Complaints cause delay of runoff

The Associated Students of ASU Supreme Court decided Tuesday to postpone the presidential runoff election until all complaints against the current candidates are decided.

The injunction to postpone was originally requested by former presidential candidate Seth Deitchman's campaign manager, Meredith Taylor. Taylor asked that the elections be delayed until the appeals process currently underway regarding Deitchman's disqualification could be heard and decided on by the court.

Jess Walsh, Chief Justice of the Court issued the order, which also stated that it "was not necessarily a result of the appeal in (Deitchman's case), but in hopes of a more effective

run-off election."

Walsh was not available for further comment but Interim Program Coordinator Adena Bernstein said the court and the

elections commission, which oversees the electoral process, needs to come to a final decision on who will be allowed to continue their candidacies.

"In order for them to look at the facts and make a decision based on those facts, they decided that they needed to postpone the runoffs until next week or the week after," Bernstein said.

Once complaints are filed, the elections commission holds a hearing and decides what action, if any, will be taken. If a candidate is not pleased with the commission's decision, they can appeal to the ASASU Supreme Court.

Rich Golden, who heads up the elections commission, said "in the interest of fairness to all parties, (the court) made the

Student's project has her weeding out weeds

It's springtime in the desert for Jennie Rambo, which means it's time to weed.

"There's one," said Rambo, a biology senior, tugging at the leafy stalks that have recently popped up in a bed of tiny, yellow flowers.

The El Niño rains have resulted in a large number of plants available to grow and bloom, making it a proud time for many Arizona gardeners. But Rambo is not in her backyard. She's on campus, putting her scientific knowledge to work in creating a desert garden where people couldn't get anything to grow before.

Rambo, who hopes to someday work in habitat restoration, began the independent project in the fall of 1996, pulling out patches of Bermuda grass and tilling the soil on a strip of land east of Armstrong Hall. Flowering plants and desert trees were soon added.

Now hummingbirds frequent the garden, zipping from the purple and pink globe mallow flowers that cover the strip.

Last year, Rambo was able to add another section to her project on the south side of the Life Sciences Building.

Landscaping with native plants makes a lot of sense because they use much less water and encourage native animals to come back, Rambo said. Creating "xeriscapes" such as this are starting to become popular in many desert cities like Scottsdale and Tucson because they're so easy to maintain.

The xeriscapes created by Rambo are now flourishing with Sonoran grasses, trees and bushes, even though they haven't been watered since last fall. They should eventually require little, if any, extra water to maintain.

Other areas of campus, covered with grass and non-native plants, need a lot more water to live. More than 88 million gallons were soaked into the campus soil last year, said David Webb, assistant director for grounds and arboretum at ASU.

"I admire her greatly," said Stan Faeth, ASU biology professor and Rambo's advisor. "She's gone against lots of adverse conditions to do this."

Faeth is referring to the hazards that come with planting flowers in an area that has a separate landscape crew.

At times, especially at the beginning

Student Health insurance to widen coverage this fall

This fall, students insured by Student Health at the three state universities will find themselves with twice the medical coverage currently available.

Starting August 16, the \$50,000 per accident in medical coverage currently provided by HealthPartners will be raised to \$100,000 per accident.

"Fifty-thousand dollars is just not a lot of money these days, and we wanted to make sure that the students and their families got adequate coverage," said Tom Jacobsen, associate director of ASU's Student Health.

This is a major medical policy, Jacobsen said, covering hospitalization, surgery, physical therapy, ambulance and mental health services.

The money for the extra coverage will come from an increase in insurance rates in upcoming semesters, varying from a 3.4 percent increase for single students to a 9

percent increase for single parents and their families.

A single student will pay \$682 next Fall and Spring for basic medical insurance in comparison to \$660 this year. A student who includes a spouse and children in the basic plan will pay \$2,883 next year as opposed to \$2645 this year.

Insurance rates usually go up about this much each year anyway, said Dr. Art Ashton, chair of the Arizona Board of Regents student health insurance advisory committee, but they weren't expected to change much next year, so this was a good time to go ahead and increase rates to double the insurance coverage.

All ASU students and their families can sign up for Student Health medical insurance when signing up for classes or by signing up at Student Health.

decision," which would still allow Deitchman to run if his case is overturned.

Deitchman was kicked out of the presidential run-offs Monday when the commission found that he had falsified his financial statements.

"As it stands, if the elections would be held this week, only Mr. (Paul) Frost and Mr. (Damon) Pace would be in (the runoff)," Golden said.

He added that if the court overturned Deitchman's case, then he would be allowed back as a candidate, and Damon Pace, who was the next runner up and who also filed the complaint in consideration, would not be in the election.

"I'm glad it was postponed," said

Deitchman. "My gut feeling is that (the case) will be overturned and I will be back.

Presidential hopeful Paul Frost said he was disappointed with the postponement.

"Campaigning isn't easy," he said. "It takes energy and time. In that aspect I'm disappointed, but I'll just have to accept it and continue on."

Pace said Tuesday he was happy with the decision to postpone and feels it was the only fair thing to do.

"If (the postponement) is what it takes to get a fair election, so be it," he said. "It's only fair to Seth and myself. I think once the facts are presented to the Supreme Court, they will take it for what it is and decide against Seth."

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Protestants: Clinton should keep out of Ireland talks

BELFAST, Northern Ireland — Northern Ireland's two major Protestant parties bitterly disagree about the landmark peace accord, but they agreed on one thing Tuesday: President Clinton shouldn't try to sell it to people here.

The government of the Irish Republic, meanwhile, freed nine Irish Republican Army prisoners in a bid to boost support for the accord among the outlawed group's supporters.

The Ulster Unionist Party, already split over its leaders' decision to accept the deal, said a possible Clinton visit the week before a May 22 referendum might be "misunderstood" by Protestants resentful of foreign pressure to compromise, making rejection more likely.

"I think it might be misunderstood if he was to directly involve himself in an electoral process here in the province," said a senior Ulster Unionist negotiator, Reg Empey, arguing that Protestants "want to make up their own minds."

Leaders of the IRA-allied Sinn Fein party spent Tuesday at a secret location considering how to sell to their hard-line supporters an accord that the party's negotiators accepted, but falls far short of a united Ireland.

The deal will be the focus of debate this weekend at Sinn Fein's annual conference in Dublin, but leaders are hoping to delay a vote over whether to accept it until later this month.

The peace agreement, reached after 22 months of negotiations, would create a new Northern Ireland Assembly of Protestants and Catholic politicians. The assembly would be required to cooperate formally with the Irish Republic.

The accord keeps Northern Ireland firmly linked to Britain and its troops based here for the foreseeable future.

The British and Irish governments

aren't fearful of a majority "no" vote in the referendum, but they do worry that a large minority "no" would deny the deal the overwhelming public endorsement they feel it will require.

The nine IRA inmates walked free from the Irish Republic's top-security Portlaoise prison Tuesday and issued a statement pledging 100 percent support for the IRA and its allied Sinn Fein party.

All had been serving sentences for possessing arms and explosives — and all but one had been due to remain behind bars until the 21st century.

While the north's Catholic leaders seek a visit by Clinton to encourage the plan's acceptance, many Northern Ireland's Protestant leaders were concerned it would be viewed as foreign intervention.

"What business is it of Mr. Clinton's whether Northern Ireland remains a part of the United Kingdom or goes — as this agreement would have it — into a united Ireland?" said Peter Robinson, deputy leader of the Democratic Unionist Party.

Clinton discussed the prospect of visiting Northern Ireland during a White House reception Monday for former Sen. George Mitchell, the chairman of the Irish peace talks who sealed the deal Friday among eight parties.

The president emphasized that he wouldn't consider coming without the approval of the British and Irish prime ministers, Tony Blair and Bertie Ahern, and Protestant and Catholic politicians.

John Alderdice, leader of the non-sectarian Alliance Party, which draws support from the north's most moderate Protestants and Catholics, said Clinton should ignore the Democratic Unionists, "since they're determined to vote no regardless of what he does."

"He's a great campaigner, and I'm sure he could make a positive contribution," said Alderdice.

