# ASU helps NASA explore surface of Mars

NASA's Mars Global Surveyor Spacecraft began its primary mapping on Mars Monday.

But ASU's geology team, which works with NASA, started gathering information about the alien surface months ago. The information may eventually help launch a manned mission to Mars.

Because so little is known about the red planet, any information gathered will be helpful, said Phil Christensen, ASU's lead investigator for the project.

"We basically don't know anything about Mars," Christensen said. "We're trying to understand the early history. Did Mars have hot springs? Did Mars have oceans? Did Mars ever have life? Anything we learn is interesting."

The geology team will collect information such as temperatures on Mars, heat emitted by the surface, and general information about Mars' atmosphere, said Kelly Bender, the mission planner at ASU.

The information is gathered through an instrument called the Thermal Emission Spectrometer, which collects data 24 hours a day. The TES gives information about the surface of Mars, which in return provides information about the planet's environment.

Christensen received more than \$1 million from NASA and said the team will keep working until at least 2001, although he'd like to continue the work even after that.

"Hopefully we'll find something exciting," he said. "One thing I'm excited about is that our data will play an important role in where the next NASA mission lands on Mars."

He also said ASU's involvement will have a positive impact on the University.

## Border life teaches professor to 'see from both sides'

"It's about discovery and seeing things from both sides," said Alberto Ríos, ASU Regents English professor, who grew up in Nogales in the late 1950s and '60s.

"Of course you are growing up in a special environment living on the border of town," he said. "You're surrounded by food, languages, and fencing."

Ríos will tell about his experience growing up on the U.S.-Mexican border at 3:30 p.m. Thursday in the Anthropology building, room B203. Ríos' speech is part of the Border Studies Colloquium series sponsored by the ASU Center for Latin American Studies.

Although his first language was Spanish, Ríos said he had to learn to balance two languages and two cultures. His mother is from England, and his father is from Mexico.

When he started first grade, he said he got swatted for speaking Spanish.

"For me as a writer, maybe not as a human being, it helped me understand the power of language," Ríos said. "If you could say something that could provoke someone so much, there was a power to that."

He started paying attention to that power and what it had to offer.

Ríos said speaking two languages was like a pair of binoculars.

"By using two lenses you can bring something that is far away much closer so you can see it better," he said. "And by seeing better, you understand it more."

The professor speaks like a living poem, said Jim Hathaway, media relations manager of the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences.

"He presents one side of the Arizona experience that is foreign to a lot of people who have lived here, yet it's much

## Election complaints come rushing in

Three newly appointed Associated Students of ASU elections commissioners handled a flood of complaints Tuesday, six of which were lodged against presidential candidate Jenny Holsman.

The complaints — filed by presidential candidate Mike Sosso's campaign managers and Jayme Sloan, ASASU elections director — accuse Holsman of placing a sign against a tree, posting a sign with a metal stake instead of a wooden one, and campaigning too close to voting sites during the primary election. All of these offenses violate the ASASU elections code.

Holsman appeared at the hearing with 15 witnesses, and commissioners listened to both sides of each complaint. They have 24 hours after Tuesday's 3:30 p.m. meeting to assess penalty points to her and other candidates. Once a candidate receives seven points they are disqualified from the race.

Sloan said if a candidate is disqualified, they can appeal it to the student government supreme court.

Holsman said many of the charges against her overlap, which is why she's not too concerned about being disqualified.

"I ran an honest campaign (for the primary)," she said. "The signs in question fell down on their own accord, and I had campaign helpers checking on them continually."

Campaign Manager Mike Frias stated in his complaint that "In order to ensure a fair election, each candidate should be required to abide by the same rules and regulations. Ms. Holsman refused to follow those rules that were established."

However, Holsman said she's not in the wrong.

She said she told members of her campaign staff to move "Just Jenny" signs 50 feet from the polls, but because of miscommunication, the signs remained in place.

Holsman also said she's unsure of how her sign outside of the ASU bookstore, originally propped by a

wooden stake, became attached to the metal stake next to it.

"The sign either fell down and was put there by someone trying to help me out, or someone placed it

"It really helps ASU's image to be able to participate in missions like this," he said. "It helps to attract better students and better graduate students. It makes a huge impact on the classroom as well."

there, took a picture and made a complaint," she said.

Holsman replied that she "did not accuse anyone, but only said it was possible."

The hours of aggressive banter at the hearing will be taken into account by commissioners, who said it

is their duty to hear all sides and make a fair judgment.

Commissioner Martin Montorfano, a broadcast student working on his second bachelor's degree, said these complaints are a significant part of campaigns.

"These might seem like petty, minor things," he said. "But they come up year after year."

One complaint was filed against former presidential candidate Brian Campbell for propping his sign against a tree; however,

Campbell was knocked out of the race during the primary.

The other two complaints were against College of Liberal Arts and Sciences senate candidates Gregory Ensell and Darin Wisheart for posting a sign too close to a polling site.

"I don't want this election to turn into what it was last year, with a lot of petty complaints," Holsman said. "I didn't file any complaints. All I can concentrate on is running a good, clean campaign."

His third collection of short stories, "The Curtain of Trees," will be published in April. His memoir, "Capirotada," will be available this fall.

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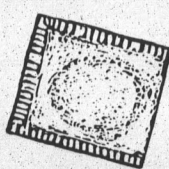
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## Killer had sex with attorney while in jail

PHOENIX (AP) — An attorney representing a man convicted in the so-called bounty hunter slayings was having sex with her client in the jail visiting room, a court was told.

Prosecutors met with Judge Gregory Martin of Maricopa County Superior Court on Monday to determine whether Carmen Fischer should be allowed to continue to represent Michael Sanders, who is awaiting a hearing on a possible death sentence.

Monday's hearing on Fischer's assignment was to continue on Wednesday.

Sanders was found guilty of first-degree murder and related charges for his role in a home invasion in which

Spring Wright, 19, and Chris Foote, 25, were killed in 1997.

The masked men in black who entered their home with assault rifles and bulletproof vests claimed they were on a bounty-hunting mission in search of a California bail jumper. Investigators said it was a robbery instead.

Prosecutors told Martin that Fischer's relationship with Sanders could be a conflict of interest and could result in ineffective presentation, which in turn could be found to be grounds for a new trial.

Matthew Silverman of the Arizona State Bar Association said there is no ethical rule prohibiting sex

between an attorney and client but that an attorney could be disciplined in such a case if the attorney's behavior were deemed to be inappropriate upon complaint and investigation.

Detention officers reported Fischer and Sanders were seen kissing, touching, and engaging in sexual contact — but would break away and behave as if nothing had happened when confronted about it. They were told to stop on one occasion and did not, according to testimony and records.

A jail shift commander recommended that Fischer be barred from visitation because of her behavior.

## National park proposed for Sonoran Desert

TUCSON — Backers of creating a national park in the southern Arizona desert are poetic in their praise of the region.

"This is one of the most beautiful places on Earth, and the burning symbol of the wild southwest," says a promotional brochure. "It is the living core of the Sonoran Desert

"It is essential for the well-being of our souls. It is a desert ark for science and a huge resource for education.

The proposal backed by scientists, writers, and former federal officials would combine two current national preserves and a military testing range into Sonoran Desert National Park — "5,000 square miles of silence," the organizers say.

Barry M. Goldwater Air Force Range, which covers much of Southwestern Arizona, would continue to serve its current weapons training and testing function, however.

The park, were Congress to agree, also would include Organ Pipe National Monument, on the border with Mexico, south of Ajo, and Cabeza Prieta National Wildlife Refuge, west and southwest of Ajo along the Mexican border.

