ASU officials against increase in tuition

ASU faculty and administration say they are opposed to the tuition-funded salary increase being considered by the Arizona Appropriations Committee.

The committee has proposed that 40 percent of substantial tuition increases for the 1998-99 academic year be allocated for faculty raises.

"The faculty, administration, (Arizona Board of Regents) and students involved all oppose the suggestion," said Darwyn Linder, Academic Senate president and psychology professor. "We didn't initiate it, we don't want it and we hope it will be eliminated."

Funding for UofA, ASU and NAU is comprised of senate appropriations, tuition, grants and contracts. Meager contributions from the State Appropriations Committee are forcing the tuition increase to simply keep the universities running, Linder said.

"When the Appropriations Committee doesn't meet its share, (the money) has to come from somewhere else," Linder said. "Tuition is the only flexible area."

The Appropriations Committee created the Teaching Incentive Program, which took effect in fall 1997, as a monetary

incentive because it felt faculty members were not spending enough time with students in the classroom, Linder said. Salary increases were given only to those teaching more than six hours a week.

"It does not reflect the full effort of the faculty," said Provost Milton Glick. "I believe the

best approach to salaries is where we reward people on the contributions of their work."

John Lee, the Joint Legislative Budget Committee assistant director, said University faculty is treated the same as other state employees.

"Of the \$10.1 million recommended for ASU employees, the faculty's share is \$5 million. This represents that faculty is treated exactly the same as any university and state employee for the faculty share of salary increases," Lee said in a letter addressed to the *State Press* Tuesday.

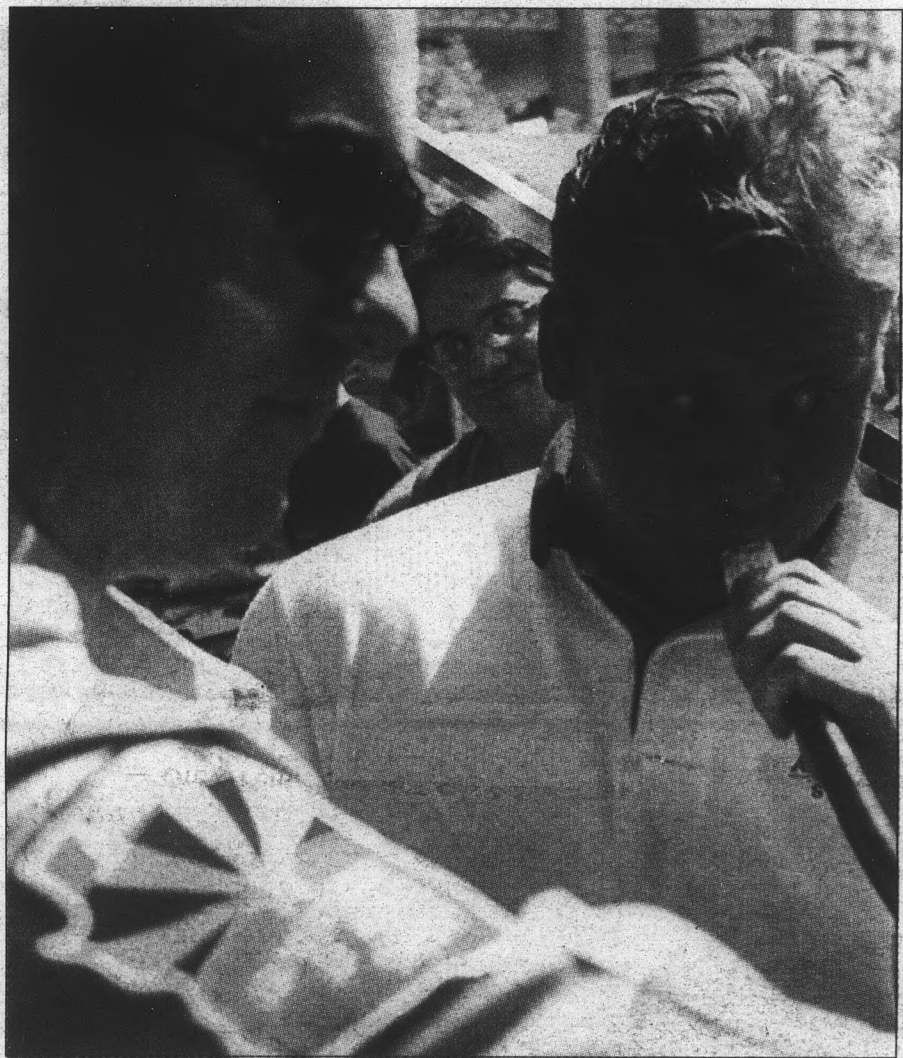
Linder said the idea of negligent professors is a misleading stereotype.

MBA program spreads to downtown Phoenix

Beginning this fall, students working downtown will have the option to leave their cars where they are, walk a few blocks to the Mercado and crack open their books to pursue an MBA.

"We are expecting to open up one class of 50 students at first," said Lee McPheters, associate dean of the College of Business. "If there seems to be a larger demand later then we will look into expanding the program further."

The classes will be held at the Mercado complex, which is currently owned and operated by ASU.

The expansion follows after an article in *U.S. News & World Report* ranked ASU's MBA program 13th of all state institutions in the nation.

The decision was made to go ahead with the project after a survey of larger businesses in the downtown area showed a large interest in putting its employees into an MBA program.

"The site is large and modern, and it is already equipped with official ASU computer labs so that professors and students downtown will have comparable facilities available to those on main campus," McPheters said.

Using the site already in existence will not only add convenience but will actually save the University money, he added.

"If we would have put the program on campus then we would have had to spend extra money to fix up an area here for them, so this is actually a less-expensive way to go," McPheters said.

In addition the facility will have ample parking and

security available so that students downtown will be able to avoid traffic and crowd headaches.

"There is already an ASU parking structure there and our students will have first priority," McPheters said. "Besides, many of the students will have already parked at their jobs and parking won't even be an issue."

The MBA program currently has an enrollment of about 1,000 students. Four hundred of those are day-time students, many of whom have come from out of state to attend ASU. There is an equal number of full time professionals who take classes at night twice a week.

"We want to help students who want more education to get it," said McPheters. "For many working downtown this may be the answer."

Weekend conference set to honor Angela Davis

Well-known international activist and intellectual Angela Davis will be honored throughout the weekend during a three-day conference geared to discuss diversity, politics and unfinished liberation.

The event, sponsored by the School of Justice Studies in connection with other ASU departments, is being held in conjunction with Black History Month and Women's History Month. The conference is a tribute to Davis for her long-time efforts to end oppression.