Napalm recycling plan sticks despite company back-out

WASHINGTON — The Navy says it remains committed to destroying or recycling 3.3 million gallons of napalm, although a company that agreed to do the job pulled out of its contract as the first shipment traveled by rail across the country Tuesday.

The Pentagon seemed taken aback by the last-minute cancellation of the deal as two 6,000-gallon drums of the Vietnam-era jellied gasoline rode a railcar from California toward its Indiana destination, crossing New Mexico on Tuesday.

"Good question," Defense Department spokesman Ken Bacon told reporters when asked what the military would do now that its napalm destruction plans are stalled.

Hoping to ease any public safety concerns, Bacon said there is no danger in shipping the incendiary product, which had been stored for two dozen years at a facility north of San Diego, because it is more stable and less volatile than gasoline.

"It's not explosive. It's very safe to transport," Bacon said.

Navy officials said they would likely seek another method of destroying the napalm or find another company to do the original job that was subcontracted out by a

larger firm.

"We're committed to this project because it is a safe and responsible project," said Navy Lt. Cmdr. Jon Smith. "We are examining all of our options."

The military hasn't yet decided what to do about the current shipment, which was being transported by the Burlington Northern/Santa Fe Railway, Smith said.

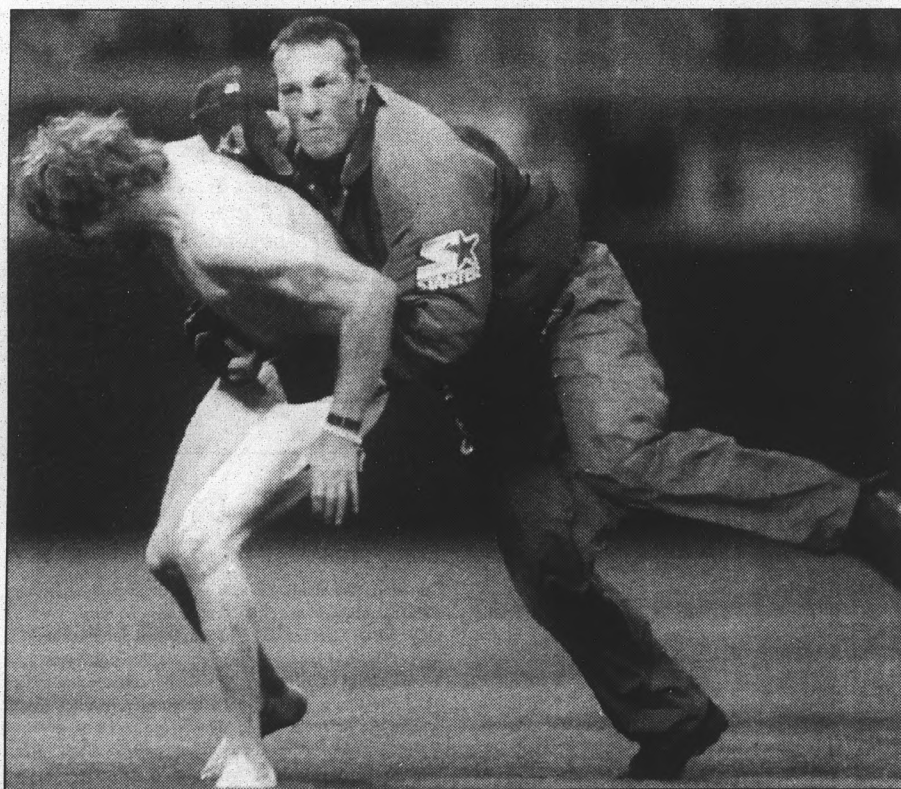
The one-railcar load on a train of 60 to 80 cars will cross into Texas, Oklahoma, Kansas and Missouri before arriving in Illinois this weekend, the company said. From there, a smaller railroad was to transport the shipment from Illinois to Indiana.

Pollution Control Industries in East Chicago, Ind., had agreed in a \$24 million contract to turn the 3.3 million gallons of napalm from the Fallbrook Naval Weapons Facility north of San Diego into fuel for cement kilns over two years.

But Monday, the company said it wanted out of the deal because some members of Congress outside of California complained about the project.

Rep. Ron Packard, R-Calif., wanted the napalm removed because state officials said it was leaking from aluminum canisters stored in an open field and contaminating soil in Fallbrook, an avocado- and citrus-farming community.

Bush visit to enlighten our lives, for a second

Former President George Bush is speaking at ASU May 5, thanks to the efforts of the Associated Students of ASU. The last time students brought a former president to the University was in 1989, when Ronald Reagan spoke. (President Clinton's visit in 1996 was a campaign stop, not a student-initiated event.)

So what?

It's spring, and we don't care. We don't care much about anything. We care only about ourselves and the things that bring short-term fun, long-term consequences notwithstanding.

People with more wrinkles and less youth than us — or maybe just more wisdom and less laziness — denounce our apathy.

"It's a big deal. The more ASU can get big names like Bush to come here, the more notoriety and recognition it gains for the University. The more our name is before the public mind, the more those degrees we're working for will mean ..."

So we can get better jobs with bigger salaries. So we can buy bigger houses sooner and drive more expensive luxury cars. So we can saddle ourselves with even bigger amounts of debt.

So we can let our lives be sapped away by the pursuit of fleeting successes and pleasures, to help us escape from the stress and burden of the successes and pleasures that didn't satisfy.

So we can one day peer out from our deathbeds at whatever progeny we've managed to leave behind and wish we'd been more concerned with them. So we can wonder what this life is all about anyway, now that the last few moments allotted us are slipping away ...

But it's spring, and we don't care. The sun is shining on our lithe young bodies and few of life's pleasures have yet revealed their accompanying consequences. It's hard to muster the energy to go to class, let alone think, so soporific is the sun.

Tests and papers may come and go, but they're accomplished more by short-term memory skills and last-minute cramming sessions than anything else. And if the concepts involved aren't even building blocks for later classes, a devil-may-care attitude is all the easier.

Studying just doesn't stack up with cooking our skin, or poisoning our livers or reveling in the sound of our own voices. Studying is incompatible with our narcissism, most of the time. If we can muster the thought that it will have long-term benefits, it becomes a priority.

And to the extent that we appreciate what Bush can do for us or our dreams, we'll get excited about his appearance. And we should. ASASU has done a great thing for this school by bringing Bush here. It's a praise-worthy endeavor.

We'll think that for about two seconds, and then we'll return to thinking about what it means for us. We'll drift back into that stupor of self love. Funny thing: Selfishness is as soporific as the sun.

But does it yield beautiful lives? Does it yield meaningful lives? Is such a thing even possible?

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### United States failing in role as protector

Last night, Constancio Pinto, the United Nations representative for East Timor, spoke at the Memorial Union about the occupation of East Timor by Indonesia. As a citizen of East Timor, and as a member of the leading opposition group, his story is a sad one: about one-third of his countrymen have perished in the last 23 years. This is the work of the Indonesian government, its dictator General Suharto and his cronies in the military. As a percentage of its population, East Timor has experienced one of the worst genocides in the 20th century.

Until 1975, East Timor was a colony of Portugal and is still considered as such by the United Nations. When it declared independence, Indonesia invaded East Timor with the tacit approval of the United States. It is no coincidence Indonesia's invasion began hours after Henry Kissinger, then-secretary of state, left the capital of Indonesia after consulting its leaders. The government of the United States knew about the invasion and may have held the leverage to discourage the invasion. It did not.

Since the invasion, massacres have continued unabated. However, just as the United States did nothing to stop the invasion, it continues to fail to condemn and discourage the bloodshed. David T. Kenney, a State Department official speaking at a hearing about the occupation in East Timor in 1977, said the following: "Sir, my judgment on this is they (the East Timorese) are, that given the circumstances and alternatives available to them, have decided their best interest lies at this time in incorporation with Indonesia."

This is absolute nonsense, even for a diplomat. Kenney's statement fails to distinguish the individuals committing bloodshed from the individuals who are bleeding. Moreover, to promote the idea that an occupied people have "decided" to accept their occupation is to distort reality beyond recognition. These type of statements are usually associated with Fidel Castro or the old Soviet empire, not the government of a free nation.

