligibility, Barr feels both players will give each other healthy competition.

"Larry Johnson's obviously a good player, but so is Steve Trejo," he said. "Steve deserves playing time, so obviously he wants that and will get that. I see good competition there, which will make our defense better hopefully."

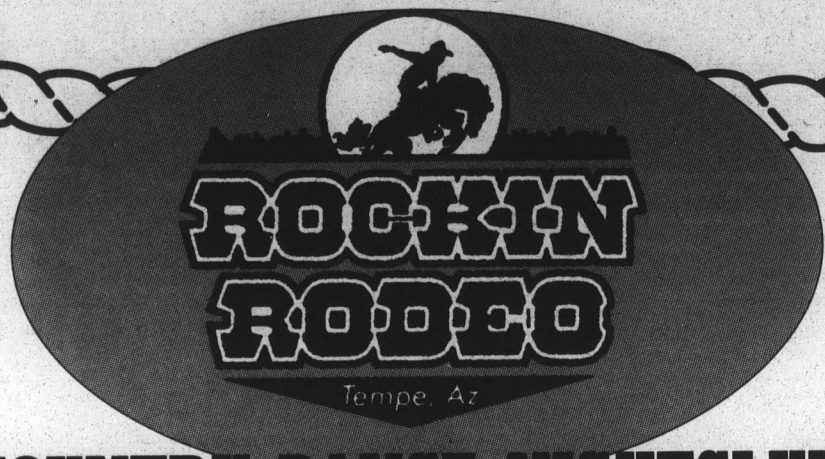