"All of the speakers are coming in her honor," said Karen Carson, president of the ASU chapter of the NAACP. "It's to honor her legacy. Angela is one of the brightest and most well-

known intellectuals in this country."

The conference, "Unfinished Liberation: Power, Identity and Culture," begins 9 a.m. Friday in the Katzin Music

Hall, located across from Gammage Auditorium near the Music Building. However, there will be a movie screening 7:30 tonight in the Architecture Building to help jumpstart the events.

Carson said it is important not only for students but the entire community to attend the conference.

"We're talking about unfinished liberation," Carson said. "If you have a conference honoring a freedom fighter like Angela, it dispels the myth that all is well in America. There are still so many injustices and forms of oppression in the world, particularly in this country."

Davis, now a professor of African-American studies at the University of California at Santa Cruz, has been investi-

Linder estimates a professor, who holds six class sessions a week, spends at least 24 additional hours teaching and 6-16 hours on related instruction. Others are required to conduct and publish research in addition to teaching.

"We as faculty, administration and the Arizona Board of Regents, are in agreement that we simply want the same merit package as other state employees," Linder said.

Glick said he is concerned with the

power this utilization of tuition funds would allow the Arizona Legislature.

"In the past we've never had the Legislature earmark tuition for a particular purpose," Glick said. "It's always been the responsibility of the (ABOR). It would be entering new ground that I don't think would be good."

There will be a tuition setting meeting March 25.

gating the criminal justice system for years, working to end oppression around the world, Carson said.

"She deals with all ethnic groups," Carson said. "She's concerned with all forms of oppression."

David Goldberg, director of the School of Justice Studies, said the conference is bringing about 20 activists from all over the country to speak in honor of Davis. He said the goal is to encourage students to think about the world around them and introduce new ideas.

"We are having the conference to raise questions about diversity when it's under fire in relation to university life," Goldberg said. "It will raise questions about politics and stimulate an intellectual environment for students."

Carson said although Davis has been to campus several times to speak, this is the first conference at ASU to honor her work.

"The struggle for liberation is something we need to carry on," Carson said. "Her legacy needs to continue. She's so important and so many people love her."

Justices: Sexual harassment covers same-sex scenarios

WASHINGTON — On-the-job torment can be illegal sexual harassment even when the offender and victim are the same sex, the Supreme Court said Wednesday in a decision that could touch virtually every American workplace.

The court said same-sex harassment can violate a federal anti-discrimination law as it voted unanimously to revive a Louisiana lawsuit closely watched by the nation's employers and gay-rights groups.

In that lawsuit, a man alleged he was sexually harassed by three other men while working on a Gulf of Mexico oil rig.

Wednesday's decision provided important new guidelines for resolving sex-harassment claims, but plenty of questions remain about the legality of certain conduct in specific employment settings.

"Common sense and an appropriate sensitivity to social context will enable courts and juries to distinguish" between what is legal and illegal, Justice Antonin Scalia wrote for the court.

"We're very pleased with the commonsense standard the court adopted," said Ann Reesman, a lawyer for the Equal Employment Advisory Council, an employers' group. "This adds some clarity."

Gay-rights advocates also praised the ruling. "Civil rights law will no longer unfairly exclude same-sex sexual harassment, and this fact will benefit all American workers," said Elizabeth Birch of the Human Rights Campaign.

The ruling allows victims of homosexual harassment to get into federal court even though Congress never has said bias based on sexual orientation is illegal.

Kathy Rodgers of the NOW Legal Defense and Education Fund said the ruling "once and for all places sexual harassment law squarely in the mainstream of anti-discrimination law."

The term "harassment" does not appear in the text of the anti-bias law known as Title VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1964. But the Supreme Court ruled in 1986 that sexual harassment amounts to discrimination if it creates a "hostile environment" in the workplace.

In subsequent rulings, the justices said a hostile environment can come about not only by overtly sexual behavior but also by "discriminatory intimidation, ridicule and insult ... sufficiently severe or pervasive to alter the conditions of the victim's employment."

In the Louisiana case, a federal appeals court ruled as it threw out Joseph Oncale's lawsuit that the federal law never applies to same-sex harassment.

His sexual-harassment claim stemmed from four months of work in 1991 as a roustabout assigned to a Gulf of Mexico oil rig with Sundowner Offshore Services.

Oncale's lawsuit against Sundowner and three men said

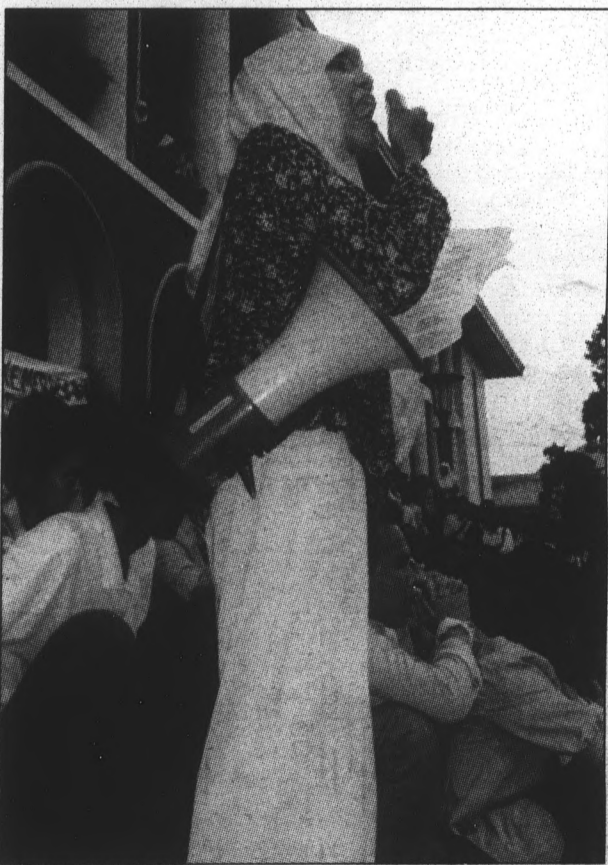
he was sexually assaulted, battered, touched and threatened with rape by his direct supervisor, John Lyons, and a second supervisor, Danny Pippen. Another defendant, coworker Brandon Johnson, was accused of assisting in one of the alleged incidents.

The Supreme Court's decision allows Oncale to take his lawsuit to a jury but does not ensure his ultimate victory.

Indonesian students protest economy

JAKARTA, Indonesia — Thousands of banner-waving university students demanded President Suharto's ouster Wednesday — the largest display of anger yet over the eco-

nomics crisis that has Indonesia in an upheaval.