The bottom line is this: our government knew about the atrocities in East Timor and did nothing to stop it because such an effort, in the language of foreign policy experts,

would "jeopardize our strategic interests."

Such a policy, while cold-blooded, at least had some saliency during the Cold War. Indonesia, while being the furthest thing from a democracy, was a staunchly anti-Communist nation that served as a valuable ally in the region. Moreover, the island of Timor is placed exactly where U.S. submarines could move from the Pacific to Indian oceans. Other observers of the situation point out that offshore oil reserves near Timor island could have as much oil as Kuwait.

But now that the Cold War is over, the United States continues to look the other way at Indonesian atrocities in East Timor. Not only is that morally indefensible, but it also serves a minimal strategic interest. With the discovery of oil eclipsing demand around the world and our unrivaled military might, our condemnation of the genocide in East Timor would have a minimal impact on our security interests. Yet we still sell arms to East Timor. Why?

As a nation, we are doing much less than we should to undermine the continued destruction of a predominantly mountain people. It's as simple as that.

My calculated prediction is that the United States will remain the unrivaled hegemonic power of the world for at least 30 years and could remain so for even as long as 100 years. Our economic and military power around the world far surpasses any other nation. Moreover, that power, at least for the moment, continues to grow in both absolute and relative terms in comparison to every other nation on earth (except China).

My concern is that in the next century, which will be even more of the American century than this one, we will increasingly become fat, dumb and happy. Our policies will become more removed from our values of increased global prosperity and individual human rights. We will focus upon short-term goals that actually erode our long-term interests.

If we want to create the world in our image, both freer and richer so people can find a better life for themselves and their posterity, we require the courage of our convictions and a moral authority based upon a consistency of behavior. Our nation has demonstrated neither in East Timor.

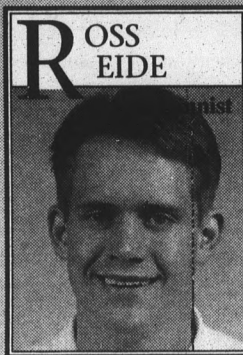
### Political whining

In Erik Noland's letter to the editor, he said, "Maybe I'm idealistic. Maybe the *State Press* reports only what the students want to hear."

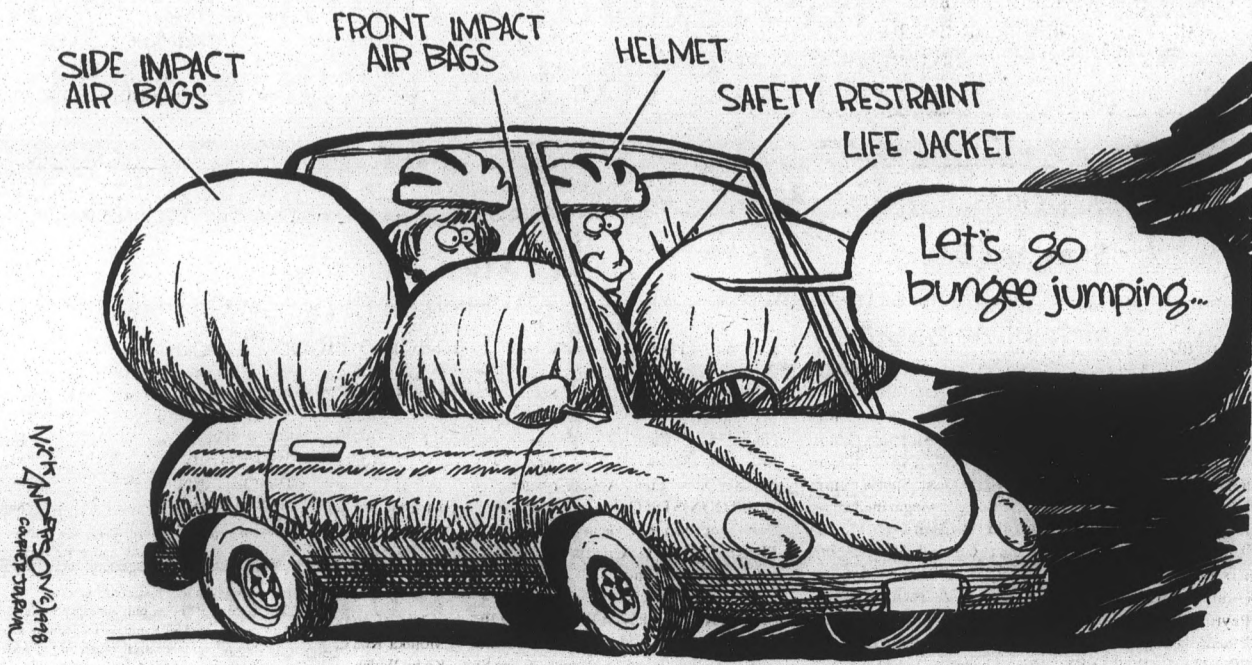

# College of Engineering senator pulled from race

Kelley Byrne, the newly elected senator for the College of Engineering, was forced to step down from his position Monday after a verdict from the elections commission knocked him out of the race.

Current Sen. Drew Feth, College of Engineering, filed a complaint last week arguing that Byrne failed to submit a mandatory financial statement.

"Sometimes people question the way ASASU runs itself and its elections," Feth said. "We have to be consistent year to year. If we fail to do that, we're making it personal, not policy. People were kicked out last year for not turning in financial statements."

Byrne did not turn in his financial statement on time, but one was turned in when he was notified that it was mandatory. He said he was unable to reach the elections coordinator when questioning the importance of the document.

"It was my assumption that because I did not spend any money, I did not have to fill out the form," Byrne said. "I turned in a form eventually; granted, it was late."

The elections commission assessed 20 points to Byrne, which disqualified him.

"I felt that what (ASASU) did wasn't in their best interest," Byrne said. "I didn't think the financial form was that important. I really wanted to be the senator."

Feth said he filed the complaint because there were two other candidates for the senate seat who did follow the election rules.

Sanjeev Ramchandra, the third place candidate, will move up to fill Byrne's shoes and represent the College of Engineering, along with Robert M. Sistik, the second place candidate.

"Failure to follow the established rules weakens the status of ASASU," Feth said. "It discredits the amount of work the engineering college has put forth this year. We want someone to carry that torch on. Without rules, it's anarchy."

# Senate panel endorses capping lawyer's fees in tobacco case

PHOENIX (AP) — The private lawyers hired to make Arizona's case against tobacco companies would have their fees slashed under a bill endorsed by a state Senate panel Tuesday.

The proposal would put a \$1 million cap on the amount private lawyers could make by winning Arizona's anti-tobacco lawsuit. Arizona is one of 40 states suing tobacco companies to recover money spent on smokers' medical care.

The Senate Government Reform Committee endorsed the plan on a 5-1 vote Tuesday.

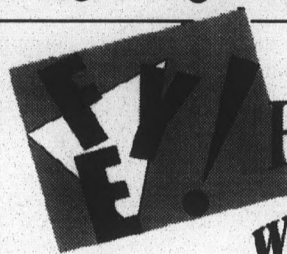
Sen. John Kaites, R-Glendale, has raised the lawyers' fees issue in his campaign for Arizona Attorney General. Kaites says the state's contract with private lawyers is illegal and would give those attorneys up to \$381 million.

Kaites, who sponsored a similar measure that died in the Senate Judiciary Committee last week, said tobacco companies should be forced to "send the money to the taxpayers and the kids and not the lawyers."

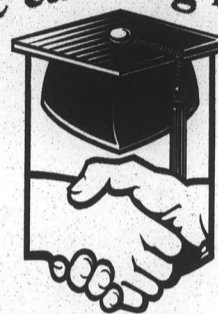
Aides to current Attorney General Grant Woods said the contract, which calls for the state's lawyers to get 18 percent of damages paid by tobacco companies, was legal and should not be overturned by the Legislature.

Lawyers in Woods' office do not have the time or the resources to pursue the case, which could bring the state billions of dollars, said Assistant Attorney General Tom Prose. The state's private lawyers might quit if the Legislature passes the fee cap, Prose said.