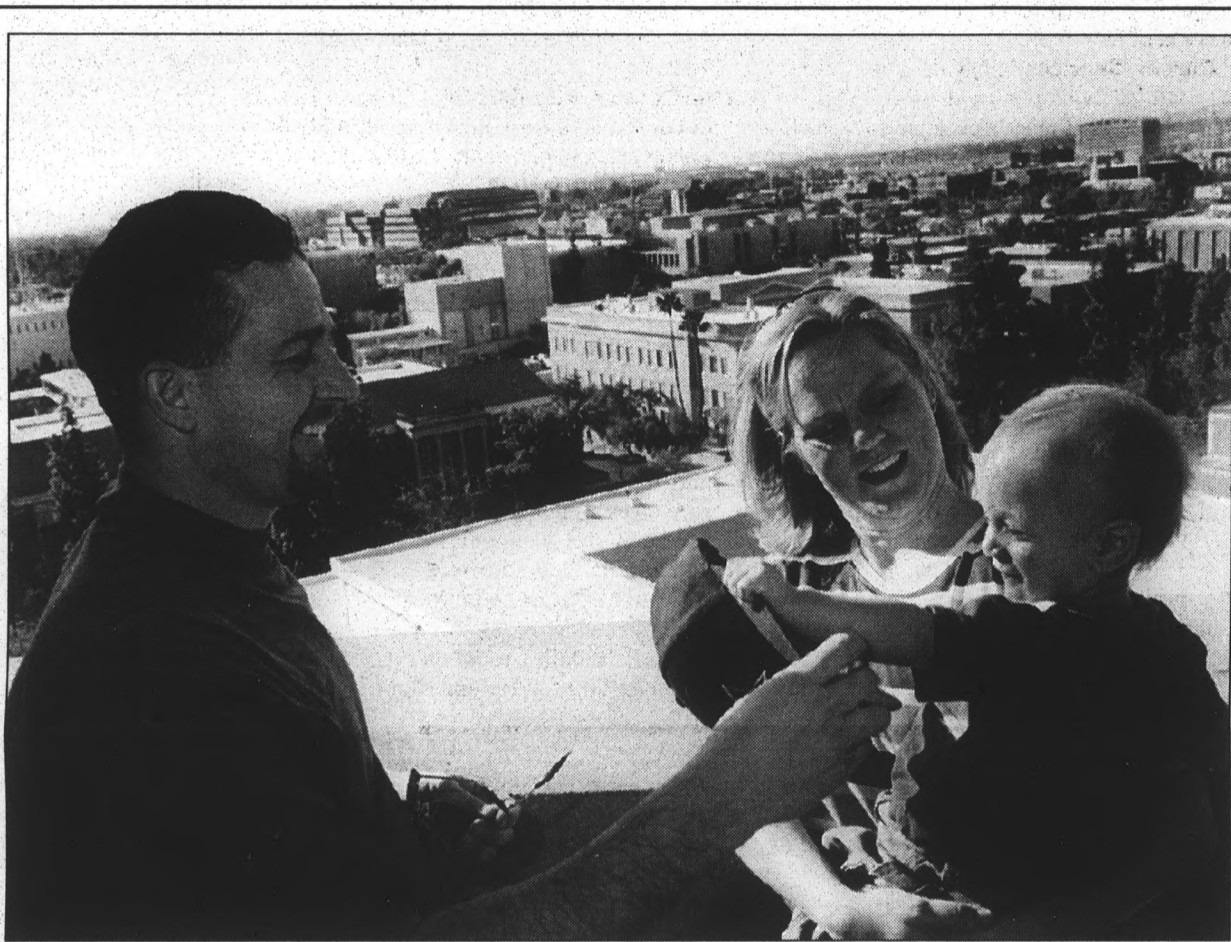
A drive for its creation is to be announced later this week, *The Arizona Daily Star* said in describing the plan today.

The land within the proposed boundaries — it would be larger than Yellowstone and Grand Canyon national parks combined — contains no mines, no paved roads, no privately owned holdings, and no cattle grazing allotments.

It is subject to depredation by off-road vehicles and unauthorized camping, however, and organizers want to see it in the hands of the National Park Service.

That service already deals with Organ Pipe National Monument; the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service deals with the Cabeza Prieta refuge. The Air Force and the Marine Corps use the gunnery and flight range.

"In a world of off-road vehicles, growing millions and leisure time, we either protect ground that matters or see it mashed under our feet," the organizers say in their brochure.

## Elizabeth Dole plans visit to Phoenix

PHOENIX (AP) — Elizabeth Dole plans to visit the Phoenix area Thursday, a day after she launches an exploratory committee for president in Iowa.

Reginald M. Ballantyne III, president of Phoenix Memorial Health System, will join former Attorney General Grant Woods in hosting Dole and about 100 small-business people at Ballantyne's Paradise Valley home.

"I just think she's an extraordinary individual," said Ballantyne, past president of the American Hospital Association. He knew Dole in her role as American Red Cross president.

Dole's plans call for about two hours of coffee, cookies and questions, moderated by Woods and his wife, a former Phoenix television anchor, Marlene Galan.

## Troubled ride owners hired for Chandler Ostrich Festival

CHANDLER (AP) — The Yuma carnival company whose owners were indicted in the death of a Texas teen last year will run the rides at this weekend's Chandler Ostrich Festival.

The festival's prime sponsor, the Chandler Chamber of Commerce, knew about the death, but decided to honor the last year of its contract with B&B Amusements anyway.

"It's not something that we took lightly, nor did we feel bound by the contract," said Sandra Anderson, the chamber's director of special events. "But they've had a very good safety record for 50 years, and we've never had a problem here."

On Monday, Anderson said the company, which is owned by Robert Merten Sr., his wife, Shara Merten, and

their son, Robert Merten II, assured her the death of 15-year-old Leslie Lane was not the company's fault.

Lane was flung from a Himalaya ride last March at the Austin-Travis County Livestock Show and Rodeo. She hit a wall bordering the ride platform and died.

The ride was going faster than recommended by its manufacturer, and the lap bar across Lane's lap was not properly fastened to the car, a grand jury found. The grand jury also said the safety latch was inadequate, the ride had not been sufficiently inspected and the owners allowed it to be used even though they had been notified parts of the ride were broken.

As a result, the Mertens, four B&B workers, and the owner and an employ-

ee of a Florida ride inspection company were indicted on charges related to Lane's death.

Anderson said she was told the charges were dropped and that investigators determined that Lane caused her own death by standing up during the ride.

Brian Kingston, lead prosecutor in the case, said neither is true.

"I've got nine murder indictments in here, and I haven't signed off on anything," said the Travis County assistant district attorney.

Lane's death isn't the only problem that B&B has had, *The Arizona Republic* reported Tuesday: In August, a 14-month-old boy died at a carnival in Mendota, Calif., when he fell from his seat on a kiddie ride that was oper-

ated by a company that Robert Merten II owns. An investigator found that the restraints were unsuitable for very small children.

Five days before Lane's death, an 8-year-old girl was hurt on a kiddie ride at the same fair in Austin. The company admitted no wrongdoing but settled with the girl's family for \$8,000.

In 1995, the company was hit with three safety violations in the death of a 43-year-old employee, who was crushed while assembling a ride in Flagstaff.

In 1991, the same ride that ejected Lane was involved in an incident at a fair in California, seriously injuring two women.

### Phoenix spreads pavement in quick-fix pollution solution

Look out west over the horizon, see anything different?

You should. You should notice more black streaks cutting the city in shreds. You should notice the dwindling desert beauty — the making of our city into a tar-overlaid hell-hole.

That's because the city of Phoenix so generously spent \$6 million to pave over 93 miles of dirt road in the city.