The protests came as the United States and other foreign lenders stepped up the pressure on Suharto to carry out reforms they consider crucial to rescuing the economy — reforms that could undercut much of Suharto's power and wealth.

"Hang Suharto!" shouted protesters in the Java island city of Yogyakarta, circling their campus on scooters under the scrutiny of hundreds of police and plainclothes officers.

Students also rallied in several other cities on Java as well as on Sulawesi, another of Indonesia's larger islands.

Five people have been killed in riots this year over rising food costs, but Wednesday's rallies were peaceful. Confined to campuses, they posed little threat to Suharto, who has resisted calls to overhaul the government he began shaping in the 1960s.

Even as the students protested, delegates to a special assembly were preparing to extend Suharto's 32-year rule. Already Asia's longest-serving leader, the 76-year-old president is almost certain to get a seventh five-year term next week.

However, Suharto is under growing international pressure to carry out economic reforms in exchange for \$43 billion bailout by the International Monetary Fund.

The IMF has already handed over \$3 billion, but still has not decided whether to grant the second \$3 billion installment, due March 15.

The United States, which exerts virtual veto power over the IMF, says Suharto is not moving fast enough on reforms that would remove business perks he, his family and their associates have long enjoyed.

Indonesia says many of the measures, including the slashing of subsidies, are too strict and could provoke more social unrest.

But with the deadline nearing, Suharto said Wednesday that he had dismantled a string of monopolies in line with the IMF requirements. In a meeting of top economic advisers, he said the government has stripped the state agency Bulog of all trade controls except for a rice monopoly.

Indonesia's worst economic turmoil in three decades began when the currency, the rupiah, plunged in value last year, pushing up prices and unemployment in the nation of 202 million.

Feminist group sues anti-abortion leaders

CHICAGO — Using a law designed to combat organized crime, the National Organization for Women asked a federal court jury Wednesday to force militant anti-abortion leaders to pay for damages caused in clinic attacks.

"If the anti-abortion thugs won't obey the law, we'll go after them where it hurts — their wallets," NOW President Patricia Ireland said Wednesday at the start of court action.

The lawsuit, filed under the Racketeering Influenced Corrupt Organizations law, names as defendants two of the most militant anti-abortion groups, Operation Rescue and the Pro-Life Action League, as well as three of the league's top leaders.

The civil lawsuit accuses the groups and defendants Joseph Scheidler, Timothy Murphy and Andrew Scholberg of waging a campaign to shut the clinics through fear and violence.

While the actual damages asked total only \$86,500 for attacks on clinics in Milwaukee and Wilmington, Del., the sum could climb into the millions if the defendants lose the class-action suit, thus allowing other clinics to file claims for money.

Before attorneys for NOW began their opening statements, Scheidler met with reporters in the lobby of the courthouse and denied the charges. He said he was being blamed for arsons, bombings and shootings that had nothing to do with him.

He acknowledged his role in the anti-abortion movement but said he always advocated pursuing the goal "by legal means."

Attorneys for NOW and the clinics, however, told jurors that anti-abortion leaders claimed to advocate legal means but actually engaged in criminal conduct.

NOW attorney Fay Clayton said Scheidler and his co-defendants didn't actually engage in arsons and bombings but created an atmosphere in which others carried out these acts.

"It's about force, violence and fear," she said.

Beer and Sun Devil football don't mix

For once, the state House of Representatives should let ASU follow the rest of the Pac-10, rather than move it ahead of the conference.

Recently, House Bill 2057 was introduced, which proposed that spectators would be allowed to bring their own food or drinks to publicly funded stadiums such as Bank One Ballpark and Sun Devil Stadium.

If this bill passes, it would cause long lines for fans and a slew of headaches for ASU officials.

Although beer is allowed in Sun Devil Stadium during Arizona Cardinals games, it is not allowed at a majority of college football venues.

UofA does not allow containers of any sort into Arizona Stadium. Many of our sister schools in the Pac-10 follow suit.

Marc Dellins, UCLA's sports information director, said alcohol is not allowed at the Rose Bowl during Bruins home football games. When the stadium is used for the New Year's Day game, which is part of the Alliance Bowl, alcohol also is not allowed.

When the Trojans shared the Coliseum with the then-Los Angeles Raiders, containers were allowed inside the stadium. And beer was served.

But college football and the NFL are two different entities.

OK, so there's always that one casual fan — henceforth referred to as "that guy" — who sneaks a flask of the good stuff past the entrance and into ASU games. But the majority of Sun Devil football fans are too busy rooting for the team; they could honestly care less if booze is allowed.

Sure, there are exceptions to the "no booze" rule, but the exceptions also have installed safeguards.

Tim Tesselone, USC's sports information director, said a light beer is served until the end of the third quarter at Trojans home games. He added that containers are not allowed.

That's one alternative for ASU to consider, should this bill pass: serve a light, cheap beer until the end of the third quarter.

Hey, if we want choice beer, we've got plenty of bars to choose from in town after we beat the bejesus out of an opponent. We can tap that keg of St. Pauli Girl later. Let's root for the team first. While Cardinals fans are at times driven to drink by their team, Sun Devils can wait until after the game to imbibe.

Sun Devil Stadium manager Tom Sadler has legitimate concerns if this bill passes: Every container would have to be checked, causing long lines at the entrances.