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## Possible conflict of interest plagues ASASU elections committee

Some students feel the Associated Students of ASU's elections commission, which stands as an alias supreme court, deciding who is eliminated from elections, is plagued with conflicts of interest.

Head Elections Commissioner Richard Golden was presidential contender Damon Pace's campaign manager in last year's elections.

"He ran Damon Pace's campaign last year; is he running it again this year from a different position?" asked Sen. Craig Reid, College of Education. "Richard Golden is conspiring with Pace. Look who he is kicking out and who he is not. It's pretty simple."

Golden's position represents a conflict of interest because the elections commission reads filed com-

plaints, holds trials and decides verdicts.

When Golden was selected as commissioner, the elections screening committee did not know Pace intended to run for president.

"There is a word for it: conflict of interest," said Sen. Andrew Lefberg, College of Business.

The commission has determined thus far to eliminate Seth Deitchman, former presidential candidate, and Kelley Byrne, former senator-elect of the College of Engineering, from the elections.

"I am one out of three commissioners, and it was the decision of the entire commission," Golden said.

He said that although he was Pace's campaign manager last year, he does not consider this a conflict of interest. He said he has spoken little with Pace since last summer.

"Golden made a decision he could easily back up," said Erik Noland, ASASU assistant public relations director. "Anybody else in the same situation, given the same facts would have given the same decision."

Reid said Pace and Paul Frost, also a presidential candidate, have broken rules equal to those for which the commission disqualified Deitchman.

He alleged that Frost campaigned in the Mormon Temple and that Pace is vividly campaigning in Parking Structure 1. These are in violation of the election rules.

"If Deitchman should be kicked out, Frost should be too," Reid said. "(The commission) should be fair in their decision."

There are currently complaints pending with the commission against Pace, Frost and Deitchman.

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# Police conduct sting operation against Apache Boulevard crime

In an ongoing battle against prostitution and drug use along Apache Boulevard, three law enforcement agencies worked together to help rid the area of illegal activity.

Tempe police, Mesa police and officials from the Liquor Control Board worked together Friday night in an undercover sting operation on the boulevard that is notorious for prostitution, illicit drug activity and other blight. They arrested 11 females and eight males for prostitution and cited four businesses and seven people for liquor violations.

Sgt. Dave Lind, spokesman for Tempe police, said the department became aware of the problem and decided to act.

"We received a number of complaints from people who live in the area, and officers who work there became aware of the problem," he said.

Police have responded to complaints from people who work or live in the area before, said Lt. Phil Harris of the Tempe police, adding they do sting operations a couple of times a year. Most illegal activity usually goes from Rural Road to the east Tempe border.

Additional police services will continue to be used, including overtime funds that increase patrol to help combat the problem.

However, past efforts have only eliminated the problem temporarily, Harris said. The illegal activity usually leaves right after a bust and comes back later, which is something officials would like to change.

"The problem is not prostitution or drugs," Harris said. "The problem is, people can't get a job or they have an addiction that they can't get rid of."

Harris said next time they hope to bring in social agencies, like ComCare and the East Valley Addiction Counsel, to work with the people they arrest who are homeless or addicted.

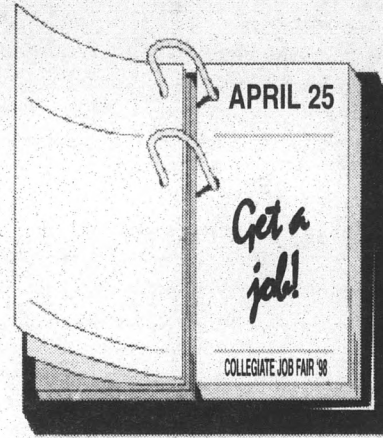
"We did a good job with making arrests Friday night," he said. "But something we need to add is a way for folks to change their lifestyles, and police can't do that. Police deal with law enforcement."

Those who were arrested Friday night were taken to a motel room, where they were booked and then transported to jail.

"Next time we would like to book them, and take them to a room and ask them what their needs are," Harris said.

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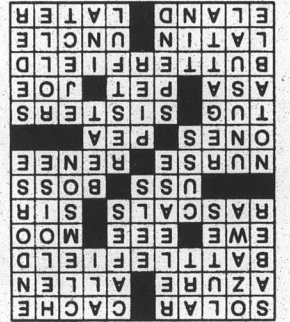

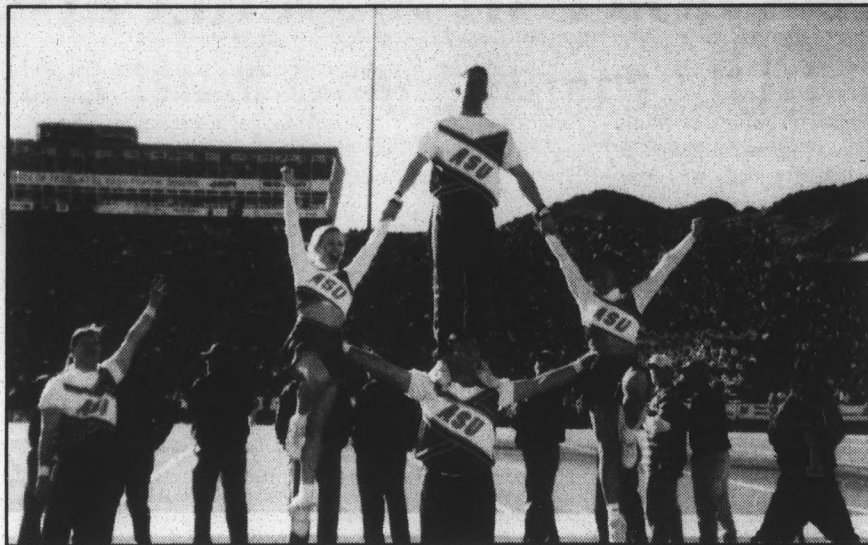

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## Bill to legalize sparklers headed to governor's desk

PHOENIX (AP) — Arizonans could legally celebrate Independence Day with sparklers and other non-explosive fireworks this year for the first time under a bill sent to Gov. Jane Hull's desk.

The Arizona House approved the measure (SB1423) on a 39-20 vote Monday afternoon.

Supporters of the idea have tried for years to get the Arizona Legislature to repeal the state's ban on non-explosive fireworks. Then-Gov. Fife Symington vetoed a similar bill in 1996.

Hull has not decided whether she will sign the sparkler bill, spokeswoman Francie Noyes said Monday.

Backers say Arizonans should be able to use sparklers, which are legal in 40 other states, to celebrate the Fourth of July and other special occasions. A lobbyist from a fireworks industry

group told a House panel last month more people visit emergency rooms for toilet seat injuries than for fireworks-related wounds.

Opponents say sparklers and other non-explosive fireworks such as snakes and glow worms are dangerous because they burn at high temperatures.

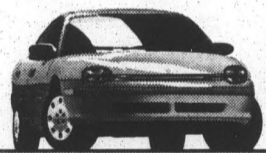
"This has nothing to do with little children. This has to do with profits," Rep. Andy Nichols, D-Tucson, a public health doctor. "I can almost guarantee you that we will have young children who will be burned by these devices."

Firefighters and the state Land Department also opposed the bill, citing the danger that careless use of sparklers could ignite wildfires, especially this year when heavy winter rains caused the growth of large amounts of underbrush.

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# Senate votes to limit winter gas choice in Phoenix area

PHOENIX — In a move that could make gasoline more expensive for motorists statewide, the Senate voted Tuesday to require the use of just one type of less-polluting gasoline in the Phoenix area during the winter.

The Senate voted during debate on an air-quality bill (SB1247) to allow use of only a type of oxygenated fuel already used in California, the source of most gasoline sold in Arizona.

"The most important thing is our duty to protect the health of the people of this state," said Sen. Marc Spitzer, a Phoenix Republican who sponsored both the air-quality bill and the fuel amendment to it.