Do you like walking along forgotten roads, kicking the soil up on your boots as you go?

How about jogging on the softer clay in the early morning hours before the hustle and bustle of the city bogs you down?

Maybe you want to hold onto a little of the Old West.

Well, too bad.

In the name of environmental protection and in the quest to rid our city of those nasty particulates, the city of Phoenix poured tar over our precious dirt roads.

We're not saying protecting the environment is a bad thing. Quite the contrary. But it seems Phoenix didn't take the time to review all its options.

Options such as dust-control products sold right here in the Valley. These products bind soil together to keep particles heavy enough so they don't become airborne.

Dust-control products of the past were petroleum-based. Not only were they environmentally unclean, some of them became oily when rain hit the ground. Accidents, it was feared, were inevitable.

Today's products don't have these problems. They're environmentally safe and, if used, allow dirt roads to remain intact while eliminating the dust clouds that choke the city's air.

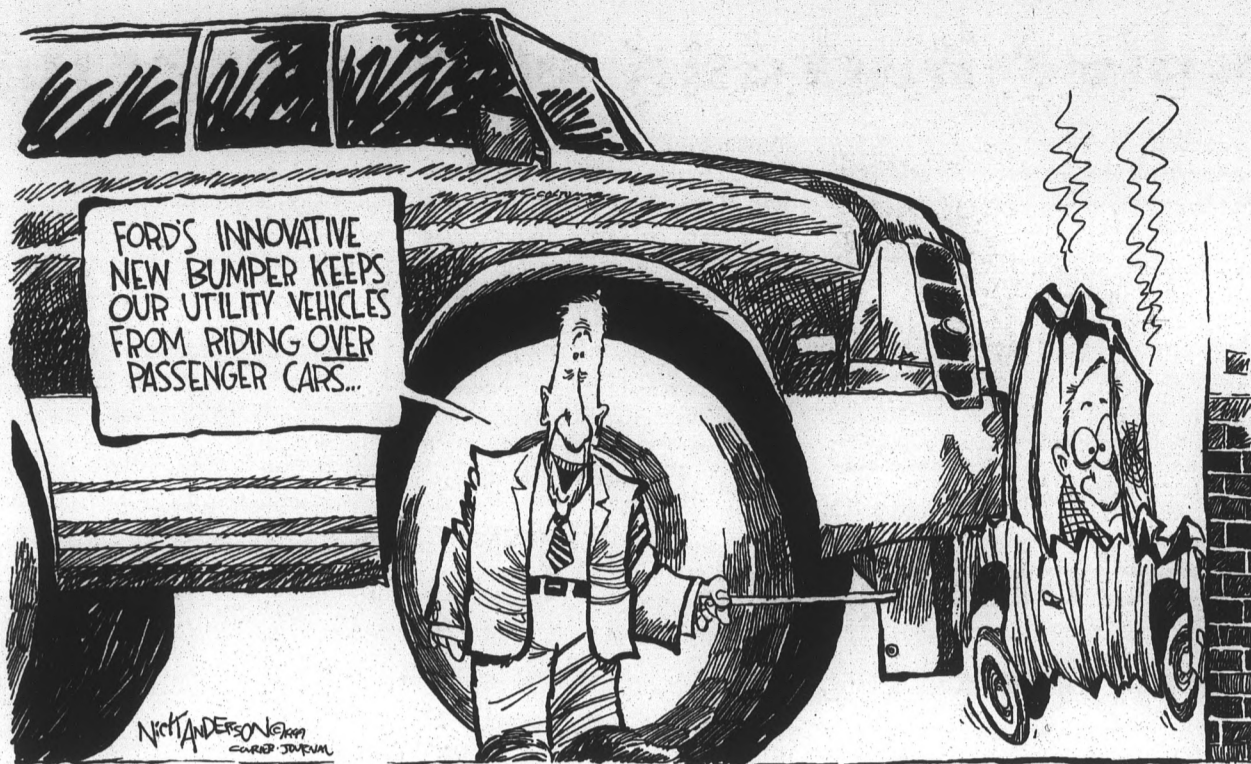
But, the city of Phoenix didn't choose this option. Instead, it decided to pave over those pesky roads and eliminate the problem for good.

We think Phoenix, sticking with this theme, should just drench the city's parks with tar as well. Why bother fertilizing and mowing the grass? Just spread a nice thick layer of pavement on top, and the problem is solved.

The same holds true for golf courses. Surely those constant rounds with the lawn mower must kick up harmful particles of grass. Just saturate the courses with concrete and reap the sanitized rewards.

Paving over the city's last few miles of dirt roads wasn't the answer to the pollution problems that haunt Phoenix. With the amount of vehicles clogging the freeways every morning and afternoon, it's hard to imagine these lonely roads as the true culprit to our problems.

A little time, effort and willingness to explore alternative options would have exposed this error. We're just sad to see the last remnants of our city's dusty beginning buried under the pretense of environmental cleanliness.



## Help scarce for disabled student

Scott Greeves isn't too proud to admit that sometimes he needs a little help.

In fact, he has asked for help every day since Jan. 19.

His classified ad has run in the past 37 issues of the *State Press*. This is not the first time Greeves has asked for help from ASU students, but it is the first time he has had to wait more than a few weeks for a response.

He shouldn't have to wait any longer.

Greeves, 31, is a wheelchair user who has about four or five people working for him at any given time. Each employee works about 10 hours a week in various shifts.

Like other people his age, Greeves has a full-time job. He is intelligent and friendly. He has an apartment and a roommate. He has hobbies and interests. He likes to read, and he regularly watches *Frasier*. In many ways, he is like everyone else.

However, most people take for granted the tasks with which Greeves needs assistance. Although he is capable of doing almost everything, getting ready for the day and preparing for bed require help.

He said that in the past five years, he has hired several ASU students for these positions, and he had hoped to do it again.

"I've always had luck in the past," he said.

This time, though, things are different.

"I didn't expect it to take more than three or four weeks," Greeves said.

Although he has already hired one person, there hasn't been much additional response.

In the past three weeks, he has received only one inquiry about the job opening. One person on a campus of approximately 43,000 has called for more information.

Despite this staggering ratio, Greeves is not discouraged.

"If I spent all my time worrying about hiring someone, I wouldn't get anything done," he said.

This job is certainly unique. It is not about selling a

product or serving customers. It is not about making a profit. It's about a person's life.

Greeves understands that this job is not for everyone, and he is not resentful that the response rate has been low.

He admitted, "This type of work requires a unique kind of individual."

It requires a reliable, punctual person who wants to help others. It's not a job where you call in at the last minute and expect someone to cover your shift. If you don't go to work, Greeves doesn't either.

Greeves said he believes the response rate is low because of a booming job market that allows college students to work for higher wages than he can offer.

Maybe, but \$8.40 is not a low wage by any means.

Plus, many students need jobs with flexible hours. Many students need jobs they can fit in before or after school. Some need a second job that requires just a few hours a week.

Even if the economic argument is weak, we should be able to demonstrate to Greeves and others that ASU has community spirit.

ASU is a strong community. We have several organizations on campus devoted to community service and to helping others.

And, yet only one person in three weeks has called.

Sure, not everyone can do this job. But on a campus of more than 43,000 students, there should be more students who can and want to help Greeves and others in his position.

Greeves said there is a high demand for people to assist wheelchair users.

"It's not just me," he said.

This job is not for everyone, but until someone fills the position, the ad will continue to run, and Greeves will continue to wait.

"It's just a matter of the right person reading the ad," he said.

"Eventually, something will pop up," he said.

Until it does, he waits.