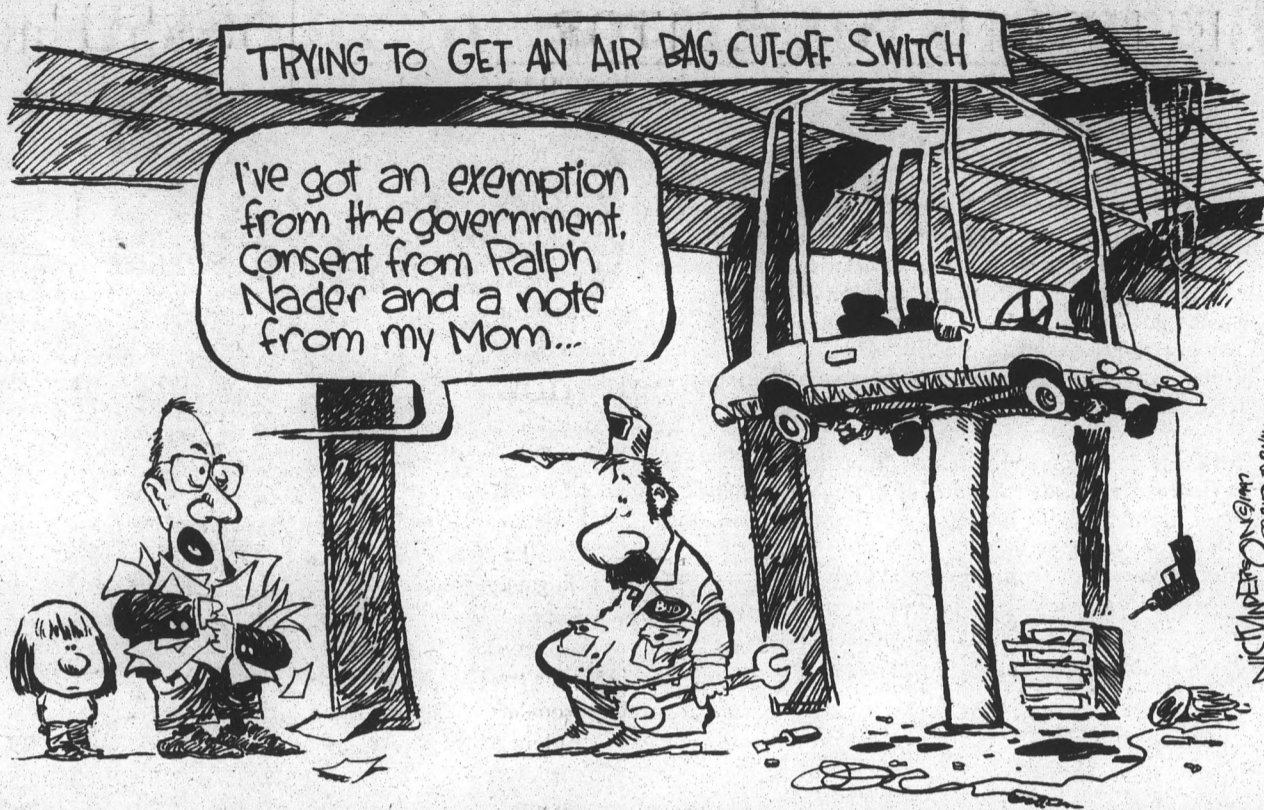
The booze itself is a problem that won't be solved until "that guy" stops sneaking it in the stadium. But solutions to the booze problem are fodder for another day's editorial.

Long lines would be a pain in the rear. We want to get to our seats and see our team. And we want to do so NOW. We don't want to wait for a bunch of yo-yos to get their containers checked at the entrance.

House Bill 2057 should be killed for the sake of football fans waiting to get into the stadium to watch their beloved teams. It should be struck down, stomped on and exterminated with great prejudice until it is revised and rewritten.

Sure, the public may have paid for Sun Devil Stadium, making it a public facility, but the line must be drawn. House Bill 2057 must be taken back and given more thought.

Think about it: You just can't scream and cheer for the Sun Devils and enjoy a brewski. It isn't possible. You'd spill your drink.



Loopholes: Valley's way to draw businesses

Attracting new businesses to the Valley is a major concern of state legislators. Sure, it would be nice to think companies would want to relocate here just for the sunny skies and dispositions, but that's often not enough.

Incentives have to be given, restrictions lifted, loopholes created. It's not ideal, but it's the way business is conducted in the real world.

Of course, there's always the question of how far to go in accommodating new businesses. Where do you draw the line? I don't know. Then again, neither do legislators.

See, down at the State Capitol, they seem to think legalizing loansharking is not a viable option. Rep. Wes Marsh, R-Scottsdale, and Rep. Jim Weiers, R-north Phoenix, are pushing a bill that would let money-lenders charge 25-percent interest per month. That works out to 188 percent per year.

Just to put that into perspective, the current legal limit is 36 percent annually for loans under \$10,000. The bill has already been passed in the House, and is now under consideration in the Senate.

So why are Marsh and Weiers so desperate to make these changes to state law? It's not just because they're concerned about the plight of the poor, underprivileged money-lender. No, they're doing it for the good of the whole state.

These concessions must be made in order to attract Title Loans of America, a Florida firm, to the Valley.

"As I understand it, if they don't get these kind of percentage rates, they're not going to come into the state," Weiers said. Arizonans would lose out on the opportunity to pay 188-percent annual interest.

Eighteen states have already rewritten legislation to make room for this outfit, changing laws written to protect the public from parasites. Florida Rep. Ralph Livingston has dubbed his state's legal loophole for the company the "How to steal a car from a poor person bill."

There's a reason Livingston calls it that — because that's what often happens. We already have similar operations here. You've seen the ads in the classified section,



between those for 900 numbers and blood banks. They all promise "Cash For Your Car While You Drive It," or something along those lines.

All these outfits work in much the same way. Borrowers sign over ownership of vehicles, and the company comes across with the cash. If you don't pay back, bye-bye car.

The big difference is the interest rate. It's the difference between 36 and 188. It's the fact that these heretofore criminal rates guarantee that a large percentage of borrowers will lose out on the deal.

See, people go to these money lenders because they need cash in a hurry. They're not financial whizzes, obviously. But that's no reason for them to be taken advantage of, and that's exactly what happens with such loans. Maybe they're unaware of just how fast the fees can mount. Maybe the big break they were expecting didn't come through. Next thing they know, somebody else owns their car.

There's a reason that 36 percent is the legal limit for interest rates — because charging any more is simply wrong. It's taking advantage. Maybe no legs are broken, but it's still loansharking.

Weiers, however, says allowing such loans would benefit borrowers who might not be eligible for loans elsewhere. I see — these loans are actually some sort of community service, performed by the selfless folks at the loan company. And all they ask in return is 188-percent annual interest. Or your car — whichever.

"It's a tremendous leap of faith on the part of a lender on any vehicle they don't possess," Weiers said. I agree — why, it's altruistic. Of course, they do have the title, and they probably wouldn't be in the business if people running off with their cars was a common occurrence.

I don't know how many concessions should be made in attracting outside companies to Arizona. I don't know just where to draw the line, but I think maybe this is a good place to start. Commerce we need, loansharking we don't.

If this bill passes in the Senate, look into how your elected representatives voted. Let them know what you think of the big favor they're doing you when election day comes around. And if you have to borrow, read the fine print.

Tuition-increase facts

Let's get the fact straight!
For the ASU Main, ASU West and ASU East campuses, the Joint Legislative Budget Committee (JLBC) recommended \$10.1 million for fiscal year 1999 salary adjustments, which includes \$3.4 million for salary annualization, \$2.9 million for Classification Salary Adjustment and \$3.8 million for merit increases.