If enacted, the fuel decision would scrap the state's current practice of allowing winter use of both ethanol-based Phase II CARB — short for California Air Resources Board — and feder-

ally sanctioned gasoline with the controversial additive methyl tertiary butyl ether (MTBE).

A study conducted by an ASU economics professor found eliminating the two-fuel option could force Arizona consumers to pay between 6 and 27 cents more per gallon. The study was commissioned by the Arizona Rock Products Association, an industry group whose member companies' vehicles use a lot of gasoline.

"Every cent that we add in production is a cent that somebody will have to pay," said Sen. Rusty Bowers, R-Mesa. "This costs more."

The fuel decision would have a statewide impact because the Phoenix area dominates the state's gasoline market and most gasoline used in Arizona arrives in the state via a pipeline to Phoenix. In most cases, it would be impractical for oil companies to send one type of gasoline to Phoenix and another elsewhere.

There are big stakes for the oil industry.

Unocal Corp. has a patent for the California gasoline, and a federal judge in Los Angeles last month refused to overturn a judgment requiring other companies to pay Unocal 5.75 cents a gallon.

Under Spitzer's bill, only Phase II CARB could be sold in the Phoenix area annually between Nov. 1 and March 31 beginning in 2000.

The federal Environmental Protection Agency is studying whether MTBE causes cancer or damage to the central nervous system.

There is opposing scientific testimony, but critics contend MTBE, an organic compound added to gasoline to produce cleaner-burning fuel, threatens drinking water supplies and can cause cancer.


Congress mandated in 1990 that oil companies put air-cleaning chemicals in gasoline to reduce carbon monoxide and smog in large urban centers.

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**Oxnard, Calif., police chief  
to become Phoenix's top cop**

PHOENIX — Harold L. Hurtt, who is police chief in Oxnard, Calif., but has a long history with the Phoenix Police Department, was introduced Tuesday as the city's top cop.

Hurtt spent the last five years as police chief in Oxnard, a city of 157,000 just north of the Los Angeles area. He spent the 24 years before that rising through the ranks of the Phoenix Police Department. He will replace outgoing chief Dennis Garrett.

Hurtt, who will be the city's first black police chief, took the new job only a month after a jury awarded \$45 million to the family of a black double amputee who died after a struggle with police. The man's family claimed he died from a choke hold, though an internal investigation cleared the officers involved.

But Hurtt said during a news conference Tuesday that he didn't know the details of that case. And he sidestepped questions about whether his race could help him reach out to minorities who have long complained of mistreatment at the hands of Phoenix police.

"I think my approach is that I will go out to the community ... find out what the concerns are," Hurtt said. "My style is to be available, to be there in the community."

The Rev. Oscar Tillman, leader of the local chapter of the NAACP, said he wished Hurtt had spoken to the public while he was interviewing for the job to gauge community concerns. He said the department should have chosen someone with less history in the department so he or she could take an unbiased look at its operations.

And he said Phoenix police need to go fur-

ther to reach out to minorities than appointing a black chief.

"They've put a new cover on the book, but we want to see if the story has changed," Tillman said.

Mayor Skip Rimzsa responded heatedly when Hurtt was asked whether his race made him uniquely suited to reach out to minority groups. He denied that race was a factor in hiring Hurtt.

"He's a skilled and talented individual," he said.

State and county NAACP officials marched during the 1994 Fiesta Bowl Parade to protest the death of Edward Mallett, the double amputee who died after the struggle with police.

In another racially charged incident, a Phoenix police officer was fired and charged for allegedly beating a Somali man who couldn't speak English during an April 1997 traffic stop.

Hurtt advanced to become a top assistant in the Phoenix department and was a finalist when Garrett, who is retiring, landed the job as chief in 1991.

Hurtt won praise for pushing community-based policing in Oxnard. When he arrived there, there was one Block Watch patrol. Now there are 35.

He also helped turn part of a vacant high school into a police-sponsored youth center, and set up police "storefronts" in rough neighborhoods. Oxnard's crime rates sank under his leadership. Major crime fell nearly 30 percent in five years.

The new chief will oversee a department with 3,400 employees and an annual budget of about \$240 million. Hurtt will take over for Garrett May 11.

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# Catholics flock to see image in tree resembling Virgin Mary

TUCSON — Mary Garcia brought her mother and daughter to see it in the morning. She returned with her father at noon, then at midafternoon with her husband. She came back in the early evening to recite the rosary.

A 2-inch imperfection in the bark of a sparse walnut tree at Frances Kirberger's house has many believing it's a vision of the Virgin of Guadalupe, Mexico's patron saint and a symbol revered by many Hispanics.

"I can't get enough," said Garcia, a homemaker who visited the tree repeatedly on Monday. "I still get goosebumps."

Ever since Good Friday, when relatives noticed the image on a branch six feet up, the faithful have come to Kirberger's home. Newspaper and television

reports brought dozens more on Monday.

"It's just a miracle," said Kirberger's daughter, Angie Bustamante, who lives with her mother.

The crowds linger late into the night and reappear early in the morning. But Bustamante said she doesn't mind because the apparition isn't meant just for her family.

"It belongs to everyone who's Catholic," she said.

The Virgin of Guadalupe, Mexico's patron saint, is an apparition of Mary seen in 16th century Mexico and held sacred by many Roman Catholics.

The image, formed by a break in the bark, has an outline resembling a person wearing robes. Scarred bark around the edges looks like robes draped over the bare wood in the middle.

The tree's trunk has been obscured by an

impromptu and growing shrine of prayer candles, a framed drawing of the Virgin, a multicolored Easter basket and bouquets of roses.

Some who have seen the image say it's a sign of hope for Kirberger, who is diabetic, and Bustamante, who said she needs a kidney transplant. Or a message of love from Kirberger's late husband, in whose memory the tree was planted.

Eddie Bejarano, who was vacationing from San Jose, Calif., said it could be a message to all people of faith.

"There are so many mysterious things that God has done," Bejarano told the crowd Monday. "But nobody sees the signs because nobody practices the faith."

"It takes people of real faith to see these things."




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
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News story reunites family with brother

TAMPA, Fla. — The deacon approached Patricia Coleman on Easter Sunday, the day of rebirth and resurrection. Had she seen the article about her brother?

No, it wasn't Tony, who had died of cancer 18 months earlier. And not Dale, the IBM executive in New York. The Associated Press story he had read in The Tampa Tribune was about Arthur Bell, a 71-year-old man, once a pioneering ballet dancer, who'd been found homeless and disoriented on a Brooklyn street, his feet almost frozen.

Arthur! The missing brother, the one who had fled a stifling life in a small Southern town as the first son of a preacher who reviled dancing — the thing Arthur loved best in all the world.

The brother she and her four sisters and two brothers had hunted for decades.

"I said, 'Oh Lord. Is he dead or is he alive?'" Coleman said. "He has risen. My brother rose on Easter Sunday."

"Only God could do this," another sister, Annie Stubblefield, 63, said Monday, as she and her sisters worked to arrange a reunion with their brother, now in a New York City nursing home regaining strength and relearning to walk.

By midday they had arranged for Dale Bell, who had met Arthur only once, as a grade-schooler when the dancer returned briefly in the mid-1950s, to visit the nursing home this week when he returns from a business trip. The rest of the family plans to visit as soon as they can make arrangements.

Arthur Bell's reaction to hearing about his family was recounted by social worker Clare Osman: "He said, 'Oh, my God, Dale.' He said, 'That's a great thing.' He has a chance to see all of his family again."

The reunion was a long-time coming. His sisters recall a charming teen-ager who loved to sing and could dance like no one else they knew, but who so chafed at his strict upbringing that he boarded a bus for New York City on the day he gradu-

ated from high school. World War II was not yet ended.

Patricia was in elementary school and decided the brother she was crazy about just didn't love her. Evangeline was 5 and remembers the day Arthur sat down and told her he was going to New York to dance. Sharon was an infant; she grew up hearing about the glamorous brother who had picked out her name.

"He was just determined to be a dancer," Stubblefield said. "He was determined not to be a laborer, and he made it." They saw him only once again, the quick visit in the 1950s when their father was ill. After that, Arthur Jr. fell out of touch and they watched his career from afar, hearing from an aunt that his dancing career had led him to London and Paris.