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## New bill could mean unqualified teachers

You won't need any special training, extra-ordinary preparation programs, or certifications to teach if the Arizona Board of Education and some state legislators have their way. Superintendent of Public Instruction Lisa Graham Keegan and a majority of the board is backing House Bill 2280, a proposal that would give individual school governing boards authority to hire non-certified teachers for classroom instruction.

Teachers who teach teachers are not sure that's wise.

"The fear isn't that they'll (uncertified teachers) be incompetent because of lack of tools," said Dr. Gene Glass, associate dean of research at ASU's College of Education. "It's that they'll get into schools having been untried and unobserved."

Professional preparation programs, like those in the COE, teach teachers how to modify and adapt to students, deal with disruptions appropriately, and to plan lessons for the short and long term. Glass said the internship and student-teaching blocks within the program help to weed out those who are just not cut out for the classroom.

Currently, Arizona teacher certification requires a bachelor's degree, completing a

teacher preparation program, and passing a range of exams. In fact, recent proposals would make certification requirements even more stringent. Two new tests and a performance evaluation for teacher certification have been proposed by state authorities within the past year.

That sounds like a step in the right direction. Raising the standards for those leading the classroom should help raise the bar for students as well. So, why would the state, so concerned that certification should really mean something, also say that it's OK to hire uncertified teachers?

The proposed law would allow a school board to hire a candidate with a bachelor's degree and a major or minor in the field of instruction. The new teacher would also need to pass a grammar, math and reading proficiency exam and show, minimum teaching skills. Proponents of the bill say that it would be especially important in rural districts where teacher shortages are on the rise.

The issue of whether a non-certified teacher can do a good job for Arizona's students is not a clear-cut one, said Charles German.

German teaches in the Cottonwood/Oak

Creek district and is board president of the Camp Verde Unified School District. He said that in a rural area like Camp Verde, with approximately 1,550 students in grades K-12, it is sometimes difficult to retain certified teachers, as salaries tend to be lower than what they could make in urban areas.

"If you have someone who's demonstrated professional ability and has the ability to deal with students, I don't have a problem with them teaching," German

said. He added that he'd be concerned about positions that need specific training, like

special education teachers. He expressed mixed emotions about the issue, however. Given an option between a certified teacher and one who is not, he said the choice was clear.

"Experience tells me that you don't have the time to take the chance of putting non-certified teachers in the classroom with students," he said. "But we are going to have a shortage of teachers before too long."

German added that his "gut feeling" was that there was more at issue. He questioned

the motivations behind the decisions being made at the capitol.

"Is this proposal to save money for the districts, or is it for the state department of education to increase funding to charter schools?" he said.

I'll admit that I waver on this issue. Nationwide teacher shortages have been reported in the news. And I do believe there are those exceptional individuals who are born to teach and could do quite well in the classroom, with or without certification. Perhaps there's a way, in needs-based situations, that those people could be allowed into the classroom with strict conditions placed upon them.

We are already allowing experimentation with Arizona's students. It is not necessary for charter school teachers to be certified.

Parents who send their children to public schools expect certain minimum standards. One of which is that the teachers will come to the classroom well prepared with the tools, both practical and subtle, needed to bring our children a first rate education.

Well-intentioned attempts to restructure teacher qualifications could mean dumping ill-equipped and unqualified people into our classrooms.

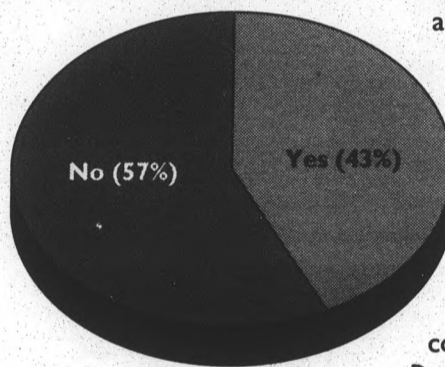

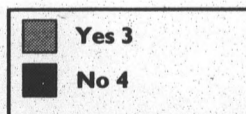
#### Last week's results

# Study: Watching horror movies as a kid can have long-term effects

DETROIT — If *Jaws* scared you out of the water or *Psycho* changed your shower habits, a study suggests you probably aren't alone.

A survey of 150 students at the Universities of Michigan and Wisconsin found that one in four had some lingering "fright" effect from a movie or TV show they saw as a child or a teen-ager.

Some people who saw the thriller about a man-eating shark never went into the ocean again, said Kristen Harrison, a University of Michigan communications professor who co-wrote the study.

And *Psycho*?

"There are people who shower with the door open, even though they're quite sure there isn't a killer in the house," Harrison said Tuesday.

Ninety percent said they were scared by a TV or movie from their childhood or adolescence; 26 percent said they still experience "residual anxiety."

The younger children were when they were frightened, the longer the reaction lasted.

Ranny Levy, president of the Coalition for Quality Children's Media in Santa Fe, N.M., said her own 27-year-old son was frightened of taking a swim in the sea a few years ago and blames it on seeing *Jaws* as a boy.

"He had to force himself. He really identified it with watching *Jaws* when he was little," she said.

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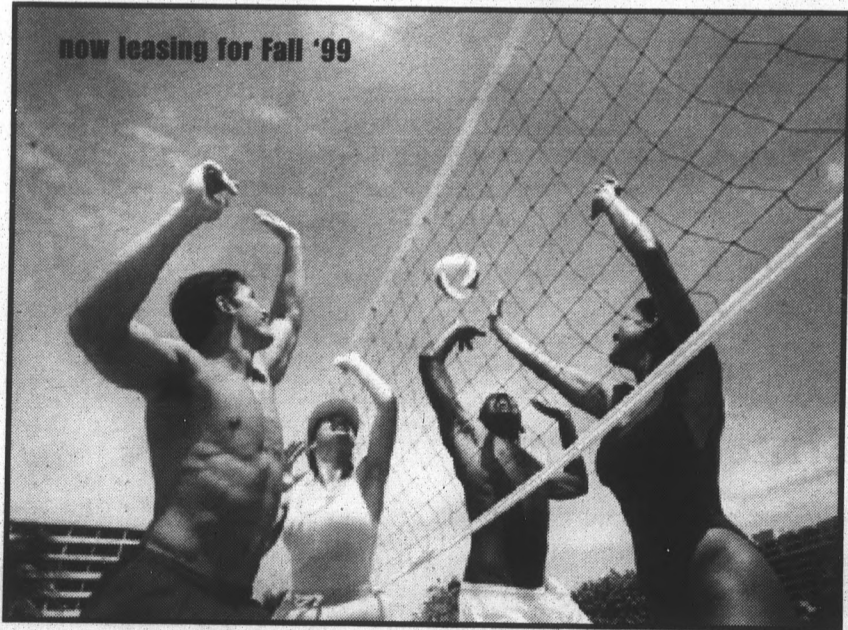
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# Hispanic Mother-Daughter Program hosts workshop

The Hispanic Mother-Daughter Program encourages Hispanic female high school students to continue their education at an institute of higher learning.

Organizers of the program said they hoped a workshop that took place in the Memorial Union Tuesday would bring the goal closer.

The workshop, "Enrichment Programs for College-Bound Students," consisted of the introduction of programs for Hispanic women by ASU faculty and professors.

"We want to build awareness from eighth to 12th graders and let them know that they too can go to college to achieve their dreams," said Rose Lopez, the program's director.

Established in 1984 and sponsored by ASU's Student Life, the program has a goal to encourage Mexican-

American families to escape poverty by pursuing education, said Christine Marin, ASU archivist for Hayden Library's Chicano Research Collection.

"The program bridges the gap between the community and the school," said Marin, who was one of the first members of the advisory council. "College still remains to be this white ivy tower and an organization like this helps us to break through that."