Of the \$10.1 million recommended for ASU employees, the faculty's share is \$5 million, which includes \$1.6 million for full funding of merit and across-the-board annualization, \$1.3 million for CSA share and \$2.1 million for full funding of 2.5 percent merit increase. This represents that faculty is treated exactly the same as any university and state employee for the faculty share of salary increases. In addition, the qualifying ranked faculty of ASU will receive the Teaching Incentive Program (TIP) allocation of \$1.8 million of the \$4-million TIP annualization.

Therefore, the state is providing \$6.8 million for faculty salary adjustment in FY 1999 for ASU alone. This is all state General Fund money. Your headline, which reads "Tuition increase may finance faculty raises," (March 2) is totally false.

The footnote adopted by the Joint Appropriations Subcommittees will do two things: One, all faculty may receive additional bonuses if the Arizona Board of Regents increases the tuition rate. Two, students will benefit from the faculty's improved performance in teaching.

As you may know, the three universities have collected about \$10 million more a year in tuition than what was appropriated by the Legislature in the past five years. Approximately 50 percent of the annual surpluses is associated with tuition-rate increases and the other 50 percent with enrollment and tuition mix. Thus, the 40 percent footnote language directs the universities to use about \$2 million of the surpluses for additional faculty salary bonuses.

In sum, faculty are receiving more salary

increases from the state General Fund than all other state and university employees during FY 1999. And the ultimate beneficiaries are the students for quality education.

Media deciding guilt or innocence, taking over job of the courts

It's a sad story:

A gentle, pious Avondale woman was tied up, raped and killed last Wednesday while delivering a box of food to a poor Phoenix family. Worse yet, she was delivering the food on behalf of her church. The gesture embodied her faith. Trudy Calabrese died for her convictions and kindness. Now a family, church and community mourn her. By all accounts, she was a saint. Now the circle is complete: she is a martyr.

However, there's a sadder story:

John and Kara Sansing are being held in connection with Calabrese's death. According to police, John Sansing tied up Calabrese, raped her and then stabbed her to death — possibly in front of his children. It's enough to make a thoughtful person wonder if the world has truly gone mad.

It gets worse:

The *Arizona Republic* ran feature stories Saturday on the alleged killers. In one of the articles, neighbors described John Sansing as "a mean-tempered man who struck his wife and milked the welfare system for food, housing and other handouts." Yet his prudence did not end there. John Sansing had "brushes with the law in Utah," and "has strug-

gled with serious drug problems that have included marijuana and more powerful substances." Even more repugnant, he allegedly sent his children through the neighborhood like winged monkeys from *The Wizard of Oz*, "asking people to cough up cigarette money for their father." Sweet Jesus — that man must be a killer.

It would be easy to hate John Sansing, a disgusting man who allegedly raped and killed a woman delivering him a dose of kindness. It would be easy, except for one tiny, petty little detail: John and Kara Sansing have not been found guilty of the crime. They have not even gone to trial. Regardless, the *Republic* has crucified them on a newsprint cross.

The press pounced on the story, speculating that the men were biological terrorists, perhaps even Saddam Hussein's minions on American soil. Turns out they were only scientists.

Sources claim that a former White House intern had a

sexual affair with the president, who then pressured her to lie about it. Reporters have been attacking Clinton like ravenous sharks, ripping his character into bloody little bits. Too bad there is no proof. What if I held a press conference to announce that Gov. Jane Hull had forced me to have sex with her? Could I be on *Meet the Press*, too?

Actual guilt is not the issue. John Sansing is probably a rapist and killer, and Clinton is probably lecherous and definitely guilty of stretching the truth. That, however, is for the courts to determine. The media exist to relay information, not pass judgment.

In America, accused criminals are "innocent until proven guilty." Otherwise, justice cannot exist. We, media consumers, must not allow reporters to violate that principle. Would you want your personal life splattered like a bug on the *Republic's* front page?

There is one solution: Don't just absorb. Don't be a sponge. Don't let the *Republic* convince you of John Sansing's guilt. Use your squishy gray stuff. Otherwise, to quote Sheryl Crow, "Justice is a faded lie."

More than 100 disabled ASU students gathered at Matthews Hall Wednesday to view new technology for disabled students.

The show featured 12 vendors of office technology for people with hearing, visual, physical and learning disabilities.

David Carey, an ASU graduate in physical education, came up with the idea to hold an event for disabled students that would make them aware of the latest resources

that are available through the University.

He said he always wished that someone would have helped him in a similar way while he was a student.

"I just hope that this will help (disabled) people," he said. "There's a lot of work involved in this, but I feel very rewarded."

Carey, who was paralyzed from the waist down in 1989 when a stray bullet pierced his spine while he was sleeping in his bed, felt that the show could benefit more than just disabled students.

"Anybody can use this stuff," Carey said. "Like the voice-recognition technology can be used by anybody who doesn't type very well."

Tedde Scharf, associate director for Disabled Student Resources, said that she was surprised by the turnout for the showcasing.

"He (Carey) has done a great job at bringing a very balanced and professional presentation for students," Scharf said.

Michael Judge, a senior studying broadcasting, said he thought the presentation

was a great chance for students to check out the latest technology. He added however, that it wasn't an opportunity that comes around very often.

"I'm overjoyed because the more a disabled person can see what resources are available to them, the more closer they can come to living independently," he said. "Take me for example — this spring I'll be graduating and I want to know of every opportunity that will help me in the career world."

FBI charges 14 individuals in six companies with conspiracy

NEW YORK — In the first federal prosecution of sports betting over the Internet, the FBI Wednesday brought conspiracy charges against 14 owners and managers of offshore companies with sports betting pages.

"The Internet is not an electronic sanctuary for illegal betting," Attorney General Janet Reno said in a statement. "It's a federal crime to use the Internet to conduct betting operations."

The defendants, including two former stockbrokers and a lawyer, let thousands of clients across the United States wager on professional and college sports events through six companies, prosecutors alleged.

U.S. Attorney Mary Jo White said the defendants broke a 1961 law making it a crime to use interstate telephone lines

for gambling.

"Such blatant and widespread efforts to evade gambling laws cannot and will not be tolerated," White said at a Manhattan news conference.

One of the defendants, Kerry Rogers, blasted prosecutors in a telephone interview from Las Vegas, calling the charges "ridiculous."

"They've got guys shooting people up in New York. Don't they have anything better to do? I'm not in the gambling business. I'm in the Internet business," he said, describing his work as an Internet provider as more like that of a landlord.

He defended the company prosecutors linked him with even though he said he only provides them space on the Internet.

"They clearly have a license to do it. I've read the law a hundred times. I've asked several lawyers and it's legal,"

Rogers said.

The companies charged were located in the Caribbean and Central America, but some also had offices in New York City. White said 90 percent of their customers were in the United States.