Then he seemed to vanish entirely. His family says they searched for him over the years, tracking him as far as a shelter or a street address, but they got no further without his Social Security number. Each Thanksgiving, they'd have a family reunion — without Arthur.

The newspaper article changed all that. In the story, Arthur didn't mention Tampa. But he did say he grew up in a large family in Florida and his father was a preacher.

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# Clinton focuses on sports in race forum

HOUSTON — Giving a sharper focus to his national dialogue on race, President Clinton on Tuesday urged Americans to look to the world of sports as an example of how individuals of different races can join in a common effort.

"It is important that people see that in athletics in America that the rules are fair, that people get their fair chance," Clinton said in leading off a scheduled 90-minute nationally televised discussion on the role of race in sports.

An avid fan of college basketball and major professional sports, Clinton is well versed in sensitive issues like white dominance in coaching and sports team ownership. He said if professional sports wants more minority coaches but cannot find them, "then there's something wrong with recruitment."

The meeting, broadcast live on ESPN, was the second of Clinton's three planned nationally televised town hall meetings on race. The first was in Akron last December.

In the opening session, conducted on a downtown theater stage, the focus was on finding ways to put more minorities in professional coaching and managing jobs.

Joe Morgan, a member of baseball's Hall of Fame, said baseball has made only small progress. While noting that some of the greatest players in baseball history are black, "once they're finished, there is no place for them to go" in the sport business.

Clinton said he was optimistic that talking about race in the context of sports can help the nation deal with broader racial issues. "America, rightly or wrongly, is a sports crazy country," he said. "And we often see games as a metaphor or symbol of what we are as a people."

Why sports?

"Race in sports offers an analogy that really can be translated into the larger society," Judith Winston, executive director of Clinton's race initiative, told reporters before the session at the downtown Wortham Theater Center.

"We think this is a great opportunity to illustrate some substantial points using sports as an example of the way we dealt with race relations — both our successes and our continuing challenges," she added.

The Houston program featured such sports luminaries as Jim Brown, the former Cleveland Browns running back; Keyshawn Johnson, a wide receiver for the New York Jets, and five-time Olympic medalist Jackie Joyner-Kersey. Also on the program were John Thompson, head basketball coach at Georgetown University; Carmen Policy, president of the San Francisco 49ers, and San Diego Padres owner John Moores.

Clinton's first town hall meeting on race, at Akron, covered a wide range of topics. His hope in Houston was to narrow the focus to sports in a way that would engage Americans who might not otherwise want to discuss race issues.

In Houston, the forum's makeup angered Latino activists who complained that too few Hispanics were represented. Felipe Lopez, a basketball star at St. John's University, was the only Hispanic on the 11-member panel. ESPN added Lopez after a Latino group wrote to Clinton to protest.

Lockhart said ESPN had invited numerous Hispanic sports figures, who declined for various reasons. He said the White House was satisfied with the final group. "It is a good panel bringing a wide variety of opinions and experiences," Lockhart said.

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# Coca-Cola pulls back curvy test cans for more tinkering

ATLANTA — Coca-Cola's new curvy can is being pitched into the recycle bin.

The company pulled the contoured, red 12-ounce can from four of five test markets as it tries to resolve problems and come up

with a can that repeats the success of its curvy bottles that lit up sales four years ago.

Consumers liked the cans, but not enough to pay extra for it, company officials said. There also were problems fitting the cans into some vending machines.

"This is just a natural part of the testing

(and) learning," company spokeswoman Polly Howes said Tuesday. "We continue to work on it."

The company had tested the cans for about a year in Terre Haute, Ind.; Tucson, Ariz.; Las Cruces, N.M.; and Brownsville, Texas. The cans are still available in El Paso, Texas,

as development continues.

One problem to work out is the cost of production. Mike Harris, sales manager at Coca-Cola Bottling in Tucson, said some consumers balked at paying the extra 10 percent to 12 percent it added to the cost of a Coke.



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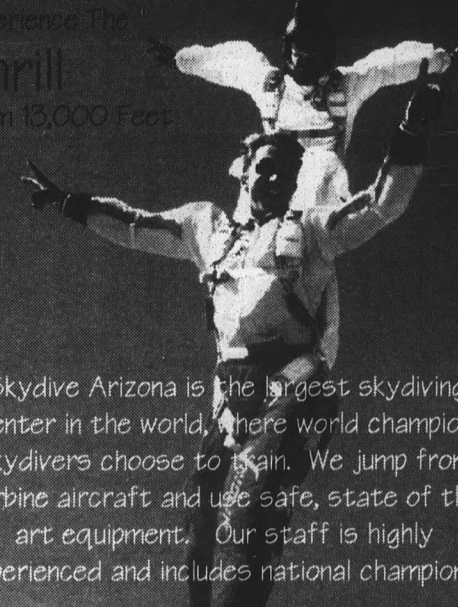
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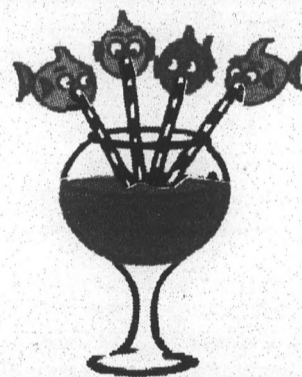
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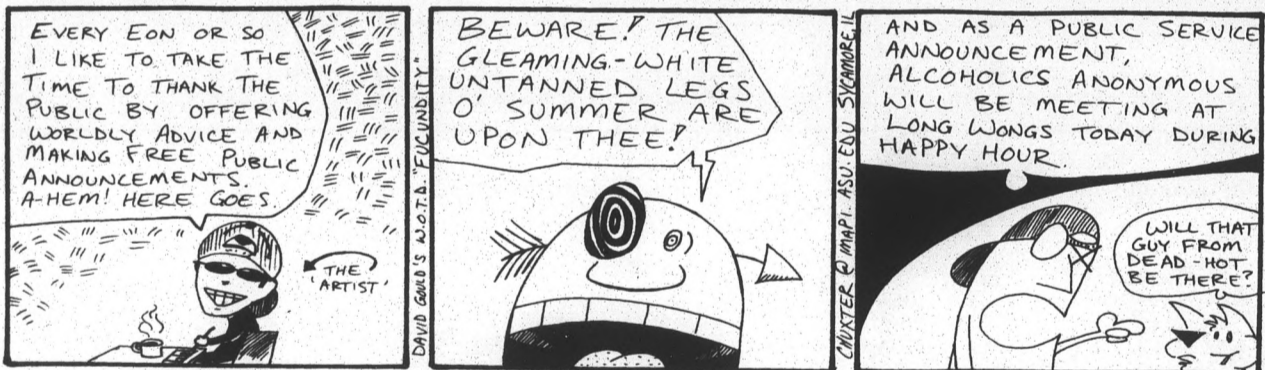

### Sophomore gymnast Hess vaults way into spotlight

Like a lone bullet in the chamber of a Colt .45, ASU gymnast Michelle Hess just needed the trigger to be pulled.

Bang!

Hess' 9.95 vault at the Midwest Regional two weeks ago in Tempe showcased the sophomore's explosive potential.

With her team in desperate straights, clawing its way back from a season-low score on uneven bars (46.9), Hess turned in that career-high mark on a vault she had never done in competition before.

But that's her job. She's the specialist.

The Thornville, Ohio native was recruited to compete in three events, however, her first two years have been mainly vault and little else.

"It's kind of tough (competing on just one event)," said Hess, who has exhibitioned on beam and floor this season. "I just have one thing to concentrate on and if I mess it up I feel even worse because it is the only thing I did. But we are a team so whatever we can pull together when it matters for the team."

Putting the team first is exactly what Hess did with her vault.

ASU head coach John Spini had been planning on saving Hess' half-on, half-off vault for nationals, but the 5-foot-1 gymnast had other thoughts.

After an average 9.75 effort on her first attempt, a fired-up Hess told Spini she was ready to stick her new vault now.