To encourage Hispanic students to go to college, the program recruits a minimum of 100 new seventh-grade students each year for the following year as eighth graders. The women will remain members throughout their college career and beyond.

"The difference between this group and other mentor programs is the mentality that they're educating our mothers so they can educate their families," said Kathya Hidalgo, a Spanish-literature senior who has been in the program since 1990. "I always knew I wanted to go to

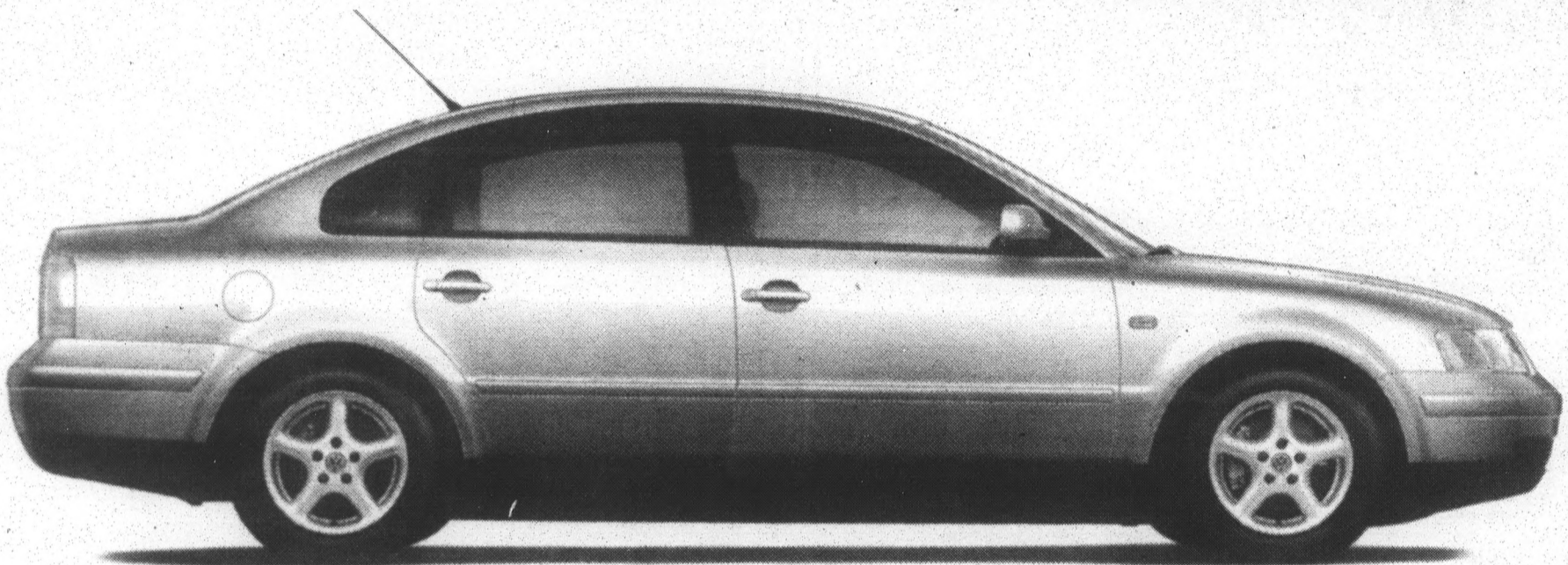
college but they helped me to establish contacts and gave me exposure that I would have otherwise not have had."

Laura Rendon, a professor in educational leadership and policy studies, said the program has flourished since its development more than a decade ago. She said that on several occasions, professors from other colleges have suggested modeling the program.

"I believe the group has helped students set high aspirations," Rendon said. "We've helped to demystify the process of getting into college and parents have been more knowledgeable."

Lopez said the program has graduated 95 students in the last four years and coordinators hope to establish an alumni association in the near future.

"We will continue to serve as mentors for students and assist them with test-taking, studying, and even friendship and dating skills," she said.



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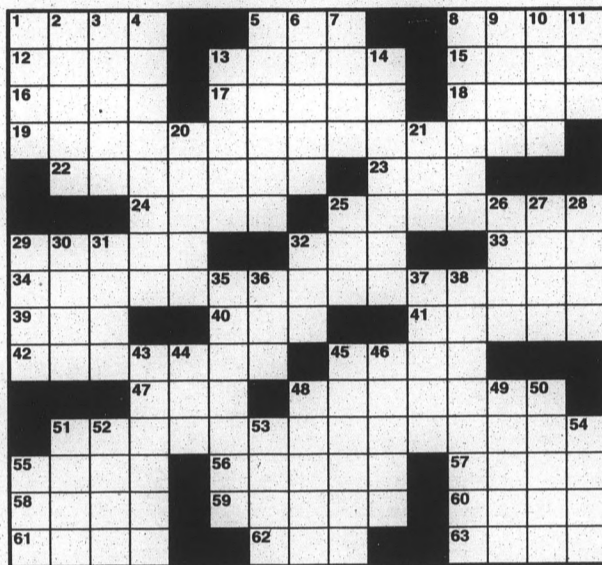



## Waiting list grows for international students' field trip

The ASU International Students Office's annual spring break field trip proved popular as it quickly filled up after the invitations went out a month ago.

Thirty-two students signed up, said Suzanne Steadman, director of the International Students Office. This is the third year the trip has been offered. This year, the aim is to show the students the historic, cultural, and current conditions of Native Americans in Arizona.

Steadman said the day-long trip has two purposes. Primarily, this purpose is educational, intended to focus on the Native American community in the state, specifically the Tohono O'Odham in southern Arizona, she said.

The social function of the trip, though secondary, is also important. Many international students have no plans for spring break and spend the week alone in Tempe, Steadman said.

"At the moment, we have a waiting list of several people hoping to get in," said Lloyd Brimhall, assistant director of ISO. "In general,

international students show a sincere interest in Indian history and culture. We hope to show them some of that. Maybe the field trip can help answer some of their questions."

their culture," said Dina Raad, a graduate student in mass communication. "I've always been intrigued with their spiritual outlook of life, and their stories and history."

When Raad learned she was getting a Fullbright scholarship to go to ASU, she saw it as a great opportunity to learn more about Native American culture. The Jordanian-Palestinian plans to attend a powwow, an Indian ceremony, that ISO offers after spring break.

"I think the picture (the) media gives isn't true, and the best way to learn about the Indians is in their own community," she said. "It will be interesting to see the real reservation life."

The students said they aren't going just to be visitors on the reservation.

"I hope we can share our own culture as well as learn about the Indian (culture)," Raad said. "It can be a two-way process."

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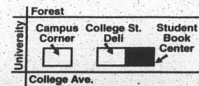

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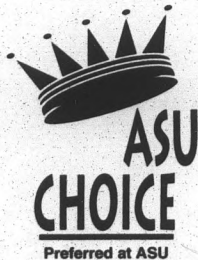
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# Case dropped against retarded boy who took \$2

WEST PALM BEACH, Fla. (AP) — A 15-year-old retarded boy grabbed \$2 in lunch money out of the pocket of a classmate — and for that, he could have gotten life in prison.

For weeks, prosecutors defended their decision to treat Anthony Laster as an adult, even though the boy communicates on the level of a 5-year-old. He spent four weeks, including Christmas, in a jail for adults because his sister was unable to raise the \$500 needed to get him out.

Then, last week, two days after *60 Minutes* arrived to do a story on the case, the charges were dropped.

The prosecutor offered no apologies for his zero-tolerance stand in the case of Anthony, who never knew his father and whose mother died in November.

"You do not cherry-pick the cases, you do not say you feel sorry for this person because there's a developmental disability or this person has had a bad family life so we

won't charge him as an adult," said Mike Edmondson, a spokesman for Palm Beach County State Attorney Barry Krischer.