The companies advertised their sites in magazines and through promotional mailings and their own Web sites. Bettors opened accounts with initial deposits of \$100 to \$500 and placed their bets via computers or over toll-free telephone numbers and were required to pay a 10-percent fee, authorities said.

Two of the 14 have been arrested and the remaining defendants were notified that they will be arrested when they return to the United States, the authorities said. All are U.S. citizens.

If convicted, the defendants each face a maximum sentence of five years in prison and a fine of up to \$250,000.



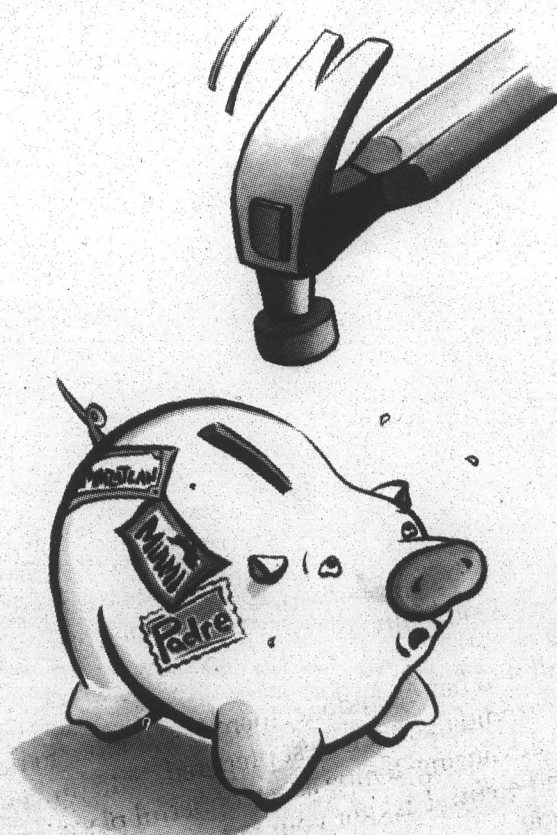

British interfaith leader wins \$1 million religion prize

NEW YORK — The British businessman who helped mediate a controversy over the placement of a Catholic convent near Auschwitz has won the \$1.2 million Templeton Prize for Progress in Religion, the richest award for achievement in any field.

The prize Wednesday went to Sir Sigmund Sternberg, 76, executive committee chairman of the International Council of Christians and Jews.

"It is time for religion to come out of the church, the synagogue, the mosque, the temple," he said. "While it is recognized that all religions have their own truths, and these shall be unassailable, there is a sense of a spirit which soars above all else and which, if harnessed, could contribute to the creation of caring societies as nothing else could."

The Templeton Prize was established in 1972 by investment manager John M. Templeton. The award will be bestowed at Buckingham Palace in May.

Sternberg was born in Hungary and went to Britain in 1939 during the rise of Nazism. He founded real estate and software companies and became one of the earliest and strongest advocates for interfaith dialogue.

He helped resolve the dispute that developed in 1984 when a group of Carmelite nuns established a convent at the perimeter of the Auschwitz death camp in Poland.

The nuns said their intent was to pray for death-camp victims. But others saw it as an intrusion into a setting indelibly linked to the Holocaust.

In meetings with Catholic and Jewish leaders, Sternberg helped develop a consensus for moving the convent. The nuns moved out in 1993. Last month, the government announced a wooden cross remaining on

the site would be moved.

Last year, along with Sheikh Zaki Badawi, principal of Muslim College in London, Sternberg established the Three Faiths Forum to find common ground among Judaism, Islam and Christianity.

Sternberg said he is "certainly no saint."

"I am really a simple soul, a businessman, who, in a modest way, has been smiled on by fortune and who has tried to repay the blessings which have been bestowed on me by opening to others a sense of the goodness which lies in us all, regardless of our faith," he said.

Sternberg is the second Jewish recipient of the Templeton Prize. Lord Jakobovitz, former chief rabbi of Britain, won in 1991. Other past winners include Billy Graham, Mother Teresa and Alexander Solzhenitsyn.

The ASU women's basketball team faces a simple task — win its last two games and finish no worse than sixth in the Pac-10, or lose both and finish in an all-too familiar place, as low as No. 8.

ASU (10-15, 6-10 Pac-10) hosts UCLA (18-7, 13-3) tonight and USC (11-14, 6-10) on Saturday. Both games tip-off at 7 p.m. at the University Activity Center.

For seniors Rameeka Lowe, Spring Steed and four-year letter winner Stephanie Freeman — who will be wearing maroon and gold for the last time — that means the Sun Devils must pick up their play.

"Hopefully we've put that (the Cal game) behind us and we can get two wins this weekend," said Freeman, who will leave ASU at No. 2 on the all-time steals list and No. 4 all-time in three-point field goals.

She added that keeping their place in the Pac-10 is important. "With two wins ASU would achieve eight on the season, or one less than Freeman saw in her three previous seasons with the Sun Devils.

"It's not fifth (place), but we want to stay in sixth," she said. "I think that everybody knows how important these two games are. The way we played against Cal was unacceptable and we know that if we come out like that against UCLA we are going to get blown out."

Lowe added that the chance to finish sixth shows just how far the Sun Devils have come.

"I'm excited about that. Last year we were ninth so that's a big jump," said Lowe, who has alternated between point and shooting guard all season. "I think we've worked hard this year, really hard. And that shows it."

Tonight's game against the Bruins should be a good gauge as to how well ASU comes back from last week, and how much the program has improved in 1998, Sun Devil head coach Charli Turner Thorne said.

"After this week is over ... everyone is going to evaluate our program," she said. "We'll have the banquet (and) awards, and then we'll be able to sit back and evaluate our season."

"How we play this week is going to, in my opinion, really affect how we evaluate this season. Whether we get that sixth-place finish makes a big difference."

Turner Thorne went on to say that her three seniors have been a giant piece of ASU's turnaround this year, especially their play since the loss of starting point guard Rechelle Lang in January.

Sun Devils looking for win over UCLA to complete formula

Figuring out the formula that will reserve a spot for the ASU men's basketball team in the NCAA Tournament has become quite simple.

Just ask interim head coach Don Newman. "We win on Thursday, we're in," Newman said referring to ASU's second-to-last regular season game.

Coming up with that win, though, is where the formula gets complicated.

The Sun Devils (18-11, 8-8 Pac-10) travel to Pauley Pavilion tonight to battle No. 19 UCLA at 8:30. The game won't be televised but can be heard on KMVP 860 AM.

ASU is 9-40 all-time against the Bruins, including a 78-73 loss earlier this year.