"I walked over and said, 'OK Michelle, let's see the

## Laiho earns Pac-10 honor; men's assistant coach named

The Pac-10 Conference announced that ASU hammer thrower Mika Laiho has been named its Male Field Athlete of the Week for April 6-12.

Laiho, a senior from Parkano, Finland, broke his own school record in the hammer with a winning throw of 72.26 meters (237-feet, 1-inch) at the Sun Angel Classic in Tempe.

The Sun Angel Classic title was Laiho's second in three years at the meet and his third straight win this season.

His NCAA automatic mark of 72.26 is the seventh-best in Pac-10 history and the best collegiate mark in the country this year. Laiho has dominated every hammer competition he has entered this year, winning his three competitions by a combined 120 feet.

At Ole Miss, O'Dowd was responsible for scouting, scheduling and game and practice preparation and helped with on-campus recruiting. He also coordinated and directed the Ole Miss summer basketball camps.

Prior to Mississippi, O'Dowd was an assistant coach and assistant athletic director at Barton County Community College in Great Bend, Kan. during the 1991-92 school year.

His coaching resumé also includes stints at Kansas State (1989-91) where he was a graduate assistant and Topeka High School in Topeka, Kan., as an assistant from 1986-1989.

## Silman faces 5 years prison, fine for ASU point-shaving scandal

PHOENIX (AP) — The alleged mastermind of the ASU point-shaving scandal pleaded guilty Tuesday to five counts of sports bribery, becoming the sixth and final defendant to plead out.

Benny Silman, a 26-year-old former ASU student from North Hollywood, Calif., faces five years in prison and \$250,000 in fines.

Federal prosecutors said Silman conspired to bribe two ASU basketball players to miss shots so that he and three gamblers could beat the projected point spread on four games in 1994.

Silman made no comment Tuesday. His lawyer, David Chenoff, said Silman changed his plea because all of the other conspirators in the scam — including two former Arizona State players and three men who allegedly placed bets in the scheme — were prepared to testify against him.

Silman had pleaded innocent in December to charges of money laundering, racketeering and sports bribery charges.

U.S. District Judge Robert C. Broomfield can still reject the terms of the plea agreement. Silman is scheduled for sentencing June 29.

The players, Stevin "Hedake" Smith and Isaac Burton, pleaded guilty in December to deliberately missing shots in games so the

gamblers could beat the projected point spread.

Joseph Gagliano, 29, a Phoenix investment adviser, also pleaded guilty, as did alleged bookmakers Dominic Mangiamele, 61, of Mount Prospect, Ill., and his son, Joseph Mangiamele, 36, of Arlington Heights, Ill.

Joe Lodge, an assistant U.S. attorney handling the case, said he couldn't comment on whether his office is investigating any other possible suspects in the scheme.

The alleged conspirators placed more than 61 bets totaling \$506,000 on the basketball games in what the FBI says was a major sports gambling scandal.

A federal grand jury returned a 72-count indictment in December against the Mangiameles, Silman and Gagliano, accusing them of sports bribery, money laundering and racketeering.

Smith, the Sun Devils' No. 2 all-time leading scorer, agreed to fix the four games for \$20,000 a game, in part to erase a reported \$10,000 gambling debt to Silman, a fellow student, according to Smith and Silman's plea agreements.

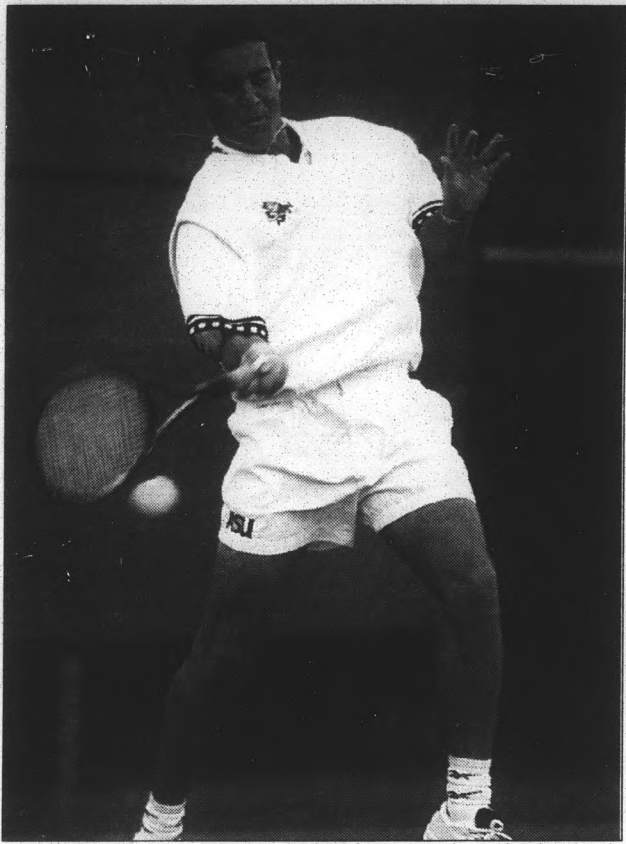
The 1994 games in question were those with Oregon State on Jan. 27, Oregon on Jan. 29, Southern California on Feb. 19 and Washington on March 5.

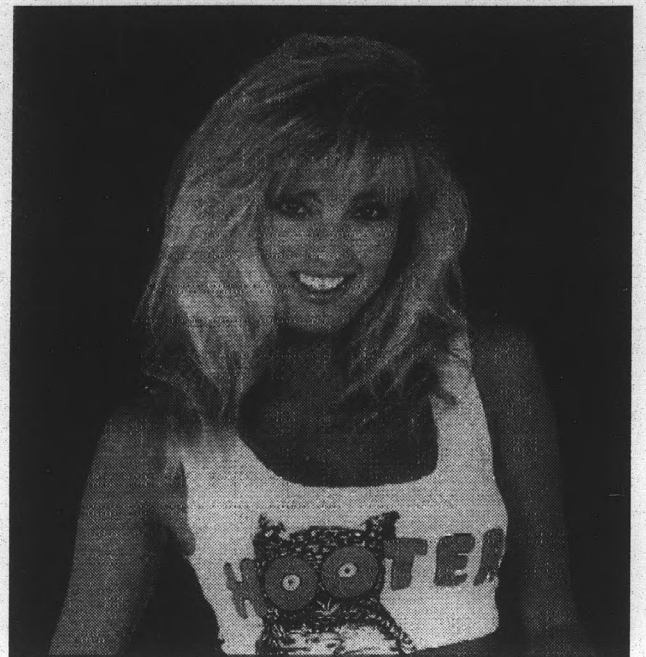
Left fielder Dustin Delucchi scored the final run on shortstop Michael Collins single to left field.

The Sun Devils were lead by second baseman Willie Bloomquist and Myers. Both had three hit nights.

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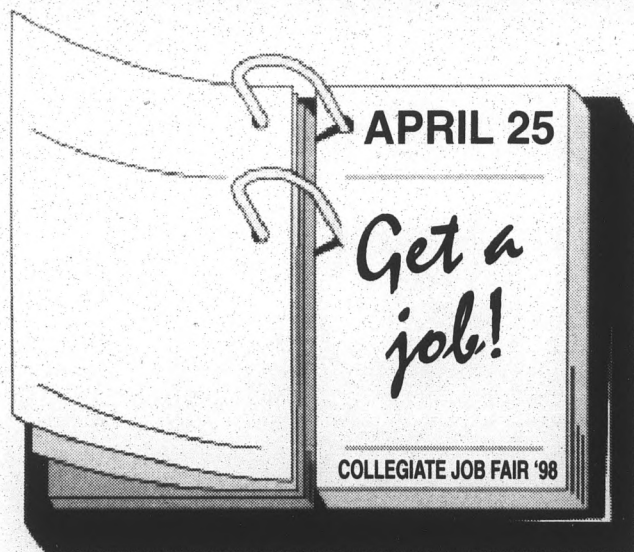

# Men's club gymnastics captures national crown

After the ASU men's gymnastics team clinched first place at this weekend's USA Collegiate National Championships in New Haven, Conn., head coach Scott Barclay felt as if a burden had been lifted off his shoulders.