The decision to drop the charges of strong-arm robbery, extortion and petty theft Thursday had nothing to do with *60 Minutes*, Edmondson said.

The 14-year-old victim changed his story and his new version did not back up the severity of the charges, Edmondson explained.

The child originally told police he felt threatened and in fear of physical harm when Anthony demanded his money during art class Dec. 1 at a Boynton Beach middle school. Later, he said he did not feel he was in danger.

State law gives prosecutors authority to decide which juveniles are treated as adults. Edmondson said in Palm Beach County, the policy is to treat as adults all offenders who are at least 14 and have committed a felony.

"If it is automatic, they've got a lot of holes in their

zero-tolerance policy," said John Walsh, an attorney with the Juvenile Advocacy Project who was appointed by a court to represent Anthony.

Anthony did not deny taking the money. He said he was hungry and used the money to buy candy, according to police.

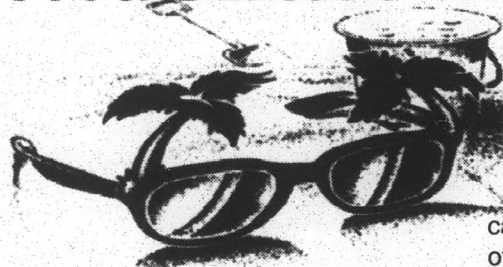
Walsh said what was needed in this case was for someone to take a look at the child and his circumstances.

"Maybe if they had done that they would have seen that he was having difficulty dealing with his mother's death," he said. "There just seemed to be very little attention to the individual child. No one seemed to care."

Anthony's family did not return calls for comment.

"You scan the country, you rarely find cases this outrageous," said Dan Macallair, associate director of the Justice Policy Institute in San Francisco. "This particular prosecutor is prosecuting kids in adult court that probably shouldn't even have gotten past the school principal."

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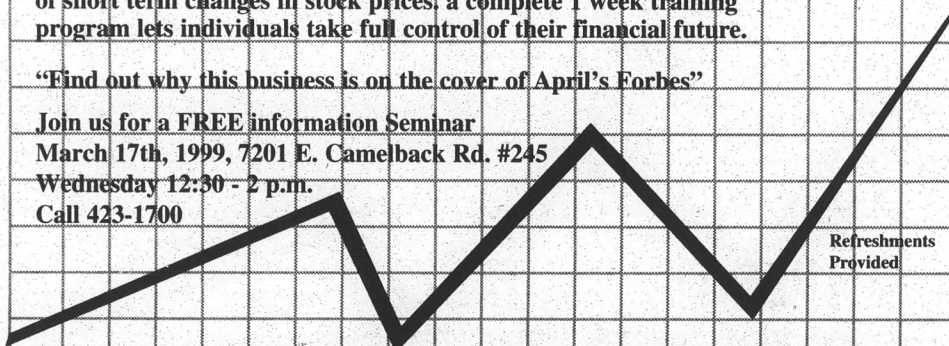
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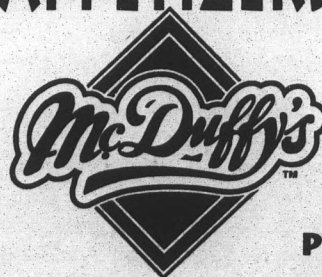
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# N.C. town agrees to annex black neighborhoods

TRENTON, N.C. (AP) — Two weeks after the mayor inflamed racial tensions by saying blacks are unfit to govern themselves, the all-white town council agreed to annex three black neighborhoods — the first annexations in Trenton's 215-year history.

Black activists immediately announced they would drop a week-old boycott of the town's white-owned businesses after the three councilmen agreed Monday night to annex the areas and their roughly 100 residents.

Trenton is a farming center of 200 people on North Carolina's coastal plain. The town is about one-fourth black, and activists hope that will lead to the election of the town's first black council member.

"We just want to show people this board is not racially biased," Councilman Charles Jones said. "Let's put this ugly thing behind us and all go back to living normal lives where we all speak to each other and are friends."

Blacks had filed a federal lawsuit Jan. 12 alleging the town discriminated by refusing to annex the three areas, called Haiti, Monktown, and Spicely-Quinn Lands.

But the issue didn't catch fire until two weeks ago, when Joffree Leggett, Trenton's white mayor of 16 years, told *The Kinston Free Press* that blacks don't belong in town government.

"They are not leaders," he said. "A black man would rather work for a white person."

Leggett, 81, resigned last week under pressure from the

council.

Most residents of the three neighborhoods have signed a petition in favor of becoming part of the town. After the council's decision, many said the town never would have acted without pressure from the NAACP.

"They weren't going to do nothing," said Johnson Willis, one of the plaintiffs in the lawsuit. "They never wanted to give us nothing. I had to sue them for everything."

Jones, the councilman, said the board could not consider annexing the three areas until early this year, when the neighborhoods were finally connected to the town sewer service.

The annexation process is expected to take about a year. "This was meant to happen, and I'm glad it happened," said Sharon Ingram, who lives in one of the neighborhoods.

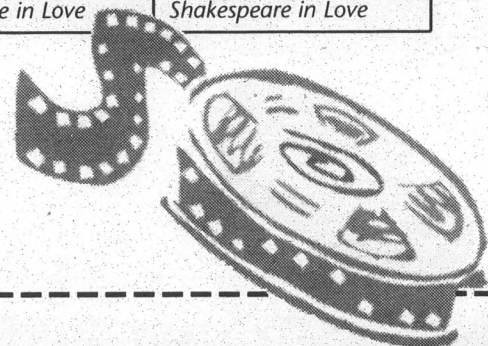

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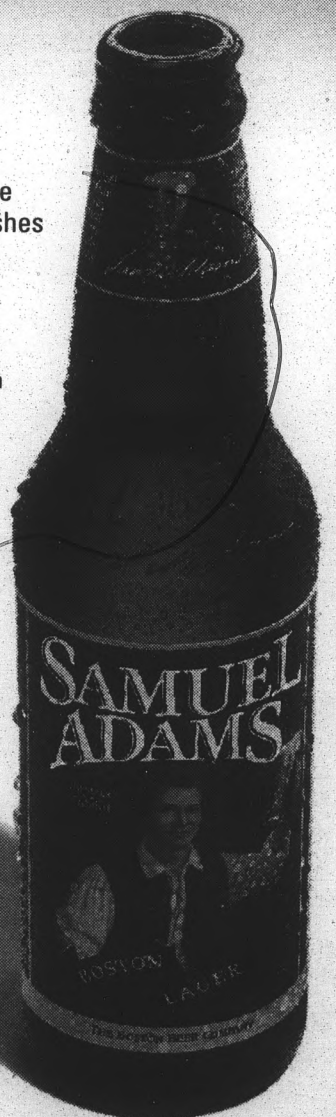
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**RJR Nabisco to quit the cigarette business**

NEW YORK — RJR Nabisco Holdings Corp., the food-and-tobacco conglomerate whose brands include Camels and Winstons, Oreo cookies, and Ritz crackers, is getting out of the cigarette business.

RJR said Tuesday it will sell its international tobacco business to Japan's biggest tobacco company for \$7.8 billion and spin off its domestic tobacco operations as a separate company.

The moves come amid rising legal challenges to cigarettes and falling numbers of U.S. smokers — something tobacco opponents were quick to note.

"The tobacco industry is in deep trouble," said Ahron Leichtman, executive director of Citizens for a Tobacco-Free Society.

RJR said its aim is merely to help the cigarette and food companies achieve greater success as separate entities.