The Sun Devils haven't beaten UCLA in the past 18 tries — a span of nine years — and haven't won at Pauley Pavilion since Ronald Reagan was in the White House, a 67-64 squeaker in 1987.

Still while the past favors the Bruins, Newman said he prefers to focus on the present.

"This has got to be the time," he said. "This is our last shot at the Bruins (this season). We're leaving (Tempe) with a lot of confidence. We're going down there focused, and (it's) going to be a barn burner."

A win over UCLA would give the Sun Devils their third "quality" win of the year — they've already beaten Cincinnati and Stanford on the road and both teams are currently ranked in the top-25.

Combine that with a win Saturday over USC (7-19, 3-13) and ASU would be a lock with 20 victories.

UCLA comes into tonight's tilt with a 21-7 overall record, third place in the Pac-10 at 11-5. Ever since junior Jelani McCoy quit the team three weeks ago because of intense media scrutiny, though, the Bruins have struggled.

UCLA was taken to overtime by lowly USC, lost at No. 2 Duke 120-84, needed all 40 minutes to get past cellar dweller Washington State (3-14 Pac-10), 78-75 and was defeated by Washington State 95-94.

McCoy, a 6-foot-10, 237-pound center, has been Bruins most accurate shooter the past three seasons, not to mention ever. His career field goal percentage coming into this season was .716 and .600 in the 15 games he appeared in this year. He was also the Bruins most intimidating defensive presence, blocking 25 shots, which still leads the team.

Sun Devil forward Mike Batiste, though, said his team can't go in thinking UCLA is in a slump.

"We know they're struggling right now, but they're still a good ball team," Batiste said. "They have veterans on their team from the national championship team so we know they've got experience and we know they can take it to us at any time."

ASU guard Eddie House said he feels the Bruins remain a solid all-around team.

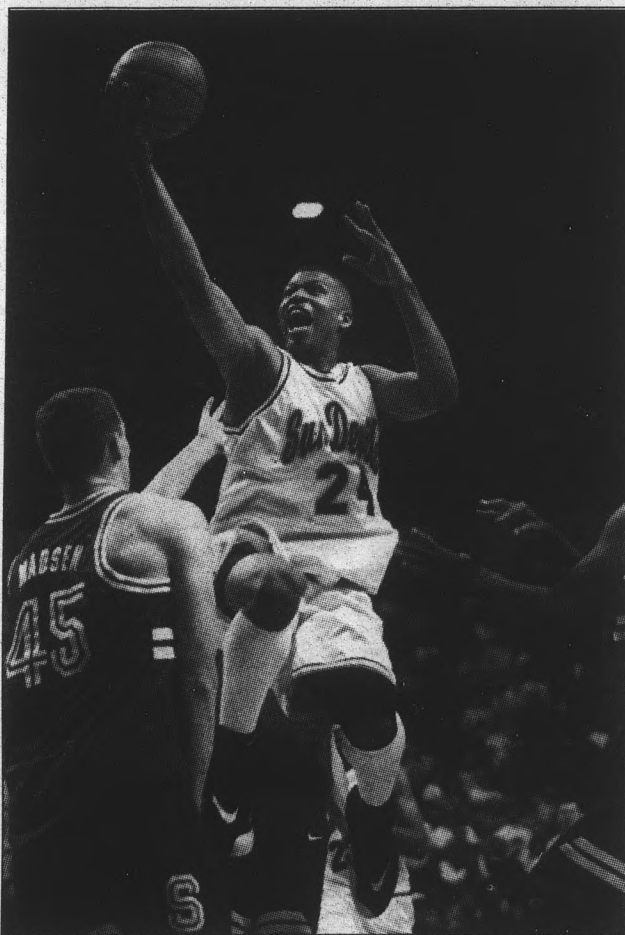
"They've got some pretty a good big man in J.R. Henderson," House said referring to the conference's third leading scorer (19.2 points per game). "I think we've got to shut him down in the post and mainly the guards we don't want to get off are Baron Davis and (Earl) Watson."

"Toby Baily is a proven player, and we know he is going to get his so we're going to try and limit what the others do."

Baily is the ninth-leading point producer in the Pac-10 (17.5) and is the current Pac-10 Player of the week. In the loss to Washington, Baily tied a UCLA record by scoring 32 points in a half.

Scoring quickly has become a Sun Devil trademark as well, House said.

"I think what will give them problems is the way we can put the ball in the hole so quickly," said House who is 50-120 (41.7 per-

cent) from behind the arc this season. "Say they hit a bucket, we can come down and hit a three before you can blink you eye, and then we can come right back and hit another three."

ASU has been scorching from three-point land in the past two games, hitting 21 of 41 (.512) from.

Sargsian returns to Valley for Classic Seniors

While most of the attention surrounding the ATP's Franklin Templeton Classic, being held this week at the Scottsdale Princess, has focused on Andre Agassi and his apparent re-dedication to the game, the appearance of his practice partner, Sargis Sargsian, has also peeked the interest of many Valley residents and ASU tennis fans.

Sargsian, arguably the greatest tennis player to ever don the familiar maroon and gold threads of an ASU athlete, took the court Monday for the first time as a professional in the city where he gained fame as a Sun Devil.

The 25-year-old from Armenia, who was awarded a wildcard into the main draw, defeated qualifier Ramon Delgado, 6-2, 3-6, 6-1, in the first round of the event. In his second round match Wednesday Sargsian squared off against Albert Costa, the No. 2 seed and No. 22-ranked player in the world.

With a solid ground attack and consistent serving, the ex-Sun Devil put fear of an upset into the mind of Costa when he extended the match to a third set. Costa, however, came back strong in the third, breaking Sargsian twice in the set enroute to a 6-3, 3-6, 6-1 win in front of a largely Sargsian biased stadium court crowd.

"Of course you try to give a little extra here," Sargsian said. "You have people that you know here, and when they come out you really want to do well."

Sargsian came to ASU in August of 1993 and immediately took the collegiate tennis world by storm. He racked up consecutive All-American honors for singles in 1994 and 1995 as well as doubles in 1995.

Then on May 21, 1995 he became ASU's first, and presently only, NCAA Singles Champion.

Only half-jokingly, Sargsian calls the tennis he played at ASU the best he has played in his entire life.