"We finally pulled it off again," he said. "It's a huge monkey off our backs. The team was confident, but not overly objective. We knew we could do it, but we knew we had to hit (our sets)."

ASU last won the national title in 1994, the year after they were dropped as a varsity sport. The team placed third the last two years.

ASU competed against Washington for the team title and eight NCAA-sponsored squads, plus UW, for individual honors. The Sun Devils defeated the Huskies by a count of 212.90-204.95 to win the national championship.

"This was a great accomplishment for our program," Barclay said. "(We) knew it would be a close race. We were really close to giving it away on the first three rotations, but had a really great effort on the pommel horse which gave us the lead we needed going into the last event.

"(The) rings made me sweat quite a bit when we didn't hit the way we should have. Yet I'm really proud of our team's effort and the fact that we were able to capture the team title with all non-scholarship athletes."

Sophomore Randy Sooter, with an all-around score of 55.65, defeated every athlete on the NCAA teams en route to his first place finish. He also earned All-American status in six events.

"I felt much more confident at this meet," Sooter said. "I feel like I am learning to be a better competitor and hit my sets when needed."

With Sooter leading the way, four of ASU's five all-arounders placed in the top six: Sooter first,

senior co-captain Jon Portillo, third (52.45); junior co-captain Peter Wieging, fifth (51.25); and freshman David Bender, sixth (51.00).

"I think (this finish) shows what great potential he has," Barclay said, referring to Bender.

Wieging, Bender, Portillo, and Rowe each added an All-American placement, and with Sooter's six, the Sun Devils doubled the amount of All-Americans they brought home last year.

"Our team went into this competition with a lot more confidence than in last year's meet," Wieging said. "That really helped because we were more prepared. We still could have done better, but I'm just glad we won."

Barclay was also named Coach of the Year by USA Gymnastics.

"As many obstacles as we have faced as a team, I'm really proud of (them)," he said. "This is the best team we have had and it's only going to get better."

half/half front, unless you want to do the pike," Spini said. "And she said she wanted to do the pike. I said, 'Can you make it?' and she said yes. I said, 'Can you make it?' I'm not here to watch you land with straight legs and hurt yourself. I don't need to go anywhere if you can't make it."

After sticking a near-perfect vault — "another 10.0" Spini said, referring to teammate Carrie Courtney's "Perfect 10" a few minutes later — many Sun Devils were in tears.

"We were all crying. When she stuck we all cried," junior Lisa Vincijanovic said.

"Michelle's half-on, half-off layout is a big plus for us," Spini said. "That's a big vault. That was the hardest vault you saw at the meet (Midwest Regionals)."

"Coming out of a half-on, she's a stud."

The teams' score of 49.575 was the all-time high for an ASU squad and among the best in the country.

"We are pretty proud of that," Hess said. "All year we have struggled with vault because of the new code and everything. This was the first meet we've had so many 10.0 (starting value) vaults thrown, with four. Usually it's only one or two of us. We were pretty proud of that because we have been working so hard."

With regionals now just a pleasant memory, one goal still remains — NCAA Championships.

Thursday, ASU will go up against No. 1 Georgia, No. 3 Alabama, No. 5 Michigan, No. 7 BYU and No. 9 N.C. State in the first round of the NCAA Championships in Los Angeles.

Added to the tough draw will be the tough rotation ASU is in — beam, floor, bye, vault, floor, vault.

Undaunted the Sun Devils are confident of their chances.

"The coaches have made us so mentally strong, that's where we are ahead of other teams," Hess said. "Last year we came up against pressure and conquered it. So I think we are mentally ready."

Spini said it simply — "If we hit 24 sets we should be in the top three in that rotation."

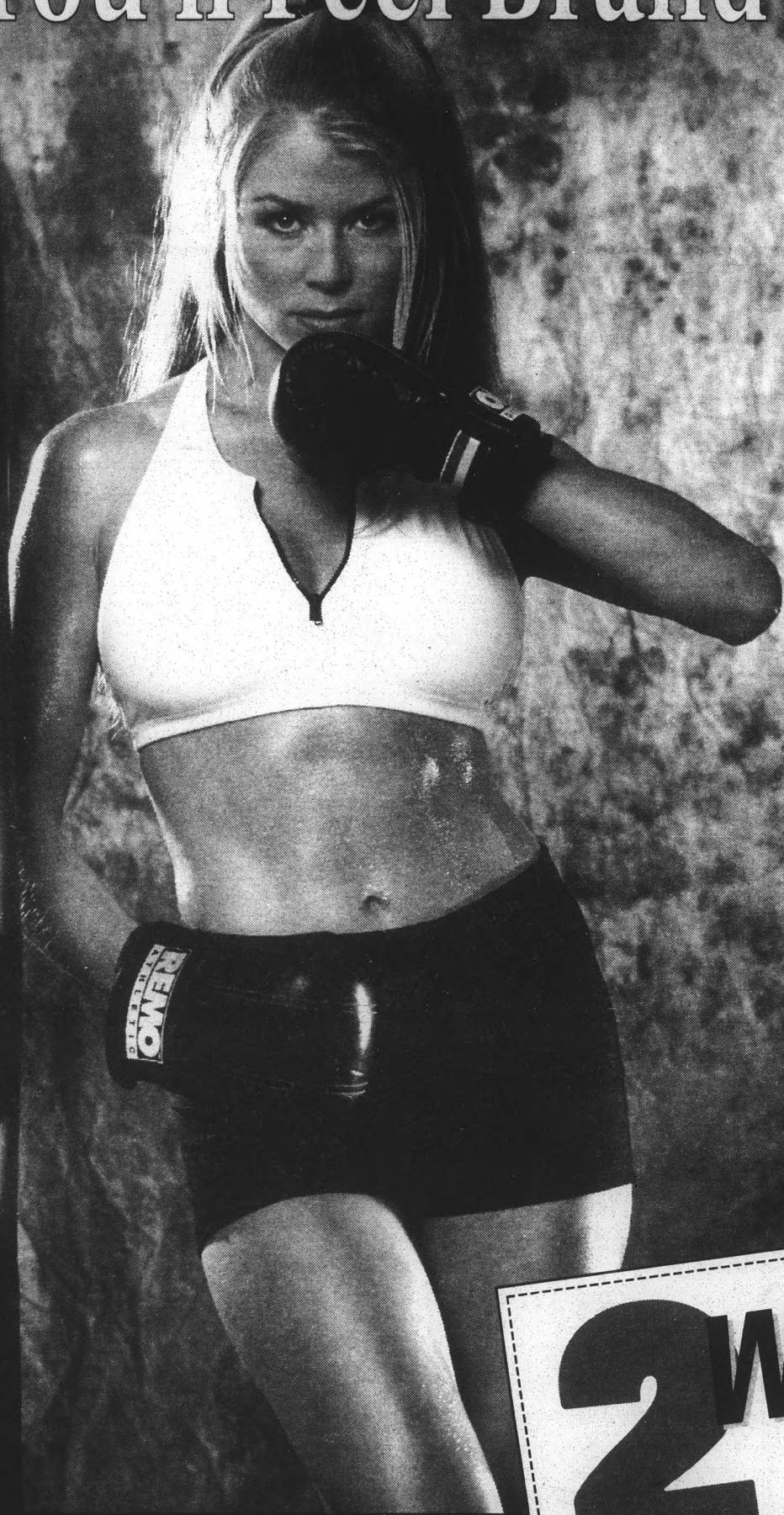
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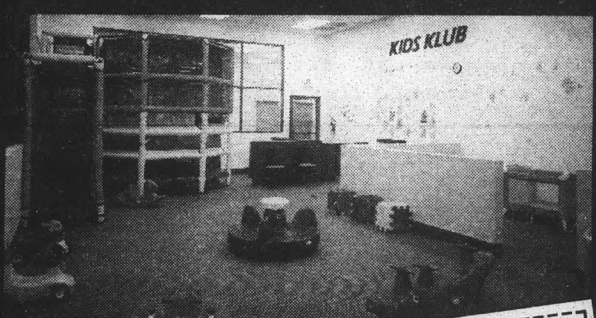
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