The \$17 billion conglomerate has been under pressure for several years from major stockholders to separate its food and tobacco businesses because the tobacco is considered a drag on RJR's stock. Some investors won't put their money in any company that has tobacco holdings, out of either opposition to smoking or fear that lawsuits will hurt profits.

The breakup doesn't entirely solve the problem, because RJR can be hit with tobacco lawsuits even after it has shed its cigarette business.

Carl Icahn, the corporate raider who holds 7.7 percent of RJR stock, had threatened to launch a fight for control of the board of directors to force a separation. He did not return calls for comment Tuesday.

His 25 million shares grew in value slightly as RJR Nabisco stock rose 12 1/2 cents to \$28.75 a share in trading on the New York Stock Exchange. Nabisco Holdings — which trades as a separate stock even though RJR owns 80.6 percent of it — closed up 31 1/4 cents at \$44.93 3/4 a share.

RJR Nabisco was created during the mid-1980s when

the R.J. Reynolds tobacco company bought the food company Nabisco Brands.

RJR's international tobacco business is a distant third to Philip Morris Cos. and British-American Tobacco, and its earnings have fallen amid financial turmoil in its key Russian and Asian markets. It will be sold to the Japan Tobacco Co.

"The deal will allow us to secure a base for future growth overseas and establish us as a global player," Japan Tobacco said in a statement.

After the sale, RJR will spin off its domestic tobacco operations to RJR shareholders. The tobacco business will revert to its old name — R.J. Reynolds Tobacco Co. — and retain its headquarters in Winston-Salem, N.C.

The resulting RJR Nabisco will be basically a food company, with such products as Chips Ahoy! and Snackwell's cookies, Life Savers candy, and Planters nuts.

"We believe that the food and tobacco businesses will be best able to achieve their full potential under separate ownership structures," said RJR chairman and chief executive Steven F. Goldstone.

If RJR had tried to spin off its food assets instead, it would probably have been accused by anti-tobacco forces of trying to hide assets. Such accusations could have tied up such a breakup in court.

John Maxwell, an analyst at Davenport & Co., said RJR got a fantastic price for the international business and will use the proceeds to help reduce its \$9.1 billion debt.

Even with lower debt, however, the R.J. Reynolds Tobacco Co. faces challenges. Analysts expect the steady decline in smoking will accelerate because of big price increases that are being used to pay for a lawsuit settlement that is costing the industry \$246 billion over 25 years.

In addition, the government is considering a similar suit to recover the costs of treating sick smokers. A California jury recently ordered Philip Morris to pay a smoker a record-breaking \$51 million. A class-action smokers' suit is on trial in Florida, and several union health funds are suing the industry.

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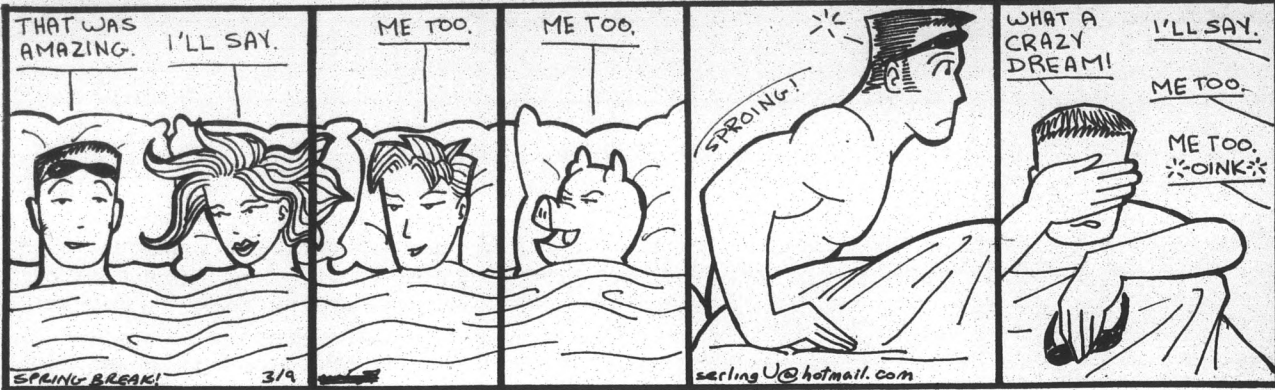

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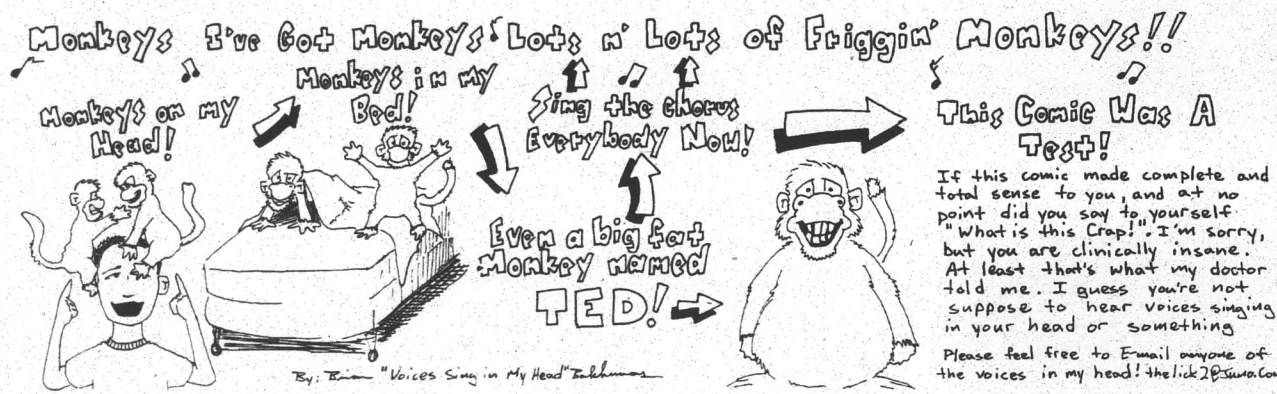