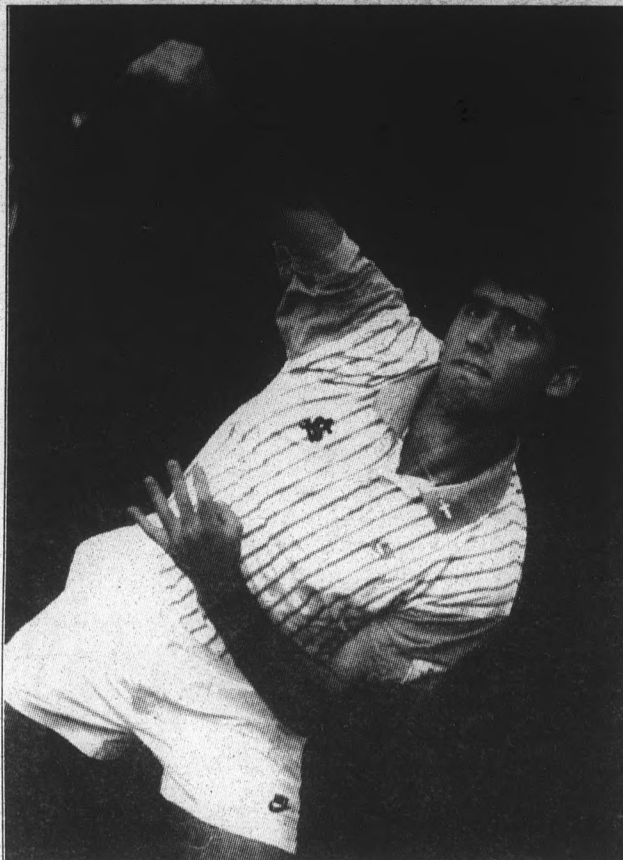
"Going to ASU was probably the best thing I've done in my life for tennis," Sargsian said. "I was there for two years and I improved my game so much it was unbelievable."

"It's a great school (ASU), it was a lot of fun and I had a great time there, and I really feel I played my best tennis over there."

Since leaving ASU at the top of the collegiate game in 1995, Sargsian has already had several memorable moments on the professional tour. Last year he won his first ATP tour event in Newport, Conn., and reached a career-high ranking of No. 57. He is also frequently seen around the practice courts with hitting-partner Andre Agassi.

"It is great to practice with Andre," Sargsian said. "He really helps me out and gives me tips. This is a guy who was No. 1 in the world, one of the best players ever. I am really picking up a lot."

Sargsian was knocked out of the singles portion of Arizona's only ATP tour

event with his loss to Costa, but he is still hanging tough with partner Xavier Malisse in the doubles portion.

Play continues through the weekend at the Franklin Templeton Classic, where a special offer of \$5 general admission tickets are available to any student with a valid I.D.

Thus far, ASU has ended a two-and-a-half year road losing streak, won more games in the Pac-10 (6) than it has since 1992-93, beat three conference foes by more than 20 points and reached double figures in wins, also the first time since the '93-'93 campaign.

"We could have easily gone in the tank when we lost Rechelle," she said. "But we haven't. And I think the biggest reason is the seniors, and that probably says the most about them."

Steed said it should be expected for the whole team to turn it up a notch.

"I think everybody stepped it up," she said. "Because anytime you lose a player it is up to the rest of the team to pick up where that player used to be. Not just us three seniors but everyone picked it up."

Now that the season is drawing to a close, the seniors want to end their careers at ASU with W's.

"I really want to go out with two wins. I don't want to leave my career with a loss, or two losses," Steed said. "I believe it will (be a great showing) with two wins at the end. It would show we've improved a lot."

"It's pretty important to get the two wins," Lowe said. "Up until now we have done pretty well this year. I'm looking forward to going out with a positive."



Freeman said expectations won't be so low for ASU next year.

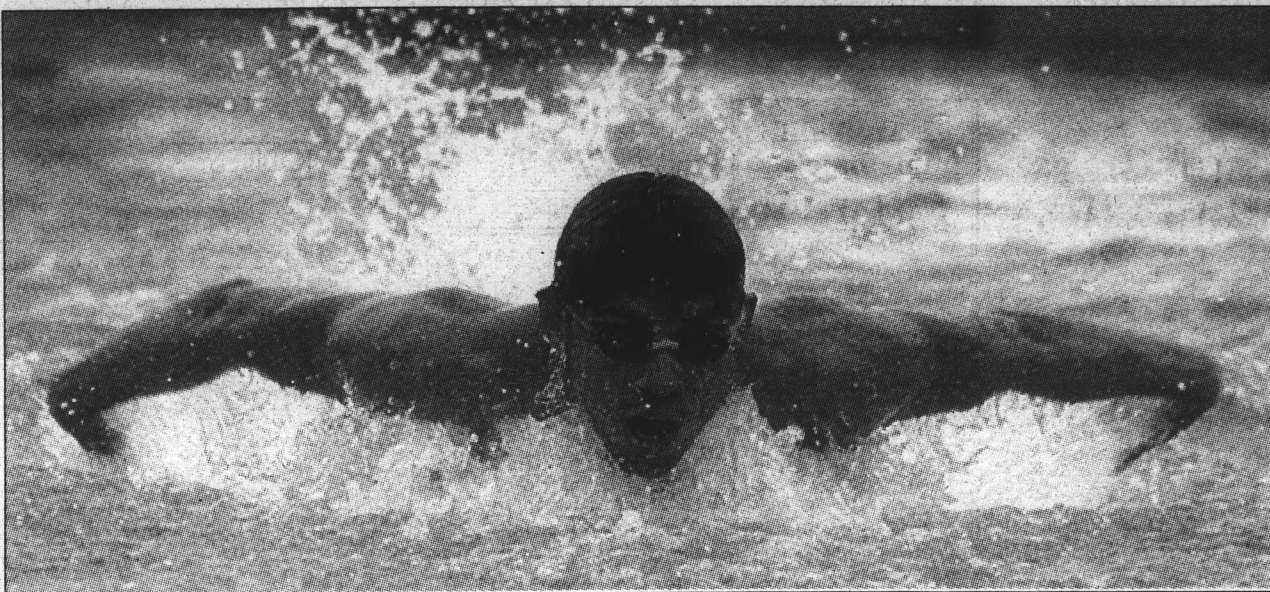

Men's swim team Pac-10 bound

With six months of preparation and over 17 meets and tournaments behind them, the No. 13 ASU men's swimming team will now attempt to win the Pac-10 Championship this weekend at the Belmont Shores Olympic Pool in Long Beach, Calif.

The Sun Devils head into the conference meet with a 6-4 overall record. Although ASU was only able to win one Pac-10 meet this season, against No. 10 Arizona last month, the team feels confident about its upcoming performance.

Farrell added, "We definitely have the potential to pull off some surprises."

Only six teams will compete in the conference meet, but five of the six teams participating hold top-10 status.

"The competition out here will be really tough," senior Robert Delgado said. "Everyone of us will swim well since we've trained so much. We're very rested and fresh to go."