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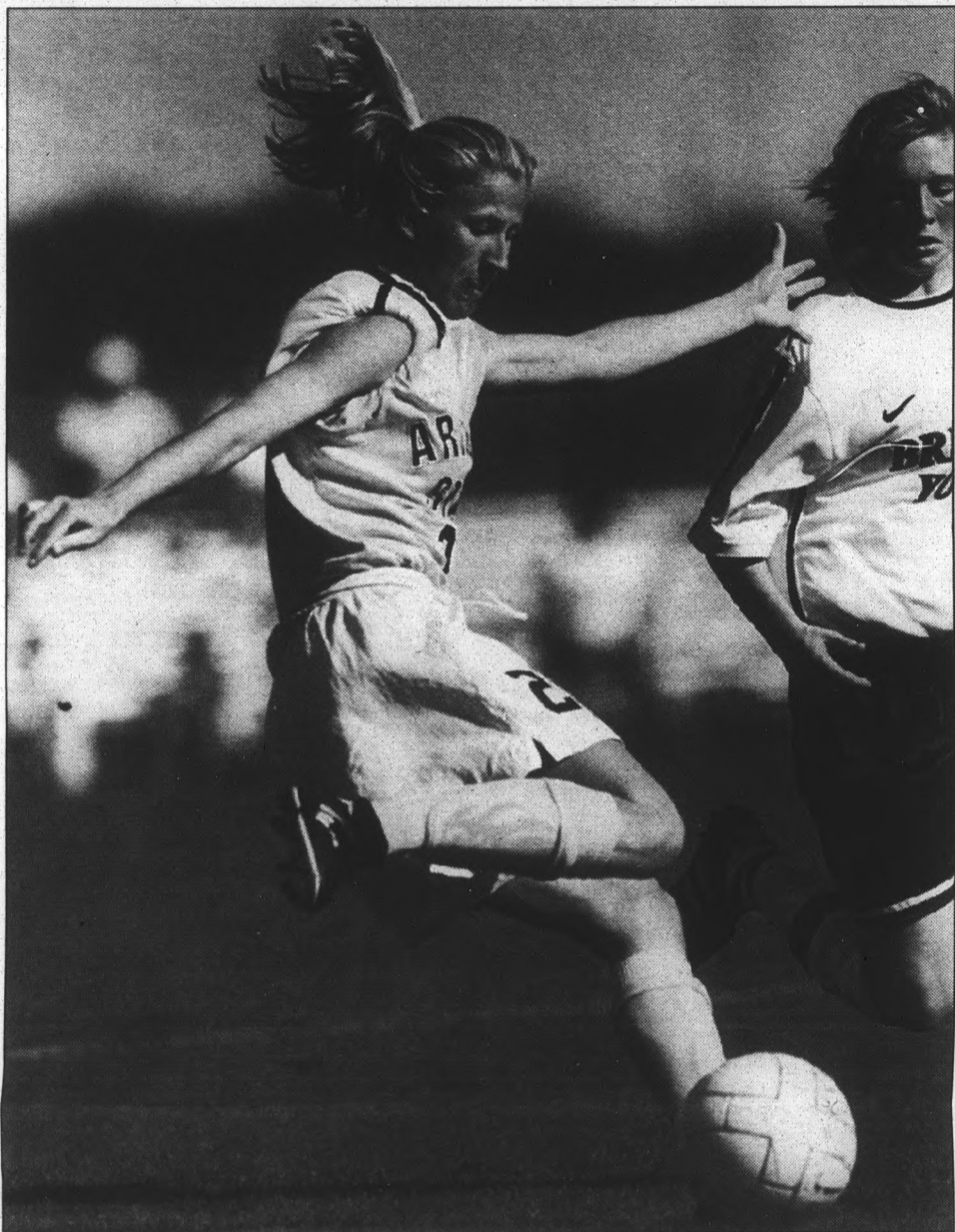
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## Tullock impresses at national camp

The Under-21 Women's National Soccer Team now knows the power of Stacey Tullock. The power?

ASU head coach Terri Patraw found out about this power in Tullock's freshman year. Tullock led the team in every perceivable offensive category. She was awarded the Pac-10 Freshman of the Year, leading the conference in goals and scoring.

"She is a heck of a talent, but she is also a heck of a person," Patraw said.

The camp, held in Orlando, Fla. from Feb. 19-24, was nothing but soccer: eat, sleep and study soccer.

"It was a week basically of nothing but soccer," Tullock said. "(We) got up, ate, practiced, came back, practiced again. Then the next day was the game."

When Tullock went to her first national camp, she was hoping just to make an impression and, in a long shot, be invited back.

"They (head coach Loren Gregg and staff of the camp) didn't expect me to do as well as I did," Tullock said. "It went really well."

Tullock played in two of the three games, scoring in one of them. Against Clemson on Feb. 21, Tullock registered a goal in the team's 4-0 win. The team defeat-

ed the University of Florida 3-1 the next day and Finland on Feb. 24. Tullock dressed for the team's 3-1 win over Finland but did not play.

Tullock said the play at the camp was quicker, but that didn't phase her. She felt right at home, playing with all that talent.

"It was definitely a step up," Tullock said. "The speed of play was very fast.

Fortunately I was able to play with that. That is the type of player I am — a quick player. It wasn't that hard for me to get adjusted."

Patraw was amazed by how much Tullock accomplished at her first national camp.

"She made such an impression that by the end of the week she was dressing with the women's national team," Patraw

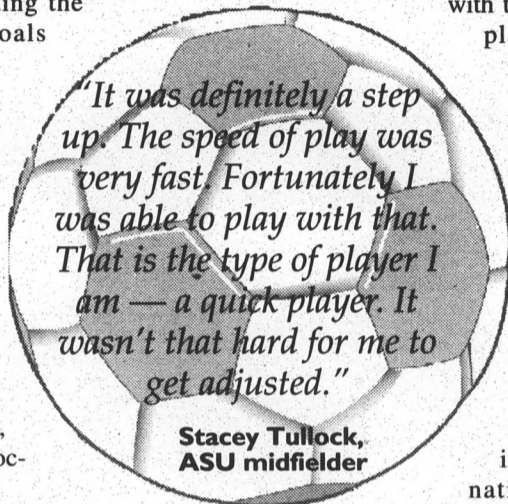
said. "To make that type of impression (in) three or four days is

just fantastic. The type of feedback she got back from the national team staff — hey, you can't be anything but proud of her."

Tullock would have been invited back, but the team was full for a trip to upcoming trip to Germany. She will get a call for the next camp.

# Lady Vol seniors aspire to win 4th title, go out in style

A word, a nod or just a look is all it takes.

Then Kellie Jolly tosses a pass down-court and Chamique Holdsclaw finishes the break with a layup. Or Holdsclaw flips the ball out to Jolly for a three-pointer.

Their mostly silent on-court communication has developed over four seasons of playing together for Tennessee and produced remarkable results.

The No. 2 Lady Vols (28-2) have won an unprecedented three consecutive NCAA women's basketball titles. Now, as Jolly and Holdsclaw prepare for their final NCAA tournament, they want to make it four in a row.

"We want to go out there and win our fourth championship and go out in style," said Holdsclaw, who on Tuesday became the first three-time selection to The Associated Press women's All-America first team.

Jolly, an honorable mention All-America, puts it even more simply.

"We want to go out as winners," she said.

Jolly and Holdsclaw seemingly had little in common when they arrived on the Tennessee campus as freshmen in 1995.

Holdsclaw, who is 6-foot-2 and black, learned her game playing against boys in New York City schoolyards.

Jolly, who is 5-10 and white, polished her game against her brothers and through hours of shooting alone in a school gym in rural Sparta, Tenn.

"Both are quiet, soft-spoken, not extremely outgoing," Lady Vols coach Pat Summitt said. "At times, I think both of them come across as being very shy."

Not on a basketball court. There they are fierce competitors who stay calm while feeding off each other.

They also are confident, as Jolly showed when she won her first national champi-

onship.

"Kellie told me when she was a freshman: 'One down, three to go,'" Summitt said.

While Jolly is like a pit bull, with bruises and scrapes from diving for loose balls, Holdsclaw is quick and graceful, able to take over a game at any time.

She is Tennessee's career scoring leader — male or female — and needs only seven points to pass former Lady Vol Bridgette Gordon as the NCAA tournament's leading scorer. Seven more rebounds, and she will pass USC's Cheryl Miller as the tournament's rebounding leader.

Holdsclaw also has been voted the Final Four's MVP the past two years.

"I'm playing with the best basketball player in the world," Jolly said of Holdsclaw. "It's been fun. It's an honor and a privilege to play with her out on the court. She's very smooth and smart."

Jolly, a point guard who would like to coach someday, has a few records of her own, including most assists at a Final Four (20 in 1997) and most assists in a title game (11, also in 1997). She also shares the mark for the NCAA's highest 3-point shooting percentage in a title game, hitting four of the five she took mostly from NBA distance.

She helped spark Tennessee to its 1997 title by returning from a badly sprained ankle to score a then-career-high 19 points in the Midwest Regional championship over Connecticut.

"We're not the typical vocal leaders — 'Do this, do that.' We try to lead by example," said Holdsclaw, the likely first pick in the upcoming WNBA draft.

And that means not settling for anything less than a fourth championship.

"If our defensive intensity is there, I don't think there's a team in America that can stop us," Holdsclaw said.
